We define those goals as...

To enjoy a vibrant, life-changing relationship with God. There is no higher goal than that of helping a hurting child to understand and experience the deep love of the Father and to trust Jesus as Savior. This is the foundation on which we build, and we invest in this goal from the first day a child enters our care.

- To experience emotional and physical well-being. Vulnerable children come to us with physical needs and deep emotional pain locked inside. Each of our programs addresses the physical needs as we focus on emotional healing. You are helping us to make investments in professionals who have training in trauma-informed care and are dedicated to walking with a child to true healing.
- To be equipped for a life of independence and service. We want to do more than heal a child's hurts; we want to prepare and equip them for successful independence and the desire to serve family and community. Our kids receive life skills instruction, training in marketable skills, and connection with local churches for support and service.
- To live in community, free of fear and violence. Too many of our kids live in communities that are not safe and do not have adequate resources to secure justice for children who are abused or exploited. Our professional teams seek to stand in this gap, working with community partners, local leadership, and government authorities to change the way they protect and support children.

May each of us "run with perseverance" toward these goals, full hearted, with joy and courage to show every child how much they are treasured by our good Father.

What is a journey?

In the simplest, most literal terms, a journey is a trip. But as all of us who have traveled – literally or figuratively – know, it encompasses much more than the movement from where we are today to where we will be tomorrow or in 10 years.

For vulnerable children and orphans, the journey from the pain of their past to a future of hope and wholeness is one with many starts and stops, inevitable disappointments, and hard-won victories.

For many years, residential care was the solution, the destination of the journey of a homeless child, whether the reason for homelessness is the death of or abandonment by the child's parents, separation from family by war or other calamities, or abuse that makes it impossible for a child to return home.

While we understand that a quality residential option is often a necessary "rest stop" on a child's journey, we firmly believe that the best long-term option is a real family. This could mean reunification with biological family, or when this is impossible, careful placement of a child inside a loving Christian family in or near that child's community.

That's why with every stop along a child's winding path, we look with confidence toward the real destination – family!


