In the evening, guests can join in an Evening of Access Magic Silent Disco on the Dance Floor.

Big Umbrella Day is at Lincoln Center's campus, located between West 62nd Street and West 65th Street, between Columbus and Amsterdam Avenues.

Getting to Lincoln Center

Travel Options:

The Lincoln Center Campus is on the Upper West Side of Manhattan between West 62nd and 65th Streets and Columbus and Amsterdam Avenues.

BY SUBWAY: David Geffen Hall is a short distance from the **1** train at West 66th Street and a slightly longer distance from the **A**, **B**, **C**, **D** or **1** trains at 59th Street—Columbus Circle. Both subway stations are accessible via elevator.



BY BUS: The M5, M7, M10, M11, M66, and M104 bus lines all stop within one block of Lincoln Center.

Access-A-Ride:


If you need an address for Access-A-Ride we suggest **20 Lincoln Center Plaza** (our designated Access-A-Ride drop-off on Columbus Avenue between West 63rd and West 65th Street).

Pick-Up/Drop-Off:

Guests can be dropped off and picked up on Columbus Ave between 62nd and 65th street.

Parking

Main Campus Parking (operated by ICON) is available.



- Designated accessible parking spaces are located in the yellow section of the garage.
- Entrance for Reserved Parking Section is on Amsterdam Avenue at 64th Street.
- Parking permit and/or sticker must be displayed.
- Advance reservations for parking include a \$5 service charge.
- Height restrictions for vans apply.

When I Arrive

I can plan to travel to the Lobby of David Geffen Hall, near the corner of West 64th Street and Columbus Avenue.

This is a good place to arrive and find out information about the day's events, where there are restrooms and places to sit and relax. The Lobby will open at 10am on Big Umbrella Day.



I do not need a ticket to come to Big Umbrella Day – I can just show up!

If the event I am interested in or the art station I want to explore is busy when I arrive, I can check the schedule to see if there is time to come back later. In the lobby of David Geffen Hall, there are bathrooms, air conditioning, a water fountain, places to sit, and an information table where guests can learn all about Big Umbrella Day and ask questions.

There are several places to take a break and several chill-out spaces available throughout the day:

KultureCity Sensory Activation Vehicle

This is a dedicated chill-out space near the Garden. Guests are welcome to enter for sensory regulation and encouraged to use the space for up to 15 minutes at a time.



Outdoors at The Garden at Damrosch Park, close to the interactive gardening activity.

This is a good outdoor space to take a break. There is seating and sensory materials to borrow.




Indoors in the David Geffen Hall Lobby

This is a small break space close to where performances are taking place. It is a good place to get away from the crowd but to still be able to hear any performances happening on the Grand Promenade.




Indoors at the David Geffen Hall Music Box
