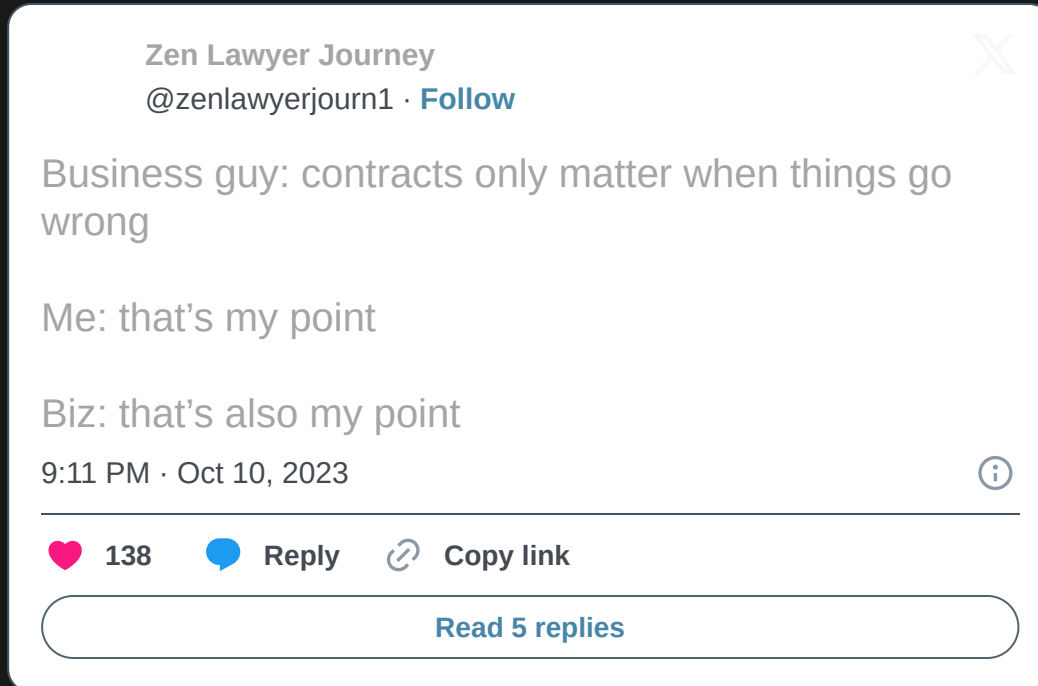

Over 500 Acts in the Singapore Statute Book are revised.
The Acts are updated to 1 December 2021.

SIMPLIFIED LANGUAGE

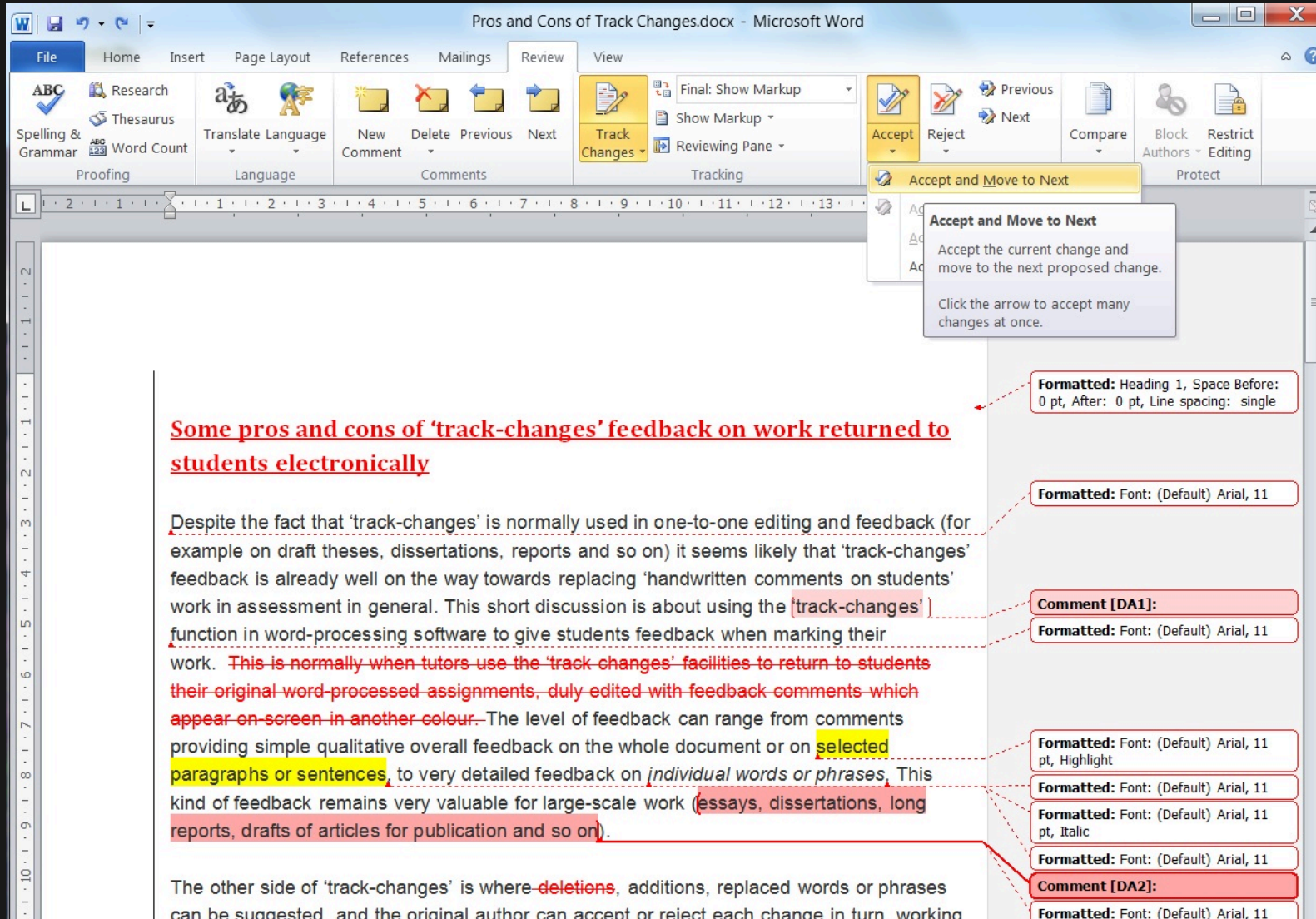

Step 1: Tokenize text into a list of words

Step 2: Compare the list of words using
SequenceMatcher

Step 3: Get the opcodes

- ('equal', 0, 4, 0, 4)
- ('replace', 4, 6, 4, 6)
- ('equal', 6, 9, 6, 9)

HOW TO GET A *redline*

Step 4: Create the redlines from the opcodes

- ('equal' , 0 , 4 , 0 , 4) -> "The quick brown fox"
- ('replace' , 4 , 6 , 4 , 6) -> "~~jumps over~~
walks past"
- ('equal' , 6 , 9 , 6 , 9) -> "the lazy dog."

HOW TO GET A *redline*

Step 5: Finish by forming the output

"The quick brown fox ~~jumps over~~ walks past the lazy
dog."

IT WORKS FOR MY APP!

Redlines

`Redlines` produces a Markdown text showing the differences between two strings/text. The changes are represented with strike-throughs and underlines, which looks similar to Microsoft Word's track changes. This method of showing changes is more familiar to lawyers and is more compact for long series of characters.

Redlines uses [SequenceMatcher](#) to find differences between words used.

Example

Given an original string:

```
The quick brown fox jumps over the lazy dog.
```

And the string to be tested with:

```
The quick brown fox walks past the lazy dog.
```

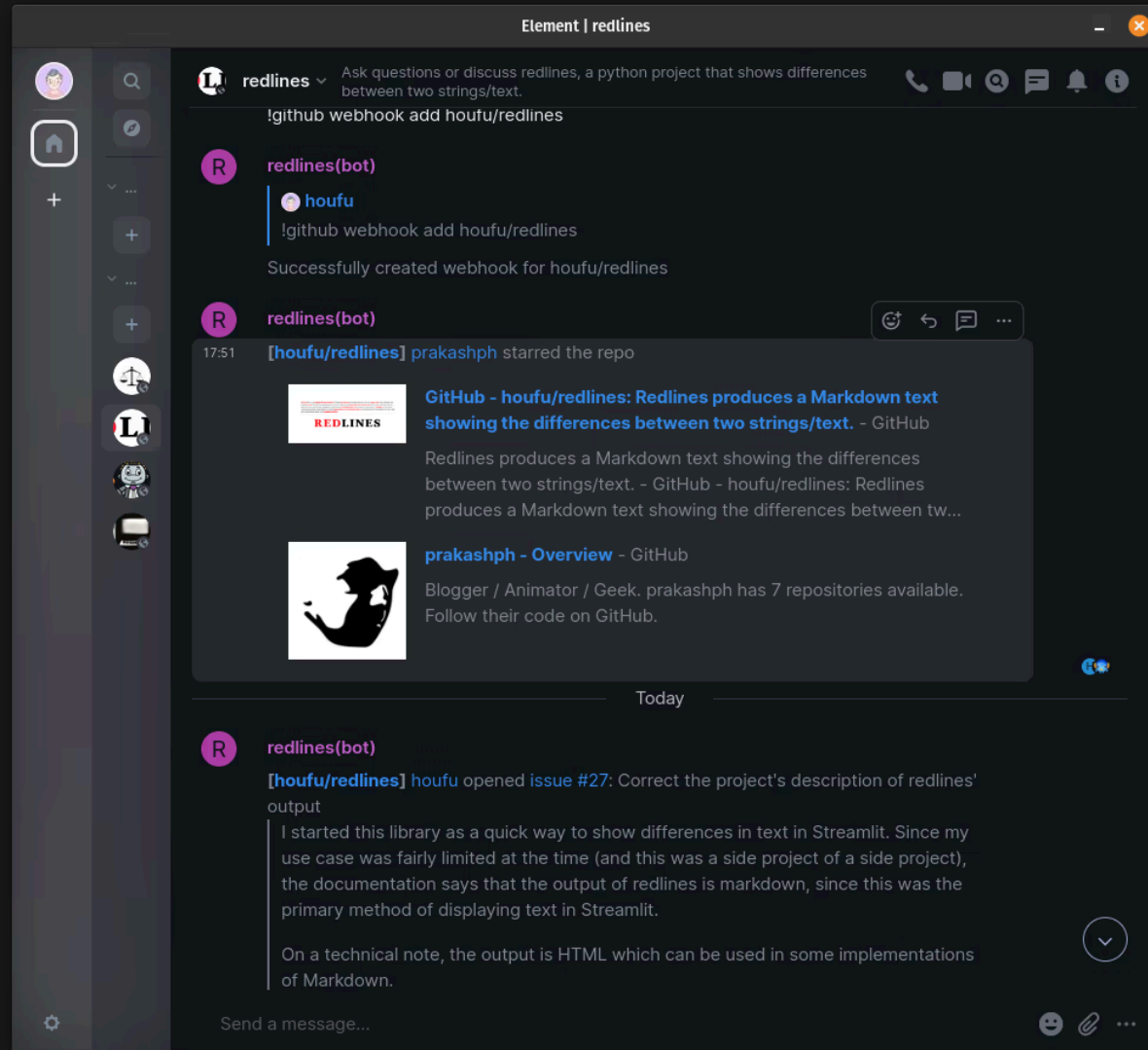
The library gives a result of:

```
"The quick brown fox <span style='color:red;font-weight:700;text-decorat:
```

Which is rendered like this:

The quick brown fox ~~jumps over~~ walks past the lazy dog.
