



WHO WE ARE

Multicultural Arts Victoria (MAV) has played a critical role in promoting cultural diversity and challenging the dominant cultural narrative, by facilitating pathways into systems of cultural production, dissemination and consumption, for and with artists from diverse cultural backgrounds. Our deep roots into diaspora communities and engagement with newly arrived refugees and migrants have made MAV a nexus for participation, creation and self-determination.

Our multi-disciplinary and cross artform capability has attracted artists from around the globe to collaborate in artmaking that subverts traditional concepts of classical versus contemporary, professional versus community, to produce new works that have inspired, provoked and entertained millions of audience members. MAV has positioned art and artists centrally in its advocacy and capacity building, so that the journey towards cultural equity is shaped, first

and foremost, by the talents and contributions of culturally diverse artists.

Each year we work with approximately 2,000 culturally diverse artists, across all artforms, to facilitate cultural participation and the creation of new work, enabling cultural expression as a fundamental human right, and strengthening community cohesion by responding creatively to the experiences of migration and settlement.

Our role is not to dictate the terms of our cultural engagement, but to dismantle structures that prevent artists and communities from directing their engagement with us, through self-determination and agency. As such, our annual program is in constant evolution. We aim to be nimble and responsive, sourcing and applying resources from government, philanthropy, education and community partners to realise artists' creative visions.


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STATE OF CULTURE

MAV strengthens the musical ecology of Australia by creating pathways for artists from refugee and Indigenous backgrounds into band-rooms, recording studios, radio stations and onto stages - linking them with top musicians and producers and providing the tools to create new music, establish an online presence and begin their journey in the Australian music industry. State of Culture is a professional-development music program that challenges and creates new Australian music.

Examples of the State of Culture 2019 program include:

Assembly (Cultural Diversity Week)

Bringing the areas of Multicultural Affairs and the Creative Industries together, Assembly is a commissioned artistic centrepiece of the key events during Cultural Diversity Week (16-24 March 2019). Through an innovative 11-piece ensemble, this work in collaboration with a range of prominent high-calibre instrumentalists - will be an outstanding example of innovative inter-cultural creative collaboration.

ReMastered Myths

ReMastered Myths brings together artists from Victoria's richly diverse communities highlighting rare and under-represented musical styles and generating some of the most exciting musical creations to-date in a range of showcase events.

Multifuturism - January - December

Multi-Futurism highlights the interaction of tradition and technology, identity and culture, creating experiential events in the spirit of innovation and inclusivity.

Tempo Sessions - 16 & 30 June - Ballet Lab,

Temperance Hall - 199 Napier St, South Melbourne Tempo Sessions, coordinated by local musician Oscar Jimenez, invites and encourages emerging artists to present their work, collaborate and network.

Cool Out Sun + The Senegambian Jazz Band- 22 March- Esplanade Hotel

Senegambian Jazz Band and Cool Out Sun fuses Afro jazz, deep-world music beats and funk to create some truly awe-inspiring rhythms and melodies.

EMERGE

EMERGE is MAV's ongoing response to consultations with emerging and refugee communities wanting to increase participation in the arts. Through the process of community cultural development, the arts build discourse and understanding of issues surrounding refugee migration and resettlement alongside increasing the social and economic contributions from our diverse communities to the wider society.

Emerge plays a pivotal role in reflecting and articulating community ideals, identity and talent from emerging and refugee artists and communities throughout Victoria.

Emerge in the West (Conversations)

Founded in 2011, this annual 'Emerge' event is an outcome of MAV's Community Cultural Development program for emerging and refugee artists and communities. In June, MAV will be holding a set of events around Footscray's Nicholson Street Mall. Other Emerge in the West initiatives include: Smartphone Stories, Mobile Music Sessions, Unearthed Wyndham Women's Magazine and Mutuashi in the Streets.

Emerge in Yarra

In 2019, Emerge in Yarra brings together artisans and communities from across the Emerge program at the Abbotsford Convent with a multitude of live-music and theatre performances, arts workshops, language, storytelling and cooking classes - celebrating the arts, culture and positive contributions of artists and communities from refugee and emerging community backgrounds in Victoria.

Emerge in the North

MAV is working with the Cities of Whittlesea and Hume and the Brotherhood of St Laurence in a series of events that brings the community together to celebrate and share the cultures of Indigenous and newly-arrived communities in Melbourne's outer north. This year's program follows on from community gatherings in three municipalities and includes: Open Mic at Mama Africa Café in Glenroy, Soul Magazine, Lamine Sonko and the African Intelligence, Emerge in the North Art Exhibition: Broadmeadows Global Learning Centre, 22 August – 9 October 2019

Emerge in Bendigo

A thriving a network of artists and cultural leaders from refugee, First People's and diverse cultural backgrounds in Bendigo working together creatively and expressing Culture in Visual Arts, Fashion, Dance and Music. In partnership with City of Greater Bendigo, Loddon Campaspe Multicultural Services, Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation. Projects in 2019 include Zinda festival, Mother Tongue at Bendigo Easter Festival, Cultural Dance Fusion, Imagine Peace, Pavilion project, and Interwoven exhibition at La Trobe Arts Institute.

Emerge in Shepparton

Emerge in Shepparton hosts a multitude of projects, gatherings and events in the Goulburn Valley in partnership with local artists and communities, Yorta Yorta, cultural groups and partners. Emerge in Shepparton celebrates the arts, culture and positive contributions of people from First Nations and refugee and emerging communities living in Victoria's north east. Projects for 2019 include: Nowroz Celebration, Emerge Group Exhibition, Troy Firebrace Exhibition, Know Your Roots and Pasifika Festival, Ignite Sound Sessions, Ignite Youth Showcase, The Mooroopna River Flats Yakapna Loitjpati (Family Talk), Pacific Creative Leadership Camp and Heard Instinct Open Mic Nights.

Emerge Ambassadors & Cultural Gatherings

For the past decade, MAV's Emerge program has cultivated strong relationships with local community members, artists and leaders, many of whom contributed significantly to the success of the Emerge Festivals and development of the program over its course. MAV has formally acknowledged and appointed over 60 artists with a fresh call-out planned for 2019. Emerge locations are: Wyndham, Maribyrnong, Brimbank, Yarra, Bendigo, Shepparton, Whittlesea and Hume. A regular series of Emerge Gatherings is held in each Emerge Hub to connect artists and communities, to explore mutual opportunities and to facilitate intercultural dialogue and program planning.

Emerge Cultural Leadership

With the continued generous support of Gandel Philanthropy, MAV is working with emerging artists and communities, local governments and cultural organisations in outer-metro and regional Victorian local government areas, Wyndham, Outer North, Shepparton and Bendigo to collaboratively develop and deliver a cultural leadership program that responds to local needs and builds on community strengths.


MAV is partnering with Project Eleven regarding Indonesian content for Mapping Melbourne in 2019 and 2020.

It is a platform for strengthening arts networks between contemporary independent artists across the Asian region, building connections and establishing collaborative ongoing relationships, and presenting challenging work. We need to strengthen Australia's relationships across the region. Mapping Melbourne emphasizes social and cultural links as much as political and economic. Exhibiting and performing at some of our iconic institutions and public spaces, the festival profiles established and emerging artists from across Australia. The Southbank Dawn Raga Series is a place-based pilot program that provides consistent opportunities to elevate the mental, physical as well as emotional wellbeing of working communities through blissful, Indian classical music (Ragas) in an open-air area. In partnership with Art Centre Melbourne and VicHealth.

Industry Pathways

MAV provides capacity-building workshops throughout the year aimed at engaging artists and providing them with the tools and information to create opportunities and to navigate the music industry. Representatives from Creative Victoria, Councils, labels, booking agencies, live music representatives and managers form panels for discussions, grant writing-workshops, information sessions and networking. MAV provides grant-auspicing and funding-application development working alongside artists throughout the year.

The Embassy

MAV supports 'The Embassy' – a group of multidisciplinary artists who are dedicated to assisting each other's theatre collaborations for a residency at the City of Melbourne's Boyd Studios. Evolving from the MTC Connect program, 'The Embassy' is Suhasini Seelin, Shannan Lim, Vidya Rajan and Wahibe Moussa.

Lamine Sonko presents 13:12 - Wednesday April 3 - Melbourne Recital Centre

Presented by MAV, Lamine Sonko's work is a unique synthesis of contemporary and traditional Senegalese music.

Lehenda Ukrainian Dance Company

MAV is supporting Lehenda Ukrainian Dance Company to collaborate with Cheremosh Ukrainian Dance Company of Edmonton Canada to develop 'Razom' - a merging of two companies of the Ukrainian diaspora.

Yohai Cohen Quintet - Saturday 16 March - Melbourne Recital Centre

Internationally renowned oud player, vocalist and percussionist, Yohai Cohen performs Moroccan Andalusian and cha'abi (popular) music in Hebrew and Arabic.

Film School Collective - Sat 5 October - Kew Courthouse

Film School Collective are a rare musical experience incorporating ambient textures, hip-hop beats, experimental improvisation and traditional Chinese music.

Ajak Kwai - Saturday 31 August - Kew Courthouse

Four Corners of Albania - Melbourne Recital Centre

Apoorva Krishna is a star on the rise in the Carnatic traditions. With the Australian Sruthi-Laya Quintet, she performs masterpieces by 18th-century Indian composers and her own compositions.

New Springs brings together a group of musicians from two sides of the Indian Ocean who have forged a deep and unique musical connection over several decades. These performers, from India and Australia will bring the best of their respective musical traditions together for this inspiring event.
