Given these factors, in a year where MAV's activities continue to expand, we believe the net outflow of cash of \$142.093 reflects MAV's investment in strengthening the financial future of the entity.

During 2014, MAV continued its commitment to strong management and good corporate governance. A key aspect of this is the ongoing attention by the Board and the staff at MAV to all aspects of planning and careful management of the financial position, performance and ongoing activities of the entity. The Board will continue to work in 2015 and beyond to ensure the financial future of the organisation remains

It is also important to acknowledge the ongoing appointment of the highly-regarded accounting firm BDO in conducting the annual audit for MAV. We see our association with our auditors as crucial in enabling us to continue enhancing our governance and reporting structures reflecting the serious commitment of MAV to good corporate governance.

The solid operating results for 2014 are driven by MAV's exceptional program delivery and the outstanding leadership of our Chief Executive Officer Jill Morgan AM and her team who have significantly

increased the level of projects delivered throughout the year. I would also like to acknowledge the amazing work of our Chair, Stefan Romaniw OAM.
