





Artist & Audience Development Program

aking an active role in supporting Canadian talent is an important part of who we are and what drives us. Our Artist & Audience Development Program is dedicated to artists that we believe will one day be the future generation of stars on our main stages, and has remained a focus in 2016.

This past season, we continued our role in developing, promoting and celebrating artists, as well as nurturing relationships between them and their audiences before and after concerts.

We presented performances and outreach activities at venues ranging from small clubs, midsized theatres, downtown parks, Yonge-Dundas Square, on our own patio at Roy Thomson Hall and most importantly, inside our two Halls.

Some examples of initiatives, pop/soul artist Liz Loughrey performed to a sold-out Rivoli audience in April, which prepared her for the capacitycrowds at two concerts at Yonge-Dundas Square: her own band's performance and her

contribution to the Massey Hall Band's celebration of The Beatles as part of BeatlesTO Week.

Massey Hall supported the release of Loughrey's single "Rise Up" which in just a few short weeks garnered more than 120,000 streams on Spotify and close to 100 feature posts on blogs and websites across Canada as well as in France. England, Brazil and Japan.

Recent Canadian Folk Music Award winner Donovan Woods has enjoyed an incredible year of career growth as he makes his way down the road to Massey Hall, following last year's sold-out Harbourfront Centre Theatre show with an impressive sold-out concert at the 700-seat Trinity-St. Paul's Centre in


October 2016. Woods and his team worked closely with us over the past year to engage current and future fans through a variety of initiatives including studio recordings, email campaigns and video productions.

It was a big year for Emilie-Claire Barlow, who had her Massey Hall headline debut this year accompanied by orchestra and in support of her JUNO-winning album Clear Day. 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Tabla master Ritesh Das receives **Roy Thomson Hall Award of Recognition**

Jeteran tabla master Ritesh Das, the Artistic Director and Founder of the Toronto Tabla Ensemble, a not-for-profit organization since 1991, is the recipient of the 2016 Roy Thomson Hall Award of Recognition.

The Roy Thomson Hall Award is presented to an individual, ensemble or organization to recognize creative, performing, administrative, volunteer or philanthropic contributions to Toronto's musical life. Established in 1984 by the Volunteer Committee of Roy Thomson Hall to thank the community that supported the conception and building of the new concert hall, the \$10,000 cash prize is awarded every two years at the Mayor's Arts Awards Luncheon presented by the Toronto Arts Council.

Das received the award on Thursday, May 26 during the llth annual Mayor's Arts Lunch, an event that brings together leaders of the arts, government, and business to celebrate the benefits that the artistic community and their benefactors bring to the life of Toronto.

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
