

WHITE OAK LAKE STATE PARK

Among the wooded, rolling hills of southwest Arkansas is 725-acre White Oak Lake State Park, a perfect haven for fishing enthusiasts and nature lovers. The park represents the beautiful natural diversity of wild flora and fauna of Arkansas's West Gulf Coastal Plain region. The picturesque lakeside setting for camping and picnicking combine with the lake's fishing thrills to make this a peaceful location for a day outing or a two-week vacation for the entire family. Whether you hike the trails under the forest canopy enjoying the sights and sounds of the natural world, or settle down by the shore with a fishing line to relax and wait for the big one, you will always remember your pleasant stay at White Oak Lake State Park.

FACILITIES

The park provides camping, picnicking, hiking and fishing year round. Fishing supplies, boats/licenses as well as T-shirts and souvenirs are available. A free launch ramp near the boat dock provides easy access to the lake for those with their own rigs. There is no horsepower limit on the lake.

Camping ♦ Most of the 45 campsites along the lakeshore have 30 amp power and accommodate the latest RVs and trailers. The bathhouse and rest rooms remain open year round. Water and electricity are provided at 41 sites; the remaining four are open to tent campers only. A dump station is near the bathhouse. Campers and picnickers can obtain firewood at the **Visitor Center**.

Group Pavilion ♦ On a hill overlooking the lake is a large screened-in pavilion. Ideal for group get-togethers or family reunions, the pavilion may be reserved for a fee by calling or visiting the park.

Other Facilities ♦ A barrier-free playground is near the park store. Medical facilities, restaurants and complete shopping conveniences are just 20 minutes away in Prescott or Camden.

NOTE: Campers **must** register at the Visitor Center **before** occupying a campsite. All sites are reservable up to one year in advance. Please call to check availability.

INTERPRETIVE SERVICES

Programs ♦ From Memorial Day to Labor Day, a park interpreter provides programs, guided hikes, nature talks, demonstrations, and evening presentations free of charge. Program schedules are posted at the Visitor Center and on park bulletin boards and on ArkansasStateParks.com.

Trails ♦ Four nature trails (see map) wind their way through a variety of environments from marshlands to beech-covered ridges. Beech, hickory and white oak trees may be seen along the trails as well as white-tailed deer, green herons and beaver. Self-guided brochures are available at the Visitor Center for the *Spring Branch, Coastal Plain and Beech Ridge trails*. Each trail offers excellent birdwatching opportunities. The Fern Hollow Hike/Bike Trail is a ten-mile multi-use trail.



LOCATION

From I-30 at Prescott, travel twenty miles east on Arkansas Highway 24 to Bluff City, then take Arkansas Highway 299 for approximately 100 yards before turning onto Highway 387, then go 2.5 miles south to the park.

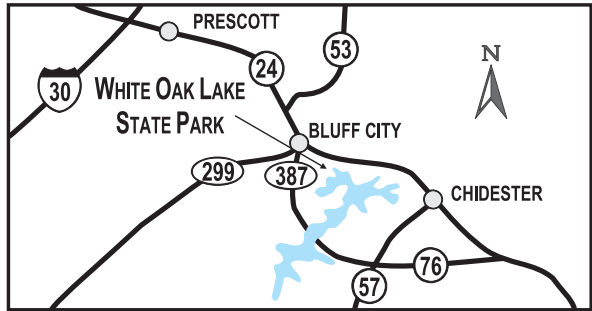
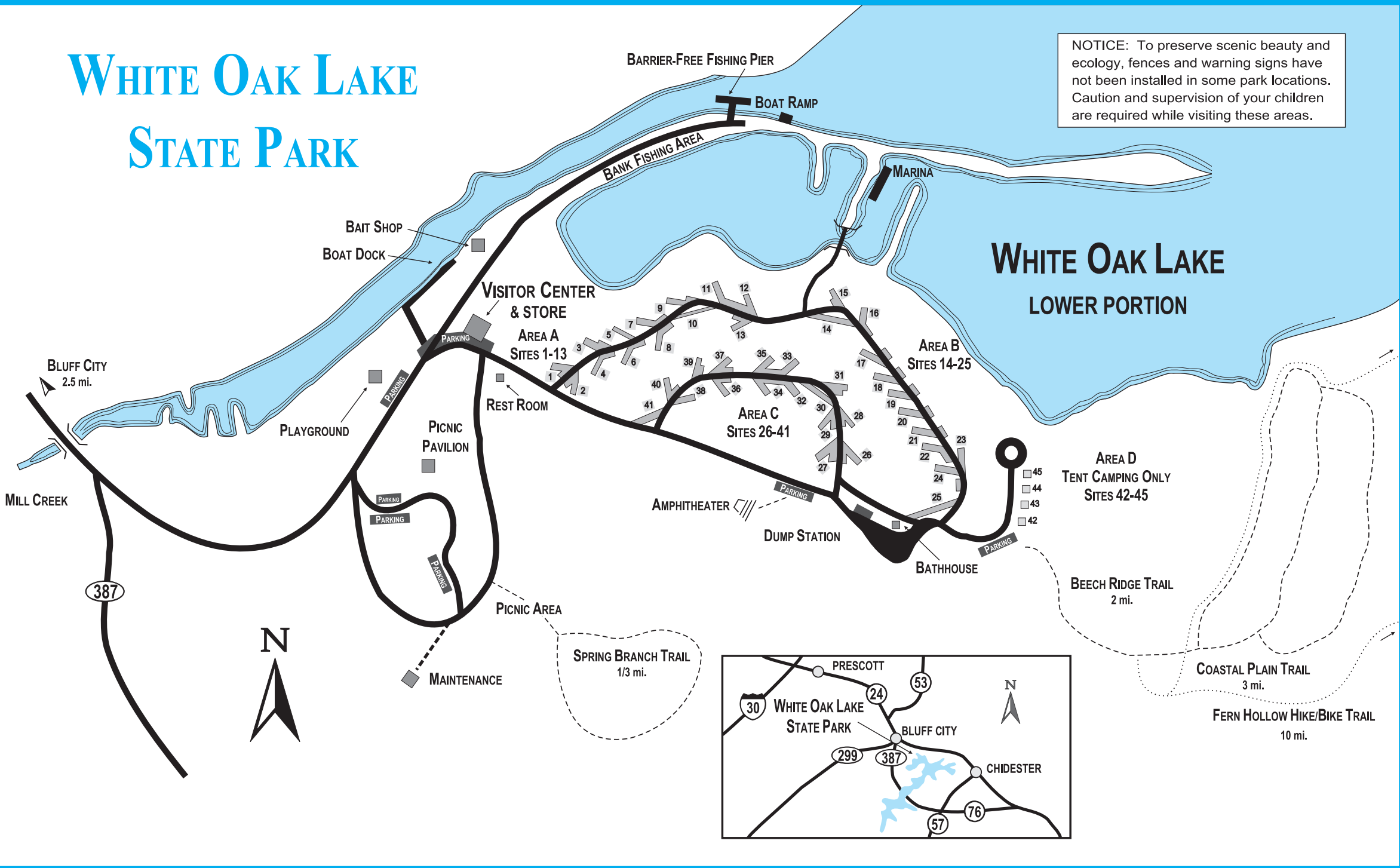
