THE MINUS18 JOURNEY

MINUS18 UNDERAGE EVENTS BEGIN Nan McGregor, a mum from PFLAG, wants her gay son to have a safe space to meet other LGBTIQ youth so she launches Minus18 events.

2007 Minus18 Events grow to hundreds of young people attending each school holidays. This got us thinking: Woah, we've got something really special here!

2010 Our first school resource is launched with Safe Schools, giving students the tools they need to take a stand against homophobia and transphobia by creating Queer-Straight-Alliances. **2010** The first Queer Formal in Australia is held by Minus18, with 200 youth attending, and over 100 community members sponsoring their tickets for free!

2011 Minus18 volunteers from the past 10 years meet together and begin planning for the charity.

THE MINUS18 FOUNDATION IS BORN!

We transformed the beautiful community we created through events to launch the Minus18 Foundation: **Australia's charity for LGBTIQ youth**.

2015 Minus18 co-develops the first national LGBTIQ teaching resource with Safe Schools, supporting secondary schools Australia-wide.

2016 The first Minus18 event in Adelaide attracts 200 youth

2018 Our first Sydney event attracts 450 LGBTIQ youth.

2013 150,000 people access Minus18 resources online each year, and that number continues to grow.

2017 As LGBTIQ school programs are defunded around the country, Minus18 Workshops are launched to champion LGBTIQ inclusion.

2018 Queer Ideas Festival is held - the first youth summit for 120 young LGBTIQ leaders to have their voices heard by Government and community.

THE STORIES WE CREATE



Argo

I was born in Greece, and moved here to Australia when I was 5. My background is a mix of Greek, Filipino and Spanish which means at home there's a whole lot of Filipino and Spanish style cooking. Unfortunately I forgot all my Greek when I moved here though, ha!

Growing up was a little difficult. My mum is fairly Catholic, and from the get go I went to private Catholic school. It was good to begin with, with a diverse community and a lot of other first-generation immigrants like me.

But highschool was a bit more difficult. I was really at that stage of my life where I was coming to terms with my sexuality, and what it all meant. I found Minus18, which was amazing. I had a safe avenue to meet others who identified as anything other than 'straight', which was completely brand new to me.

In Year 9 I was outed by a friend, who told the whole school that I was bisexual. It made everything that much more difficult for me. So I had to deal with that for at least 6 months

The fact that I had made friends outside of school was one of the most supportive things, in the sense that there were other people in my life who were coming out at the same time, or who already had. They all had advice, and we could actually talk about it. Really that's exactly what I needed at the time.

Slowly bit by bit, people realised that my sexuality didn't change me, and realised "Oh, it's still Argo, he hasn't changed.

If it wasn't for Minus18, I wouldn't have known where to go; I would have been a pretty lonely kid. Honestly, I think I might have had to end up moving schools. It was tough, and I can't imagine getting through it without Minus18.





LGBTIQ YOUTH ARE MORE VISIBLE NOW THAN EVER BEFORE.

BULLYING

75% of LGBTIQ young people will experience verbal or physical abuse due to their LGBTIQ identity before they're 25.1 The most common places for this to occur is at school and at home.

IDENTITY

Sexuality and gender identity are increasingly experienced by young people as fluid and non-binary. More young people are identifying as queer, genderqueer, gender fluid, and are more open about the fact they might just still be figuring it out.^{1 23}

MISTRUST OF COMMUNITY

More and more, LGBTIQ youth feel misunderstood by those who are not LGBTIQ, or who are not their own age. They're relying more on LGBTIQ peers and online information for support.5

EDUCATION

81% of LGBTIQ students believe their school doesn't support them, and that their teachers aren't doing enough to stop LGBTIQ bullying. The positive is that having just one supportive teacher can reduce a young person's negative experiences by 50%.²

COMING OUT

Majority of same sex attracted young people realise their identity before they are 13. It's a lot earlier than most realise, and shows that they really aren't 'too young to know'.

THE GOOD NEWS

In many cases, young people are feeling more empowered to be the ones leading the movement of equality in Australia, and are joining spaces like Minus18 to help make it happen.

MENTAL HEALTH

Because of these experiences, LGBTIQ youth are up to 12x more likely to experience depression³ and up to 5x more likely to experience anxiety⁴ than the general population.

INTERSECTIONALITY

LGBTIQ youth from other marginalised demographics experience additional hardship and isolation, especially people of colour, people of faith, people living with a disability and people from regional and rural areas.





Growing up was a TOTAL train wreck, haha. I grew up in Sale, which is 3 hours out of Melbourne. It's a small town, but we did have a McDonalds, so it was booming!

Being in a small town, everyone knew everyone's business. I knew I liked girls, and it was something I was really open about, and from about year 8 I copped a lot of shit

In the change rooms at school, girls would be like, "Ew, Elyza don't look at me" or I'd walk past a crowd of girls, and they'd yell out nasty things, like 'dyke'. You know, that sort of stuff.

My family was completely awesome, though. I remember when I was 14 I told my mum, and told her what was going on at school, and she was the most amazing, supportive person ever. It definitely made it easier, but even then, I felt pretty alone.

At 16, a friend introduced me to the Minus18 online community, where I had the chance to talk to thousands of other people who were all going through the exact same things as me.

It was amazing. Instantly, things seemed to get easier. Life got easier. I thought "Wow this is something I want to get involved in". It was incredible.

One day I got the courage to take the train to a Minus18 event. It was colourful, and fun, and within the space of 4 hours I had 6 best friends just-like-that. I felt for the first time I was happy for a whole day, and didn't have to worry about all the other shit bothering me.

Minus18 has opened my mind and my life so much. Going from a scared lesbian in Sale to realising that my sexuality is an amazing part of who I am; it's an incredible feeling.

OUR MODEL



LIFE-AFFIRMING SOCIAL INCLUSION

Through a preventative model of mental health support, we tackle social isolation by creating spaces where young people belong. That means spaces where young people are the ones who are visible, and where expressing your LGBTIQ identity is celebrated.



& ADVOCACY

LGBTIQ youth shouldn't need to access Minus18 events to feel safe, so we transform communities through workshops, resources and health promotion campaigns that enable others to champion inclusivity.

We go to schools, organisations and workplaces to teach and train them on LGBTIQ inclusion.



YOUTH EMPOWERING YOUTH

We believe that the best and most effective way to empower young people is for other young people to be the ones engaging with them. Minus18 initiatives place youth at the forefront, supported by Minus18 staff.

- Our volunteer crew are young people themselves. They're the ones who engage with our attendees and support education content.
- 'Lived experience and connection to LGBTIQ youth' is a key selection criteria for all staff roles.
- Our strategic plan has been developed
 with input from our youth advisory group.

CREATING HIGH IMPACT

In 20 years more than 65,000 youth have attended Minus18 programs collectively across Melbourne, Sydney and Adelaide, and over 2.5 million people have found support online.

We gather feedback with our young people about their experience of our programs, and are constantly adjusting and tweaking what we do to suit their needs.

95% of young people who participate in Minus18 activities would recommend us to a friend, and we think that's pretty great.



MICAH SCOTT FOUNDING CEO

When we launched the Minus18 Foundation less than 8 years ago, we only dreamt of the impact we would have, and the young lives we could continue to transform.

The past 12 months have seen Minus18 undergo a sorely needed period of financial growth, after the implementation of new activities to raise the profile of our critical work and share this with the community. It's through the generous support of you, our partners, supporters and donors, that this is possible. It's only with your help that we can continue our mission to create an Australia where all LGBTIQ youth are safe, empowered, and belong.

Championing Indusion

This year we continued to invest in our famous, highimpact events, hosting the first ever Sydney Queer Formal, alongside our Melbourne and Adelaide events. Our highest priority while growing the reach of our events is to maintain the inclusive, identity-affirming heart and soul that makes them so magical. This year, 98% of attendees reported that they felt more positive about their LGBTIQ identity after attending Minus18 - we couldn't be more proud.

It shouldn't just be Minus18 events that affirm identity, and that's why we deliver LGBTIQ Education Workshops in schools and workplaces, and work with partner organisations to ensure we're able to reach as many corners of the country as possible.

The experiences of LGBTIQ youth are changing rapidly but that doesn't mean it's 'getting better' for everyone. 36% of our Queer Formal attendees told us their parents didn't know, or weren't supportive of their LGBTIQ identities, especially those who were bisexual and gender diverse. As the experiences of LGBTIQ youth are changing, they need an organisation that can keep up. That's where we come in.

We couldn't create the spaces we do without the tireless work of the Minus18 team—our staff and youth volunteers—whose passion and energy keeps our organisation relevant and thriving.

Fulfilling our Strategy

This year we completed our 2017-2019 Strategic Plan, and partnered with Nous Group to undertake a national-expansion study. It's the first step in creating the groundwork to take Minus18 to even more parts of Australia.

This financial year, we turned a surplus, and we'll be allocating these funds immediately towards our 2019/2020 youth and advocacy programs, including:

- » Aligning the Sydney Queer Formal to Mardi Gras 2020, to build youth inclusion and visibility throughout the festival.
- » Continuing to ensure that money is never a barrier for a young person to engage with our events, by removing or subsidising ticket costs.
- » Launching our LGBTIQ Workshop delivery program for schools and youth services in regional and rural areas.
- » Working with partner and grant agencies to provide even more free LGBTIQ Education Workshops to secondary schools and not-for-profits.
- Investing in additional professional development and training for all staff and volunteers, ensuring that we upskill the next generation of LGBTIQ leaders.
- » Continuing to shine a light on the injustice that LGBTIQ youth face and continuing to have conversations to build empathy and change hearts and minds.

Minus18 isn't just a social network, a voice, or an education centre. Minus18 is a beacon to all LGBTIQ young people with the essential message that they are worthy of being loved. No matter the circumstances at school, home or at work—they'll always have a place to belong.

GOVERNANCE

Company Structure

Board Composition

Directors receive a face-to-face and written induction, and sign a Directors Agreement. Directors' knowledge of Minus18's operations is maintained by monthly reports from the CEO, invitations to Minus18 events and Board-Staff social opportunities.

Sub-Committees of the Board

Empowered by our Constitution, the Board has delegated additional controls and responsibilities to three Sub-Committees. The Sub-Committees make recommendations to the Board to enable informed decision-making. Each Committee has a Terms of Reference approved by the Board, and is presided over by a Committee Lead.

Certain Sub-Committees have appointed Expert Advisors. These are external volunteer non-director roles that provide guidance and build capacity of the Foundation.

Risk Management

The Board (led by the Finance & Risk Committee) oversees the establishment, implementation and annual review of Minus18's risk management system. The Board identified key risks and implements mitigation strategies via a Risk Register which is reviewed quarterly.

In addition to the Expert Advisors appointed to assist the Board's Sub-Committees, the Board has access to independent advice on the following matters:

- Investments the Board has engaged U Ethical to advise on and manage Minus18's ethical investment portfolio. The Board has approved risk and return parameters for the portfolio. U Ethical presents a report to the Finance & Risk Committee each quarter.
- Legal the Board has engaged Clayton Utz to provide ongoing ad hoc pro bono legal advice.
- Payroll and finance the Board has engaged Cloud Business Consulting & Bookkeeping Pty Ltd, registered Company BAS Agents, to provide payroll and bookkeeping services.

Financial Management

Minus18 has several interconnected layers of financial management that have enabled us to harness significant financial growth:

- Accountant with several years experience in the role. The Treasurer provides monthly financial reports to the Board for review and discussion.
- The annual budget for Minus18 is prepared by the CEO and Finance & Risk Committee, and reviewed twice a year. The budget is scrutinised and approved by the Board.
- Minus18 engages a qualified bookkeeper, responsible for finance administration and payroll. The bookkeeper is highly responsive to requests for information from the Board and management.
- The Board, on the recommendation of the Finance & Risk Committee, has invested a significant proportion of Minus18's cash reserve with U Ethical. This investment provides higher returns than storing the reserve in our bank accounts, and the funds remain easily accessible on demand by the Board.

LIFE-AFFIRMING EVENTS TO BE YOURSELF AND BELONG

Making friends and having a sense of community is key to building confidence and resilience for LGBTIQ youth. This year we were able to provide this experience to 4,045 young people who attended our life-affirming events across Melbourne, Sydney, and Adelaide.

Access & Inclusion

As we grow, we're commited to maintaining the heart and soul of our events, by ensuring young people from all identities feel safe and included when they access Minus18 spaces. In our 2017-2019 Strategic Plan, we prioritised access for young people who are:

- » Trans and gender diverse.
- » People of colour.
- » From regional / rural areas.
- » Living with a disability.

This included implementing and improving practices around:

- » Providing Auslan interpreters at major events.
- » Ensuring all venues are wheelchair accessible.
- » Providing low-sensory chill out spaces at major events.
- » Providing LGBTIQ specialist youth workers at events.
- » Prioritising the visibility and inclusion of the above identities through our volunteers, paid performers and marketing material.

We have lots of room to grow, particularly in engaging intersex young people and people of colour, and are committed to these areas in 2019 and 2020.

EVENT HIGHLIGHTS



BANNER MAKING

Summer is massive at Minus18. We engage almost 2,000 youth at Carnival and Pride March; the two major events within Melbourne's Midsumma Festival.

In December, we held a banner making day for young people to create hundreds of banners and signs to proudly display at Pride March. Young people were invited to our Collingwood work space to paint, glue and glitter signs of their own design.



YOUTH PRECINCT AT MIDSUMMA CARNIVAL

Teaming up with Midsumma in January, we hosted the Youth Precinct at Carnival—a safe, drug, alcohol and smoke-free area exclusively for young people. Over 750 youth attended throughout the day. There was a dance floor, youth performers, and interactive dance workshop where attendees learnt the choreography for Pride March. Massive kudos to Youth Projects and QUIT Victoria for their support at the event.



PRIDE MARCH

With dance moves and their handmade signs, nearly 1,000 young people braved the summer heat to march with Minus18 at the 2019 Pride March in St Kilda. It was incredible to see the growth of young people feeling confident to march, as well as their reactions when they saw that tens of thousands of people in the community there to cheer them on.



SCIENCEWORKS SYNC

In June, Minus18 partnered with Museum Victoria to help host their second youth dance party at Scienceworks. Minus18's involvement helped drive attendance from 150 - at their first event-to 400 at this iteration.

Minus18's events and partnerships team consulted with Scienceworks in the lead up, advising on best practice when hosting an inclusive and accessible youth event.

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT

As part of graduating her learning program at Minus18, our youth event assistant, Emma, took the lead in the production of the Scienceworks Sync Event. Emma coordinated the chill out space, glam station & badge making activation, and worked with local LGBTIQ youth to bring it all to life.

Oh - and we made the switch to biodegradable glitter this year too! Phew, what an awesome year of building community.

120 LGBTIQ YOUTH LEADERS SHARE THEIR IDEAS FOR A MORE **INCLUSIVE VICTORIA**

Queer Ideas Festival brought together 120 young LGBTIQ leaders from all over Victoria to discuss the issues they're facing and develop the solutions they want to see. Held at Federation Square, the Festival prioritised young people from diverse backgrounds and identities, including, people of faith, people of colour, people with disabilities and people from rural and regional areas.

Travel scholarships were provided for regional and rural groups to attend the Melbourne-based event. We partnered with WayOut Wodonga, Headspace Mildura and Headspace Horsham to coordinate the travel and supervision, ensuring location wasn't a barrier to participation.

No leadership summit is complete without inspiring people to learn from, and Queer Ideas Festival engaged facilitators, speakers, artists and performers from a hugely diverse intersection of the LGBTIQ community. They collaborated on developing workshops for the festival, collecting data and information gathering; working with us to compile the 'Young & Queer Report-16 ideas for a more LGBTIQ inclusive Victoria'. This report is available for free and can be accessed to inform a youth-led approach in community and organisational inclusion strategies.

Finally, the two-day festival ended with a closing concert for 500 young people across Victoria - it was epic.

Queer Ideas Festival was funded by the Victorian Government, In partnership with Federation Square, VICE, RMIT and QUIT.

THE MINUS18 QUEER FORMAL®

The Queer Formal is Minus18's major event; a night thats's often a young person's very first LGBTIQ event, where they can come as they are, and feel safe wearing the clothes that align to their gender identity.

Still today, not all LGBTIQ youth feel safe expressing their identity at a high school event and we hear countless stories of young people not being supported or allowed to attend their school formal with a same gender partner. The Queer Formal gives all young people, regardless of their sexuality or gender identity, a night to be themselves and celebrate their identity.

Over the past 12 months, we held 3 Queer Formals for 1,150 LGBTIQ youth across Melbourne, Adelaide-and for the first time ever—Sydney.

The Night of Their Lives

So what does a Queer Formal look like? There's a hall full of rainbows, photobooths, snacks, fun activations and hundreds of young people covered in biodegradable glitter having the night of their lives. The evening begins with speeches from local LGBTIQ heroes, performances from queer youth performers, and dinner throughout.

There's a chill out space to hang out and chat, with youth workers to talk to if things get too much. When the nerves have calmed down, the night ends with a DJ and dance, and before too long parents will be waiting outside to pick their children up.

Community Support

We couldn't host the Queer Formal around Australia without the generous support of our sponsors and partners. They're the ones who provide the financial support that keeps the event alive and free for every single young person to attend.

This year we introduced our first Name Sponsor: Instagram. What a dream team! Instagram elevated the Melbourne event, which boasted more activities than ever before, including makeover stations, photobooths, dessert buffets and the headline performance act: Electric Fields. It's partnerships like these that really make this the most special night for LGBTIQ youth.

CREATING AN AUSTRALIA FREE FROM LGBTIQ BULLYING & DISCRIMINATION

Whether it's in their community, school or workplace, young people deserve to feel safe and supported no matter who they're engaging with. It can be challenging to keep up with ever-evolving terminology, research and experiences of our community - that's where we can help.

We equip you and your team with the tools needed to ensure LGBTIQ people of any age are safe in these spaces.

Workshops

Tackling bullying in schools is at the forefront of what we do, with workshops for students and young people, and professional development for teachers.

For workplaces, we deliver high impact training and LGBTIQ professional development that's interactive, interesting, and that everyone gets involved.

We specialise in content that is easy to understand, and delivered by our high-energy young presenter team.

Online Support

Even though our reach is growing at an enormous rate (we must be doing something right) we aren't quite big enough to visit all of Australia-yet!

We use our online reach to provide peer support through articles, interviews and video content, so young people, schools and workplaces are able to access information online no matter what part of Australia they're located.

School Workshops

- » Student workshops are a space for students to learn about LGBTIQ inclusion, and ask the questions that their teachers might not be able to answer. 3,660 students participated in Minus18 Workshops. 6 school workshops were funded by the City of Stonnington community grants, and 10 were funded through a donation from VicBears.
- » Teacher Training this year equipped 400 teachers with the ability to support LGBTIQ students - particularly youth who are trans and gender diverse. If these teachers share their learnings with just 30 students each, thats an impact on 12,000 students!

Community Workshops

- » LGBTIQ Youth Workshops create a sense of belonging and foster leadership skills. This year 370 LGBTIQ youth participated in these workshops, which a big focus in regional and rural areas.
- » Workplace Professional Development is where we saw out biggest growth in the past 12 months. 2,190 adults participated in our training, with incredible results. 97% were blown away, and would recommend it to others. How about getting us in to your work?
- » Not all workplaces have the capacity or availability to invite Minus18 in to deliver a workshop, which is why we held our first Community Forum for individuals to attend. The 'Creating Queer-Friendly Workplaces' forum was delivered in partnership with the City of Darebin LGBTIQ Community Grant program. 40 community members attended, and we hope to deliver more next year.

In Partnership with the cuties at Lush and contributions from the Human Rights Commission, National Centre for Gender Equality and The LGBTI Health Alliance, the "How to be a Trans Ally: Guide" was created.

Minus18 partnered with Lush to train their staff on trans inclusion, co-develop the Guide, which was provided to customers for free with purchases of their limited edition Trans Pride bath bomb.

ESCAPE VELOCITY

Escape Velocity, created with the inspiring team at St Martin's Arts Youth Centre, and funded by Creative Victoria, is a three stage campaign, advocating for Trans & Gender Diverse identities and gender acceptance.

The participants shared their lived experiences, building the framework of the campaign, developing the scripts and filming process. The first campaign, featuring three short films, will be released in August 2019.

INTERNATIONAL DAY AGAINST HOMOPHOBIA, BIPHOBIA, INTERPHOBIA & TRANSPHOBIA (IDAHOBIT)

May 17 is the anniversary of the World Health Organisation's declassification of homosexuality as a disease in 1990. Today, May 17 is used to champion the LGBTIQ community.

Each year, Minus18 coordinates the Australian campaign, empowering schools, organisations, workplaces and universities to go rainbow in solidarity with the LGBTIQ community.

Toolkits

Minus18 produced free toolkits for schools and workplaces to activate for IDAHOBIT by going rainbow, hosting an event, or engaging in LGBTIQ education on the day. Through these toolkits, 970 organisations registered their IDAHOBIT activity for the day.

Pride Packs

To really make things easy and help organisations host their own LGBTIQ inclusion celebrations, Minus18 produced Pride Packs with all the items needed to host an activity.

376 Pride Packs were sent to schools and workplaces around Australia, containing stickers, rainbow ribbons, posters, badges, and of course, rainbow flags.

A FREE REPORT DETAILING THE SOLUTIONS 120 YOUNG LGBTIQ AUSTRALIANS HAVE FOR THE FUTURE.

Young LGBTIQ people are in desperate need of opportunities to have a say on the issues that matter to them—and to be actively engaged with and involved in decision-making processes. The Victorian Government identified this, and enlisted Minus18 to produce the Young & Queer Report; a consultation report on the experiences of 120 LGBTIQ youth present at the Queer Ideas Youth Summit. The report shares the experiences, and subsequent solutions young people propose for a better, more inclusive future.

We encourage you to use this free report to shape service delivery, youth strategy, and as evidence for funding applications. The report details 16 ideas from the youth participants, and 5 key recommendations:

1. Review Sexual Health Education in Schools

A lack of access to, and appropriateness of sexual health education (particularly in schools) was the highest priority from the youth participants.

Participants spoke about their lack of access to LGBTIQ inclusive sexual health information, and their fears for their own wellbeing and safety, due to accessing this information online, where it risked being inaccurate, age-inappropriate or pornographic.

2. Involve youth in LGBTIQ school programs

Negative experiences at school (including bullying and abuse from both students and teachers) were key experiences that the participants shared and prioritised. Students were largely unaware of their own school's LGBTIQ programs and initiatives.

Students who had positive experiences at school shared how their involvement in the development of LGBTIQ activities, especially the creation of LGBTIQ student groups and pride events, had contributed to them feeling safe and included.

3. Build Trust Between Youth and Older **LGBTIQ** Communities

Participants expressed fear, and uncertainty about their relationship to older members of the LGBTIQ community, while also expressing deep care and concern for the wellbeing of older LGBTIQ people. They shared a strong appreciation for the historical work they had invested into LGBTIQ inclusion, and a desire to connect with older generations, though a lack of faciliated opportunity.

4. Invest in Communication between LGBTIQ Youth and their Government / Community

Feelings of frustration towards 'people in power' (particularly the Government, media and other organisations) came up frequently in the consultations. Young people expressed "not feeling heard" and that their ideas were not valued. Interestingly, many of the ideas presented by the young people aligned closely with actions that have been committed by the Government or were funded activities already occurring from other agencies.

This highlights the opportunity to bridge the gap in communication between young people, their Government, and their community. Youth summits and events are one method to build this connection, with 88% of participants self reporting feeling more connected to their Government after this summit.

5. Invest in LGBTIQ peer support

Participants who spoke of their experiences of discrimination, abuse or mental health challenges identified a gap in knowing where to gain support, and access LGBTIQ inclusive networks.

Others identified their friends and LGBTIQ peer groups as the primary methods of support that best helped them. In particular, young people spoke about the importance of the internet in engaging in these networks, and a desire for more content that was created specifically by other LGBTIQ youth (such as LGBTIQ youth-created resources, videos and blogs).

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

WHERE THE MONEY CAME FROM

Over the past 12 months, we've been working on diversifying our revenue streams and strengthening the income generated outside of our Government funding. This has been achieved through a focus on fundraising, sponsorship, workplace professional development and the launch of our new pride and education merchandise.

Through the generous support of our donors, partners and sponsors we were able to extend our resources and support for LGBTIQ young people beyond what aligns with Government expectations and priorities. This ensures that we're more financially resilient and sustainable, it allows for more autonomy and enables us to deliver our work in the face of changing political priorities.

WHERE THE MONEY WAS INVESTED

Through our generous supporters, this year we were able to significantly increase our investment in youthfacing programs, growing the capacity of events by over 100%, and the production of LGBTIQ education resources by 45%. Growth within our Workshop and Partnerships teams allowed us to create new staff positions and invest in the development and training of all volunteers and staff.

Employee Benefits \$522,756 Investing in our greatest asset—our people—enables us to strengthen the long-term sustainability of our organisation and bring additional rigour to the programs we deliver. Generous in-kind support has resulted in budget savings throughout the year, resulting in a reduction to our administration costs to be 6% of total expenses and contributing to a financial surplus for the year. This will be reinvested into our 2019/2020 priorities, outlined on Page 46.

WHAT'S NEXT

2020 - 2022 Strategic Plan

Following the successful completion of the 2017-2019 Strategic Plan titled 'Where We Belong', Minus18 will work to develop its next Strategic Plan for 2020 - 2022. PwC's The Difference, will generously host a series of strategic development workshops with the Minus18 Board, staff and young people at the end of 2019.This will be the critical first step in building the next phase of Minus18's support for LGBTIQ youth Australia-wide.

Victorian Pride Centre

The Victorian Pride Centre, home to LGBTIQ organisations from all over Victoria, opens in 2020. The Pride Centre brings the opportunity to unlock deeper community collaboration, more space for direct youth support and volunteer training, as well as the potential to host school excursions. Community tenants will be required to contribute rent and Minus18 is reserving future funds for this move whilst lease negotiation is underway. Construction of the Pride Centre has now commenced and is expected to open late 2020.

Family Resources

As our programs and events grow, parents, carers and families of LGBTIQ youth are looking to us for more information on how to better understand and support their child. In 2020, Minus18 will work with families of LGBTIQ youth to develop new resources and content to empower the support of LGBTIQ children all over the country.

Mardi Gras 2020

Mardi Gras is the largest LGBTIQ festival in Australia and we're currently developing a partnership to bring the Sydney Queer Formal to the 2020 festival calendar. This premier event will be the first step in incorporating Minus18 into their programming, so not only will we be reaching more young people, we'll also be boosting youth visibility and engagement throughout the world-famous festival.

Regional & Rural Workshops

We have found that many schools and community groups from regional and rural areas are interested in undertaking our workshops and training, but because of the additional travel and resourcing costs, it has not always been possible. Over the next 12 months Minus18 will pilot the 'Queer Out Here' project, offering free education workshops to LGBTIQ youth, secondary school students and teaching staff from regional and rural areas of Victoria, as well as secondary school staff in Adelaide, Brisbane and Perth. This project is generously funded by BHP and the Alfred Felton Bequest.

Volunteer Program

Our youth volunteers are at the heart of our programs and are the core to maintaining our relevance and connection to the rapidly changing experiences of LGBTIQ young people.

In 2020, we are investing extra resources into the volunteer program with the goal to offer additional training and development to further support the next generation of LGBTIQ youth leaders.

Online Resource Redevelopment

The number of people accessing Minus18 online resources and support has more than doubled over the past 12 months, with over half a million users engaging each year. Online resources are essential for ensuring young people, parents and schools can access information and support on identity in their own time; especially those in regional and remote parts of Australia. In 2020, we will be rebuilding our online resource portal and website from scratch, to make accessing this support significantly easier.
