## A MESSAGE FOR YOU

**Sometimes when we speak to people about our work, they say, “there’s so much going wrong in the world, how do you not give up?”**

On one level they’re right. More people have been forced to flee their homes by war and conflict than at any time since the Second World War. Hunger caused by these wars and by droughts is at crisis levels. Climate change threatens to undo many of the gains made in lifting people out of extreme poverty. And yet, we find ourselves unable to not be hopeful.

Where does that hope come from?

Firstly, it comes from the people we meet in the communities you support around the world. No matter how tough the situation is, the people your love is reaching have not given up. Children tell us over and over again about their hopes for the future, and parents show us the practical things they are doing to make that hope a reality for their children and grandchildren. If they can press on without despairing, how can we not?

Secondly, it comes from seeing first-hand just how much we can do to help change things. For us, and I know for you, it’s never been a question of: ‘How can we make the world better for all?’. With that perspective, it’s easy to feel overwhelmed and paralysed.

A better question is: ‘What can each of us do with what we’ve been given?’ This perspective motivates us because never in history has it been more possible to help make real change in people’s lives and futures than it is right now.

Going towards rather than away from suffering is part of living life in all its fullness – both for us and for the children and communities we serve.

Whether it’s sponsoring a child to transform their community and the opportunities they have. Or helping a family at their lowest moments, when they’re facing war or famine. Or re-greening villages that have had their forests stripped and degraded. These are practical messages that say we will work to hold onto hope together.

In this report, you’ll see how your kindness has helped precious little ones recover from malnutrition. You’ve helped girls and boys learn to read and brought clean water close to home so kids can grow healthy and stay in school. Your compassion has helped communities respond to child abuse and children to find ways to cope with the trauma of war and start to heal.

The Christian scriptures say: “The light shines in darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it.” This statement can be hard to hold onto in the messiness and strife this world brings. But we choose to have faith that somehow, our offerings of love and service will be turned into something beautiful. Thank you for being such a part of this mission. We wish you hope and blessings.

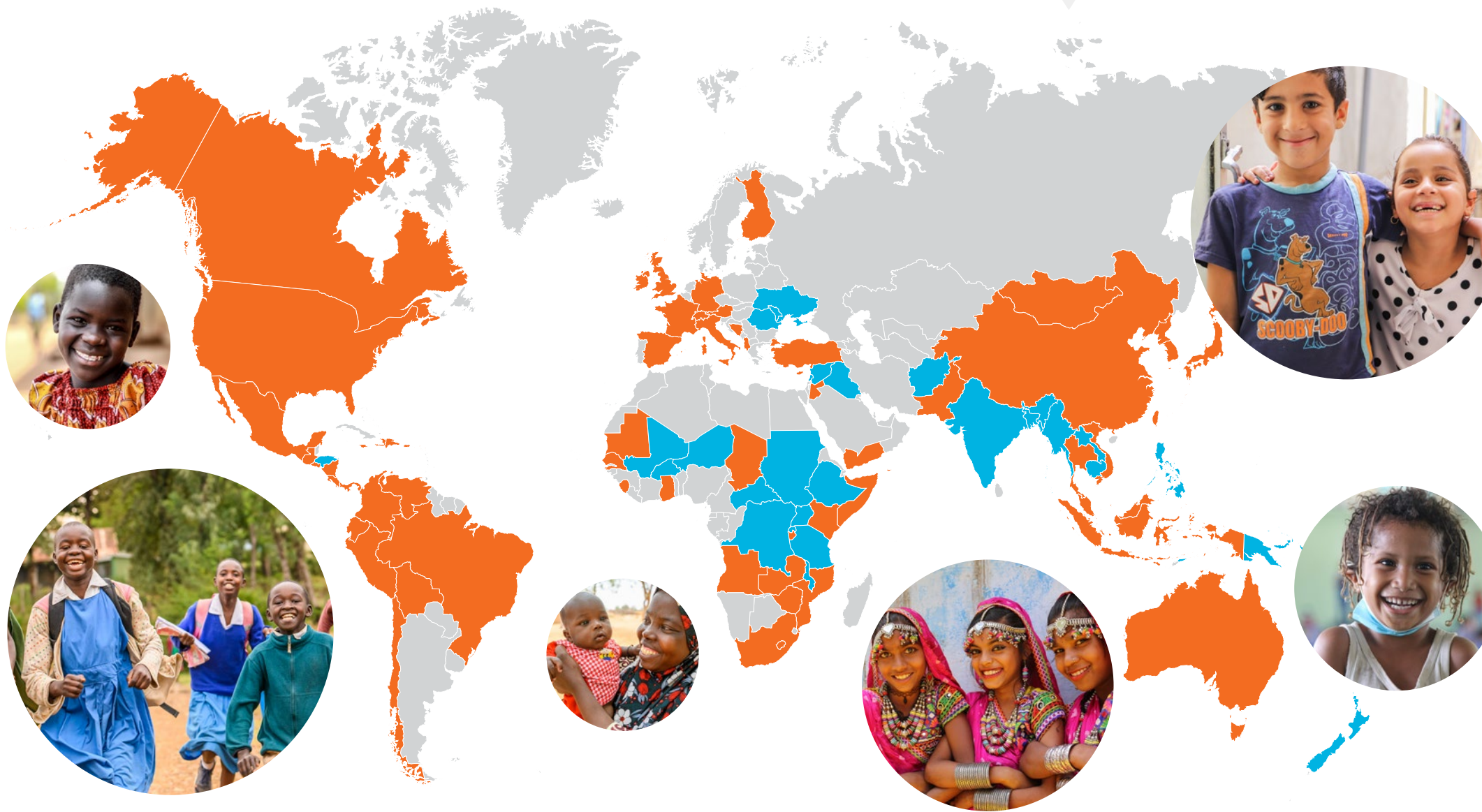

# YOUR IMPACT

You are extraordinary! Here's just some of what we accomplished together last year, thanks to your generosity and other Kiwis like you:



You helped **improve the lives of 3.6 million children** growing up in the world's toughest places.



**1,500 children** living in camps in northwest Syria are **finding ways to cope and manage trauma** after receiving psychosocial support.



**5,842 girls and boys** in Tanzania took part in activities that helped them **know, experience and show God's love.**



**4,316 farmers** from three communities in Myanmar and Uganda are now practising sustainable, climate-smart agriculture, securing their farming resources and income for the long term to provide for their children.



**6,865 people** from 10 communities in Mali, Malawi, Tanzania, Cambodia, Niger and Bangladesh now **know how to respond to child abuse or neglect.**



**964 pregnant women** in Pirganj, Mithapukur and Mirpur, Bangladesh, **gave birth in a health facility**, reducing the risk of death for babies and mothers.



**10,710 children** in Chadakori, Niger are now **able to read**, compared to just 1,530 in 2019.



**4.5 million people** received **life-saving food**, including 2.7 million children, in 15 countries through our partnership with the World Food Programme.



Thanks to your kindness, over the last five years, 89% of the severely malnourished children we treated made a full recovery.



**9,482 girls and boys** in Lipiri, Malawi, and Chadakori, Niger, said their parents were doing more activities with them to **help children learn to read.**



**5,811 girls and boys** caught in conflict in Tigray, Ethiopia, are now going to **non-formal learning programmes** to help them catch up and continue their educations.

"We used to suffer from stomach aches and diarrhoea," says Flora, 9 years old. "I once missed classes for two weeks because I was in hospital with a stomach infection. We weren't even comfortable eating outside because of the flies." People in Nyaronga, Flora's community in Tanzania, often went to the toilet in the open.

Your kindness made it possible for health officers to run local training sessions on the importance of good hygiene. This changed many minds in Flora's community. "Now, my parents have built a better toilet, and my life has changed," she says. "I have somewhere I can wash my hands with soap. My stomach aches are history!"

"I was paid such a low wage for my farm work that I couldn't buy food or clothes for my 10 children," says Mary, a mother in Kasanda community, Tanzania. "We lived in a house so uncomfortable that you couldn't call it a home. It was just a roof over our heads." The house was so poorly ventilated that respiratory illnesses spread easily.

Everything changed when Mary joined our business training, which runs with your support. She also learned to make doormats. By selling them at the local market, she's earning a better income. "I've been able to build a new house, with enough space for us to sleep in. I can buy food, shoes and school uniforms for my children. The chickens now live in our old house," she says.



# YOUR EMERGENCY RESPONSE

## As the war in Ukraine continues, so does your compassion and generosity.

When 8-year-old Sophia heard about the crisis in Ukraine, she immediately wanted to help. With a whole lot of love and some creative ingenuity, Sophia has been raising funds for kids who've been forced to leave everything behind.

Using her amazing talents, she's been creating blue and yellow Ukrainian-inspired crafts – from bracelets and headbands to prayer beads, bookmarks and bag tags – which she gifts to every person who supports her cause.

"Fundraising for Ukraine has made me feel I really belong in my community because people were supporting Ukraine and also supporting me," she says. "Even though I'm 8, I can contribute and help make the world a better place," she says. We couldn't agree more Sophia!

## You helped children and families to survive and find safety in crisis.

"We left home with nothing but the memories in our hearts," says Ivan, a father of three in Syria. "It tore me apart. There were other parents who lost children. It scared me, so we left hoping to find a safer place.

"It was fear. It was panic. I hid how scared I was from my children. We used to live in a big house and they had their own rooms. Now, we're barely making it.

"In the camp, we had to pay a large amount of money for water. Waste was scattered all over the place. This caused illnesses and diseases to spread among children."

Then generous Kiwis like you helped bring clean, safe water to the camp. "Having clean water made our lives easier. Now we can breathe," says Ivan.

"We don't have to worry about securing water and the team is doing a great job maintaining a clean environment at the camp."

# YOU PARTNERED IN THE PACIFIC






Eleven-month-old Julian is gaining weight and growing strong and his mum Cecily has a garden full of fresh vegetables to help keep him healthy. PAPUA NEW GUINEA

In partnership with the New Zealand Aid Programme, you're helping to protect children in the Pacific and South East Asia from violence, improve their nutrition and empower families to meet their needs.

For Cecily and her two young children in Papua New Guinea, your support has been a life-saver. Her 11-month-old son Julian weighed just 4.5 kilograms when a World Vision health volunteer noticed he was too weak to walk. You made it possible for Julian to receive emergency health care, followed by a week of hands-on nutrition classes for Cecily. Her community also helped Cecily plant a garden so she can grow nutritious food for her family. Now Julian is smiling and playing again, and he's already gained 3 kilograms!

## Because you cared...

-  **2,645 PEOPLE** were trained to respond to child protection incidents.
-  **1,192 CHILDREN** had their health checked for malnutrition and 427 children received support to recover. You also equipped parents to start gardening and raising livestock.
-  **71 SAVINGS GROUPS** are helping families get ahead financially. With access to financial services like savings accounts and microloans, parents are better able to meet children's needs.

More than 5,000 Kiwis made their voices heard on a modern slavery law



World Vision Advocacy Ambassadors pounded Wellington pavements in June getting public submissions on the Government's proposal for a Modern Slavery law. NEW ZEALAND

Thousands of you called on the Government to introduce a Modern Slavery law that puts vulnerable children and adults at its centre.



The Government asked how a modern slavery law in New Zealand should look, and you responded, sending a clear message that no matter where people live, they should be paid fairly, treated with dignity and be safe at work. Businesses and individuals alike said the Government isn't doing enough to address modern slavery and support a new law here in Aotearoa.

# YOU SMASHED 40 HOURS

Almost 36,000 Kiwis took part in the World Vision 40 Hour Challenge to bring clean water to kids in the world's toughest places.

Ka pai Aotearoa! In July, tens of thousands of Kiwis took part in the World Vision 40 Hour Challenge and raised \$1,288,996.60 for clean water. Your aroha in action is reaching our global neighbours with emergency water and wells. In refugee camps and rural villages, clean water is starting to flow.

-  **66,750 PEOPLE** in Syrian refugee camps now have safe water to drink.
-  **3,441 PEOPLE** in Malawi have already been trained to keep clean water flowing for years to come.

Janson Charitable Trust is helping kids in Malawi to receive a quality education and build a future of their choosing.

The Canterbury-based Trust was registered in 2009 as Namirembe Trust, before changing its name to Janson Charitable Trust in 2018.

Its charitable purpose is making gifts towards the advancement of education and the relief of poverty. Being aware of the difference education has made in their lives, the Trustees want the same impact for children and young people overseas. Like us, they believe every child deserves an education.

Since 2011, Janson Charitable Trust has partnered with us to generously fund literacy and education-focused projects in Lipiri community, central Malawi. In this community, poverty, disadvantage and vulnerability were preventing children from reaching their full potential. Many didn't receive the quality of education they deserve, and others – especially girls – never had the opportunity to attend school at all.

When poverty forces kids to miss school, they miss opportunities and their shot at a better future. But Janson Charitable Trust is helping to change that.

In the past few years, the Trust's focus has been on giving youth another shot at the future with vocational and trade training, as the children they support have grown up. The Trust is also focused on helping girls return to and stay in school.

In 2018, Trustees Garth Janson and Justine Tindley travelled to Malawi with us to see the impact of their kindness. This trip allowed them to see the two projects in action – Keeping Girls in School and Lipiri Literacy Boost. Garth and Anne Janson are no strangers to World Vision, having worked for World Vision in South Sudan, Mozambique, Taiwan, North Korea and Sri Lanka!

Thank you so much Janson Charitable Trust. Your support for education and entrepreneurship in Malawi is helping kids to break free from poverty, for good.
