Your love and care helped **improve the lives** of **4.1 million children!**



Every 60 seconds ... a family gets water ... a hungry child is fed ... a family receives the tools to overcome poverty. And it's all because of you.

5.2 million people received **life-saving food**, including 3.1 million children, in 16 countries through our partnership with the World Food Programme.



1.68 million of these precious children live in the world's most fragile and dangerous places.



11,635 girls and boys in Tanzania took part in activities that helped them **know, experience and show God's love.**



Your generosity is helping us to reach one new person with clean water every 10 seconds and three more schools every day with clean water.



26,577 more people now have **clean, safe drinking water** close to home.



685 children in Bangladesh and Cambodia now have a reading corner at home after their parents attended workshops to help more children **learn to read.**

“Now we have clean toilets and we can wash our hands.”

“I hated using the toilets at school,” says Gideon, age 12 (front). “They were dirty, there was no privacy because so many other students were pushing to get in, and we couldn’t wash our hands. Sometimes I had to go in the bushes.”

His primary school in Tanzania had just eight toilets for 778 students. Girls and boys suffered from waterborne diseases and some stopped going to school.

But things are different now! Kind Kiwis like you made it possible to build two new toilet blocks,

one for girls and one for boys, with 10 toilets in each and taps with clean, safe water.

Now that students have modern toilets and clean, running water to wash their hands, they are healthier – with better hygiene and less sickness. That means they can spend more time learning and playing at school.

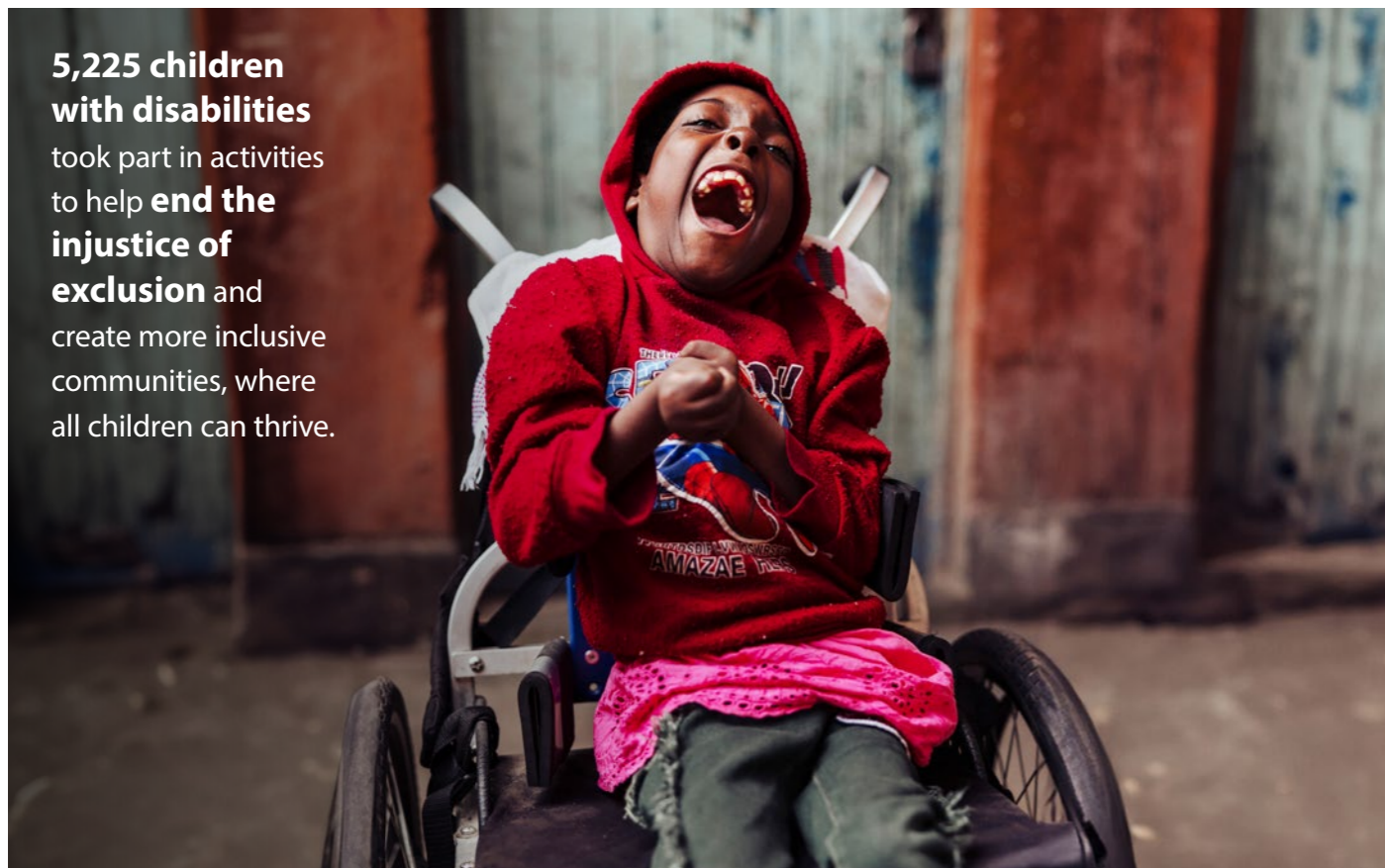
“Now we have clean toilets and we can wash our hands,” says Gideon. “It is a dream for us. And we don’t miss school because of stomach pains.”

Together, we've impacted the lives of over 200 million vulnerable children by tackling the root causes of poverty.

5,188 farmers in Uganda learned how to grow nutrient-rich crops, such as orange sweet potatoes and iron-rich vegetables, helping them to **stop child malnutrition** in its tracks.



5,225 children with disabilities took part in activities to help **end the injustice of exclusion** and create more inclusive communities, where all children can thrive.



For the first time, Isaya, age 11, has a wheelchair to get around! Your kindness means Isaya can now go to school and play with his friends! TANZANIA

"Now I can move around easily and go places."

"It was hard for me to move around," says 11-year-old Isaya, who has a disability. "I used to crawl, which hurt my knees and legs. I was lonely because my family left me at home when they went out. I couldn't go out or visit friends."

"Isaya is a bright kid. He's interested in studying and wants to learn, but it was hard for me to send him to school. The school is so far and the only way was if I carried him there and back," says his mother (left).

Thanks to generous Kiwis like you, we were able to provide Isaya with a wheelchair, health checks and physiotherapy services. As a result, Isaya can now go to school and join in community events.

"Now I can move around easily and go places," Isaya says. "I can play with friends. I often make new friends because some of them want to wheel me around for fun. It's like we're playing toy cars! I am so happy and grateful. Thank you!"

YOUR EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Your kindness has helped nearly 1 million people across Türkiye and Northwest Syria, right when they needed it most.

On 6 February 2023, two huge earthquakes hit Türkiye and Syria. Thousands of people lost their lives and millions were left homeless. Your compassion helped deliver urgent, life-saving support to children and families – right from the very first day. And in the months since, your love has supported survivors with emergency food, healthcare, safe water, blankets, heating, fuel, child protection and more.

Eight-year-old Badr* had endured multiple moves due to the conflict in Syria. Just when his family had finally found a modest house to rent, the earthquake struck. Thanks to the love and care of supporters like you, Badr's family received a more spacious and durable tent to shield them from the relentless rain and biting cold while work was being done to repair their home.

Healing can start here

"When fighting broke out in our village, my family fled to save our lives," Momina* (left) says. "I used to cry a lot and was so sad. But now I have discovered happiness, knowledge and new friends!"

Afar, Ethiopia, is a region that's been ravaged by conflict and natural disasters. There are few mental health supports for children experiencing post-traumatic stress disorder. But there are many children who need help to process what they've been through.

Because of your compassion, child-friendly spaces in Afar, and in disaster zones and refugee camps around the world, are bringing joy to precious tamariki caught in conflict and helping them start to heal. Thank you for providing children like Momina with safe places to play, learn, laugh and just be kids again.

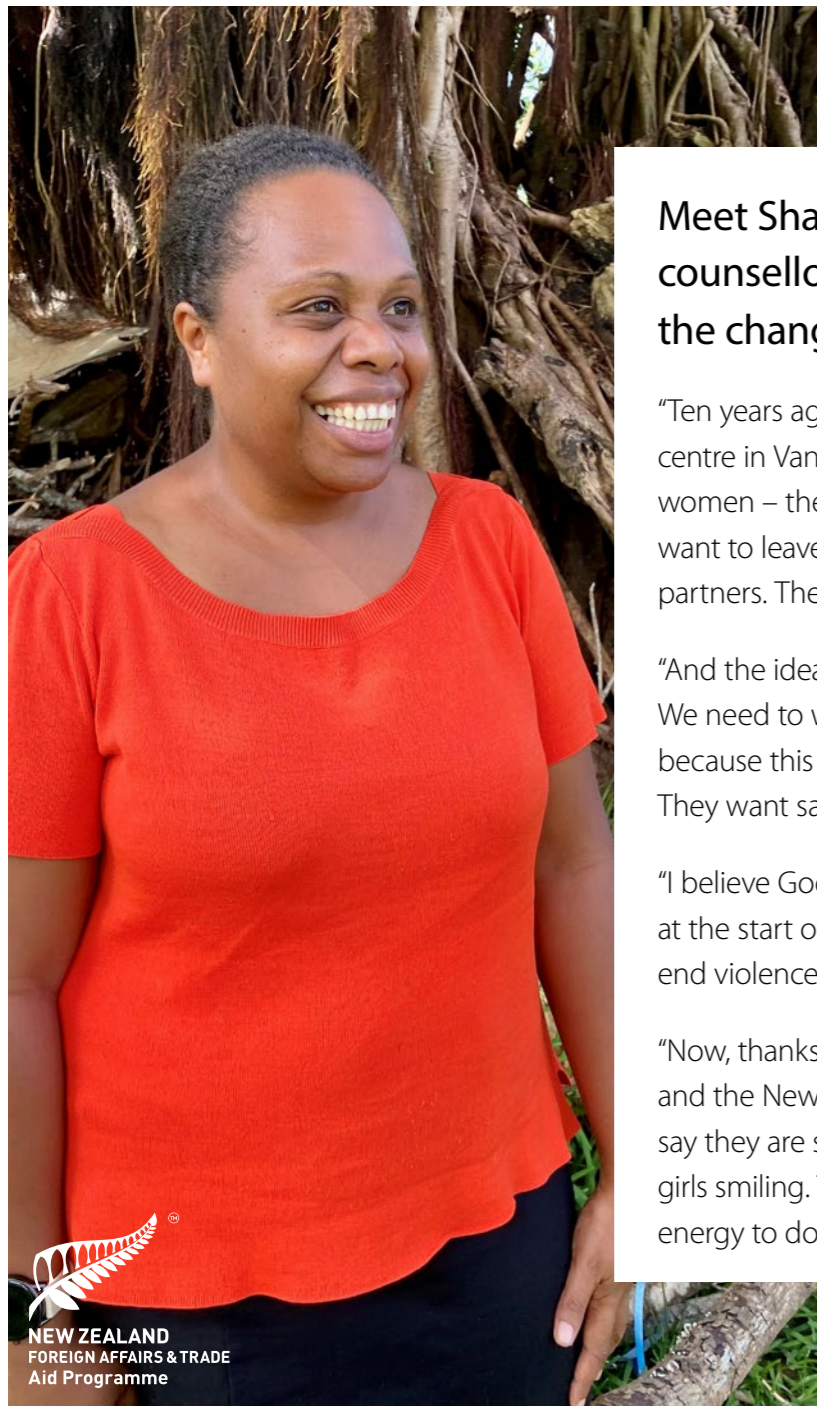


YOU PARTNERED IN THE PACIFIC

In partnership with the New Zealand Aid Programme, you're helping to weave protection, nutrition and livelihoods into a strong safety net for the children of the Pacific and South-East Asia.

You're empowering children, families and communities in Laos, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Timor-Leste and Vanuatu to grow stronger, so children can thrive! Over the past year, your kindness reached 9,522 people, including 5,592 women and girls, and 134 people with disabilities. That's 25% more than we were aiming for. Thank you!



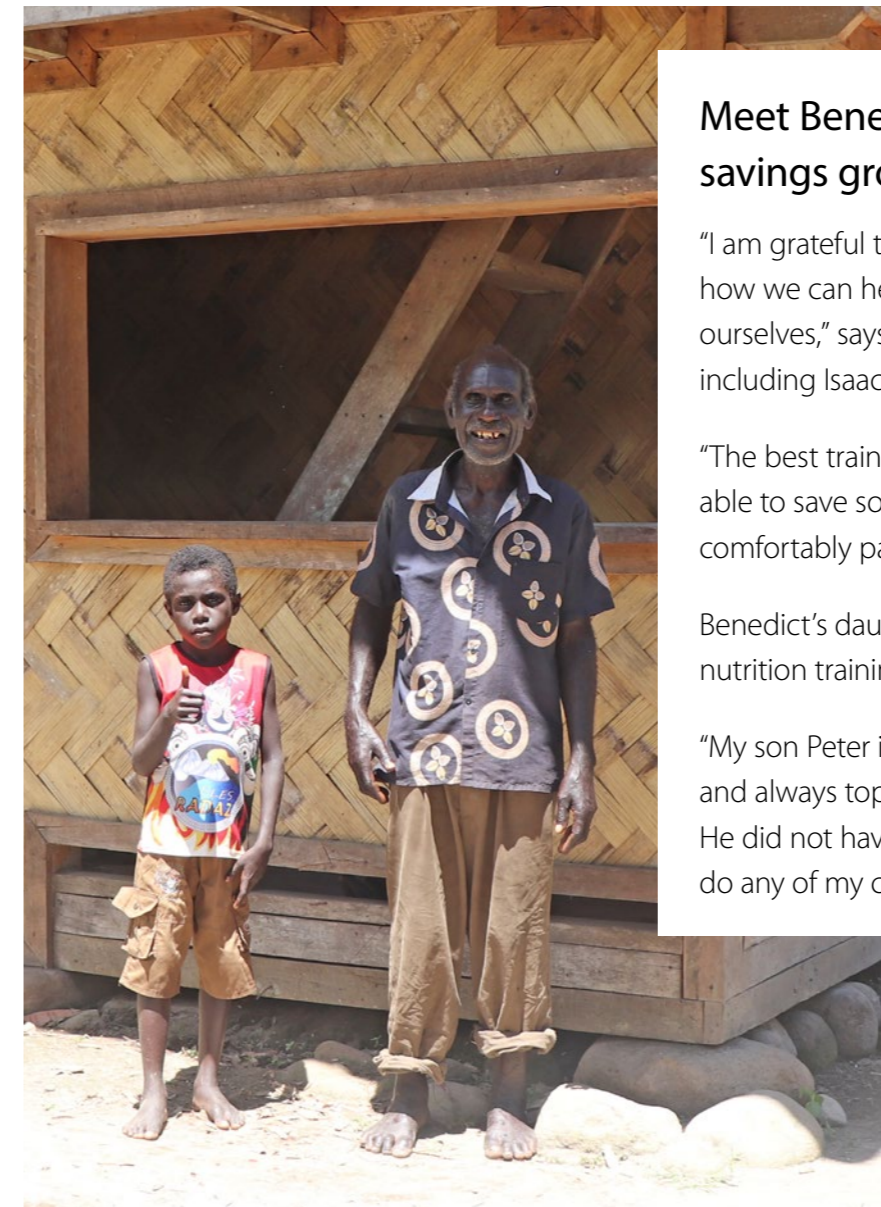
Meet Shanna, a gender-based violence counsellor in Vanuatu helping men be the change in their families.

"Ten years ago, I was working at the only women's crisis centre in Vanuatu. I kept hearing the same message from women – they just want the violence to stop. They don't want to leave their families. They love their husbands and partners. They just want the violence to stop.

"And the idea came to me – how do we make it stop? We need to work with men. We need men in the picture because this is what women want. They want safe homes. They want safe families.

"I believe God led me to World Vision at the right time, at the start of a programme that works with men to end violence.

"Now, thanks to the support of the New Zealand people and the New Zealand government, I'm hearing women say they are safe in their homes. I'm seeing children and girls smiling. That just makes my day and gives me more energy to do the work."



Meet Benedict, chair of a community savings group in Papua New Guinea

"I am grateful to World Vision. They have trained us on how we can help our homes, community, families and ourselves," says Benedict, who is also a grandfather of 12, including Isaac (left).

"The best training of all is the savings training. We are able to save some of the money we make. Now, I can comfortably pay for all my grandchildren's school fees."

Benedict's daughter Anastacia, a mum of five, credits nutrition training with her children's good health.

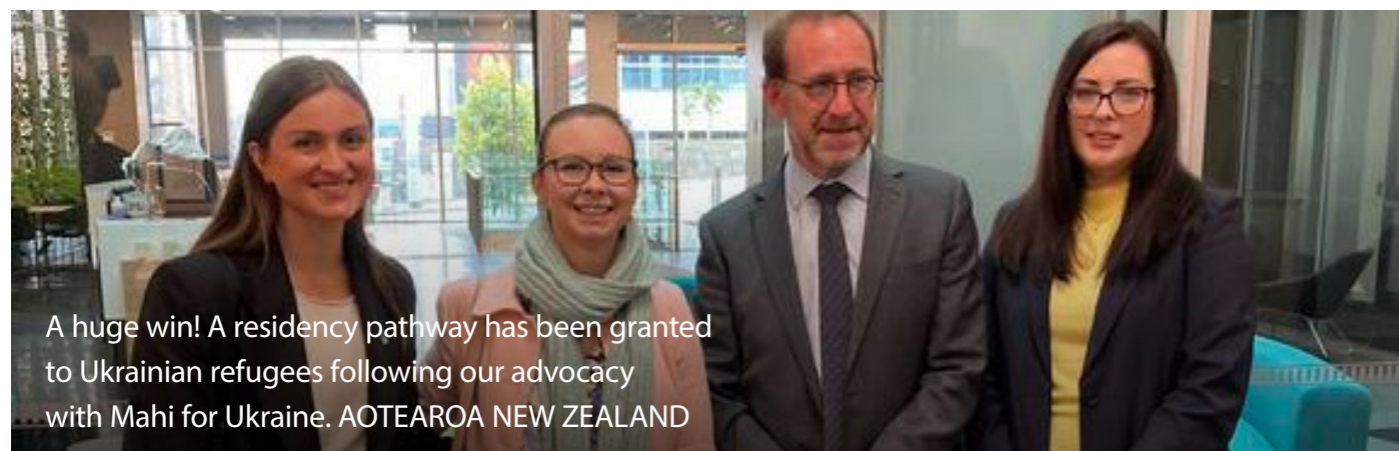
"My son Peter is a healthy baby. He is well-nourished and always tops the birth-weight chart during check-ups. He did not have any issues like his sister and now, neither do any of my children," she says.

Meet Ana, an active parents' club member in Timor-Leste

"I used to discipline my children by yelling and hitting them. I learned new ways without resorting to violence after I joined the parents' club. Now, I correct my children with a soft voice and show them examples that they can easily understand." Ana aspires to be a nurturing mother not only to her own family, but also to her community.



YOU ADVOCATED FOR CHANGE



Because of your collective advocacy, we are one step closer to a world where children everywhere can live in freedom and dream of a brighter future.

With your support, World Vision New Zealand has campaigned against injustice, advocated for legal reform and mobilised communities to challenge the policies, systems and attitudes that prevent children and their families from experiencing life in all its fullness.

Last year, your advocacy led to the New Zealand Government committing to draft modern slavery legislation for supply chains. A remarkable 6,500 Kiwis signed our open letter in July, urging the government to progress modern slavery legislation before the election. Your engagement with MPs and presence at election meetings made it loud and clear that modern slavery legislation must be front and centre for the new government.

Student advocacy from our youth conferences and advocacy ambassadors was especially impactful. In May, they delivered more than 300 letters to the prime minister expressing solidarity with the 12 million children trapped in modern slavery globally. The prime minister responded with his own letter confirming that addressing the issue of modern slavery was a priority.

Thanks to your generosity, we were able to launch [four major research reports](#), exposing the

prevalence of modern slavery and child labour in Aotearoa New Zealand's supply chains, and highlighting the experiences of people who resettle in Aotearoa New Zealand on humanitarian visas.

In partnership with Mahi for Ukraine, we successfully advocated for policy improvements and better supports for Ukrainians. In August 2023, the government implemented many of our requested policy changes, including establishing a pathway to residency for Ukrainians.

We also conducted research into the evacuation and resettlement experiences of Afghan nationals who resettled in Aotearoa New Zealand in 2021 and, subsequently, advocated for the government to develop a more effective crisis evacuation and resettlement model for future emergencies.

In collaboration with other humanitarian agencies, we penned an open letter urging the government to show global leadership and champion peace efforts in Gaza.

As part of our climate change advocacy, we scoped our new flagship campaign, asked the government to provide stronger financial support to the Pacific, and include children and young people in environmental decision-making.

YOU TOOK ON THE WORLD VISION 40 HOUR CHALLENGE



Tens of thousands of Kiwis took part in the World Vision 40 Hour Challenge to help change everything for kids who urgently need clean water. And it's change that will last.

Ngā mihi nui ki Aotearoa! In July, you took on the World Vision 40 Hour Challenge and raised \$1,119,937 to bring life-changing clean water to kids in the world's toughest places. You should feel so proud! This is just the start of your impact:

💧 **46,336 PEOPLE IN SYRIAN REFUGEE CAMPS** have received emergency water.

💧 **3,456 MORE PEOPLE IN MALAWI** have clean water close to home, thanks to new long-term water pumps.

💧 **2,826 STUDENTS** now have hand-washing stations at school ... and counting!

"I am so happy you came to help us," says 9-year-old Madalitso (right). "Dirty water made our lives miserable. Now, my life is so good, I rarely get sick like before because we have clean water from the well. And that means I'm doing much better at school. I'm so grateful!"

Meet James, a generous and faithful Visionary choosing to share his blessings.

"I didn't start out with much. Whatever money I've earned in life, it's all come from God. Really, I'm only the steward of that money. I don't regard it as mine. There are lots of people who need it, and I feel it should be used to help them.

"My father helped people in need. We once lived opposite a family with half a dozen kids, and their father had tuberculosis. My father bought those kids new shoes so they didn't have to go to school with bare feet. He helped them in all sorts of ways. He'd help someone when nobody else bothered.

"God has been good to me, so I knew I should pass it on," says James. As part of our Visionaries Group, James has included a gift in his Will for World Vision as a natural extension of his love and the deep values and beliefs of his life.

"World Vision makes it easy for me to do good things for people – things that I would be doing myself, if I were young and fit and able to.

"World Vision is doing what Jesus commanded. Love your neighbours as yourself. Help people out. Our help should go where it's most needed. First, make sure that anyone you're responsible for is looked after. Anything they don't need, you've got to leave it to someone who does need it.

"We're all brothers and sisters in Christ. So in that sense, you're leaving it to your family."

"Jesus' instruction that we should love our neighbours as we love ourselves prompted me to be concerned about people who are in dire straits around the world," says James.

THE WORLD VISION 100

The World Vision 100 is a small but growing group of supporters like you, who have committed to contributing \$5,000 or more each year to help the poorest families in the poorest communities lift themselves above poverty. As more supporters have joined, more families have moved from dependency to self-sufficiency. For good.

Families trapped in extreme poverty struggle to survive without the skills, resources or opportunities they need to earn a stable living and provide well for their children.

But your love is coming alongside them. Over the past year, The World Vision 100 has equipped hundreds of the poorest families in some of the poorest villages in Asia with tools to lift themselves out of poverty – and never look back.

Shadhona, a mother in Bangladesh, is one of them. Her family was dependent on her husband and lived hand-to-mouth in a vicious cycle of hardship. They struggled to feed their children and had no savings.

Today, that's all changed. You provided Shadhona and her family with an intense, wrap-around programme – the training, resources, cash, food and emotional support they needed to break free from poverty, for good.

It started with a cow and livestock training to help Shadhona contribute to the family income. Today, she has three cows, her children have nutritious milk to drink and she sells extra milk at the local market. Shadhona proudly displays the family vision she drew as part of our programme (top right). It covers her plans to have a cattle farm, a house that is well maintained and a nutritious vegetable garden.

Her vision is coming true. You helped Shadhona learn how to garden in small spaces, using hanging and sack garden techniques. Another new source of food and income! Her earnings have more than doubled and, for the first time, her family has savings. Shadhona has even been able to buy a hand pump (bottom right), bringing clean water close to home. "It has been a life-changing experience for us," she says.

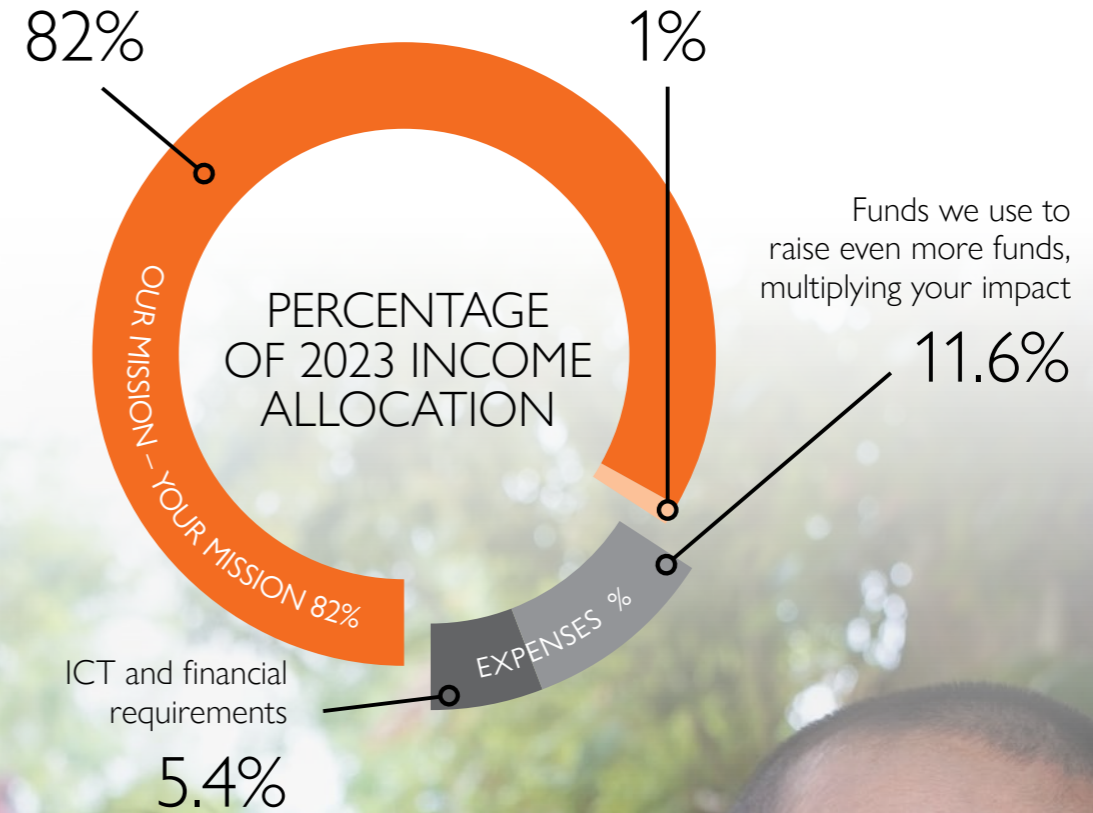
