—— About the Play —

In 1974, Alan Bennett befriended Miss Mary Shepherd, an eccentric, cantankerous and rather smelly old lady. She 'temporarily' parked her dilapidated van outside Bennett's London home – and stayed for 15 years. Best-known for the celebrated 2015 film starring Maggie Smith, *The Lady in the Van* is a mostly true story of the fascinating relationship between the award-winning British writer and his long-term guest. Was she a fugitive on the run? A talented pianist? A nun? Or just an old lady struggling with mental health and homelessness?

— About the Playwright

Alan Bennett has been one of the UK's leading dramatists since the success of Beyond the Fringe in the 1960s. His television series *Talking Heads* has become a modern-day classic, as have many of his works for the stage, including *Forty Years On, The Lady in the Van, A Question of Attribution, The Madness of George III* and his adaptation of *The Wind in the Willows. The History Boys* won Evening Standard, Critics' Circle and Olivier Awards, and the South Bank Award. It also won six Tonys including Best Play on Broadway, and was released as a film in 2006. Bennett's other plays include *The Habit Of Art, People*, and the short plays *Hymn* and *Cocktail Sticks (Untold Stories)*. His latest play *Allelujah!* opened at The Bridge Theatre in London in July 2018.



Before the show

What systems are in place to support homeless people in Melbourne? Compare and contrast the social class structures of the United Kingdom and Australia. What are the moral and ethical implications of writing about another real person?

Post-show Activities



Discuss this moment in the play:

A. Bennett: How long have you been living in the van?

Miss Shepherd: Who says I live there? I may spend the night there on occasion but it's only a pied- $\dot{\alpha}$ -terre.

A. Bennett: Where do you live?

Miss Shepherd: I got it to put my things in, though don't spread that around.

What does this interaction tell you about Miss Shepherd's personality and history?

Discuss the device the playwright uses of having two Alan Bennett characters. How are they different? What is the function of A. Bennett 2?

Discuss how each character treated Miss Shepherd differently. How might her experience be similar to those of people in Melbourne?




Did you know that the vans onstage are made of timber? See a photo essay about their creation at mtc.com.au/backstage.



Consider how many actors played multiple characters in the play. How were production areas such as costume and wigs used? How did actors manipulate their expressive and performance skills?
