- DIGITAL EDUCATION -



MTC's innovative Digital Education program is extending the company's reach to thousands of geographicaly and socially isolated young people, using the platforms and technologies that are part of their everyday life.

Students can now explore MTC's production workshops via our new online Virtual Tour, watch time-lapse recordings of rehearsals, gain insights through video and podcast interviews with actors and creative artists, and enhance their studies with web-based interactive revision tools. Post-show Q&A sessions through Instagram Stories enabled students to access behind-the-scenes secrets on their mobile device.

The number of teachers and students downloading MTC's free, award-winning Education Packs continues to grow.

- PRE-SHOW TALKS AND POST-SHOW Q&A -



Schools get the most out of their excursion to MTC when they add a Pre-show Talk. For *The Violent Outburst that Drew Me To You, Così* and *Shakespeare in Love*, Pre-show Talks gave students the opportunity to learn behind-the-scenes insights and make connections between the performance and the curriculum. Performances with a Pre-show Talk also included a 20-minute post-show Q&A with available members of the cast and creative team.

– WORK EXPERIENCE –



MTC offers a select number of work experience placements each year. Students are assigned to an MTC production for one week to observe rehearsals and assist with small stage management tasks as required. Students sometimes assist in other departments with administrative tasks, as well as Props Hire. If an MTC production is in-season, students are offered tickets to a matinee performance.

REACH

- **10** students participated
- 4 students attended regional schools
- 3 students attended disadvantaged (ICESA <1,000) schools
- 2 students re-engaged with MTC following previous involvement in enrichment programs

- TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT -



MTC delivered a range of professional development events for teachers throughout 2019 both in Melbourne and regional Victoria. In partnership with Drama Victoria, we delivered a Dramaturgy PD, in conversation with director Iain Sinclair, to support teachers with the new VCE Study Designs. We also welcomed English teachers from VATE (Victorian Association for the Teaching of English) to MTC HQ for a conversation with voice and dialect coach Leith McPherson about the language in *Shakespeare in Love*, ahead of them seeing the production on stage. We also presented a special *Storm Boy* puppetry workshop at MTC HQ with Dead Puppet Society for teachers across Victoria and interstate.

- HQ TOURS -



Students and teachers have the opportunity to peek behind the scenes on an HQ Tour and see how Australia's oldest professional theatre company operates. Our Sturt Street Headquarters in Southbank is the engine room of the Company, housing the Production, Administrative and Creative departments.

School groups visit the MTC Production departments, including wigs, wardrobe, properties, scenic art and the set workshop. Teachers often book this experience prior to seeing an MTC production. REACH

In 2019, MTC won two Drama Victoria awards: Best Resource for the 2019 VCE Playlist for the *Così* Education Pack; and Best Performance by a Theatre Company for Years 7–10 for *Storm Boy* by Colin Thiele, adapted for the stage by Tom Holloway, a co-production with Queensland Theatre in association with Dead Puppet Society.
