OVERVIEW

Entering its eighth year, MTC's Women in Theatre Program is one of the Company's most successful career development initiatives and has supported over 80 female theatre professionals to date. Each year the program continues to address gender imbalance in the arts by breaking down barriers to employment opportunities through industry mentorships, leadership skills development and operational training, mental health and wellbeing support and access a rewarding network of sector experts and program alumnae.

The devastating impacts of COVID-19 on the live performance industry in 2020 and into 2021 have affected many of our 2020 participants and program alumnae. Theatre closures, lock-down restrictions and ineligibility to access Job Keeper have seen their work and incomes, built on life-long craft and commitment, vanish overnight. MTC would like to thank you sincerely for your support and advocacy. Your generosity has provided a vital lifeline to our female artists and theatre-makers, so that the arts sector of tomorrow survives in full parity, representative of diversity and artistic excellence.

2020 MTC WOMEN IN THEATRE PROGRAM

Participants travelled from Sydney and across Melbourne, gathering at MTC HQ for their first week of Salon Sessions which were able to take place in person in February 2020. These sessions included *Profile Management & Networking, Fearless Leadership* and a deep dive into the inner workings of MTC programming and structural organisation. It was a great opportunity for our participants to meet each other, the MTC Executive and Artistic Teams and so many of the Women in Theatre Giving Circle Donors at Welcome Drinks. Participants were also introduced to their mentors, chosen by the individual participant and the program administrators in collaboration, to begin establishing connections and set desired outcomes.

Despite the impact of the ongoing crisis on arts and artists in Victoria, and thanks to the generosity of the Women in Theatre Giving Circle, MTC continued to find imaginative and innovative ways to best support the 2020 cohort in their professional development remotely.

Transitioning to online delivery via Zoom, MTC hosted the second week of *Salon Sessions* in May 2020. Participants learned about the operational aspects of running a large theatre company through *MTC Business* Parts 1 and 2 conducted by MTC Department Heads, discussed *Developing New Australian Works* with MTC Literary Associate and program alumna Jenni Medway, explored *Creative Pathways* with MTC Casting and Artistic Team experts, and concluded the week with the first of three *Mental Health and Wellbeing* coaching workshops run by independent Counsellor and Arts Specialist Gabriel Edwards.

Hosted remotely in October 2020, *Salon Sessions* returned with an additional session focused on *Mental Health and Wellbeing* with Gabriel Edwards, in response to ongoing impacts of the pandemic on the cohort and sector and an opportunity to hear directly from two artists negotiating this in Sarah Ward (performer) and Anna Leibzeit (Sound Designer). The week also included part one of the *Grants, Money and Me* workshop with Auspicious Art's Selene Bateman and part one of the invaluable annual *Pitching and Negotiating Masterclass* hosted by Leadership Consultant Erica Bagshaw.

Our Week Four activities included a third *Mental Health and Wellbeing* session and part two of *Grants, Money and Me* in late 2020, and a further session on *Production and Playing Spaces* with MTC Production Design Coordinator Jacob Battista will be delivered online in early 2021. Part two of the *Pitching and Negotiating Masterclass* will take place remotely on Thursday 25 February to prepare the 2020 cohort for the annual *Pitch Day*, where participants have the opportunity to pitch themselves, their work and their collaborative ideas to MTC Artistic and Operational Executives. The *Pitch Day* is scheduled for Thursday 18 March, currently in-person at MTC Southbank Theatre.

In support of the core program of *Salon Sessions*, MTC were keen to make sure that the cohort felt as connected to each other and MTC as possible, and make sure that their experience as part of the program was as valuable as it could be, not being in person. MTC therefore established additional workshops, zoom drinks and personal catch-ups throughout 2020, made possible by your support.

As well as the increase of professionally led coaching as part of our *Mental Health and Wellbeing* sessions, MTC also engaged award-winning Artistic Director Sam Strong to present a workshop on *Creative Leadership*, added a requested discussion on *Diversity and Working Cross-Culturally,* and hosted Zoom and in-person Drinks Catch-ups in August and December.

PARTICIPANT FEEDBACK



Being a participant in the MTC Women in Theatre program provided essential guidance, support, motivation and validation for me during this stage of my career. Although I was clear about what I hoped to gain from the program at the outset, the content of the program provided even more than what I had anticipated, opening my eyes to the further potential of myself as an artistic leader. The program staff, guest artists and all of MTC team were generous in helping me work towards my hopes for the program and beyond... I felt tremendous benefit by gaining an inside into main-stage practices, learning how I can adapt these both to my independent practice and roles within small-med organisations. Perhaps more profoundly for myself as a freelance artist I appreciated the psychological security that being attached to an organisation at MTC's level provides. This is incredibly valuable regardless of the COVID-19 era.

In particular I found the Mentoring component of the program, which was a career-trajectory game-

changer for me. Regular meetings with my mentor provided highly tailored career guidance that I can implement well beyond the timeline of the program, and an informal mentor/mentee relationship has emerged out of our regular meetings. This means I can manage my career speed-bumps with a friend and outside eye to help sustain me - which I am equally determined to do for others. It helped me coalesce where I currently see my career, assisted in my focussing how I want to progress, and provided me with the pathway, the clarity, and has awakened the guts for me to get there. I cannot say enough how incredibly beneficial being a part of this program has been for me. Thank you MTC team. I will be forever grateful.

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The Women in Theatre Program has provided invaluable industry knowledge and insight into people's real experiences working in the arts. I have found discussions with the group extremely grounding, connecting all of us to share stories and ways of working. In particular, the mentorship aspect encouraged me to reflect inwards, to discover my strengths, weaknesses and address the trajectory of my career. The session modules provided a practical approach to learning and made catch ups productive and thought provoking. During COVID-19, it was uplifting to still have masterclasses online and be connected. The selected guest speakers, professionals and peers brought truth, honesty and real-life advice that we could apply as individuals.

Through the experience, I solidified my interests and created goals for existing roles and in my own creative practice. I successfully created an Accessibility Action Plan at MICF, and was offered to be in Footscray Community Arts Centre's residency program, RESIDENCE later in the year. I would highly

recommend the program to anyone working in the industry as it invites such a wholesome approach to professional development and mentorship.

The one on one meetings with Joanna were a great opportunity develop a rapport and ask questions that I otherwise wouldn't have the chance to ask.

Given the difficult and isolating circumstances of the 2020 Women in Theatre Program, MTC have extended program activity in 2021 solely for last year's cohort. This will allow the group to come together in person, pitch live with MTC Artistic and Operation Executives and feel first-hand the inner workings of the State theatre company.

2020 also saw MTC working closely with program alumnae, who are now more than ever in need of support, connections and creative collaborations.

We have decided therefore to postpone any additional participants of the core program in 2021 and introduce new opportunities for increased networking, leaning and skills development across our entire program alumnae.

With such a significant gap in employment opportunity between male and female technical creatives, MTC will continue its Technical Design Stream this year, with two placements on offer to mid-career sound and lighting artists. The participants will be assigned to mainstage productions throughout the design to production period, enabling hands-on knowledge sharing between MTC experts, experienced designers, and the participants. This exposure to staging professional theatre in large-scale venues, with state of the art technology and experienced crews, will provide the participants with the knowledge base and expertise to assist in their taking on future Technical Creative Design roles.

We look forward to being in touch with the Women in Theatre Giving Circle to engage with the 2021 program and participants as soon as possible.
