— About the Play

Jon is a prize-winning novelist who wants more out of life. His third marriage is going about as well as his first two, and he's stuck at university teaching creative writing to lazy undergraduates. He's a good teacher, but he believes there's really only one student worth his time. Annie is clever, imaginative, and a huge fan of Jon's work. One afternoon, Jon catches himself admiring Annie in her red coat, and soon it feels like their affair was destined from the start. But when the embers have cooled and the affair is over, who will control their narrative?

About the Playwright

Hannah Moscovitch is an acclaimed Canadian playwright, TV writer and librettist whose work has been widely produced in Canada as well as around the world. Hannah has been the recipient of numerous awards, including the Trillium Book Award, the Nova Scotia Masterworks Award, both The Scotsman Fringe First and The Herald Angel Award at the Edinburgh Festival, and the prestigious Windham-Campbell Prize administered by Yale University. She has been nominated for the international Susan Smith Blackburn Prize, New York City's Drama Desk Award, as well as Canada's Siminovitch Prize and Governor General's Award (twice each). Past stage work includes her theatre-rock concert hybrid Old Stock: A Refugee Love Story, co-created with Christian Barry and Ben Caplan, which has been touring internationally since 2017, and won the 2019 BankSA Adelaide Fringe Pick in Australia. Hannah is a Playwright-in-Residence at Toronto's Tarragon Theatre

Before the show



Think about the title of the play and make predictions about the story, then read the About the Play section overleaf. Discuss the question: who will control their narrative?

Research the play Oleanna by David Mamet. Compare the play's synopsis to what you know about this production.



Download the **show programme** and read about the creative team who worked on this production. Research the roles of Intimacy Coordinator and Movement Consultant and think about what they might do in rehearsal.

Read the article **Ripped from the Headlines** on the MTC website, then investigate what is happening in the real world that might resonate with the themes of this play, including the #MeToo movement.

Read the article **A Moving Performance** on the MTC website and make notes about the movement language you might see in this production.



Watch the **video traile**r and make predictions about how the production. Discuss design elements, themes, characters, mood.

Post-show Activities



Discuss the use of direct address in the play. How did the actor use their expressive skills to switch between direct address and dialogue with the other character?

Discuss the ending of the play. What is the overall feeling you're left with? Write your own epilogue to the play that explores what happens next for Annie and Jon.

Recall some moments from the play that resonated with you, made you laugh, or that you didn't like. Have other people in the class chosen the same moments?

Revisit the **video trailer** to jog your memory of the set design. Discuss how the actors used the space, and identify the entrances and exits, and symbolism in the design.



Read director Petra Kalive's article **Balance of Power** on the MTC website and discuss how power was explored in the production.
