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WRITER'S NOTE

Inspired by a family visit to Berlin,
Joanna Murray-Smith's newest work is an
MTC NEXT STAGE Original that asks difficult
but vital questions.

Berlin is a small play about big ideas. In 2015, I visited Berlin with my husband and three children. I expected the children would find the deluge of cultural and tourist destinations in the city overwhelming. To my surprise, they were the ones lingering as I headed for the exits, overwhelmed by the claustrophobia of horror. My children are the grandchildren of an historian and a history teacher, so the past has always been a living presence for them. They are the children of a

writer and a journalist, so storytelling is a prominent feature of our life at home. But perhaps more importantly, their adored grandmother Nita arrived in Melbourne as a young Jewish refugee from Poland. Before long, almost everyone she had known in her township – from her teachers and friends to shopkeepers, neighbours and her own grandparents – had been slaughtered. The town was wiped off the map and eventually swallowed by Ukraine. As a teenager, it was daunting to imagine the eradication of nearly everyone who had populated my life. Through my mother, my children and I had a silent but profound connection to Berlin.

While the children went off on their own to find the stadium where, during the 1936 Olympics, Hitler snubbed the great African American track-star Jesse Owens, I became obsessed by the Stolpersteine, the small shining plaques in the residential pavements marking the date and destiny of the Jews who had once lived at each address. What was it like, I wondered, to live in a city so engaged with its own historical crimes, its own human failing? Everywhere we went, history was as much of a presence as the moment we were in. A city

so vibrant, so beguilingly cultured, so full of young people from all over the world in seemingly permanent creative celebration, was punctuated at every turn by unambiguous shame.

Then and in subsequent visits, I applauded Germany for its determination to relentlessly examine its own soul. But I have also felt sympathy for the young, who I presumptuously imagine might struggle to find 'the lightness of being'. Should a line ever be drawn? I think I know the answer to that, especially with the recent rise of the Far Right. But surely if the past is so present, it must still collect a toll on our emotions? What suffering, what guilt, what fury is carried on in our DNA and for how long? Is love a viable weapon in fighting for freedom from history?

I owe a debt to my mother here, Nita Murray-Smith, whose stories ensured remembrance, at least in my family. She and my beloved relative Judy Kolt (the Melbourne-based author of the astonishing memoir *Tell it to the Squirrels*) have personified the power of resilience for me. They have embodied, with extraordinary vitality, the will to find and spread joy whilst carrying within them the weight of their own histories. They remain inspirations in their engagement with love, life, culture and children despite what they knew, what they saw and what they remembered.

And thanks, too, to Sam, Charlie and Lucie, who allowed me to experience Berlin through eyes other than my own.

Gratitude, as always, to all at MTC, for its ongoing faith in and support of its artists, to Brett for his excitement about the play, NEXT STAGE and its wonderful donors for its hugely generous support in the writing of the play and to Iain Sinclair,

Grace Cummings, Michael Wahr and the wonderful stage managers and designers, the set builders and costume makers and all the other talented folk who have brought this play to life.

Finally, thanks go to the intrepid and generous audiences who have, against the odds, come back to see living ideas in a living medium. On behalf of all the playwrights, directors and actors of the Australian stage, thank you.

JOANNA MURRAY-SMITH — PLAYWRIGHT

Joanna Murray-Smith's plays have been produced and translated all over the world, in over two dozen languages, including on Broadway, the West End and at the Royal National Theatre in London. Joanna has worked across many forms, from plays to novels, journalism, opera libretti

and screenplays. Her plays include Three Little Words, Switzerland, Pennsylvania Avenue, True Minds, Songs for Nobodies, The Gift, Rockabye, The Female of the Species, Ninety, Bombshells and Flame (Melbourne Theatre Company); L'Appartement (Queensland Theatre); American Song (Milwaukee Repertory); Day One-A-Hotel-Evening (Red Stitch); Fury (Sydney Theatre Company); Rapture, Nightfall, Redemption, Love Child and Honour (Malthouse Theatre). Joanna has also adapted Hedda Gabler (for the State Theatre Company of South Australia) and Ingmar Bergman's Scenes from a Marriage for Sir Trevor Nunn (Coventry/London).



IAIN SINCLAIR — DIRECTOR

Iain Sinclair holds a Master's degree from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and King's College London. For MTC he directed *The Beast* by Eddie Perfect, and Arthur Miller's *A View from the Bridge*. Other credits include *Mojo* by Jez Butterworth, *Blood Wedding* by Federico García

Lorca, translation by Iain Sinclair, *Our Town* by Thornton Wilder (Sydney Theatre Company); *Brisbane* by Matthew Ryan (Queensland Theatre); *The Seed* by Kate Mulvany, *Killer Joe* by Tracey Letts, *Beyond the Neck* by Tom Holloway and *My Arm* by Tim Crouch (Belvoir); *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* (Ensemble); *Grey Nomad* by Dan Lee (Australian Theatre Company Los Angeles); *All My Sons* by Arthur Miller (Eternity Theatre) and *Good Works* by Nick Enright (Eternity Theatre). He was director of dramaturgy for Playwriting Australia and chair of the NSW Premiers Literary Awards for playwriting. Sinclair is the recipient of a number of awards including the Stuart Wagstaff Award for Most Outstanding Direction and the 2020 Green Room Award for Best Direction. He is Head of Acting at 16th Street Actors Studio in Melbourne.



CHRISTINA SMITH — SET & COSTUME DESIGNER

Christina Smith's work as a set and costume designer has been seen at Melbourne Theatre Company in shows including A View from the Bridge, The Architect, Gloria, The Odd Couple, Elling, National Interest, The Seed,

NIKLAS PAJANTI — LIGHTING DESIGNER

Niklas Pajanti is an award-winning lighting designer whose practice ranges across contemporary art forms and performance styles including theatre, dance, opera, circus, musical theatre, comedy, events, exhibitions and public

spaces. For Melbourne Theatre Company, his designs include: Così, A View from the Bridge, Astroman, A Doll's House Part 2, Rupert, The Cherry Orchard, The Beast and Queen Lear. Other theatre includes: When the Rain Stops Falling, Spring Awakening, I Want to Dance Better at Parties (Sydney Theatre Company); One Night the Moon, Not Like Beckett (Malthouse Theatre); My Urrwai, Angels in America, Wild Duck, Babyteeth, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?, The Pillowman (Belvoir); Much Ado About Nothing, The School for Wives (Bell Shakespeare); Sunday in the Park with George (Victorian Opera). Niklas is the winner of two Green Room Awards.

Kelly is an award-winning composer, musician and sound designer for stage and screen. Stage highlights include A View from the Bridge, Working with Children, Di and Viv and Rose, Hay Fever, Three Little Words, Double Indemnity,

Rupert, The Crucible (Melbourne Theatre Company); Triple X, Boys Will Be Boys, The Trial (with Malthouse Theatre) (Sydney Theatre Company); Hedda, Scenes from a Marriage (Queensland Theatre); Romeo and Juliet, As You Like It, Tartuffe, Macbeth, Julius Caesar (Bell Shakespeare); Edward II, The Shadow King (Malthouse Theatre); The House on the Lake, Emerald City, The Boys, The Floating World, Dreams in White (Griffin Theatre Company); Title and Deed, Nora, Hedda Gabler (Belvoir); Pomona (Red Stitch); Animal (Theatre Works); The Bacchae (Fraught Outfit). Kelly is winner of four Green Room Awards and a Melbourne International Arts Festival Award.



ANNA McCROSSIN-OWEN — VOICE & DIALECT COACH

Anna McCrossin-Owen's MTC credits include *Photograph* 51, Heisenberg, A View from the Bridge, Gloria, Rock'n'Roll, Spelling Bee and Cyrano De Bergerac. Her film credits include dialect coaching Emily Mortimer in RELIC, Helen

Mirren and cast in *Winchester*, and Margot Robbie, Chiwetel Ejiofor and Chris Pine in *Z for Zachariah*. Her TV credits include *The Crown* (Australian accent advisor), *Mr. Inbetween*, *Glitch*, *The Family Law* series 1–3, and *The Kettering Incident*. Anna teaches Spoken Voice at the Victorian College of the Arts (VCA). Studies include University of Queensland (BA), VCA (Acting) and Victorian Music Theatre (Voice); she is an Associate of Trinity College London and the Australian Music Examinations Board. She consults to business and trains video news journalists. Anna has been honoured by the Victorian Green Room Association for Outstanding Contribution to the Melbourne Stage.



ALASTAIR CLARK — ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

Alastair Clark is a theatre and opera director from Aotearoa New Zealand. *Berlin* is his Melbourne Theatre Company debut. Productions as assistant director include: *The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui* and *A Midsummer Night*'s

Dream (Sydney Theatre Company); Die Prinzessin auf der Erbse (Victorian Opera); Doctor Zhivago: The Musical (Broadway); Writing for Performance (NIDA). Productions as director include: Ironbound (Kings Cross Theatre); Rough Draft #37: Meat Eaters (Sydney Theatre Company); The Second Hurricane (Victorian Opera); Antigone (NIDA); Spring Awakening (Chapel off Chapel). Alastair has undertaken directing secondments on Le nozze di Figaro (Opera Australia) and Mother Courage and Her Children (Belvoir). He is a graduate of NIDA (MFA) and The University of Melbourne (BA). He was a member of the 2016 Almeida Resident Directors Programme.



MICHALA BANAS — INTIMACY COORDINATOR

Michala Banas is a multi-award winning actor with over 35 years professional experience as a performer on stage and screen. In early 2019, she travelled to the UK to train as an Intimacy Coordinator with Ita O'Brien, founder of Intimacy

on Set. Since completing her training, Michala has been working extensively as an intimacy coordinator. Her MTC credits include *Kiss of the Spider Woman*, *Torch the Place, Home, I'm Darling, Emerald City* and *Sexual Misconduct of the Middle Classes*. Michala has also coordinated on *Faust* (Opera Australia), *Black Ties* (Ilbijerri Theatre Company) and on screen for *Wentworth* (Foxtel), *Clickbait* (Netflix) and *The Newsreader* (ABC). The role of intimacy coordinator is still fairly new to the industry here in Australia, and is proving to be instrumental to the safe and sometimes mishandled creation of intimate content. Michala is thrilled and honoured to be working on *Berlin*, and is extremely proud that MTC has embraced the engagement of intimacy coordination so wholeheartedly.
