His home is in Perth and Katherine is his forever mother 'bonded before time itself'. But after Jamie falls in love with Zahra. an anti-racism activist who tells him about the shady history of international adoption, Jamie starts to wonder: Why is Katherine so secretive? And where exactly is his adoption file?

Chenturan Aran is a Sri Lankan Australian playwright, journalist and rapper. He has been published in The Age, All The Best Radio, and is a part of the editorial team at SAARI - a blog that platforms South Asian Australian writers. He is also a tutor at The University of Melbourne, teaching documentary film and mobile journalism. His script Pass The Damn Papadums, Katherine won the Union House Theatre Award for Best New Writing in 2020. The script was developed during a mentorship with Samah Sabawi in partnership with La Mama Theatre. In 2021, he was selected to be in the Besen Writers Group at Malthouse Theatre, which supports early career playwrights to develop their work. Chenturan is also an active member of the Melbourne underground rap scene, performing under the name Chen Be Quiet.
