Writer and Director Andrea James on why she was inspired to relive and celebrate the iconic moments from the life of the Wiradjuri tennis superstar Evonne Goolagong Cawley on stage.

There's something about a number one sportsperson that is utterly transfixing. The sheer wonderment of watching the best in the world is a sight to behold.

To tell the story of Evonne Goolagong – Wiradjuri tennis superstar – we've really had to lift our game. She has creatively challenged us as artists in the best ways possible. There's something about a crisp white sports outfit that really makes our Blakness shine.

Growing up on my father's Yorta Yorta country, I have two endearing television memories. The first is of my dad's cousin Glenn James running onto the MCG as the one and only Aboriginal football umpire of the day (there were very few First Nations footy players in the league at that time too); and the second memory is of Evonne Goolagong Cawley bursting onto our screens and back pages when she made a Wimbledon comeback in 1980.

Evonne was a joy to watch and was renowned for her grace both on and off the court. She was a breath of fresh air on a sometimes stuffy tennis circuit; as she superseded race and class barriers to become a number one tennis player.

Sunshine Super Girl is not a documentary, but rather a dramatisation for stage that relives the moments that we remember and know about. Ours is a legendary tale about a Legend and National Icon.

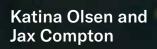
After a period of independent research and writing, the wonderful team at Performing Lines picked up the project and nurtured a series of creative developments in 2017 to 2019. Choreographer Vicki Van Hout was instrumental to this development journey; and applied her rigorous practice to develop a dance language that could emulate the flow and brilliance of a worldclass tennis player and bring physical dexterity to the storytelling.

In perfect synergy, *Sunshine Super Girl* made its world premiere at the Yarruwala Arts & Cultural

Festival on Wiradjuri Country in Griffith in October 2020 – on Evonne's traditional homelands.

Research references include *Home: the Evonne Goolagong Story* by Evonne Goolagong Cawley and Phil Jarratt, *The Inner Game of Tennis* by W. Timothy Gallwey as well as archival materials from the Australian Film & Television Archive, The Wimbledon Tennis Library and Evonne and Roger's own personal anecdotes.



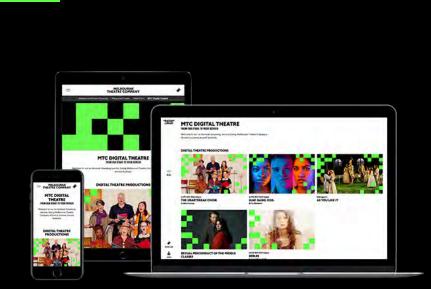

Kirk Page is a proud Munanjali man of the Yugembeh nation QLD with ancestral lineage connecting to Badu Island in the Torres Strait Islands and a Polish German mix of migrant settler heritage. He trained at the National Aboriginal and Islander Skills

Development Association (NAISDA). His practice as an artist centres Indigenous voices always. Credits include *The Demon* (Stalker Theatre Company); *Wudjang Not the Past* (Bangarra Dance Theatre); *Dreamland* (NORPA); *Harp in the South, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Stolen and Black Diggers* (Sydney Theatre Company); *Snugglepot & Cuddlepie* (CDP); *Silent Disco* (Griffin Theatre Company); *The Dreamers* and *Conversations with the Dead* (Belvoir Street Theatre); *My Girragundji* (Bell Shakespeare); *Australia the Show* (Hothouse Theatre); *Death in Bowengabbie* (Merrigong Theatre Company); *My Lovers Bones* (Brown Cab Productions). TV credits include Season 2 of *Redfern*, for which Kirk received a Logie nomination for most outstanding actor, and Series 2 of *Mystery Road*.



## **ANDREA JAMES** DIRECTOR & WRITER

Andrea James is a Yorta Yorta/Gunnaikurnai theatre maker and VCA graduate. She is a NEXT STAGE playwright at Melbourne Theatre Company and is writing *The Black Woman of Gippsland* set on her Grandmother's country. Andrea wrote and directed

*Winyanboga Yurringa* (Carriageworks 2016, Geelong Performing Arts Centre 2016, Belvoir 2019). For Griffin Theatre Company, her play *Dogged* written with Catherine Ryan premiered in 2021 where she also directed *Ghosting the Party* by Melissa Bubnic in 2022. Ahead of its national tour, *Sunshine Super Girl* played at Griffith Regional Theatre in 2020 and Sydney Festival in 2021. Andrea was Artistic Director of Melbourne Workers Theatre 2001–2008, Aboriginal Arts Development Officer at Blacktown Arts Centre 2010–2012, Aboriginal Producer at Carriageworks from 2012–2016, and is currently an Artistic Associate at Griffin Theatre Company. She was a participant of the British Council's Accelerate Program for Aboriginal Art Leaders 2013 and was recently awarded the Mona Brand Award for Women Writers.



# **VICKI VAN HOUT** ORIGINAL CHOREOGRAPHIC CONCEPT & INITIAL MOVEMENT DIRECTION

Vicki Van Hout is a Wiradjuri woman born on the south coast of NSW. An independent choreographer, performance-maker and teacher, Vicki has toured nationally and internationally, most recently with her

critically acclaimed solo show *plenty serious TALK TALK*. A graduate of NAISDA and the Martha Graham School of Contemporary Dance in New York, Vicki was awarded the 2014 NSW Dance Fellowship – the first Indigenous winner of the Fellowship – and the 2019 Australia Council Award for Dance.

Ben has also lit multiple award shows including APRA Screen Music Awards and Australian International Design Awards.



# **GAIL PRIEST** COMPOSITION & SOUND DESIGN

Gail Priest is a sound artist, curator and writer living on the land of the Darug and Gundungurra people (Katoomba, NSW). Originally trained in theatre, she has worked as a sound designer/composer for performance for over 25 years primarily collaborating

with independent directors and choreographers. Recent shows include Sunshine Super Girl (Andrea James, Performing Lines); Grace Under Pressure (Alternative Facts); Playlist (Powerhouse Youth Theatre); and Obscene Madame D (Kantanka). She also creates her own performances including A continuous self-vibrating region of intensities (Performance Space and The Substation) and installations such as SonoLexic (Experimenta) and Sounding the Future (UTS Gallery). She has performed live experimental music and exhibited immersive sound installations nationally and internationally and has several CD releases on her own label, Metal Bitch, as well as other labels including Flaming Pines. She is also a curator of concerts and exhibitions and writes factually and fictively about sound and media arts.



## MIC GRUCHY VIDEO MEDIA DESIGN

Mic Gruchy works across stage, screen and video art. He is a pioneer of video design for theatre, designing shows for all the major companies and festivals around Australia for more than 30 years. He has produced projections on the Sydney Opera House

and video designs for theatre, opera and dance around Australia, in London's West End, across Europe and Asia. His shows have won Helpmann Awards and he was awarded an Australia Council Established Artist's Fellowship for Interdisciplinary Practice in 2012. He has edited feature films, TV shows, documentaries and his video artworks are in collections and museums around the world. Commissioned works include installations for the Sydney Opera House, Sydney Olympic Park and the Biennale of Sydney. Recent video designs include *The Crowd And I* (Australian Chamber Orchestra); *Bunngul* the Gurrumul Orchestral concert (Perth and Darwin Festivals) and *Love for One Night* (Northern Rivers Performing Arts).

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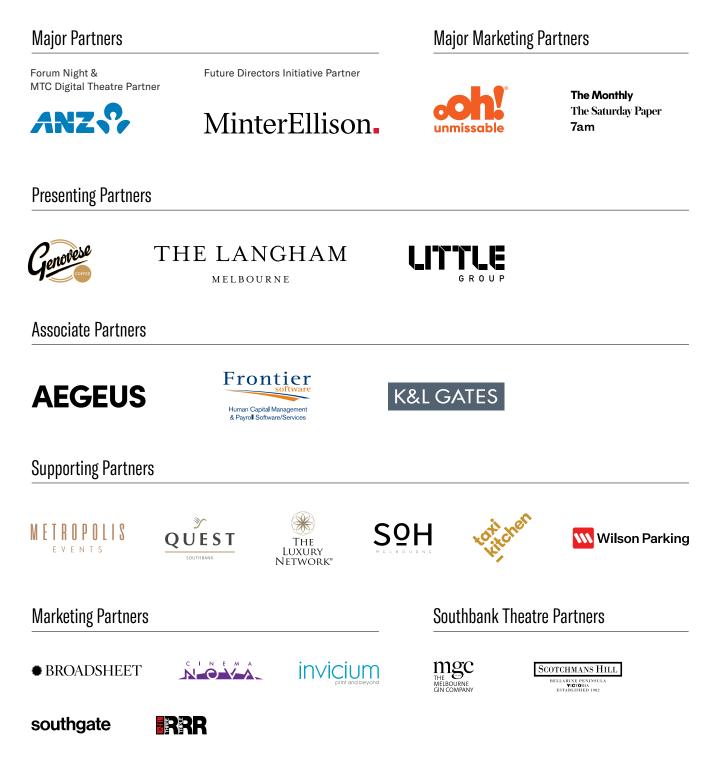
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
