LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: FY 2022 Regular Appropriations

- 9 of 12 Regular Appropriations bills have passed in the House, with 0 of 12 passed in the Senate.
- The House Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies passed a bill closely aligning with the President's FY 2022 top-line Request for Indian Affairs programs.
- Each year, <u>Appropriations</u> Committee Reports outline funding decisions and requests from Appropriators in Congress to Executive Branch agencies.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: FY 2022 Regular Appropriations

- Since no FY 2022 Regular Appropriations bills are enacted, Congress is working to Pass a Continuing Resolution (CR).
- On September 21, 2021, the House passed a CR funding the government through December 3, 2021, and suspending the debt ceiling through December 16, 2021.
- Republicans in the Senate have expressed that they will not vote to suspend the debt ceiling in a CR, introducing their own stopgap funding measure.

- On August 10, 2021, the Senate passed a \$1.2 trillion infrastructure package that includes key spending provisions related to transportation, water infrastructure, energy, climate resiliency, tax, and a five-year surface transportation authorization.
- House leadership offered to hold a vote on the bill by September 27, 2021, but the need for a CR could substantially affect those plans.
- Democratic leadership is meeting today to discuss the Infrastructure bill, Budget Reconciliation spending, a CR, and the debt limit. More clarity on the procedural path forward is expected Friday, September 23, 2021.

 On August 23, 2021, the House adopted the Senate's <u>Budget</u> <u>Resolution</u>, which includes \$3.5 trillion in budget reconciliation instructions.

 Budget Reconciliation bill text has been produced by all 13 House Committees, but differences remain between Congressional chambers.

 House Democratic leadership has signaled to be prepared for adjustments and an agreed-to top line spending number.

- House Budget Reconciliation provisions for Interior currently include:
 - \$2.7 billion for overdue Indian water rights settlements
 - \$1 billion for Tribal climate resilience and adaptation programs
 - \$500 million to improve Tribal housing
 - \$500 million for a Tribal Civilian Climate Corps
 - \$369.8 million for BIE construction, repair, improvement, and maintenance
 - \$300 million for BIA Road Maintenance and to address deferred maintenance backlog
 - \$200 million for BIA Public Safety and Justice Construction
 - \$150 million for near-term drought relief
 - \$100 million for Tribal Wildfire Prevention
 - \$41.1 million for BIE digital infrastructure
 - \$35 million for Tribal energy programs
 - \$30 million for conducting consultation with tribal governments

- Budget Reconciliation Next Steps:
 - Today's meeting between Democratic leadership is critical in shaping the timeline, any changes, and procedural next steps.
 - If the House makes changes that satisfy both chambers, then a rapid vote on Budget Reconciliation spending could occur in early October.
 - Otherwise, the Senate could propose changes and send the bill back to the House.
 - Progressive Democrats have been pushing for the Budget Reconciliation bill to move along with the Infrastructure bill.
 - However, House Majority leadership indicated that moving the reconciliation bill next week is not likely to occur.

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
