Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act) to provide federally recognized Indian tribal governments (Tribal Nations) the pathway to request a Presidential emergency or major disaster declaration. After consulting with Tribal Nations FEMA released the 2017 Tribal Declarations Pilot Guidance which serves as a resource for Tribal Nations on Stafford Act declarations, disaster assistance, and related requirements. The Guidance also includes the criteria that FEMA uses to evaluate declaration requests from Tribal Nations and make recommendations to the President regarding whether to declare an emergency or major disaster. FEMA invites Tribal Nations to attend the first in a series of tribal consultations and listening sessions on the Tribal Declarations Guidance on Thursday, February 23, 2023. The purpose of this listening session is to gather Tribal Nations' feedback on how to best improve the Presidential disaster declaration process to ensure that Tribal Nations are able to access FEMA resources during and after disasters in Indian Country.
