FIRST AND 10

- The Chicago Bears (0-1) and Cincinnati Bengals will kick off Week 1 of the NFL preseason when they meet inside Paul Brown Stadium on Thursday, Aug. 9, at 6 p.m. CT in Cincinnati, Ohio.
- Chicago and Cincinnati have met on nine preseason occasions leading into Thursday's matchup.
- The Bengals hold a 6-3 advantage in preseason meetings with the Bears, including a 4-0 mark when playing in Cincinnati.
- The Bears opened the preseason portion of their schedule against the Baltimore Ravens in the annual Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio Aug. 2. Chicago fell to Baltimore, 17-16.
- Former Chicago linebacker Brian Urlacher was honored throughout the week, becoming the first Bear to be enshrined since 2011 and the 28th overall in franchise history - the most of any team.
- Chicago defeated the Bengals, 33-7, last season in Week 14 at Cincinnati. QB Mitchell Trubisky played his best game as a pro, completing 25 of 32 passes for 271 yards and one touchdown with zero turnovers and a 112.4 passer rating. He also rushed for a TD.
- The Bears rushed for 232 yards in the win as Jordan Howard recorded 147 yards and two TDs on 23 carries.
- The Bears are led by first-year Head Coach Matt Nagy, who joins Chicago after being named the 16th head coach in franchise history on January 8th, 2018.
- Also joining the staff is first-year offensive coordinator Mark Helfrich, who served as head coach at the University of Oregon from 2013-16 where he compiled a 37-16 record during his four years.
- New to Chicago are several offensive weapons acquired via free agency, including WR Allen Robinson (JAX), WR Taylor Gabriel (ATL) and TE Trey Burton (PHI), to name a few.

SETTING THE STAGE

The Chicago Bears (0-1) travel to Cincinnati this week for their second road matchup of the preseason when they face the Cincinnati Bengals (0-0) at 6 p.m. CT on Thursday, Aug. 9, inside Paul Brown Stadium. Thursday's contest will be televised on Fox 32 with Adam Amin (play-by-play) and Jim Miller (analyst) on the call.

Leading the Bears in his first season with the club is head coach Matt Nagy, who was named Chicago's 16th head coach in franchise history on January 8th, 2018. Nagy owns 10 seasons of NFL coaching experience, all under head coach Andy Reid with the Philadelphia Eagles and Kansas City Chiefs.

The Bears enter this week's competition with an 0-1 preseason record following a 17-16 loss to the Baltimore Ravens inside Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in Canton, Ohio. As part of the Hall of Fame Weekend festivities, Chicago's Brian Urlacher was honored as the Bears' 28th inductee, which marks the most by any NFL team.

Most recently in 2017, the Bears finished the regular season 5-11 while showing signs of progress in the franchise's goal to build a roster with a younger core group of players.

Quarterback Mitchell Trubisky earned 12 starts, completing 196-of-330 passes for 2,193 yards and seven TDs. Trubisky's completions and passing yards each marked Bears rookie records.

Jordan Howard led the ground attack, becoming the first running back in Bears history to start a career with back-to-back 1,000+ yard rushing seasons after totaling 1,122 yards in 2017 and 1,313 in 2016.

With a solid foundation built, the 2018 Bears enter the preseason with 16 returning starters from a season ago: seven offense, nine defense (min. 8 starts). Returning members from the 2017 roster will be joined by several offseason acquisitions, including wide receivers Allen Robinson (JAX) Taylor Gabriel (ATL) and Bennie Fowler (DEN), tight end Trey Burton (PHI), kicker Cody Parkey (MIA) and offensive lineman Earl Watford (ARI), to name a few.

Welcoming Chicago to Cincinnati for the second consecutive year are the Cincinnati Bengals. Led by 17th-year head coach Marvin Lewis, the Bengals are coming off 7-9 campaign in 2017 and will be appearing in their first preseason contest of the 2018 season.

The Bengals enter the 2018 preseason with 15 returning starters from a season ago (6 offense, 9 defense). Led by QB Andy Dalton, the Cincinnati offense returns its top receiver from 2017 in A.J. Green (1,078 yards, 8 TDs), in addition to the club's leading rushers in Joe Mixon (626 yards) and Giovani Bernard (458 yards).

Defensively, the Bengals ranked among the NFL's Top 10 teams in fewest yards per play (4.97, 6th), net passing yards allowed (211.2, 8th) and red zone scoring (46.4%, 6th). Adding pressure to opposing quarterbacks are three of the AFC's elite pass-rushers from 2017 in Geno Atkins (9.0 sacks), Carl Lawson (8.5 sacks) and Carlos Dunlap (7.5 sacks). Additionally, Cincinnati's leading tackler from a season ago, Vincent Rey (84 takedowns), returns for his ninth season with the Bengals after joining the team in 2010 as an undrafted free agent.

With most of their key players watching from the sideline, it will be difficult if not impossible for the Bears to draw any meaningful conclusions from last Thursday night's preseason-opening Hall of Fame Game.

But there were certainly several positives in a 17-16 loss to the Baltimore Ravens at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium, especially for a team that's determined to generate more touchdowns and takeaways this season.

The Bears produced one of each early as safety DeAndre Houston-Carson's interception set up Chase Daniel's 4-yard TD pass to fullback Michael Burton.

In addition to the takeaway, the defense also recorded five sacks in the first half alone, one each by young pass rushers Isaiah Irving, Roy Robertson-Harris, Jonathan Bullard, Kylie Fitts and Nick Williams. The unit added three more sacks in the second half.

Another bright spot was the performance of rookie seventh-round receiver Javon Wims, who caught seven passes for 89 yards, all in the second half.

On the negative side, the Bears committed four turnovers in the game and mustered just 91 yards and six first downs in the first half.

Burton's touchdown, which gave the Bears a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter, came after Houston-Carson picked off a Robert Griffin III pass after it had been deflected twice, first by Ravens receiver Breshad Perriman and then by Bears cornerback Michael Joseph.

Houston-Carson's interception came after Daniel had been picked off by safety Chuck Clark on the game's first possession.

The Ravens tied the score 7-7 on Griffin's 5-yard touchdown pass to tight end Maxx Williams, who beat linebacker John Timu with 4:00 left in the first quarter.

On the Bears' next play from scrimmage, Daniel's pass over the middle was intercepted by linebacker Kamalei Correa, who returned it 15 yards to the Chicago 9.

Irving sacked Griffin on third-and-goal from the 5, forcing the Ravens to settle for Kaare Vedvik's 31-yard field goal, which gave Baltimore a 10-7 lead late in the opening period.

Playing the first half, Daniel completed 8 of 16 passes for 53 yards with one touchdown, two interceptions and a 38.8 passer rating. In the second half, Tyler Bray connected in 18 of 34 passes for 181 yards with 1 TD and a 78.2 passer rating.

The Bears committed their third turnover of the game early in the third quarter when safety DeShon Elliott stripped receiver Demarcus Ayers after a 6-yard reception from Bray and defensive end Bronson Kaufusi recovered the fumble at the Chicago 36.

Baltimore converted the takeaway into Lamar Jackson's 7-yard touchdown pass to Hayden Hurst, widening the margin to 17-7 with 9:09 left in the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 22-yard field goal drew the Bears to within 17-10 with 13:24 remaining in the fourth quarter, capping an eight-play, 48-yard drive.

The Bears drew to within 17-16 on Bray's 10-yard touchdown pass to Tanner Gentry with 2:44 left in the fourth quarter. But Bray's pass on the subsequent two-point conversion attempt fell incomplete, enabling the Ravens to escape with a one-point victory.

TRUBISKY SET TO ENTER SECOND SEASON

- Quarterback Mitchell Trubisky went 4-8 in his 12 starts as a rookie in 2017. He set Bears rookie records with 2,193 passing yards and 196 completions and also rushed for 248 yards and two touchdowns. He averaged 182.8 passing yards per game while completing 59.4 percent of his throws.
- Over his final five games Trubisky completed more than 67 percent of his passes, which was fifth-best in the NFL.
- Trubisky enjoyed one of his most efficient games in Week 14 at Cincinnati, throwing for 271 yards on 25-of-32 passing with 1 TD. He also rushed for a TD to become the first Bears rookie quarterback since Jim McMahon in 1982 with a passing touchdown and a rushing touchdown in the same game.
- The very next week, Trubisky completed 31-of-46 passes for 314 yards in Week 15 at Detroit -- all single-game Bears rookie records.

- Trubisky made his NFL debut on Monday Night Football against Minnesota Oct. 9 to become the third rookie quarterback selected in the first round to make his first NFL start in addition to his debut on Monday Night Football, joining Detroit's Chuck Long (December 15, 1986 vs. Chicago) and Philadelphia's John Reaves (October 2, 1972 vs. New York Giants).
- Trubisky became just the second quarterback since 1960 from the University of North Carolina to make a regular-season start in the NFL. Former Texans QB T.J. Yates made seven starts during his four seasons with the club (2011-13, 2015).
- In 12 games, Trubisky limited defenses to just seven interceptions, which ranked tied-third among NFL quarterbacks with at least 300+ passing attempts. On third down, Trubisky threw just one interception on 99 attempts, which ranked him third in the NFL with a 1.0 INT rate on 3rd downs.

- In the overtime win at Baltimore in Week 6, Trubisky became just the second rookie QB to win a game in Baltimore since the franchise moved from Cleveland to Baltimore in 1996. Prior to that,

Baltimore was 14-1 when facing rookie QBs at home and 11-0 under head coach John Harbaugh. Trubisky joins Jake Plummer as the only other rookie quarterback to win a game on the road at Baltimore after Plummer did so in 1997.

HOWARD LOOKS TO BUILD ON HISTORIC SOPHOMORE SEASON

- Running Back Jordan Howard finished third in the NFC with 1,122 rushing yards to go along with 9 TDs last season.
- Howard, who rushed for 1,313 yards as a rookie in 2016, finished with 1,122 rushing yards in 2017 and is the first player in franchise history to rush for 1,000 yards in each of his first two NFL seasons.

- Howard surpassed former Chicago running back Matt Forte (2008-15) for the most yards in their first two seasons with the club in Week 13 vs. San Francisco. Forte had the previous mark with 2,167 yards in his first two seasons from 2008-09.

- Howard also became the fastest player in Bears history to rush for 2,000 yards in a Bears uniform (24 games), besting Walter Payton's previous mark of 26 games.
- Howard ranks tied for first among all NFL players with 12 100-yard rushing games by a running back during the regular season since the start of 2016. Entering the league as a 5th-round selection in the 2016 NFL Draft, Howard is the only player among the Top 5 who were selected in the fifth round or later.

- Howard's career-high 167 yards rushing at Baltimore Oct. 15 were the second-most allowed by the Ravens by an individual at M&T Bank Stadium (Marshall Faulk had 192 in 1998). Howard also carried the ball a career-high 36 times in the win and recorded a 53-yard run in overtime to set up the winning field goal.

- Howard's 147 rushing yards at Cincinnati in Week 14 marked his second-highest of the season and his third game with at least 140 yards. It also marked his sixth of the season (140 vs. PIT; 167 at BAL; 102 at NO; 125 vs. DET; 147 at CIN) and the 12th 100-yard rushing game of his career.

- Howard dominated AFC North opponents in 2017, rushing for 498 yards on 104 attempts with six touchdowns in four wins over the Steelers, Ravens, Bengals and Browns.

COHEN ENTERS YEAR 2 IN THE BACKFIELD

- Rookie running back Tarik Cohen caught 53 passes in 2017, the third most by a Bears rookie. Matt Forte caught 63 in 2008 and Mike Ditka 56 in 1961.

- Cohen finished tied for third in the NFL among rookie RBs with 53 receptions, tied with Kansas City's Kareem Hunt and trailing only New Orleans' Alvin Kamara (81) and Carolina's Christian McCaffrey (80).

- Cohen was second on the team with his 53 receptions and third with 353 yards. He also was second on the team in rushing with 87 carries for 370 yards and two TDs.

- Cohen rushed for a season-high 80 yards on 12 carries (6.7 avg) in the Week 14 win at Cincinnati and also caught two passes for five yards.

- Cohen became the first NFL rookie since Gale Sayers in 1965 and the first NFL player since Terry Metcalf in 1975 to score touchdowns via rushing, receiving, passing and punt return in a single season.

- Cohen hauled in a 70-yard second-quarter reception in Week 7 vs. Carolina, the longest reception by a Bear in 2017. It was the longest reception by a Bears running back since Jeremy Langford recorded an 83-yarder at St. Louis on Nov. 15, 2015. Additionally, the 70-yard reception was the third-longest by a Bears RB since 1960, trailing only

Matt Forte's 89-yarder versus Detroit (9/12/10) and Jeremy Langford's 83-yarder at St. Louis.

- Cohen threw a 21-yard touchdown pass to tight end Zach Miller in the win at Baltimore, becoming the first Bears rookie running back to throw a touchdown pass since Gale Sayers on October 10, 1965 (26 yards to Dick Gordon). He also became the first player 5'6" or shorter to throw a touchdown pass since Wee Willie Smith did so in 1934 for the New York Giants. Wee Willie Smith also stood at 5'6" tall. Additionally, Cohen became the 10th Chicago running back since 1960 to throw a touchdown pass and the first since Adrian Peterson did so on Dec. 30, 2007 versus New Orleans.

- Cohen impressed in his rookie debut vs. the Falcons Sept. 10, totaling 158 all-purpose yards, the most ever by a Bears rookie in a season debut. The previous record was 148 yards, set by Bob Margaita against the Green Bay Packers in 1944. Cohen rushed for a team-high 66 yards on five carries (13.2 avg) and also led the team with eight catches for 47 yards, including a 19-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter. The rookie from North Carolina A&T also had three punt returns for 45 yards.

- Cohen teamed up with Howard as the Bears rushed for 222 yards (Howard 140, Cohen 78) in the OT victory over the Steelers in Week 3, marking just the fourth time in Mike Tomlin's 11 years in Pittsburgh in which the Steelers allowed 200+ yards rushing.

- Howard and Cohen combined for 200+ yards on the ground twice in 2017: in Week 3 vs. Pittsburgh and Week 14 vs. Cincinnati. Prior to this past season, that had not been done by a Bears duo since 2010 when Matt Forte (166) and Chester Taylor (43) combined for 209 yards on the ground.

SHAHEEN LOOKING TO BUILD ON ROOKIE SEASON

- Rookie tight end Adam Shaheen led the team with three TD receptions in 2017 and finished with 12 catches for 127 yards in 12 games.

- Shaheen scored the first TD of his NFL career in the win over the Steelers in Week 3, a 2-yard strike from Mike Glennon in the second quarter (:47 seconds) to put the Bears up 14-7. The last Bears rookie tight end to score a touchdown was Greg Olson in 2007 (10/7/07 vs. GB). Shaheen then added a second touchdown in Week 11 on a 1-yard pass from Trubisky against the Lions and added his third in Week 14 vs. Cincinnati.



ENTIRE SECONDARY RETURNS FROM 2017

- Chicago enters the 2018 season with the entire starting secondary with defensive backs Prince Amukamara, Kyle Fuller, Marcus Cooper, Bryce Callahan, Cre'Von LeBlanc along with safeties Adrian Amos and Eddie Jackson. Collectively, the group had 65 total starts in 2017. Quintin Demps and Chris Prosinski, the only two non-returners with starts, each tallied three starts apiece.

EDDIE JACKSON ENTERING YEAR TWO

- Bears rookie DB Eddie Jackson started all 16 games as a rookie in 2017, logging 53 tackles, six passes defended, three fumble recoveries, two interceptions and one touchdown.

- Jackson picked off Bengals quarterback Andy Dalton in Week 14, his second of the season, and snapped Andy Dalton's streak of 192 pass attempts without an interception. Later in the fourth, Jackson again caused a turnover when he forced an A.J. Green fumble and recovered it at the Chicago 20 (13:37).

- Jackson returned a 75-yard fumble recovery for a TD in the first quarter (9:15) vs. Carolina in Week 7. It was the longest fumble recovery for a score by a Bears rookie. Later in the second quarter, Jackson picked off Panthers quarterback Cam Newton and returned the interception 76 yards for his second score on the day. In doing so, Jackson became the first player in NFL history to return both a fumble recovery and an interception for 75+ yard touchdowns in the same game.

- Additionally, Jackson also became the first rookie in NFL history with multiple 75+ yard defensive touchdowns in a single season and is the first player to return both a fumble and interception for a touchdown in the same game since Antonio Cromartie (SD) did so at Minnesota in Week 8 of the 2007 season.

- Ironically, Jackson did all of the above exactly one year ago to the date (Oct. 22) when he was carted off the field as a collegiate standout at Alabama on Oct. 22, 2016 with a broken leg after being tackled returning a fourth-quarter punt vs. Texas A&M.

- Jackson's 75-yard fumble recovery was the third-longest fumble recovery by a Bear since 1960, trailing only Mike Brown's 95-yard return in 2004 (Sept. 19 at GB) and Brian Urlacher's 90-yard return in 2001 (Oct. 7 at ATL).

- Jackson became the first Bears rookie since 1990 (Mark Carrier), the first NFL rookie since 2009 (Jairus Byrd) and the first Bears player since 2012 (Tim Jennings) to record at least two games with two turnovers in a season.

HICKS POSTS CAREER NUMBERS IN 2017

- Defensive lineman Akiem Hicks started all 16 games for the second consecutive season in Chicago and tallied 54 total tackles.

- Hicks wrapped up 39 solo tackles in 2017, topping his previous career-best (36) from 2016.

- Hicks had a career-high 8.5 sacks for -57 yards in 2017, topping his 7.0 sacks he had in 2016. He now has 15.5 sacks over his past two seasons in a Bears uniform.

- Hicks' 20 quarterback hurries in 2017 also marked a career-high, besting the 17 QBHs he tallied in 2016.

FULLER AMONG ELITE COMPANY IN 2017

- Defensive Back Kyle Fuller had 68 total tackles, two interceptions and 22 passes defended on the season. He was one of only two players in the NFL with at least 65+ tackles and 20+ passes defended.

- Fuller recorded one interception, one tackle and a career-high six passes defended in a 20-3 win over the Cleveland Browns in Week 16. The six passes defended were the most by any player in the NFL in 2017 (single game) and raised his season total to 22, which ranked tied for second among Bears defenders since 1991 and also is the most in a game by a Bears player since 1994.

AMOS COMING INTO YEAR 4 IN CHICAGO

- Chicago defensive back Adrian Amos logged his first career interception in the overtime win at Baltimore (his hometown), picking off quarterback Joe Flacco with 5:29 left in the fourth quarter and returning it 90 yards for a touchdown. The 90-yard return marked the fourth-longest interception for a touchdown by a Chicago Bear since 1960, trailing only Richie Petitbon (1962, 101 yds), Rosey Taylor (1968, 96 yds) and Todd Bell (1981, 92 yds). Amos is the first Bear to return an interception for a touchdown since defensive back Cre'Von LeBlanc did so on a 24-yard return at Detroit on Dec. 11, 2016.

O'DONNELL AMONG NFC'S TOP PUNTERS

- Punter Pat O'Donnell finished tied for fourth in the NFC in punting with a 47.0 average. O'Donnell's long punt of the season was a 69-yarder in the opener against the Falcons, tied for the third-longest punt in the NFC last season. He had 27 punts inside the 20.

- O'Donnell converted a 38-yard touchdown pass to running back Benny Cunningham on a 4th-and-6 with 5:33 to go in the third quarter Oct. 9 vs. the Vikings. O'Donnell became just the third punter since 1960 to throw a TD pass for the Bears. Brad Maynard completed a TD pass, a 12-yard comple-



tion to Dustin Lyman on Dec. 1, 2002 at Green Bay and his first coming on a 27-yarder to Brian Urlacher on Dec. 23, 2001 at Washington. Additionally, Mike Horan completed the first TD pass for the Bears since 1960, an 18-yard TD pass to Ryan Wetnight in 1998 versus Washington.

LOOKING BACK ON 2017

- Chicago defeated two Division champions this season in Pittsburgh and Carolina and suffered six losses by one possession scores.
- Chicago had two overtime wins in 2017. The last time the Bears recorded two overtime victories in the same season was in 2008 when Chicago defeated New Orleans, 27-24, and Green Bay, 20-17, in back-to-back weeks (weeks 15 & 16).
- This season the Bears became the first NFL team since the 1925 Bears to play each of their first 11 games against teams that entered the game with a .500 record or better.
- The Bears swept the AFC North last season with road wins over the Steelers (23-17 ot), Ravens (27-24 ot) and Bengals (33-7) and vs. the Browns (20-3).
- In the 33-7 win at Cincinnati in Week 14, the Bears totaled a season-high 482 total yards and 29 first downs. The 33 points were the most by a Bears team since Nov. 15, 2015 at the St. Louis Rams (33-13) and the 26-point differential was the largest since a 51-20 win at Tennessee in 2012. Chicago possessed the ball for 38:09, its longest of the season and the second-highest TOP since 2012.
- Bears rookies accounted for 55 percent of Chicago's touchdowns this season (17 of 31), the highest percentage since 1982 and the most total TDs by Bears rookies since 1965.

- The Bears ranked eighth in the NFC with 111.8 rushing yards per game. Chicago rushed for 232 yards in the Week 14 win at Cincinnati, marking the fourth time this season the Bears have topped 200 yards on the ground -- the most 200-yard games in a season since the Bears topped 200 four times in 1990.
- Ten (10) teams in the NFL rushed for 220+ yards on 13 separate occasions in 2017. The Chicago Bears accounted for four of those outings and were the only team with multiple 220+ rushing performances (232 at Cincinnati; 231 at Baltimore; 222 vs. Pittsburgh; 222 vs. Detroit). The Bills, Giants, Panthers, Saints, Cowboys, Jets, Jaguars, Rams and Redskins all did it once in 2017.
- The 231 yards rushing by the Bears in the OT win at Baltimore were the most allowed by a Ravens opponent in their franchise history. The 54 rushing attempts by the Bears at Baltimore were the most since 1988 when the Bears also rushed 54 times in a Week 1 victory vs. Miami.
- Chicago's defense allowed just 15 offensive touchdowns over the past 45 quarters of play (dating to the fourth quarter of the Oct. 9 game vs. Minnesota). The Bears had five games this season allowing one or fewer offensive TDs (at Ravens 0 TDs; Panthers 0; 49ers 0; Bengals 1; Browns 0).
- From Week 4-17, Chicago's defense allowed just 17 offensive TDs, tied for the second-fewest in the NFL.

- The Bears finished the regular season tied for third in the NFC and tied for seventh in the NFL with 42 sacks on the year.
- The Chicago defense limited Carolina's offense to just three points in Week 7. It was the fourth time since 2010 the Panthers have been held to three or less points and just the second time under head coach Ron Rivera and quarterback Cam Newton's direction (3 points vs. TEN on Nov. 13, 2011).

Delivering their most complete performance of the season, the Bears dominated on both sides of the ball in a 33-7 rout of the Bengals.

The Bears (4-9) held decisive advantages over the Bengals (5-8) in total yards (482-234), first downs (29-14) and time of possession (38:09-21:51) in recording their most lopsided win since a 51-20 victory over the Titans Nov. 4, 2012 in Tennessee.

QB Mitchell Trubisky played his best game as a pro in his home state, completing 25 of 32 passes for 271 yards with one touchdown, no turnovers and a 112.4 passer rating. He also scored his first NFL TD on a 4-yard run on a read-option play.

Jordan Howard rushed for 147 yards and two touchdowns on 23 carries, while Tarik Cohen added 80 yards on 12 attempts. Kendall Wright caught 10 passes for 147 yards and rookie Adam Shaheen had four receptions for 44 yards and one TD.

The injury-depleted Bears defense allowed the Bengals to advance inside the Chicago 25 on only one of 11 possessions. The unit was led by rookie safety Eddie Jackson, who recorded an interception and a second takeaway when he forced and recovered an A.J. Green fumble.

Among the defenders the Bears played without were Pernell McPhee, Leonard Floyd, Eddie Goldman, Willie Young, Mitch Unrein, Jerrell Freeman, Adrian Amos and Quintin Demps.

The Bears scored a touchdown on their first possession of a game for the first time this season, taking a 6-0 lead on Howard's 21-yard run.

Mike Nugent missed the subsequent extra point attempt, hitting the right upright.

The Bengals took a 7-6 lead on Andy Dalton's 14-yard touchdown pass to Brandon LaFell with 2:15 left in the first quarter. The veteran receiver beat safety Deon Bush on a corner route.

The Bears followed by scoring the game's final 27 points, taking a 12-7 halftime lead on Nugent field goals of 34 and 27 yards.

Trubisky, who completed 17 of 23 passes for 170 yards in the first half, opened the second half with a 4-yard TD run, giving the Bears a 19-7 lead. The rookie quarterback connected on 4-of-4 passes for 57 yards on the nine-play, 57-yard drive.

Jackson then generated the game's only two takeaways on back-to-back possessions. First, the fourth-round pick intercepted a Dalton pass that deflected off Green. Jackson then ripped the ball out of Green's hands after a reception along the sideline and recovered the fumble.

The Bears converted both turnovers into fourth-quarter touchdowns on Trubisky's 1-yard pass to Shaheen and Howard's 8-yard run.

**RYAN PACE** GENERAL MANAGER

Ryan Pace is in his fourth season as general manager of the Chicago Bears. He is the sixth general manager in franchise history after being hired on January 8, 2015. The Bears announced a three-year contract extension for Pace on January 1, 2018, keeping him with the club through 2021.

Following the 2017 season, Pace decided to take the team in a different direction and sought to find the right head coach to lead the Bears into the future. On January 8, 2018, Pace announced Matt Nagy as the Bears 16th head coach in franchise history.

With Nagy in place, Pace used all avenues available to help bolster a young roster. Pace and the Bears made a splash on the first day of free agency, signing wide receivers Allen Robinson II and Taylor Gabriel, tight end Trey Burton and kicker Cody Parkey. Pace also awarded Sam Acho, Prince Amukamara and Kyle Fuller with multi-year extensions for their performances on the field in 2017. In the 2018 NFL Draft, Pace selected linebackers Roquan Smith (round 1, 8th overall), Joel Lyeigbuniwe (round 4, 115th overall) and Kylie Fitts (round 6, 181st overall), offensive lineman James Daniels (round 2, 39th overall), wide receivers Anthony Miller (round 2, 51st overall) and Javon Wims (round 7, 224th overall) and defensive lineman Bilal Nichols (round 5, 145th overall).

In 2017, Pace continued his track record of drafting rookies who make an immediate impact on the team. QB Mitchell Trubisky (No. 2 overall) set Bears rookie records for passing yards (2,193) and completions (196). He also rushed for 248 yards and two touchdowns and averaged 182.8 passing yards per game while completing 59.4 percent of his throws. RB Tarik Cohen became the first NFL rookie since Gale Sayers (1965) to score touchdowns via rushing, receiving, passing and punt return in a single season. He also tallied the third most receptions (53) by a Bears rookie in club history. DB Eddie Jackson finished the season with two interceptions and became the first player in NFL history to return both a fumble recovery and an interception for 75+ yard touchdowns in a single game (vs. CAR, 10/22/17). TE Adam Shaheen led the Bears in receiving touchdowns in 2017 with three.

After a stellar rookie season in 2016, RB Jordan Howard continued to have success on the ground, becoming the first player in franchise history to rush for over 1,000 yards in each of his first two NFL seasons (1,313 in 2016 & 1,122 in 2017) and also became the fastest player in Bears history to rush for 2,000 yards (24 games), besting Walter Payton's previous mark of 26.

Defensive lineman Akiem Hicks, a key 2016 free agent acquisition, earned a four-year contract extension in September 2017 after tallying a then career-high 7.0 sacks in 2016. Hicks topped that mark in 2017 posting 8.5 sacks.

In 2016, Chicago's draft class tallied 3,390 offensive/defensive snaps, which ranked fourth in the NFL (CLE - 4,339; TEN - 3,512; IND - 3,509). Leading the way for the rookie class was Howard, who set a new Bears rookie record with 1,313 yards on the ground, and LB Leonard Floyd, who posted the third most sacks by a rookie in team history (7.0) despite missing four games due to injury.

In Pace's first two seasons as Bears GM, five Bears were selected to the PFWA's All-Rookie team (Adrian Amos, Floyd, Eddie Goldman, Cody Whitehair and Howard), tied for the most in the NFL in that time frame.

In his first season overseeing Chicago's roster, Pace was tasked with turning over a roster that ranked as one of the oldest in the NFL (average 27 years, 39 days old). He trimmed that average to just over 25-years old in two seasons. The Bears fielded a competitive team, improving by one game over their previous year's record, despite the youth movement. The 2015 Bears were involved in 11 games decided by one score (5-6 record in those games) despite leading the NFL with nine rookie starters (three on offense, six on defense). The Bears defense improved from 30th in 2014 (377.1 yards per game) to 14th in 2015 (345.1 ypg) despite starting a league-most six rookie starters who combined for 41 starts, second most to the Saints 44 defensive rookie starts. Pace accomplished the task with just six draft picks, two of which were utilized on the defensive side of the ball (Goldman, 12 starts and Amos, 16 starts).

Pace joined the Bears after spending 14 seasons (2001-14) as a member of the Saints organization, including 13 in the player personnel department. He spent the last two seasons (2013-14) with the Saints as director of player personnel. In that role, Pace helped manage the team's college and pro scouting operations including all facets of scouting and evaluation of college and pro prospects along with New Orleans' roster.

Pace spent six seasons as the club's director of pro scouting (2007-12), which included overseeing the club's pro scouting staff. His duties involved recommending player acquisitions by evaluating the Saints roster and potential NFL free agents, monitoring all NFL transactions, researching possible trade opportunities, assessing player talent from other professional leagues and directing the advance scouting of future opponents. He also helped the Saints prepare for the NFL Draft following the regular season by assisting in the evaluation of top college prospects.

The Flower Mound, Texas native got his start in New Orleans' player personnel department as a scouting assistant in 2002, a role he held for two years before working as a pro scout from 2004-06. During that time he



evaluated free agents and collegiate players entering the NFL Draft as well as scouted upcoming opponents. He joined the Saints in 2001 supporting the coordination of all game day, training camp and stadium operations.

Over Pace's 13 seasons in the New Orleans personnel department (2002-14), the Saints compiled a 115-93 (.553) record. Since 2006, the Saints reached the playoffs five times, won three division titles, played in two NFC Championship games (2006 and 2009) and won the franchise's first Super Bowl title (Super Bowl XLIV). The Saints pro scouting department helped build a Super Bowl championship club by using all avenues at their disposal: signing free agents QB Drew Brees, FB Heath Evans, LB Scott Fujita, CB Randall Gay, C Jonathan Goodwin, CB Jabari Greer, WR Lance Moore and DE Anthony Hargrove and trading for TE Jeremy Shockey, LB Jonathan Vilma, LB Scott Shanle and TE David Thomas. Pace has also worked to acquire players such as NT Brodrick Bunkley, G Ben Grubbs, LBs Curtis Lofton, RB Darren Sproles. Over his last two seasons with the Saints their draft classes included regular starters LT Terron Armstead (2013, third round), WR Brandin Cooks (2014, first round), S Kenny Vaccaro (2013, first round) and WR Kenny Stills (2013, fifth round).

In 2008, he was selected by the club to attend the NFL's Stanford Business School's Executive Education Program for Managers. He was a part of the franchise in 2005 while the club dealt with immense adversity having to guide itself through several moves in base operations in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

Pace played collegiately as a defensive end at Eastern Illinois (1995-99), serving as team captain as a senior, graduating with a bachelor's degree in marketing.

Pace and his wife, Stephanie, have a daughter, Cardyn.

MATT NAGY HEAD COACH

Matt Nagy is in his first season with the Chicago Bears after being named the 16th head coach in franchise history on January 8th, 2018.

Nagy owns 10 seasons of NFL coaching experience, all under head coach Andy Reid with the Philadelphia Eagles and Kansas City Chiefs.

In 2017, Nagy completed his fifth season in Kansas City and his first as offensive coordinator. He was promoted to OC following the 2016 season after serving as co-offensive coordinator with Brad Childress. Prior to that, Nagy spent three seasons as the Chiefs QBs coach.

In his first season as offensive coordinator in 2017, Nagy guided a Chiefs offense that ranked No. 5 in the NFL in total offense with 375.4 yards per game en route to a 10-6 record and an AFC West Division championship. The Chiefs also finished sixth in the NFL in points per game (25.9), seventh in passing yards (256.5), ninth in rushing (118.9) and led the NFL with the fewest giveaways (8). The Chiefs also were one of the most explosive offenses in 2017, tying for fifth in the NFL with 69 plays from scrimmage of 20 or more yards.

Quarterback Alex Smith finished the 2017 regular season fourth in the AFC in passing with 4,042 yards to go along with 26 touchdowns – both career highs – and only five interceptions. Also under Nagy's tutelage, rookie running back Kareem Hunt led the NFL in rushing with 1,327 yards and eight touchdowns and tied for first in the NFL with 12 rushes of 20 or more yards, earning Pro Bowl honors in the process. Travis Kelce also earned Pro Bowl honors, leading all NFL tight ends with 83 receptions and finishing second among tight ends with 1,038 yards and eight touchdowns. Nine of his 83 grabs went for at least 25 yards, second most in the league behind only New England's Rob Gronkowski (11). Additionally, wide receiver Tyreek Hill ranked seventh in the NFL with 1,183 yards to go along with seven touchdowns and tied for third with 15 receptions of 25 or more yards – trailing only Pittsburgh's Antonio Brown (16) and Houston's DeAndre Hopkins (17).

In his five seasons with the Chiefs, Nagy worked closely with Smith, who owned a 65.1 completion percentage in the five seasons working with Nagy, ranking first among all Chiefs QBs with at least 700 passing attempts.

In 2016, Nagy helped the Chiefs to a 12-4 regular-season record, the club's first AFC West title since 2010, the No. 2 overall seed in the AFC and a first-round bye. Overall, Nagy helped the Chiefs to the postseason four times in his five seasons with the club.

In his first year with the Chiefs, Nagy worked with Smith in a season that brought him five 100.0-plus quarterback ratings, one of which was a perfect rating of 158.3 at Oakland. Focusing on ball protection, he coached Smith to an AFC-low seven interceptions with a minimum of 300 attempts and a 1.4 interception percentage, also the lowest in the AFC. Smith's interception percentage in the 2013 season has him solidified as the third-best single-season mark in franchise history. Smith also earned his first Pro Bowl selection following his first season with the Chiefs in 2013.

Before joining the Chiefs coaching staff, Nagy spent three years on the offensive staff of the Philadelphia Eagles, serving two seasons as the franchise's offensive quality control coach (2011-12). He was promoted to that role after he served as a coaching assistant during the 2010 campaign. His initial experience with the Eagles came in 2008 and 2009 when he served as a coaching intern during Eagles training camp.

A former quarterback for the Arena Football League, Nagy played six seasons for the New York Dragons (2002), Carolina Cobras (2004), Georgia Force (2005-06) and Columbus Destroyers (2007-08). During his career, Nagy completed 65.5 percent of his passes for 18,866 yards, 374 touchdowns and a quarterback rating of 115.1.

Nagy played collegiately at Delaware, setting more than 20 career passing records at the time, including career marks for passing yards (8,214) and touchdowns (58). He ranks second for most career attempts (895) and most career completions (502) behind former Delaware star and current Baltimore Ravens QB Joe Flacco. Nagy earned All-America honors as a senior for the Blue Hens after setting single-season records in attempts (379), yards (3,436) and touchdowns (29).

After graduating from Delaware with a degree in health and physical education, Nagy gained coaching experience at several local high schools, as he served as an assistant coach at Manheim Central (2001), the quarterbacks coach at Cedar Crest (2002-03) and the offensive coordinator at Palmyra Area High School (2008-09). He and his wife, Stacey, have four sons: Brayden, Tate, Jaxon and Jett.

**VIC FANGIO DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

Vic Fangio is in his fourth season as Chicago's defensive coordinator after being hired by the Bears on January 20, 2015. The 2018 season will mark his 32nd year in the NFL and his 19th season as an NFL defensive coordinator.

After inheriting a defense that had ranked 30th in total defense in 2013 and 2014, the Bears finished 14th, 15th and 10th in 2015, 2016 and 2017, respectively. The Bears also finished 2017 tied for third in the NFC and tied for seventh in the NFL with 42 sacks. On five separate occasions last season, the Bears defense held opponents to one or fewer offensive touchdowns (at BAL 0; vs. CAR 0; vs. SF 0; at CIN 1; vs. CLE 0). From Weeks 4-17, Chicago's defense allowed just 17

offensive touchdowns, which tied for the second-fewest in the NFL during that span.

Under Fangio's watch, rookie DB Eddie Jackson became the first player in NFL history to return both a fumble recovery and an interception for 75+ yard touchdowns in the same game while DL Akiem Hicks posted a career-high 8.5 sacks. DB Kyle Fuller also enjoyed a career season, as he was one of two players in the NFL last season to post at least 65 tackles and 20 pass breakups.

Fangio, who attended East Stroudsburg University, was inducted into the Northeast Pennsylvania Hall of Fame in 1993. He has a son, Christian, and a daughter, Cassie.

**MARK HELFRICH OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

Mark Helfrich is in his first season as offensive coordinator for the Bears after being hired by the club on January 12, 2018. He joins the Bears with 21 years of coaching experience at the collegiate level, including four as a head coach at the University with Oregon.

Helfrich most recently served as the head coach at Oregon from 2013-16 where he compiled a 37-16 record during his four years, including a 24-12 mark in the Pac-12. He enjoyed his best season in 2014 in leading the Ducks to a school-record 13 wins, a Pac-12 championship, a Rose Bowl victory in the inaugural College Football Playoff semifinal and an appearance in the CFP national championship game. Also that season, quarterback Marcus Mariota became the first Oregon player to win the Heisman Trophy before being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft. In recognition of his efforts, Helfrich was finalist for the Eddie Robinson and Maxwell Football Club Coach of the Year.

Prior to becoming the head coach in Eugene, Helfrich served as the offensive coordinator for former head coach Chip Kelly at Oregon from 2009-12. During that time the Ducks played in four straight BCS bowls and won three consecutive Pac-12 championships. The 2012 season featured one of the top offensive seasons in Oregon history as the Ducks averaged 49.6 points and 537.4 yards per game.

**CHRIS TABOR SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR**

Chris Tabor begins his first season as the Bears special teams coordinator after being hired on January 12, 2018. It is his second stint with the club, originally holding the title of assistant special teams coach from 2008-2010. He spent the last seven seasons with the Cleveland Browns as their special teams coordinator.

Under Tabor's watch, the Browns were the only team in the NFL to have earned at least one AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award each season from 2011-2016. In total, the Browns won seven AFC Special Teams Player of the Week awards. He also oversaw kicker Phil Dawson and returner Joshua Cribbs in 2012 when they were both selected to the Pro Bowl, marking just the second time in team history that two specialists made the annual all-star game in the same year.

During his seven seasons with the Browns, Tabor helped numerous players set NFL and franchise records. Punter Britton Colquitt set the Browns net punting average record in consecutive seasons with 40.3 in 2016 and 40.6 in 2017. Tabor's punters hold four of the Browns top five single season net punting marks with Colquitt holding the top two spots, Andy Lee placing third (40.1 in 2015) and Spencer Lanning checking in at fifth (39.2 in 2014). In 2015, kicker Travis Coons set an NFL record with 18 consecutive field goals to start his career, while Andy Lee set a franchise record in punt average with 46.71.

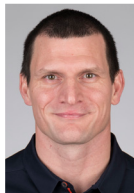

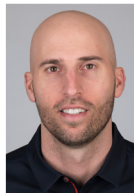

BEARS IN THE COMMUNITY

CHICAGO SPORTS ALLIANCE

Last December, the Chicago Bears joined the Black-hawks, Bulls, Cubs and White Sox to lend their broad reach and resources in support of solutions to decrease violence in the city. Working collectively as the Chicago Sports Alliance, \$1 million total in one-time grants was donated to support three programs addressing this critical issue: Choose 2 Change, a high-intensity mentoring and trauma therapy program proven to reduce violent behavior; analyst training by the Crime Lab for the Chicago Police Department's Strategic Decision Support Centers; and the University of Chicago Crime Lab to support efforts to measure and assess the impact of the teams' initial investments to improve outcomes for the most vulnerable Chicagoans. On June 25, the five teams came together for the first time in recent history to jointly host youth and mentors from Choose 2 Change, along with police officers from the SDSCs, to celebrate the start of summer and congratulate the youth for their work in the program.



MONSTERS OF THE MIDWAY

The Chicago Bears announced in April the "Monsters of the Midway" brand campaign project in partnership with ATHLITACoMiCS, which was founded by former Bear Israel Idonije to meld the worlds of comics and sports. Through the partnership, the Bears and Idonije's team have created an alternate universe where Bears players are depicted as superheroes collectively known as the "Monsters of the Midway." Each "Monster" has his own unique powers, which play off his natural skill set as a football player. The vision was to create an alternate world where the "Monsters of the Midway" defend the City of Chicago from a weekly nemesis, drawn from the Bears' 2018 schedule. The storyline will take fans up to the point of conflict each week where the characters transition from the comic world into reality as the outcome is played out on the field each game day.



SAVE DA PLANET

The Chicago Bears held a Save Da Planet sustainability event with Chicago Gateway Green and IGS Energy over the summer at Southside Occupational Academy High School in Englewood. Linebacker Sam Acho, alumni Jason McKie, Staley Da Bear and 30 IGS Energy employees joined to plant trees and flowers in school gardens, propagate boxwood, spread mulch, serve as runners for materials, landscape/clean and assemble a compost bin and rain barrels. Additionally, the Bears and IGS teamed up to provide a \$10,000 donation to Southside Occupational Academy High School for greening and sustainability programming.



LAMBS FARM

In May, the Chicago Bears 2018 rookie class volunteered at Lambs Farm, which is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to help people with developmental disabilities lead productive, happy lives and connect with the human. Based near Libertyville, Ill., Lambs Farm strives to maintain exemplary vocational, residential, social and recreational programs, and to operate in a manner that will continue to help people grow. Rookies volunteered with participants at Lambs Farm's businesses, including the Magnolia Café & Bakery, pet shop, thrift shop, bakery, farmyard, shearing sheep and landscaping.



BEARS IN THE COMMUNITY

I GROW CHICAGO

This June, over 60 Chicago Bears employees volunteered with I Grow Chicago to help rehabilitate some of their properties in Englewood, working with community members on a variety of projects including painting, installing cabinets and floors, moving furniture, staining a deck and demolition. Additionally, the Chicago Bears through the NFL Foundation, and Bears Care made a donation to provide financial support for the rehabilitation process. Through this donation, I Grow Chicago will be able to expand their Peace Campus to include a Family Resource House, which will aim to empower, educate and employ women and mothers to become community leaders. During construction, residents of I Grow Chicago will learn from the contractors on-site and be paid to assist throughout the rehabilitation process. In 2014, I Grow Chicago opened the Peace House, a previously abandoned home in West Englewood that they transformed into a community gathering space. They are creating a culture of hope in Englewood, where a community is ready to make a difference for themselves, their neighbors and their children.



MINI MONSTERS

Bears Mini Monsters Clinics, brought to you by Advocate Health Care, bring non-contact football drills to Chicagoland schools and parks to allow kids to show off their athleticism and learn football skills. This year, the Bears have partnered with the Chicago Police Department's CAPS team to have officers help lead each clinic alongside alumni.



BEARS CARE GALA

The 23rd annual Bears Care Gala was held in May at the United Club at Soldier Field, where just over 650 guests, including 29 players, helped raise over \$600,000 for breast and ovarian cancer research and treatment programs. Chicago natives Kay Adams and Kyle Brant from NFL Network's "Good Morning Football" hosted the first-ever Orange Carpet.



CUNNINGHAM'S GIFT-GIVING

Bears running back Benny Cunningham did the giving on his birthday this past July, providing bicycles for underprivileged children throughout the Nashville community. Cunningham was at the Phatkaps on Bell Road in Antioch and gave away 100 bicycles. The Nashville native didn't have a bike growing up and always wanted to make that dream come true for others.

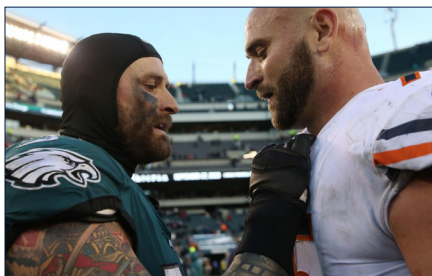
THE LONG FAMILY

Bears offensive lineman Kyle Long is the son of Hall of Famer (2000) Howie Long and the middle child of three brothers.

Howie was a second-round pick for the Oakland Raiders in the 1981 NFL Draft. He joined the Raiders one year after the team won Super Bowl XV. Three years later, in 1983, he helped the team capture another Super Bowl title with a 38-9 win over the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl XVIII. He went on to be selected to eight Pro Bowls, the first following the 1983 season.

Chris, Kyle's older brother, was a collegiate standout at the University of Virginia prior to being selected in the 1st round (No. 2 overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams. Chris has captured two Super Bowl titles with the New England Patriots (SBLI) and Philadelphia Eagles (SBLII).

Howard Jr. the youngest of three brothers, worked in the Oakland Raiders front office as a Player Personnel Assistant for five seasons.



KEVIN, KA'RAUN & KYZIR WHITE

Bears wide receiver Kevin White is the oldest of three brothers, all of which play in the NFL. In rare company, The Baldingers, Watts and Gronkowskis are among those who have also had three siblings play in the NFL. Additionally, there are four Fuller brothers in the NFL.

Ka'Rau, the middle child, went undrafted in 2018 following four years at West Virginia University. Originally signed by the Seattle Seahawks, Ka'Rau was released and quickly signed by the Cincinnati Bengals where he's currently a wide receiver. Ka'Rau hauled in 61 receptions for 1,004 yards with 12 touchdowns in 2017 at WVU.

Kyzir, the youngest of the trio, also played at West Virginia University and was a fourth-round pick (119th overall) by the Los Angeles Chargers in the 2018 NFL Draft. As a senior in 2017, Kyzir appeared in 14 games and totaled 100 tackles (69 solo), 8.5 tackles for loss, eight passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.



FULLER BROTHERS MAKE HISTORY

Bears defensive back Kyle Fuller is the second-youngest of four brothers to have reached the NFL. Following the 2016 NFL Draft, the Fullers became just the second set of four brothers to reach the NFL in the Super Bowl era, joining the Browners—Ross, Jim, Joey and Keith, who played in the 1970s and '80s.

The oldest of four, Vincent (S), was a fourth-round pick (108th overall) in the 2005 NFL Draft by the Tennessee Titans. Vincent spent the first six years of his career as a safety with Tennessee before playing his final season with the Detroit Lions in 2011.

The second-youngest, Corey (WR), was a sixth-round pick (171st overall) in the 2013 draft by the Detroit Lions. Corey appeared in 28 games in two seasons with Detroit before landing on the Saints practice squad for the 2016-17 seasons. Corey is currently a free agent.

Kendall (DB), a third-round draft choice (84th overall)

by the Washington Redskins in 2016, enters his third year in the NFL and his first with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2018. Kendall has appeared in 29 games (12 starts) with 74 tackles (54 solo), four interceptions and 12 passes defended.

All four brothers attended Virginia Tech University.

SAM & EMMANUEL ACHO

Bears linebacker Sam Acho is the older brother of former Eagles linebacker Emmanuel Acho.

Emmanuel, a sixth-round pick in the 2012 NFL Draft (204th overall) by the Cleveland Browns, spent his rookie season in Cleveland before being traded to the Philadelphia Eagles in 2013. He appeared in 20 games across two seasons with Philadelphia and logged 18 tackles (7 solo) and 2.0 tackles for loss.

Following his playing days, Emmanuel has worked for both the Longhorn Network and Fox 7 as of recent, does public speaking, and hosts a podcast called Beyond the Film Room, which is about the abilities of athletes beyond sports. Acho also participated in a forum with the former Austin police chief meant to reduce divisions between the police and African-American communities.



JEFF & JAY RODGERS

Bears defensive line coach, Jay Rodgers, is the older brother of former Bears special teams coordinator Jeff Rodgers, who is currently the special teams coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals.

Jeff has 17 years of coaching experience, including 14 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10), and San Francisco (2003-07).

Collectively while overseeing the Bears special teams, KR Deonte Thompson ranked second in the NFL in 2016 in kickoff return yards (804) and Sherrick McManis led the Bears in special teams tackles in each of the past three seasons (2015-17).



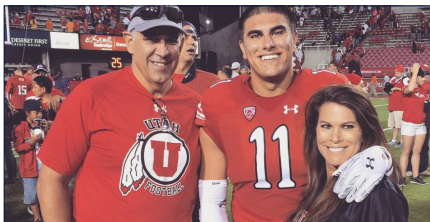

KYLIE & MATT FITTS

Bears rookie Kylie Fitts is the son of former professional baseball player, Matt Fitts. Matt was selected in the 22nd round (549th overall) of the 1981 amateur draft by the New York Mets organization. A right-handed pitcher, Fitts played two seasons with the Kingsport Mets (Appalachian League) before leaving the game due to shoulder issues. Fitts returned home and pursued the game of football, joining the Cal-State Fullerton Titans as a walk-on tight end/interior offensive lineman.



JAMES & LESHUN DANIELS

Bears rookie offensive lineman James Daniels is the younger brother of NFL running back LeShun Daniels. Originally signed by the New England Patriots out of Iowa in 2017, LeShun most recently saw action with the Washington Redskins, appearing in four games in 2017 before his release in March. LeShun is currently a free agent.
