# ROBERT IRSAY

President and Treasurer



"There are two things in my life that are not for sale, my wife and the Colts." This statement, made during a radio interview at halftime of a Colts-Dolphins game, indicates the importance of the Baltimore Colts to their owner Robert Irsay.

"I bought the Colts to play in Baltimore, I have no thought of taking them elsewhere. We have a great team in a great sports town," was a comment made by Irsay when he bought the team in '72. His commitment to keep the Colts in Baltimore was recently demonstrated when in '78, he purchased a track

of land in Baltimore County which will become the Colts new training facility. The three million dollar project includes offices, locker and training room facilities, meeting rooms and three practice fields.

Irsay became the Colts second owner on July 26, 1972, when he traded his recently acquired Los Angeles Rams to Carroll Rosenbloom for his Baltimore Colts franchise. Irsay had purchased the Rams from the estate of the late Dan Reeves.

Irsay was born on March 5, 1923 in the "Bucktown" section in the northern part of the City of Chicago.

He worked his way through the University of Illinois, earning a B.S. degree in mechanical engineering. During his time in Champaign, he was a member of the Illini football team and was a teammate of former Colt Alex Agase.

Following graduation, he joined the U.S. Marine Corps and served from 1941 to 1945. He saw action with the First and Fourth Marine Divisions. At the time of his discharge, he had reached the rank of Lieutenant.

After leaving the Marines, he worked five years in the ventilation business before forming his own company. With \$800 borrowed from his wife's savings account, he formed The Robert Irsay Company of Skokie, Illinois in 1952. Over the next two decades, the company grew into one of the largest and most respected heating, air conditioning and ventilating companies in the world. In 1971, Irsay sold his company to a company listed on the New York Stock Exchange and remained associated with it until 1978.

During 1978, Irsay organized Colt Construction and Development Co., a diversified construction and development company which, along with its other projects throughout the country, is constructing the new Colt training facility.

The 1978 season marked the first time Irsay missed a Colts game. A bout with the flu kept him from witnessing the Colts upset win over the New England Patriots.

He is a strong supporter of the Council of Colts Corrals and has donated over \$30,000 to help in their charitable work. For his involvement with the community, he was honored in '78 by the Eastside Athletic Club as their "Man of the Year." Irsay serves as a member of the Board of Directors for the Eye Research Institute and Michigan National Bank both of Chicago. He is an active fund raiser and scholarship sponsor for the Stritch School of Medicine of Loyola University.

Irsay and his wife, Harriet have been married for over 30 years. They have two sons, Tom (25) and Jimmy (20) a sophomore at Southern Methodist University.

## **RICHARD SZYMANSKI**

**Executive Vice President and General Manager**



Dick Szymanski is entering his third season as Executive Vice President and General Manager of the Baltimore Colts. His association with the team however began 25 years ago when "Sizzy" was the Colts second round selection in the 1955 college draft. Over the past two decades, he has been a player, a coach, a member of the Personnel Department and on January 25th, 1977 became General Manager.

The Toledo, Ohio native played on three NFL championship teams (1958, 1959, 1968) and three times earned All Pro honors. At the end of his rookie season in 1955, he made the first of his three appearances in the NFL Pro Bowl (1955, 1962, 1964). During his 13 year career, he played both center and linebacker. In 1977, he was honored as the starting center on the Colts Silver Anniversary team.

Following the Colts Super Bowl appearance in 1969, Szymanski joined the staff of the Colts Personnel Department. In 1973, he was named Assistant Personnel Director and one year later was named Director of Pro Personnel. It was also during that year 1974, that he returned to the field as offensive line coach under Howard Schnellenberger.

A four year starter at Notre Dame, he played both center and linebacker for Irish coaches Frank Leahy and Terry Brennan. At the end of his senior year, he started at center for the College All-Star team that defeated the Cleveland Browns 30-27 in the Chicago Tribune Charities game. Later that year, he earned All-Pro honors during his rookie season.

Szymanski and his wife Patricia Ann live in Timonium with his two children Debra Ann and Michael Patrick. He was recently named to Who's Who.

## **ERNIE ACCORSI**

**Assistant General Manager**



Ernie Accorsi is entering his third season as Assistant General Manager of the Colts. Included among his responsibilities in this post are to assist in the negotiation of player contracts, serve as a liaison with the NFL and to assist in policymaking decisions involving all aspects of the organization. Prior to rejoining the Colt organization in January of '77, he served two years on the staff of Commissioner Pete Rozelle as Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference. In this position, he

directed the administrative details of the conference. Before taking the NFL job in New York, Accorsi served as the Colts Public Relations Director from '70 until '75. It was during this time that he earned the reputation as being one of the finest PR Directors in the NFL.

Before joining the Colts, Accorsi worked as a sportswriter for the Charlotte News, the Baltimore Evening Sun and the Philadelphia Inquirer. He has also served as Director of Information for St. Joseph's College and as Assist. SID at Penn State.

Accorsi, his wife Judy and their three children, Michael, Sherlyn and Patrick live in Timonium.

# TED MARCHIBRODA

HEAD COACH

Ted Marchibroda is entering his fifth season as head coach of the Baltimore Colts. Last year he suffered through his only losing season with the Colts as injuries claimed six starters for the season. In his first three seasons, he compiled a record of 31 and 11 and won three AFC East Championships. Last season, he ended the year with a 5-11 mark. Included among the wins were victories over play-off teams, Denver and New England.



In his first season, 1975, Marchibroda's Colts staged the greatest single season turn-about in the history of the NFL. Never before had a team gone from last place to first place in a single season. The Colts had ended the '74 season with a 2-12 record. In Marchibroda's first season, the Colts turned in a 10-4 record and won their first AFC East title since 1970. The season was highlighted by a nine game winning streak. Included among the wins was a 10-7 overtime win against the Dolphins and a 34-21 win over the Patriots to clinch the title in the last game of the season.

For his achievement and success in his first season, Marchibroda was honored with Coach of the Year awards from the Sporting News, Pro Football Weekly, Football Digest and the Washington Touchdown Club.

The Colts repeated their Divisional Championship in 1976 when they ended the season with an 11-4 mark. The Colts dominated divisional play, ending the season with a 7-1 record against AFC East teams.

Marchibroda became the first Colt coach to win three divisional championships, when in '77, the Colts posted another 10-4 record to capture their third AFC East title. The Colts had to score 27 points in the last half of the last game to give Marchibroda his distinction.

Before joining the Colts on February 15, 1975, Marchibroda served 14 years as an NFL assistant coach. He began his pro career as backfield coach for Bill McPeak and the Washington Redskins in 1961. Four years later, 1965, he joined the L.A. Rams staff and worked the next nine years with George Allen. In 1971, he was named offensive coordinator of the Redskins when Allen was named head coach.

His pro experience began in 1953 when he was selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the first round of the college draft. A quarterback at St. Bonaventure and Detroit, his best pro season was in 1956. That season, he finished second in the NFL in passing. He completed 124 of 275 passes for 1585 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Marchibroda was born March 15, 1931 in Franklin, Pa. He and his wife, the former Henrietta Schlosser of Oil City, Pa. have four children, two daughters, Jodi and Lonni and two sons, Ted and Robert. Ted, Jr. will be entering his senior year at the University of Virginia where he is a starting wide receiver.

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#### NOTES ON MARCHIBRODA'S CAREER IN BALTIMORE

**Four Year Record:** 36-22-0 62.0% (1975 10-4, 1976 11-3, 1977 10-4, 1978 5-11)

**Third Winningest Coach:** Marchibroda ranks as the third winningest coach in Colts history. With 36 career victories, he

ranks behind Don Shula and Weeb Ewbank. Shula won 71 games while coaching the Colts from 1963 thru 1969. Hall of Famer Ewbank won 59 games during his nine seasons as Colt coach.

**Three AFC East Titles:** Under Marchibroda, the Colts have won three AFC East titles beginning in 1975 and running through 1977. No coach in Colts history has ever won more than two titles in conference or divisional play. Shula won two NFL Western Conference titles in 1964 and 1968. Ewbank won two Western titles in '58 and '59.

**Longest Win Streak:** Under Marchibroda's guidance, the Colts won nine straight games in '75. This is the second longest winning streak for regular season games in Colts history. It is the third longest streak when play-off games are added. The longest streak was 11 games in 1964. The Colts won 10 straight in 1968, winning their last eight regular season games and two in play-off competition.

**Other Streaks:** In addition to their nine straight, the Colts have compiled win streaks of six games in 1976 and five games in 1977 under Marchibroda.

**Losing Streaks:** The longest losing streak for the Colts under Marchibroda came at the end of the 1978 season. The Colts lost their last five games. In his first season, Marchibroda saw his squad lose four in a row as they dropped four of the first five games before starting their nine game win streak.

**Winning Record Against 12:** In his four seasons in Baltimore, Marchibroda has compiled winning records against 12 teams in the NFL. Five other teams have even records and only five teams have winning records against the Colts.

**AFC East Record:** Marchibroda has won 20 games while losing 12 against AFC East competition. The Colts have defeated the New York Jets six times while losing only twice. Against the Bills and Dolphins, the Colts hold a 5-3 edge. The New England Patriots and the Colts have the hottest rivalry in the division with each team winning four games.

**AFC Record:** Against AFC competition, Marchibroda has won 30 of 46 games. Besides his 20 wins in the Eastern Division, he shows winning records against the other two divisions. Against AFC Central competition, Marchibroda has won 4 games while losing 2. In games against AFC Western Division teams, the Colts have won 6 of 8.

**NFC Record:** In the last four seasons, the Colts have played 12 games against NFC teams. They have an even mark of 6 wins and 6 losses. The six wins have come against the Redskins (twice) the Buccaneers, the Cardinals, the Giants and the Bears.

**Home & Away Records:** Marchibroda has won only 2 more games at home in Memorial Stadium than he has on the road. During his four seasons, the Colts have won 19 games at home and lost 10. On the road, the Colts have won 17 and lost 12.

**'79 Opponents:** Of the eleven different teams scheduled to play the Colts in '79, Marchibroda has a winning record against 8 of them. The other three teams, New England, Pittsburgh and Cleveland all have even records.

**Monthly Records:** The Colts have won 6 of 11 games played in September, 11 of 18 games played in October, 14 of 18 games in November and 5 of 11 played in December.

**Pre-Season Record:** Using the pre-season as a period to teach and experiment, Coach Marchibroda has an 8-14 record. In his first two seasons, the Colts ended the pre-season with 2-4 records. In '77, the Colts posted a 3-3 mark, while in '78 they finished with a 1-3 record.

### **MAXIE BAUGHAN, Defensive Coordinator and Linebackers**

Maxie Baughan, four times an All-Pro linebacker during his 14-year career, joined the Colts staff in 1975. He retired as an active player in 1971 and spent the 1972-73 seasons as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at his alma mater, Georgia Tech. He rejoined the Redskins in 1974 as a player-coach, before coming to Baltimore. The 40 year old Alabama native was the second draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1960. He gained All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors nine times and served as defensive captain there, before being traded to Los Angeles in 1966, where he gained like honors. He was traded to Washington in 1971. He and his wife, Dianne, have three sons.



### **DICK BIELSKI, Receivers**

In his sixteenth season as coach in the NFL, Dick Bielski had formerly spent nine years as receiver coach with the Baltimore Colts. After being with the Redskins since February 1973, he rejoined the Colts in February of 1977. He starred as fullback and place kicker with the University of Maryland for four years (1951-54). Selected in the first round of the 1955 college draft by the Philadelphia Eagles, he played tight end for the Eagles for five years (1955-59). He was traded to the Dallas Cowboys where he started at tight end for two years before being traded to Baltimore. As a pro, Bielski caught 107 passes for 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns while kicking 58 extra points and 26 field goals. He and his wife, Jo, have four children and reside in Timonium, Maryland.



### **GEORGE BOUTSELIS, Special Teams**

George Boutselis is in his fifth year with the Colts and the NFL as the team's first special teams coach. He attended the University of North Carolina, where he played quarterback and began his coaching career. He served as a graduate assistant (1963) and as offensive (1964) and defensive backfield coach (1965-66). He was defensive backfield coach at the University of Cincinnati in 1967-68, before returning to the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1969 as defensive coordinator at Maryland. He moved to Iowa State in 1972 as defensive coach and to Virginia as defensive coordinator in 1973. In 1974, he was defensive backfield coach of the Charlotte Hornets of the WFL. Boutselis, 38 years old, is a native of Harrisburg, Pa., and is single.



### **ED KHAYAT, Defensive Line**

One of the ringleaders of Philadelphia's 1960 NFL championship defensive units, Ed Khayat joined the Baltimore Colts in February of 1977, after spending the previous two years with the Falcons. A Tulane University graduate, Khayat played 10 seasons in the NFL. He was signed by Washington as a free agent in 1957; played with the Eagles from 1958-61; was traded to Washington for 1962-63; returned via trade to Philadelphia in 1964-65; and, then ended his career with Boston of the old AFL in 1966.

Since 1967, his NFL coaching positions have been defensive line, New Orleans, 1967-70; defensive line until promoted to head coach, Philadelphia (three games into the season) 1971 (finishing 6-4-1) and 1972 (2-11-1); defensive line, Detroit, 1973-74, and, Atlanta. The 44 year old Khayat is a native of Moss Point, Miss. He and his wife, Deborah, have two children, Eddie, Jr., (9), and Bill, (5).



### **JOHN SYMANK, Defensive Backfield**

The newest member of the Colts coaching staff, John Symank brings to the Colts 15 years of college and professional coaching experience. Symank joins the Colts after serving as defensive backfield coach for the New York Giants since 1974. Prior to his joining the Giants staff, he was with the Atlanta Falcons from 1966 thru 1968. Symank played seven seasons in the NFL mostly with the Green Bay Packers. He signed with Green Bay before the 1957 season after playing collegiate football at the University of Florida and Arlington State Junior College in Texas. He played with the Packers from 1957 thru 1962. He played his last season with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1963. Born in La-Grange, Texas, he lettered in track and football at Caldwell H.S. in Caldwell, Texas. Married, he and his wife, Sariann have four children.



### **ERNIE ZWAHLEN, Offensive Line**

One of two new faces on the Colts staff is offensive line coach Ernie Zwahlen. Zwahlen joined the Colts staff on February 23, 1979. The Portland, Oregon native has coached five seasons in the NFL, serving with the New York Jets in 1967 under Weeb Ewbank and with the San Francisco 49ers from 1968-70. He retired from coaching following the 1971 season with the Houston Oilers. Since then he has been working in real estate in Texas. A graduate of Oregon State, he joined the OSU coaching staff following graduation. In 1958, he moved from Corvallis to Iowa State. Six years later, he moved to Purdue. He left Purdue in '67 to join the Jets. A bachelor, he holds a B.S. degree from Oregon State in Education and Physical Education and a Master of Education degree.



### **BOB COLBERT, Administrative Assistant to the Head Coach**

Bob Colbert joined the Colts organization in 1977 as Administrative Assistant to Coach Marchibroda. Among his duties are scouting, administrative work and coaching the offensive backs. Before joining the Colts, Colbert worked as a coaching aid for the Washington Redskins. A three year letterman at the University of Maryland, he played defensive back for the Terrapins from 1967 to 1969. Following graduation, he got his first coaching job at Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C. In 1972 he left Gallaudet to become an assistant coach at Colgate. He coached the defensive backs until he left to join the Redskins in '75. Colbert is a native of Pittsburgh. He lives with his wife, Chris, and their one year old daughter, Cara, in Shrewsbury, Pa.



### **MILLER McCALMON, Administrative Assistant to the Coaching Staff**

Miller McCalmon joined the Colts staff in 1978. He will be working with the defensive coaches. Before joining the Colts, he worked two years for the Redskins as a Personnel Scout (76-77). A graduate of Tulsa, he was a two year letterman as a defensive back. Following his graduation in 1970, he worked one season as a graduate assistant while completing work on a Masters Degree in Educational Administration. In 1972, he was an assistant coach at Colorado State working with receivers. In 1973, he became head coach at Erie H.S. in Erie, Colorado. He is a native of Denver, Colorado. He and his wife, Georgia, have two girls and live in Brookville, Md.



## **ED BLOCK, Trainer Emeritus**

For the past 25 years he has been known as "Ed Block of the Colts" and for 25 years he has served as friend, confidant, and healer for the players of the Blue and White. Due to a severe heart attack before the '77 season, "Ed Block of the Colts" was recently named Trainer Emeritus. A member of the Citizens Savings Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame, Block has been associated with the Colts since 1954. He joined the Baltimore organization from the physical education staff of Washington University in St. Louis. A native of St. Louis, Block attended the University of Missouri where he earned his Bachelor and Masters degrees in Physical Education. Following World War II, where he served as an executive officer for a tank outfit and was decorated with a Purple Heart, he continued his education while on the staff at Washington University, earning his doctorate from Columbia. In addition to his work with the Colts, Block has worked with the Kernan's Children's Hospital, Johns Hopkins Hospital and with the in-space conditioning program for NASA. In 1978, the Ed Block Courage Award was established by the Eastside Athletic Club to honor a Colts player who demonstrates the characteristics of courage and dedication.



## **JOHN LOPEZ, Head Trainer**

John Lopez joined the Colts training staff in June of 1979 after serving as assistant trainer for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers since 1976. Before joining the Buccaneers, he worked six years as assistant then head trainer at the University of Tampa. He started his training career while a student at Tampa. He graduated in 1971 with a degree in Physical Education.



A life long resident of Tampa, he has served as head trainer for the Lions American Bowl and the Can-Am Bowl which are played annually in Tampa during January.

He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Associations and the American College of Sports Medicine. He is married and he and his wife, Jane, have one daughter, Lindy, born in November of '77.

## **TIM KIRSCHNER, Trainer**

Tim Kirschner was appointed trainer during the off-season. He joined the Colt staff in August of 1977. Prior to joining Baltimore, he worked for three years as an assistant trainer at Michigan State University. During that period, he also served as an instructor of athletic training for undergraduate students. Kirschner received his bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Texas. He earned his master's degree at Michigan State while working as a graduate assistant trainer with the football and wrestling teams. In 1974, he served as assistant trainer at the USA-USSR Junior Track and Field Championships in Austin, Texas and in 1976, he was head trainer for a United States team in a wrestling match against the USSR held in East Lansing, Michigan. He also served as assistant trainer for the AFC team in the 1978 Pro Bowl. The 29-year old native of Austin, Texas is single and resides in Owings Mills, Maryland.



### **FRED SCHUBACH, Player Personnel Director**

Fred Schubach has been with the Baltimore Colts since the club's inception in 1953, serving the past six years as Player Personnel Director. In those six years, the Colts added 16 players through the draft that started last year. A Philadelphia native, Schubach joined the Colts as equipment manager, after working for his father, Fred, who served 27 years as the Philadelphia Eagles equipment manager. In 1967, he was asked to join the personnel staff on a part-time basis, while continuing his equipment duties. He became a full-time member of the personnel department in 1971, and in 1973 was named director. Fred and his wife, Hazel, have two sons, Fred, Jr., and Richard, and reside in Lutherville, Md.



### **BOB TERPENING, College Scout**

Bob Terpening joined the Colt Personnel Staff in February of 1977 after three years as football coach at Mount Hebron High School in Ellicott City, Maryland. Terpening received his bachelor's degree from Shepherd College and earned his master's degree at West Virginia University. In 1969-70, he was head football coach at Baltimore City College. He graded films of college talent for the Colts in 1970 and in 1971, he joined the New England Patriots' Scouting Department on a full-time basis until 1973. From 1974-77, he served as a part-time scout for the Patriots while coaching at Mount Hebron. Terpening resides with his wife Virginia and two sons Chris (7) and Matt (3) in Reisterstown, Maryland.

## HISTORY OF THE COLTS

Professional football came to the city of Baltimore when it was awarded a franchise in the All-America Football Conference on December 28, 1946. Bob Rodenberg headed a purchasing group which acquired the bankrupt Miami Seahawks and after a contest among the Baltimore fans, won by Charles Evans of Middle River, Maryland, the team was renamed the "Colts."

On September 7, 1947, wearing green and silver uniforms, the Colts under head coach Cecil Isbell won their initial AAFC game, 16-7, over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The team concluded its inaugural season before a record Baltimore crowd of 51,583 losing to the New York Yankees, 21-7. The Colts finished the year with a 2-11-1 record good for a fourth place finish in the Eastern Division.

Baltimore completed the 1948 season with a 7-8 record, tying the Buffalo Bills for the division title. The Colts compiled a 1-11 slate in 1949. The All-America Football Conference and the National Football League merged in 1950 and the Colts became a member of the NFL. After posting a 1-11 record for the second consecutive year, the franchise was dissolved by the league on January 18, 1951 because of its failing financial condition.

After two full seasons without professional football, the people of Baltimore were challenged by NFL Commissioner Bert Bell in December of 1952 to purchase 15,000 season tickets within six weeks in order to re-enter the NFL. The ticket drive was initiated on December 8, 1952 and the 15,000 ticket quota was attained in four weeks and three days.

On January 23, 1953, under the principle ownership of Carroll Rosenbloom, Baltimore was awarded the NFL's Dallas Texan franchise. The Baltimore team continued to use the name "Colts" and inherited the blue and white team colors worn by the Texans.

Before their first NFL season, the "new" Baltimore Colts engineered one of the biggest trades in sports history. In a deal with the Cleveland Browns involving 15 players, Baltimore received 10 Browns in exchange for 5 Colts. Among the players who came to Baltimore in the deal were Don Shula, Bert Rechichar, Carl Taseff and Art Spinney. These players helped the Colts open the 1953 NFL season with a 13-9 upset of the Chicago Bears in a game where Bert Rechichar set a then NFL record with a 56 yard field goal.

In 1954, Baltimore hired Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Ewbank would guide the Colts for the next nine seasons (the longest tenure of any Colt head coach) and lead the club to its first divisional and World Championships.

On November 30, 1958, the Colts clinched their first Western Division title with a 35-27 win over San Francisco before a record home sellout crowd of 57,557. Four weeks later, Baltimore won its first World Championship, downing the New York Giants, 23-17, in the fabled "sudden-death" overtime contest at Yankee Stadium. The Colts repeated as champions in 1959, clinching their second Western Division crown and defeating the Giants, 31-16 in Baltimore for the World Title.

In January 1963, Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as the team's third head coach since 1953. During the 1963 campaign, quarterback John Unitas led the Colt offense to eight team records and set a then NFL individual passing mark of 237 completions. The Colts won a club record eleven consecutive games in 1964, enroute to clinching their third Western Conference title and first under Shula. During that campaign, Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored 20 touchdowns, both NFL records at the time. The following year, Baltimore tied Green Bay for the Western Conference title. With halfback Tom Matte quarterbacking the club because of

injuries to John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo, the Colts lost a controversial 13-10 "sudden-death" playoff contest to the Packers.

Under Shula, Baltimore made its first Super Bowl appearance in 1968. The club finished first in the Coastal Division with a 13-1 mark then defeated Minnesota, 24-14, in the Western Conference Championship game and blanked Cleveland, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. The team went on to face the American Football League Champion New York Jets in Super Bowl III, losing a 16-7 upset.

In May of 1969, the NFL merged with the AFL and Baltimore, Pittsburgh and Cleveland joined the old AFL teams to form the American Football Conference of the NFL. For the 1970 season, the Colts were situated in the Eastern Division of the AFC and on September 20, the club won its first AFC game, 16-14 over San Diego. In mid-December, Baltimore clinched its first Eastern Division Championship with a 20-14 win at Buffalo, then defeated Cincinnati and Oakland in the playoffs to win the AFC Championship. On January 17, 1971, the Colts defeated the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl V, 16-13, on Jim O'Brien's 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining in the game.

In July 1972, the Colts came under new ownership as Robert Irsay acquired the club from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams.

In 1974, two young Colt stars established NFL records as runningback Lydell Mitchell carried the ball 40 times against the New York Jets at Shea Stadium and quarterback Bert Jones completed 17 consecutive passes against the same Jet club later in the season. Mitchell set another mark that season, winning the league pass receiving title with 72 receptions, an all-time high for runningbacks.

In 1975, Mitchell would continue his record-setting pace by becoming the first runningback in Colt history to rush for 1,000 yards, gaining 1,193 yards on 289 carries.

Baltimore's fortune dramatically turned around in 1975, starting with the hiring of Ted Marchibroda as head coach. Following a dismal 2-12 finish in 1974, the Colts made a complete reversal under Marchibroda who led the club to a 10-4 record and their first Eastern Division title since the 1970 Super Bowl year. In four years at the Colts helm, Marchibroda has guided Baltimore to a 36-21 record and three Eastern Division crowns.

In 26 years of National Football League competition, the Colts have posted a 211-150-6 record, including three World Championships and ten Conference or Divisional titles. Since 1958, Baltimore has won 178 games, more than any team in the NFL for that 20 year period.

The success of the Baltimore franchise is exemplified by the number of Colts who have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Heading a list of six players and one coach is quarterback John Unitas, who was inducted in July, 1979. Other Colt inductees include Raymond Berry, Art Donovan, Gino Marchetti, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker and head coach Weeb Ewbank.

- Spring, 1954**—Weeb Ewbank named head coach.

- November 2, 1958**—Colts record club's first shutout, 56-0 over Green Bay Packers, to win sixth straight game and also set club record for largest margin of victory.

- November 30, 1958**—Colts clinch first Western Division title 35-27 over San Francisco before second straight record home sellout crowd of 57,557.
- December 28, 1958**—Colts defeat New York Giants 23-17 at Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" game for World Championship.
- December 12, 1959**—Colts score 24 fourth quarter points to rally from 10-point deficit and defeat Los Angeles 45-26 at the Coliseum for second Western Division championship.

- December 11, 1960**—Touchdown passing streak by John Unitas snapped by Los Angeles at NFL record 47 games.

- May 18, 1977**—John Unitas (1956-1972) rejoined Colts as Special Consultant.
- November 20, 1977**—Lydell Mitchell breaks Lenny Moore's career rushing record of 5174 yds. Mitchell ended the '77 season with 5487 yds.
- December 18, 1977**—Colts defeat New England in the season finale 30-24 to clinch their third consecutive AFC Eastern Divisional title with a 10-4 record. The Colts winning TD came on a 99 yard drive, the longest in Colts history.

## HALL OF FAME COLTS



**JOHN UNITAS, QB, 6-1, 196, Louisville**  
Nineteen seventy three was the end of an era in the NFL. John Unitas, the greatest quarterback ever to put on shoulder pads retired. After 18 years, Unitas left the game with a helmet full of records.

He was the first quarterback to pass for more than 40,000 yards. His NFL records include most games with 300 yards or more passing (26), most seasons leading the league in touchdown passes (4) and his mark of most consecutive games with a TD pass (47) is a feat that rivals Joe DiMaggio's 56 game hitting streak.

He ended his career ranked number one in NFL history in five career categories: most passes attempted (5,186), most passes completed (2,830), most yards gained passing (40,239), most seasons 3,000 yards or more passing (3) and most touchdown passes (290).

He owns a Super Bowl record for the longest TD pass completing a 75 yarder in Super Bowl V to John Mackey. Holds NFL championship records for highest career completion percentage (62.9) and most yards gained in championship play (1,177).

In his 17 seasons with the Colts, he established 22 records. During his stay in Baltimore, Unitas was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player three times and played in 10 Pro Bowls, the most ever by a Colt. He was 5 times named All-Pro.

With Unitas calling signals, the Colts won World Championships in 1958 and 1959 and the Super Bowl title in 1970.

Unitas opened his quarterbacking career with the Colts throwing an interception for a TD to J.C. Caroline of the Bears on October 21, 1956. He ended his career with the Colts by throwing a TD to Eddie Hinton on December 3, 1972. Between those two passes he provided an entire generation of football fans with memories and moments that they will never forget.

- 1969 Named the NFL's greatest quarterback in honor of the 50th Anniversary of the league. Named the player of the decade by the Associated Press.
- 1970 Leads the team to its first AFC championship. Suffers a rib injury in the first half of the Colts 16-13 Super Bowl win over the Dallas Cowboys.
- 1973 Career ends with 40,239 yds passing on 5,186 attempts and 2,830 completions with 290 TDs, all NFL records.

**RAYMOND BERRY**, End, 6-2, 187, SMU

Retired in 1967 as the leading pass receiver in NFL history (now ranks second) with 631 receptions. . . selected as a "future" choice in the 20th round of the 1954 draft by the Colts. . . named all-pro three times (1958-60) and played in five Pro Bowl games. . . led NFL in receiving in 1958-60. . . holds NFL championship game records for yardage (178) and receptions (12), which he set in the 1958 "sudden death" title game against the New York Giants. . . last career touchdown reception came against Dallas at Memorial Stadium on December 3, 1967 and covered five yards. . . born February 27, 1933 in Corpus Christi, Texas. . . attended Paris (Texas) High School. . . now coaching with the New England Patriots. . . inducted in the Hall of Fame, July 28, 1973.



**ART DONOVAN**, Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 265, Boston College

The first Colt to enter the Hall of Fame, Donovan was inducted August 3, 1968. . . played from 1953-61 with the current Colt franchise and with Baltimore in 1950, the New York Yanks, 1951, and Dallas Texans, 1952. . . all-pro 1954-57 and played in the Pro Bowl game five times. . . one of the most popular Colts of all time. . . attended Notre Dame for one year, entered the Marines during World War II, and switched to Boston College after his service discharge. . . lettered four years (1946-49) as a tackle and was named All-East in 1948-49. . . reported to training camp in 1962, but announced his retirement at age 37, before the season opened. . . he was honored and his jersey number, 70, retired in an emotional ceremony at Memorial Stadium on September 16, 1962. . . attended St. Michael High School in New York City, where he was born June 5, 1925 in the Bronx. . . lives with his family in Towson, Maryland.



**WEEB EW BANK**, Head Coach 1954-62

Ewbank led the Colts to consecutive World Championships in 1958 and 1959. . . defeated the N.Y. Giants 23-17 in sudden death overtime thriller called "the greatest game ever played" . . . beat the Giants again in '59 31-16 to win second world title. . . had a career mark of 59-52-1 in 9 seasons with Colts. . . left Baltimore in '62 to become head coach of the N.Y. Jets. . . led the Jets to a Super Bowl Championship in '68 defeating the Colts 16-7 in Super Bowl III. . . had a career coaching record in New York of 71-77-6, giving him a career record of 130-129-7 for 20 years in the NFL/AFL. . . is the only coach in NFL history to win world championships in both the NFL and AFL. . . nine years as head coach of the Colts is the longest coaching tenure in Colts history. . . born in Richmond, Indiana on May 6, 1907 . . . attended Richmond High School where he was a three sport-star. . . graduated from Miami of Ohio in 1928. . . Coached basketball for 13 years at Miami. . . coached with Paul Brown at the naval base at Great Lakes. . . rejoined Brown in '49 as the Cleveland Browns tackle coach. . . joined the Colts in 1954 succeeding Keith Molesworth.




**GINO MARCHETTI**, Defensive End, 6-4, 245, San Francisco

Marchetti, acclaimed as the greatest defensive end in pro football history during the 1969 NFL 50th anniversary, was inducted into the Hall of Fame on July 29, 1972. . . named all-pro nine consecutive seasons (1956-64) and played in every Pro Bowl game from 1954 through 1964, with the exception of the 1958 game, which he missed with a broken ankle suffered in the "sudden death" championship game against the New York Giants. . . announced retirement after the 1963 season, in which he also served as an assistant coach, but reconsidered and played in 1964. . . retired again following the 1964 season, but returned to play in four games in 1966, when the Colts suffered heavy injuries in the defensive line. . . played his final game on December 18, 1966 in San Francisco. . . fought in the "Battle of the Bulge" during World War II at the age of 18, after graduating from Antioch (Calif.) High School. . . was a 1951 All-West Coast tackle selection at San Francisco and played in the East-West and College All-Star games. . . born January 2, 1927 in Smithers, West Virginia. . . makes his home with his family in Devon, Pa.



**LENNY MOORE**, Running Back & Flanker, 6-1, 190, Penn State

Moore entered the Hall of Fame on August 2, 1975. . . retired in 1967 with 11,213 combined net yards in a 12-year career, including 5174 rushing and 363 pass receptions for 6039 yards. . . scored 678 points on 113 touchdowns with stretches of 18 straight games scoring at least one touchdown and 11 straight scoring at least one touchdown rushing; both are NFL records. . . gained All America honors at Penn State and was the number one draft pick of the Colts in 1956. . . was named 1956 Rookie of the Year. . . selected Comeback Player of the Year and Most Valuable Player in 1964, when he scored 20 touchdowns, after many thought his career had ended. . . born November 25, 1933 in Reading, Pa., and attending Reading High School. . . lives with his wife and children in Baltimore and is Promotions Director of the Colts.



**JIM PARKER**, Guard and Tackle, 6-3, 272, Ohio State

A member of both the Professional and National Football Foundation Halls of Fame. . . the Colts first draft pick in 1957, after twice being named All-America (1955-56) as a guard at Ohio State. . . winner of the 1956 Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman. . . also played linebacker collegiately. . . his 1954 team won the Rose Bowl and the national championship. . . named to the modern all-time All-America college football team in 1969, which was selected as part of the 100th anniversary of college football. . . was all-pro eight consecutive seasons (1958-65) and played in the Pro Bowl following each of those seasons. . . started as the left tackle for the Colts, was moved in 1962 to left guard, and back to tackle in 1966. . . announced retirement near end of the 1967 season in which he only played in three games because of a leg injury. . . played in 139 consecutive games, the second longest string in Colt history. . . streak ended when he missed the Colts game with San Francisco at Memorial Stadium on Oct. 10, 1967. . . born April 3, 1934 in Macon, Georgia and attended Scott High School in Toledo, Ohio. . . lives with his family in Baltimore.



**GREEN BAY 13, BALTIMORE 10**—A courageous effort by the undermanned Colts was doomed by a pair of Don Chandler field goals—one with 1:58 remaining from 22 yards to tie the score and a second of 25 yards to conclude 13:39 of "sudden-death" action. The Colts had jumped ahead 7-0, after 21 seconds of play when Don Shinnick scooped up Bill Anderson's fumble and truded 25 yards to the end zone. They protected their edge tenaciously until the finish as Tom Matte went the route at quarterback, rushing for 57 yards and passing for 40. Zeke Bratkowski, subbing for the injured Bart Starr, completed 22 of 39 aeriels for 248 yards. The Packers ran 80 plays to the Colts' 59 and led in first downs, 23-9. Attendance was 50,484.

The brutal defensive struggle resulted in 11 turnovers, which prevented a fluid, artistic performance but contributed to the drama of the contest. Dallas nearly put the game away early in the third period when, leading 13-6, the Cowboys recovered Jim Duncan's fumble on the 2nd half kickoff and zipped to the Colts' two in five plays. Duane Thomas, however, fumbled on the next play. Rick Volk provided Baltimore with the opportunity to tie halfway through the fourth period when he intercepted Craig Morton on the Dallas 33 and returned it to the three. Tom Nowatzke punctured into the end zone and after O'Brien's PAT it was 13-13. Mike Curtis intercepted another Morton pass on the Dallas 41 in the final minute and ran it back to the 28. The Colts stopped the clock with nine seconds left in the game and O'Brien made history. Morton's desperation pass on the final play of the game was intercepted by Jerry Logan.



Since the Baltimore Colts joined the NFL in 1953, they have won 201 regular season games, lost 143 and tied 6. Only the Cleveland Browns have won more games during that 26 year period. The Browns have a 214-127-9 record.

Since the Colts first World Championship in 1958, the team has won more regular season games than any other NFL franchise. In the 21 year period, the Colts won 178 games, lost 107 and tied 5.

## BALTIMORE MEMORIAL STADIUM


Baltimore Memorial Stadium was completed in 1954. Construction began in 1949, the final season of Baltimore's play in the All-America Football Conference, on the same site as the original Baltimore Stadium. Work continued through 1949 and the 1950 National Football League season without the Colts missing a home game.

Construction was suspended following the dissolution of the Baltimore NFL franchise in 1950, and did not resume until 1952. Work continued through the 1953 season, when the current Colt team moved to the city from Dallas.

The stadium, in its present form, was completed prior to the 1954 season with a capacity of 52,000. Additions brought the capacity up to a high of 60,240 in 1970. Comfort refinements have reduced the current capacity to 56,626 for Colt games played before conversion from the baseball configuration, and 60,763, when the football configuration is completed.

The original Baltimore Stadium was built of wood on mounds of dirt beginning in 1922. It was completed in 1924 with a seating capacity of 80,000 and officially dedicated on November 29, 1924, when 80,150 persons attended the Army-Navy game. Capacity later was reduced to 66,000.





## COLTS PRACTICE FACILITY

On March 28, 1979, ground was broken for the construction of the Colts new three million dollar office/practice complex being built in Owings Mills, Maryland.

The complex will consist of a two story brick and glass building plus two and half practice fields of natural turf.

The complex will house offices for the coaching staff, the general manager and other front office personnel. The Colts Ticket Office will move from its present location in Memorial Stadium to the facility.

On the ground floor level, the players will have their locker room with space for 96 lockers. The trainers and equipment people will have adequate space for treatment and storage. The ground floor will also have meeting rooms and a film processing area.

The facility is scheduled to be open in the fall of 1979.

## COLTS RADIO-TV NETWORK

The Baltimore Colts 1979 Radio Network will cover a five state region plus the District of Columbia. WCBM-AM of Baltimore will serve as the flagship station for the Colts 30 station network. Veteran play by play announcer Chuck Thompson will do the broadcasts and Vince Bagli will do the color.

Thompson has been doing play by play for Baltimore teams since the late 1940s when he moved to the Monument City from Philadelphia. He began his Baltimore career doing the Baltimore Orioles of the International League and the Baltimore Colts of the All American Football Conference. Nationally recognized and nationally honored, Thompson lists his 1958 broadcast of the Colts-Giants "sudden death" NFL championship game and the seventh game of the 1960 Pirates-Yankees World Series as his most memorable assignments.

Bagli has been associated with Baltimore sports for as many years as Thompson. He has worked in both the print media and the electronic media having worked as a sportswriter for the Baltimore News American and for WBAL-Radio and TV. Twice nationally honored, Bagli is a Baltimore sports broadcasting institution.

WMAR-TV (Channel 2) will telecast the Colts four pre-season games. WBAL-TV (Channel 11) will air all the regular season games.

## **THE BALTIMORE COLTS MARCHING BAND**

The Baltimore Colts Marching Band, under the direction of Art Schmersal, will be celebrating its 33rd anniversary this season. The band was founded in 1947 when the Colts played in the All American Football Conference. The band remained active in 1951-52 when Baltimore was without a professional football team and was a strong force in the city regaining an NFL franchise in 1953.

In addition to its pre-game and halftime performances, the band annually appears in local parades and has for the past 17 years served as the official Preakness band. The band is an all volunteer group which starts practicing in late spring.

The band is represented at the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio by its first bass drum donated in 1966. The Colts band was the first to incorporate a cheerleading unit into the band in 1954.

## **THE QUARTERBACK CLUB OF BALTIMORE**

The Quarterback Club was founded in 1959 and meets every Monday night following a Colts home game. Each year the organization sponsors a Scholarship Awards Dinner honoring the top student-athletes in Baltimore. At this dinner, the annual John Unitas Football Man of the Year Award is presented along with High School Coach of Year, Most Valuable Player on the Colts and the Greater Baltimore High School Player of the Year. A \$1000 scholarship is given to the high school Player of the Year.

## **HARRY R. SHRIVER—STADIUM ANNOUNCER**

Harry Shriver will be entering his 16th season as the "Stadium Voice of the Baltimore Colts". He started working at the P.A. microphone in 1964 when he was Sports Director of WFBR Radio. Now General Manager of the station, Shriver has missed only the 1972 season opener against the St. Louis Cardinals because of the flu.

A member of the Award winning "Conference Call" panel, he serves as the Master of Ceremonies for the Quarterback Club's weekly meetings. He has twice served as Chairman of the Baltimore Broadcasters' Coalition and served one term as President of the Maryland-DC-Delaware Broadcasters' Association. He and his wife, Pat, live with their two children in Pikesville, Maryland.

## **COLTS CORRALS**

The Colts Corrals are probably the most unique fan club organization in professional sports. The first Corral was organized in 1958 and since then, 34 other Corrals have been formed covering Maryland, Delaware and Pennsylvania. Colts Corral 954 is the most unusual Corral being formed entirely of inmates at the Maryland Correctional Institute.

The Council of Colts Corrals annually sponsors a convention in Ocean City, Maryland that attracts over 1,000 Colts fans for a football weekend. Other events hosted by the Council or the separate Corrals include award banquets, bull roasts, dinners and golf outings with the proceeds from these events being donated to charitable organizations. Since their formation, the Corrals have contributed over \$100,000 to charities.

The Corrals have been well represented at the Hall of Fame inductions of Gino Marchetti (1972), Jim Parker and Raymond Berry (1973), Lenny Moore (1975) and John Unitas (1979).

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


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
