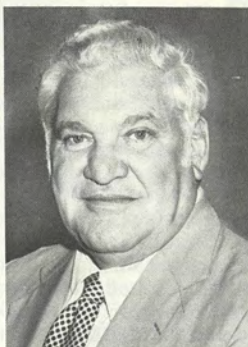

On February 26, 1980, Robert Irsay brought to realization a long awaited dream of the Baltimore Colts, for it was on that date that the dedication of the Colts new multimillion dollar office/training complex was held.

"This building is a symbol of our dedication to bring winning football back to our fans in Baltimore. This facility is second to none in the NFL," stated Irsay at the dedication, "and we want our football team to match the standards set by this building."

Irsay became owner of the Colts on July 26, 1972, when he traded his recently acquired Los Angeles Rams to Carroll Rosenbloom for the Baltimore franchise. Irsay had purchased the Rams from the estate of the late Dan Reeves.

Irsay was born on March 5, 1923, in Chicago's northern "Bucktown" section. He worked his way through the University of Illinois where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering. While attending Illinois, he was an Illini football teammate of former Colt Alex Agase.

After his graduation, he served from 1941 to 1945 in the United States Marine Corps as a member of the First and Fourth Divisions. He had attained the rank of lieutenant at the time of his discharge.

During the years following his discharge from the service, he worked for a ventilation company in Chicago until 1952.

Starting with \$800 borrowed from his wife Harriet's savings account, he formed The Robert Irsay Company of Skokie, Illinois and built it into one of the largest and most respected heating, air conditioning and ventilating companies in the world. During its twenty plus years, The Robert Irsay Company completed contracts on some of the largest buildings in the famed Chicago "Loop." The company also includes Cobo Arena in Detroit, Disney World in Orlando and countless commercial and residential projects among its achievements.

In 1971, Irsay sold his company to a company listed on the New York Stock Exchange. He remained associated with the firm until 1978 when he formed Colt Construction and Development Company and its affiliate Colt Developers Co., diversified construction and development companies, with offices in Baltimore, Los Angeles, Denver and Chicago. These companies were responsible for the construction of the Colt complex.

His success in the business world has enabled him to make significant contributions of time and money to many charitable organizations. A strong supporter of the Colts Corrals, he has contributed heavily to their charities as well as to the Stritch School of Medicine at Loyola University. He is a director of and an active fund raiser for the Clearbrook Center for Retarded Children in Rolling Meadows, Illinois and for the Troubled Children's Foundation Center in Hialeah, Florida. For his community work in Baltimore, Irsay was honored by the Eastside Athletic Club as their "1978 Man of the Year." He is a member of the Executive Committee of NFL Properties, which dedicates a majority of its earnings to NFL Charities. He has served as Tournament Chairman for the NFL/Colts Alumni Charity Golf Classic held in Baltimore for the benefit of the Maryland Special Olympics.

Irsay and his wife, Harriet, have two sons, Tom (29) and Jim (24). Jim is now working with the Colts in the Player Personnel Department. He and his wife, Meg, have two daughters, Carlie Margaret (2) and Casey Coyle, born February 10, 1983.

ERNIE ACCORSI

General Manager



Baltimore Colts General Manager Ernie Accorsi and the message he brings to Colts fans throughout Baltimore: "I've been with the Colts organization a long time—it's the only franchise I ever worked for—and I want to see us win. I know the fans do, and they deserve it," says Accorsi.

In only one season as the Colts General Manager, Accorsi has already established a reputation as one of the most visible and acces-

sible front office leaders in the National Football League. In addition to a continuing involvement with the Council of Colts Corals, the Quarterback Club of Baltimore and the Colts Chapter of the NFL Alumni, Accorsi is active in a variety of local civic and youth groups including the Boy Scouts, Optimist Clubs, Rotary Clubs and Sports Boosters. He has brought the Colts message to a variety of local business groups ranging from the Steel Club of Baltimore to the National Association of Accountants to the Advertising Association of Baltimore. The 41-year old Accorsi has participated in a variety of golf tournaments, bowlathons and telethons for the benefit of local charities. He was honored as the Grand Marshall for the Colts Convention Parade in Ocean City, Maryland last June and was selected as recipient of the 1982 Columbus Award granted by the Italian American Organizations United of Maryland.

Accorsi was named the Colts General Manager on May 16, 1982, after twelve years of service in the National Football League, including ten with the Baltimore Colts. In 1975 and 1976, he was on NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle's staff, serving as assistant to the President of the National Football Conference.

Accorsi joined the Colts in 1970 as Public Relations Director and returned in 1977 as Assistant General Manager. During the past five years, he has assisted in policymaking decisions involving all aspects of the Colts' organization. Accorsi directed the development of the Colts' 1981 off-season marketing campaign which increased season ticket sales. This was the first increase following a sub-.500 season in 25 years. He also participated in negotiation of player contracts and radio/TV agreements in addition to serving as liaison with the National Football League office.

The Colts won Super Bowl V in Accorsi's first year in the League and he was later selected to work five additional Super Bowls as a member of the League's staff. He was also on three Pro Bowl staffs.

A native of Hershey, Pennsylvania, Accorsi graduated from Wake Forest University in 1963. He worked as a sportswriter for the Charlotte News prior to service in the U.S. Army and then joined the staff of the Baltimore Evening Sun in 1964. He was the Sports Publicity Director at St. Joseph's College (Philadelphia) in 1965 when the Hawks were named the preseason number one college basketball team in the nation by Sports Illustrated. Accorsi returned to the newspaper business in 1966 with the Philadelphia Inquirer, where he covered football and basketball, including the regular assignment of the Philadelphia 76ers. In 1969 he was hired by current Athletic Director Jim Tarman as Assistant Sports Information Director at Penn State University. It was a year when Penn State finished number two in the country in both national wire service polls and produced five First Team All America selections.

FRANK KUSH HEAD COACH

In his first season as Head Coach of the Baltimore Colts, Frank Kush embarked on a rebuilding program which resulted in a two-thirds turnover in personnel to make the Colts the youngest team in the National Football League. In spite of this dramatic transition, Kush led the Colts to their first winning preseason mark (3-2) since 1970 but an eight-week players' strike interrupted the 1982 campaign and the Colts finished with a regular season record of 0-8-1.



The transition which marked Kush's first year as Head Coach was a necessary and important element in laying the foundation for a successful team in the future. Kush approaches the Colts rebuilding program with a philosophy which has proven effective over nearly a quarter century of coaching.

"My coaching philosophy is a disciplined approach which emphasizes conditioning and the fundamentals of the game in addition to mental preparation," says Kush, "but above all, everyone must be motivated toward the same objective. . . success." Kush's career record as a head coach is proof that his approach to the game is both sound and successful.

During his 22 year tenure (1958-79) as head coach at Arizona State University, Kush compiled one of the most impressive records in college football history. His career record of 176-54-1 (a .764 winning percentage) was ranked second among active NCAA coaches at the time of his departure from ASU.

Kush entered the professional ranks for the first time in 1981 when he was named head coach of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League. He continued his success in the CFL by posting an 11-4-1 mark which earned a first place finish in the Eastern Conference.

Kush succeeded Dan Devine as head coach at Arizona State in 1958 after serving three years as the varsity line coach. He posted a winning record in 20 of 21 full seasons while moving the Sun Devils from the Border Conference to the Western Athletic Conference (1962) and then to the Pac-10 (1978). His clubs won two Border Conference titles and seven WAC titles in addition to posting a 6-1 mark in bowl competition.

One of Kush's most memorable bowl wins came in 1975 when the Sun Devils defeated heavily favored co-Big Eight champion Nebraska, 17-14, in the Fiesta Bowl. The victory concluded a perfect 12-0 campaign for Arizona State and earned the team a number two ranking in both national wire service polls and a number one national ranking by the Sporting News. For his efforts with the '75 club, which contained only eight seniors, Kush was named "Coach of the Year" by the American Football Coaches Association and by the Walter Camp Foundation.

One of fifteen children, Kush was born on January 20, 1929 in Windber, Pennsylvania. He won All State honors on the Windber High football team and was elected class president three times. In 1948, he enrolled at Washington and Lee but transferred to Michigan State after one semester. He earned All American honors as a 175 pound defensive guard and played in only one losing effort during his three year Spartan career.

Kush has earned a Master's Degree in Education from ASU. He and his wife, Fran, have three sons. Dan (28) holds several ASU placekicking records and works as an engineer in Arizona. David (26) is a fourth year medical school student at the University of Arizona. Damian (22) is a junior at ASU majoring in architectural design.

ZEKE BRATKOWSKI, Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

The most experienced NFL coach on Frank Kush's staff is Zeke Bratkowski who serves as the Colts offensive coordinator and quarterback coach. Prior to joining the Colts last year, Bratkowski served as an assistant in the National Football League for 12 seasons including the last three years as offensive backfield coach for the Green Bay Packers. He began his NFL coaching career in 1969-70 as Green Bay's backfield coach before serving as an assistant on the Chicago Bears staff from 1972-74. In 1975, he rejoined the Packers as quarterback coach. Bratkowski played 14 seasons in the NFL at quarterback beginning in 1953 when he was the Bears number two draft choice. After one season with Chicago, he spent two years in the Air Force before returning to the Bears from 1957-60. He played with the Los Angeles Rams from 1961-63 and then moved to Green Bay where he played from 1963-68 and 1971. Bratkowski was born on October 20, 1931 in Danville, Illinois. He and his wife, Mary Elizabeth, have three children, Robert (26), Steve (23) and Kassie (21).



GUNTHER CUNNINGHAM, Defensive Line

Gunther Cunningham will again be in charge of the Colts defensive line. Before joining the Colts coaching staff in 1982, he handled the defensive linemen and linebackers for Frank Kush's Hamilton Tiger-Cat club of the CFL during the 1981 season. Prior to working with Kush at Hamilton, he served four seasons (1977-80) at the University of California where he worked with the defensive secondary in 1977 and then served as defensive coordinator in his final three years under Colts runningback coach Roger Theder. After his graduation from the University of Oregon in 1968, Cunningham coached the Ducks defensive line for three seasons (1969-71) before moving to Arkansas as defensive secondary coach (1972) and then to Stanford to handle the linemen (1973-76). Born on June 19, 1946 in Munich, Germany, Cunningham was raised in Lompac, California. He and his wife, Rene, reside with their daughter Natalie (7) and infant son Adam in Reisterstown, Md.



HAL HUNTER, Offensive Line

Entering his second season with the Baltimore Colts, Hal Hunter brings 25 years of coaching expertise to his post as the Colts offensive line coach. In 1981, he served on Frank Kush's Hamilton staff as both offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. Hunter started his collegiate coaching career at Richmond where he handled the defensive line from 1958-61. He then served as offensive line coach at West Virginia (1962-63), Maryland (1964-65), Duke (1966-70), Kentucky where he was also offensive coordinator (1971-72) and Indiana University in Bloomington, Ind. (1973-76). In 1977, he was named head coach at California (Pa.) State College where he spent four years before joining Kush in the CFL in 1981. Hunter was a three year starter at Pitt as a linebacker and offensive guard. Born on June 3, 1934 in Canonsburg, Pa., he and his wife, Eileen have two daughters, Heidi (27) and Heather (26) and one son, Hal (23) and reside in Pikesville, Md.



RICHARD MANN, Wide Receivers

A former player and coach under Frank Kush at Arizona State, Richard Mann enters his second year with the Baltimore Colts as receivers coach. Before joining the Colts coaching staff in 1982, he served for eight years as a coach on the collegiate level. From 1980-81, Mann served as receivers coach at Louisville. Prior to his stay at Louisville, he coached for six seasons under Kush at Arizona State in charge of the receivers. As a player, Mann earned three varsity letters at Arizona State under Kush. He started as a flanker but moved to the starting tight end position for his final two seasons. He caught 28 passes for 340 yards during his collegiate career. Mann was born on April 20, 1947 in Aliquippa, Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Karen, have three children, Deven (5), Richard (3) and Mario (1), and reside in Randallstown, Md.



ROGER THEDER, Running Backs

Entering his second season with the Baltimore Colts, Roger Theder is in charge of the Colts running backs. Before joining the Colts staff in 1982, he served as head coach at the University of California for four years (1978-81), after handling the Golden Bears' quarterbacks and receivers from 1972-77. During his collegiate coaching career, Theder contributed to the development of All American quarterbacks such as Rich Campbell, Steve Bartkowski and Jim Plunkett. He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Bowling Green in 1963 before moving to Northern Illinois as quarterbacks and receivers coach (1964-67). He served as quarterbacks coach at Stanford from 1968-71 and the Cardinals were Rose Bowl winners in each of his last two seasons. Theder is a graduate of Western Michigan where he lettered three years at quarterback and earned All Conference honors as a senior. Theder was born on September 22, 1939 in Watertown, Wisconsin. He and his wife, Marie, have three children, Rick (17), Denae (15) and Monique (10) and reside in Lutherville, Md.



BOB VALESENTE, Defensive Backs

In his second season with the Baltimore Colts, Bob Valesente will coach the Colts defensive backs. Before joining the Colts staff in 1982, Valesente served two years as defensive coordinator at Mississippi State (1980-81). He began his collegiate coaching career at Cornell in 1964 where he handled both the linebackers and defensive secondary in ten seasons. He then moved to the University of Cincinnati where he coached the defensive secondary (1976-77) before taking the same position at Arizona (1978-80). Valesente was a four year letterman at running back and defensive back at Ithaca where he also earned All America honors as a centerfielder on the baseball squad. After graduation, he played two seasons (1963-64) of Class A baseball in the Chicago Cubs organization before earning his Master's Degree in Physical Education from Ithaca in 1965. Valesente was born on July 19, 1940 in Seneca Falls, N.Y. He and his wife, Joan, have three children, Ginger (17), Bobby (14) and Michelle (3) and reside in Cockeysville, Md.



RICK VENTURI, Linebackers

Entering his second year of coaching at the professional level, Rick Venturi will again handle the Colts linebacking unit. He joined the Baltimore staff in 1982 after serving as a guest linebacker coach for Frank Kush's Hamilton club during training camp in 1981. Venturi had coached for 13 years at the collegiate level including three seasons (1978-80) as head coach at Northwestern. He began his coaching career at his alma matter serving as the freshman coach in 1968-69 before taking charge of the defensive secondary (1970-72) at the varsity level. In 1973 he moved to Purdue where he handled the linebackers for four seasons before taking the defensive backfield post at Illinois in 1977. He lettered three years at Northwestern as quarterback, defensive back and linebacker. Born on February 23, 1946 in Taylorville, Illinois, Venturi was raised in the Decatur, Rockford and Pekin sections of Illinois. He and his wife, Cheri, have two children, Marin (12) and Jason (10) and reside in Reisterstown, Md.



MIKE WESTHOFF,

Tight Ends/Special Teams/Weight Training Coordinator

In his second year with the Baltimore Colts and as the youngest member of Frank Kush's eight-man staff, Mike Westhoff will serve as the team's tight ends and special teams coach as well as weight training coordinator. The 34 year old Westhoff worked as offensive line coach at Texas Christian in 1981 after working three seasons in the same capacity at Northwestern under Colts linebacker coach Rick Venturi. While at Northwestern, he also assisted in the weight training program. Westhoff initially entered the college ranks in 1974 as a graduate assistant and later a part-time coach at Indiana University in Bloomington, Ind. where he handled the linebackers and defensive line. He moved to a full-time post as offensive line coach at Dayton in 1976 before taking over the defensive line and linebackers at Indiana State in 1977. Westhoff was a starting tight end for three years at Wichita State, earning MVP honors as a junior. Born on January 10, 1948 in Pittsburgh, he was raised in Bethel Park, Pa. He and his wife, Marilyn, have one son, John (2) and reside in Owings Mills, Md.



JIM IRSAY, Player Personal Department

Jim Irsay joined the Colts organization in January, 1982 after his graduation from Southern Methodist University. After a period of orientation in all the administrative and football aspects of the organization, Jim was added to the Club's Personnel Department during the past off-season. His duties include college scouting and breaking down films as well as administrative and business responsibilities. Jim received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Broadcast Journalism from SMU where he played one and a half years as a linebacker under current New England Patriot head coach Ron Meyer. He was born on June 13, 1959 in Lincolnwood, Illinois and attended Loyola Academy in Wilmette, Illinois. He and his wife, Meg, have two daughters, Carlie (2) and Casey, born February 10, 1983, and reside in Timonium, Maryland.



JOHN LOPEZ, Head Trainer

John Lopez joined the Colts training staff in June of 1979 after serving as assistant trainer for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers since 1976. Before joining the Buccaneers, he worked six years as assistant, then head trainer at the University of Tampa. He started his training career while a student at Tampa. He graduated in 1971 with a degree in Physical Education.

A life long resident of Tampa, he has served as head trainer for the Lions American Bowl and the Can-Am Bowl which were played annually in Tampa during January.

He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Associations and the American College of Sports Medicine. He has also served as a member of the Committee on Sports Eye Safety of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.



HUNTER SMITH, Assistant Trainer

Hunter Smith joined the Colts training staff last May after serving as Head Athletic Trainer at the College of William and Mary in 1982. Prior to joining the staff at William and Mary, Smith served ten years as an Assistant Professor in Physical Education and Head Athletic Trainer at Salisbury State College. A Certified Athletic Trainer, he was one of the founding leaders of the Maryland State Certified Athletic Trainers Association. Smith earned a Bachelors degree in Physical Education from Florida State University in 1971 and a Masters degree in Physical Education and Health from Tennessee Technological University one year later. He is currently serving on the Board of Directors of the National Athletic Trainers Association. A native of Salisbury, Maryland, he and his wife, Susan, have one daughter, Kelly.



JON SCOTT, Equipment Manager

Jon Scott joined the Colts in March, 1982 as Assistant Equipment Manager and was elevated to head of the Club's equipment staff in November of the same year. Before joining the Colts on a full-time basis, Scott worked as Assistant Equipment Manager at Arizona State University for two years. His association with the Colts began when he worked as Assistant to the Equipment Manager during the Club's 1979 and 1980 summer training camps. Scott received a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Michigan State University in 1980 where he served as a student equipment manager for six years (1975-80). Born on December 18, 1956, Scott is a native of East Lansing, Michigan. He is single and resides in Owings Mills, Maryland.



JACK BUSHOFSKY, Player Personnel Director

Jack Bushofsky was named the Colts Player Personnel Director in June, 1983 and is responsible for directing the college scouting aspects of the Colts personnel department. Bushofsky served the past four years as college and pro personnel scout with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Before joining the Bucs in 1979, he worked two years as a BLESTO combine scout. The 45-year old Pittsburgh native has had an extensive career in football serving as head coach at his alma mater, Austin Peay (1973-76), assistant coach at Villanova (1968-72), and several years in the Pittsburgh high school system. After serving in the Marine Corps, he earned Little All-America honors as a guard and linebacker at Austin Peay from 1959-61 where he received a Bachelor's degree in Health and Education and a Master's degree in Administration. Born on October 8, 1937 in Pittsburgh, he and his wife, Mary Ann, have three children, Danielle (15), Jeffery (13) and Bryne Marie (8).



BOB TERPENING, Pro Personnel Director

NOTES ON 1982 RESULTS AND OPPONENTS

- ***For the second consecutive year, Baltimore played the most difficult schedule in the National Football League. The Colts opponents in '82 had a combined winning percentage of .648 (52-28-1) compared to the next toughest schedules of Philadelphia and Tampa Bay at .580 (47-34). In 1981, Baltimore's opponents had a winning percentage of .5555 (140-112-4) compared to Seattle's .5551 opponents winning mark.
- ***Seven of the Colts eight 1982 opponents qualified for the playoffs (Cincinnati, Green Bay, Miami, Minnesota, New England, NY Jets and San Diego) and had winning records.
- ***The Colts played only *one* team in 1982 that finished the season with a losing record (Buffalo at 4-5).
- ***The Colts had the *youngest team* in the NFL in '82 with an average age of 24.87 years and an average of 1.9 years of NFL experience entering the season.
- ***There were *31 new additions* to the 49-man active roster (63% turnover) including 21 players entering their first season in the NFL (14 rookies, 7 first year men). Six of 22 starters were either rookies or first year men.

The Colts first regular season home opener in 12 years was marred by injuries and second half miscues as Baltimore dropped a 24-13 decision to the New England Patriots at Memorial Stadium. The Colts played the Patriots to a 10-10 tie in the first half before succumbing to key injuries, mistakes and an overpowering Patriot offensive line in the second half. New England's offensive line asserted itself early in the contest gaining 158 of its game total 227 rushing yards (5.2 yards per carry for the afternoon) in the first half. The Patriots offense was able to convert two of the Colts four second half turnovers (a David Humm interception and a Cleveland Franklin fumble) into touchdowns which proved to be the deciding points of the contest. In addition, the Colts sustained injuries to several key performers including rookie QB-Mike Pagel (mild concussion), RB-Curtis Dickey (shoulder/hamstring), FB-Randy McMillan (mouth) and WRs Ray Butler and Matt Bouza (muscle cramps). All five were starters on the offensive unit and all but McMillan missed most of the second half. The Colts eight possessions during the final two periods resulted in a field goal, 3 punts, 3 interceptions and one lost fumble. Three Colt QBs threw a season-high 46 passes and completed 20 for 239 yards. The Colts top receivers were Matt Bouza (6 for 76) and Zachary Dixon (4 for 60). Dixon also led the Colts running attack with 47 yards on 8 carries. Baltimore's defense was led by LB-Barry Krauss (7 tackles, 2 assists) and LB-Cliff Odom (5 tackles, 3 assists). CB-Derrick Hatchett recorded the Colts first interception of the season.

With several offensive performers returning to the starting lineup, the Colts effort was significantly improved as the club dropped a hard-fought 24-20 decision to the Miami Dolphins at the Orange Bowl. On the strength of a 17 point second quarter outburst, the Colts held a 3-point lead at halftime but managed to score only 3 second half points in succumbing to the defending AFC Eastern Division champions. "The big difference between this game and the opener against New England was that we ran the ball better," said Colts head coach Frank Kush afterwards, "that was our gameplan." Indeed, Baltimore gained 160 yards on the ground and was led by Zachary Dixon's career-high 87 yards on 20 carries. The Dolphins jumped out to a 14-0 first quarter lead before the Colts responded with 17 unanswered points to take a 3 point lead at halftime. Baltimore scores came on a 53 yard TD pass from Mike Pagel to Ray Butler, Mike Wood's career-long 51 yard field goal and Wood's 5 yard TD pass to LB-Barry Krauss after a mishandled field goal placement. Miami scored 10 third quarter points to take a 24-17 lead while the Colts were able to manage only a 48 yard field goal from Wood for the remainder of the contest. Pagel completed 8 of 16 passes for 124 yards and his first career TD pass to Butler. Dixon was the Colts top receiver with 3 catches for 18 yards. The Colts defense was led by FS-Nesby Glasgow with 8 tackles and 5 assists. Krauss recorded the Colts first QB sack of the season.

After the conclusion of the 57-day NFL players strike, the Colts resumed the 1982 regular season schedule with a 37-0 loss to the New York Jets at Shea Stadium. The defeat was the most decisive for a Colt club since a 42-0 loss to the Miami Dolphins in Baltimore on September 10, 1978. The Jets dominated the Colts in all phases of the game including total yards (476-318), rushing yardage (227-88), total first downs (29-18) and time of possession (35:51-24:09). The New York club was able to score on seven of its nine offensive possessions throughout the game. The Colts offense was characterized by an inability to execute in key situations. Baltimore's longest drive of the game covered 60 yards in 14 plays during the first quarter but ended when a 32 yard field goal by Mike Wood was blocked. One Colt drive to the Jets 5 yardline was stopped on downs while another possession ended at the New York 9 yardline with an interception. Colts QB-Mike Pagel completed 17 of 34 passes for a season-high 230 yards but threw two interceptions. His top receivers were TE-Tim Sherwin (5 for 92 yards) and WR-Ray Butler who had 3 receptions for a season-high 57 yards. Top tacklers on the defense were FS-Nesby Glasgow (7 tackles, 6 assists) and LB-Cliff Odom (8 tackles, 3 assists). SS-Jeff Delaney had a QB sack. The game's top rushing effort was turned in by Jets RB-Freeman McNeil who gained 123 yards on 22 carries and scored one TD in addition to catching a 32 yard TD pass from Richard Todd. Todd completed 13 of 27 passes for 231 yards and 2 TDs.

GAME FOUR—November 28**Buffalo 20—Baltimore 0****Rich Stadium****33,985**

The Colts were shut out for the second consecutive week as the club's trip to Buffalo's Rich Stadium resulted in a rain-soaked 20-0 defeat. Neither club was able to pass the football effectively under slippery conditions as Colts QB-Mike Pagel completed only 3 of 17 passes for 62 yards (tying a club record for fewest pass completions in a game) while Bills signal-caller Joe Ferguson managed only 6 of 16 for 63 yards. Ball control was the key factor in the game as Buffalo had possession for nearly three quarters of the contest (44:40) to Baltimore's one quarter (15:20). Using a ground-oriented attack, the Bills were able to generate a total yardage advantage of 312-88 over the Colts. The Colts defense surrendered a season-high 245 yards on the ground while permitting a season-low 67 yards through the air. Meanwhile, the Colts attack had its poorest showing of the season recording season-low totals of 88 total yards including 36 rushing and 52 passing. Baltimore's 88 yard offensive showing came close to breaking the club mark for fewest net yards in a game (69 vs Detroit on Nov. 6, 1954). The Colts were unable to move the football into Buffalo territory throughout the entire game with their deepest advance only to their own 49 yardline. Leading tacklers on the Colts defense were FS-Nesby Glasgow (12 tackles, 6 assists) and DE-Donnell Thompson (11 tackles, 5 assists). The game's primary offensive weapons were Buffalo runningbacks Joe Cribbs and Roosevelt Leaks who led the Bills ground attack with 94 and 90 yards respectively.

GAME FIVE—December 5**Cincinnati 20—Baltimore 17****Memorial Stadium****23,598**

After two consecutive shutouts, the young Colts rebounded with their most exciting and inspired effort of the season in losing to the defending American Conference champion Cincinnati Bengals, 20-17 at Memorial Stadium. A 40 yard field goal by the Colts' Mike Wood sailed short and wide left with three seconds remaining in the game or the Colts would have taken the Super Bowl runner-up Bengals into overtime. A key factor in the game was the ability of Baltimore's rushing attack to gain a season-high 210 yards against a Cincinnati defense which entered the contest leading the AFC by allowing an average of only 52 rushing yards per game. The Colts opened the scoring with a 17 yard touchdown pass from Mike Pagel to Ray Butler. The Bengals responded in the second quarter when QB-Ken Anderson hit WR-Steve Kreider with a 24 yard scoring toss but Colts DE-Donnell Thompson blocked the extra point. The Colts defense turned in another impressive effort but the offense was ineffective as the Baltimore club dropped its sixth consecutive game of the '82 campaign, 13-10, to the Minnesota Vikings in the Metrodome. Colts head coach Frank Kush praised the performance of his young defense which surrendered a season-low 13 points against a potent Viking attack. Rookie CB-James Burroughs intercepted a Tommy Kramer pass and returned it 94 yards (to tie a club record) for the Colts only touchdown of the afternoon. The Colts attack was able to post only 3 points during the afternoon while posting its second-lowest total yardage figure (198) of the season. Kramer threw for 258 yards and RB-Ted Brown was the game's leading rusher with 75 yards. Colts QB-Mike Pagel completed 14 of 32 passes for 116 yards and threw 2 interceptions while under heavy pressure all afternoon. His top target was FB-Randy McMillan who caught a season-high 5 passes for 32 yards. The top Colt tackler was LB-Greg Bracelin with 7 and 6 assists.

After two consecutive 3-point losses, the Colts moved closer to the victory column by gaining a 20-20 tie with Green Bay at Memorial Stadium. Trailing 20-6 early in the fourth quarter, Baltimore scored two touchdowns in the final seven minutes to send the contest into overtime and both teams were unable to connect on potential game-winning field goals in the extra period. The Colts newly acquired placekicker Dan Miller gave his club a 3-0 first quarter lead with a 23 yard field goal but the Packers responded with 10 second quarter points to take a 10-3 lead at halftime. The two clubs each added a field goal in the third quarter and Green Bay padded its lead to 20-6 when RB-Eddie Lee Ivery scored on a one yard run early in the fourth period. The Colts defense surrendered season-high point and yardage totals as San Diego's league-leading attack rolled up 510 yards total offense while posting a 44-26 win at Jack Murphy Stadium. Charger QB-Dan Fouts, the AFC's top rated passer entering the contest, threw for 298 yards and 5 TDs including 3 to TE-Kellen Winslow while RB-Chuck Muncie added 126 yards on the ground. Two of the Colts season-high 5 turnovers (4 fumbles, 1 INT) occurred on the club's first two possessions as both drives were stopped by fumbles. San Diego then proceeded to score 23 unanswered points as Fouts threw TD passes of 30 and 13 yards to Winslow and 41 yards to WR-Wes Chandler while Rolf Benirschke added a 41 yard field goal. The Colts responded with three scores to cut the margin to 23-13 but it was as close as they would come to the lead for the remainder of the contest. Baltimore equaled its season-high 5 turnovers (3 fumbles, 2 INTs) and K-Dan Miller missed three first half field goals as the Colts finished a winless season. The Colts improved in several defensive categories in 1982 including points allowed per game (33.3 to 26.2), total yardage allowed per game (424.6 to 366.2), opponent's third down efficiency (51.4% to 43.7%) and putting more pressure on the opposing quarterback. The Colts defense recorded 11 sacks in 9 contests last year compared to 13 sacks over 16 games in 1981.

HISTORY OF THE COLTS

Professional football came to the city of Baltimore when it was awarded a franchise in the All-America Football Conference on December 28, 1946. Bob Rodenberg headed a purchasing group which acquired the bankrupt Miami Seahawks and after a contest among the Baltimore fans, won by Charles Evans of Middle River, Maryland, the team was renamed the "Colts."

On September 7, 1947, wearing green and silver uniforms, the Colts under head coach Cecil Isbell won their initial AAFC game, 16-7, over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The team concluded its inaugural season before a record Baltimore crowd of 51,583 losing to the New York Yankees, 21-7. The Colts finished the year with a 2-11-1 record good for a fourth place finish in the Eastern Division.

Baltimore completed the 1948 season with a 7-8 record, tying the Buffalo Bills for the division title. The Colts compiled a 1-11 slate in 1949. The All-America Football Conference and the National Football League merged in 1950 and the Colts became a member of the NFL. After posting a 1-11 record for the second consecutive year, the franchise was dissolved by the league on January 18, 1951 because of its failing financial condition.

After two full seasons without professional football, the people of Baltimore were challenged by NFL Commissioner Bert Bell in December of 1952 to purchase 15,000 season tickets within six weeks in order to re-enter the NFL. The ticket drive was initiated on December 8, 1952 and the 15,000 ticket quota was attained in four weeks and three days.

On January 23, 1953, under the principle ownership of Carroll Rosenbloom, Baltimore was awarded the NFL's Dallas Texan franchise. The Baltimore team continued to use the name "Colts" and inherited the blue and white team colors worn by the Texans.

Before their first NFL season, the "new" Baltimore Colts engineered one of the biggest trades in sports history. In a deal with the Cleveland Browns involving 15 players, Baltimore received 10 Browns in exchange for 5 Colts. Among the players who came to Baltimore in the deal were Don Shula, Bert Rechichar, Carl Taseff and Art Spinney. These players helped the Colts open the 1953 NFL season with a 13-9 upset of the Chicago Bears in a game where Bert Rechichar set a then NFL record with a 56 yard field goal.

In 1954, Baltimore hired Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Ewbank would guide the Colts for the next nine seasons (the longest tenure of any Colt head coach) and lead the club to its first divisional and World Championships.

On November 30, 1958, the Colts clinched their first Western Division title with a 35-27 win over San Francisco before a record home sellout crowd of 57,557. Four weeks later, Baltimore won its first World Championship, downing the New York Giants, 23-17, in the fabled "sudden-death" overtime contest at Yankee Stadium. The Colts repeated as champions in 1959, clinching their second Western Division crown and defeating the Giants, 31-16 in Baltimore for the World Title.

In January 1963, Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as the team's third head coach since 1953. During the 1963 campaign, quarterback John Unitas led the Colt offense to eight team records and set a then NFL individual passing mark of 237 completions. The Colts won a club record eleven consecutive games

in 1964, enroute to clinching their third Western Conference title and first under Shula. During that campaign, Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored 20 touchdowns, both NFL records at the time. The following year, Baltimore tied Green Bay for the Western Conference title. With halfback Tom Matte quarterbacking the club because of injuries to John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo, the Colts lost a controversial 13-10 "sudden-death" playoff contest to the Packers.

Under Shula, Baltimore made its first Super Bowl appearance in 1968. The club finished first in the Coastal Division with a 13-1 mark then defeated Minnesota, 24-14, in the Western Conference Championship game and blanked Cleveland, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. The team went on to face the American Football League Champion New York Jets in Super Bowl III, losing a 16-7 upset.

In May of 1969, the NFL merged with the AFL and Baltimore, Pittsburgh and Cleveland joined the old AFL teams to form the American Football Conference of the NFL. For the 1970 season, the Colts were situated in the Eastern Division of the AFC and on September 20, the club won its first AFC game, 16-14 over San Diego. In mid-December, Baltimore clinched its first Eastern Division Championship with a 20-14 win at Buffalo, then defeated Cincinnati and Oakland in the playoffs to win the AFC Championship. On January 17, 1971, the Colts defeated the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl V, 16-13, on Jim O'Brien's 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining in the game.

In July, 1972, the Colts came under new ownership as Robert Irsay acquired the club from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams.

In 1974, two young Colt stars established NFL records as runningback Lydell Mitchell carried the ball 40 times against the New York Jets at Shea Stadium and quarterback Bert Jones completed 17 consecutive passes against the same Jet club later in the season. Mitchell set another mark that season, winning the league pass receiving title with 72 receptions.

In 1975, Mitchell would continue his record-setting pace by becoming the first runningback in Colt history to rush for 1,000 yards, gaining 1,193 yards on 289 carries.

After posting a 2-12 record in 1974, Baltimore's fortunes began to change with the hiring of Ted Marchibroda as head coach in February, 1975. Marchibroda led the Colts to three consecutive Eastern Division titles before posting back-to-back 5-11 seasons in 1978-79.

The Colts named Mike McCormack to replace Marchibroda as head coach in January, 1980. Shortly thereafter, the Club moved its headquarters to a new \$5 million office/training complex in Owings Mills, Maryland. The Colts improved to a 7-9 record in 1980 before recording the worst record in Club history with a 2-14 slate last season.

On December 21, 1981, the Colts named Frank Kush to replace McCormack as Head Coach. In addition, Club owner Robert Irsay announced the appointment of Ernie Accorsi as General Manager on May 16, 1982.

Under Kush's guidance, the Colts recorded their first winning preseason record (3-2) since 1970. After two weeks of regular season play, a players' strike resulted in the loss of seven games per team from the 1982 schedule and each team played a nine game schedule. The Colts finished the season with a record of 0-8-1.

Baltimore received the first selection in the April 26, 1983 NFL draft and selected Stanford quarterback John Elway. Six days later on May 2, the Colts traded Elway to Denver in exchange for the Broncos' 1983 first round choice, offensive tackle Chris Hinton, along with quarterback Mark Herrmann and Denver's first round choice in the 1984 NFL draft.

In 30 years of National Football League competition, the Colts have posted a 225-192-7 record, including three World Championships and ten Conference or Divisional titles. Baltimore's regular season victory total of 215 is the third highest of any NFL club over the last three decades.

The success of the Baltimore franchise is exemplified by the number of Colts who have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. A total of six players have been selected for enshrinement including Raymond Berry, Art Donovan, Gino Marchetti, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker, John Unitas and head coach Weeb Ewbank.

- Spring, 1948**—Colts reorganize with over 200 stockholders. Jake Embry named president and Walt Driskill, general manager.
- December 12, 1948**—Buffalo Bills win playoff game for Eastern Division title in Baltimore 28-17 in game marked by near riot. Colts finish 7-8 under Isbell. Dick Barwegen named all-league guard and attendance totals 244,502.
- Spring, 1949**—Driskill succeeds Embry as president, while continuing as general manager.
- Fall, 1949**—Isbell fired after first four games and Driskill named coach. Team finishes seventh in Eastern Division with 1-11 record. Barwegen again named all-league.
- December 9, 1949**—National Football League and AAFC reach "peace" agreement and Colts enter NFL for 1950 season.
- December 18, 1949**—Abraham Watner named Colts' president.
- Spring, 1950**—Clem Crowe named head coach.
- December 10, 1950**—Colts conclude 1-11 season with 15-14 defeat to Yanks at Yankee Stadium. Yanks will later become the Baltimore Colts.
- January 18, 1951**—Watner withdraws franchise and is paid \$50,000 for players by NFL.
- December 3, 1952**—Commissioner Bert Bell, addressing Advertising Club, issues challenge to Baltimore to sell 15,000 season tickets in six weeks to re-enter NFL.
- December 8, 1952**—Ticket drive officially begins with quota reached in four weeks, three days.
- January 11, 1953**—Carroll Rosenbloom, with 52 per cent control, heads ownership group including William F. Hilgenberg, Zanvyl Krieger, Thomas Mullan, Sr., and R. Bruce Livie.
- January 23, 1953**—Baltimore awarded Dallas Texan franchise. Don Kellett named president and general manager and Keith Molesworth, head coach.
- March 25, 1953**—Baltimore and Cleveland put together one of the biggest deals in sports history, a trade which involved 15 players. The Colts acquired 10 ex-Browns in exchange for five Colts. Players acquired by the Colts were quarterback Harry Agganis, tackle Dick Batten, end Gern Nagler, halfback Bert Rechichar, guard Ed Sharkey, tackle Stu Sheetz, halfback Don Shula, end Art Spinney, halfback Carl Taseff and guard Elmer Willhoite. Going to the Browns were linebacker Tom Catlin, tackle Don Colo, guard Hershel Forrester, tackle Mike McCormack and halfback John Petibon.

- September 27, 1953—Colts upset Chicago Bears 13-9 in NFL opener at Memorial Stadium before 23,715 fans.
- Spring, 1954—Weeb Ewbank named head coach.
- February 4, 1957—Carroll Rosenbloom named president.
- November 2, 1958—Colts record club's first shutout, 56-0 over Green Bay Packers, to win sixth straight game and also set club record for largest margin of victory.
- November 16, 1958—Colts defeat Chicago 17-0, marking first shutout for Bears in 149 games.
- November 30, 1958—Colts clinch first Western Division title 35-27 over San Francisco before second straight record home sellout crowd of 57,557.
- December 28, 1958—Colts defeat New York Giants 23-17 at Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" game for World Championship.
- December 12, 1959—Colts score 24 fourth quarter points to rally from 10-point deficit and defeat Los Angeles 45-26 at the Coliseum for second Western Division championship.
- December 27, 1959—Colts beat New York Giants 31-16 in Baltimore for second straight World Championship.
- December 11, 1960—Touchdown passing streak by John Unitas snapped by Los Angeles at NFL record 47 games.
- January 8, 1963—Don Shula relieves Weeb Ewbank as team's third head coach since 1953. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington later named first player-coaches.
- December 15, 1963—John Unitas concludes season with eight team and one then-NFL record of 237 completions.
- January 20, 1964—Carroll Rosenbloom purchases all remaining stock to gain full ownership.
- November 22, 1964—Colts win club record 10th straight game, 24-7 over Rams in Los Angeles, to clinch third Western Conference title.
- December 13, 1964—Raymond Berry catches 506th career pass against Washington and Lenny Moore scores 20th touchdown of season, both NFL records at the time.
- December 27, 1964—Browns defeat Baltimore 27-0 in NFL title game in Cleveland.

- May 18, 1977**—John Unitas (1956-1972) rejoined Colts as Special Consultant.
- November 20, 1977**—Lydell Mitchell breaks Lenny Moore's career rushing record of 5174 yds. Mitchell ended the '77 season with 5487 yds.

- July 28, 1979**—John Unitas inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.
- December 16, 1979**—Joe Washington sets team record with 82 receptions to lead NFL.
- January 16, 1980**—Mike McCormack named Head Coach.
- February 26, 1980**—Grand opening of new Colts training complex.

HALL OF FAME COLTS

RAYMOND BERRY, End, 6-2, 187, SMU

Retired in 1967 as the leading pass receiver in NFL history (now ranks second) with 631 receptions... selected as a "future" choice in the 20th round of the 1954 draft by the Colts... named all-pro three times (1958-60) and played in five Pro Bowl games... led NFL in receiving in 1958-60... holds NFL championship game records for yardage (178) and receptions (12), which he set in the 1958 "sudden death" title game against the New York Giants... last career touchdown reception came against Dallas at Memorial Stadium on December 3, 1967 and covered five yards... born February 27, 1933 in Corpus Christi, Texas... attended Paris (Texas) High School... inducted in the Hall of Fame, July 28, 1973.

ART DONOVAN, Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 265, Boston College

The first Colt to enter the Hall of Fame, Donovan was inducted August 3, 1968... played from 1953-61 with the current Colt franchise and with Baltimore in 1950, the New York Yanks, 1951, and Dallas Texans, 1952... all-pro 1954-57 and played in the Pro Bowl game five times... one of the most popular Colts of all time... attended Notre Dame for one year, entered the Marines during World War II, and switched to Boston College after his service discharge... lettered four years (1946-49) as a tackle and was named All-East in 1948-49... reported to training camp in 1962, but announced his retirement at age 37, before the season opened... he was honored and his jersey number, 70, retired in an emotional ceremony at Memorial Stadium on September 16, 1962... attended St. Michael High School in New York City, where he was born June 5, 1925 in the Bronx... lives with his family in Towson, Maryland.



WEEB EW BANK, Head Coach 1954-62

Ewbank led the Colts to consecutive World Championships in 1958 and 1959...defeated the N.Y. Giants 23-17 in sudden death overtime thriller called "the greatest game ever played" ...beat the Giants again in '59 31-16 to win second world title...had a career mark of 59-52-1 in 9 seasons with Colts...left Baltimore in '62 to become head coach of the N.Y. Jets...led the Jets to a Super Bowl Championship in '68 defeating the Colts 16-7 in Super Bowl III...had a career coaching record in New York of 71-77-6, giving him a career record of 130-129-7 for 20 years in the NFL/AFL...his 4-1 postseason mark gives him 134 career victories to rank 10th on the all-time list...is the only coach in NFL history to win world championships in both the NFL and AFL...nine years as head coach of the Colts is the longest coaching tenure in Colts history...born in Richmond, Indiana on May 6, 1907...attended Richmond High School where he was a three sport-star...graduated from Miami of Ohio in 1928...Coached basketball for 13 years at Miami...coached with Paul Brown at the naval base at Great Lakes...rejoined Brown in '49 as the Cleveland Browns tackle coach...joined the Colts in 1954 succeeding Keith Molesworth.



GINO MARCHETTI, Defensive End, 6-4, 245, San Francisco

Marchetti, acclaimed as the greatest defensive end in pro football history during the 1969 NFL 50th anniversary, was inducted into the Hall of Fame on July 29, 1972...named all-pro nine consecutive seasons (1956-64) and played in every Pro Bowl game from 1954 through 1964, with the exception of the 1958 game, which he missed with a broken ankle suffered in the "sudden death" championship game against the New York Giants...announced retirement after the 1963 season, in which he also served as an assistant coach, but reconsidered and played in 1964...retired again following the 1964 season, but returned to play in four games in 1966, when the Colts suffered heavy injuries in the defensive line...played his final game on December 18, 1966 in San Francisco...fought in the "Battle of the Bulge" during World War II at the age of 18, after graduating from Antioch (Calif.) High School...was a 1951 All-West Coast tackle selection at San Francisco and played in the East-West and College All-Star games...born January 2, 1927 in Smithers, West Virginia...makes his home with his family in Devon, Pa.

LENNY MOORE, Running Back & Flanker, 6-1, 190, Penn State

Moore entered the Hall of Fame on August 2, 1975...retired in 1967 with 12,451 combined net yards in a 12-year career to rank 9th among the all-time NFL leaders...he gained 5174 yards rushing and 6039 yards on 363 receptions along with 1180 yards on kickoff returns and 56 yards on punt returns...scored 678 points on 113 touchdowns with stretches of 18 straight games scoring at least one touchdown and 11 straight scoring at least one touchdown rushing; both are NFL records...gained All America honors at Penn State and was the number one draft pick of the Colts in 1956...was named 1956 Rookie of the Year...selected Comeback Player of the Year and Most Valuable Player in 1964, when he scored 20 touchdowns, after many thought his career had ended...born November 25, 1933 in Reading, Pa., and attended Reading High School...lives with his wife and children in Baltimore.

JIM PARKER, Guard and Tackle, 6-3, 272, Ohio State

A member of both the Professional and National Football Foundation Halls of Fame... the Colts first draft pick in 1957, after twice being named All-America (1955-56) as a guard at Ohio State...winner of the 1956 Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman... also played linebacker collegiately...his 1954 team won the Rose Bowl and the national championship...named to the modern all-time All-America college football team in 1969, which was selected as part of the 100th anniversary of college football...was all-pro eight consecutive seasons (1958-65) and played in the Pro Bowl following each of those seasons...started as the left tackle for the Colts, was moved in 1962 to left guard, and back to tackle in 1966...announced retirement near end of the 1967 season in which he only played in three games because of a leg injury...played in 139 consecutive games, the second longest string in Colt history...streak ended when he missed the Colts game with San Francisco at Memorial Stadium on Oct. 10, 1967...born April 3, 1934 in Macon, Georgia and attended Scott High School in Toledo, Ohio...lives with his family in Baltimore.



JOHN UNITAS, QB, 6-1, 196, Louisville

1973 was the end of an era in the NFL. John Unitas, the greatest quarterback ever to put on shoulder pads, retired. After 18 years, Unitas left the game with a helmet full of records.

He was the first quarterback to pass for more than 40,000 yards. His NFL records include most consecutive seasons leading the league in touchdown passes (4) and most consecutive games with a TD pass (47), a feat that rivals Joe



DiMaggio's 56 game hitting streak.

He ended his career ranked number one in NFL history in six categories: most passes attempted (5,186), most passes completed (2,830), most yards gained passing (40,239), most seasons 3,000 yards or more passing (3), most games with 300 yards or more passing (26) and most touchdown passes (290).

He also set several post-season marks including highest career completion percentage (62.9) and most yards gained in championship play (1,177).

In his 17 seasons with the Colts, he established 22 records. During his stay in Baltimore, Unitas was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player three times and played in 10 Pro Bowls, the most ever by a Colt. He was 5 times named All-Pro.

With Unitas calling signals, the Colts won World Championships in 1958 and 1959 and the Super Bowl title in 1970.

Unitas opened his quarterbacking career with the Colts throwing an interception for a TD to J.C. Caroline of the Bears on October 21, 1956. He ended his career with the Colts by throwing a TD to Eddie Hinton on December 3, 1972. Between those two passes he provided an entire generation of football fans with memories and moments that they will never forget.

- 1956 Called the "Cinderella Kid" sets NFL mark for completion percentage by a rookie 55.6%
- 1957 Throws for 2,550 yds and 24 TDs and is named NFL MVP.
- 1958 Led Colts to 23-17 overtime win against N.Y. Giants for World Championship.
- 1959 Throws record 32 TDs and leads team to second World Championship
- 1960 Streak of 47 consecutive games with a TD pass ends. Sets an NFL record of 3,099 yds passing.
- 1963 Completes 237 passes for NFL record.
- 1964 Named the NFL's MVP, had only 6 of 305 pass attempts intercepted.
- 1966 Tops NFL record for career TDs with 232 and most yards gained passing 29,539.
- 1967 Leads the team to a 11-1-2 record and wins his third MVP award in the NFL.
- 1969 Named the NFL's greatest quarterback in honor of the 50th Anniversary of the league. Named the player of the decade by the Associated Press.
- 1970 Leads the team to its first AFC championship. Suffers a rib injury in the first half of the Colts 16-13 Super Bowl win over the Dallas Cowboys.
- 1973 Career ends with 40,239 yds passing on 5,186 attempts and 2,830 completions with 290 TDs, all NFL records.

NFL CHAMPIONSHIP DEC. 28, 1958 YANKEE STADIUM

BALTIMORE 23, NEW YORK 17—Quarterback Johnny Unitas took the Colts 80 yards in 13 plays, the last a one-yard carry by Alan Ameche through the right side of the Giant line at 8 minutes, 15 seconds of sudden death overtime. The regulation game ended 17-17 when Baltimore's Steve Myhra booted a 20-yard field goal seconds from the gun. 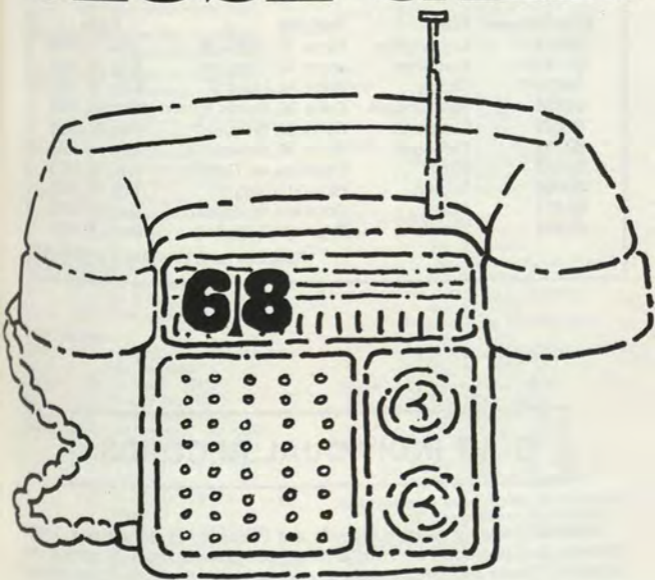

BALTIMORE MEMORIAL STADIUM

Baltimore Memorial Stadium was completed in 1954. Construction began in 1949, the final season of Baltimore's play in the All-America Football Conference, on the same site as the original Baltimore Stadium. Work continued through 1949 and the 1950 National Football League season without the Colts missing a home game.

Construction was suspended following the dissolution of the Baltimore NFL franchise in 1950, and did not resume until 1952. Work continued through the 1953 season, when the current Colt team moved to the city from Dallas.

The stadium, in its present form, was completed prior to the 1954 season with a capacity of 52,000. Additions brought the capacity up to a high of 60,240 in 1970. Comfort refinements have reduced the current capacity to 57,340 for Colt games played before conversion from the baseball configuration, and 60,586, when the football configuration is completed.

The original Baltimore Stadium was built of wood on mounds of dirt beginning in 1922. It was completed in 1924 with a seating capacity of 80,000 and officially dedicated on November 29, 1924, when 80,150 persons attended the Army-Navy game. Capacity later was reduced to 66,000.

BALTIMORE COLTS SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Baltimore Colts Scholarship Fund was established on March 31, 1982 by Colts President Robert Irsay. The scholarship is privately funded by the Club and will be presented each year to a Baltimore area high school student to assist in the pursuit of a college education. Recipients will be selected by an independent committee on the basis of academic eligibility and financial need.

The first recipient of the Colts Scholarship is former Colts linebacker Mike Woods. Woods was paralyzed from the neck down after a shooting incident in Cleveland on May 21, 1982. The \$5000 scholarship will enable Woods to complete his undergraduate degree at the University of Cincinnati upon completion of his rehabilitation.



THE BALTIMORE COLTS MARCHING BAND

The Baltimore Colts Marching Band will be marking their 37th season this year. The Band was founded in 1947 for the All America Football Conference Baltimore Colts. In 1951-52 when Baltimore was without Pro-Football, the Band remained active and played a major force in the city regaining an NFL franchise in 1953.

In addition to its pre-game and halftime performances, the Band supplies all the time-out music during all Colt home games. The Colts' Band annually appears in local parades and for the past 21 years served as the "Official Preakness Band."

The Band is an all volunteer group which starts practicing in late spring. They hold the honor of becoming the first musical unit in Professional Football to be represented in the Pro-Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio by presenting its first bass drum in 1966. The Colts' Band was the first to incorporate in the NFL a Color Guard, Majorettes, Cheerleaders and Flagline units into their organization.

COLTS CORRALS

The Council of Colts Corrals, now in its 27th year of organized support of the Baltimore Colts, is one of the most unique fan organizations in all of professional sports.

According to Council Chairperson Jim Phillips of Colts Corral #7 in Hagerstown, Maryland, the Colts Corrals were formed "to promote interest and activities related to the Baltimore Football Colts organization and professional football in general." "In essence," says Phillips, "the member of the Colts Corrals will always be there to support the Baltimore Colts—win, lose or draw."

The idea to organize a Colts fan club originated with two fans, Ed Loud and Lee Novak, who approached Colts General Manager Don Kellett with their suggestion in 1956, the Club's fourth season in Baltimore. With Kellett's approval, Loud and Novak organized the City's first Colts Corral comprised of about 50 Colts fans in May of 1957. Four months later, Colts Corral #2 was formed in Baltimore by Hurst "Loudy" Loudenslager and his wife Flo, and consisted mostly of national guardsmen and their wives.

Over the past 26 years, the number of Colts Corrals has increased to 31 and the total membership has grown to over 2000, many of whom are Colts season ticket holders. There are Corrals located throughout the greater Baltimore metropolitan area and across the state of Maryland. Corral support has also extended into Hanover, Pennsylvania and New Castle, Delaware. Two of the most unusual Corrals have been formed at the Maryland State Penitentiary in Baltimore, which has been in existence for 22 years, and at the Maryland House of Corrections located in Jessup, Maryland.

Members of the Colts Corrals are always in attendance to support the Colts at all the Club's home games. In recent years, Corral support has also extended to Colts road contests, and at least one Corral is now represented at every Colts game away from Baltimore. In addition, the Corrals have been well represented at the Hall of Fame induction ceremonies in Canton, Ohio for former Colts Gino Marchetti (1972), Jim Parker and Raymond Berry (1973), Lenny Moore (1975) and John Unitas (1979).

The Council of Colts Corrals annually sponsors a Convention in Ocean City, Maryland that attracts over 1,000 Colts fans for a football weekend. The Corrals host Colts players and members of the Club's front office and coaching staff who are guests of honor in the annual Saturday morning parade and Sunday evening dinner-dance. Volleyball tournaments, crab feasts and a variety of additional activities fill the Convention weekend with continuous entertainment. Other events hosted by the Council or the individual Corrals include award banquets, bull roasts, dinner-dances and golf outings. The Council's annual Bull Roast has drawn more than 1,000 people over the last several years.

In addition to the moral support they give to the Baltimore Colts, the Council of Colts Corrals also provides financial assistance to local charities. The proceeds from Corral-sponsored events are donated to various charitable organizations. Since their formation, the Corrals have contributed over \$100,000 to charity. Included among the organizations which have benefited from Corral financial support are the Ronald McDonald House, the American Cancer Society, United Cerebral Palsey, and many more.

One Corral member who has given more of his time and effort in support of the Colts than any fan in organized sports is the Secretary of the Council of Colts Corrals, Hurst Loudenslager, otherwise known as "Loudy." He has served as Council Secretary for the last 22 years and has contributed to the formation of all but one of the 36 Corrals that have been organized through the years. Loudy has been a Colts season ticket holder since 1953 and has extended his support to the team's road games with send-offs and greetings upon return for over 600 team flights. He and his wife, Flo have sent over 2,500 birthday cards, more than 1,000 birthday cakes, and over 3,500 Christmas cards to Colts players, coaches and front office personnel over the last 20 years. For his noteworthy promotion of the Colts and the City of Baltimore, he recently received the prestigious Silver Award from Baltimore Mayor William Donald Schaefer.

Interest in the Colts and the Council of Colts Corrals has no geographic bounds. The Council has received inquiries from Colts fans across the United States who are interested in Associate Memberships in the Colts Corrals. Correspondence from fans interested in learning more about the Corrals has come from across the Atlantic Ocean in areas as distant as Dublin, Ireland and as far west as Pago Pago, Samoa across the Pacific Ocean. Many of those who write are native Baltimoreans who have always supported the Colts, but there are also those who have never known a hometown football team and have adopted the Colts as their Club.

Colts General Manager Ernie Accorsi summarizes the Club's feelings about the Colts Corrals. "The Baltimore Colts have indeed been blessed with a fan organization that has been a source of unfailing support through the Club's championship seasons and the lean years," says Accorsi. "The Corrals have an unparalleled level of interest and enthusiasm for the Colts that is unmatched among fans of any professional sports team."

THE QUARTERBACK CLUB OF BALTIMORE

The Quarterback Club of Baltimore meets on Monday evenings after Colts home games. Every meeting is attended by a Colt player, coach or front office representative, who speaks to the members and answers questions about the past game.

Founded in 1959, the Club serves to promote football at all levels in the Baltimore metropolitan area. Each year it conducts its annual Scholarship Awards Night dinner at which is presented its John Unitas Football Man of the Year, High School Coach of the Year, Most Valuable Colt Player of the Year, and Greater Baltimore High School Player of the Year, with several scholarships awarded.

The 1983 officers for the Quarterback Club include: David Mahoney, president; Dennis Hormes, vice president; and Herb Wright, secretary.



COLTS OFFICE/TRAINING FACILITY

On February 26, 1980, the Colts hosted the grand opening of their new office/training facility located northwest of Baltimore City in Owings Mills, Maryland. The complex serves as the home of the football club and the entire administrative staff including the ticket office.

The facility features a two story office/training structure which covers approximately 43,000 square feet. It includes two and one half practice fields of natural turf and parking facilities to accommodate up to 140 vehicles. The total area of the complex proper which includes the building, practice fields and parking lots is 14 acres.

The facility, which was privately financed by the Baltimore Colts Football Club and owner Robert Irsay, was under construction for a total of ten months. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held on March 28, 1979. Colts administrative personnel moved into the new complex on January 28, 1980.

The two-story brick and glass structure is a multi-purpose building. The upper level contains offices for the entire administrative staff, ticket sales and player personnel. Offices for the head coach and each assistant coach are located in a separate section on this level with easy access to player meeting rooms on the lower level. Several conference rooms and a large reproduction center are also included on the upper level.

The lower level consists of a large locker room with 59 permanent lockers lining the walls and enough space to accommodate 36 additional temporary lockers. There are separate locker and shower areas for the coaching staff and administrative personnel. This level also includes a film processing lab which will enable the Colts coaching staff to view films of each day's practice within hours of its completion. There are a total of seven player meeting rooms and an equipment room with built-in laundry facilities.

The players' training room contains an area devoted exclusively to injury rehabilitation with a wide assortment of equipment used in physical therapy. There is also a sauna, a steam room and several whirlpool baths. A six foot jacuzzi enables an injured player to stand upright and run in place for therapeutic purposes. Other training facilities include two handball/racquetball courts and a large weight lifting room.

Adjacent to the building are two 120 yard practice fields of natural turf. The two fields are separated by a 50 foot tower which is used to film each practice session. There is also a 50 yard auxiliary field which will be utilized for practice drills requiring the use of heavy equipment. An outdoor shed, providing 2,880 square feet of storage space, is located adjacent to the practice fields.

The facility is located at 11001 Bonita Avenue just off of Reisterstown Road. It can be reached by taking Exit 20 North off the Baltimore Beltway (I-695) and following Reisterstown Road approximately five miles to Bonita Avenue.

COLTS RADIO-TV NETWORK

The Baltimore Colts 1983 Radio Network will cover a seven state region plus the District of Columbia. WCBM-AM of Baltimore will continue to serve as the flagship station for the Colts 32 station network. Veteran play by play announcer Chuck Thompson will do the broadcasts and Vince Bagli will do the color.

Thompson has been doing play by play for Baltimore teams since the late 1940s when he moved to the Monument City from Philadelphia. He began his Baltimore career doing the Baltimore Orioles of the International League and the Baltimore Colts of the All American Football Conference. Nationally recognized and nationally honored, Thompson lists his 1958 broadcast of the Colts-Giants "sudden death" NFL championship game and the seventh game of the 1960 Pirates-Yankees World Series as his most memorable assignments.

Bagli has been associated with Baltimore sports for as many years as Thompson. He has worked in both the print media and the electronic media having worked as a sports-writer for the Baltimore News-American and for WBAL-Radio and TV. Twice nationally honored, Bagli is a Baltimore sports broadcasting institution.

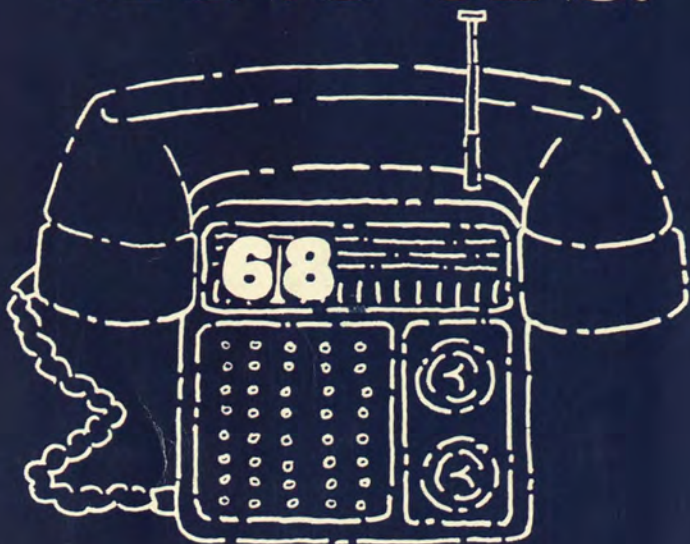
