## INDIANAPOLIS COLTS OFFICERS

### ROBERT IRSAY

#### President and Treasurer

"The greatest thrill I've had in football was on April 2, 1984, when I walked into the Hoosier Dome with Mayor (Bill) Hudnut in front of all those fans," says Robert Irsay of the 20,000 people who showed up to welcome the Colts to Indianapolis. "It is my intention," Irsay continues, "for the Colts to be a vital contributing member of the greater Indianapolis community."



Irsay became owner of the Colts on July 26, 1972, when he traded his recently-acquired Los Angeles Rams to Carroll Rosenbloom for the Colt franchise. Irsay had purchased the Rams from the estate of Dan Reeves.

Irsay was born on March 5, 1923, in Chicago's northern "Bucktown" section. He worked his way through the University of Illinois, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering. (While attending Illinois, he was an Illini football teammate of former Colt Alex Agase.)

From 1941 to 1945, he served in the United States Marine Corps, after which he worked for a mechanical contracting company in Chicago.

In 1952 he formed the Robert Irsay Company of Skokie, Ill. After building the business into one of the largest and most respected heating, ventilating and air conditioning companies in the world, Irsay sold his company to a firm listed on the New York Stock Exchange in 1971. He remained associated with the firm until 1978 when he formed Colt Construction and Development Co., and its affiliate, Colt Developers, Co., which are diversified construction and development companies.

Irsay is an active supporter of many charitable organizations. Among those are: Indianapolis Black Expo, the Mental Health Association and Cystic Fibrosis Foundation in Indianapolis; Foundation for Children with Learning Disabilities, New York, New York; Stritch School of Medicine at Loyola University in Chicago; and the Troubled Children's Foundation Center in Hialeah, Fla. He makes further donations through the Colts as a member of NFL Properties which dedicates a major portion of its earnings to NFL Charities.

Irsay has two sons, Tom (32) and Jim (27), the club's general manager.



## OFFICERS

### JIM IRSAY

#### Vice President and General Manager

**Dedication:** The best description of Jim Irsay's commitment to bringing winning football to the City of Indianapolis. Irsay has been involved in all aspects of the day-to-day operation of the Colts since joining the club in January of 1982. Jim was added to the personnel department in 1983 and took over as general manager in early 1984, following the Colts move to Indianapolis. The 27-year old Irsay was instrumental in the hiring of Rod Dowhower as the Colts new head coach during the 1985 off-season.



Irsay received his bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism from Southern Methodist University, where he played linebacker for a year and a half as a walk-on, before an ankle injury ended his career. Jim was born on June 13, 1959 in Lincolnwood, Ill. He attended Loyola Academy in Wilmette, Ill., where he played golf, boxed and became an avid weight-conditioner.

Jim is an active member of the Indianapolis community and is involved with Big Brothers of Indianapolis. He is a corporate member of the Indiana Sports Corporation and he serves on the Board of Directors of the Noble Center for Retarded Citizens in Indianapolis. Jim and his wife, Meg, have two daughters, Carlie (5) and Casey (3).

### MICHAEL G. CHERNOFF

#### Vice President and General Counsel

Since March of 1975, Michael Chernoff has been vice president and general counsel for Robert Irsay's various business concerns including the Colt football team.

The Glencoe, Ill. native received his bachelor's degree from the University of Chicago in 1956 and then stayed on at Chicago to receive his Doctor of Law degree in 1959. Chernoff was in private practice until 1974 when he became vice president and general counsel to a Fortune 500 company, one year before joining Irsay. Chernoff's legal background includes extensive work in corporate law securities, real estate and taxes. He has also played a key role in negotiating commercial, player and other contracts, including the contract which put the Colts in Indianapolis.



Chernoff, who resides in Chicago with his wife, Eunice, has three children, Susan (27), Steven (24) and Robert (17). Steven and his wife, Michelle, recently made Chernoff a grandfather.



## ROD DOWHOWER

### Head Coach

When Rod Dowhower joined the Colts on January 28, 1985, he took the responsibility of writing new chapters of success for the Colts.

The 43-year old Dowhower has readied himself by coaching under Don Coryell, Dick Vermeil and Bill Walsh.

Dowhower began his relationship with the former as Coryell's quarterback at San Diego State, where he earned Small College All-America honors. Dowhower launched his coaching career



under Coryell in 1966 as a quarterback and receivers coach, and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1968, a capacity where he remained for five years. During Dowhower's seven years at San Diego State, he developed quarterbacks Brian Sipe, Dennis Shaw and Don Horn. In addition, five receivers Dowhower coached collegiately were NFL starters during the 1972 season, including Isaac Curtis, Haven Moses and Ken Burrow.

Dowhower got his first taste of professional coaching as the quarterbacks and receivers coach under Coryell at St. Louis in 1973. During that season, Cardinals' quarterback Jim Hart completed a then-club record 55.6% of his passes, and five Cardinal receivers caught at least 29 passes.

Dowhower moved to UCLA in 1974 as the offensive coordinator under Dick Vermeil. The Bruins appeared in the 1976 Rose Bowl (following the 1975 season), defeating Ohio State 23-10 behind Wendell Tyler's 172 rushing yards.

Following a year as the offensive coordinator at Boise State in 1976, Dowhower joined Bill Walsh's staff at Stanford as the quarterback coach. Dowhower was promoted to the head coaching position in 1979, earning a 5-5-1 record. While at Stanford, Dowhower helped groom future NFL players such as James Lofton, Steve Dils, Turk Schonert, Guy Benjamin and Darrin Nelson.

The Denver Broncos tabbed Dowhower as their offensive coordinator in 1980 under head coach Red Miller. In 1981, he was given the additional responsibilities of receivers coach, and that year wide receiver Steve Watson responded with 60 catches, an AFC-leading 1,244 yards and 13 touchdowns.

Dowhower returned to St. Louis in 1983, as the offensive coordinator under Jim Hanifan. In 1984, the Cardinals sported the top-ranked passing attack in the NFC and the third-most productive in the entire NFL with an average of 266.4 yards per game, while averaging 130.4 yards per game on the ground. The Cardinals' offense set nine team single-season offensive records as it averaged 397 yards a game total offense for 1984. Under Dowhower's offensive scheme, quarterback Neil Lomax completed 345 of 560 passes (61.6%) for 4,619 yards and 19 touchdowns on his way to a Pro Bowl season. Wide receiver Roy Green caught 78 passes for the second consecutive year. His 1,555 reception yards led the NFL and earned him his second straight Pro Bowl appearance. Running back Ottis Anderson had 70 receptions, while

wide receiver Pat Tilley (52) and tight end Doug Marsh (39) were among six Cardinals receivers to catch at least 26 passes in Dowhower's potent attack.

Born on April 15, 1943 in Ord, Neb., Dowhower attended Santa Barbara (CA) High School, where he played football, basketball and baseball. His football team won the CIF Championship in 1960, and Dowhower played in the North-South All-Star Game in 1961, before attending San Diego State.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from San Diego State (major in social science, minor in physical education), Dowhower earned his master's degree in history at U. S. International University. He also earned teaching credentials from the State of California.

Rod is married to the former Nancy Small of San Diego, Calif. They have two sons, Brian (15) and Deron (14).

### TOM LOVAT

#### Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Line

Tom Lovat joined the Colts in 1985 as the assistant head coach/offensive line coach after serving as the offensive line coach for the St. Louis Cardinals since 1981.

In 1985, the Colts' offensive line yielded just 35 sacks, the third-fewest in the NFL, while averaging 5.0 yards per rushing attempt, tops in the league.

Lovat, who has six years professional experience in the NFL with the Cardinals, Packers and Colts among his 25 years of coaching, was the first offensive coach tabbed by Rod Dowhower.

"Tom is a veteran coach with a great deal of experience. He is an excellent technical coach, along with possessing good player relations abilities," said Dowhower. "His is a key position in our organization. With his administrative talents, Tom does an excellent job."

Lovat, 47, began his coaching in 1961, after his playing career as a guard and linebacker at Utah. Lovat's first collegiate job was at his alma mater in 1967 as an assistant coach. He moved to Idaho State as the offensive line coach from 1968-70, before serving for one year (1970) as the defensive coordinator of the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League. Lovat returned to Utah as a defensive coach in 1972, and was named the head coach two years later. He served as the head coach at Utah from 1974-76, then joined Bill Walsh's staff at Stanford. He was a coaching member, along with Dowhower, of the Cardinals teams which defeated Georgia in the Bluebonnet Bowl and LSU in the Sun Bowl.

Lovat was born December 28, 1938 in Bingham, Utah. He is married to the former Lyn Boren of Bingham. They have three children, Johna (22), Matthew (19) and Mark (16).







## JOHN BECKER

### Quarterbacks

John Becker joined the Colts in 1985 as the quarterbacks coach, moving from the Buffalo Bills, where he held the same position in 1984.

Becker has coached in the league six years, including four with Philadelphia. He was in charge of the Eagles' wide receivers (1983), running backs (1981-82) and research and quality control (1981). He coached on the staff with George Hill and Billie Matthews, both current Colts coaches.

Becker began his coaching career at Crespi Carmelite High School (Encino, Calif.) in 1965, while attending Cal State-Northridge. He joined the staff at UCLA in 1970 as a freshman coach. Becker was an assistant at New Mexico State in 1971, and at the University of New Mexico (1972-73), before taking the head coaching position at Los Angeles Valley College in 1974. He compiled a three-year 17-10-1 record, then moved to the University of Oregon as the offensive coordinator. He remained there for three years before entering the NFL with Philadelphia.

"John is our quarterbacks coach, and that is his area of expertise. He worked with Dick Vermeil in Philadelphia developing the Eagles' quarterbacks before going to Buffalo and doing a great job there," said Dowhower. "John works directly with me here in shaping our quarterbacks into our philosophy. Like all our coaches, John is a hard worker who is used to achieving success through his efforts with the players."

Becker was born February 16, 1943 in Alexandria, Va. He is married to the former Kathy Wallick of Van Nuys, Calif. They have three children, Kristine (21), Karen (20), and John (19).



## GEORGE CATAVOLOS

### Secondary

George Catavolos joined the Colts in May of 1984 as the defensive secondary coach, his first professional position after a successful collegiate career.

The Colts secondary gave up seven fewer touchdowns in 1985 than in 1984, and the improvement is continuing under Catavolos.

Catavolos moved to the Colts after serving as the secondary coach under Johnny Majors at Tennessee for the 1982 and 1983 seasons. Prior to 1982, Catavolos worked as the secondary coach at Kentucky from 1977-81. He was part of the staff which guided Kentucky to a 10-1 record (6-0 in the Southeastern Conference) in 1977.

Catavolos began coaching as a graduate assistant at Purdue in 1967, under Jack Mollenkopf. He worked at Purdue for two years before taking his first full-time coaching assistantship at Middle Tennessee State in 1969. Catavolos joined the Louisville coaching staff as a defensive backs coach in 1970, then landed the same position at Purdue in 1971. He coached at Purdue for six years under head coaches Bob DeMoss and Alex Agase.

Catavolos received his bachelor's and master's degree from Pur-

due, where he starred for the Boilermakers as a defensive back. He was co-captain for the 1967 Purdue squad which defeated USC, 14-13, in the Rose Bowl. He also received that year's Noble E. Kiser Award for academic excellence.

"George has done an excellent job with the Colts, coaching some of the toughest positions in football. His success as a coach is represented in a player like Nesby Glasgow. It is pleasing to have a coach like George, and I am happy to have him as part of my staff," said Dowhower.

Catavolos was born May 9, 1945 in Cleveland, Ohio. He is married to the former Tona Jones of Royal Center, Ind. They have two daughters, Lindsay Marie (3) and Stephanie Lynn (2).

### GEORGE HILL

#### Defensive Coordinator

George Hill joined the Colts in 1985 as the defensive coordinator, after serving for six seasons as the linebackers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles. He was the first new appointment by Rod Dowhower to the Indianapolis staff.

"When I first thought of arranging a defensive coaching staff, I thought of George Hill. I am very pleased to be able to hire the man who was my initial choice for a coordinator," said Dowhower.

"When I was with St. Louis we faced George's defenses twice a year, and I've really built some respect for George's abilities."

Hill initiated his coaching career at Findlay (Ohio) College in 1959. From 1960-64, Hill coached at Denison University, then he moved to Cornell in 1965. He served 1966-70 as an assistant at Duke, then joined Woody Hayes' staff at Ohio State for eight seasons (1971-78) as the defensive coordinator.

Under Hill, the Colts defense in 1985 featured seven performers who started every game and three others who started at least 12 contests. With a solid nucleus of players and an infusion of youth through the past two drafts, Hill's philosophy should blend the unit into one of the stingiest in the league.

Hill was born April 28, 1933 in Bay Village, Ohio. He is married to the former Cloyde Roy of Altoona, Pa. They have two children, Greg (21) and Tammy (17).



### JOHN MARSHALL

#### Defensive Line

John Marshall joins the Colts in 1986, after serving as the defensive coordinator with Atlanta from 1983 to 1985. Prior to his stint with the Falcons, Marshall spent two seasons as linebacker coach with Green Bay, and coached the Pack's special teams in 1980.

Marshall, 40, also possesses eleven years as a coach on the collegiate level. He entered coaching after a neck injury during his freshman year at Washington State halted his career as a linebacker. His first post came at Hancock Junior College where he worked under John Madden. Marshall then took the head freshman coaching position at Oregon, where he instructed from 1969-71. Marshall moved to coach the offensive line at Oregon from 1972-76,





before he advanced to Southern Cal as the linebacker coach. During Marshall's 1977-79 term at USC the Trojans won two Rose Bowls and a national championship.

Marshall was born October 2, 1945 in Arroyo Grande, Calif. He is married to the former Becky Hann of Coos Bay, Oregon. They have two daughters, Sarah (12) and Meg (10).

### **BILLIE MATTHEWS**

#### **Offensive Coordinator/Running Backs**

Billie Matthews joined the Colts in 1985 as the offensive coordinator/running backs coach, moving from Philadelphia, where he coached the Eagles' running backs for the 1983 and 1984 seasons.

Matthews served in the running backs coach capacity with the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-82, including the 49ers' 1981 Super Bowl title season.

Before entering the NFL, Matthews coached at UCLA from 1971-78, where he tutored five 1,000-yard rushers, including Wendell Tyler and Theotis Brown (twice). The 56-year old Matthews also coached John Riggins and Delvin Williams at Kansas, where he was an assistant in 1970.

"Billie is a veteran coach who lends valuable experience to the offensive concept we are developing here. Billie worked under Bill Walsh at San Francisco, so he is schooled thoroughly in the use of running backs in the passing attack. With that philosophy he fits in well as our offensive coordinator," said Dowhower.

Matthews starred at Southern University (Baton Rouge, La.), where he was 37-4 as a quarterback during his career. His freshman season (1948) resulted in a 11-0 record, good for the National Black Championship.

Matthews was born March 15, 1930 in Houston, Texas. He is married to the former Gene Woods of Paris, Texas. They have four children, Jackie, Kenneth, Kennette and Karen.



### **CHIP MYERS**

#### **Receivers**

Chip Myers joined the Colts in 1985 as the receivers coach, bringing nine years of league receiving experience, and entering his fourth year as an NFL coach, his second with the Colts.

Myers worked for two seasons at Tampa Bay as the Buccaneers' receivers coach. Myers was partly responsible for a passing attack which totaled 3,907 yards for the 1984 season.

Prior to Tampa Bay, he served for three years at Illinois in the same capacity under Mike White. He began his coaching career as a special training camp assistant with the San Francisco 49ers in 1979.

Myers' playing career started with the 49ers in 1967. He played for the Cincinnati Bengals from 1969-75, where Bill Walsh was the receivers coach. Under Walsh's guidance, Myers earned Pro Bowl honors following the 1972 season.

"Chip is our receivers coach, and that includes our tight ends as well. Chip played with the Cincinnati Bengals and had Bill Walsh

as an offensive assistant there. He also coached under Mike White at Illinois, experiences which make him ideal for our concepts," said Dowhower. "In 1984 at Tampa Bay, Chip helped coach an offense which had three receivers, James Wilder (85-685), Kevin House (76-1,005) and Gerald Carter (60-816) catch at least 60 passes. Results like that indicate what Chip's ideas can do for your attack."

Myers was born July 9, 1945 at Panama City, Fla. He is married to the former Susie Lovatt of Cincinnati, Ohio. They have five children, Adam (18), Brian (16) and Chris (12) Bortz; Adam (12) and Elizabeth (9) Myers.

### KEITH ROWEN

#### Special Teams/Assistant Offensive Line

Keith Rowen joined the Colts in 1985 as the special teams/assistant offensive line coach and, at 33, is the youngest member of the coaching staff. Rowen has eleven years coaching experience.

Rowen began his career as the assistant defensive line coach at Stanford from 1975-76. He moved to Cal State-Long Beach from 1977-79 as the offensive line coach, before taking the same position at Arizona in 1979. After five seasons at Arizona, Rowen landed his first professional job as the offensive line coach/offensive coordinator with the Boston/New Orleans Breakers from 1983-84.

In 1984, he coached the running backs with the Cleveland Browns.

"Keith is a bright, young coach who has an excellent future in this game," said Rod Dowhower. "He has a wealth of collegiate experience coaching both offensive lines and special teams."

Former Browns head coach Sam Rutigliano pointed out that Keith "is one of the finest young coaches in football today."

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Stanford, with a Ph. D. from USC, Rowen has authored several articles on football, two of which, "Pass Protection" and "Utilizing the Tight End in the Passing Attack", were published by the *Athletic Journal*.

Rowen was born September 2, 1952 in New York, N.Y. He is married to the former Sheri Andrews of Laguna Beach, Calif. They have two daughters, Mande (5) and Holly Nicole (2).



### RICK VENTURI

#### Linebackers

Rick Venturi joined the Colts in 1982 as the linebackers coach, making him the senior member of the coaching staff in terms of service to the club.

Venturi entered the coaching ranks as a freshman coach for Northwestern from 1968-69. He took charge of the defensive secondary there from 1970-72. Venturi spent 1973-76 handling the linebacking coaching chores at Purdue, working along with George Catavolos, the Colts' secondary coach. Venturi left his Purdue post for the same position at Illinois in 1977. In 1978, Venturi landed the head coaching job at his alma mater, Northwestern, where he coached for three seasons.



"Rick has done a fine job with the Colts' linebackers, develop-



ing the unit into one of the best in the league. He is a big asset to the team as a coach and a person," said Dowhower.

Venturi was born February 23, 1946 in Taylorville, Ill. He is married to the former Cheri Rotello of Rockford, Ill. They have two children, Marin (15) and Jason (13).

### **TOM ZUPANCIC**

#### **Strength and Conditioning**

Tom Zupancic joined the Colts staff in 1984 as the strength and conditioning coach. Zupancic, a fixture in Indianapolis for years as the owner and operator of his own gymnasium, came to the club after finishing as a finalist in the 1984 U.S. Olympic Wrestling Trials.

### **BOB TERPENING, Assistant General Manager**

Bob Terpening, whose association with the Colts goes back to 1970, was promoted to assistant general manager of the club in May of 1984.

Terpening, 44, began working with the Colts in 1970 grading films during his tenure as the head football coach at Baltimore City College H.S. In 1971 he joined the New England Patriots' scouting department. In 1977 Terpening returned to the Colts as a college scout and in January of 1982 was named Director of Pro Personnel. 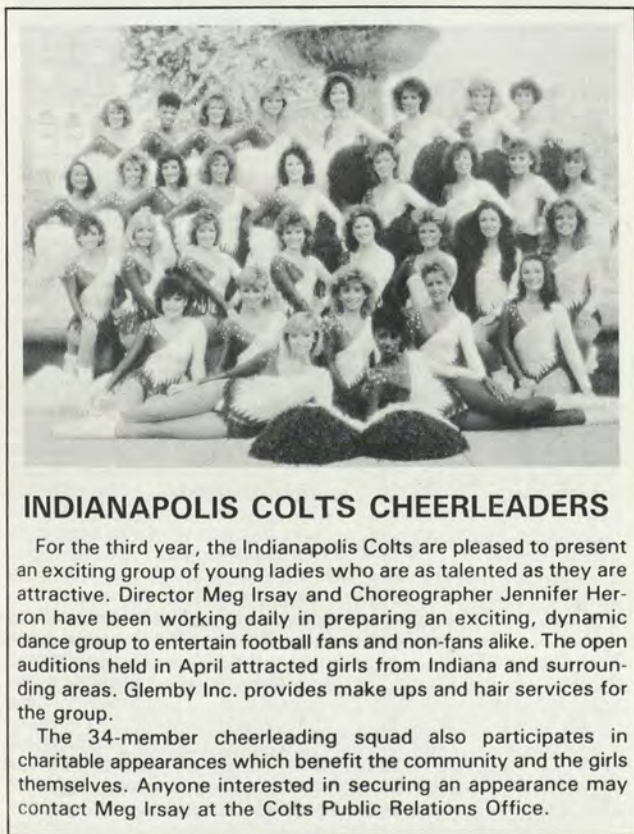

## HOOSIER DOME



The Hoosier Dome, built at a cost of \$77.5 million, is the home of the Indianapolis Colts.

Begun as an act of faith in 1981, when NFL football in Indianapolis was still just a gleam in the city's eye, both the public and private sectors joined in the thrust to build one of America's finest sports arenas.

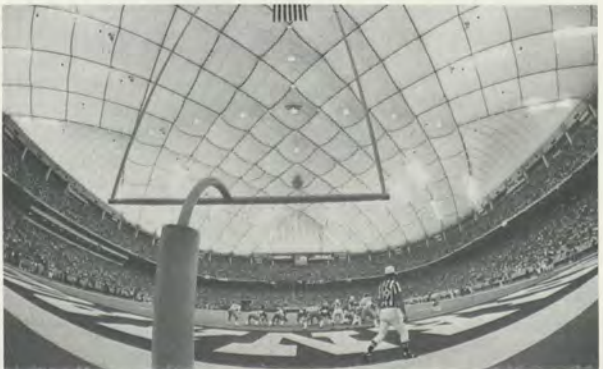
A one-percent restaurant food and beverage tax in Marion County paid a major portion of the municipal bond which funded the bulk of the construction costs. The project was aided in its early stages by a \$25 million commitment from the Eli Lilly pharmaceutical firm, and by a \$5 million boost from the Krannert charitable trust.

The Dome is adjacent to the Indianapolis Convention Center, which was built in 1972. Those two buildings, now joined, give Indianapolis one of the most unique sports and convention centers in the country, featuring 300,000 square feet of column-free exhibition space. The buildings are maintained at a temperature in the low 70s year-round.

In height, the Dome is equivalent to a 19-story building. The roof stands 193 feet from the Dome floor.

The football surface in the Dome is Astro Turf, rolled out in 28 sections fastened by a DuoLock (Velcro-like) strip on each piece. It takes approximately 12 hours to position the surface on the concrete floor.

The Dome capacity for football is 60,127. Ninety-seven luxury box suites ring the top of the lower level, and the press box on the south side of that level can accommodate 127 media members comfortably.





## INSTANT REPLAY

### LIMITED INSTANT REPLAY SYSTEM TO BE USED IN 1986

At the NFL Annual Meeting in March 1986, the clubs adopted (by a 23-4-1 vote) a one-year system of limited Instant Replay of officiating calls for 1986.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a "no frills" approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986.

#### *What is the objective of this system?*

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

#### *What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?*

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

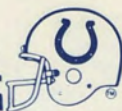
If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted (via a paging device worn at the beltline), and he then will use a walkie-talkie for further communication with the Replay Official.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period (probably 15-20 seconds) after the play is over. (If there is a time out, the Replay Official would not necessarily be restricted to the 15-20-second period.)

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will *not* include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeling; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.

## HISTORY OF THE COLTS

Professional football came to Indianapolis March 29, 1984, when Colts owner Robert Irsay moved the historic NFL franchise from Baltimore to Indianapolis — the friendly heart of the midwest.

The roots of the franchise go back to December 28, 1946, when the bankrupt Miami Seahawks of the All-America Football Conference were purchased and relocated in Baltimore by a group headed by Bob Rodenberg. As the result of a contest in Baltimore, won by Charles Evans of Middle River, Md., the team was renamed the "Colts."

On September 7, 1947, wearing green and silver uniforms, the Colts under Head Coach Cecil Isbell (formerly an All-American player and coach at Purdue University) won their initial AAFC game, 16-7, over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The team concluded its inaugural season before a record Baltimore crowd of 51,583 losing to the New York Yankees, 21-7. The Colts finished the year with a 2-11-1 record good for a fourth place finish in the Eastern Division.

The Colts completed the 1948 season with a 7-8 record, tying the Buffalo Bills for the division title. The Colts compiled a 1-11 slate in 1949. The All-America Football Conference and the National Football League merged in 1950 and the Colts became a member of the NFL. After posting a 1-11 record for the second consecutive year, the franchise was dissolved by the league on January 18, 1951 because of its failing financial condition.

After two full seasons without professional football, NFL Commissioner Bert Bell challenged the franchise in December of 1952 to sell 15,000 season tickets within six weeks in order to re-enter the NFL. That 15,000-ticket quota was reached in four weeks and three days.

On January 23, 1953, under the principal ownership of Carroll Rosenbloom, the NFL's Dallas Team franchise was moved to Baltimore where, keeping the "Colts" nickname, the Texan team colors of blue and white were inherited.

Before their first NFL season, the "new" Baltimore Colts engineered one of the biggest trades in sports history. In a deal with the Cleveland Browns involving 15 players, Baltimore received 10 Browns in exchange for five Colts. Among the players who came to Baltimore in the deal were Don Shula, Bert Rechichar, Carl Taseff and Art Spinney. These players helped the Colts open the 1953 NFL season with a 13-9 upset of the Chicago Bears in a game where Bert Rechichar set a then-NFL record with a 56-yard field goal.

In 1954, the Colts hired Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Ewbank would guide the Colts for the next nine seasons (the longest tenure of any Colt head coach) and lead the club to its first divisional and world championships.

On November 30, 1958, the Colts clinched their first Western Division title with a 35-27 win over San Francisco before a record home sellout crowd of 57,557. Four weeks later, Baltimore won its first World Championship, downing the New York Giants, 23-17, in the fabled "sudden-death" overtime contest at Yankee Stadium. The Colts repeated as champion in 1959, clinching their second Western Division crown and defeating the Giants, 31-16 in Baltimore for the World Title.

In January 1963, Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as the team's third head coach since 1953. During the 1963 campaign, quarterback John Unitas led the Colts offense to eight team records

and set a then-NFL individual passing mark of 237 completions. The Colts won a club record eleven consecutive games in 1964, enroute to clinching their third Western Conference title and first under Shula. During that campaign, Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored 20 touchdowns, both NFL records at the time. The following year, Baltimore tied Green Bay for the Western Conference title. With halfback Tom Matte quarterbacking the club because of injuries to John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo, the Colts lost a controversial 13-10 "sudden-death" playoff contest to the Packers.

Under Shula, Baltimore made its first Super Bowl appearance in 1968. The club finished first in the Coastal Division with a 13-1 mark, then defeated Minnesota, 24-14, in the Western Conference Championship game and blanked Cleveland, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. The team went on to face the American Football League Champion New York Jets in Super Bowl III, losing a 16-7 upset.

In May of 1969, the NFL merged with the AFL and Baltimore, Pittsburgh and Cleveland joined the old AFL teams to form the American Football Conference of the NFL. For the 1970 season, the Colts were situated in the Eastern Division of the AFC and on September 20, the club won its first AFC game, 16-14, over San Diego. In mid-December, Baltimore clinched its first Eastern Division Championship with a 20-14 win at Buffalo, then defeated Cincinnati and Oakland in the playoffs to win the AFC Championship. On January 17, 1971, the Colts defeated the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl V, 16-13, on Jim O'Brien's 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining in the game.

In July, 1972, the Colts came under new ownership as Robert Irsay acquired the club from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams.

In 1974, two young Colt stars established NFL records as running back Lydell Mitchell carried the ball 40 times against the New York Jets at Shea Stadium and quarterback Bert Jones completed 17 consecutive passes against the same Jet club later in the season. Mitchell set another mark that season, winning the league pass receiving title with 72 receptions.

In 1975, Mitchell would continue his record-setting pace by becoming the first running back in Colt history to rush for 1,000 yards, gaining 1,193 yards on 289 carries.

After posting a 2-12 record in 1974, Baltimore's fortunes began to change with the hiring of Ted Marchibroda as head coach in February, 1975. Marchibroda led the Colts to three consecutive Eastern Division titles before posting back-to-back 5-11 seasons in 1978-79.

The Colts named Mike McCormack to replace Marchibroda as head coach in January, 1980. The Colts improved to a 7-9 record in 1980 before recording the worst record in Club history with a 2-14 slate in 1981.

On December 21, 1981, the Colts named Frank Kush to replace McCormack as Head Coach. In addition, Club owner Robert Irsay announced the appointment of Ernie Accorsi as General Manager on May 16, 1982.

Under Kush's guidance, the Colts recorded their first winning preseason record (3-2) since 1970. After two weeks of regular season play, a players' strike resulted in the loss of seven games per team from the 1982 schedule and each team played a nine game schedule. The Colts finished the season with a record of 0-8-1.

The Colts received the first selection in the April 26, 1983 NFL draft and selected Stanford quarterback John Elway. Six days later



on May 2, the Colts traded Elway to Denver in exchange for the Broncos' 1983 first round choice, offensive tackle Chris Hinton, along with quarterback Mark Herrmann and Denver's first round choice in the 1983 NFL draft.

In 1983, the Colts forged the biggest turnaround in NFL history for a team that had gone winless the previous season. The 1983 Colts were 6-4 after week 10 and then went 7-9 on the season. The Chris Hinton acquisition proved successful as the rookie earned a starting berth at offensive guard for the AFC in the Pro Bowl. The Colts' running game came together as Curtis Dickey and Randy McMillan combined for just shy of 2,000 yards rushing to rank first in the AFC and second in the NFL.

Following the 1984 season, President Robert Irsay and General Manager Jim Irsay appointed Rod Dowhower as Head Coach on January 28, 1985. Dowhower brought with him one of the most potent offensive philosophies in the NFL. Under the first-year head coach, the Colts went 5-11 during the 1985 season. The team's rushing attack amassed 2,439 yards on the ground, tops in the AFC and fifth-best in the entire league. The Colts' 5.0 yards per attempt for the season led the NFL.

In more than 30 years of National Football League competition, the Colts have posted a 241-224-7 record, including three World Championships and 10 Conference or Divisional titles. The Colts' regular season victory total of 231 is among the highest of any NFL club over the last three decades.

The success of the Colt franchise is exemplified by the number of Colts who have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. A total of six players have been selected for enshrinement including Raymond Berry, Art Donovan, Gino Marchetti, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker, John Unitas and Head Coach Weeb Ewbank.

**Spring, 1948**—Colts reorganize with over 200 stockholders. Jake Embry named president and Walt Driskill, general manager.

**December 12, 1948**—Buffalo Bills win playoff game for Eastern Division title in Baltimore 28-17 in game marked by near riot. Colts finish 7-8 under Isbell. Dick Barwegen named all-league guard and attendance totals 244,502.

- January 23, 1953**—Dallas Texan franchise moved to Baltimore, Don Kellett named president and general manager and Keith Molesworth, head coach.
- March 25, 1953**—Baltimore and Cleveland put together one of the biggest deals in sports history, a trade which involved 15 players. The Colts acquired 10 ex-Browns in exchange for five Colts. Players acquired by the Colts were quarterback Harry Agganis, tackle Dick Batten, end Gern Nagler, halfback Bert Rechichar, guard Ed Sharkey, tackle Stu Sheetz, halfback Don Shula, end Art Spinney, halfback Carl Taseff and guard Elmer Willhoite. Going to the Browns were linebacker Tom Catlin, tackle Don Colo, guard Hershel Forrester, tackle Mike McCormack and halfback John Pettibon.
- September 27, 1953**—Colts upset Chicago Bears 13-9 in NFL opener at Memorial Stadium before 23,715 fans.
- Spring, 1954**—Weeb Ewbank named head coach.
- February 4, 1957**—Carroll Rosenbloom named president.
- November 2, 1958**—Colts record club's first shutout, 56-0 over Green Bay Packers, to win sixth straight game and also set club record for largest margin of victory.
- November 16, 1958**—Colts defeat Chicago 17-0, marking first shutout for Bears in 149 games.
- November 30, 1958**—Colts clinch first Western Division title 35-27 over San Francisco before second straight record home sellout crowd of 57,557.
- December 28, 1958**—Colts defeat New York Giants 23-17 at Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" game for World Championship.



- December 12, 1959**—Colts score 24 fourth quarter points to rally from 10-point deficit and defeat Los Angeles 45-26 at the Coliseum for second Western Division championship.
- December 27, 1959**—Colts beat New York Giants 31-16 in Baltimore for second straight World Championship.
- December 11, 1960**—Touchdown passing streak by John Unitas snapped by Los Angeles at NFL record 47 games.
- January 8, 1963**—Don Shula relieves Weeb Ewbank as team's third head coach since 1953. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington later named first player-coaches.
- December 15, 1963**—John Unitas concludes season with eight team and one then-NFL record of 237 completions.
- January 20, 1964**—Carroll Rosenbloom purchases all remaining stock to gain full ownership.
- November 22, 1964**—Colts win club record 10th straight game, 24-7 over Rams in Los Angeles, to clinch third Western Conference title.
- December 13, 1964**—Raymond Berry catches 506th career pass against Washington and Lenny Moore scores 20th touchdown of season, both NFL records at the time.
- December 27, 1964**—Browns defeat Colts 27-0 in NFL title game in Cleveland.
- December 26, 1965**—Packers edge Colts 13-10 in "sudden death" playoff for Western Conference crown. Tom Matte quarterbacks club in absence of injured John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo.
- June 8, 1966**—NFL and American Football League announce merger for 1970.
- January 23, 1967**—Don Kellett retires and Joe Campanella succeeds as general manager.
- February 15, 1967**—Joe Campanella, Colts GM passes away.
- March 17, 1967**—Publicity Director Harry Hulmes named general manager.
- November 5, 1967**—Colts score two late touchdowns to defeat world champion Packers 13-10 and snap five-game series losing string.
- December 17, 1967**—Unbeaten in 13 games (11-0-2), Colts drop final game of season in Los Angeles 34-10 to miss playoffs.
- August 3, 1968**—Art Donovan becomes first Colt to be included into Pro Football Hall of Fame.
- December 8, 1968**—Colts win Coastal Division title by virtue of Chicago's 17-16 win over Los Angeles. Colts defeated Green Bay 16-3 day before.
- December 22, 1968**—Colts defeat Minnesota 24-14 for Western Conference crown.
- December 29, 1968**—Colts shutout Cleveland 34-0 for NFL championship and first title since 1958-59.
- January 12, 1969**—New York Jets defeat Colts 16-7 in Super Bowl III at Orange Bowl.

- August 23, 1985**—Colts moved into new training complex in Indianapolis.
- April 19, 1986**—More than 10,000 fans visit Colts training complex during first-ever public open house.

**HALL OF FAME COLTS**

**RAYMOND BERRY**, End, 6-2, 187, SMU

Retired in 1967 as the leading pass receiver in NFL history (now ranks second) with 631 receptions...selected as a "future" choice in the 20th round of the 1954 draft by the Colts... named all-pro three times (1958-60) and played in five Pro Bowl games...led NFL in receiving in 1958-60...holds NFL championship game records for yardage (178) and receptions (12), which he set in the 1958 "sudden death" title game against the New York Giants...last career touchdown reception came against Dallas at Memorial Stadium on December 3, 1967 and covered five yards...born February 27, 1933 in Corpus Christi, Texas...attended Paris (Texas) High School...inducted in the Hall of Fame, July 28, 1973.

**ART DONOVAN**, Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 265, Boston College

The first Colt to enter the Hall of Fame, Donovan was inducted August 3, 1968...played from 1953-61 with the current Colt franchise and with Baltimore in 1950, the New York Yanks, 1951, and Dallas Texans, 1952...all-pro 1954-57 and played in the Pro Bowl game five times...one of the most popular Colts of all time...attended Notre Dame for one year, entered the Marines during World War II, and switched to Boston College after his service discharge...lettered four years (1946-49) as a tackle and was named All-East in 1948-49...reported to training camp in 1962, but announced his retirement at age 37, before the season opened...he was honored and his jersey number, 70, retired in an emotional ceremony at Memorial Stadium on September 16, 1962...attended St. Michael High School in New York City, where he was born June 5, 1925 in the Bronx...lives with his family in Towson, Maryland.





## HALL OF FAME

### WEBB EWBANK, Head Coach 1954-62

Ewbank led the Colts to consecutive World Championships in 1958 and 1959...defeated the N.Y. Giants 23-17 in sudden death overtime thriller called "the greatest game ever played" ...beat the Giants again in '59 31-16 to win second world title...had a career mark of 59-52-1 in 9 seasons with Colts...left Baltimore in '62 to become head coach of the N.Y. Jets...led the Jets to a Super Bowl Championship in '68 defeating the Colts 16-7 in Super Bowl III...had a career coaching record in New York of 71-77-6, giving him a career record of 130-129-7 for 20 years in the NFL/AFL...his 4-1 postseason mark gives him 134 career victories to rank 10th on the all-time list...is the only coach in NFL history to win world championships in both the NFL and AFL...nine years as head coach of the Colts is the longest coaching tenure in Colts history...born in Richmond, Indiana on May 6, 1907...attended Richmond High School where he was a three sport-star...graduated from Miami of Ohio in 1928...Coached basketball for 13 years at Miami...coached with Paul Brown at the naval base at Great Lakes...rejoined Brown in '49 as the Cleveland Browns tackle coach...joined the Colts in 1954 succeeding Keith Molesworth.



### GINO MARCHETTI, Defensive End, 6-4, 245, San Francisco

Marchetti, acclaimed as the greatest defensive end in pro football history during the 1969 NFL 50th anniversary, was inducted into the Hall of Fame on July 29, 1972...named all-pro nine consecutive seasons (1956-64) and played in every Pro Bowl game from 1954 through 1964, with the exception of the 1958 game, which he missed with a broken ankle suffered in the "sudden death" championship game against the New York Giants...announced retirement after the 1963 season, in which he also served as an assistant coach, but reconsidered and played in 1964...retired again following the 1964 season, but returned to play in four games in 1966, when the Colts suffered heavy injuries in the defensive line...played his final game on December 18, 1966 in San Francisco...fought in the "Battle of the Bulge" during World War II at the age of 18, after graduating from Antioch (Calif.) High School...was a 1951 All-West Coast tackle selection at San Francisco and played in the East-West and College All-Star games...born January 2, 1927 in Smithers, West Virginia...makes his home with his family in Devon, Pa.



1972 inductee Gino Marchetti appeared in 10 Pro Bowls and was named All-Pro nine times.

## HALL OF FAME



### LENNY MOORE, Running Back & Flanker, 6-1, 190, Penn State

Moore entered the Hall of Fame on August 2, 1975...retired in 1967 with 12,451 combined net yards in a 12-year career to rank 9th among the all-time NFL leaders...he gained 5174 yards rushing and 6039 yards on 363 receptions along with 1180 yards on kickoff returns and 56 yards on punt returns...scored 678 points on 113 touchdowns with stretches of 18 straight games scoring at least one touchdown and 11 straight scoring at least one touchdown rushing; both are NFL records...gained All America honors at Penn State and was the number one draft pick of the Colts in 1956...was named 1956 Rookie of the Year...selected Comeback Player of the Year and Most Valuable Player in 1964, when he scored 20 touchdowns, after many thought his career had ended...born November 25, 1933 in Reading, Pa., and attended Reading High School...lives with his wife and children in Baltimore.

### JIM PARKER, Guard and Tackle, 6-3, 272, Ohio State

A member of both the Professional and National Football Foundation Halls of Fame...the Colts first draft pick in 1957, after twice being named All-America (1955-56) as a guard at Ohio State...winner of the 1956 Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman...also played linebacker collegiately...his 1954 team won the Rose Bowl and the national championship...named to the modern all-time All-America college football team in 1969, which was selected as part of the 100th anniversary of college football...was all-pro eight consecutive seasons (1958-65) and played in the Pro Bowl following each of those seasons...started as the left tackle for the Colts, was moved in 1962 to left guard, and back to tackle in 1966...announced retirement near end of the 1967 season in which he only played in three games because of a leg injury...played in 139 consecutive games, the second longest string in Colt history...streak ended when he missed the Colts game with San Francisco at Memorial Stadium on Oct. 10, 1967...born April 3, 1934 in Macon, Georgia and attended Scott High School in Toledo, Ohio...lives with his family in Baltimore.





## HALL OF FAME

**JOHN UNITAS**, QB, 6-1, 196, Louisville  
 1973 was the end of an era in the NFL. John Unitas, the greatest quarterback ever to put on shoulder pads, retired. After 18 years, Unitas left the game with a helmet full of records.



He was the first quarterback to pass for more than 40,000 yards. His NFL records include most consecutive seasons leading the league in touchdown passes (4) and most consecutive games with a TD pass (47), a feat that rivals Joe

DiMaggio's 56 game hitting streak.

He ended his career ranked number one in NFL history in six categories: most passes attempted (5,186), most passes completed (2,830), most yards gained passing (40,239), most seasons 3,000 yards or more passing (3), most games with 300 yards or more passing (26) and most touchdown passes (290).

He also set several post-season marks including highest career completion percentage (62.9) and most yards gained in championship play (1,177).

In his 17 seasons with the Colts, he established 22 records. During his stay in Baltimore, Unitas was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player three times and played in 10 Pro Bowls, the most ever by a Colt. He was 5 times named All-Pro.

With Unitas calling signals, the Colts won World Championships in 1958 and 1959 and the Super Bowl title in 1970.

Unitas opened his quarterbacking career with the Colts throwing an interception for a TD to J.C. Caroline of the Bears on October 21, 1956. He ended his career with the Colts by throwing a TD to Eddie Hinton on December 3, 1972. Between those two passes he provided an entire generation of football fans with memories and moments that they will never forget.

- 1956 Called the "Cinderella Kid" sets NFL mark for completion percentage by a rookie 55.6%
- 1957 Throws for 2,550 yds and 24 TDs and is named NFL MVP.
- 1958 Led Colts to 23-17 overtime win against N.Y. Giants for World Championship.
- 1959 Throws record 32 TDs and leads team to second World Championship
- 1960 Streak of 47 consecutive games with a TD pass ends. Sets an NFL record of 3,099 yds passing.
- 1963 Completes 237 passes for NFL record.
- 1964 Named the NFL's MVP, had only 6 of 305 pass attempts intercepted.
- 1966 Tops NFL record for career TDs with 232 and most yards gained passing 29,539.
- 1967 Leads the team to a 11-1-2 record and wins his third MVP award in the NFL.
- 1969 Named the NFL's greatest quarterback in honor of the 50th Anniversary of the league. Named the player of the decade by the Associated Press.
- 1970 Leads the team to its first AFC championship. Suffers a rib injury in the first half of the Colts 16-13 Super Bowl win over the Dallas Cowboys.
- 1973 Career ends with 40,239 yds passing on 5,186 attempts and 2,830 completions with 290 TDs, all NFL records.

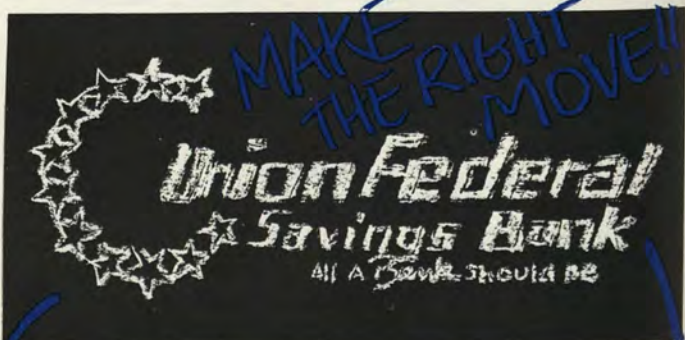
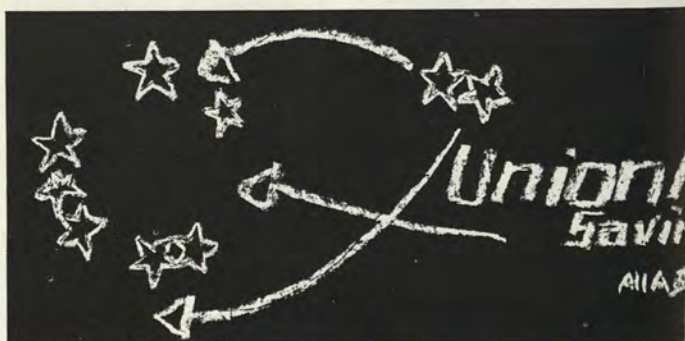
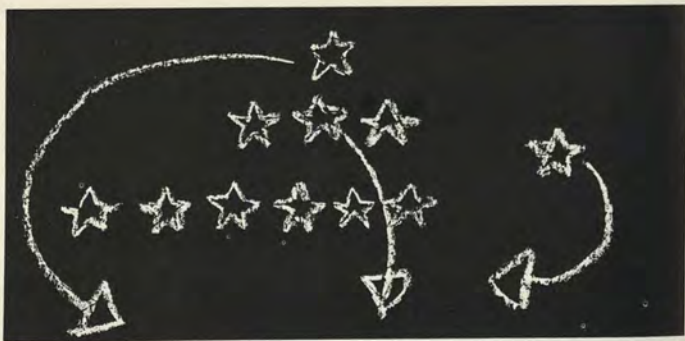
