Out of the uncertain, seemingly day-to-day existence which the Baltimore Colts first knew has come a football team which today is no longer reeling on weak, unsubstantial legs. Yes, the Colts are growing up.

They have gotten over that tottering "awkward" stage of infancy and now head for the football races with greater intent, more extensive preparations and—yes—a better chance of winning.

The early chapters in the story of Baltimore football were turbulent ones. First, there was the ill-fated All-America Conference. The Colts, after gaining admittance in 1947, were fortunate to survive even after the AAC died. Baltimore was one of three teams (Cleveland and San Francisco were the others) to gain admittance to the National Football League in 1950.

But, Baltimore was plagued by many handicaps, in almost every facet of operation, when it joined the National League. Its franchise was forfeited after the first season and only after two years of pending litigation and numerous negotiations was it returned.

That part of the comeback story is a familiar one by now of how the citizens of Baltimore bought 15,000 season tickets (almost \$300,000 worth) in a four-week period to guarantee football again. So, the "orphaned" Dallas Texans were left on the white marble stoops of Baltimore, much like abandoned foundlings. They were taken in and given a new home—and it has been a happy one.

The owners of the Colts have yet to share in the financial profits of the team. Everything has been turned back into making the operation a more expansive and successful one. Indeed, after the last two seasons, each of the Colt players has received appreciation gifts of \$500 and \$300. This was a heretofore unprecedented happening in the realm of professional sports for a team which turned out to be an "also ran" to be so rewarded.

The Colt owners are proud of their employer-employee relations and the public good-will expressed in their behalf. They zealously guard such an enviable position.

They fully realize, too, the trust the people of Baltimore and Maryland have placed in them. They hope they will be forever equal to this important responsibility. They dedicate themselves to making the Colt franchise a stronger one and improving it when and where need be.

Yes, the Colts are ready once again to head for the football races. That championship winner's circle is exclusive territory but it's the only place to be. May we some day arrive.

Our Owners

Every organization reflects the personality, the character and the business acumen of those in charge. And, it can be said unequivocally that any prestige professional football enjoys in Baltimore today is the direct result of the men who own and operate its franchise.

Carroll D. Rosenbloom is the major stockholder and chairman of the board of directors. He is a native of Baltimore, former football and baseball player at Baltimore City College and the University of Pennsylvania. The Blue Ridge Mfg. Co. and the Marlboro Shirt Company are two of his many enterprises with his main base of operations being in New York City.

Donald S. Kellett serves in the dual capacity as president and general manager. Kellett also is a one-time Penn athlete, college coach and professional baseball player. Prior to coming to Baltimore, he had a successful career in radio and television.

The vice chairman of the board is Zanvyl Krieger, a prominent Baltimore attorney. He, too, is a graduate of the Baltimore City College, the Johns Hopkins University and the Harvard Law School.

R. Bruce Livie, a former flier in the Royal Canadian Air Force, golf professional and owner of the Bobanet Racing Stable, is the vice president. Livie is an automobile dealer in Baltimore. The colorful Scotsman served as chairman of the ticket drive in 1953 which enabled the Colts to return to the National League.

Thomas Mullan, Sr., acts as the Colts' secretary. He is a widely known and respected contractor and has had a hand in constructing some of Baltimore's largest buildings. He has been interested in sports all his life and has made an outstanding contribution to the youth of the city through his assistance in establishing improved recreational facilities.

William F. Hilgenberg, the other member of the board, is treasurer of the Colts. He also is extremely active in fraternal and civic affairs and last spring was voted to the presidency of the Advertising Club of Baltimore. He is president of the Seaboard Fish Co. and president of the Baltimore City Fire Board.

Krieger, Mullan and Hilgenberg were among the owners of the old Colt franchise. All three played important parts in bringing about restoration of the Colt team in 1953.

The Colts' attorney and advisor to the board is William D. Macmillan, recognized as one of the foremost legal minds in Baltimore. It was Macmillan's direction which resulted in Baltimore's return to the National Football League two years ago.

'Boss Of The Hosses'

DONALD S. KELLETT

President-General Manager

Professional baseball was Don Kellett's first calling but, as often happens in the game of life, he made his way into a different sport as an executive and administrator. Kellett is president, general manager and a member of the Board of Directors of the Baltimore Colts and, in the space of two short years, has received acclaim throughout the National Football League for his direction in helping to make the newest football team one of the soundest in organization and structure.

Kellett's athletic career has been an interesting and far-reaching one. He is generally credited with being one of baseball's first "bonus" boys. That was in 1934 when he came off the campus of the University of Pennsylvania as the leading hitter in Eastern intercollegiate play with an average of .488. The Boston Red Sox signed him for \$5,000, which was a lot more money then than it is now.

He played shortstop, third base and second for the Red Sox of Bucky Harris and Joe Cronin. Kellett recalls his first trip to the plate in the American League was against Vernon (Lefty) Gomez. "I was so nervous," he says now, "that I believe Lefty could have thrown me a grapefruit and I would have had trouble hitting it. As it was, I struck out. But I guess that wasn't too much of a disgrace. Lefty won 24 and lost 5 that year."

Kellett remained with the Red Sox until near mid-season in 1935 before he was sent to Albany in the International League and, subsequently, to Little Rock in the Southern Association. The next year he was with the Syracuse Chiefs and played the full season before going to Ursinus College as frosh coach of three sports. He was appointed head football coach in 1937 and held the position through 1940.

In 1941, he was named director of Freshman athletics and coach of frosh football, basketball and baseball at Penn. Two years later, he was promoted to assistant coach of varsity football and baseball and head coach of varsity basketball. His 1944-45 cage squad won the Eastern Intercollegiate championship.

In 1946, "Red" Kellett, as he was known in college, joined the staff of radio station WFIL in Philadelphia as an announcer of all

major sports. When a television franchise was granted to WFIL, Kellett handled the first commercial program, a pro football game between the Eagles and Bears. Kellett later became administrative assistant to the general manager of WFIL and was placed in charge of television operations.

Kellett is originally from Brooklyn, N. Y., where he was a four letterman at Erasmus High School. He later attended the Peekskill Military Academy before matriculating at Penn in the Wharton School of Finance. He played football, baseball and basketball and won nine varsity letters.

Don is married to the former Dorothea L. Tevis. They have two daughters, Dona and Dee. The Kellett family moved to Baltimore in 1952, when Don was appointed president and general manager of the new Colt franchise.

He has given Baltimore football an aggressive, wide-awake direction and even his staunchest competitor, George Preston Marshall of the Washington Redskins, has been moved to say:

"Don Kellett has done a remarkable job of organization. He has helped make Baltimore a sounder franchise than it has ever had before."

They Hold The Reins

WILBUR C. (Weeb) EWBANK

Head Coach

There is no end to the preparation, study and theory Wilbur C. (Weeb) Ewbank puts into his football. Every practice session is preceded by a session in the classroom, where Ewbank's fully uniformed squad puts on paper what's to be later accomplished on the field.

The Ewbank "College of Football Knowledge" makes use of the customary blackboard, visual training aids and movies. Written tests are given at the end of each week's training camp work and every game film, exhibition or league variety, is graded position-by-position and play-by-play.

Ewbank, a coach for more than 25 years, is an outstanding organizer and a man who has continually kept abreast of the constant changes in modern day football. He is a graduate of Miami University in Oxford, Ohio and in college was a football teammate of Paul Brown.

"Weeb," so nicknamed because his younger brother, as a baby, couldn't pronounce Wilbur, later coached for Brown at the Great Lakes Naval Station during World War II and also as his tackle coach with the Cleveland Browns from 1949 through 1953.

The congenial Ewbank, one of the most cooperative coaches in the business, won three of nine games in his first season of guiding the Colts. Three of the contests were lost by a combined margin of 7 points.

Before going to the pro Browns and then to the Colts, Ewbank was head basketball coach and an assistant in football at Brown University for one year, 1946. The next fall he moved to Washington University in St. Louis as head football tutor and won five of eight games. His following season, he won nine out of ten for a 14 and 4 aggregate while at Washington.

Ewbank began coaching at Van Wert (Ohio) High School in 1928. He was there two years and then returned to join the athletic department of his alma mater, Miami. He remained there for 13 years before being commissioned in the Navy in 1943. While at Great Lakes, Ewbank helped Brown coach the powerful Bluejacket football team and was head coach of basketball.

When the war was over, he struck out on his own again and the bounce of the football took him to Brown University, Washington University, the champion Cleveland Browns and then on to Baltimore.

Incidentally, Frank Lane, general manager of the Chicago White Sox, related last fall, on the same day Paul Richards was announced as manager and general manager of the Baltimore Orioles, that he once tried and failed to get Ewbank's name on a baseball contract. Lane said that it was when Ewbank was playing semi-pro baseball in Richmond, Ind., his hometown, that he tried unsuccessfully to sign him for the Cincinnati Reds' organization. However, Ewbank refused, went on to college, graduated and then advanced through the coaching ranks.

Ewbank is married to the former Lucy Massey and they have three daughters. Nancy and Luanee are married to former players Weeb coached at Brown and Washington. His other daughter, Jan, is a student at the Towson High School.

FRANK (Red) CUMISKEY

Center and Guard Coach

He was Weeb Ewbank's chief assistant at Washington University in 1947-'48 and Frank (Red) Cumiskey was the first man hired by the new Colt coach when he started out to build himself a staff a year ago. Cumiskey will coach the Colt guards and centers, the same position he handled in 1954 for Ewbank.

Cumiskey was a Big-Ten end at Ohio State in 1935 and later performed two seasons, 1937-'38, with the old Brooklyn Dodgers' pro club. He began coaching at Aquinas High School in Columbus, Ohio, and was there for three years prior to joining the Navy in 1942 and being assigned as gunnery officer aboard the U.S.S. Coral Sea.

Red also coached football in the Navy and was on the Great Lakes staff under Paul Brown in 1945. He later worked for Charley Caldwell as line coach at Princeton, for Ewbank at Washington U. and for Bill Edwards at Vanderbilt.

At Ohio State, Cumiskey played under the late Francis Schmidt and started in the 1935 game against Notre Dame which is regarded as one of the most thrilling in the history of modern day football. The Colts' "senior assistant" calls Youngstown, Ohio his home but he is now living in Baltimore the year-around.

CHARLES (Chuck) WINNER

Backfield Coach

Youthful Charley Winner is regarded as one of the ablest young coaches in the National Football League. He played for head coach Weeb Ewbank at Washington University and in 1948 was the winner of the St. Louis Quarterback Club award as standout back in the area.

Winner turned in an outstanding job handling the Colt ends in 1954. He also cared for considerable scouting and was Ewbank's "key" press box observer on game days. Winner came to the Colts after assisting four years at Case Tech. He also served as a scout for the Cleveland Browns.

A veteran of World War II, Charley was a radio operator-gunner with the Eighth Air Force. He was shot down on his 17th mission and spent two months in a German prison camp. The Colt assistant was born in Somerville, N. J., but now makes his home in Baltimore with his wife, Nancy, and a young daughter.

FRANK LAUTERBUR

Tackle Coach

The newest member of the Colt staff, Francis X. Lauterbur, first came to Weeb Ewbank's attention while he was coaching high school football in the Cleveland area. He moved on to Kent State College and coached the line—and Ewbank continued hearing fine reports about the young man from friends in the coaching fraternity.

Lauterbur, a former Marine lieutenant, will take over the job of coaching the Colt tackles. He is a native of Detroit and a graduate of Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio, where he was an All-Ohio tackle for three years.

The 32-year-old Lauterbur is married and has three daughters. While in the service, he played guard for the El Toro Marines and is regarded by Ewbank as a fine new addition to his staff.

TOM HUGHES

End Coach

Since playing with the Los Angeles Dons in 1946, Tom Hughes has had a varied and successful career as an assistant coach and athletic trainer. Hughes, a native of St. Louis, played tackle on the University of Missouri Sugar Bowl team in 1952.

He later attended Purdue as a member of the Marine Corps officers training program and received All-America recognition with the Boilermakers in 1945. Tom, subsequently, played in the 1945 and '46 East-West games and—in 1949—was an assistant coach in the same post-season classic.

From July 1946 until July 1950, Hughes was assistant football and baseball coach and head trainer at the University of Oregon. The 1950 season found him serving the New York football Yanks as trainer. He spent the next two years coaching at his alma mater, Purdue, as an aide in football and baseball.

For the past three seasons, Hughes has been on the faculty at the University of North Dakota and head line coach in football.

KEITH MOLESWORTH

Executive Vice-President

Quiet, ever-sincere Keith Molesworth has spent more than twenty years in professional sports, first as a baseball and football player and later as a coach in both pastimes. With the Colts, "Moley," as he is popularly known, is executive vice-president of the organization and also chief talent scout.

Molesworth, an alumnus of little Monmouth College in Illinois, was one of the few athletes able enough to mix professional football and baseball and make a career out of both. He played six years with the Chicago Bears in the National Football League and was in baseball's high minors with Oakland, Moline, Galveston, Waco, Syracuse and with the International League Baltimore Orioles for two seasons as a

shortstop. At Syracuse, incidentally, he was teamed up in a double play combination with Don Kellett, now president of the Colts.

Prior to joining the Bears, Keith played with the Portsmouth Spartans and Ironton Tanks. In his first year, 1934, with the Bears, he served as an understudy to the illustrious Red Grange but Coach George Halas later switched him to quarterback. He was a good field general, fine punter and excellent open-field runner.

After hanging up the cleats and spikes, Molesworth went into coaching and was varsity backfield boss at the Naval Academy for seven years, besides coaching plebe basketball and baseball. After leaving the Navy, he managed the Cincinnati Redlegs' farm club at Columbia in the Sally League and lost the 1946 pennant on the final day by half-a-game.

Subsequently, he coached the Honolulu Warriors of the Pacific Coast Football League and won the title two out of three years. He then moved to the Richmond Rebels of the American Football League and won the flag in 1949 and '50. In 1952, Keith was back in the NFL as backfield coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers. The next year, 1953, Baltimore's first season back in the National League, the pleasant native of Washington, Iowa became head coach of the Colts. His team won three and lost nine before Molesworth moved into the administrative end of the football business.

At present, his foremost responsibility is directing the player procurement program of the Colts.

ED BLOCK

Trainer

Trainer Ed Block is perhaps the most important "behind the scenes" man in the entire football operation of the Colts. He was brought to Baltimore last year by Coach Weeb Ewbank, who called him "the best in the business" and his work was worthy of such praise.

Ed is a native of St. Louis and first served as Ewbank's trainer at Washington University, where he also was a member of the faculty. He is a graduate of the University of Missouri and holds a B.S. and Master's degree in physical education. He has his Doctorate in Education from Columbia University and also a registered physical therapist certificate from the same university.

Block, from a family of ten children himself, is a member of the staff at the Kernan Hospital for Crippled Children in Baltimore and is enthusiastic about working with youngsters. Ed served in World War II and was wounded while in action with a tank outfit.

His career includes service as Chief of Physical Training and Corrective Exercises with the Seventh Convalescent Hospital in France and Germany, coaching and teaching at Hancock High School in St. Louis, recreation work in the State of Missouri and physical therapy at three New York hospitals.

FRED SCHUBACH, JR.

Equipment Manager

He's young in years, 25, but Fred Schubach, Jr., is a highly qualified and experienced man in the handling of equipment and in pre-game locker room preparation. His father has handled the same position for the Philadelphia Eagles for the last 16 years and Fred had occasion to learn the business under his dad's teaching.

Fred is a former catcher in the Philadelphia Athletics' farm system and played at Federalsburg in the Eastern Shore League, Martinsville in the Carolina League, Red Springs in the Tobacco State League and Kewanee in the Central Association. He later worked as a bull-pen catcher for the old Philadelphia Athletics and numbers many of the top names in baseball today among his close friends.

He was in the Army Medical Corps for two years during the Korean war and was stationed in Japan at the Osaka Army Hospital. He's married and lives in Baltimore.

Off To The Races

PROSPECTUS

(Or Sizing-Up the Squad)

What was the fastest finishing, most "talked about" team in the National Football League in late season last year is pointing for a quick getaway in 1955. Coach Weeb Ewbank is hoping to spur his Baltimore Colts out of the starting gate with a rush and a roar—but all he really wants is for them to pick up where they left off last December.

Ewbank agrees that little fault can be found with his giant defensive line, which is one of the best in all football. His chief concern in training camp and during the exhibition schedule, however, will be to improve an offense which scored less points (131) than any other team in the league last fall.

The Colts flashed excellent improvement in their final five games of 1954. They lost to Green Bay, 7-6; fell to the Chicago Bears, 28-13; upset San Francisco, 17-13; knocked off Los Angeles, 22-21, and then lost to San Francisco, 10-7, in the finale after missing four chances to cash in with field goals from close range. The victories over the 49ers and Rams, coming on successive week-ends, were the first ever scored by the Colts against their West Coast opponents.

Ewbank has some outstanding new faces to fit into his cast with the likes of Alan (The Horse) Ameche, the Heisman Trophy winning fullback from Wisconsin; George Shaw, the All-Pacific Coast Conference quarterback from Oregon; End Frank McDonald, Miami's fine blocker and pass catcher; Halfback L. G. Dupre of Baylor; Guards George Preas of V.P.I. and Jack Patera of Oregon; End Ray Berry of S.M.U. and Center Dick Szymanski of Notre Dame.

Ewbank, for five years an aide to Paul Brown at Cleveland, is going into his second campaign as head coach of the Colts. The returning veterans are thoroughly experienced in the Ewbank way of doing things and two of his four assistants from last year are back with him again. There will be little wasted motion and Ewbank even brought the rookie delegation to training camp a week in advance of the veteran players.

Since last season, the Colts have lost Quarterback Cotton Davidson and Halfback Bob Leberman to service, End Dan Edwards to Vancouver of the Western Canadian Interprovincial League, Guard Dick Barwegen and Fullback John Huzvar via retirements.

The defensive line is unquestionably the soundest department. Ends Don Joyce and Gino Marchetti, Tackles Tom Finnin and Art Donovan, all-pro choice; and Middle guard Joe Campanella are an experienced, rugged unit and average 253 pounds per man.

Doug Eggers and Bill Pellington are returning linebackers and Bert Rechichar, Jimmy Lesane, all-around Carl Taseff and Don Shula are well seasoned defensive halfbacks. Ewbank will look at Rechichar, Shula and Taseff in offensive rolls. The latter was used on only one offensive play in 1953 but in that one crack got one yard and one touchdown. Then last season, Taseff moved into the fullback position in an emergency situation against Green Bay and rolled for 120 yards—the only Colt back to gain more than 100 yards in any one game during 1954.

Rechichar and Shula are top pass receivers and Ewbank will try them both at offensive halfback and end. The same for Monte Brethauer, who is coming out of service after a good rookie showing with the Hosses in 1953.

Ewbank has a problem at offensive end. He's sure that Lloyd Colteryahn will improve on his first year showing which saw him catch 30 passes for 384 yards. Swift Jack Bighead, the Euchee Indian, and steady Jim Mutscheller, ex-Notre Dame captain, are two other holdover offensive hopes. Mutscheller also can play defense. McDonald from Miami and Berry from S.M.U., a standout in the East-West game, also loom prominent in flank plans.

Ken Jackson and Jack Little, from Texas and Texas A. & M., respectively, are returning offensive tackles and Art Spinney and Alex Sandusky will be back for their second season as guards. Spinney and Sandusky reported to the Colts as ends but were converted to guards during the 1954 training period and, all things considered, gave an adequate account of themselves in their new positions.

George Radosovich, Buzz Nutter, the Colt centers last year, are back again. John Rapacz, veteran of the All-America Conference and five years in the NFL, was acquired from the New York Giants and Notre Dame's highly regarded Szymanski are two other top center possibilities.

The important quarterback position should be improved, especially with Gary Kerkorian now fully indoctrinated in the Ewbank system. He's a good passer and last year completed 53.9 percent of his tosses. Other QBs to go along with Kerkorian, who also handled

extra-point work in 1954, are the aforementioned Shaw, Texas A. & M.'s Ray Graves, Illinois' Don Engels and Maryland's celebrated Jack Scarbath, who came in a trade from Washington.

The halfback situation has a veteran appearance to it with Claude (Buddy) Young, as exciting as ever coming back for another fine year; George Taliaferro, gifted receiver and runner, and "Rolls" Royce Womble all returning. Womble was the "find" of 1954. He was signed as a free agent from North Texas State and turned out to be a dependable pass catcher as well as a strong outside sprinter.

Zollie Toth, who has few peers as a pass blocker, is an established pro fullback of five years standing. Ameche will team up with Toth and they should make for a good veteran-rookie combination.

Now Ewbank is after additional bench strength in 1955 and prefers to have more players capable of playing two or more positions—such as Campanella, Joyce, Marchetti, Spinney, Sandusky, Lesane, Rechichar, Taseff, Jackson, Mutscheller, Nutter and Brethauer.

The Colts came with a fast late season push in 1954. Ewbank is pointing now for the same kind of a start. He's not figuring on bringing up the rear.

Milestones In Life Of The Colts

December 28, 1946—All-America Football Conference franchise awarded to Baltimore.

September 7, 1947—Colts won inaugural game, beating Brooklyn Dodgers by 16-7 score in Stadium.

September 28, 1947—Baltimore pro record crowd of 51,583 saw Colts lose to New York Yanks, 21-7.

April 28, 1948—New ownership of Colts, civic group headed by R. C. (Jake) Embry, president, announced.

December 12, 1948—Colts, playing for Eastern Division title, lost by 28-17 score to Buffalo Bills in game marked by near riot over disputed pass completion ruling.

February 24, 1949—Walter S. Driskill named president and general manager of Colts.

December 9, 1949—All-America Conference and National League came to "peace" agreement. Baltimore, Cleveland and San Francisco taken into newly aligned, 13-team National League.

December 18, 1949—Abraham Watner appointed president of Colts.

January 18, 1950—Abraham Watner withdrew Baltimore franchise and was voted \$50,000 for Colt players which were distributed to other NFL teams.

December 1, 1952—Newspaper headlines screamed news that Colts would return to National League in 1953 with former players of defunct Dallas team, providing 15,000 season tickets were bought in seven-week period.

December 3, 1952—Commissioner Bert Bell confirmed that a new franchise would be placed in Baltimore if 15,000 season tickets were sold.

January 11, 1953—Carroll Rosenbloom became 52 percent owner of new Colts. Other owners were William F. Hilgenberg, Zanvyl Krieger, Thomas Mullan, Sr., and R. Bruce Livie. Donald S. Kellett appointed president-general manager.

January 22, 1953—Colts officially accepted back in National League.

September 27, 1953—New Colt team made glorious debut with 13-9 upset of Chicago Bears.

November 28, 1954—Colts scored touchdown in last two minutes to defeat San Francisco 49ers, 17-14, for first time in history.

December 4, 1954—An 11-yard field goal in last 10 seconds by Gary Kerkorian gave Colts first win over Los Angeles Rams, 22-21, in Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

THE COLTS BAND

There's a special place reserved in the admiring hearts of Baltimore's football faithful for the Colts' Band, a smart-stepping musical array which has been playing and parading since 1947.

Even during Baltimore's two year absence from the National League, the band played on and lent hope to the day when football would return.

The Colt Band, outfitted in "Cowboy and Cowgal" toggery, performs the year around at parades and concerts. It participates at civic and community functions throughout Baltimore and the State of Maryland and has twice been invited to lead the Miss America pageant at Atlantic City. It also has appeared in Philadelphia, New York, Brooklyn, Washington, Hanover, Pa., and York, Pa.

Bob Cissin, a charter member of the group, is director of the Colt Band. Other officers include George Linsky, secretary and property manager; Bud Coward, treasurer; Lee Johnson, librarian; and Mrs. Emelie Cissin, choreographer.

The band is comprised largely of amateur musicians of all ages and occupations—policemen, school teachers, taxi drivers, salesmen, mechanics and students.

At Colt home games, 12 cheer leaders, under the direction of Thelma Mack, lead organized cheering from the stands and also take part in half-time productions with the Colt Band.

COLTS ASSOCIATES

It was back in the early days of professional football in Baltimore that 25 young, aggressive businessmen huddled for the first time with Charles P. McCormick, prominent civic leader, calling the signals. It was McCormick's idea in 1948 that the Colt cause could be furthered on a city and state wide basis by the formation of a group which would work in close unity with the team and its front office.

Since that time, the organization has functioned under the banner of the Colts Associates—even during the two-year span, 1951-'52, when Baltimore was without pro football.

The Colts Associates operate non-profit, meet every week during the season and help in the promotion of a varied schedule of activities. Within their own structure, the Colts Associates have cared for placing players in off-season jobs, housing, staging of the annual Intra-Squad game, half-time entertainment and numerous other undertakings.

Membership in the Colts Associates has been held to a maximum of 25 active members. Edwin W. Adams, Jr., ticket manager and publicity director of the old Colts, is chairman of the Associates for 1955.

The Colts Associates, certainly one of the most unique groups in professional sports, believe that being represented in the National Football League is of a great publicity and entertainment value to Baltimore. They feel that what's good for the Colts is good for the city and the entire State of Maryland.
