ROBERT IRSAY

President and Treasurer



On February 26, 1980, Robert Irsay brought to realization a long awaited dream of the Baltimore Colts, for it was on that date that the dedication of the Colts new five million dollar office/training complex was held.

"This building is a symbol of our dedication to bring winning football back to our fans in Baltimore. This facility is second to none in the NFL," stated Irsay at the dedication, "and we want our football team to match the standards set by this building."

Irsay became owner of the Colts on July 26, 1972, when he traded his recently acquired Los Angeles Rams to Carroll Rosenbloom for the Baltimore franchise. Irsay had purchased the Rams from the estate of the late Dan Reeves.

Irsay was born on March 5, 1923, in Chicago's northern "Bucktown" section. He worked his way through the University of Illinois where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering. While attending Illinois, he was an Illini football teammate of former Colt Alex Agase.

After his graduation, he served from 1941 to 1945 in the United States Marine Corps as a member of the First and Fourth Divisions. He had attained the rank of lieutenant at the time of his discharge.

During the years following his discharge from the service, he worked for a ventilation company in Chicago until 1952.

Starting with \$800 borrowed from his wife Harriet's savings account, he formed The Robert Irsay Company of Skokie, Illinois and built it into one of the largest and most respected heating, air conditioning and ventilating companies in the world. During its twenty plus years, The Robert Irsay Company completed contracts on some of the largest buildings in the famed Chicago "Loop." The company also includes Cobo Arena in Detroit, Disney World in Orlando and countless commercial and residential projects among its achievements.

In 1971, Irsay sold his company to a company listed on the New York Stock Exchange. He remained associated with the firm until 1978 when he formed Colt Construction and Development Company and its affiliate Colt Developers Co., diversified construction and development companies, with offices in Baltimore, Los Angeles, Denver and Chicago. These companies were responsible for the construction of the Colt complex.

His success in the business world has enabled him to make significant contributions of time and money to many charitable organizations. A strong supporter of the Colts Corrals, he has contributed heavily to their charities as well as to the Stritch School of Medicine at Loyola University. He is an active fund raiser for the Clearbrook Center for Retarded Children in Rolling Meadows, Illinois and for the Troubled Children's Foundation Center in Hialeah, Florida. For his community work in Baltimore, Irsay was honored by the Eastside Athletic Club as their "1978 Man of the Year." He is a member of the Executive Committee of NFL Properties, which dedicates a majority of its earnings to NFL Charities. He served as Tournament Chairman for the NFL/Colts Alumni Charity Golf Classic held last May in Baltimore for the benefit of the Maryland Special Olympics.

Irsay and his wife, Harriet, have two sons, Tom (27) and Jim (22), a senior at Southern Methodist University. The Irsay's first grandchild, Carlie Margaret, was born on February 16, 1981 to Jim and his wife, Meg.

RICHARD SZYMANSKI

Executive Vice President and General Manager



Dick Szymanski is entering his fifth season as Executive Vice President and General Manager of the Baltimore Colts. His association with the team however began 26 years ago when "Sizzy" was the Colts second round selection in the 1955 college draft. Over the past two decades of his association with the Colts he has been: a player; a coach; a member of the Personnel Department; and, effective January 25th, 1977 the General Manager.

The Toledo, Ohio native played on three NFL championship teams (1958, 1959, 1968). At the end of his rookie season in 1955, he made the first of his three appearances in the NFL Pro Bowl (1955, 1962, 1964). During his 13 year career, he played both center and linebacker. In 1977, he was honored as the starting center on the Colts Silver Anniversary team.

Following the Colts Super Bowl appearance in 1969, Szymanski joined the staff of the Colts Personnel Department. In 1973, he was named Assistant Personnel Director and one year later was named Director of Pro Personnel. It was also during that year 1974, that he returned to the field as offensive line coach under Howard Schnellenberger.

A four year starter at Notre Dame, he played both center and linebacker for Irish coaches Frank Leahy and Terry Brennan. At the end of his senior year, he started at center for the College All-Star team that defeated the Cleveland Browns 30-27 in the Chicago Tribune Charities game. Later that year, he earned All-Pro honors during his rookie season.

Szymanski and his wife, Patricia Ann, live in Lutherville with their two children, Debra Ann and Michael Patrick. He has been named to Who's Who.

ERNIE ACCORSI

Assistant General Manager



Ernie Accorsi is entering his fifth season as Assistant General Manager of the Colts. Included among his responsibilities in this post are: participating in negotiation of player contracts and radio/TV agreements; serving as a liaison with the NFL and the City of Baltimore; and, assisting in policymaking decisions involving all aspects of the organization. This past off-season, he was very involved in the club's new marketing campaign which increased season ticket sales. This was the first increase after

a losing season in 25 years. Prior to rejoining the Colt organization in January of '77, Accorsi served two years on the staff of Commissioner Pete Rozelle as Assistant to the President of the NFC. Before taking the NFL job in New York, Accorsi served as the Colts' Public Relations Director from 1970 through 1975.

Before joining the Colts, Accorsi worked as a sportswriter for the Charlotte News, the Baltimore Evening Sun, and the Philadelphia Inquirer. He has also served as Director of Information for St. Joseph's University and as Assistant SID at Penn State. He is a graduate of Wake Forest University.

Accorsi, his wife Judy, and their three children, Michael, Sherlyn, and Patrick live in Timonium.

MIKE MCCORMACK

HEAD COACH

Mike McCormack is entering his second season as head coach of the Baltimore Colts. After posting a 7-9 record in his first year at the Colts helm, he looks forward to the challenge of the upcoming season. "Last year, I think we demonstrated that we can play with the tough teams," says McCormack. "Now, we are going to have to show that we can defeat those teams."

He was named the Colts' head coach on January 16, 1980 after spending the previous four seasons as offensive line coach with the Cincinnati Bengals.

McCormack was a member of the Dallas Texans squad when its franchise was awarded to the City of Baltimore on January 23, 1953. However, Baltimore football fans had to wait 27 years before they could see him in Colt colors, since in March of 1953, McCormack and four of his teammates (Don Colo, John Petibon, Hershel Forrester and Tom Catlin) were traded to Cleveland for 10 Browns in one of the largest trades in NFL history. Don Shula, Bert Rechichar and Art Spinney were among the players acquired from the Browns.

A number one draft pick in 1951 from the University of Kansas, he played ten seasons in the NFL. Drafted by the New York Yanks, he played one season at Yankee Stadium before serving two years in the Army and missing the 1952 and 1953 seasons. During that time, the Yanks moved to Dallas and played one season before moving to Baltimore in 1953. It was during his service hitch that Colt General Manager Don Kelleff traded him to the Browns.

In Cleveland, McCormack earned a reputation as being one of the finest offensive tackles in the game. Six times he was named to the Pro Bowl game. During his nine seasons with the Browns, he played in three NFL Championship games, winning the NFL title twice, in 1954 and 1955. He retired as a player in 1962.

Following his retirement, he returned to his hometown of Kansas City, Kansas where he started a very successful career in insurance. While in KC, he was active in a project that brought professional football to that City.

He returned to football in 1966 when Otto Graham, his former teammate, offered him a spot on the coaching staff of the Washington Redskins working with the offensive line. He remained in Washington until 1972. During that six year period, he coached under Graham, Bill Austin, the late Vince Lombardi and George Allen.

In 1973 he became head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles. In three seasons with the Eagles, he recorded a 16-25-1 record.

After his tenure with the Eagles, he joined the staff of the former Cleveland Browns coach, Paul Brown, in Cincinnati.

Born in Chicago, Illinois on June 21, 1930, McCormack was raised in Kansas City, Missouri. He attended De La Salle High School where he starred in both football and basketball and the University of Kansas, where he was an All Big 7 selection at guard and tackle. After his senior season, he played in the 1951 East-West All Star game and served as captain of the West squad. He was the starting right tackle in the College All Star Game against the 1950 World Champion Cleveland Browns.

He married the former Ann Helsby on January 29, 1956. They have four children, Michael (23), Timothy (22), Molly (20), and Colleen (18).



DICK BIELSKI, Receivers

In his eighteenth season as coach in the NFL, Dick Bielski had formerly spent nine years as receivers coach with the Baltimore Colts. After being with the Redskins since February 1973, he rejoined the Colts in February of 1977. He starred as fullback and place kicker with the University of Maryland for four years (1951-54). Selected in the first round of the 1955 college draft by the Philadelphia Eagles, he played tight end for the Eagles for five years (1955-59). He was traded to the Dallas Cowboys where he started at tight end for two years before being traded to Baltimore. As a pro, Bielski caught 107 passes for 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns while kicking 58 extra points and 26 field goals. He and his wife, Jo, have four children and reside in Towson, Maryland.



GEORGE BOUTSELIS, Special Teams/Tight Ends

George Boutselis is in his seventh year with the Colts and the NFL as the team's first special teams coach. He attended the University of North Carolina, where he played quarterback and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1963) and as offensive (1964) and defensive backfield coach (1965-66). He was defensive backfield coach at the University of Cincinnati in 1967-68, before returning to the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1969 as defensive coordinator at Maryland. He moved to Iowa State in 1972 as defensive coach and to Virginia as defensive coordinator in 1973. In 1974, he was defensive backfield coach of the Charlotte Hornets of the WFL. A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Boutselis is a 41 year old bachelor who makes his home in Harrisburg.



JOHN IDZIK, Offensive Backfield

The naming of John Idzik in January 1980 as the Colts offensive backfield coach marked both a return to Baltimore and to a Mike McCormack staff for the Philadelphia native. Idzik, entering his sixteenth season as an NFL assistant, was the Colts offensive backfield coach from 1970-72 under Don McCafferty. He worked on McCormack's staff at Philadelphia in the same capacity from 1973-75. During his first year at Philadelphia, Eagle ball carriers averaged an impressive 4.3 yards per carry. Idzik served as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach with the Eagles in 1976 before taking the same position with the Jets from 1977-79. He played his college football at the University of Maryland (1947-51) where he also lettered in baseball. Idzik began his coaching career at Tennessee (1954) and worked at Maryland, Detroit and Tulane before entering the pro ranks in 1966 as offensive coordinator at Miami. He and his wife, Joyce have three children, Cynthia, Joy and John, a senior wide receiver at Dartmouth.



ED KHAYAT, Defensive Line

One of the mainstays of Philadelphia's 1960 NFL championship defensive unit, Ed Khayat joined the Baltimore Colts in February of 1977 after spending the previous two years with the Falcons. A Tulane University graduate, Khayat played 10 seasons as a pro. He was signed by Washington as a free agent in 1957; played with the Eagles from 1958-61; was traded to Washington for 1962-63; returned via trade to Philadelphia in 1964-65; and then ended his career with Boston of the old AFL in 1966. Since 1967, his NFL coaching positions have been defensive line, New Orleans, 1967-70; defensive line until promoted to head coach, Philadelphia (three games into the season) 1971 (finishing 6-4-1) and 1972 (2-11-1); defensive line, Detroit, 1973-74, and Atlanta. The 46 year old Khayat is a native of Moss Point, Miss. He and his wife, Deborah, have two children, Eddie, Jr. (12), and Bill (8).



JOHN SYMANK, Defensive Backfield

John Symank will be entering his third year with the Colts and the eighteenth season of his coaching career. Symank joined the Colts staff in March, 1979 after serving as defensive backfield coach with the New York Giants (1974-78) and the Atlanta Falcons (1966-68). Between his stints with Atlanta and New York, he held collegiate head coach positions at Northern Arizona (1969-70) and Texas-Arlington (1971-73). Symank played seven seasons in the NFL mostly with the Green Bay Packers. He signed with Green Bay before the 1957 season after playing collegiate football at the University of Florida and Arlington State Junior College in Texas. He played with the Packers thru 1962 before finishing his playing career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1963. Born in LaGrange, Texas, he lettered in track and football at Caldwell H.S. in Caldwell, Texas. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children and reside in New Freedom, Pennsylvania.



CHUCK WEBER, Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

Chuck Weber joined the Colts staff in January, 1980 after serving two years as defensive backfield coach with the Cleveland Browns. Entering his eighteenth season at the professional level, Weber began his coaching career with the AFL's Boston Patriots (1964-67) as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator before moving to San Diego for two seasons. In 1970, he moved to Cincinnati where he worked six years as defensive backfield coach before joining St. Louis in the same capacity for 1976-77. Weber's playing career as a linebacker covered seven years (1955-61) with the Cleveland Browns, Chicago Cardinals and Philadelphia Eagles. The Philadelphia native has had the distinction of playing on two different NFL championship teams—the '55 Browns and the '60 Eagles. Weber is a graduate of West Chester State College (Pa.) and holds a masters degree in Administration from Temple University. He and his wife, Ginnie, have five children and reside in Upperco, Maryland.



RAY WIETecha, Offensive Line

One of three new additions to the Colts staff last year was offensive line coach Ray Wietecha. Wietecha joined the Colts in February, 1980, after spending two years out of the coaching profession as vice president of a New York city moving company. He began his pro coaching career with the Rams offensive line in 1963 before moving to Green Bay. During his five seasons (1965-70) with the Packers, he was in charge of the offensive line and the running game, the club won 51 games, three NFL titles and two Super Bowl championships. The East Chicago, Indiana native became a scout for the N.Y. Giants in 1971 before moving to offensive line coach for the next five seasons. His last coaching job was at Buffalo in 1977. A graduate of Northwestern University, Wietecha was the N.Y. Giants starting center for ten seasons (1953-62) and played in four Pro Bowls. He and his wife, Joan, have four children.



JOE VITT, Weight Training Coordinator

Joe Vitt is entering his third year with the Colts as the club's weight training coordinator. His responsibilities include year-round supervision of the players' weight training and conditioning programs. He also serves as a defensive aide and assists the coaching staff in film breakdown and preparation of the defensive game plan. During the off-season, he serves as coach of the Colts basketball team. Vitt joined the Colts in June, 1979 after serving three years as general manager of the Nautilus Fitness Center in Towson, Maryland. He lettered for three years as a linebacker at Towson State University where he pursued a degree in Physical Education. Vitt was raised in Blackwood, New Jersey, just outside of Philadelphia, where he achieved All-State football and baseball honors as a high school athlete. He and his wife, Linda, reside in Towson, Maryland with their son, Joe, Jr., born in March, 1980.



CLYDE POWERS, Special Assignments

Clyde Powers joined the Colts coaching staff on July 8, 1980 after playing six years in the NFL. As assistant coach for special assignments, he has many varied responsibilities ranging from on the field coaching, to scouting the Colts next opponent, to assisting in the breakdown of offensive game films. Selected in the fifth round of the '74 draft by the NY Giants, he played four seasons with the Giants until his release at the start of the '78 season. He played the final '78 game with the KC Chiefs and reported to their camp in '79. A knee injury ended his playing career. He was a three-year letter winner at Oklahoma and earned All Big 8 honors at safety his senior year. He played in the Senior Bowl with Mike McCormack as his coach, and the Blue-Gray All Star games. He was born on August 19, 1951 in Pascagoula, Mississippi. He grew up in Lawton, Oklahoma and lived there during the off seasons. He is single and resides in Randallstown, Maryland.



ED BLOCK, Trainer Emeritus

For the past 26 years he has been known as "Ed Block of the Colts", and has served as friend, confidant, and healer for the players of the Blue and White. Due to a severe heart attack before the '77 season "Ed Block of the Colts" was named Trainer Emeritus. A member of the Citizens Savings Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame, Block has been associated with the Colts since 1954. He joined the Baltimore organization from the physical education staff of Washington University in St. Louis.



A native of St. Louis, Block attended the University of Missouri where he earned his Bachelor and Masters degrees in Physical Education. Following World War II, in which he served as an executive officer for a tank outfit and was decorated with a Purple Heart, he continued his education while on the staff at Washington University and later earned his doctorate from Columbia. In addition to his work with the Colts, Block has worked with the Kernan's Children's Hospital, Johns Hopkins Hospital and with the in-space conditioning program for NASA. In 1978, the Ed Block Courage Award was established by the Eastside Athletic Club to honor a Colts player who demonstrates the characteristics of courage and dedication.

JOHN LOPEZ, Head Trainer

John Lopez joined the Colts training staff in June of 1979 after serving as assistant trainer for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers since 1976. Before joining the Buccaneers, he worked six years as assistant, then head trainer at the University of Tampa. He started his training career while a student at Tampa. He graduated in 1971 with a degree in Physical Education.



A life long resident of Tampa, he has served as head trainer for the Lions American Bowl and the Can-Am Bowl which were played annually in Tampa during January.

He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Associations and the American College of Sports Medicine. He has also served as a member of the Committee on Sports Eye Safety of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

JOHN KASIK, Assistant Trainer

John Kasik joined the Colts staff in May, 1981 as assistant trainer. His association with the Colts began in 1979 when he worked on the Colts training staff during summer training camp. He remained on the staff as an intern during the '79 season under head trainer John Lopez. One year later, he earned a degree in Education and Athletic Training from West Virginia University. In June, 1981 he received a Masters degree in Athletic Training from the University of Miami while working on the college's training staff. A Certified Athletic Trainer, Kasik is a native of the Parkville section of Baltimore. He is a 1975 graduate of Loyola High School. In May, 1981, he was married to the former Sally Grace of Towson, Maryland.



FRED SCHUBACH, Player Personnel Director

Fred Schubach has been with the Baltimore Colts since the club's inception in 1953, serving the past seven years as Player Personnel Director. In those seven drafts the Colts added 14 players who were starters last season. HISTORY OF THE COLTS

Professional football came to the city of Baltimore when it was awarded a franchise in the All-America Football Conference on December 28, 1946. Bob Rodenberg headed a purchasing group which acquired the bankrupt Miami Seahawks and after a contest among the Baltimore fans, won by Charles Evans of Middle River, Maryland, the team was renamed the "Colts."

On September 7, 1947, wearing green and silver uniforms, the Colts under head coach Cecil Isbell won their initial AAFC game, 16-7, over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The team concluded its inaugural season before a record Baltimore crowd of 51,583 losing to the New York Yankees, 21-7. The Colts finished the year with a 2-11-1 record good for a fourth place finish in the Eastern Division.

Baltimore completed the 1948 season with a 7-8 record, tying the Buffalo Bills for the division title. The Colts compiled a 1-11 slate in 1949. The All-America Football Conference and the National Football League merged in 1950 and the Colts became a member of the NFL. After posting a 1-11 record for the second consecutive year, the franchise was dissolved by the league on January 18, 1951 because of its failing financial condition.

After two full seasons without professional football, the people of Baltimore were challenged by NFL Commissioner Bert Bell in December of 1952 to purchase 15,000 season tickets within six weeks in order to re-enter the NFL. The ticket drive was initiated on December 8, 1952 and the 15,000 ticket quota was attained in four weeks and three days.

On January 23, 1953, under the principle ownership of Carroll Rosenbloom, Baltimore was awarded the NFL's Dallas Texan franchise. The Baltimore team continued to use the name "Colts" and inherited the blue and white team colors worn by the Texans.

Before their first NFL season, the "new" Baltimore Colts engineered one of the biggest trades in sports history. In a deal with the Cleveland Browns involving 15 players, Baltimore received 10 Browns in exchange for 5 Colts. Among the players who came to Baltimore in the deal were Don Shula, Bert Rechichar, Carl Taseff and Art Spinney. These players helped the Colts open the 1953 NFL season with a 13-9 upset of the Chicago Bears in a game where Bert Rechichar set a then NFL record with a 56 yard field goal.

In 1954, Baltimore hired Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Ewbank would guide the Colts for the next nine seasons (the longest tenure of any Colt head coach) and lead the club to its first divisional and World Championships.

On November 30, 1958, the Colts clinched their first Western Division title with a 35-27 win over San Francisco before a record home sellout crowd of 57,557. Four weeks later, Baltimore won its first World Championship, downing the New York Giants, 23-17, in the fabled "sudden-death" overtime contest at Yankee Stadium. The Colts repeated as champions in 1959, clinching their second Western Division crown and defeating the Giants, 31-16 in Baltimore for the World Title.

In January 1963, Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as the team's third head coach since 1953. During the 1963 campaign, quarterback John Unitas led the Colt offense to eight team records and set a then NFL individual passing mark of 237 completions. The Colts won a club record eleven consecutive games in 1964, enroute to clinching their third Western Conference title and first under Shula. During that campaign, Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored 20 touchdowns, both NFL records at the time. The following year,

Baltimore tied Green Bay for the Western Conference title. With halfback Tom Matte quarterbacking the club because of injuries to John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo, the Colts lost a controversial 13-10 "sudden-death" playoff contest to the Packers.

Under Shula, Baltimore made its first Super Bowl appearance in 1968. The club finished first in the Coastal Division with a 13-1 mark then defeated Minnesota, 24-14, in the Western Conference Championship game and blanked Cleveland, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. The team went on to face the American Football League Champion New York Jets in Super Bowl III, losing a 16-7 upset.

In May of 1969, the NFL merged with the AFL and Baltimore, Pittsburgh and Cleveland joined the old AFL teams to form the American Football Conference of the NFL. For the 1970 season, the Colts were situated in the Eastern Division of the AFC and on September 20, the club won its first AFC game, 16-14 over San Diego. In mid-December, Baltimore clinched its first Eastern Division Championship with a 20-14 win at Buffalo, then defeated Cincinnati and Oakland in the playoffs to win the AFC Championship. On January 17, 1971, the Colts defeated the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl V, 16-13, on Jim O'Brien's 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining in the game.

In July, 1972, the Colts came under new ownership as Robert Irsay acquired the club from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams.

In 1974, two young Colt stars established NFL records as runningback Lydell Mitchell carried the ball 40 times against the New York Jets at Shea Stadium and quarterback Bert Jones completed 17 consecutive passes against the same Jet club later in the season. Mitchell set another mark that season, winning the league pass receiving title with 72 receptions.

In 1975, Mitchell would continue his record-setting pace by becoming the first runningback in Colt history to rush for 1,000 yards, gaining 1,193 yards on 289 carries.

After posting a 2-12 record in 1974, Baltimore's fortunes began to change with the hiring of Ted Marchibroda as head coach in February, 1975. Marchibroda led the Colts to three consecutive Eastern Division titles before posting back-to-back 5-11 seasons in 1978-79.

On January 16, 1980, the Colts named Mike McCormack to replace Marchibroda as head coach. In keeping with a spirit of renewal, and rededication, the club moved its headquarters to a new \$5 million office/training complex in Owings Mills, Maryland.

In 28 years of National Football League competition, the Colts have posted a 223-170-6 record, including three World Championships and ten Conference or Divisional titles. Since 1958, Baltimore has won 190 games, the second highest number of any NFL club for that 23 year period.

The success of the Baltimore franchise is exemplified by the number of Colts who have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. A total of six players have been selected for enshrinement including Raymond Berry, Art Donovan, Gino Marchetti, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker, John Unitas and head coach Weeb Ewbank.

Going to the Browns were linebacker Tom Catlin, tackle Don Colo, guard Hershel Forrester, tackle Mike McCormack and halfback John Petibon.

- December 22, 1968**—Colts defeat Minnesota 24-14 for Western Conference crown.
- December 29, 1968**—Colts shutout Cleveland 34-0 for NFL championship and first title since 1958-59.
- January 12, 1969**—New York Jets defeat Baltimore 16-7 in Super Bowl III at Orange Bowl.
- May 17, 1969**—Baltimore, Pittsburgh, and Cleveland join old AFL teams to form American Football Conference as NFL realigns.
- January 6, 1970**—Don Klosterman named general manager.
- April 3, 1970**—Don McCafferty succeeds Don Shula as head coach. Shula quit to become head coach of Miami Dolphins.
- September 20, 1970**—Baltimore wins first AFC game, 16-14 over San Diego, in realigned NFL.
- December 13, 1970**—Colts clinch Eastern Division championship with 20-14 win at Buffalo.

Retired in 1967 as the leading pass receiver in NFL history (now ranks second) with 631 receptions...selected as a "future" choice in the 20th round of the 1954 draft by the Colts... named all-pro three times (1958-60) and played in five Pro Bowl games...led NFL in receiving in 1958-60...holds NFL championship game records for yardage (178) and receptions (12), which he set in the 1958 "sudden death" title game against the New York Giants...last career touchdown reception came against Dallas at Memorial Stadium on December 3, 1967 and covered five yards...born February 27, 1933 in Corpus Christi, Texas...attended Paris (Texas) High School...now coaching with the New England Patriots...inducted in the Hall of Fame, July 28, 1973.

ART DONOVAN, Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 265, Boston College

The first Colt to enter the Hall of Fame, Donovan was inducted August 3, 1968...played from 1953-61 with the current Colt franchise and with Baltimore in 1950, the New York Yanks, 1951, and Dallas Texans, 1952...all-pro 1954-57 and played in the Pro Bowl game five times...one of the most popular Colts of all time...attended Notre Dame for one year, entered the Marines during World War II, and switched to Boston College after his service discharge...lettered four years (1946-49) as a tackle and was named All-East in 1948-49...reported to training camp in 1962, but announced his retirement at age 37, before the season opened...he was honored and his jersey number, 70, retired in an emotional ceremony at Memorial Stadium on September 16, 1962...attended St. Michael High School in New York City, where he was born June 5, 1925 in the Bronx...lives with his family in Towson, Maryland.



WEEB EWBANK, Head Coach 1954-62

Ewbank led the Colts to consecutive World Championships in 1958 and 1959...defeated the N.Y. Giants 23-17 in sudden death overtime thriller called "the greatest game ever played" ...beat the Giants again in '59 31-16 to win second world title...had a career mark of 59-52-1 in 9 seasons with Colts...left Baltimore in '62 to become head coach of the N.Y. Jets...led the Jets to a Super Bowl Championship in '68 defeating the Colts 16-7 in Super Bowl III...had a career coaching record in New York of 71-77-6, giving him a career record of 130-129-7 for 20 years in the NFL/AFL...is the only coach in NFL history to win world championships in both the NFL and AFL... nine years as head coach of the Colts is the longest coaching tenure in Colts history...born in Richmond, Indiana on May 6, 1907 ...attended Richmond High School where he was a three sport-star...graduated from Miami of Ohio in 1928...Coached basketball for 13 years at Miami...coached with Paul Brown at the naval base at Great Lakes...rejoined Brown in '49 as the Cleveland Browns tackle coach...joined the Colts in 1954 succeeding Keith Molesworth.



GINO MARCHETTI, Defensive End, 6-4, 245, San Francisco

Marchetti, acclaimed as the greatest defensive end in pro football history during the 1969 NFL 50th anniversary, was inducted into the Hall of Fame on July 29, 1972...named all-pro nine consecutive seasons (1956-64) and played in every Pro Bowl game from 1954 through 1964, with the exception of the 1958 game, which he missed with a broken ankle suffered in the "sudden death" championship game against the New York Giants...announced retirement after the 1963 season, in which he also served as an assistant coach, but reconsidered and played in 1964...retired again following the 1964 season, but returned to play in four games in 1966, when the Colts suffered heavy injuries in the defensive line...played his final game on December 18, 1966 in San Francisco...fought in the "Battle of the Bulge" during World War II at the age of 18, after graduating from Antioch (Calif.) High School... was a 1951 All-West Coast tackle selection at San Francisco and played in the East-West and College All-Star games...born January 2, 1927 in Smithers, West Virginia...makes his home with his family in Devon, Pa.



Gino Marchetti was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1972.

LENNY MOORE, Running Back & Flanker, 6-1, 190, Penn State

Moore entered the Hall of Fame on August 2, 1975...retired in 1967 with 11,213 combined net yards in a 12-year career, including 5174 rushing and 363 pass receptions for 6039 yards...scored 678 points on 113 touchdowns with stretches of 18 straight games scoring at least one touchdown and 11 straight scoring at least one touchdown rushing; both are NFL records...gained All America honors at Penn State and was the number one draft pick of the Colts in 1956... was named 1956 Rookie of the Year...selected Comeback Player of the Year and Most Valuable Player in 1964, when he scored 20 touchdowns, after many thought his career had ended...born November 25, 1933 in Reading, Pa., and attending Reading High School...lives with his wife and children in Baltimore and is Promotions Director of the Colts.

JIM PARKER, Guard and Tackle, 6-3, 272, Ohio State

A member of both the Professional and National Football Foundation Halls of Fame... the Colts first draft pick in 1957, after twice being named All-America (1955-56) as a guard at Ohio State...winner of the 1956 Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman... also played linebacker collegiately...his 1954 team won the Rose Bowl and the national championship...named to the modern all-time All-America college football team in 1969, which was selected as part of the 100th anniversary of college football... was all-pro eight consecutive seasons (1958-65) and played in the Pro Bowl following each of those seasons...started as the left tackle for the Colts, was moved in 1962 to left guard, and back to tackle in 1966...announced retirement near end of the 1967 season in which he only played in three games because of a leg injury...played in 139 consecutive games, the second longest string in Colt history...streak ended when he missed the Colts game with San Francisco at Memorial Stadium on Oct. 10, 1967...born April 3, 1934 in Macon, Georgia and attended Scott High School in Toledo, Ohio...lives with his family in Baltimore.





JOHN UNITAS, QB, 6-1, 196, Louisville
 1973 was the end of an era in the NFL. John Unitas, the greatest quarterback ever to put on shoulder pads retired. After 18 years Unitas left the game with a helmet full of records.

He was the first quarterback to pass for more than 40,000 yards. His NFL records include most games with 300 yards or more passing (26), most seasons leading the league in touchdown passes (4) and his mark of most consecutive games

with a TD pass (47) is a feat that rivals Joe DiMaggio's 56 game hitting streak.

He ended his career ranked number one in NFL history in five career categories: most passes attempted (5,186), most passes completed (2,830), most yards gained passing (40,239), most seasons 3,000 yards or more passing (3) and most touchdown passes (290).

He owns a Super Bowl record for the longest TD pass completing a 75 yarder in Super Bowl V to John Mackey. Holds NFL championship records for highest career completion percentage (62.9) and most yards gained in championship play (1,177).

In his 17 seasons with the Colts, he established 22 records. During his stay in Baltimore, Unitas was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player three times and played in 10 Pro Bowls, the most ever by a Colt. He was 5 times named All-Pro.

With Unitas calling signals, the Colts won World Championships in 1958 and 1959 and the Super Bowl title in 1970.

Unitas opened his quarterbacking career with the Colts throwing an interception for a TD to J.C. Caroline of the Bears on October 21, 1956. He ended his career with the Colts by throwing a TD to Eddie Hinton on December 3, 1972. Between those two passes he provided an entire generation of football fans with memories and moments that they will never forget.

- 1956 Called the "Cinderella Kid" sets NFL mark for completion percentage by a rookie 55.6%
- 1957 Throws for 2,550 yds and 24 TDs and is named NFL MVP.
- 1958 Led Colts to 23-17 overtime win against N.Y. Giants for World Championship.
- 1959 Throws record 32 TDs and leads team to second World Championship
- 1960 Streak of 47 consecutive games with a TD pass ends. Sets an NFL record of 3,099 yds passing.
- 1963 Completes 237 passes for NFL record.
- 1964 Named the NFL's MVP, had only 6 of 305 pass attempts intercepted.
- 1966 Tops NFL record for career TDs with 232 and most yards gained passing 29,539.
- 1967 Leads the team to a 11-1-2 record and wins his third MVP award in the NFL.
- 1969 Named the NFL's greatest quarterback in honor of the 50th Anniversary of the league. Named the player of the decade by the Associated Press.
- 1970 Leads the team to its first AFC championship. Suffers a rib injury in the first half of the Colts 16-13 Super Bowl win over the Dallas Cowboys.
- 1973 Career ends with 40,239 yds passing on 5,186 attempts and 2,830 completions with 290 TDs, all NFL records.

Colts' rookie Jim O'Brien climaxed one of the zaniest professional football games ever played by lofting a 32-yard field goal through the Orange Bowl uprights with five seconds left in regulation time to give Baltimore a 16-13 Super Bowl win. The brutal defensive struggle resulted in 11 turnovers, which prevented a fluid, artistic performance but contributed to the drama of the contest. Dallas nearly put the game away early in the third period when, leading 13-6, the Cowboys recovered Jim Duncan's fumble on the 2nd half kickoff and zipped to the Colts' two in five plays. Duane Thomas, however, fumbled on the next play. Rick Volk provided Baltimore with the opportunity to tie halfway through the fourth period when he intercepted Craig Morton on the Dallas 33 and returned it to the three. Tom Nowatzke punctured into the end zone and after O'Brien's PAT it was 13-13. Mike Curtis intercepted another Morton pass on the Dallas 41 in the final minute and ran it back to the 28. The Colts stopped the clock with nine seconds left in the game and O'Brien made history. Morton's desperation pass on the final play of the game was intercepted by Jerry Logan.

5. Best net points in division games.

8. Best net touchdowns in all games.
9. Coin toss (which Rozelle feels will never be needed).

WILD CARD TIES

BALTIMORE IS BEST SINCE 1953

The city of Baltimore ranks number one in combined winning percentage among cities with National Football League and Major League Baseball franchises since 1953. Over that 28 year period, the Baltimore Colts and Orioles have recorded a combined .551 winning percentage.

The Colts have a record of 213-163 for a winning percentage of .566 since entering the National Football League in 1953. The Orioles have a mark of 2359-1933 for a .550 winning percentage since joining the American League in 1954.

Baltimore's closest competition for professional sports supremacy over the past 28 years comes from the city of Pittsburgh where the Steelers and Pirates have a combined winning percentage of .522.

Since the Baltimore Colts joined the NFL in 1953, the team has won 213 regular season games, lost 163 and tied 6. Only the Cleveland Browns and the Los Angeles Rams have won more games during that 28 year period. The Browns have a 234-139-9 record while the Rams have posted a 214-154-14 mark.

Since the Colts first World Championship in 1958, the team ranks second among all NFL teams with a total of 190 wins. Only the Cleveland Browns have won more games over that 23 year period. The Browns have won 191 games since 1958.

COLTS RADIO-TV NETWORK

The Baltimore Colts 1981 Radio Network will cover a five state region plus the District of Columbia. WCBM-AM of Baltimore will continue to serve as the flagship station for the Colts 26 station network. Veteran play by play announcer Chuck Thompson will do the broadcasts and Vince Bagli will do the color.

Thompson has been doing play by play for Baltimore teams since the late 1940s when he moved to the Monument City from Philadelphia. He began his Baltimore career doing the Baltimore Orioles of the International League and the Baltimore Colts of the All American Football Conference. Nationally recognized and nationally honored, Thompson lists his 1958 broadcast of the Colts-Giants "sudden death" NFL championship game and the seventh game of the 1960 Pirates-Yankees World Series as his most memorable assignments.

Bagli has been associated with Baltimore sports for as many years as Thompson. He has worked in both the print media and the electronic media having worked as a sportswriter for the Baltimore News-American and for WBAL-Radio and TV. Twice nationally honored, Bagli is a Baltimore sports broadcasting institution.

WMAR-TV (Channel 2) will telecast the Colts four pre-season games. Baltimore's NBC affiliate station will air all the regular season games.

THE BALTIMORE COLTS MARCHING BAND

The Baltimore Colts Marching Band, under the direction of Art Schmersal, will be celebrating its 35th anniversary this season. The band was founded in 1947 when the Colts played in the All American Football Conference. The band remained active in 1951-52 when Baltimore was without a professional football team and was a strong force in the city regaining an NFL franchise in 1953.

In addition to its pre-game and halftime performances, the band annually appears in local parades and has for the past 19 years served as the official Preakness band. The band is an all-volunteer group which starts practicing in late spring.

The band is represented at the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio by its first bass drum donated in 1966. The Colts band was the first to incorporate a cheerleading unit into the band in 1954.

COLTS CORRALS

The Colts Corrals are probably the most unique fan club organization in professional sports. The first Corral was organized in 1957 and since then, 31 other Corrals have been formed covering Maryland, Delaware and Pennsylvania. Colts Corral 954 is the most unusual Corral being formed entirely of inmates at the Maryland Correctional Institute. This past year, Colts Corral #534 was also formed at the Correctional facility located in Jessup, Md.

The Council of Colts Corrals annually sponsors a convention in Ocean City, Maryland that attracts over 1,000 Colts fans for a football weekend. Other events hosted by the Council or the separate Corrals include award banquets, bull roasts, dinner-dances and golf outings with the proceeds from these events being donated to charitable organizations. Since their formation, the Corrals have contributed over \$100,000 to charities.

The Corrals have been well represented at the Hall of Fame inductions of Gino Marchetti (1972), Jim Parker and Raymond Berry (1973), Lenny Moore (1975) and John Unitas (1979).

BALTIMORE MEMORIAL STADIUM

Baltimore Memorial Stadium was completed in 1954. Construction began in 1949, the final season of Baltimore's play in the All-America Football Conference, on the same site as the original Baltimore Stadium. Work continued through 1949 and the 1950 National Football League season without the Colts missing a home game.

Construction was suspended following the dissolution of the Baltimore NFL franchise in 1950, and did not resume until 1952. Work continued through the 1953 season, when the current Colt team moved to the city from Dallas.

The stadium, in its present form, was completed prior to the 1954 season with a capacity of 52,000. Additions brought the capacity up to a high of 60,240 in 1970. Comfort refinements have reduced the current capacity to 57,340 for Colt games played before conversion from the baseball configuration, and 60,714, when the football configuration is completed.

The original Baltimore Stadium was built of wood on mounds of dirt beginning in 1922. It was completed in 1924 with a seating capacity of 80,000 and officially dedicated on November 29, 1924, when 80,150 persons attended the Army-Navy game. Capacity later was reduced to 66,000.



COLTS OFFICE/TRAINING FACILITY

On February 26, 1980, the Colts hosted the grand opening of their new office/training facility located northwest of Baltimore City in Owings Mills, Maryland. The complex serves as the home of the football club and the entire administrative staff including the ticket office.

The facility features a two story office/training structure which covers approximately 43,000 square feet. It includes two and one half practice fields of natural turf and parking facilities to accommodate up to 140 vehicles. The total area of the complex proper which includes the building, practice fields and parking lots is 14 acres.

The facility, which was privately financed by the Baltimore Colts Football Club and owner Robert Irsay, was under construction for a total of ten months. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held on March 28, 1979. Colts administrative personnel moved into the new complex on January 28, 1980.

The two-story brick and glass structure is a multi-purpose building. The upper level contains offices for the entire administrative staff, ticket sales and player personnel. Offices for the head coach and each assistant coach are located in a separate section on this level with easy access to player meeting rooms on the lower level. Several conference rooms and a large reproduction center are also included on the upper level.

The lower level consists of a large locker room with 59 permanent lockers lining the walls and enough space to accommodate 36 additional temporary lockers. There are separate locker and shower areas for the coaching staff and administrative personnel. This level also includes a film processing lab which will enable the Colts coaching staff to view films of each day's practice within hours of its completion. There are a total of seven player meeting rooms and an equipment room with built-in laundry facilities.

The players' training room contains an area devoted exclusively to injury rehabilitation with a wide assortment of equipment used in physical therapy. There is also a sauna, a steam room and several whirlpool baths. A six foot jacuzzi enables an injured player to stand upright and run in place for therapeutic purposes. Other training facilities include two handball/racquetball courts and a large weight lifting room.

Adjacent to the building are two 120 yard practice fields of natural turf. The two fields are separated by a 50 foot tower which is used to film each practice session. There is also a 50 yard auxiliary field which will be utilized for practice drills requiring the use of heavy equipment. An outdoor shed, providing 2,880 square feet of storage space, is located adjacent to the practice fields.

The facility is located at 11001 Bonita Avenue just off of Reisterstown Road. It can be reached by taking Exit 20 North off the Baltimore Beltway (I-695) and following Reisterstown Road approximately five miles to Bonita Avenue.

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
