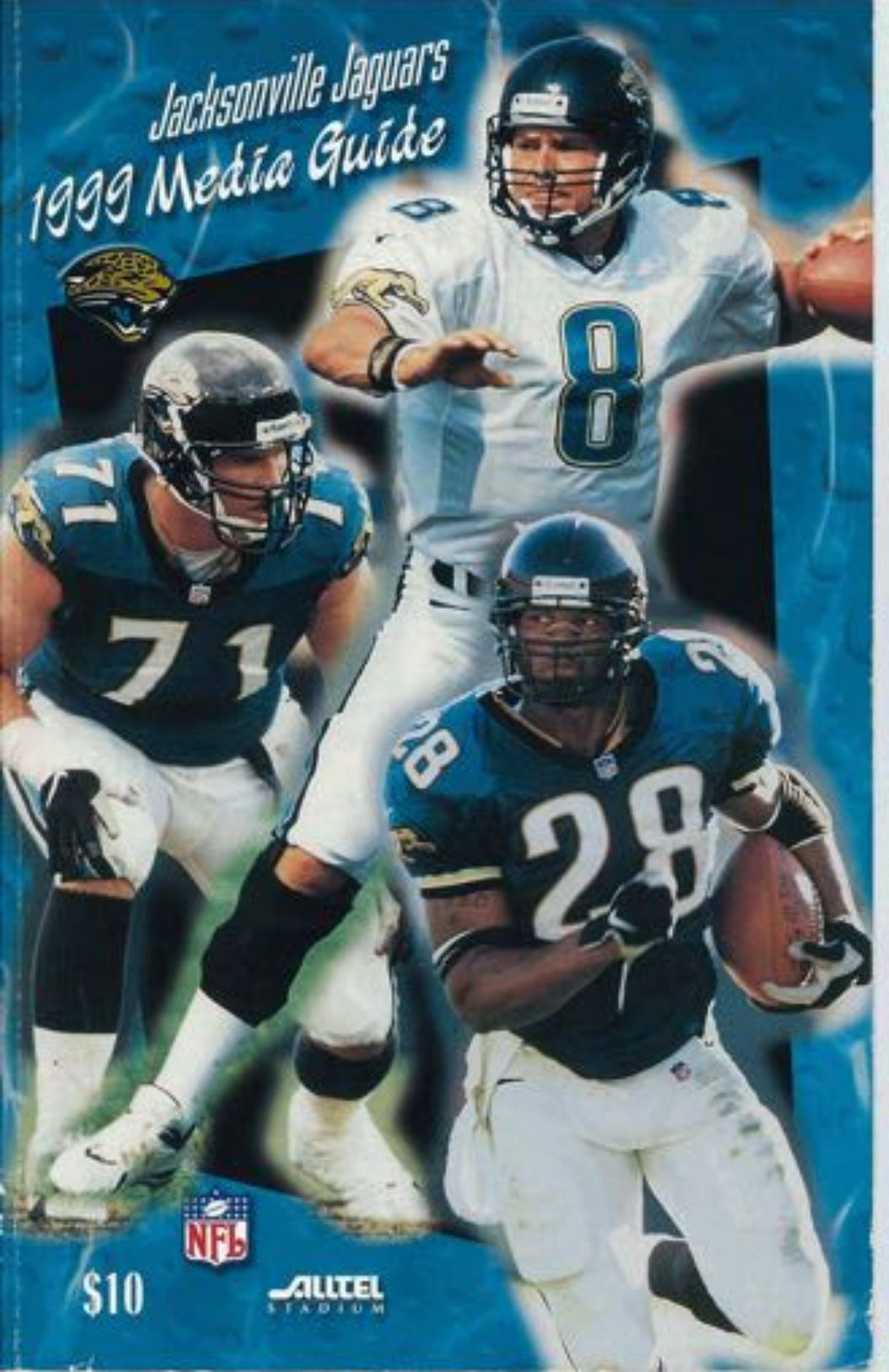

# JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS FOUNDATION



## MISSION STATEMENT

*Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefitting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.*

### PROGRAMS:

The Jaguars Foundation's innovative programs have been nationally recognized, including stories in the *New York Times*, *Forbes* magazine and the syndicated "Osgood File" radio program.

**GRANTMAKING:** From March 1995 to June 1999, the Jaguars Foundation has allocated more than \$2 million dollars in grants. This level of giving is among the top few in professional sports, and we believe that the support will continue to increase. More important, there is a fair, objective and coherent evaluation process to determine support. Grants have been allocated to serve such needs and opportunities as the establishment of a model elementary school-based health center; the purchase of land to expand a multi-service youth program in the inner-city; case management to prevent teen pregnancy and AIDS; and creation of a program to increase teaching and accountability standards for day-care facilities.

**HONOR ROWS:** This unique program, now in its fifth year, uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for agencies, young people and volunteer mentors to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. It provides for flexibility and creativity by allowing agencies to determine how best to use seats as motivational goals. All applications are reviewed by a diverse volunteer committee. Goal setting involves academic achievement, behavioral improvement, and providing public service. In 1999, about 3,200 seats have been awarded to more than 40 agencies for regular-season home games. In addition to seats, Honor Rows participants receive a free meal, a special T-shirt, hat, pledge card, certificate and recognition at the stadium during the game. All Honor Rows youth earning a seat fulfilled a pledge to remain alcohol, tobacco and drug free. The Jaguars Foundation partners with Nike, ALTEL and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation in support of this program and with the United Way to mobilize volunteers to ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of Honor Rows participants. The Jaguars Foundation received the 1996 Governor's Community Investment Award for this program.

**OTHER CHARITABLE USE SEATS:** Honor Rows is the largest of several Jaguars Foundation programs using Jaguars game seats for charitable purposes. Other programs include Sailors Aweigh (for youth whose parents are on deployment with the Navy), youth football, the Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation, Nike Let Us Play Camp volunteers, and others. In 1998, the Jaguars Foundation allocated more than \$300,000 worth of seats to home games to charitable purposes, in addition to other in-kind support, grants and technical assistance.

**NIKE/JAGUARS FOUNDATION COMMUNITY SCHOLARS PROGRAM:** Nike and the Jaguars Foundation partnered with the University of North Florida to create the Nike/Jaguars Foundation Community Scholars program, a novel scholarship program that involves UNF Honors students in



mentoring incoming inner-city students who have participated in the Honor Flows program or the Let Us Play Sports Camp. Student candidates also must be nominated by their youth agency and have demonstrated a commitment to public service. Scholarship recipients receive full tuition for four years as well as mentorship support before and during their college experience, increasing their chances for lasting academic, volunteer and professional success.

**IN-KIND SUPPORT NETWORK:** Having substantial fan, business and media attention allows the Jaguars and its Foundation to act as an intermediary between people and business that have resources with which to assist others and those in need of resources. Examples of acting as a conduit to assist others include free distribution of such things as used computers from a corporation to assist inner-city schools, wheelchairs for needy youth, food products from corporations to local nonprofits and boxes of clothing items to agencies serving the homeless. On a larger scale, this conduit function has also involved significant participation of the team's player and coach spouses. With the help of the Jaguars' Special Events Department, Second Harvest Food Bank and Winn-Dixie partnered with the Jaguars spouses to establish a food drop-off at the stadium and supermarkets prior to Thanksgiving, yielding about 21 tons of food over three years for allocation to families and soup kitchens (players' spouses recognized donors by giving out autographed photos of their husbands). Also, the Jaguars Foundation has partnered with Nike on its Re-Use-A-Shoe Program, the first such effort in the NFL. The Jaguars Foundation collected thousands of shoes that were turned into recreational court surfaces through Nike's reprocessing of shoe materials. This collaboration saved a local youth agency about \$50,000 in construction costs.

**PLAYBOOKS READING INITIATIVE:** The PLAYBOOKS Initiative involves development and distribution to public libraries of 20,000 colorful booklets in which Jaguars players and coaches list and describe books that they found particularly motivating as youth, thereby encouraging young people to read and better utilize local public libraries. Youth receive PLAYBOOKS by obtaining or showing their public library card. Players, cheerleaders and team mascot Jackson de Ville have visited dozens of libraries encouraging youth and parental reading. The Foundation received WTLV Channel 12's "Top of the Class" Award for PLAYBOOKS.

**STRAIGHT TALK:** Under the leadership of Foundation Chair and CEO Delores Barr Weaver, an unprecedented effort called "Straight Talk" involved six local television stations in simulcasting a live town hall forum on teen pregnancy and AIDS in 1995. Since then, the Foundation has established a website in partnership with the Florida Times-Union addressing the facts of teen sexuality, including an interactive question-and-answer section with Jaguars players and cheerleaders; a teen pregnancy prevention videotape titled "Teen Sex ... In Their Own Words" for distribution to local agencies and schools; and an application process for \$500,000 in multi-year grants in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation for programs specifically dealing with teenage pregnancy and STD prevention.

**ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE:** The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against youth tobacco use. The stadium is smoke-free and has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. Additionally, the Jaguars Foundation has partnered with the nation's largest private health supporter, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, to reduce youth tobacco use, sending a clear message that smoking is neither "cool" nor conducive to athletic performance. This novel effort involves "Jaguars Don't Smoke" scoreboard and concourse signage at ALLTEL Stadium, showing a vibrant full-color Jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw. This signage is also used on autograph cards used by athletes, coaches and cheerleaders. This effort has been recognized on the "Osgood File" nationally syndicated radio show. Further, this initiative involves public address announcements during games as well as television public service announcements. Also, the Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from the back cover of the Jaguars game program. Since then the entire league has followed the Jaguars' lead and removed that ad.

# **WEAVER**

Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Ga. and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need, and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and her husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 44 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, and a nine-year-old granddaughter, Morgan. Leigh is the artist of TOUCHDOWN, the 16-foot-long and six-foot-high bronze jaguar that stands outside the West Touchdown Club at ALLTEL Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all six Jacksonville television stations and the local newspaper have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy, AIDS and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars, who "open the doors, and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has already made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, the first grants to 10 local agencies in the amount of \$50,000 were made, and through June 1999 the Foundation had allocated approximately \$2 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit the Jaguars' partners for their generous financial support and the staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term affect.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating sexism, racism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally, Delores serves on the City of Jacksonville Juvenile Justice Comprehensive Strategy Board, and the Governing Boards of the Jacksonville Community Foundation, LaVilla Cultural and Heritage Association, USO Council and WJCT Public Broadcasting, and she serves as a Trustee of Fresh Ministries and the United Way of Northeast Florida. She is a member of the Ronald McDonald House Advisory Board, a staunch supporter of Hubbard House and a volunteer for Habitat House Raising Week. She is Co-Chair of the Sam Kovaris/Delores Barr Weaver Habitat Golf Tournament, which, in four years, has built 11 houses for deserving families who have earned a "hand up." The 1999 tournament raised \$200,893, with a net profit of \$171,814. In addition to the five houses built in 1999, the golf tournament has made the commitment to fund two additional houses in January 2000, bringing the total houses built to 13 even before the 2000 tournament. The 13 houses represent a total contribution of almost \$400,000 since the first tournament in 1996. She says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home."

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of Martha Graham Dance Company and NFL Charities, both of New York, and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge and the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute of Boston, where Delores and Wayne have created the Cauda Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1967. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised \$8 million.

And, yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars. She attends every game and is as excited and nervous as Wayne on game day.

### **PRESIDENT, JAGUARS FOUNDATION**

Dr. Gregory Gross was named president of the Jaguars Foundation after serving as a consultant to Wayne and Delores Weaver on charitable giving. A native of Chicago, he earned a B.A. from the University of Wisconsin, where he received four letters in soccer. He then coordinated a National Science Foundation project at Yale University and co-founded and directed an international education organization in Washington D.C., which was connected to the International Pugwash Conference on Science and World Affairs, the group that won the 1995 Nobel Peace Prize.

Dr. Gross received his master's degree at Harvard and later consulted for Digital Equipment Corporation. After working for several years in the Boston medical complex, he returned to complete his Doctorate at the Harvard Graduate School of Education while consulting in nonprofit management. Having received a research award from the Aspen Institute, he wrote a dissertation on how grantmaking foundations served the disadvantaged. He serves on the 12-Who Care Council (WTUV-TV), University of North Florida Dean's Advisory Board, Board of Communities in Schools-Jacksonville, Local Initiatives Support Corporation Advisory Board, and Public Policy Task Force of the Council on Foundations. He co-founded the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge and has run numerous Boston Marathons raising funds for cancer research. Dr. Gross and his wife, Wendy, have a daughter, Jamie.

### **DIRECTOR OF PROGRAMS**

Charlie Lemley joined the Jaguars Foundation on April 1, 1998, first as program officer and more recently as director of programs. He oversees Honor Rows and Playbooks programs and monitors Foundation legal affairs. He also reviews grant proposals and provides technical assistance to local agencies and other sports franchises.

Before joining the Foundation, Charlie was a litigation attorney for Arnold and Porter in Washington D.C. and for Foley and Lardner in Jacksonville. Prior to law school, he was an air traffic controller for the Federal Aviation Administration. He donates much time to serving the legal needs of disadvantaged children, and he chairs the Jacksonville Bar's Special Needs of Children Committee. He is an adjunct professor at the University of North Florida and serves on UNF's Pre-Law Program Advisory Board and the Board of Family Counseling Services. He has run the Boston Marathon the past five years, raising money for the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. Charlie earned his bachelor's degree from UNF and his juris doctor degree from Georgetown University. He and his wife, Charlotte, have two daughters, Genevieve and Chrissy.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 1999

■ The Jaguars to go over .600 as a franchise in the regular season. They are 35-29 in four seasons. A 13-3 record would move them to .600.

■ Mark Brunell to go over 15,000 yards passing. He has 12,512 yards entering the 1999 season. Brunell could also reach 100 career touchdown passes with 28 TDs this year.

■ Mike Hollis to retain the No. 1 ranking in all-time field goal accuracy. Currently Hollis ranks first with a 81.60 percentage on 125 attempts. In addition, Hollis can also remain first on the post-season field-goal accuracy list (he's 14 of 15 for 93.3 percent). Hollis also enters the 1999 season having kicked 13 consecutive successful field goals, three short of his team record of 16 straight, and he could score 100 points for the fourth straight season.

■ Tony Boselli to make his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl.

■ Reggie Barlow to move into first place on the NFL's all-time list for punt return average. Barlow enters the 1999 season in fifth place, with a 12.24-yard average on 79 punts. With 73 more yards, Barlow would have ranked first. (In the last two years, he's had returns of 72 and 75 yards nullified by penalties.)

■ Bryan Barker to move into the top 30 all-time in number of punts. Currently Barker has 640 punts, 37th on the career list and 57 shy of 30th place. Barker can also average 40.0-yards-plus in gross punting and 35.0-yards-plus in net punting for the ninth consecutive season.

■ Joel Smeenge to remain in first place on the Jaguars' all-time sack list. He heads into 1999 with 23 sacks, ahead of Tony Brackens (17.5).

■ Ben Coleman to increase his team-record streak of 48 consecutive starts (every game since the start of the 1996 season).

■ Kevin Hardy to go over the 500-tackle milestone in his first four seasons. He has 369 entering the 1999 season.

■ The three remaining Jaguars who have played in all 70 of the team's games — Bryan Barker, Mike Hollis and Jimmy Smith — to keep their streaks intact.

■ Jimmy Smith to stay on top of the NFL in receiving yards since 1996. He led the league with 3,750 yards the last three years, 150 more than Green Bay's Antonio Freeman. In addition, Smith can surpass the 300-reception mark with 35 catches.

■ Fred Taylor to go over 2,000 career yards rushing. He has 1,223 yards entering his second season.

■ Bryce Paup to make double-digit sacks for the first time since 1996 and third time in his career. Paup will also move up on the NFL's all-time sack list. He ranks 36th with 72.0 career sacks.

■ Keenan McCardell to reach the 400-reception mark in eight NFL seasons. He enters 1999 with 314 catches (234 in three years with the Jaguars).

■ James Stewart to remain first on the Jaguars' all-time list for touchdowns scored. Entering 1999, Stewart has 25 TDs, ahead of Jimmy Smith (24) and Fred Taylor (17).

■ Tight end Kyle Brady to set a career high for receptions. His best season yet is 30 catches in 1998 when he was with the New York Jets.

■ Camell Lake to make at least one interception for the seventh straight season.

■ Damon Jones to score a touchdown on his first reception in 1999, which would give him seven career TDs on 14 career catches.

■ Bryan Schwartz to surpass 400 tackles in his first four years. He has 368 (team record) entering the 1999 season.

# WEAVER

## CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Just as coaches and players have gameplans, so does Wayne Weaver, the chairman and chief executive officer of the Jacksonville Jaguars.

He wanted a model franchise. He wanted a team that would contend for the playoffs in a short time. He wanted success both on and off the field. He wanted a team that would compete for the Super Bowl.

As the Jaguars head into their fifth season, they are the most successful expansion franchise in National Football League history. They are the NFL's only expansion team to qualify for the playoffs in three of its first four seasons. They are the defending AFC Central Division champions. They are one of only six NFL teams that have qualified for the playoffs each of the last three seasons.

In 1993, Weaver won an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville. In 1994, he hired a winning coach in Tom Coughlin. In 1995 he presided over the building of one of the NFL's showpiece stadiums and four victories for his inaugural team. In 1996 he watched his dream team win two playoff games — one over the Denver Broncos in one of pro football's biggest upsets ever — and reach within one game of pro football's pinnacle, the Super Bowl. In 1997 Weaver saw his Jaguars win 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team has ever won, while advancing to the playoffs for a second time. And in 1998 he presided over a division championship and the franchise's first-ever home playoff game, a victory over the New England Patriots.

Those milestones are the result of Weaver's commitment to winning. Every year a new mountain to climb. Every year a new success. Every year even higher dreams. Only one goal remains: a Super Bowl championship.

"We have improved in each of our first three seasons. We've won playoff games both on the road and at home, and now we have won the AFC Central Division championship," said Weaver. "I think I took it for granted in 1996 when we were just one game short of the Super Bowl, how hard it is to get there. We have proven that we're among the elite four or five teams in the entire National Football League, so we're on track. This season is certainly going to be an interesting one."

One of the nation's most successful entrepreneurs, Weaver brought his enthusiasm and business acumen to Jacksonville, a city that was yearning for professional football ... and a city which Wayne and his wife, Delores, call home.

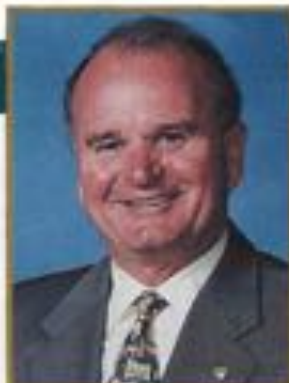
Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his hand-picked staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has long proven to be a winning way.

On March 18, 1993, J. Wayne Weaver was introduced as the managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville, the group that was trying to win an expansion franchise for the city. Fewer than nine months later, the Jacksonville Jaguars were born.

Weaver has been called a dreamer. He is. But he also makes dreams happen.

In winning the NFL's 30th franchise on November 30, 1993, Weaver led Jacksonville to what has been called one of the greatest upsets in sports history and the fulfillment of Jacksonville's more than 15-year dream of an NFL franchise.

Since that time, he has been named chairman of the NFL Properties executive commit-

tee, and he is a member of the league's stadium committee and the special committee on opportunities & challenges.

But Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses, and he is the acknowledged leader in the women's shoe industry.

He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers. Based in Evansville, Ind., Shoe Carnival, Inc., is a retail family shoe company with \$280 million in annual revenue. Weaver has nurtured Shoe Carnival from modest beginnings of four stores in 1985 to a current portfolio of 140 stores.

In July 1995, as the Jaguars went to their first training camp, Weaver became the majority owner, chairman and chief executive of LC Footwear, LLC with the acquisition of the company from Liz Claiborne, Inc. LC Footwear is a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country. Headquartered in Jacksonville, the company is opening Liz Claiborne retail shoe stores nationwide and should have 45 stores open by the end of 1999. In fewer than five years under Weaver, it already has annual revenue in excess of \$100 million.

Previously, Weaver was co-owner, president and chief executive officer of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear, from 1978 to its initial public offering in February 1993. Nine West is credited with revolutionizing the women's shoe market, as sales grew under Weaver's leadership from \$9 million in 1978 to more than \$550 million in 1993.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, in addition to their long-standing commitment to the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute at Harvard Medical School. Wayne and Delores serve on the Institute's Board of Directors, and through the Claudia Adams Barr Program, founded in memory of Delores' mother, they have raised \$8 million for Dana-Farber.

Weaver is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York. # **HUYGHUE**

## **SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS**



One of the brightest young executives in professional sports, Michael Huyghue has directed the Jaguars' football operations from start-up in 1994 through the franchise's first four seasons.

In each of the Jaguars' five seasons, Huyghue has set the pace for all of the league's teams when it comes to signing players. In 1995 the team's first rookie class was signed collectively on June 1 — a first in the NFL — and this year Huyghue again led all clubs in signing their rookie draft choices.

Huyghue (pronounced "hewg") was one of the first people Wayne Weaver sought after gaining the franchise in November 1993. Huyghue joined the Jaguars in March 1994 as vice president of football operations, and he was promoted to senior vice president in 1996. He is also a member of the team's executive committee.

Huyghue oversees all football operations for the Jaguars, with primary responsibility for negotiating player contracts and administering the salary cap, as well as overall team budget and administration. He also plays an active role in league-wide administrative affairs, serving on the Management Council's working committee, and the college relations advisory committee.

Huyghue was previously the Detroit Lions' vice president of administration and general counsel. He oversaw the day-to-day administrative responsibilities, negotiated player contracts and was instrumental in guiding the Lions to the NFC Central Division championship in 1993.

In 1992 Huyghue served as vice president/administration and general counsel for the World League. During the 1991 season he was the general manager of the Birmingham Fire, which he directed to the North American West Division Championship.

From 1987 to '90, Huyghue was labor relations counsel to the NFL's Management Council, where he advised the then-28 member clubs on interpretation and enforcement of Collective Bargaining Agreement provisions between the league and the NFL Players Association. Rounding out his labor experience, Huyghue also served briefly in the legal department of the NFL Players' Association in 1987.

Huyghue earned a bachelor's degree in communication arts from Cornell University, where he excelled in baseball and was a three-year starter at wide receiver on the football team. He went on to earn a juris doctor degree from the University of Michigan Law School in 1987 and is a member of the State Bar in New York, New Jersey, and Michigan. Huyghue was recently elected to serve as a member of the Board of Trustees at Cornell.

### **VICE PRESIDENT, ADMINISTRATION/ GENERAL COUNSEL**

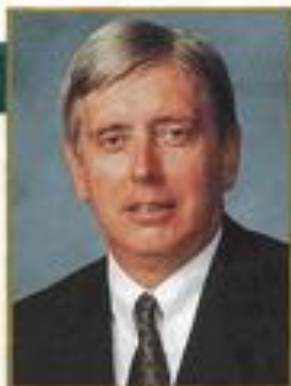

# COUGHLIN

## HEAD COACH

In each of the Jacksonville Jaguars' four seasons, the team has made steady improvement from the previous year. In a short span of time, they have grown from an expansion franchise into one of the NFL's elite teams. And they enter the 1999 season as a strong Super Bowl contender.

The guiding force behind the success of the team is head coach Tom Coughlin. His quest for success permeates the organization, and his drive is embedded in his players. His standards are high, and his goals are even higher.

In 1995, the Jaguars won four games, more than any previous expansion team in NFL history. In 1996, they went to the playoffs and advanced all the way to the AFC Championship game. In 1997, the Jaguars won a team-record 11 games. And in 1998 they won 11 more games, including their first division championship and home playoff game.

Coughlin has guided the Jaguars from their infancy to three straight playoff berths and one AFC Championship game appearance, and they now head into each season with the Super Bowl as a realistic goal, not just a wishful dream.

Coughlin laid the foundation for a winning team in Jacksonville by preaching discipline and hard work, and his tenacity and determination quickly turned a new franchise into the most successful expansion team in NFL history.

Firm, fair, honest and demanding are the four words that describe Coughlin best. "I have very high levels of expectations, and I think players need that," he says. "Players want discipline; they want organization. We emphasize responsibility and accountability, and all the little things that help you win in the long run."

The proof is in the team's myriad of successes. In four seasons, comparisons can be made against the elite teams of the NFL:

■ The Jaguars are one of only six NFL teams to qualify for the playoffs each of the last three seasons (joining Denver, New England, Green Bay, San Francisco and Minnesota).

■ Since November 24, 1996, when the Jaguars began their first run to the playoffs, they have the fourth-best record in the NFL, a 27-10 mark that is just two victories behind Denver, San Francisco and Green Bay.

■ In that time, the Jaguars have the fourth-best record at home (21-3, behind only Denver, Green Bay and San Francisco) and the fourth-best record on the road (10-8, behind Minnesota, San Francisco and Green Bay).

In 1998, the Jaguars won their first AFC Central Division championship, dethroning Pittsburgh after a four-year run. For the second straight year, the Jaguars won 11 games, seven of eight home games and six of eight division games. They defeated the New England Patriots at ALLTEL Stadium in their first-ever home playoff game, before losing to the New York Jets on the road in the Divisional Playoffs.

Two years earlier, in 1996, Coughlin's Jaguars won seven straight games and advanced all the way to the AFC Championship game, just one victory short of the Super Bowl in only the 35th game in the franchise's history. Jacksonville's 30-27 victory over Denver in that



"The next step for the entire football team will be to take our performance to another level. Everyone has to go beyond self and think about winning and what it takes to win. We need to become a more mature football team, with zero tolerance for errors and with players putting pressure on players to prepare properly, to perform and execute properly. season's playoffs is widely acknowledged as the biggest upset in pro football history since the New York Jets beat the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl III. Coughlin was named the 1996 AFC Coach of the Year by United Press International.

Coughlin was named head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars on February 21, 1994, the hand-picked choice of owner Wayne Weaver. "One of the things I was tremendously impressed with was Tom's discipline, attitude and decisiveness of how he would build this franchise," Weaver said. "It was apparent to me that Tom was not only a brilliant football coach, but he's also an extraordinarily bright man who understands the organization, administration and detail that are needed to build something from the beginning."

A veteran of 30 years in the coaching profession, Coughlin had 25 years of coaching experience before he took over the Jaguars, including seven years as a college head coach and seven seasons as an NFL assistant coach.

He spent the 1984 and '85 seasons as the wide receivers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, and he was with the Green Bay Packers in 1986 and '87 as the receivers coach. He served with the New York Giants from 1988 to '90 as the receivers coach, contributing to the Super Bowl XXV victory over Buffalo in his last season with the Giants. In 1993, Coughlin was offered the opportunity to return to the Giants as their head coach, but he declined the job so he could continue building the Boston College football program.

Coughlin's arrival in Jacksonville followed three seasons (1991-93) as head coach at Boston College, where he turned a struggling football program into a Top 20 team. Posting a 21-13-1 record in three seasons, Coughlin capped his Boston College tenure with a 9-3 record in 1993 which included eight consecutive wins, a 41-39 defeat of No. 1-ranked Notre Dame and a victory over Virginia in the Carquest Bowl. His last Boston College team was ranked 13th in the Associated Press poll and 12th in the USA Today/CNN coaches poll, despite beginning the season with an 0-2 start.

He led Boston College to an 8-2-1 record in 1992, including a Hall of Fame Bowl berth, after posting a 4-7 mark in his first season.

It was at Boston College where Coughlin met Jay McGillis, a special young player who died of leukemia at the age of 21. In 1996 Coughlin started the Jay Fund Foundation in honor of McGillis, and in the last four years the annual Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation Celebrity Golf Classic has awarded more than \$450,000 to Jacksonville-area pediatric leukemia patients and their families.

"It's hard enough to undergo a family crisis of health. But on top of that to have the questions of whether or not the family can function as a unit because of impending bills, that has to be catastrophic," said Coughlin. "So I think whatever we can do along those lines is a great thing — and in Jay's name."

Coughlin began his coaching career in 1969 as a graduate assistant at Syracuse, his alma mater. The next season he began a four-year stint at Rochester Institute of Technology, where he served as head coach from 1970 to '73, compiling a record of 16-15-2. Coughlin returned to Syracuse under Frank Maloney in 1974 and held the position of offensive coordinator from 1977 to '80, directing an offense that led the Orangemen to a berth and victory in the 1979 Independence Bowl, Syracuse's first postseason appearance in 13 years.

In 1981 Coughlin went to Boston College for the first time, as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under Jack Bicknell. He helped the Eagles win their first bowl bid in 40 years while coaching Doug Flutie, the 1984 Heisman Trophy winner. In 1983, Coughlin's last season as a Boston College assistant coach, the team earned the Lambert-Meadowlands Trophy as Eastern Champion, the first won by the Eagles since 1942.

Coughlin's playing career began as a standout scholastic star at Waterloo (N.Y.) Central High School in his hometown. He attended Syracuse University, where he was a three-year letterman for legendary coach Ben Schwartzwalder from 1965 to '67. A wing-back for the Orangemen, Coughlin played alongside All-America backs Larry Csonka and Floyd Little. He played in the 1966 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville against Tennessee. As a senior in 1967, he broke the Syracuse single-season pass receiving record, which had stood since the 1950s. An excellent student, Coughlin also won Syracuse's Orange Key Award that year as the university's outstanding scholar athlete. He graduated in 1968 with a bachelor's degree in education, and in 1969 he received his master's degree in education.

The oldest of seven children, Thomas Richard Coughlin was born August 31, 1946 in Waterloo, N.Y. He and his wife, Judy, have two daughters, Keli and Katie, and two sons, Tim and Brian.

The Jaguars' thrilling success in Coughlin's first four seasons as head coach have raised the level of expectations as the team prepares for Year Five and another run at the Super Bowl.

"If you're going to be a good football team, you're going to be a good football team all of the time," says Coughlin. "We must be able to perform against the very best in the league and win, and that would be teams like Denver and Minnesota and the New York Jets. That's the next level. If we can beat them during the regular season, then we have every right to think we could be successful in the Super Bowl. We can't be a good football team just once in a while. We pride ourselves as an organization on trying to do everything right, so we'll do whatever it takes to accomplish our goals."

John Bonamego was named assistant special teams coach of the Jaguars on March 19, replacing Joe Baker, who went to the University of Wisconsin. He joins the Jaguars from the U.S. Military Academy, where he was an assistant coach the last six years.

Bonamego, 35, assists special teams coordinator Larry Pasquale, and is directly involved in all areas of special teams, including the preparation of game plans and sideline coaching.

At Army, Bonamego was the special teams coach and recruiting coordinator from 1994 to '98 after serving as an assistant outside linebackers coach in 1993. At Army, he coached two of the team's top three all-time punters, three of the top 10 kickoff returners and three of the top 10 field goal kickers, and his units blocked 13 punts and scored five touchdowns in four years.

Bonamego was the running backs and special teams coach at Lehigh in 1992, and he served at Maine from 1988 to '91, two years as a graduate assistant and two years in charge of wide receivers and special teams. He was the head coach at Mt. Pleasant (Mich.) High School in 1987, and he began his career as a player-coach with the Verona (Italy) Redskins in 1986.

Bonamego was born August 14, 1963 in Waynesboro, Pa. He received a degree in health fitness in 1987 at Central Michigan, where he lettered twice at wide receiver and quarterback. He earned a master's degree in physical education from Maine in 1992. A native of Paw Paw, Mich., he is single and lives in Neptune Beach.

## **CAPERS**

### **DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

**NFL: 14TH SEASON**

**JAGUARS: 1ST SEASON**

Dom Capers joined the Jaguars as defensive coordinator on January 26, and he has the task of improving what was the NFL's 25th-ranked defense in 1998. He replaced Dick Jauron, who is now the head coach of the Chicago Bears.

Capers brings 27 years of coaching experience to Jacksonville, where he will work with a veteran defense that has been reinforced with the addition of safety Camell Lake, defensive tackle Gary Walker and top draft choices cornerback Fernando Bryant and defensive tackle Larry Smith.

Long considered one of the top defensive coaches in the NFL, Capers was the head coach of the Carolina Panthers from 1995 to '98, compiling a 30-34 record and leading the Panthers to the NFC Championship game in 1996.

In January 1995, Capers was named the first coach of the expansion Panthers. In the team's first season, the Panthers opened with five straight losses, but rebounded to win seven of the last 11 games, giving them a 7-9 record that set an NFL record for most victories by an expansion team. Included in that season were several other expansion firsts:



a four-game winning streak, a victory over a defending Super Bowl champion (San Francisco), and a winning home record (5-3).

In 1996, Capers' Panthers started off 5-4, then won their last seven games to claim the NFC Western Division championship. They defeated defending Super Bowl champion Dallas before losing to eventual Super Bowl champion Green Bay in the NFC Championship game. En route, the Panthers' defense finished second in the NFL in points allowed, ranked second in the league in scoring and did not lose a home game while compiling a 9-0 record at Ericsson Stadium. Capers was named Coach of the Year by Associated Press. In 1997, the Panthers finished 7-9, and they were 4-12 in '98.

Working with Tom Coughlin adds another prominent name to Capers' coaching background. In 27 years of coaching college and pro football, Capers has worked with successful coaches such as Jim Mora, Bill Cowher, Johnny Majors, Don James and Earle Bruce.

He began his coaching career in 1972 at Kent State, where he was a graduate assistant for three seasons while earning a master's degree in administration (1974). In 1975 he was a graduate assistant at the University of Washington. Capers became a full-time coach the following year, and he had a series of stops that included Hawaii (1975-76), San Jose State (1977), California (1978-79), Tennessee (1980-81) and Ohio State (1982-83).

Capers moved into pro football in 1984 when he joined Mora's staff with the USFL's Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars, who won league titles both seasons. In 1986, Capers moved on with Mora to the New Orleans Saints, where he was defensive backs coach through 1991. In '92, he was lured to the Pittsburgh Steelers by Cowher as the team's defensive coordinator. In Capers' three seasons with the Steelers, no NFL defense gave up fewer points.

Capers was born August 7, 1950 in Cambridge, Ohio, and he was raised in nearby Buffalo, Ohio. He was a star athlete at Meadowbrook High School. He graduated with a degree in physical education and psychology from Mount Union College in 1972, where he played a combination of safety-linebacker on the football team.

Capers hosts an annual charity golf tournament in the Buffalo, Ohio area which has raised thousands of dollars for the American Heart Association. He and his wife, Karen, live in Ponte Vedra Beach.

## WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

**NFL: 5TH SEASON**

**JAGUARS: 5TH SEASON**

In four seasons, Pete Carmichael has developed the Jaguars wide receivers corps into one of the top units in the NFL. The Jaguars have placed a receiver in the Pro Bowl three straight years, and have compiled five 1,000-yard receiving seasons in that time.

Carmichael's proteges, Jimmy Smith and Keenan McCardell — nicknamed "Thunder and Lightning" — have caught 477 passes for 6,935 yards and 33 touchdowns since 1996. McCardell was the first Jaguars player voted to the Pro Bowl in 1996, and Smith has been named to the squad the last two seasons. Smith and McCardell became only the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons (1996-97), and Smith leads the entire NFL with 3,750 receiving yards since 1996.

Carmichael joined the Jaguars as wide receivers coach on March 3, 1994 after 13 consecutive seasons at Boston College (18 overall), the last three as wide receivers coach under Tom Coughlin. Carmichael, 58, is in his 35th year in coaching.

Carmichael began his coaching career in 1963 at Watchung Hills (N.J.) High School and coached to Clark (N.J.) High in '64. In 1965 he spent a year at Virginia Military Institute, then he went to Madisonboro (N.J.) High. That was followed by stints at New Hampshire (1967), Columbia (1974-77) and on Joe Yukica's Boston College staff (1968-72). He was head



coach at Trenton State College in 1973. After three years as an assistant at Columbia, he earned his second head coaching assignment from 1977 to '80 at the Merchant Marine Academy. In 1981 he returned to Boston College to begin a 10-year stint as defensive backs coach under Jack Bicknell.

When Coughlin took over the Boston College program in 1991 he retained Carmichael to coach the team's wide receivers. Carmichael coached in six bowl games: Citrus, Liberty, Cotton, Carquest and twice in the Hall of Fame game.

Carmichael played one year as a quarterback at Dayton (1961) before transferring to Montclair State College, where he continued his playing career. He graduated from Montclair State in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He was born March 4, 1941 in Plainfield, N.J. and attended North Plainfield High School, where he lettered three years in both football and baseball.

Carmichael and his wife, Elaine, have two daughters, Layni (11/15/67), who is married to John Ratcliffe (and their daughter, Madeline Grace); and Kathleen (3/8/70), who is married to Doug Hight; and a son, Pete (10/6/71), who is an assistant coach at Louisiana Tech and is married to Tina.

## SECONDARY COACH

Perry Fewell was named the Jaguars' secondary coach on February 16, 1998, and he now coaches a unit that could potentially be one of the NFL's best with this year's acquisitions of Pro Bowl safety Camell Lake and first-round draft choice Fernando Bryant.

In his first season with the Jaguars in 1998, Fewell coached first-year safety Donovan Darius, who was named to several All-Rookie teams.

Now in his 15th year in coaching, the 36-year-old Fewell joined the Jaguars from Vanderbilt, where he served as secondary coach from 1995 to '97 and was also assistant head coach in 1997. That year, Vanderbilt had its best overall defense in school history and led the Southeastern Conference for the first time ever. Fewell was largely responsible for the development of Corey Chavous, who was selected by Arizona with the 33rd pick in the 1998 draft.

Fewell attended South Point High in Belmont, N.C., where he played football and participated in track. He went to Lenoir-Rhyne College, graduating with a degree in business administration in 1985. He lettered four years in football and was named the team's Most Improved Player in 1983. Following his playing career he spent one year as a graduate assistant at his alma mater.

Fewell was a graduate assistant at the University of North Carolina in 1985 and '86. He was the defensive backs coach at Army in 1987, then coached wide receivers at Kent State from 1988 to '91 before returning to Army as the defensive line coach from 1992 to '94.

Fewell was born September 7, 1962 in Gastonia, N.C. He and his wife, Kathleen, live in Jacksonville.

Greg Finnegan was named assistant strength and conditioning coach of the Jaguars on February 10, 1998. He serves as the assistant to Jerry Palmieri in the development and implementation of the Jaguars' strength and conditioning program.

Finnegan, 30, previously was the director of strength and conditioning at Boston College, a position he took over in January 1995 when Palmieri left BC to join the Jaguars. Finnegan worked as a graduate assistant with Palmieri at Kansas State in 1992 and '93, then rejoined Palmieri in 1994 as an assistant strength coach at Boston College.

Finnegan was born February 21, 1969 in Toledo, Ohio. He earned a degree in nutritional science in 1992 from Cornell University, where he was an All-Ivy League center on the football team. He earned a master's degree in exercise physiology in 1994 from Kansas State. Finnegan is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association, as well as the American College of Sports Medicine. He has written several articles focusing on topics such as nutritional supplements and football training.

He and his wife, Lyn, live in Jacksonville and have a daughter, Abigail (2/22/95) and a son, Benjamin (10/5/96).

**HOAGLIN****TIGHT ENDS COACH****NFL: 33RD SEASON****JAGUARS: 3RD SEASON**

Fred Hoaglin has been around the NFL longer than any member of the Jaguars' coaching staff — 33 years dating back to 1966 when he was a rookie center with the Cleveland Browns.

Hoaglin joined the Jaguars' coaching staff from the New England Patriots on February 11, 1997. Now in his 22nd season as an NFL assistant coach, Hoaglin has been a member of three Super Bowl staffs, winning twice as the offensive line coach for the New York Giants in Super Bowls XXII and XXV.

In 1997, Hoaglin's first season with the Jaguars, he coached tight ends for the first time in his career after serving as an offensive line coach for the previous 19 years. The Jaguars' tight ends combined for seven touchdowns, the third most of any NFL team's group of tight ends. In 1998, Jaguars tight ends accounted for 46 receptions and six more touchdowns, and this season, Hoaglin will be coaching Kyle Brady, an unrestricted free agent acquisition from the New York Jets, whom many feel is on the verge of becoming one of the NFL's top tight ends.

After retiring as a player in 1976, Hoaglin was hired by the Detroit Lions in 1978, coaching there through 1984. In 1985, he was hired by Bill Parcells in New York and a year later the Giants won their first Super Bowl. Hoaglin remained with the Giants through 1992, coaching on a second Super Bowl championship team in 1990, along with Tom Coughlin,



who was then the Giants' receivers coach. Hoaglin re-joined Parcells in New England in 1993, coaching the Patriots' offensive line for four seasons. The Patriots allowed only 102 sacks in Hoaglin's four seasons.

Hoaglin was drafted in the sixth round by the Cleveland Browns in 1966, and he broke into the starting lineup as a rookie. A versatile player, he spent the majority of his 11-year career at center. In 1969, his peers elected him to the Pro Bowl, and he put together a string of 69 consecutive starts in the late 1960s. He played seven years in Cleveland before being traded to Baltimore in 1973. He spent the following two seasons (1974-75) with the Houston Oilers before finishing his career in 1976 with the expansion Seattle Seahawks.

Hoaglin was a starter at both center and linebacker at the University of Pittsburgh and was selected to play in the North-South All-Star game his senior year. He also earned two varsity letters in golf while in college. He received a degree in industrial engineering in 1968.

Hoaglin was born January 28, 1944 in Alliance, Ohio. He and his wife, Janet, have two children: Patricia Compton (3/5/68) and George III "Rick" (9/23/70), a son-in-law, Derek Compton, and two grandchildren: Andrew (5/28/87) and Kristina Compton (4/11/89).

In 1998, Jerald Ingram had the pleasure of coaching Fred Taylor, who set 29 team records on his way to the greatest season ever by a Jaguars running back. Taylor rushed for 1,223 yards, caught 44 passes and scored 17 touchdowns, the third-most ever by a rookie in NFL history.

Overall, the Jaguars ranked fifth in the NFL in rushing in 1998 — the highest in franchise history — and running backs scored 24 touchdowns.

Taylor had been drafted in the first round of the '98 draft, but he had played sparingly while veteran James Stewart was rushing for 100 yards in each of the season's first two games until suffering a season-ending knee injury in the third game. Ingram also groomed a first-time starter at fullback in Daimon Shelton, and he tutored three other young backs who played key roles in the Jaguars' 1998 success: Tavian Banks, George Jones and Chris Howard.

Ingram was named to the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as running backs coach at Boston College under Tom Coughlin. Ingram, 38, is in his 16th year of coaching.

Following his college days as a running back at Michigan, Ingram was a graduate assistant at Michigan in 1964. In 1965 he joined the Ball State coaching staff as tight ends coach, followed by five seasons (1986-90) as running backs coach. In Ingram's last three seasons

at Ball State, the team posted a 22-10-2 record, the best among the nine Mid-American Conference schools. In 1991, Ingram joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff.

He played for the Wolverines' two Big Ten champion squads that advanced to the Rose Bowl, in addition to playing in the Sugar, Gator and Bluebonnet Bowls. Ingram graduated from Michigan in 1984 with a degree in general studies.

Ingram was born December 24, 1960 at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio and grew up in Beaver, Pa. He and his wife, Kathleen, have a son, Julian (7/27/97), and they live in Jacksonville.

Mike Maser coaches one of the best offensive lines in the NFL. Now in his fifth season with the Jaguars, he joined the Jaguars' staff on March 3, 1994 following 13 seasons at Boston College, the last three under Tom Coughlin. Maser, 52, is a veteran of 30 seasons in coaching.

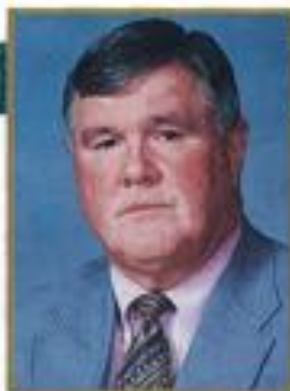
Maser's line includes Tony Boselli, widely considered the best offensive tackle in the game, as well as Leon Searcy (who has been an alternate to the Pro Bowl the last three years). Maser has a solid veteran group of guards in Ben Coleman, Rich Tyski and free agent acquisition Zach Wiegert. Last season he was forced to replace injured Michael Cheever at center, so Quentin Neujahr took over. Then, after Neujahr was injured in the final regular-season game, Maser started rookie John Wade for both games in the playoffs and the team didn't skip a beat. The Jaguars' offensive line paved the way for a running game that improved from 18th in the league in 1998 to fifth last season. In addition, the number of sacks allowed by the Jaguars has decreased every season.

A guard in college, Maser began his coaching career in 1969 as a student assistant at the University of Buffalo. In 1970, he coached for one year at Darien High School in Darien, Conn. A service veteran, Maser coached at the U.S. Military Academy Prep School at Fort Belvoir, Va. in 1971 and '72. In 1973, he was the assistant offensive line coach at Marshall. From 1974 to '78, Maser served as offensive coordinator and head of recruiting for Bluefield State College in West Virginia.

In 1979 and '80, Maser was an assistant under Jack Bicknell at Maine, and in 1981 he joined Bicknell's staff at Boston College. When Coughlin was named head coach at Boston College in 1991 he retained Maser as offensive line coach. During Maser's tenure at Boston College, the team played in six bowl games.

Maser attended the University of Buffalo, where he was a three-year starter at guard. He graduated in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation. In 1974 he received a master's degree in physical education from Marshall University.

Maser was born March 2, 1947 in Clayton, N.Y. He and his wife, Barbara, have three grown children, daughter Brigitte and sons Greg and Brian.

John McNulty is responsible for assisting the coaching staff in all aspects of game preparation, including scouting reports, opponent breakdown and writing the playbook. He joined the team on February 28, 1998.

McNulty, 31, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Michigan in 1991, and he worked with the team's defensive line in 1993 and the wide receivers in 1994. While at Michigan, the team won two Big 10 titles, earning trips to the Rose Bowl against Washington both years. In the 1991 game, the Wolverines were defeated by Mark Brunell's Huskies, while in 1992 Michigan earned the victory. McNulty also coached in the Holiday Bowl (1994) and the Hall of Fame Bowl (1993). In 1995 he joined the staff at the University of Connecticut working with wide receivers and special teams. He coached 1,000-yard receivers in 1996 and '97 and an All-American in 1997.

McNulty was born May 29, 1968 in Scranton, Pa. and was a high school standout at Abington Heights High in Clarks Summit, Pa. He graduated from Penn State in 1990 with a degree in business management and business law. He played four years as a safety at Penn State under Joe Paterno, playing in bowl games each of his four seasons.

### **STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH**

**NFL: 5TH SEASON**

**JAGUARS: 5TH SEASON**

Jerry Palmieri was named strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars on January 11, 1995. He previously had served as director of strength and conditioning operations at Boston College since August 1993.

Under Palmieri's guidance, the Jaguars have had 100 percent attendance for their four-day-a-week offseason conditioning program each of the last two years. That has helped the team reap the benefits of his program, in which players have annually set personal bests for strength, speed and other conditioning aspects. In this year's offseason conditioning program, the team's average body fat decreased by 1.68 percent, vertical jump increased 1.37 inches, and the average player's bench squat and incline increased by 28 pounds. The Jaguars have 25 veteran players who can squat more than 600 pounds and 27 veterans who can power clean more than 300 pounds.

Palmieri's philosophy is two-fold. Intangibly, he uses a scriptural verse: "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might ..." (Ecclesiastes 9:10). Each athlete is challenged to work hard and reach his fullest potential — tangibly, its strength and power. Palmieri's goal is to help each athlete increase in size, strength and speed, which ultimately produces a more powerful athlete. "Coach Coughlin wants our team to play physical on the field,"



says Palmieri. "Our job is to make our players more physical and more powerful, so that their play will be physical in competition."

Prior to his stint at Boston College, Palmieri spent six years overseeing the strength and conditioning program at Kansas State. He began his career as a strength coach in 1962 at North Carolina, followed by three years (1964-67) at Oklahoma State.

In addition to his coaching experience, Palmieri has taught college physical education classes and written articles about strength and conditioning for national publications. He has also produced videos on strength and speed training and is active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

A 1960 graduate of Montclair State, Palmieri received a master's degree in exercise physiology from the University of North Carolina in 1964. He is a three-time Golden Gloves champion (1976-78) and competed in international competition as a member of the 1978 and 1979 USA Boxing Teams. He was born October 30, 1958 in Englewood, N.J. # PASQUALE

## SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

**NFL: 20TH SEASON**

**JAGUARS: 5TH SEASON**

Under Larry Pasquale, the Jaguars have some of the most enviable special teams performers in the NFL. A veteran of 20 years as an NFL coach, Pasquale was named the Jaguars' special teams coordinator on January 21, 1995.

Mike Hollis, the Jaguars' placekicker, in 1998 became the NFL's all-time leader in field goal accuracy for both the regular season (81.6 percent) and the postseason (80.3 percent). Bryan Barker is annually one of the NFL's top punters, and his 42.8 career average ranks 21st in NFL history (he has a 44.4 average with the Jaguars). And Reggie Barlow moved into fifth place on the NFL's all-time punt return list with a 12.24-yard average, just below two members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

In four seasons coaching the Jaguars' special teams, Pasquale's units have blocked 12 kicks (three extra points, three field goals and six punts) while having only two blocked. The Jaguars have scored seven touchdowns on special teams while allowing only one. In addition, the Jaguars lead the NFL in that time with six onside kicks recovered in 13 attempts, whereas their opponents had tried 10 onside kicks and recovered none.

In 1995, Pasquale was one of six coaches nominated for the Special Teams Coach of the Year Award, and in 1997 he was voted the runner-up for Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers. In addition, the *Dallas Morning News*, in a ranking of the 19 most important statistical categories, named the Jaguars' special teams as the best in the NFL.

in 1997 (the Jaguars ranked No. 6 in '98).

In 1997, both Barker and Hollis were voted to the Pro Bowl, marking only the fourth time a team's two kickers were both named to an AFC-NFC Pro Bowl squad. Hollis led the NFL that season in scoring with 134 points, and Barker was the league leader in both net and gross punting most of the season.

During his coaching career, Pasquale's special teams units have produced 40 touchdowns in the regular season and preseason, while allowing only four blocked punts in 20 years.

Pasquale, 58, is in his 38th year in coaching, which includes four seasons at the high school level, 11 in college and two in the CFL. After serving as wide receivers and special teams coach for the Montreal Alouettes in 1975 and '79, he entered the NFL in 1979 as special teams coach for the Detroit Lions. In 1980 he joined the New York Jets as wide receivers coach, then he took over the Jets' special teams the following year for the next nine seasons.

With the Jets, Pasquale led an impressive run of high special teams rankings. The Jets had the NFL's top-ranked punt-coverage teams in 1981 and from 1986 to '88, as well as a second-place ranking in 1989. In 1984, the Jets also had the top-ranked kickoff return team. Under Pasquale, the Jets had an 80 percent success rate on fake field goals and fake punts while never allowing an opponent to convert a faked kick.

In 1990 and '91 Pasquale coached San Diego's special teams, which he boosted to the top ranking among all NFL teams in kickoff return average and punt coverage in his first season. In 1990, he was selected the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers. He coached Philadelphia's special teams from 1992 through '94.

Pasquale played college football at the University of Bridgeport (Conn.), where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education. He has also completed post-graduate work at Columbia and Fairfield University. Pasquale was born April 21, 1941 in Brooklyn, N.Y. He and his wife, Joann, have two daughters, Lisa (8/11/66) and Lauren (10/22/72), a son, Darrell (4/19/70), a son-in-law, Ben, and a grandson, Andrew.

## **PETRINO** **QUARTERBACKS COACH**

**NFL: 1ST SEASON**  
**JAGUARS: 1ST SEASON**

Bob Petrino was named the Jaguars' quarterbacks coach on February 10. He moves up to the professional ranks after 16 years coaching in college football. Petrino, 38, will tutor Mark Brunell, who is the sixth-ranked passer in NFL history, and Jonathan Quinn, a second-year passer who led the team to its 1998 season-ending victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

In 1998, Petrino was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at the University of Louisville, where he coached quarterback Chris Redman, who was second in the NCAA in total offense, and the team led the country in total offense, averaging 560 yards per game. In addition to 4,000 yards passing by Redman, the Louisville offense featured a 1,000-yard runner and a 1,000-yard receiver.

Petrino was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Utah State from 1995 to '97, and the latter two seasons the team's offense ranked ninth in the nation. In 1994, Petrino spent one season as the offensive coordinator at the University of Nevada, where his offense ranked second in the nation in yards and third in scoring. In 1994, Nevada became, at that time, only the third team in NCAA history to have a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver (since then, eight other teams have duplicated that feat).



He began his coaching career in 1963 as a graduate assistant at Carroll College (Mont.), and he spent one season as quarterbacks coach at Weber State in 1984. He returned to Carroll College as offensive coordinator and produced the NAIA's top-ranked offense in both 1985 and '86. In 1987 Petrino returned to Weber State, coaching tight ends and wide receivers. He then spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator at the University of Idaho (1988-1990) and two seasons as the quarterbacks coach at Arizona State (1992-93).

Petrino attended Carroll College in Helena, Mont., where he was a NAIA All-America quarterback and led the team to three consecutive Frontier Conference championships and was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1981 and '82. He received a degree in history and physical education from Carroll College in 1983.

Petrino comes from a coaching family. His father, Bob Petrino, is a member of the NAIA Coaches Hall of Fame and recently retired following his 29th season as head coach at Carroll College. Bob's brother, Paul, is in his second season as the wide receivers coach at Louisville.

Petrino was born March 10, 1961 in Lewiston, Mont. He and his wife, Becky, have four children: Kelsey (11/27/86), Dominic (5/5/88), Bobby (3/24/90) and Katie (10/3/91). They live in Jacksonville.

## DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

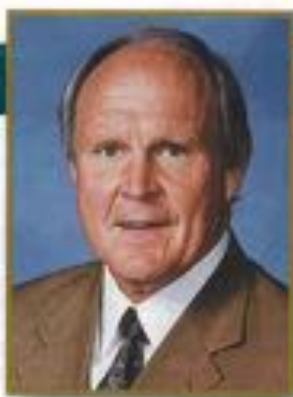
**NFL: 14TH SEASON**

John Pease was named defensive line coach on January 12, 1995 following nine seasons as defensive line coach for the New Orleans Saints. Pease, 55, is a veteran of 29 years in coaching, a career that also includes 13 years at the college level and three in the USFL.

Pease rotates seven or eight players throughout every game at both tackle and end, and the Jaguars' defensive statistics have made strides since the 1995 inaugural season, going from 17 sacks in 1995 (last in the NFL) to 37 sacks in '96 and 48 sacks in '97, before dropping to 30 sacks last season following injuries that placed five veteran defensive linemen on injured reserve.

Pease began his fulltime coaching career at Fullerton College in 1970, as linebackers coach (1970-72) and defensive line coach (1973). He also had stints at Long Beach State (1974-76), Utah (1977) and Washington (1978-82). From 1983 to '85, he was on the coaching staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL along with Dom Capers under head coach Jim Mora. The Stars won the USFL championship in 1984 and '85. When Mora was named head coach of the Saints, Pease joined him in New Orleans, where he was from

1986 until joining the Jaguars in 1995. The Saints were a playoff team three of Pease's last five seasons.

# SELMON

## OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH

**NFL: 5TH SEASON**

**JAGUARS: 5TH SEASON**

Lucious Selmon, a former All-America defensive lineman for Oklahoma, was named outside linebackers coach on January 17, 1995. Selmon, 48, joined the Jaguars after serving as outside linebackers coach at Oklahoma, where he coached the previous 19 years.

He is primarily responsible for coaching the team's strongside linebackers, including starter Bryce Paup, a four-time Pro Bowler who is in his second year with the team. Last season Paup finished second on the team with 6.5 sacks, and he added 106 tackles and a team-high 33 QB pressures. In 1996 and '97, Selmon coached Kevin Hardy, the 1996 No. 1 draft choice and the team's highest-selected defensive player ever (Hardy to weakside linebacker after the addition of Paup). As a rookie, Hardy exceeded expectations by making 130 tackles (second on the team), as well as 5.5 sacks and two interceptions, and he was named to the NFL All-Rookie team.

The oldest of the three famed Selmon brothers who were all consensus All-Americans at Oklahoma, Selmon graduated in 1974 with a degree in special education. He was a letterman from 1971 to '73 and was a teammate with his younger brothers, Dewey and Lee Roy, for one season. As a senior in 1973, Selmon served as team captain and was a finalist for the Heisman Trophy, runner-up for the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award, Defensive Player of the Year in the Big Eight Conference and Chevrolet Player of the Year.

After his college career, Selmon played in the World Football League for the Memphis Southmen in 1974 and '75. He returned to Oklahoma in 1976 to begin his coaching career as an assistant on Barry Switzer's staff. From 1976 to '83 Selmon was the defensive line coach before serving as outside linebackers/defensive ends coach from 1984 to '94. Selmon coached under Switzer for 13 seasons and was retained on head coach Gary Gibbs' Oklahoma staff in '89. In 1989 and '90, Selmon spent training camps working with the coaching staff of the Denver Broncos. During that time he helped coach the Broncos' linebackers and defensive ends.

Selmon was born March 15, 1951 in Muskogee, Okla. He and his wife, Clarice, have a son, Lucious III, and two daughters, Raeshawn and Tiffanie.

# **SZABO**

## **INSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH**

**NFL: 5TH SEASON**

**JAGUARS: 5TH SEASON**

Steve Szabo joined the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as defensive coordinator at Boston College. Now in his 31st year of coaching, Szabo spent 25 seasons at the college level, including three years as a college head coach.

Because the Jaguars employ a 4-3 "under" defense, Szabo coaches the team's inside linebackers — weakside linebacker Kevin Hardy, and middle linebackers Bryan Schwartz and Tom McManus. In all four Jaguars seasons, Szabo has coached the Jaguars' leading tackler (Schwartz, 161 tackles as a rookie in 1995 and 165 tackles in '97; Eddie Robinson, 165 tackles in 1996; and Hardy, team-record 186 tackles in 1998).

In 1996, Szabo groomed McManus as an able replacement for Schwartz, who was lost for the season after an injury in the fourth game. McManus, who was out of football in 1993 and '94, finished with 119 tackles, third on the squad. In 1997, McManus was lost for the season with a knee injury, and Schwartz had to carry the load while he rehabilitated his '96 knee injury. Last season Szabo tutored Hardy, who moved to weakside linebacker after two seasons on the strongside.

A former college running back and defensive back, Szabo began his coaching career in 1969 at Johns Hopkins followed by stops at Toledo (1970), Iowa (1971-73), Syracuse (1974-76), Iowa State (1977-78), Ohio State (1979-81), Western Michigan (1982-84), Northern Iowa (1985) and Colorado State (1989-90). From 1985 to '87 Szabo was head coach at Edinboro (Pa.) University.

After serving two seasons as defensive coordinator under Earl Bruce at Colorado State, Szabo joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff in 1991. In all, Szabo coached in a total of nine bowl games representing five different colleges.

As a halfback and defensive back at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1961 to '64, Szabo was a teammate of Heisman Trophy winner Roger Staubach. As a junior in 1963, Szabo played on the Navy team that ranked second and played for the national championship in the Cotton Bowl. He also played lacrosse for three national championship teams at the Naval Academy. Szabo graduated in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in naval science. After graduation he was stationed at Quantico from 1965 to '69, where he continued playing football for the Marines.

Szabo was born September 11, 1943 in Evergreen Park, Ill. He has two children from a previous marriage, Christine (5/12/72) and Mike (1/26/75), and he and his wife, Patti, have a son, Zack (7/28/88).

## **REIPRISH**

### **DIRECTOR, PLAYER PERSONNEL**

Now in his 21st year in the NFL, Rick Reiprish was promoted to director of player personnel on May 12, 1998 after four years as the Jaguars' director of college scouting. He has overseen the five drafts that built the nucleus of a team that has been to the playoffs each of the last three seasons and that won the AFC Central Division championship in 1998.

Those drafts brought to the Jaguars players such as Tony Boselli, Bryan Schwartz and Rob Johnson in 1995; defensive starters Kevin Hardy, Tony Brackens and Aaron Beasley in 1996; defensive linemen Ronaldo Wynn and Seth Payne in 1997; and All-Rookie team members Fred Taylor and Donovan Darius last year. Eight draft choices made the '98 Jaguars, with five of them starting games.

In all, of the Jaguars' 38 draft choices in the first four years, 30 made the team (four others played on other teams) and 20 of them have started games.

Working under head coach Tom Coughlin, Reiprish has direct responsibility for the pro and college scouting departments, which are headed by Fran Foley and Rick Mueller, respectively. Reiprish continues to direct the scouting of college players and the annual draft, as well as trades and the evaluation and procurement of veteran free agents.

A veteran of 20 years of NFL scouting, Reiprish was hired as the Jaguars' director of college scouting May 15, 1994 after serving 10 years with the Seattle Seahawks, the last five as Eastern scout supervisor. Reiprish began his scouting career as a Southeast area scout with BLESTO from 1979 to '82. From 1982 to '84 he was a personnel scout for the Kansas City Chiefs before going to Seattle as an area scout in 1984. He was named Eastern scout supervisor in 1989. Reiprish coached receivers and running backs at Austin Peay State University from 1973 to '76 before going to East Tennessee in 1977, where he coached the offensive backfield and quarterbacks. In 1978 he was the assistant offensive line coach at North Alabama.

Reiprish received a degree in education from Villanova University in 1972 and earned a master's degree in education-administration and supervision from Austin Peay State University in 1974. He was born Sept. 14, 1950 in Shamokin, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Janet live in Jacksonville and have a son, Andrew.

### **DIRECTOR, PRO SCOUTING**

Fran Foley was named director of pro scouting on May 12, 1998 following four years as the assistant director of pro personnel. Foley is responsible for the scouting and evaluation of the players on every NFL team, advance scouting of Jaguars opponents and player procurement during the NFL free-agent signing periods and the regular season.

He joined the Jaguars on March 3, 1994 from Boston College and was one of Tom Coughlin's earliest staff hires. During his three years at BC, Foley coordinated the Eagles' recruiting efforts, one of the top ranked in the nation.

Foley began his stint at Boston College in 1991, serving as tight ends and kickers coach in addition to handling recruiting duties. He was the position coach for two current NFL starting tight ends: Green Bay's Mark Chmura and the New York Giants' Pete Mitchell. His last two years were focused on personnel recruiting and team logistics. Prior to joining the coaching staff at Boston College, Foley had stints at Rutgers University as tight ends/specialists coach in 1986 and oper-





ations director from 1987 to '90. He also worked at The Citadel, coaching defensive ends in 1985 and at Colgate University as defensive line coach in 1984, when he began his college coaching career.

Foley attended Framingham (Mass.) State College, where he played offensive tackle from 1980 to '83. He graduated in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in English literature.

Foley is also director and treasurer of the Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation, which, in the last four years, has raised \$425,000 for Jacksonville-area pediatric leukemia patients and their families. ## DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING

After four years as a college scout for the Jaguars, Rick Mueller was promoted to director of college scouting on May 12, 1998. 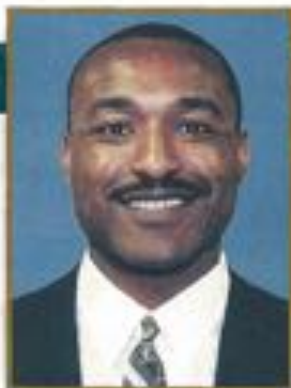
# CLARK

Jaguars PK Mike Hollis finished the 1995 season with 13 consecutive successful field goals and as the most accurate field goal kicker in NFL history for both the regular season and the postseason. Hollis' percentage of 81.60 ranks first, and only four other kickers in NFL history have a percentage better than 80 percent. Hollis has also converted his last 13 field goals in the postseason, and he is 14 of 15 overall in the playoffs.

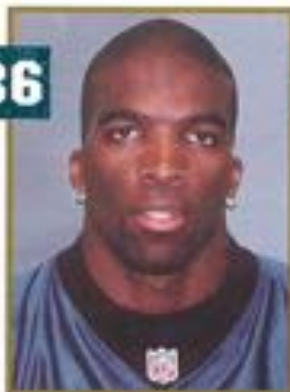
## DID YOU KNOW?

In other words, the only time Mark Brunell ever leaves his locker is for the 10 road games each season. ## STEWART'S RECORD DAY

James Stewart put himself in some exclusive and historic company on October 12, 1997 when he rushed for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles. His five touchdowns is a Jaguars single-game record.

It marked the first time an NFL player had scored five rushing touchdowns in a game since 1963. Stewart also became one of only 12 players in NFL history with five or more touchdowns in one game. Ernie Nevers, Dub Jones and Gale Sayers hold the single-game record with six touchdowns, and Stewart tied eight other players who have scored five touchdowns in one game. Stewart also became the first player to score three touchdowns in one quarter since San Diego's Rod Bernstein on December 15, 1991. Stewart had three rushing TDs in the first quarter of the game.

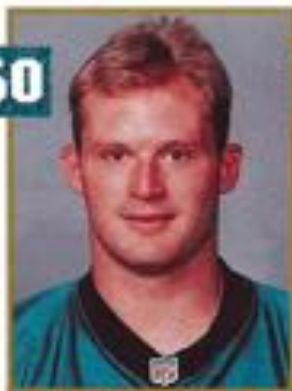

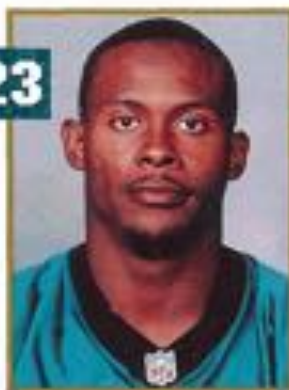

including 23 on three receptions. Had a 31-yard run for the fifth longest of his career and the eighth play of 30-plus yards on the season. On his first carry broke Natrone Means' team record for single-season rushing yards (823 in 1997), and later broke Jimmy Smith's record for combined yards from scrimmage in a season (1,324 in 1997). Considered the most aggressive and feared big cats in North America, the Jacksonville Jaguars look to pay tribute to their namesake in championship form.

The Jaguars started off on the road for the second straight season, coming away with a 24-23 victory, the team's first road victory ever over an NFC team. After spotting the Bears a field goal, the Jaguars drove 72 yards in 14 plays, only to turn the ball over on a Mark Brunell interception in the endzone. The Bears could not capitalize and punted. The Jaguars then drove downfield and scored on a 3-yard run by James Stewart to take a 7-3 lead. On the following kickoff, Glyn Milburn returned it 88 yards for a touchdown to take a 10-3 lead in the second quarter, even though replays showed Mike Hollis had tripped him up. After another Brunell interception late in the half, the Bears added a field goal to take a 13-7 halftime lead. In the third quarter, Jacksonville took advantage of a fumble forced by Dave Thomas and scored on a 7-yard touchdown by Stewart to take a 14-13 lead. Thomas forced another Bears' fumble and the Jaguars took a 17-13 lead on a 23-yard field goal by Hollis. The Bears came back, driving 72 yards in 11 plays capped by a one-yard run by Edgar Bennett to take a 20-17 lead. With the Bears leading 23-17 after a Matt Stover field goal, the Jaguars took over with 4:08 remaining in the game and drove 87 yards in 12 plays, scoring the game-winning touchdown on a 4-yard pass from Brunell to Jimmy Smith with only 29 seconds remaining. Brunell hit his first seven passes in the final drive, going 8 of 9 for 73 yards and running twice for 12 yards. The 24-23 win was only the second time the Jaguars had won with a negative turnover ratio.

Tavian Banks returned the second-half kickoff 65 yards to set up a James Stewart 1-yard touchdown run to take a 21-6 lead. The Chiefs responded with a 29-yard field goal to make it 21-9. The Chiefs fumbled on their next two possessions, but the Jaguars could not take advantage, as Mike Hollis missed two field-goal attempts. The Chiefs took over in the middle of the fourth quarter and scored a touchdown on a 13-play, 80-yard drive to cut the lead to 21-16. The Jaguars gained two rushing first downs in the final 3:39 to keep the ball from the Chiefs and preserve the victory. The Jaguars converted 6 of 12 third-down attempts and allowed only 3 of 11 (27 percent) for the Chiefs.

The third period was all Jacksonville, as the Jaguars scored two touchdowns — a 72-yard pass from Brunell to Jimmy Smith and a 1-yard pass from Brunell to Damon Jones. The defense took center stage in the second half, with sacks by Kelvin Pritchett and Fernando Smith. In the fourth quarter, Chris Hudson intercepted Eric Zeier and returned it 8 yards, killing a Ravens' drive. The Jaguars improved to 3-0 for the second straight season and improved their franchise record to 27-24 overall.

The Jaguars made their second-ever appearance on "Monday Night Football" in their first regular-season game against the Miami Dolphins in front of an ALLTEL Stadium-record 74,051 fans. The Jaguars jumped out to a 14-0 lead but then had to come from behind for the victory. On the first play from scrimmage, Fred Taylor took the handoff and ran 77 yards for a score. It marked the Jaguars' quickest score ever, as well as the longest run and longest play from scrimmage in team history. Taylor rushed for his second touchdown of the night on a two-yard run that capped a six-play, 53-yard drive. The Dolphins got on the scoreboard with a 12-play, 69-yard drive on their next possession, capped by a two-yard pass to TE Troy Drayton, making it 14-7 at halftime. Miami scored twice in the third quarter to take 21-14 lead before the Jaguars took control. First, Keenan McCardell scored on a 23-yard pass, then Miami's Olindo Mare missed a 54-yard field goal. On the next play McCardell caught a 56-yard pass for the game-winner and the longest scoring play of his seven-year career. Miami had a chance to tie the game inside the two-minute warning, but Tony Brackens stripped the ball from Dan Marino and recovered it at the Jaguars' 38-yard line. Jacksonville's 8.1-yard average per rush and 9.0 average per play were team records. Brunell completed 12 of 18 passes for 213 yards, two TDs and one interception, and Reggie Barlow led the team with four catches for 50 yards.

The Jaguars traveled to Buffalo and came away with their first loss of the season, a 17-16 defeat, as the Bills scored a touchdown with 13 seconds left in the game. The Jaguars took the opening kickoff and kept the ball for 10:27, the longest drive in team history, scoring on a 1-yard run by Tavian Banks, who started for the first time, as Fred Taylor was inactive with a shoulder injury. Banks left the game after the first series with a foot sprain, leaving the running back duties to Daimon Shelton and Chris Howard. The Bills responded in the second quarter with a touchdown pass to tie the game at 7-7. The Jaguars were able to drive again and scored on a 35-yard Mike Hollis field goal to take a 10-7 halftime lead. On the Bills' first series of the second half, Tom McManus forced a fumble, which was recovered by Tony Brackens. The Jaguars could not pound it into the endzone, and Hollis kicked a 23-yard field goal to take a 13-7 lead. The Bills responded with a 24-yard field goal to cut the lead to 13-10. Once again the Jaguars were unable to come away with a touchdown, as Hollis kicked his third field goal of the day to take a 16-10 lead into the fourth quarter. With two minutes remaining in the game, the Jaguars could not convert on third-and-two and were forced to punt. The Bills, led by quarterback Doug Flutie, drove to the Jaguars' one-yard line. After three incompletions, Flutie ran for the touchdown on a broken play to take a 17-16 lead. ■ With 17 total touchdowns, Fred Taylor finished third all-time in total touchdowns by a rookie in NFL history (Randy Moss also had 17). The record for total touchdowns by a rookie is 22 by Gale Sayers in 1965, and second is 20 by Eric Dickerson in 1983.

■ Fred Taylor's 14 rushing touchdowns tied him for third in NFL history for rushing touchdowns by a rookie. He tied the figure reached by Gale Sayers in 1965, Barry Sanders in 1989 and Curtis Martin in 1995. The NFL record for rushing touchdowns by a rookie is 18 by Eric Dickerson in 1983, followed by 15 by Ickey Woods in 1988.

The Jaguars hosted their first-ever home playoff game, defeating the New England Patriots 25-10 to advance to the divisional playoffs. Mark Brunell returned as the starter after missing nearly three games with a high ankle sprain, but for the Patriots, Scott Zolak started for the injured Drew Bledsoe. The Patriots did not score on their eight first-half possessions. The Jaguars took advantage and scored on a 35-yard Mike Hollis field goal to take a 3-0 lead. It was the first time the Jaguars ever led the Patriots in a game. Another first-quarter field goal by Hollis made it 6-0. In the second quarter, the Jaguars scored on a 13-yard run by Fred Taylor, but the two-point conversion failed, leaving the score at 12-0 at the half. In the third quarter, the momentum swung to the Patriots, with a one-yard touchdown run by Robert Edwards. The Patriots again drove and scored a 27-yard field goal to cut the Jaguars' lead to 12-10. The Jaguars' offense responded on the next drive with a 37-yard touchdown catch by Jimmy Smith from Brunell for a 19-10 lead. After a fumble by Zolak, Hollis kicked a 34-yard field goal to make it 22-10. Hollis kicked his fourth field goal of the day, a 21-yarder, to give the Jaguars a 25-10 lead. The Patriots got the ball back with 1:44 remaining in the game, but Zolak was intercepted by Chris Hudson, and the Jaguars ran out the clock to seal the victory.

The Jets drove to the Jaguars' 17, but Joel Smeenge forced a Curtis Martin fumble, which was recovered by Chris Hudson. Hudson returned the fumble 47 yards, but he fumbled an attempted lateral which was recovered by the Jets. A Keyshawn Johnson end-around with 33 seconds left in the first half made it 17-0. As the half expired, Jimmy Smith caught a 52-yard pass from Brunell to cut the lead to 17-7. Brunell was intercepted on the first possession of the half, and the Jets scored a touchdown to take a 24-7 lead. On the ensuing kickoff, Reggie Barlow returned the ball 88 yards to the Jets' four-yard line. Four plays later, Brunell found Keenan McCardell in the endzone to cut the lead to 24-14. The Jets responded again with a touchdown, making it 31-14. In the fourth quarter, Brunell hooked up with Smith for the second time for a 19-yard touchdown to cut the Jets' lead to 10. The Jaguars scored again on a Mike Hollis field goal to make it 31-24. With the Jets deep in Jaguars' territory, Donovan Darius intercepted Vinny Testaverde in the end zone. However, the Jaguars could not score and the Jets kicked a 30-yard field goal for the final score of 34-24. The Jaguars ended the season with a 12-6 overall record.

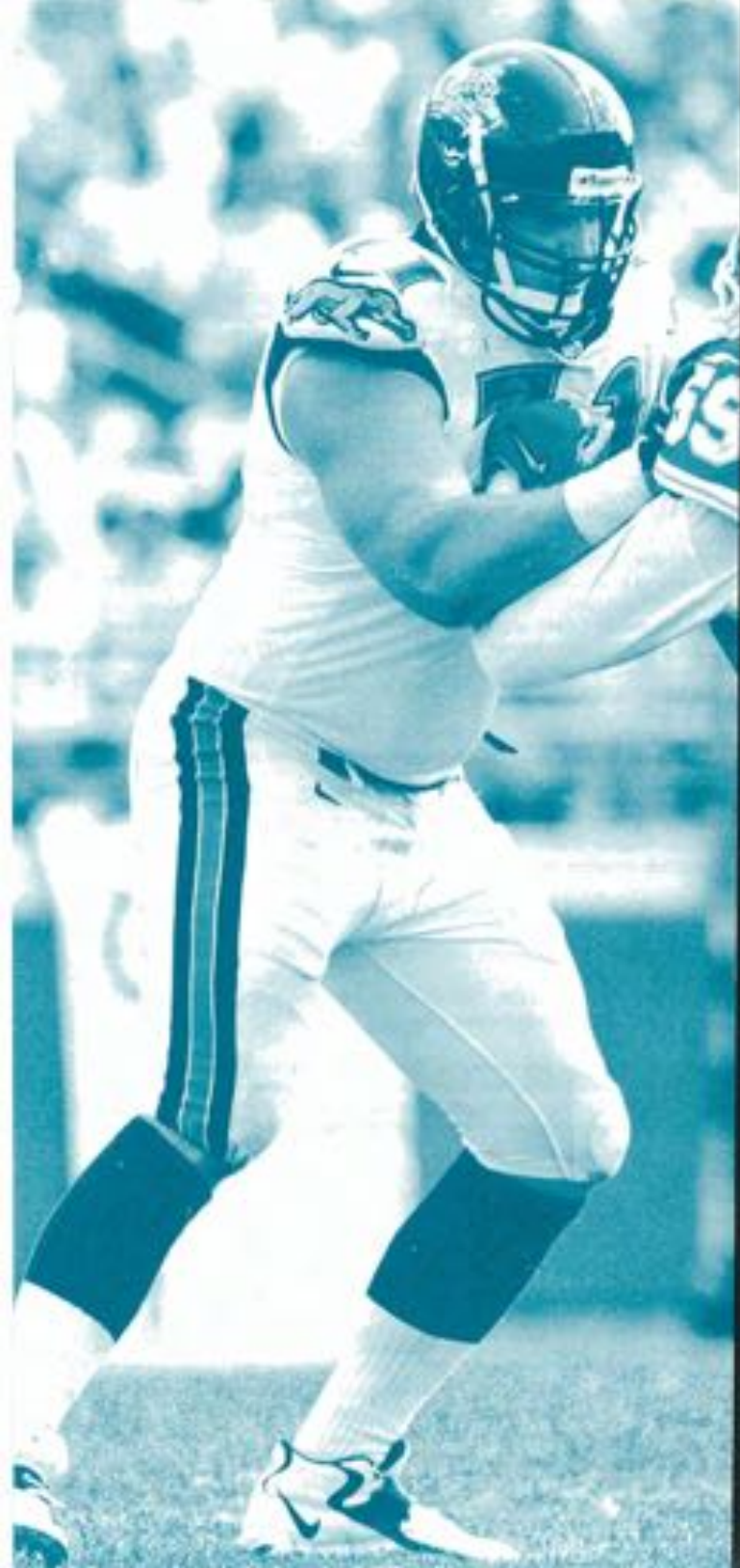

# HISTORY

## HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

### 1989

**AUG. 17** — Touchdown Jacksonville, a partnership to lead the community effort to win an NFL franchise is formed. The group, led by Tom Petway, includes Jeb Bush, Hamilton Jordan, and Arthur "Chick" Sheret.

### 1990

**APRIL 4** — National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue announces that the League will expand by two teams no later than the 1993 season.

**JULY 26** — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1993 season.

### 1991

**FEB. 12** — In a unanimous vote, the Jacksonville City Council votes to commit \$60 million to renovate the Gator Bowl contingent upon the City being awarded an expansion football team.

**MAY 15** — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1994 season, contrary to the July 26, 1990 vote.

**MAY 22** — At the owners' meeting in Minneapolis, a plan is approved that will add two expansion teams to the League for the 1994 season.

**MAY 30** — Florida Governor Lawton Chiles signs into law the Professional Sports Facilities Program, a state statute that provides state funding of up to \$2 million for 30 years for funding new sports facilities that operate in the state of Florida.

**JUNE 25** — The lease that includes the recently approved \$60 million package to renovate the Gator Bowl is approved by City Council.

**JULY 17** — The NFL announces that it will accept applications for expansion teams.

**SEPT. 16** — The City of Jacksonville files an expansion application with the League, one of 11 cities to apply.

**OCT. 1** — Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. submits its ownership application to the League. The nine-member partnership includes local businessman and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. general partner Tom Petway. J. Wayne Weaver is one of the eight limited partners, along with Jeb Bush, Lawrence DuBow, Earl Hadlow, Preston Haskell, Sandy McArthur, Charles Towers and Ron Weaver.

**OCT. 24** — David Seidin is named president and chief operating officer of Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd.

**DEC. 6** — Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. announces that the team name will be the Jacksonville Jaguars if an expansion team is awarded.

**DEC. 10** — Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. and City officials make the group's first presentation to commissioner Tagliabue and other NFL officials in New York.

### 1992

**MARCH 17** — At the League's annual winter meeting in Phoenix, the list of expansion candidate cities is cut from 11 to seven. Jacksonville is one of the seven; Nashville, San Antonio, Raleigh-Durham, and Honolulu are eliminated.

**MAY 19** — The five finalists in the expansion race are named: Jacksonville, Charlotte, Baltimore, Memphis, St. Louis. Sacramento and Oakland are eliminated.

**OCT. 20** — Citing complications surrounding the ongoing labor situation, the NFL votes to delay the expansion announcement to its 1993 fall meeting in Chicago and for expansion teams to begin play in 1995.

### 1993

**JAN. 6** — A seven-year Collective Bargaining Agreement is reached between the League and its players. With the labor situation resolved, a new expansion timetable is expected in March.

**MARCH 18** — J. Wayne Weaver is introduced as managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd.

**MARCH 23** — The expansion race is officially resumed by the NFL.

**APRIL 12** — After a tour with Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. representatives, NFL officials indi-

cate that additional renovations beyond those already planned would be necessary to renovate the Gator Bowl to NFL standards.

**JUNE 25** — Negotiations for a new lease between Jacksonville Mayor Ed Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. break down.

**JULY 1** — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. resume negotiations and agree on a plan that caps stadium renovation costs at \$112 million and protects the city from cost overruns. Mayor Austin sends the lease to City Council for approval.

**JULY 21** — The Jacksonville City Council fails to approve the newly negotiated \$112 million stadium proposal. As a result, Weaver announces that Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. is ending its bid for an NFL expansion franchise.

**JULY 22** — Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. closes offices and club seat and executive suite deposits are returned.

**AUG. 20** — The Florida Times-Union reports that negotiations between Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. and the City have resumed, encouraged by the NFL and at the request of Times-Union publisher Carl Cannon and Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert.

**AUG. 21** — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville reach an agreement on a new stadium lease capping stadium renovation costs at \$121 million, \$53 million to come from City funds and \$68 million from team and team related sources. As project manager, Touchdown Jacksonville assumes responsibility for any cost overruns.

**AUG. 22** — Facing the challenge of selling 9,000 club seats, a committee of civic and business leaders is formed called NFL Now!, headed by Carl Cannon and Adam Herbert.

**AUG. 23** — The City Council votes 14-4 to approve the new lease.

**AUG. 24** — With the new public/private partnership, Weaver and Mayor Austin meet with commissioner Tagliabue, who welcomes Jacksonville back into the expansion race.

**AUG. 25** — NFL Now! begins a 10-day drive to sell the required club seats.

**AUG. 26** — Former Kansas City Chiefs defensive back Deron Cherry joins Touchdown Jacksonville as the ninth member of the ownership group.

**SEPT. 3** — Carl Cannon of NFL Now! announces that 9,737 club seats have been sold, a number that rises to 10,112 once all the applications are processed.

**SEPT. 21** — Weaver and other Touchdown Jacksonville officials make their presentation to the NFL finance and expansion committees.

**OCT. 26** — In Chicago, League owners select the Carolina Panthers for an expansion team but delay the announcement of the second expansion city.

**NOV. 30 (4:12 p.m. ET)** — In Chicago, Jacksonville is awarded the 30th franchise in the National Football League.

**DEC. 1** — A victory celebration in the Gator Bowl, as 25,000 Jaguars fans battle cold and rain to welcome Wayne Weaver, Jaguars officials, city officials and community leaders upon their return from Chicago.

**JAN. 3** — Demolition of the Gator Bowl begins.

**JAN. 6** — The Jaguars announce a season ticket sellout for their first three seasons. Over 56,000 season tickets are sold through Dec. 31, just one month after the awarding of the team.

**FEB. 21** — Tom Coughlin is hired as head coach of the Jaguars. The former Boston College head coach and assistant with the New York Giants brings six of his assistants with him.

**AUG. 24** — The Jaguars announce that they will hold their first training camp in 1995 at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

**SEPT. 14** — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Inc. is established, under the direction of Dolores Barr Weaver and Dr. Gregory S. Gross.

**SEPT. 28** — The NFL announces specific plans to stock the expansion teams.

**NOV. 1** — The Jaguars hold their first official workout at Bishop Kenny High School. Thirteen offensive linemen work out in front of 1,500 fans.

**NOV. 2** — The NFL announces its plans for division alignment, putting the Jaguars in the AFC Central Division along with the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, Houston Oilers and Pittsburgh Steelers. The Carolina Panthers will join the NFC West Division.

**DEC. 15** — The Jaguars sign the first 10 players in team history: WR Shannon Baker, LB Hillary Butler, DE Ferric Collons, OL Greg Huntington, RB Randy Jordan, DE Ernie Logan, OT Rickie Shaw, DE Jason Simmons, DE Ricky Sutton, DE Chris Williams.

**JAN. 12** — Dick Jauron is hired as defensive coordinator. Jauron had spent nine years with the Green Bay Packers as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

**JAN. 14** — Kevin Gilbride is introduced as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He had previously been the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers.

**JAN. 20** — The Jaguars unveil their new logo and team uniform.

**JAN. 21** — Larry Pasquale is hired as the team's special teams coordinator.

**FEB. 14** — The Jaguars draft 31 players in the expansion draft. The first player selected is Arizona quarterback Steve Beuerlein. During the draft, the Jaguars acquire such veteran players as Desmond Howard, Keith Gogaricus, Darren Carrington, Reggie Cobb, Eugene Chung and Derek Brown.

**FEB. 28** — The Jaguars sign their first unrestricted free agents: guard Shawn Bouwers and defensive linemen Joel Smeenge and Don Davey. Within 15 days, six more unrestricted free-agents are signed: cornerback Vinnie Clark, punter Bryan Barker, cornerback Mickey Washington, defensive tackle Kelvin Pritchett, defensive end Jeff Lageman and center Dave Widell.

**MARCH 23** — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation awards its first grants to eight local organizations totaling \$139,850.

**APRIL 21** — The first trade in Jaguars history: Jacksonville acquires quarterback Mark Brunell from the Green Bay Packers in exchange for draft picks in the third and fifth rounds of the 1995 draft.

**APRIL 22** — Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli becomes the Jaguars' first-ever selection in the college draft, the second overall pick. Later in the first round, running back James Stewart is chosen 19th overall after the Jaguars trade up in the round. The Jaguars select a total of 10 players during the two-day draft.

**APRIL 28-30** — The first minicamp is held on the practice fields adjacent to the new stadium.

**JUNE 1** — The Jaguars sign their entire first class of draft choices at the same time, an event unprecedented in NFL history.

**JUNE 2-8** — The second minicamp is held, with one practice session being conducted in front of 2,500 fans at Bishop Kenny High School.

**JUNE 10** — "The Roar of the Jaguars," the team's cheerleaders squad, is introduced at The Landing in downtown Jacksonville. The squad includes 36 cheerleaders.

**JULY 8** — The Jaguars' first-ever training camp opens at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

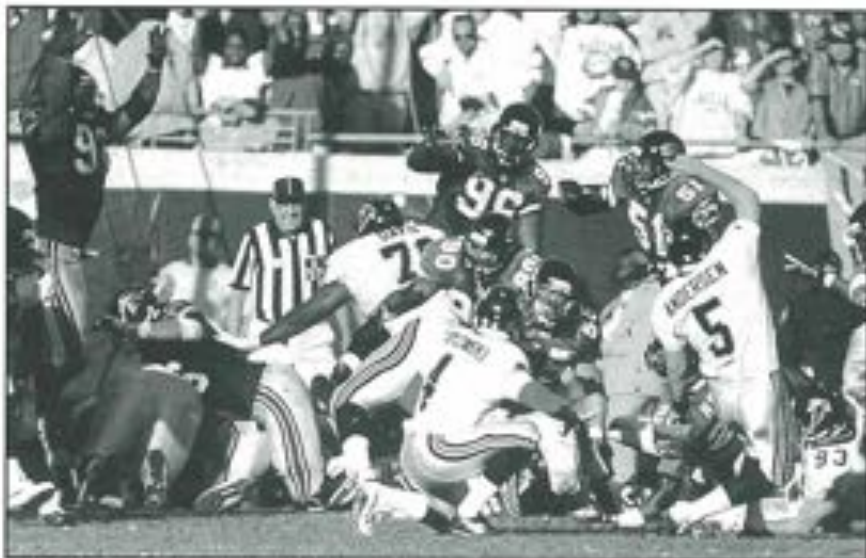
**JULY 29** — The Jaguars play their first preseason contest in the Pro Football Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, but lose to the Carolina Panthers 20-14 when a last-minute drive ends at the Panthers' two-yard line.

**AUG. 18** — Jacksonville Municipal Stadium opens, as the Jaguars host their first home preseason game. However, they lose to the St. Louis Rams 27-10.

**SEPT. 3** — The Jaguars play their inaugural game in front of 72,363 fans but lose to the Houston Oilers 10-3.

**OCT. 1** — The Jaguars get their first win 17-16 at Houston in the fifth week of the regular season — the third-fastest first victory in NFL expansion history and the fastest to earn a win on the road.

**OCT. 8** — The Jaguars defeat AFC Central rival Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 for their first home victory, the only time in NFL history an expansion team has ever defeated a team that would go on to play in the Super Bowl the same season.

- OCT. 22** — The Jaguars record their third win of the season at Cleveland with a 23-15 victory.  
**DEC. 3** — Jaguars wide receiver Jimmy Smith scores a team-record three touchdowns three different ways at Denver — on a blocked punt, off a lateral on a kickoff return and on a pass reception — an extreme rarity in NFL history.  
**DEC. 24** — The Jaguars break the previous record for victories by an expansion team with a last-second 24-21 win over Cleveland in the Browns' final game in their 55-year history.

#### 1996

- FEB. 18** — Pittsburgh Steelers offensive tackle Leon Searcy becomes the first unrestricted free agent to sign with the Jaguars in 1996.  
**MARCH 1** — Free agent Eddie Robinson signs from Houston, bolstering a young linebacker corps.  
**MARCH 2** — Keenan McCardell, Cleveland's leading wide receiver in 1995, signs a free agent contract with the Jaguars.  
**APRIL 20** — Illinois outside linebacker Kevin Hardy is selected with the Jaguars' first pick in the 1996 college draft, the second overall player chosen. By the early third round, the Jaguars also draft defensive end Tony Brackens, center Michael Cheever and defensive back Aaron Beasley.  
**JULY 19** — The Jaguars open their second training camp, their first at Ferrell Fields at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. The practice fields were named in memory of Roger Ernest Ferrell Sr. in a morning dedication.  
**SEPT. 1** — The Jaguars open their second season with a 24-9 victory over the defending AFC champion Pittsburgh Steelers. It marks the first game the Jacksonville defense does not allow a touchdown.  
**SEPT. 22** — Mark Brunell throws for a team-record 432 yards and three touchdowns, but the Jaguars lose their first-ever overtime game 28-25 at New England.  
**SEPT. 29** — In the first regular-season game between the two 1995 expansion teams, Jacksonville beats Carolina 24-14 as James Stewart runs for two TDs and the Jaguars rush for a team-record 179 yards.  
**OCT. 20** — Keenan McCardell catches 16 passes — tied for the third-highest total in pro football history — for a team-record 232 yards. However, despite breaking or tying 28 team records for single-game performances, the Jaguars lose at St. Louis 17-14.  
**NOV. 24** — The Jaguars win at Baltimore 30-27 for their first overtime victory on a 34-yard field goal by Mike Hollis.  
**DEC. 12** — Keenan McCardell becomes the first Jaguar voted to the Pro Bowl. Mark Brunell and Tony Boselli are later added as replacements, and Brunell goes on to win MVP honors in the Feb. 2 game in Honolulu.  
**DEC. 22** — The Jaguars clinch their first playoff berth in franchise history with a 19-17 victory over the Atlanta Falcons, as Morten Andersen's 30-yard field goal attempt goes wide left.

**DEC. 28** — The first second-year expansion franchise in NFL history to play a postseason game, the Jaguars become the first team to defeat the Buffalo Bills in a playoff game in Rich Stadium. Natrone Means leads the way in the 30-27 victory by running for 175 yards.

#### 1997

**JAN. 4** — The Jaguars post the biggest upset in the NFL since Joe Namath led the Jets to victory in Super Bowl III, as they stun the football world and the Denver Broncos with a 30-27 victory. After flying back to Jacksonville, the team finds 40,000 fans waiting for them at 1:30 a.m. in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

**JAN. 12** — The Jaguars' Cinderella season ends short of the Super Bowl, as Jacksonville is defeated by the New England Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. Jaguars turnovers led to 17 of the Patriots' 20 points in a game played in a wind chill of 0 degrees.

**JAN. 23** — David Soldin resigns as Jaguars president but remains as a partner.

**FEB. 5** — Chris Palmer is named offensive coordinator, replacing Kevin Gilbride who had become head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

**MARCH 5** — The Jaguars sign their only 1997 unrestricted free agent, Pittsburgh comeback Deon Figures.

**APRIL 10** — ALLTEL Stadium becomes the new name for Jacksonville Municipal Stadium in a sponsorship agreement with the information technology and communications provider.

**APRIL 19** — Jacksonville selects defensive tackle Renaldo Wynn of Notre Dame with the 21st pick of the first round of the NFL draft. In all, the Jaguars draft seven players.

**AUG. 9** — Quarterback Mark Brunell suffers a knee injury in a preseason game against the New York Giants and misses the next four games, including the first two of the regular season.

**AUG. 31** — In his first NFL start, Rob Johnson leads the Jaguars to a 28-27 victory at Baltimore in the season opener. Johnson displayed incredible courage in returning twice from a severe ankle sprain, setting a team record with 20 completions in 24 attempts (83.3 percent), 2 TD passes and a 25-yard TD rushing.

**SEPT. 7** — The Jaguars win their home opener 40-13 over the New York Giants as Steve Matthews makes his first NFL start for an injured Rob Johnson. The Jaguars started 2-0 for the first time in team history and set a franchise record with 40 points. It marked the first time in 30 years that a team won twice with two different quarterbacks making their first start in consecutive games.

**SEPT. 22** — Mark Brunell returns and leads the Jaguars to a 30-21 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their first appearance on "Monday Night Football." Brunell threw for 306 yards, but the victory wasn't clinched until the final play, when Clyde Simmons blocked a 40-yard game-winning field goal attempt and Chris Hudson returned the ball 58 yards for a touchdown as time expired.

**OCT. 12** — James Stewart rushes for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the visiting Philadelphia Eagles. It marks only the fourth time in NFL history that a player scored five TDs rushing in a game and the first time since 1963, and Stewart became one of only 12 NFL players with five or more touchdowns in one game.

**DEC. 11** — Five Jaguars are named to the AFC squad for the Pro Bowl: Tony Boselli, Bryan Barker and Mike Hollis as starters, and Mark Brunell and Jimmy Smith as backups.

**DEC. 14** — The Jaguars clinch a playoff berth for the second straight year after defeating the Bills 20-14 in Buffalo one week before the end of the regular season. Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith both went over the 1,000-yard mark, becoming the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

**DEC. 21** — The Jaguars win their team-record 11th game of the season by defeating the Oakland Raiders. The victory gave the team a 4-4 mark on the road for the first time ever, and matched division-winner Pittsburgh's 11-5 record. It takes five tie-breaker steps to determine that the Steelers were the division champion.

**DEC. 27** — The Jaguars' third season comes to an end in Denver, with the eventual Super Bowl champion Broncos winning the Wild-Card playoff 42-17.

#### 1998

**FEB. 13** — Quarterback Rob Johnson is traded to the Buffalo Bills for the ninth pick in the first round and a fourth-round choice in the 1998 NFL draft.

**FEB. 16** — The Jaguars sign Buffalo Bills linebacker Bryce Paup, an unrestricted free agent.

**APRIL 18-19** — The Jaguars draft 11 players, their most ever, in the NFL draft. Two players are selected in the first round: running back Fred Taylor from the University of Florida with the ninth pick, and safety Donovin Darius, a safety from Syracuse, with the 25th choice.

**MAY 12** — Rick Reiprich, who had been responsible for the Jaguars' first four successful drafts, is promoted to director of player personnel. Fran Foley is named director of pro scouting, and Rick Mueller is named director of college scouting.



Fred Taylor rushed for 162 yards — the third-most ever by a rookie in NFL postseason history — as the Jaguars defeated the New England Patriots in a Wild-Card playoff on January 3, 1999.

**SEPT. 20** — Running back James Stewart is injured on the Jaguars' second play of the game and lost for the season. But first-round draft choice Fred Taylor takes over and runs 52 yards for a touchdown on his first carry. The Jaguars defeat the Baltimore Ravens 24-10 for their third win of the season.

**OCT. 12** — The Jaguars post a franchise-best 5-0 start, beating the visiting Miami Dolphins 28-21 on "Monday Night Football" when Mark Brunell and Keenan McCardell hook up for two touchdown passes in the fourth quarter. Fred Taylor ran for a 77-yard TD on the game's first play from scrimmage.

**NOV. 1** — The Jaguars explode for a team-record number of points in a 45-19 victory at Baltimore. Jacksonville scored six TDs in the first half — the seventh most ever in a half in NFL history — as they jumped out to a 42-7 lead. Fred Taylor's 75-yard TD reception becomes the longest play from scrimmage in team history.

**DEC. 13** — Mike Hollis becomes the most accurate field goal kicker in NFL history by making two attempts, giving him an 81.45 percentage in four seasons (101 of 124), dethroning Philadelphia's Chris Boniol.

**DEC. 20** — The Jaguars clinch their first-ever AFC Central Division championship prior to kickoff of a Sunday night game at Minnesota, dethroning the Pittsburgh Steelers after a four-year run.

**DEC. 28** — With a 21-3 victory over the Steelers on "Monday Night Football," the Jaguars win their 11th game for the second straight year and becomes the NFL's first expansion team to qualify for the playoffs three times in its first four seasons. Fred Taylor finishes the year with 17 touchdowns, tied for the third-most ever by a rookie in NFL history.

#### 1999

**JAN. 3** — In their first-ever home playoff game, the Jaguars defeat the New England Patriots 25-10. Mark Brunell returns after missing three games with an ankle injury to throw a TD pass and Mike Hollis kicks four field goals, as Jacksonville claims its first postseason win in two years.

**JAN. 10** — The Jaguars' fourth season ends with a 34-24 loss to the New York Jets in the divisional playoffs.

**JAN. 13** — Head coach Tom Coughlin is rewarded with a contract extension through the 2003 season.

**JAN. 26** — Dom Capers, the former head coach of the Carolina Panthers, is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dick Jauron, who became head coach of the Chicago Bears.

**FEB. 12** — On the first day of free agency, the Jaguars sign two unrestricted free agents: DT Gary Walker of the Tennessee Titans and S Camell Lake of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

**FEB. 16** — The Jaguars sign TE Kyle Brady, a transition free agent from the New York Jets, to an offer sheet. The next day, the Jets decline to match the offer, making Brady a Jaguar.

**APRIL 24-25** — The Jaguars draft eight players in the NFL draft, including Fernando Bryant, a cornerback selected in the first round from Alabama.

**JULY 29** — The Jaguars open their fifth training camp at ALLTEL Stadium.

September 22, 1996 — at New England 28, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard receptions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led at the end of the first half 16-10, and built a 25-10 lead going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie Jackson six plays later and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Ravens fumbled, and Jacksonville drove down the field, with Mike Hollis winning the game with a 34-yard field goal.

October 26, 1997 — at Pittsburgh 23, Jacksonville 17

The Jaguars took a 10-0 lead into the second half, but Pittsburgh came back to take a 14-10 lead in the fourth-quarter. After a Brunell TD pass to Pete Mitchell, the Jaguars took a 17-14 lead. The Steelers scored a 19-yard field goal at the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

### September 24, 1995 — Green Bay 24, at Jacksonville 14 — Sunday night (TNT)

The Jaguars lost their fourth straight game at the beginning of their inaugural season. They fell behind 17-0 before getting on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter with two touchdown passes from Mark Brunell to Willie Jackson. It was Brunell's second start at quarterback and the first time he had played against his former team.

### December 15, 1996 — at Jacksonville 20, Seattle 13 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars battled back from a 13-7 deficit by scoring on three consecutive fourth-quarter possessions to win their eighth game of the season. Jimmy Smith scored his second touchdown of the game on a pass from Mark Brunell, and Mike Hollis kicked two field goals. Tony Brackens started with 12 tackles, a sack, an interception, three tipped passes and his fourth takeaway of the season.

### September 22, 1997 — at Jacksonville 30, Pittsburgh 21 — Monday night (ABC)

In the Jaguars' first appearance on "Monday Night Football," Mark Brunell returned from a pre-season knee injury to lead the Jaguars to the win. The Jaguars had a 17-7 lead at the half. After a Steeler touchdown and a Mike Hollis field goal, the Jaguars held on to a 20-14 lead. The Steelers scored in the fourth quarter to take a 21-20 lead, but the Jaguars regained the lead with a Hollis field goal with 4:14 left. With six-seconds remaining in the game, the Steelers' 40-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Clyde Simmons and returned by Chris Hudson 58 yards for a touchdown to end the game.

### October 12, 1998 — at Jacksonville 28, Miami 21 — Monday night (ABC)

The Jaguars took a 14-0 lead on two Fred Taylor touchdowns — including a 77-yard run on the game's first play from scrimmage. Miami scored the game's next three touchdowns before Mark Brunell and Keenan McCardell hooked up for two TD passes in the fourth quarter. With just under 2:00 remaining and Miami driving, Tony Brackens stripped Dan Marino of the ball and fell on it to give Jacksonville its fifth victory to start the season.

### December 20, 1998 — at Minnesota 50, Jacksonville 10 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars clinched their first AFC Central Division title earlier in the day when the Oilers lost, but they were unable to celebrate after getting trounced by the Vikings. Rookie Jonathan Quinn made his first NFL start in the Metrodome, and the Jaguars played a solid first half, trailing only 12-3 at the break. But Minnesota scored 38 straight points in the second half before a late Jaguars touchdown. The 50 points was the most ever allowed by Jacksonville in a game.

### December 28, 1998 — at Jacksonville 21, Pittsburgh 3 — Monday night (ABC)

The Jaguars closed out the 1998 regular season with a convincing win over Pittsburgh in front of a record crowd of 74,143. Rookie quarterback Jonathan Quinn got his first NFL victory and scored the game's first touchdown on a 15-yard run. Fred Taylor added two TDs (his 16th and 17th of the season), as the Jaguars held the Steelers to three points, the fewest ever allowed by Jacksonville in a game.

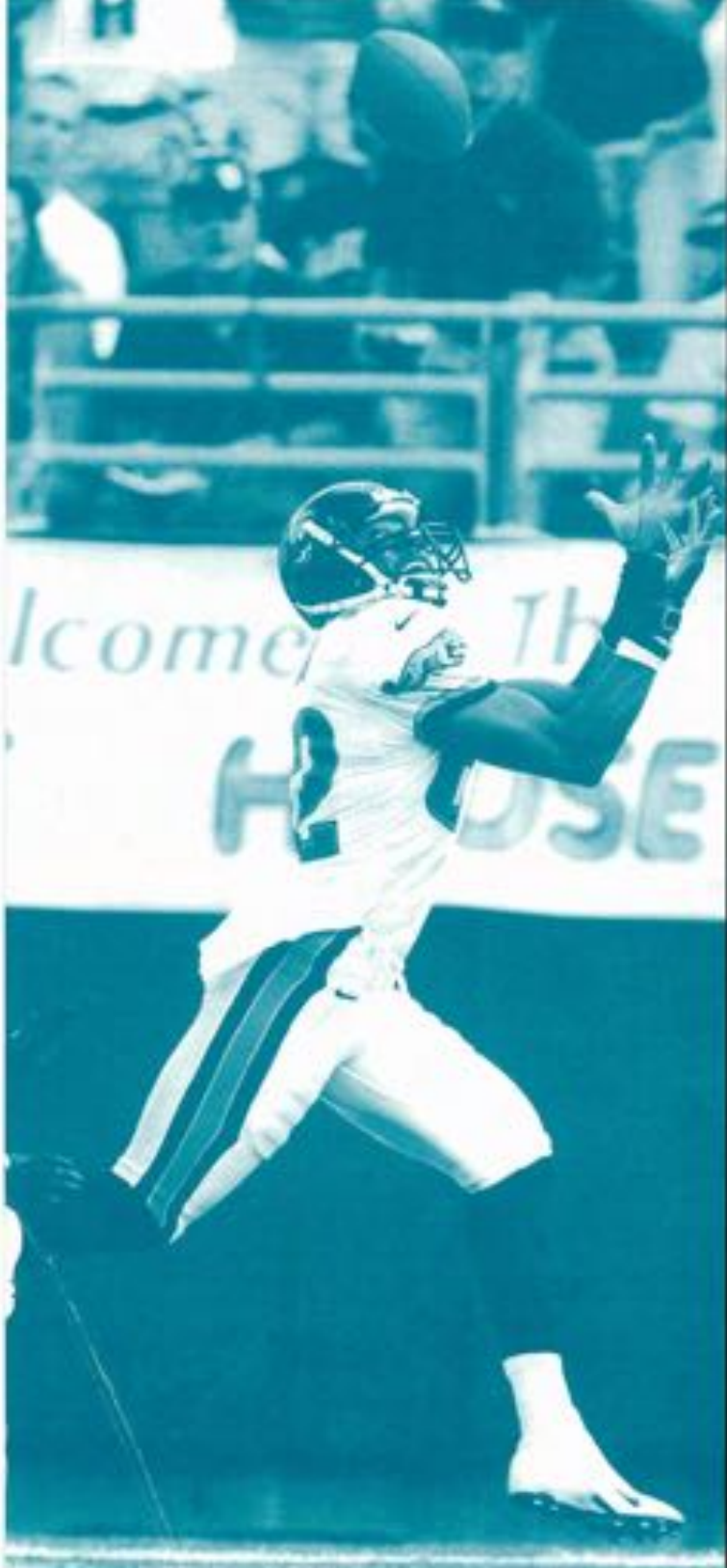

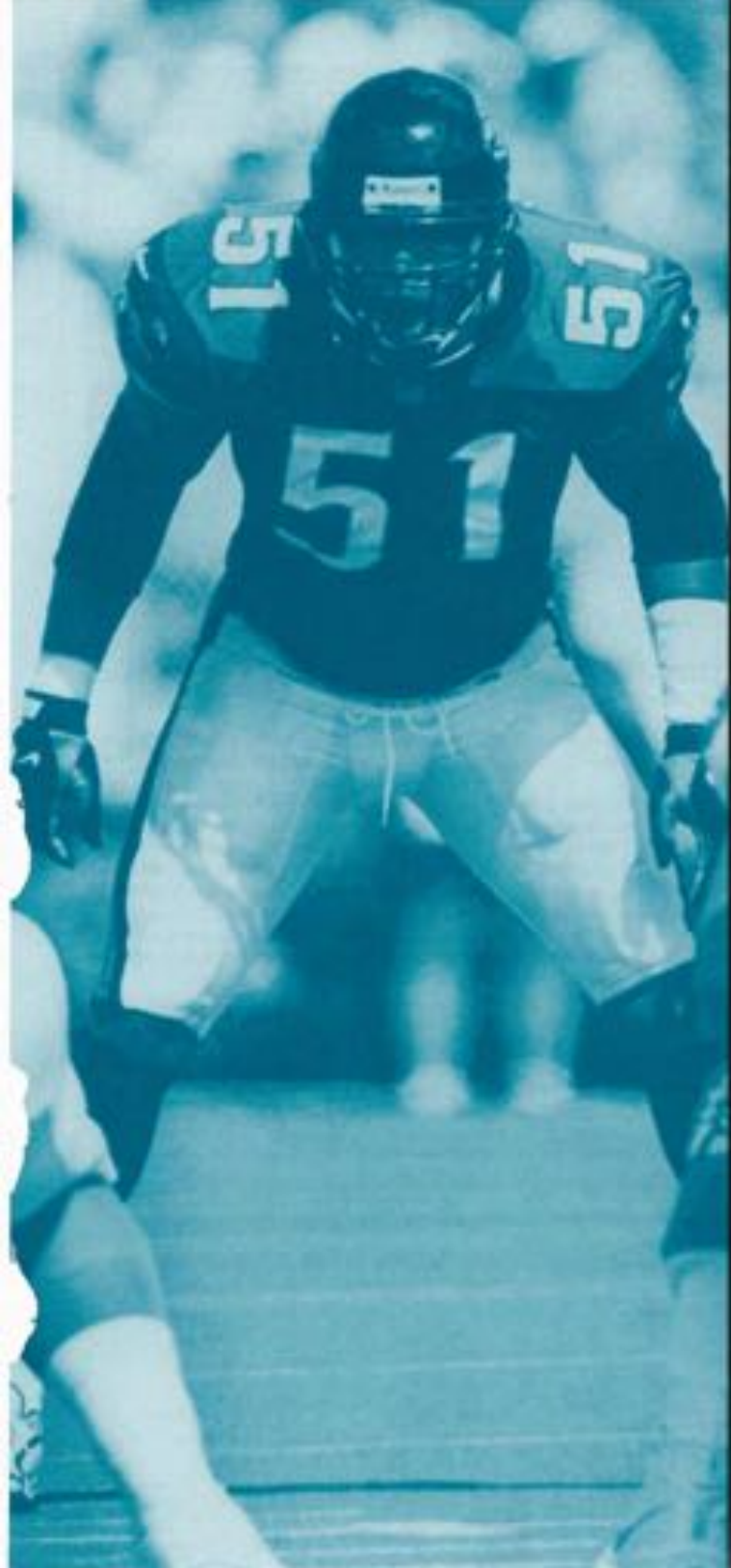

Returning for their fifth year of broadcasting Jacksonville Jaguars football on the Jaguars Radio Network are Brian Sexton and Matt Robinson. Sexton again handles the play-by-play, while Robinson adds analysis.

Sexton, 30, is the voice of the Jaguars. He is the co-host, along with Robinson, of the "Monday Evening Quarterback" which airs at 6 p.m. on WOKV and "Jaguars this Week", which airs on Wednesdays at 6 p.m. on WBWL. Sexton also is the host of the "Countdown to Kickoff Show," which airs on Fridays at 6 p.m. on WBWL. Formerly sports director at WOKV, he came to Jacksonville from Wichita, Kan., where he served as assistant sports director at KNSS in 1993 and hosted various pregame and postgame shows in addition to handling play-by-play for the Wichita State University Radio Network. He is also the host of "The Tom Coughlin Show," which airs on WOKV at 6 p.m. on Thursday nights. He and his wife, Jennifer, live in Atlantic Beach.

Robinson, 44, a former NFL and USFL quarterback, has expertise on the other side of the microphone. A former University of Georgia star, he played six seasons in the NFL, for the New York Jets, Denver Broncos and Buffalo Bills. Robinson came to Jacksonville in 1984 as captain and quarterback for the Bulls of the USFL. After his retirement in 1986, he remained in Jacksonville with several business interests in the area. Robinson is the co-host of "Monday Night Live," which airs at 7 p.m. and "The Tom Coughlin Show", which airs at 6:30 p.m. on Saturdays. Both shows can be seen on WTLV Channel 12. Robinson is also a co-host of "Jaguars this Week" with Sexton and Vic Ketchman. In 1997, he broadcast two World League games for Fox Sports. He sits on the board of trustees of the North Florida Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and the St. Johns County United Way and is a member of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce Sports Council. Robinson and his wife, Necole, have a son, Tyler, and a daughter, Mattison.

## ALLTEL STADIUM



They said it couldn't be done. They said it wouldn't be ready. But, on August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its first season in a new stadium or arena.

Two years later, on April 18, 1997, Jacksonville Municipal Stadium was re-named ALLTEL Stadium after the Little Rock, Ark.-based wireless telecommunications and information services company that is listed in Forbes 500 and Fortune 500. ALLTEL also has a regional office in Jacksonville that employs more than 1,000 employees. Revenue from the 10-year grant of naming rights — a total of \$6.2 million — is shared equally between the Jaguars and the city of Jacksonville.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new spectacle arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. ALLTEL Stadium was built faster than any major-league stadium had ever been built in North America.

And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just seconds before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." Now in its fifth year of operation, ALLTEL Stadium is still drawing raves.

The stadium features two unique "signature" features, both of them state-of-the-art. The first are the two Stadium Clubs, which are located on both sides, and the enormous twin 60-by-156-foot scoreboards with 24 by 32-foot Sony JumboTron screens.

The Clubs and all 10,000 Club Seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club — with entrances that are glass-enclosed, 100-foot-high atriums — provides more than 65,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in ALLTEL Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

ALLTEL Stadium seats 73,000, but additional temporary seats are added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity from 73,000 to well over 80,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game ... and perhaps someday a Super Bowl.

In addition to hosting at least a dozen football games every year, ALLTEL Stadium is quickly developing into a top venue for some of the world's top concerts. In the past two years, U2 and Shania Twain have performed at the stadium.

The construction of ALLTEL Stadium in the record 19 1/2 months was unprecedented. As with a football team, 12 different consulting companies shaped the construction. Demolition began on the old Gator Bowl on January 3, 1994, with approximately 90 percent of the old stadium torn down. In fact, the only portion salvaged was the west upper deck, which had been added in 1962.

A total of 121 subcontractors had a hand in the job ... all in all, thousands of people worked on the stadium from start to finish. And on Friday, August 18, 1995, ALLTEL Stadium opened its doors to more than 70,000 Jaguars faithful.

## MEDIA INFORMATION

**CREDENTIALS:** Credential requests are honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials are not issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Executive Director of Communications, Jacksonville Jaguars, One ALLTEL Stadium Place, Jacksonville FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

**PARKING:** Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked adjacent to Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

**MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL-CALL:** The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the Southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the credential will-call window at Gate 1. The credential will-call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the will-call window.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers and videographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance on the service hallway.

**POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS:** Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Tom Coughlin conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in a room off the visitors lockerroom.

### DURING THE WEEK

**MEDIA WORKROOM:** The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. Phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information are available. The phone number in the media workroom is (904) 633-6312.

**TOM COUGHLIN INTERVIEWS:** Head coach Tom Coughlin conducts his weekly news conference at 12:15 on Mondays in the media workroom. He is not available on Tuesdays, but is available to the media from 12:15 to 12:30 on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

**PLAYER INTERVIEWS:** The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. On Mondays, players are available from 11:45 to 12:15, and on Tuesdays there is no availability, as this is the players' off day. The lockerroom is open to the media on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 11:45 to 12:15 and on Fridays from 11:15 to 11:45. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance to schedule.
