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TEAM 6-2 AT HOME FOR 2ND STRAIGHT YEAR

2006 IN REVIEW: The Jacksonville Jaguars finished the regular season with a 8-8 record, including wins against five teams that advanced to the 2006 postseason. The Jaguars finished with a 6-2 record at home and posted two shutouts in their eight home games.

Jack Del Rio completed his fourth season as head coach with a record of 34-30. The Jaguars rank tied for seventh in the NFL since 2004 with a 29-19 mark and are one of only eight NFL teams with a .500 record or better in all three seasons.

2006 TEAM/INDIVIDUAL HIGHLIGHTS

■ The Jaguars ranked second in total defense (4th rushing, 10th passing), the highest ranking in team history. The defense set a franchise-record with 20 interceptions and finished the season with the second-fewest net yards allowed in team history.

■ Allowed a NFL-low 11.0 points per game in their eight home games. Only one team (New England, 24) scored 20-plus points against the Jaguars at home. ■ Outscored their opponents 371 to 274, a plus-97 point differential which ranked fifth in the NFL.

■ The Jaguars set a single-season franchise record for rushing yards (2,541) as they averaged 158.8 yards per game. In addition, the Jaguars set a franchise record with a 5.0-yard rushing average and 5.5 average per play.

■ Set a franchise-record with 375 rushing vards against Indianapolis on December 10. It was one of two 200-yard rushing games for the Jaguars in 2006. Cornerback Rashean Mathis was voted as a starter for the Pro Bowl. Mathis set a team single-season record with eight interceptions which tied for third in the NFL.

■ The running back duo of Fred Taylor (231-1,146, 5 TDs) and rookie Maurice Jones-Drew (166-941, 13 TDs) ranked second in the NFL with 2,087 rushing yards, the most by a duo in team history. The Jaguars came within 59 yards of becoming only the fifth team in NFL history to have two 1,000 yard rushers in a season

■ Taylor led the Jaguars in rushing for the seventh time in nine seasons. He became one of only 22 players in NFL history with 9,000 career rushing yards as he finished with 9,513.

■ Rookie RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew led all rookies and ranked tied for third in the NFL with 16 touchdowns (13 rushing, 2 receiving, 1 kickoff return). Jones-Drew finished with 2,250 all-purpose yards, the third-most by a rookie in NFL history. He set a team-record for all-purpose yards in a season and in a game (303 vs. Indianapolis, 12/10).

■ Jones-Drew scored a rushing touchdown in a NFL-record (by a rookie) eight consecutive games, the most in team history. He led all NFL running backs with a 5.7 average per carry, the highest in team history.

■ DE Bobby McCray led the team with a career-high 10 sacks, becoming only the fourth Jaguar in team history to have at least 10 sacks in a season.

■ LB Daryl Smith led the club with a career-high 170 tackles while rookie LB Clint Ingram ranked second with 117 tackles.

■ Third-year receiver Reggie Williams led the club with 52 receptions for 616 yards and four touchdowns while second-year receiver Matt Jones led the team with 643 yards on 41 receptions. Maurice Jones-Drew set a team rookie-record with 46 receptions.

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Features four teams that qualified for the 2006 postseason (Indianapolis, San Diego, Kansas City, New Orleans). In addition, the Jaguars will play 10 games against teams that finished .500 or better in 2006. Will travel to New Orleans to play at the Louisiana Superdome for the first time since 1996. The Jaguars will travel to in-state rival Tampa Bay for the second time in franchise history (1995). In addition, Michael Vick and the Atlanta Falcons along with the Carolina Panthers will visit Alltel Stadium for the first time since 1996. ■ The Jaguars will battle former AFC Central rival Pittsburgh for the 19th time with the Jaguars leading the overall series, 10-8. The teams have met every season since 1995 except for the 2003 season. The Jaguars have won two consecutive games in the series. Oakland will visit Alltel Stadium for the first time. Reigning NFL MVP LaDainian Tomlinson of the San Diego Chargers will visit Alltel Stadium in 2007.

JAGUARS MAKE COACHING MOVES

The Jaguars named **Dirk Koetter** the team's offensive coordinator and **Joe DeCamillis** special teams coordinator. Koetter, known for his expertise of the passing offense, has spent the last nine seasons as a head coach at the collegiate level. He previously served as head coach at Arizona State from 2001-06. DeCamillIs, who is known as one of NFL's top special teams coaches, has spent the past 14 seasons as a special teams coordinator for the Atlanta Falcons from 1997-2006.

2006 JAGUARS AWARDS

■ CB Rashean Mathis - Voted as starter for <u>Pro Bowl</u>. Named to <u>AP All-Pro team</u>. Named <u>AFC Defensive Player</u> <u>of the Week</u> following the Pittsburgh win on 9/18. Mathis recorded two fourth quarter interceptions in the Monday Night Football game.

■ Head Coach Jack Del Rio - Named <u>Motorola NFL</u> <u>Coach of the Week</u> following the Jaguars' 13-6 win at Philadelphia on 10/29.

■ RB/KR Maurice Jones Drew - Named <u>AFC Special</u> Teams Player of the Week and was presented the <u>NFL</u> Player of the Day Golden Peacock Award by NBC following the Indianapolis game on 12/10. Jones-Drew finished with three touchdowns and a team-record 303 all-purpose yards against the Colts. He had a 93-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to open the second half, the third-longest return in team history

■ QB David Garrard - Named <u>AFC Offensive Player of the</u> <u>Week</u> following the Miami game on 12/3. Garrard finished with 229 passing yards and two touchdowns for a careerhigh 136.4 passer rating against the Dolphins.

■ LB Clint Ingram - Named <u>NFL Defensive Rookie of the</u> <u>Month</u> for November. Ingram had 43 tackles (23 solo), one interception, three tackles for loss and one pass defensed in four games. He had double-digit tackles in three of the four games.

■ DE Jorge Cordova - Selected as the Jaguars <u>2006 Ed</u> <u>Block Courage Award recipient</u>. Cordova missed all of his first two seasons in the NFL with knee injuries, but has returned to play a prominent role along the defensive line in 2006.

■ DE Paul Spicer, OG Chris Naeole, TE George Wrighster and K Josh Scobee - Selected to the USA Today All-Joe Team. The award is named after former Kansas City Chiefs player Joe Phillips and goes to the players and coaches who have overachieved and are often overlooked.

CB Rashean Mathis tied for 3rd in the NFL with a team-record eight interceptions ... RB Fred Taylor ranked 6th in the AFC and 14th in the NFL with 1,146 rushing yards ... Taylor ranked 7th in the AFC and 14th in the NFL with 1,388 yards from scrimmage ... RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew led all rookies and tied for 3rd in the NFL for non-kickers with 96 points (16 TDs) ... Jones-Drew ranked 2nd in the AFC and 3rd in the NFL with 2,250 all-purpose yards, 12th in AFC and 25th in the NFL with 941 rushing yards, 8th in the AFC and 15th in the NFL with 1,377 yards from scrimmage, and 3rd in the NFL with a 27.7 kickoff return average ... JAGUARS FINISH IOTH IN OFFENSE; THIRD IN RUSHING: <u>The Jaguars finished the season ranked 10th in offense, the highest</u> <u>ranking since 2000 (7th)</u>. The Jaguars ranked third in the NFL in rushing with a 158.8 average per game, the second-highest ranking in team history (1st, 1999). The Jaguars rank sixth in rushing from 2003-2006. The Jaguars rushed for 100-plus yards in a team-record 12 consecutive games and tied for first in the NFL by rushing for 150-plus yards in nine games. The Jaguars rushed for 100-plus yards in 14 of 16 games, including a franchise record 375 yards against Indianapolis on 12/10, 150-plus yards in 9 of 16 games and 200-plus yards in three games. The three games with 200-plus rushing yards tied the club record set in 2000. There have been 14 200-plus rushing games in team history.

JAGUARS SET FRANCHISE RECORD FOR SINGLE-SEASON RUSHING YARDS: The Jaguars set a single-season franchise record for rushing yards with 2,541, shattering the previous high of 2,102 yards in 1998. The Jaguars rushed for a franchise-record 375 yards against Indianapolis on 12/10, surpassing the previous high of 244 on 12/3/00 against Cleveland. The Jaguars had the record in the first half as they rushed for 251 yards. The 375 rushing yards were the most in the NFL since Cincinnati had 407 against Denver on October 22, 2000.

OFFENSIVE LINE HELPS JAGUARS TO SINGLE-SEASON RUSHING RECORD AND SECOND-FEWEST SACKS: The offensive line paved the way to a single-season franchise-record for rushing yards and allowed only 30 sacks, the second-fewest in team history (28, 2003). The Jaguars set a franchise record with a 5.0 rushing average and 5.5 average per play. In addition, the Jaguars outgained their opponents in 12 of 16 games. The unit had a new leader in 2006 as Andy Heck took over as offensive line coach after spending the previous two seasons as the Jaguars' assistant offensive line coach. The Jaguars were solid at the tackle position with right tackle Maurice Williams and second-year pro Khalif Barnes. Williams has started all 16 games in five of his six seasons. Barnes has started 27 games in his first two seasons and solidified the spot for the future. In the interior of the offensive line, Brad Meester returned to the center position to start all 16 games after missing the final five games in 2005 with a torn biceps tendon. The two Hawaiians, 10-year veteran Chris Naeole and fourth-year pro Vince Manuwai, started all 16 games at the two guards spots, with Naeole at right guard and Manuwai at left guard.

DEFENSE RANKS AMONG NFL'S BEST FROM 2003-06

DEFENSE RANKED SECOND IN NFL IN 2006 AND FOURTH FROM 2003-06: The Jaguars defense, under the direction of fourth-year defensive coordinator Mike Smith, ranked second in the NFL in 2006 as they allowed 283.6 yards per game. The defense ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL in 2005, allowing 290.9 yards per game (106.8 rushing, 184.1 passing) and forcing 28 turnovers. The defense finished the 2004 season ranked 11th. Here's a look at the NFL's top defenses in 2006 and from 2003-2006:

2006 DEFENSE RANKED AMONG BEST IN CLUB HISTORY: The Jaguars defense ranked in the top three of several categories in team history in 2006, including a team-record 20 interceptions. <u>The Jaguars finished second in the NFL in total defense, the</u> <u>highest ranking in team history</u>. SHUTTING IT DOWN: The Jaguars ranked fourth in 2006 by allowing an average of 14.5 offensive points and the club ranks third from 2003-06 by allowing only 16.1 points per game. The Jaguars posted two shutouts in 2006, tied for the most shutouts in a season in team history (2000). The Jaguars recorded the fourth shutout in team history on September 18 against Pittsburgh with a 9-0 victory on Monday Night Football. It was the first shutout of a defending Super Bowl champion in 25 years (Oakland, 1981) and only the fifth time in NFL history. It was only the fourth time the Steelers had been shut out under head coach Bill Cowher and first time since 12/14/03 (6-0 at New York Jets). On 11 offensive possessions, the Jaguars defense did not allow the Steelers offense to cross the Jacksonville 46-yard line. The Jaguars shut out the New York Jets, 41-0, on October 8.

DEFENSE BUCKLES DOWN IN THE RED ZONE: The Jaguars ranked first in the NFL by allowing opponents only 32 drives into the red zone. Opponents struggled against the Jaguars defense in the red zone as opponents managed only 2.05 yards per play, which ranked third in the NFL, and opposing quarterbacks had a NFL-low 41.0 passer rating.

JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS HEAD COACH JACK DEL RIO

JACK DEL RIO COMPLETES FOURTH SEASON AS HEAD COACH: Jack Del Rio completed his fourth season as the Jaguars' head coach with a record of 34-30. Del Rio was named to the post on January 17, 2003, becoming the second head coach in Jaguars history. With records of 5-11, 9-7, 12-4 and 8-8, Del Rio has directed a steady course of improvement and a return to the playoffs in his four seasons as head coach.

Del Rio is now in his 22nd year in the NFL, his 11th as a coach. Del Rio spent 11 years as an NFL linebacker and had a standout college career at the University of Southern California. He previously coached in New Orleans (1997-98), Baltimore (1999-2001), and Carolina (2002). He was the Panthers' defensive coordinator, and in his only season with the club the defense improved from 31st in the NFL to second, the biggest one-season defensive improvement in NFL history. Del Rio was the linebackers coach for three seasons in Baltimore, where the Ravens' defense also ranked second each season. He helped the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants and coached the Ravens' talented linebackers, overseeing the development of Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. Prior to coaching, Del Rio played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-1991) and Minnesota (1992-95), playing in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season.

Del Rio was a starter at linebacker for Southern California (1981-84), where he earned All-America honors, was a runner-up for the Lombardi Award and co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. Del Rio is one of three NFL head coaches (Jeff Fisher, Mike Holmgren) who graduated from USC. Del Rio has learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to USC and played for John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green. As an assistant coach, he has worked for Hall of Famer Mike Ditka and Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, as well as Super Bowl participant John Fox. Among other notable coaches Del Rio has worked with are Dom Capers, Tony Dungy, Dave Wannstedt, Monte Kiffin, Mike Tice, Tom Moore, Norv Turner and Butch Davis. Drafted by baseball's Toronto Blue Jays, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on USC's baseball team in 1983 and 1984 with future stars Randy Johnson and Mark McGwire. He was a third-round choice by the New Orleans Saints in 1985 and was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team.

NFL HEAD COACHES WITH NFL PLAYING EXPERIENCE: Jack Del Rio has the longest playing tenure in the NFL among active head coaches. He played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-91) and Minnesota (1992-95). Here are the eight current head coaches with NFL playing experience:

JAGUARS END SEASON WITH IS PLAYERS ON INJURED RESERVE: The Jaguars were forced to place 15 players on injured reserve, including four starters from a year ago, and were without the services of Pro Bowl DT Marcus Stroud (ankle) for five games until he returned to the lineup against the New York Giants on 11/20. Starting nickel back Terry Cousin missed six games with a groin injury. <u>Defensively, the</u> <u>Jaguars had seven different starting lineups in 16 games.</u> Rookie Dee Webb made his first career start at right cornerback at Buffalo on 11/26 as starter Brian Williams missed the game with a hamstring injury. <u>Despite the injuries the defense ranked second in the NFL, the</u> <u>highest ranking in team history</u>. FB/RB Greg Jones suffered an ACL injury against Tampa Bay on August 26 in the third preseason game and was placed on injured reserve. The Jaguars were without three important pieces of their defense as DE Reggie Hayward, LB Mike Peterson and SS Donovin Darius were lost for the season with injuries. Hayward, who led the Jaguars with 8.5 sacks and 57 quarterback pressures in 2005, suffered a torn Achilles tendon in the season-opener against Dallas. Peterson was placed on injured reserve on October 10 after suffering a torn pectoral muscle against the New York Jets on 10/8. Darius, the club's all-time leading tackler, suffered a broken leg against the New York Giants on 11/20. QB Byron Leftwich was placed on injured reserve on December 1 after undergoing surgery on his ankle. In addition, the Jaguars lost second-year linebacker Pat Thomas (hamstring) and rookie defensive end Brent Hawkins (groin) for the season.

HOMEFIELD ADVANTAGE

DEFENSE HOLDS IT DOWN: The Jaguars defense allowed a NFL-low 11.0 points per game in their eight home games as opponents scored only 17 times in 95 possessions at Alltel Stadium. The Jaguars allowed only one team (New England, 24) to score 20-plus points at home this season. The defense allowed an average of only 270.7 yards and recorded 14 interceptions and 18 sacks at home. The Jaguars gave up only 10 touchdowns in 95 possessions.

The Jaguars scored 23 touchdowns (14 rush, 7 pass, 1 defense, 1 return) while the opponents managed only 10 TDs. The Jaguars averaged 355.6 yards of offense at home this season, including 168 rushing yards per game.

PROTECTING HOME TURF: The Jaguars rank tied for seventh in the NFL with a 59-29 mark at Alltel Stadium in the last 11 seasons (1996-2005). The Jaguars have a 21-11 mark at home under head coach Jack Del Rio, including a 6-2 record in both 2005 and 2006.

MOVING THE CHAINS: The Jaguars ranked second in the NFL with an average time of possession of 32:11. The Jaguars controlled the ball for a team-record 44:22 at Tennessee on 12/17, marking only the fifth game in franchise history the Jaguars had a time of possession of 40 minutes or more. The Jaguars had a time of possession of 32 minutes or more in eight games (5-3 record). The Jaguars recorded a 40:19 time of possession against the New York Giants on 11/20. Quarterback David Garrard directed two drives at Miami on 12/3 of 95 (11 plays) and 91 (9 plays) yards with both resulting in touchdowns. It was only the second time in team history the Jaguars had two drives of 90-plus yards in the same game (12/21/97 at Oakland) and the first time that both drives ended with touchdowns.

TAKING CARE OF THE BALL: The Jaguars ranked tied for sixth in the NFL with only 23 turnovers in 2006 (9 fumbles lost, 14 interceptions) and rank third in the NFL from 2003-06 with 93 turnovers. The two combined for 18 touchdowns which ranked tied for third in the NFL among running back duos. Taylor (9-131, 1 TD) and Jones-Drew (15-166, 2 TDs) became the first running back duo in team history to each record 100-plus rushing yards in a game against Indianapolis on 12/10. They became only the second pair of teammates over the last 30 seasons with 130 or more rushing yards each in the same game. The others were St. Louis' Marshall Faulk (183) and Trung Candidate (145) against Carolina in 2001.

ONLY 59 YARDS FROM TWO 1,000 YARD RUSHERS: The Jaguars came within 59 yards of becoming only the fifth team in NFL history to have two 1,000-yard rushers in a season. Fred Taylor ended the season with 1,146 yards and rookie Maurice Jones-Drew finished with 941 yards. Atlanta accomplished the feat in 2006 as quarterback Michael Vick (1,022) and running back Warrick Dunn (1,082) both went over 1,000 yards. The last time two running backs on the same team cleared the 1,000 yard rushing mark in the same season was in 1985 with Cleveland running backs Kevin Mack (1,104) and Earnest Byner (1,002). Franco Harris (1,128) and Rocky Bleier (1,036) of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1976 and Miami's Larry Csonka (1,117) and Mercury Morris (1,000) in 1972 also accomplished the feat

FRED TAYLOR – JAGUARS ALL-TIME LEADING RUSHER: Fred Taylor has career totals of 2,062 carries for 9,513 yards and 56 touchdowns rushing in 112 games. Taylor led the Jaguars in rushing in 2006 with 231 carries for 1,146 yards along with five touchdowns and four 100-yard rushing games. It marked the seventh time in nine seasons Taylor led the Jaguars in rushing. He registered his 42nd career 100yard rushing game against Indianapolis on 12/10 with 131 yards on nine carries and one touchdown. Taylor broke free for a 76-yard run on the Jaguars first offensive play, the second-longest run in team history. Taylor also had 100-yard games at Buffalo on 11/26 (22-101), at Philadelphia on 10/29 (15-103, 1 TD) and against the New York Jets on 10/8 (21-111, 1 TD). Here are additional notes on Taylor:

Taylor surpassed 11,000 career yards from scrimmage at Philadelphia on 10/29/06, joining Jimmy Smith (12,285) as the only Jaguars with 11,000 career yards from scrimmage.

Taylor has rushed for over 100 yards in 19 games in four seasons under Jack Del Rio and the Jaguars are 13-6 in those games.

Taylor owns the top five single-game rushing marks in team history including a team-record 234 yards on 30 carries at Pittsburgh on 11/19/00.

Taylor owns 34 Jaguars records and is the only player in club history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season.

■ Taylor owns the top five seasonal marks for a running back in Jaguars history for rushing yards (1,572, 2003), rushing attempts (345, 2003), and most 100-yard rushing games (9, 2000).

■ He holds the single game club record for rushing yards (234, 11/19/00 at Pittsburgh, 30 att.), rushing attempts (37, 9/25/05 at NYJ., 98 yards), and longest run from scrimmage (77t, 10/12/98 vs. Miami).

■ Jaguars have a 8-4 record when Taylor touches the ball 30 plus times and a 3-0 mark with 35 touches.

■ Has 18 of the top 20 rushing performances in Jaguars history and has posted 42 career 100-yard rushing games. He recorded a careerhigh nine 100-yard rushing games in 2000, including nine consecutive games. The streak tied the late Walter Payton for the third-longest streak in NFL history behind Barry Sanders (14) and Marcus Allen (11).

TAYLOR 5TH AMONG ACTIVE RUNNING BACKS: Jaguars running back Fred Taylor has rushed for 9,513 yards on 2,062 carries in nine seasons. He currently ranks 5th among active running backs in rushing yards, 21st all-time. In addition, Taylor ranks sixth in NFL history in rushing yards per game (84.9) and seventh in yards from scrimmage per game (104.6). Here are the lists:

TAYLOR BECOMES 25TH PLAYER IN NFL HISTORY WITH 2,000 RUSHING ATTEMPTS: Fred Taylor surpassed 2,000 career rushing attempts against the New York Giants on 11/20. <u>Taylor became one of 25 players in NFL history with 2,000-plus carries and</u> <u>Taylor's 4.6 yards per carry average ranks fifth-best among the 25 players: Jim Brown (5.2), Barry Sanders (5.0), Tiki Barber (4.7) and O.J. Simpson (4.7).</u>

TAYLOR MOVES INTO 21ST PLACE IN NFL HISTORY: Fred Taylor surpassed Earl Campbell (9,407) in 21st place all-time for career rushing yards at Indianapolis on 12/10. <u>Taylor is one of only 22 players in NFL history with 9,000 career rushing yards. In addition,</u> <u>Taylor (21st) and Antowain Smith (49th) are the only two players among the Top 50 rushers who have never made a Pro Bowl.</u>

THE SKINNY ON MAURICE JONES-DREW:

■ Led all rookies and ranked tied for third in the NFL with 16 touchdowns (13 rushing, 2 receiving, 1 kickoff return). <u>The 16 touchdowns</u> ranked fifth among all rookies since 1990 and were the most since Clinton Portis had 17 in 2002.

■ Led all NFL running backs with a 5.7 average per carry.

■ Led all rookies and ranked third in NFL history by a rookie with 2,250 all-purpose yards.

■ Owns the team record for most all-purpose yards in a season (2,250) and in a game (303 vs. Indianapolis, 12/10). The 2,250 all-purpose yards led all rookies in 2006 and ranked third in the NFL. The 303 all-purpose yards ranked fourth in NFL history by a rookie and were the most since Tim Brown had 306 on November 28, 1988 for Oakland.

I think the explosive qualities he has and the physical toughness he has you can see in his play. I think that is very clear for anyone who watches him. I think he's a special young man. He has a champion's heart. He has a real positive energy about him. He's a terrific teammate, totally unselfish. He's in it for the team. There is a reason a guy like that never lost a high school game. He's been a champion everywhere he's been. He understands it takes good coaching, it takes good teammates, and he wants to be a good teammate and do what his coaches ask him first. God has blessed him with some great ability. It just came in a shorter package than most, but he has some really special ability."

JONES-DREW AMONG THE NFL LEADERS: Led all rookies and ranked tied for 3rd in the AFC and tied for 3rd in the NFL for non-<u>kickers with 96 points (16 TDs)</u> ... Ranked 1st in the NFL among running backs with a 5.7 yards per carry average ... Ranked 3rd in the NFL in all-purpose yards with 2,250 ... Ranked 12th in AFC and 25th in the NFL with 941 rushing yards ... Ranked 8th in the AFC and 15th in the NFL with 1,377 yards from scrimmage ... Ranked 3rd in the NFL with a 27.7 kickoff return average ...

MAURICE KNOWS WAY TO THE END ZONE; LED ALL ROOKIES WITH 16 TOUCHDOWNS: Maurice Jones-Drew led the Jaguars with 16 touchdowns (13 rushing, 2 receiving, 1 return), which ranks fifth among all rookies since 1990. Jones-Drew led all rookies with 16 touchdowns and ranked tied for third in the NFL. Jones-Drew scored a touchdown in 12 of the last 14 games and had all 16 touchdowns in those 14 games. Jones-Drew had a rushing touchdown in a team-record eight consecutive games, including six in the last four games. The eight consecutive games with a rushing touchdown set a NFL record by a rookie, surpassing former Baltimore Colt Curtis Dickey (1980) The eight straight games with a touchdown is tied with Fred Taylor who did it in eight games in 1998. Jones-Drew ranked second in team history with 16 touchdowns (Taylor, 17, 1998) in a season and was also second to Taylor (14) for most rushing touchdowns as a rookie with 13.

YARDS, YARDS AND MORE YARDS: <u>Maurice Jones-Drew finished his rookie season with 2,250 all-purpose yards which ranks third</u> in NFL history by a rookie. Jones-Drew produced three of the top seven single-game all-purpose yards totals in team history in his rookie season and owns the franchise-record for single season all-purpose yards in a game and a season. Jones-Drew set the franchise's singlegame record with 303 all-purpose yards against Indianapolis on 12/10, including a career-high 166 rushing yards on only 15 carries (11.1 avg.). The 303 all-purpose yards were the fourth-most in NFL history by a rookie and the most in a game since Jonathan Carter of the New York Jets had 304 against Indianapolis on November 16, 2003.</u> Jones-Drew finished with 244 all-purpose yards against Indianapolis on 9/24, the fourth-highest total in team history. He became the seventh player in team history to rush for 100-plus yards, the first rookie in the NFL in 2006, and joined Fred Taylor (1998, six 100-yard games) as the only rookies in team history to rush for 100 yards. He is only the fourth Jaguar to post three or more 100-yard rushing games, joining Taylor (42), James Stewart (6), and Stacey Mack (3).

"PINBALL" MAKES HIS MARK: Quarterback Byron Leftwich nicknamed rookie running back Maurice Jones-Drew "pinball" during training camp for the way defenders bounce off of him. Jones Drew ranked second on the team in rushing with 166 carries for 941 yards with a team-high 13 rushing touchdowns and also ranked second with a team rookie-record 46 receptions for 436 yards and two touchdowns. Jones-Drew recorded a career-long 51-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter at Washington on 10/1. The 51 yards marked the fourth-longest touchdown reception by a running back in team history with the last 50-plus touchdown reception by a running back coming on 10/17/04 vs. Kansas City (64t, Byron Leftwich to Fred Taylor). Jones-Drew had a career-high seven receptions for 58 yards at Houston on 10/22 along with a rushing touchdown.

MATHIS NAMED PRO BOWL STARTER: Rashean Mathis became the first Jaguars cornerback to be voted to the Pro Bowl as he was the only Jaguar named to this year's Pro Bowl team. Mathis ranked tied for third in the NFL with a team-record eight interceptions. Mathis is the seventh defensive player in team history to be voted to the Pro Bowl and his selection marked the fourth consecutive season the Jaquars have had a defensive player in the Pro Bowl. Mathis is the sixth Jaguar drafted by the team to make the Pro Bowl. He is one of the four current Jaguars that has made the Pro Bowl in Jacksonville, joining Marcus Stroud (2003-05), John Henderson (2004) and Chris Hanson (2002).

MATHIS FINISHES TIED FOR THIRD IN NFL WITH EIGHT INTERCEPTIONS: Jaguars cornerback Rashean Mathis ranked tied for third in the NFL with a team-record eight interceptions. Mathis, who owns the team record with 20 career interceptions, surpassed the previous single-season record of six set by Aaron Beasley (1999) and Marlon McCree (2002). Mathis recorded two interceptions against Tennessee on 11/5, his second game this season with two interceptions (9/18/06 vs. Pittsburgh). Mathis intercepted Tennessee guarterback Vince Young on 11/5 and returned it a career-long 55 yards to the one-yard line, tied for the second-longest return in team history. Mathis had 146 interception return yards this season and 267 for his career, which ranks as the second-most in team history.

MATHIS IS CREAM OF THE CROP FROM 2003 DRAFT CLASS: Jaguars Pro Bowl cornerback Rashean Mathis leads all defensive backs selected in the 2003 draft in interceptions with 20. Mathis is one of 49 defensive backs selected in 2003 and joins Dallas cornerback Terence Newman as the only players to start every game since being drafted. Eight defensive backs were selected ahead of Mathis in 2003 including six in the first round. Mathis led the Jaguars in 2005, and shared the lead in 2004, with five interceptions each year. He ranked tied for third in the NFL with a career-high eight interceptions in 2006.

MCCRAY LEADS TEAM WITH IO SACKS; MOST BY A JAGUAR SINCE 2001: Jaguars defensive end Bobby McCray led the team in 2006 with a career-high 10 sacks and ranked second with 33 quarterback pressures. McCray, a seventh round pick in 2004, played a larger role on defense following the season-ending injury to Reggie Hayward. McCray became only the fourth Jaguar in team history to have at least 10 sacks in a season, joining Tony Brackens (12 in 1999 and 11 in 2001), Kevin Hardy (10.5 in 1999) and Gary Walker (10 in 1999). McCray was inactive for the season-opener against Dallas. He recorded at least one sack in nine of 15 games, including a season-high two against the New York Jets on 10/8. His previous career-high was 5.5 sacks in 2005. He has 19 career sacks which ranks tied with Marcus Stroud for sixth in team history.

SMITH STEPS UP TO LEAD DEFENSE: FINISHES WITH CAREER-HIGH 170 TACKLES: With veteran linebacker Mike Peterson on injured reserve, third-year pro Daryl Smith stepped up as the leader of the Jaguars defense. Smith led the club with a career-high 170 tackles along with three sacks and one interception. Smith recorded double-digit tackles in eight of 10 games after moving from the outside to the middle with Peterson out. Smith tied his season-high with 17 tackles on 12/10 against Indianapolis (17 tackles, vs. Houston on 11/12), the second-highest total of his career (18 at Houston, 12/24/05).

MAKING HIS MARK: Jacksonville Jaguars linebacker Daryl Smith was one of six linebackers selected with the first 39 picks of the 2004 draft. Smith, the 39th overall pick, has totaled 365 tackles and nine sacks in three seasons as a starter. Only Jonathan Vilma (1st round, 12th overall) ranks ahead of Smith in total tackles and games started among the six linebackers.

"BIG HEN" CLOGS UP THE MIDDLE: Defensive tackle John Henderson is regarded as one of the NFL's top defensive linemen and is a menace to opposing running backs. Henderson has recorded 399 tackles (311 solo), 22.0 sacks, 111 quarterback pressures, 32 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in his first five NFL seasons (80 games). Henderson ranked third on the team in 2006 with 3.5 sacks, surpassing his total of three sacks last year. <u>He ranked tied for fifth among AFC defensive tackles in sacks</u>. Additional notes on Henderson include:

Henderson, the ninth overall pick in 2002, earned his first Pro Bowl appearance in 2004. He was the highest-drafted defensive lineman ever by the Jaguars and second defensive tackle drafted overall in 2002.

In 2004, Henderson posted a career-high 98 tackles and 40 quarterback pressures along with 5.5 sacks. He combined with defensive tackle Marcus Stroud in 2004 for 10 sacks, the third-best mark in the NFL among defensive tackle tandems.

Ranks fifth in team history with 22.0 sacks in 80 career games. Has three career multi-sack games.

Has not missed a game in his four-year career, starting 76 of 80 games.

DEL RIO ON JOHN HENDERSON: "Big John has been unbelievable this year. I think last year was excellent as well. Maybe he didn't get the notoriety that I think he is starting to get this year but he has been a real force for us in the middle. I think the other thing that's happened was that Marcus (Stroud) was out for five weeks, and is still fighting through some things, and John has taken on a little bit of a leadership role as well in terms of not just taking care of himself but getting guys around him. I've talked to him constantly about the way Joe Greene took charge of that team in Pittsburgh. I spent a lot of time talking with Tony Dungy about what made that team so special in Pittsburgh and he went on to talk about Joe Green. I think John Henderson is that type of man – big, strong and when he says something, guys listen."

MEIER MAKES MOST OF OPPORTUNITY: Rob Meier mostly sees action as a reserve in the Jaguars defensive tackle rotation, but 18 of his 25 starts have been at defensive end. Meier saw action behind Pro Bowl tackles Marcus Stroud and John Henderson in 2006, but Meier started three games at LDE after the opening day injury to Reggie Hayward. Meier moved back inside and started at DT for five games with Stroud out with an injury. <u>Meier, who was a seventh-round pick in 2000 from Washington State, ranked second on the team in 2006</u> <u>with five sacks (third-most among AFC defensive tackles).</u> Meier ranked third on the team in 2005 with a career-high six sacks and led all AFC defensive tackles. Meier has played in 107 games with the Jaguars with 25 starts and has 15.5 sacks and 225 tackles. He started eight games at defensive end in 2004 before suffering a fractured fibula at Minnesota on 11/28.

STROUD RETURNS TO ACTION IN FINAL SEVEN GAMES: Three-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle Marcus Stroud returned to the starting lineup for the final seven games. Stroud had missed the previous five games with an ankle injury. He recorded 24 tackles, 2.5 sacks, one tackle for loss, and eight quarterback pressures in the last seven games. He registered a sack in three consecutive games for the first time since 2002, and has 19 in his career to rank tied for sixth in team history.

DAVID GARRARD POSTS 10-8 RECORD AS A STARTER: David Garrard has started 18 games in the last five seasons and owns a 10-8 record as a starter. He directed the club to a 5-5 mark in 10 starts this season after leading the team to four wins in the last five games in 2005 to close out the regular season. The 10 starts were the most in a season for Garrard. He is one of only four quarterbacks to be drafted by the Jaguars in team history (Rob Johnson, 1995; Jonathan Quinn, 1998; Leftwich, 2003) and joined Leftwich (9,042) and Brunell (25,698) as the only quarterbacks in team history to throw for 3,000-plus yards. Garrard, a fourth-round pick by the Jaguars in the 2002 draft, totaled 145 of 241 for 1,735 yards with a career-high 10 touchdowns passing in 2006 along with a career-high 47 rushes for 250 yards. Garrard finished 17 of 23 for 195 yards and one touchdown for a 113.5 passer rating against New England on 12/24, the third-highest completion percentage of his career (73.9). He completed 16 of 22 passes for 229 yards and two touchdowns at Miami on 12/3 for a career-high 136.4 passer rating. He was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance against the Dolphins. Garrard directed the offense to a season-high 414 yards against the New York Giants as he finished 19 of 32 for 249 yards. The 249 yards were the third-most of his career and he connected with Matt Jones on a career-long 49 yard completion in the fourth quarter. Garrard threw for a career-high three touch-downs on 11/5 against Tennessee on 12 of 22 passing for 177 yards and finished with a 120.6 passer rating, the third-highest of his career.

TALL TARGETS: The Jaguars have selected three receivers in the last three seasons and all three stand at six-foot-four or taller (2004, Reggie Williams, 6-4; 2004, Ernest Wilford, 6-4; 2005, Matt Jones, 6-6). The tight end position is also loaded with height as the top two tight ends stand six-foot-six in veteran Kyle Brady and 2006 first-round pick Marcedes Lewis.

MATT JONES FINISHES WITH TEAM-HIGH 643 RECEIVING YARDS; TWO 100-YARD RECEIVING GAMES: Second-year wide receiver Matt Jones led the team with 643 receiving yards on 41 receptions and four touchdowns, including two 100-yard receiving games. Jones, the Jaguars' 2005 first-round pick, surpassed his rookie total of 36 receptions and finished with a career-best 15.7 yards per reception. He had 13 receptions of 20-plus yards. He set a career-high with 128 receiving yards at Miami on 12/3 and had a 15-yard touchdown reception from David Garrard. In the season-finale at Kansas City, Jones had five receptions for 104 yards. He has three career 100-yard receiving games and is only the third player in team history to record three-plus 100-yard games (Jimmy Smith, 46; Keenan McCardell, 19).

WRIGHSTER RECORDS CAREER-BEST NUMBERS: Tight end George Wrighster, who has missed 13 games due to injuries since being drafted in the fourth round in 2003, ranked fourth on the team with a career-high 39 receptions for 353 yards and three touchdowns. Wrighster doubled his previous career-best receptions total of 13 set in 2003 and 2005 and receiving yards total of 150 set in 2003. He played in only four games in 2004 because of a back injury and was placed on injured reserve. He is the second-highest tight end ever drafted by the Jaguars (Marcedes Lewis, 2006 first round).

INGRAM FILLS IN NICELY: NAMED NFL ROOKIE OF THE MONTH: Clint Ingram, a third-round pick in 2006, started at outside linebacker the last 11 games following the injury to Mike Peterson and recorded double-digit tackles in four of the last seven games including 13 against New England on 12/24. Ingram was rewarded for his play in November as he was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month. Ingram, the first rookie to start on defense for the Jaguars in 2006, led the team in tackles in four games including nine tackles at Tennessee on 12/17. He registered 10 tackles at Philadelphia on 10/29 including his first career sack and led the team on 11/5 against Tennessee with a career-high 14 tackles (9 solo). He recorded his first career interception against the New York Giants on 10/20 along with 10 tackles. He led the team with 12 tackles at Miami on 12/3.

SENSABAUGH RETURNS TO LINEUP: Safety Gerald Sensabaugh made his first start of the season at Buffalo on 11/26 as he replaced Donovin Darius who suffered a season-ending leg injury against the New York Giants on 11/20. Starting is familiar territory for Sensabaugh as he started the final three games of the 2005 season, including the playoff game at New England. Sensabaugh, the Jaguars' fifth round pick in 2005, recorded a career-high two interceptions in 2006 along with a career-high 47 tackles. Sensabaugh picked up his first career interception at Miami on 12/3, stopping a key Miami drive in the red zone, and finished with a season-high nine tackles. He picked off Peyton Manning against Indianapolis on 12/10.

SCOBEE FINISHED 26 OF 32 IN 2006: Jaguars placekicker Josh Scobee connected on 81.2 percent of his field goals in 2006 (26 of 32), including a career-best streak of 15 consecutive field goals that was snapped at Buffalo on 11/26. It was the third-longest streak in team history. Scobee, who was drafted in the fifth round of the 2004 draft, led the team with a career-high 119 points which ranked third in the AFC and fifth in the NFL. The 119 points ranked third in team history and he became only the fourth player in team history with 300-plus points. Scobee's 26 field goals surpassed his previous career-high of 24 in 2004. Scobee was 14 of 19 from 40-plus yards in 2006. Scobee's 14 field goals from 40-49 yards were the most in the NFL in 2006. Scobee is 73 of 93 on field goals in his three-year career. Scobee set a team-record against Cincinnati on Oct. 9, 2005 with two field goals of 50-plus yards (51, 53) and the 53 yarder tied his careerhigh and the longest field goal in club history. He led the team with a career-high 107 points in 2005 and joined Fred Taylor and Mike Hollis as the only three Jaguars to have 100 points in a season. Scobee has scored in 33 consecutive games dating back to 1/2/05, the second-longest streak in team history. Mike Hollis holds the team record at 67 games.

SCOBEE RANKS SECOND IN NFL WITH 21 TOUCHBACKS: Josh Scobee ranked second in the NFL with a career-high 21 touchbacks. Here is a look at Scobee's career numbers and the 2006 leaders for touchbacks:

2006 ROOKIE REVIEW: The Jaguars finished with 13 rookies on their 53-man roster and all six 2006 draft picks ended the season with the club. Here's a recap of the Jaguars' 13 rookies, including DE Brent Hawkins who was on IR:

■ TE Marcedes Lewis (1st round, 28th pick) — Played in 15 games with three starts. Missed the season-opener against Dallas with an ankle injury suffered in training camp. Finished with 13 receptions for 126 yards and one touchdown. Had two receptions for 40 yards at Washington on 10/1, including a 31-yard reception that helped set up a touchdown. Recorded his first career touchdown at Buffalo on 11/26.

■ RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew (2nd round, 60th pick) — Played in all 16 games with one start. Led Jaguars and ranked tied for third in the NFL with 16 touchdowns. Ranked second on the team in rushing with 166 carries for 941 yards along with a team-high 13 TDs. Ranked second in receiving with a team rookie-record 46 receptions for 436 yards and 2 TDs. Led team with 31 kickoff returns for a 27.7 average including a 93-yard kickoff return on 12/10 against Indianapolis, the third-longest in team history. His 16 touchdowns led all rookies and ranked fifth among all rookies since 1990. Led all NFL running backs with a 5.7 average per carry. **Ranked third in NFL history by a rookie with 2,250 all-purpose yards.** Set the team record for most all-purpose yards in a season (2,250) and in a game (303 vs. Indianapolis, 12/10). The 2,250 all-purpose yards led all rookies in 2006 and ranked third in the NFL. The 303 all-purpose yards ranked fourth in NFL history by a rookie and are the most since Tim Brown had 306 on November 28, 1988 for Oakland. Scored a rushing touchdown in a NFL-record (by a rookie) eight consecutive games, the most consecutive games in team history. In addition, the eight consecutive games with a touchdown ties Fred Taylor (8, 1998) for most in team history. Had a 74-yard touchdown run against New England on 12/24, the second-longest touchdown run in Jaguars history.

■ LB Clint Ingram (3rd round, 80th pick) — Played in 14 games with 11 starts. Was the first rookie to start on defense for the Jaguars in 2006 as he moved into the lineup at outside linebacker in week six following the injury to Mike Peterson. Ranked second on the team with 117 tackles along with 1.5 sacks and one interception. Led the team in tackles in four games and recorded double-digit tackles in four of the last seven games. Had a career-high 14 tackles (9 solo) against Tennessee on 11/5. Named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for his play in November. Recorded his first career interception against the New York Giants on 10/20 along with 10 tackles.

■ DE Brent Hawkins (5th round, 160th pick) — Played in six games before being placed on injured reserve on 11/8 with a groin injury. Started training camp at linebacker before being moved back to his college position of defensive end. Finished with two sacks, eight tackles and three special teams tackles in six games. Picked up his first career sack on 10/22 at Houston. Followed with four tackles and one sack at Philadelphia on 10/29, becoming the first Jaguars rookie since John Henderson in 2003 to have a sack in back-to-back games.

■ DE James Wyche (7th round, 213th pick) — Spent first 10 weeks on the practice squad before being activated to the 53-man roster on November 15. Was inactive for six games.

■ DB Dee Webb (7th round, 236th pick) — Played in 11 games with one start, primarily on special teams. Finished with 16 tackles and one interception along with five special teams tackles. Made first career start at RCB for injured Brian Williams on 11/26 at Buffalo and recorded his first career interception. Saw extensive action on 11/5 against Tennessee after Rashean Mathis left the game with an injury and finished with a career-high eight tackles.

■ OT Richard Collier (Undrafted) — Was one of three undrafted rookies to make the opening day roster. Saw action in four games on special teams. Served as the backup left tackle behind Khalif Barnes.

■ S Jamaal Fudge (Undrafted) — Spent first 10 weeks on the practice squad before being signed to the active roster on 11/20. Played in six games and finished with five tackles and three special teams tackles. Pressed into duty on December 24 against New England after starting safety Deon Grant left with an injury.

■ LB Brian Iwuh (Undrafted) — Saw action in 12 games primarily on special teams. Registered 10 special teams tackles along with 10 tackles as a reserve linebacker. Began the season on the practice squad, but was signed to the active roster on 9/22.

■ DE Tony McDaniel (Undrafted) — Played in 11 games as reserve on the defensive line. Was one of only three undrafted rookies to make the opening day roster. Ranked second among rookies with 21 tackles, one sack, three passes defensed and six quarterback pressures. Recorded a career-high 10 tackles (9 solo) against Tennessee on 11/5. Was inactive the final two games with a hip injury.

■ RB Montell Owens (Undrafted) — Played in 14 games primarily on special teams. Was one of three undrafted rookies to make the opening day roster. Finished with eight special teams tackles. Recovered an onsides kick from Dallas in the season opener to preserve a Jaguars victory. Had a streak of five consecutive games with a special teams tackle. Also saw action at fullback.

WR Charles Sharon (Undrafted) — Spent first 10 weeks on the practice squad before being activated on 11/22. Dressed for one game at Buffalo on 11/26, but did not play.

DE Jeremy Mincey (Free Agent) — Signed by the Jaguars on 12/14 off the San Francisco 49ers practice squad. Originally selected in the sixth round by the New England Patriots out of Florida. Was inactive for all three games for the Jaguars.

WHO SAYS YOU CAN'T GO HOME?: Most NFL players are drafted by a team outside of their hometown and are forced to leave family and friends behind as they pursue their professional careers. Three Jaguars are fortunate enough to return to their hometown of Jacksonville to play in the NFL. Cornerback Rashean Mathis, who played at Englewood High School, is in his fourth season with the team after his college career at Bethune-Cookman. Cornerback Dee Webb, a seventh-round pick in this year's draft, played at Ed White High School in Jacksonville before starting for two seasons at Florida. Safety Jamaal Fudge, who was a teammate of Webb's at Ed White High School, was signed off the Jaguars practice squad on November 20. In addition, wide receiver Charles Sharon, who hails from Palatka, Florida, was signed off the practice squad in late November.

MAKING HISTORY ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL: The Jaguars made history in their two appearances on Monday Night Football in 2006. The Jaguars shut out defending Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh, 9-0, on 9/18, the lowest scoring game in the 37-year history of Monday Night Football. The Jaguars claimed a 26-10 win over the New York Giants on 11/20 and held the Giants to 25 rushing yards, the fewest by a Jaguars opponent in team history. The previous record was 26 rushing yards by the Steelers earlier in the season. <u>The 26 yards</u> were the fewest rushing yards by the Steelers in 15 seasons under head coach Bill Cowher and the first time the Steelers have not picked up a first down rushing since 12/28/03 vs. Baltimore.

SIX ROOKIE UNDRAFTED FREE AGENTS ON CURRENT ROSTER: Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio has made it clear that an undrafted rookie free agent has an opportunity to make the final 53-man roster. Since Del Rio took over the helm in 2003, there have been 10 undrafted free agent rookies on the club's opening day roster. The Jaguars had three undrafted rookie free agents earn a spot this year, tying for the most under Del Rio. The Jaguars finished the season with six rookie free agents on their roster as LB Brian Iwuh, S Jamaal Fudge and WR Charles Sharon were signed off the club's practice squad.

Jimmy Smith, who retired this offseason, started a team-record 150 games in a span of 10 seasons with the Jaguars. <u>Running back Fred Taylor, safety Donovin Darius (injured reserve) and tight end Kyle Brady are the only Jaguars who remain on the roster from 1999.</u> Brad Meester, who was a second round pick by the Jaguars in 2000, had his team-record streak of 92 consecutive starts snapped in 2005. The longest current streak of starts is now 64 games by Rashean Mathis and Maurice Williams, the third-longest streak in team history.

MR. JAGUAR: Tight end Kyle Brady finished his eighth season in Jacksonville and has played in 120 games. The 120 games are tied with Mark Brunell (1995-2003) for the second-most games played in team history. Jimmy Smith holds the franchise-record with 171 games played.

TONY BOSELLI BECOMES FIRST MEMBER OF "PRIDE OF THE JAGUARS": Former Jaguars offensive lineman Tony Boselli became the first member of the "Pride of the Jaguars" as he was honored at the Jaguars' game on October 8 against the New York Jets. Boselli was the Jaguars first- ever draft pick when they selected him with the second overall pick in the 1995 draft from Southern California. Boselli started 91 of 92 career games in seven seasons with the Jaguars from 1995 to 2001 and is the only Jaguar to start five consecutive Pro Bowls.

TIDBITS FROM THE REGULAR SEASON:

■ The Jaguars improved to a NFL-best 9-3 (.750) in their 12-year history on Kickoff Weekend with a 24-17 win over Dallas on September 10, including a 3-1 mark under head coach Jack Del Rio. The Jaguars have won three consecutive season-openers for the first time since 1999-2001.

■ The Jaguars defeated Pittsburgh, 9-0, on Monday, September 18, the lowest scoring game in Monday Night Football history. The nine total points also tied for the fewest points by two teams in Jaguars history. The Jaguars defeated Baltimore, 6-3, on 11/14/99 at Alltel Stadium. Neither team managed to score in the first half. The last time a NFL game was scoreless in the first half was the Jaguars game on 9/18/05 at Indianapolis. It was only the third scoreless half in the NFL since 2003. In 2005, the Jaguars' defense held opponents scoreless in six different halves.

Pittsburgh had only 26 rushing yards on 9/18, the second-fewest by a Jaguars opponent in franchise history. The Steelers had only 14 rushing attempts against the Jaguars, tied for third-fewest in team history by a Jaguars opponent. The fewest rushing attempts by a Jaguars opponent was 11 by Atlanta on 11/7/99. The Jaguars held the Steelers to 153 net yards, the third-fewest net yards allowed in team history.
 The Steelers became only the third opponent in Jaguars history (12/12/04 vs. Chicago; 12/21/03 vs. New Orleans) to not have a first down

rushing. The Steelers picked up only nine first downs, tied for the fourth-fewest first downs allowed in Jaguars history. ■ The Jaguars shut out the New York Jets, 41-0, on 10/8, marking the second-largest margin of victory in Jaguars history (48, 12/3/00 vs. Cleveland).

The Jaguars held the New York Jets to 45 net passing yards on 10/8, the second-fewest by a Jaguars opponent in team history.
 The Jaguars scored 28 points in the first half against the Jets on 10/8, the second-most points in a first half in team history (42, at Baltimore, 11/1/98), and tying the for the third-most points in a half.

■ Gerald Sensabaugh blocked a punt against the Jets on 10/8, the first blocked punt since 10/9/05 vs. Cincinnati (Derrick Wimbush).
 ■ The Jaguars rushed for a season-high 209 yards on 46 carries at Philadelphia on 10/29, the 12th-most rushing yards in team history and most since the club had 221 at St. Louis on 10/30/05. The Jaguars have rushed for 200-plus yards five times since 2003. The 46 carries were the most since 9/25/05 at the New York Jets (47 carries, 139 yards).

■ The Jaguars held Philadelphia with Donovan McNabb at quarterback without a touchdown for the first time since 11/7/04 at Pittsburgh, a span of 23 games. In addition, McNabb did not throw for a touchdown for only the fifth time since 2004.

The Eagles entered the game on 10/29 having scored 20-plus points in each of their first seven games and the Jaguars held them to two field goals.

The win over the New York Giants on 11/20 was the 100th regular season win in franchise history (100-86). The Jaguars are the first NFL team with a winning record at the time of its 100th win since the Dolphins were 100-68-3 when they won their 100th game in 1978.

The New York Giants managed only 25 rushing yards on 11/20, the fewest by a Jaguars opponent in team history.
The leaver surpressed the provide framehics record of 244 rushing yards (12/2/00 yes Claveland) in the first half agains

The Jaguars surpassed the previous franchise record of 244 rushing yards (12/3/00 vs. Cleveland) in the first half against Indianapolis on 12/10 as they rushed for 251 yards. The Jaguars finished with 375 yards, the second-most in the NFL since 1970.

Fred Taylor (9-131, 1 TD) and Maurice Jones-Drew (15-166, 2 TDs) became the first running back duo in team history to record 100-plus rushing yards in a game against Indianapolis on 12/10. Taylor and Jones-Drew both had 100-plus yards at the half as the team rushed for 251 yards in the first half. It was the first time for a team to have two 100-yard rushers in the first half and 251 rushing yards in the first half since 11/22/92 when Buffalo did it against Atlanta (Kenneth Davis, 147; Thurman Thomas, 103). The Bills had 254 rushing yards at the half.
 Tennessee attempted only 15 passes on 12/17, the fewest by a Jaguars opponent in team history, and managed only 57 net passing yards, the third-lowest by a Jaguars opponent in team history.

■ The Jaguars held Tennessee to five first downs on 12/17, the second-fewest by an opponent in team history (2, 12/3/00 vs. Cleveland), and did not allow a third down conversion. The last time a Jaguars opponent failed to convert a third down was Cleveland on 12/3/00 (0-12). The Jaguars had 23 first downs.

■ The Jaguars set a franchise record with a time of possession of 44:22 at Tennessee on 12/17. It was only the fifth game in team history the Jaguars had a time of possession of 40 minutes or more.

JAGUARS LEAD NFL WITH 9-3 MARK ON KICKOFF WEEKEND: The Jaguars own the NFL's best record in the opening game of the season with a 9-3 mark in their 12-year history, including wins in three consecutive season-openers. The Jaguars opened the 2006 season with a 24-17 win against Dallas at Alltel Stadium. The Jaguars are 3-1 on Kickoff Weekend under head coach Jack Del Rio.

TIDBITS FROM THE JAGUARS LOCKERROOM:

B RB Fred Taylor, S Donovin Darius and TE Kyle Brady are the only three Jaguars that remain from the 1999 team. In addition, there are 13 players on the roster who were with the team prior to 2003.

B/KR Maurice Jones-Drew has worn a Superman tee-shirt underneath his jersey since he was 10-years old playing Pop Warner football in Pinole, California. A lady watching one of his games said, 'he looked Superman the way he ran past the defenders.' Jones-Drew's late grandfather, Maurice Jones, bought him a shirt and he has continued the ritual in the NFL.

Jaguars guard Chris Naeole is one of five current NFL players from Kahuku High School in Hawaii. Kahuku joins Dillard (Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.), Ely (Pompano Beach, Fla.), Long Beach Poly (Long Beach, Calif.) and Dorsey (Los Angeles, Calif.) as the high schools with a NFL-best five players in the NFL. Other players from Kahuku include Aaron Francisco (Arizona), Chris Kemoeatu (Pittsburgh), Ma'ake Kemoeatu (Carolina) and Itula Mili (Seattle). Jaguars quarterback Quinn Gray played at Dillard.

Rookie running back Montell Owens earned a roster spot as a rookie free agent from Maine, becoming only the fifth NFL player to play at Maine. Owens sent a highlight tape to Boston College, but the coaches thought he would be better off playing Division I-AA. Boston College sent the tape to Maine where they gave Owens his only scholarship offer. Owens is a musician in his spare time and is an accomplished trumpet player.

WR Ernest Wilford has worn the number 19 since playing at Virginia Tech. Wilford had worn number 14 in high school but switched to number 19 at age 19 to signify a change in his lifestyle. "It was the year I changed my life around," Wilford said. "I don't want to say I had a troubled childhood, but I was just very outspoken."

S Deon Grant grew up in Augusta, Ga., and worked as a server in the kitchen at Augusta National during The Masters. Grant was working when Tiger Woods won his first Masters in 1997.

Jaguars' 2006 draft picks Marcedes Lewis and Maurice Jones-Drew were not the only players from their high schools drafted in 2006. In fact, both players had two other high school teammates selected in this year's draft, tops among high schools. Lewis was joined by Darnell Bing (Safety, Oakland) and Winston Justice (OT, Philadelphia) from Long Beach Polytechnic High School. Jones-Drew was the first player from nationally-ranked De La Salle High School (Concod, Calif.) selected, but was joined by teammates Kevin Simon (linebacker, Washington) and Demetrius Williams (WR, Baltimore) on the second day of the draft.

The Jaguars have three players on their roster from Hawaii (OG Chris Naeole, OG Vince Manuwai, (PS) WR Chad Owens).

OT Stockar McDougle's brother, Jerome, was a first-round draft choice of Philadelphia in 2003 and remains on the roster.

DT Rob Meier was the number one overall pick of the 2000 CFL Draft by British Columbia. Meier is one of two foreign born players on the roster (Reggie Williams, Landstuhl, Germany).

WR Cortez Hankton is the cousin of Carolina Panthers wide receiver Karl Hankton.

QB Quinn Gray led the Frankfurt Galaxy to the World Bowl Championship in the spring of 2003.

LB Nick Greisen is the second cousin of Redskins C Casey Rabach.

DE Bobby McCray's father, Bobby McCray, Sr., is the head football coach at Homestead High School in Miami, Florida.
