MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefiting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

Jaguars Foundation received the 2006 Steve Patterson Sports Philanthropy Award

The Jaguars Foundation is the proud recipient of the 2006 Steve Patterson Sports Philanthropy Award for outstanding leadership in philanthropy in professional sports. This national award was established last year by The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, The Sports Philanthropy Project and the widow of former basketball player and coach Steve Patterson who was committed to serving those in need. The award recognizes the work of the Jaguars Foundation beginning in 1995 to help the most vulnerable among our community's youth and their families, and our leadership in guiding other professional teams in the development of grant making and other programs in their local markets. The award will be presented to the Foundation at the Jaguars Monday night game on September 18, 2006.

PROGRAMS:

GRANT MAKING: When the Jaguars were named as the 30th franchise in 1993, the Weaver's vision was to give back to the community in a substantial manner. The Foundation was announced on September 14, 1994, and awarded its first grants in 1995 before the team played its first game. From March 1995 through June 2006, the Jaguars Foundation has allocated more than \$9.5 million in grants. This level of giving is among the top few in professional sports. Through a fair and objective evaluation process, grants are allocated to serve the needs of economically and socially disadvantaged youth throughout Northeast Florida.

STRAIGHT TALK™: Straight Talk is a unique partnership with local media and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida to help prevent teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections. Under the leadership of Foundation Chair and CEO, and Jaguars owner, Delores Barr Weaver; WJXT 4, WJCT PBS 7, WTLV ABC12, WJWB WB17, WJXX ABC25, WAWS FOX30, WTEV CBS47, Comcast Cable,

Cox Radio (WAPE, 95.1), Clear Channel Radio (WJBT, 92.7), The Florida Times-Union / jacksonville.com, Clear Channel Outdoor and PRI Productions collaborate to produce an annual prime time television town hall forum, "Teens & Sex...the Real Truth." The show offers candid information on teens and sex and the consequences faced by sexually active teenagers. Broadcast each May (National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month), the 2006 show was hosted by actor and recording artist Orlando Brown from the Disney Channel's "That's So Raven" show and local broadcast personality Jennifer Candelino. Jaguars player Ernest Wilford is featured, along with a taped message from players Terry Cousin, Rashean Mathis, Brad Meester, Todd Yoder and Joe Zelenka, in the Jaguars locker room; ROAR member, Heather Miller; radio personalities Amadeus and DJ Dr. Doom, a panel of experts including youth advocate Shelby Knox from the Sundance Award winning documentary "The Education of Shelby Knox", guest testimonials, a middle school studio audience,

and an exciting student PSA contest. The Straight Talk program, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, has also awarded more than one million dollars in grants to local programs specifically dealing with this issue. HONOR ROWS®: In partnership with Reebok and Alltel, this unique program, now in its 12th year, uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for youth ages 9 to 17 to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. Youth can earn their seat to a game for achieving their goal to improve academic achievement and personal behavior and for participation in volunteer community service projects and physical fitness activities. In addition, all Honor Rows youth pledge to remain free from illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco. Nearly 4,600 seats will be awarded in 2006 to more than 40 nonprofit agencies. A volunteer committee reviews all Honor Rows proposals. At the game, participants receive a meal, Honor Rows t-shirt and hat, and special recognition by the Weavers and fans. The United Way of Northeast Florida mobilizes game-day volunteers who ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of the participants.



In addition to the Honor Rows, the Jaguars Foundation awards seats to other charitable organizations, including Habijax for volunteer recognition; US Navy/Sailors Aweigh for youth whose parents are on deployment; inner-city youth football associations; Ronald McDonald House guest families and others who meet Foundation guidelines for support. Each season, the Foundation allocates approximately 11,800 seats for charitable purposes with an in-kind value exceeding \$470,000.

THE OFFICIAL PLAYBOOKS® READING PROGRAM: Through a partnership with Pepsi, Reebok and local public libraries, this award winning innovative program inspires young people to read. In The Official Playbooks booklet, Jaguars owners, players, coaches and cheerleaders recommend books they found particularly motivating as youth or as adults today. Youth can pick-up The Official Playbooks during the football season at area public libraries. Playbooks can also be accessed year-round at jaguars.com. The Foundation awards approximately \$300,000 in grants annually to programs that promote literacy. In addition, since 2003, through a partnership with the nonprofit FIRST BOOK, major book publishers and local co-sponsors, the Jaguars Foundation has distributed more than 325,000 new children's books into the homes of low-income families.



ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against tobacco use. The signature "Jaguars Don't Smoke" logo, showing a vibrant Jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw, appears on the scoreboard and signage throughout Alltel Stadium; Jaguars' publications and autograph cards; and on television. The stadium has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. The Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from their game-day program, since followed by the entire league.



AWARDS AND RECOGNITION: The Jaguars Foundation is the recipient of the 2006 Steve Patterson Sports Philanthropy Award established by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) and The Sports Philanthropy Project. The Foundation's Straight Talk program won the Wilmer Shields Rich Bronze Award for Excellence in Communications (2005) by the Council on Foundations. The Jaguars Foundation was named Jacksonville's Outstanding Foundation (2003) by the Association of Fundraising Professionals—Florida First Coast Chapter. The same year, the Foundation also received the Governor's Community Investment Award in recognition of its juvenile justice crime and youth violence prevention programs for youth. This award was also received in 1996 for the Honor Rows program. Other awards include: WTLV-12 Top of the Class Award (1996) for Playbooks; Bridge Builder Award (1997); Grantmakers in Health Award (1995 and '96); and Florida Department of Education's Commissioner's Business Recognition Award (2001). The Jaguars Foundation's innovative programs have been recognized in national media, including the January/February 2005 issue of FOUNDATION News and Commentary, as well as in articles in the New York Times, Forbes, Grantmanship Center Magazine, St. Anthony Messenger, and on the "Osgood File" radio program.

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**CHAIR/CEO, JAGUARS FOUNDATION**

Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Georgia and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 51 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, a sixteen-year-old granddaughter, Morgan and a three-year-old grandson, Nash. Leigh and her friend, Beau Gage, are the artists of TOUCHDOWN, the 16' long and 6' high bronze jaguar that stands outside the Crown Royal Touchdown Club located on the west side of Alltel Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all seven local television stations and their affiliates, Comcast Cable, Cox Radio, Clear Channel Radio and Outdoor, as well as the local newspaper and their website Jacksonville.com, have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy, AIDS, and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and to heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville. The annual Straight Talk program is broadcast each May during National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month. In addition, the Jaguars Foundation, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, has also awarded in excess of one million dollars in grants to local programs specifically addressing the issue of teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care who I was interested in, what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars who "open the doors and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September, 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, grants to eight local agencies in the amount of \$140,000 were made and through June, 2006, the Foundation has allocated more than \$9.5 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit her Jaguars partners for their generous financial support and staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term impact.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating sexism, racism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally, Delores serves on the Governing Board of the USO Council, WJCT Foundation and she serves as Trustee Emeritus of the United Way of Northeast Florida. She also serves on the Advisory Boards of Ronald McDonald House, The Bridge of Northeast Florida, and the Cathedral Arts Project, Inc., the Honorary Board of Dreams Come True and WJCT Public Broadcasting. And as a very concerned citizen in regard to public education, and after a ten year tenure as a Board of Trustees member of the Community Foundation, she now serves on its Quality Education for All Committee. Delores is a staunch supporter of the four local domestic violence shelters: Betty Griffin House, Hubbard House, Micah's Place and Quigley House, as well as Planned Parenthood, and is a member of The International Women's Forum and the Women's Giving Alliance. She is Chair of the Delores Barr Weaver Golf Tournament benefiting HabiJax, Jacksonville's affiliate of Habitat for Humanity. Since its inception in 1996, the tournament has sponsored 62 houses, representing a cash contribution in excess of \$2.1 million.

In addition, she is the Founder of FRIENDS of HabiJax. Through the Florida Sales Tax Refund Program to build low-income housing, a total of 25 organizations are designated Charter Members of FRIENDS and together they have sponsored 147 houses. The two entities have sponsored a total of 209 houses, representing a cash contribution to HabiJax in excess of \$7.6 million. Delores says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home." Under Delores' guidance, the Weaver Family Foundation has contributed over \$16.5 million to Jacksonville agencies and organizations, of which over \$1.25M has been contributed to United Way of Northeast Florida and an additional \$750,000 is committed over the next three years.

The Weavers also contributed \$1 million to United Way of America for designated programs directed toward Hurricane Katrina Relief.

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of NFL Charities, New York, Taste of the NFL/Hunger Related Events of Minnesota, the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute of Boston and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge, and a Founding Member of the Sports Philanthropy Project in New England. Delores and Wayne created the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research at the Dana-Farber in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1957. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures, and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease, will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised almost \$30 million. A total of 550 runners participated thru the Challenge in 2006 and raised \$3.8 million.

And yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars; she has not missed a game in the franchise's eleven seasons, and readily admits she is both nervous and excited on gameday. She knows the best is yet to come on both the field of life and the football field.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, JAGUARS FOUNDATION

Prior to joining the Foundation in September of 2000, Peter Racine developed and administered programs for abused, neglected, homeless and runaway children, including eight years as Executive Director of the Northeast Florida Exchange Club Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse. From 1987 to 1992, as Executive Director for Covenant House in Honduras, Central America, he established programs for Honduran street children. Prior to that, he helped begin Covenant House programs in Houston and Toronto after working at their New York City site. Racine has partnered with various national and international initiatives, including: Community Partnerships for Protecting Children with the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation; Early Childhood Violence Prevention Project with the U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; Outreach to Urban Street Children with the European Economic Community and the Sports Philanthropy Project with The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

Racine received his B.A. at Rutgers University in New Jersey, and his M.T.S. at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. He, his spouse Kelly and daughter Miriam reside in Jacksonville.



MARJORIE SABIO MARQUEINEZ PROGRAM OFFICER

Marjorie Sabio Marquezine has been with the Jaguars Foundation since its inception in 1994. She served as Coordinator of Grants and Special Programs prior to being named a Program Officer. Her responsibilities include management of Straight Talk, the Foundation's teen pregnancy prevention initiative which includes grant making and an annual televised forum; Playbooks, the reading program which includes contests and an annual publication; and, grant making and evaluation.

Marquezine graduated from Boston College, with a degree in English and a concentration in Communication in 1990. She and her husband Rodnie live in Jacksonville.

Tarek G. Tabet joined the Jaguars Foundation as a Program Officer in 2001. 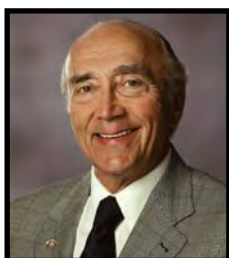

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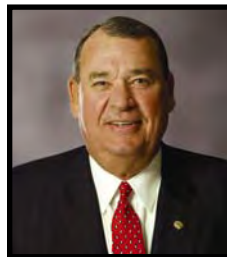
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WAYNE WEAVER **CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER**

When Wayne Weaver brought the NFL to Jacksonville in 1993, he did so with a passion and a vision. Through five playoff berths, two division titles and two AFC Championship game appearances, the young Jaguars franchise was built to succeed. Now in its 12th NFL season, the team is riding the momentum of its return to the playoffs last year.

Under Weaver's leadership, the Jacksonville Jaguars organization, in its first decade in the National Football League, established itself as the most successful expansion franchise in league history with four playoff appearances in the team's first five seasons. When their second decade began in 2005 with the team's 11th season, the Jaguars returned to the

goal remains: a Super Bowl championship.

"Our steady improvement over the last three years resulted in our return to the playoffs last season, which was our goal," Weaver says. "Our challenge now is to build upon that, to compete for our division title, and to win in the postseason. We believe as an organization that we're moving in the right direction and making the right moves. The strong support of our community and our great fans is crucial to reaching our ultimate goal."

Jaguars football began on November 30, 1993, when Weaver surprised the football world by winning an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville. In 1994 he presided over the building of one of the NFL's showpiece stadiums, and in the 1995 season his inaugural team claimed four victories.

In 1996 Weaver watched his second-year dream team win seven late-season games in a row including two in the playoffs, and advance to within one game of the Super Bowl. That year's playoff victory in Denver is regarded as one of pro football's biggest upsets ever. The 1997 Jaguars won 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team had ever won, and in 1998 the Jaguars won their first division title and the franchise hosted its first-ever home playoff game. In 1999 the Jaguars finished with the NFL's best record, a 14-2 mark, as the team hosted the AFC Championship game. And in 2000 Weaver led the effort to bring the Super Bowl to Jacksonville, as the city was selected in a vote of his fellow owners.

In hosting Super Bowl XXXIX in

playoffs for the first time since 1999, posting a 12-4 record which was the second-best mark in franchise history.

Champions of the AFC Central Division in 1998 and '99, the Jaguars' four consecutive playoff seasons were from 1996 to '99. Those achievements are the result of Weaver's commitment to winning. One





Jacksonville on February 6, 2005, Weaver put an exclamation point on the first decade of NFL football in Jacksonville. The smallest city to host the league's crown jewel, Jacksonville saw its leaders and citizens rally together to create a successful and memorable Super Bowl experience.

One of the nation's most successful entrepreneurs, Weaver brought great enthusiasm and keen business acumen to Jacksonville, a city that was yearning for professional football. He wanted a model franchise and a team that would contend for the playoffs in a short time. He also wanted success both on the field and in the community. Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has long proven to be a winning way.

But if football is his passion, Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers that is based in Evansville, Ind. He also serves as chairman and CEO of Liz Claiborne Shoes, a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country that is headquartered in Jacksonville. Previously Weaver was co-owner, presi-

dent and CEO of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores Weaver have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars Foundation.

Weaver is a member of five NFL committees: Finance, Audit, Investment, Business Ventures, and Special Committee on League Economics. He is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York, and also serves on the boards of Stein Mart, the Cummer Museum of Arts and Gardens, the Jacksonville Zoo and the Alliance for World Class Education.

Weaver was born on January 14, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West. Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 51 years and have a daughter Leigh, a son Bradley, a 16-year-old granddaughter Morgan, and a three-year-old grandson Nash.





PAUL VANCE
**SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS/
 GENERAL COUNSEL**

Paul Vance was promoted to senior vice president of football operations in November, 2001 after serving as general counsel to the team since the inception of the Jaguars. He is one of 18 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Vance is responsible for the Jaguars' salary cap strategy and planning and player contract negotiations. He also oversees the team training and medical functions, the team video and equipment departments and team travel and logistics.

In 2002 he was credited with developing, with former Coach Tom Coughlin, the plan to solve the Jaguars salary cap problems for the 2002 season. The plan involved the drastic but necessary decision to offer Pro Bowl tackle Tony Boselli, Gary Walker and Seth Payne to the Houston Texans in the Expansion Draft, as well as the implementation of fiscal restraint in player contracts and acquisition for the 2002 and 2003 seasons. As of 2004, the Jaguars have emerged with one of the healthiest cap situations in the NFL.

Since taking over in 2001, Vance has been responsible for the negotiation of extensions for veterans such as Rashean Mathis, Marcus Stroud, Fred Taylor, Jimmy Smith, Brad Meester, Maurice Williams, Chris Naeole, Kyle Brady, Chris Hanson and Paul Spicer and contracts with free agents including Deon Grant, Reggie Hayward and Mike Peterson. Notable rookies signed during this period include John Henderson, Byron Leftwich, Rashean Mathis, Mike Pearson, Vince Manuwai, Reggie Williams and Matt Jones.

After the coaching change was announced at the end of the 2002 season, he assisted owner Wayne Weaver in the

identification and interview of prospective candidates. The process led to the signing of head coach Jack Del Rio and vice president of player personnel James Harris. Del Rio, Harris and Vance have established a close working relationship that emphasizes consideration and balance of all coaching, player personnel and salary cap aspects in the player acquisition and roster building process.

Vance has been with the Jaguars since July 1994, following 21 years of private practice in Connecticut. While there, he represented Wayne Weaver during the expansion process. Since coming to Jacksonville, he has been of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars.

He graduated from the University of Rochester in 1969 with a degree in economics. While at Rochester, he played baseball and captained the school's basketball team. He received his J.D. in 1973 from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

Among his community activities, he has served on the board of Jacksonville's Museum of Science and History and the MaliVai Washington Kids Foundation. He is a member of the Business Advisory Council of the University of North Florida Coggin School of Business. He has also served as a member of the steering committee of Downtown Visions, Inc., which successfully organized a business improvement district in downtown Jacksonville. A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Paul and his wife, Jane, live in Jacksonville. They have four children: daughters, Kerry and Jamie, and sons, Jordan and Derek.

VICE PRESIDENTS

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BILL PRESCOTT **SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, STADIUM** **OPERATIONS/CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER**

Bill Prescott is the senior vice president, stadium operations/chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He is responsible for managing the Jaguars portion of Alltel Stadium, and as a result of the recent lease amendment, is responsible for the concession operations on a year round basis. A recently completed negotiation of the concession contracts will bring in Ovations to manage the general concessions, Levy Restaurants to manage the suites and clubs in addition to the south end zone, and XP Events to manage the merchandise operations. These changes are expected to bring a new enthusiasm and excitement to enhance the game day experience for Jaguars fans. Prescott is also the liaison with the Jaguars and the City of Jacksonville for lease matters and working with SMG (facility and game day operations managers).

Prescott oversaw the design and construction of the recent \$63 million renovation of Alltel Stadium which included amenities such as escalators, the Bud Zone, and the new Terrace Suite, in addition to remodeling of the clubs and suites, retrofitting the scoreboards for new 24'x84' video displays, and the opening of the new Pepsi Plaza in the location of the old practice fields. All of the renovations were completed in time for Super Bowl XXXIX, which was played on February 6, 2005.

As CFO, he oversees the financial operations and information technology of the team. In addition, Prescott inter-

acts with the NFL on financial matters and worked closely with Wayne Weaver and Paul Vance on the league wide revenue sharing plan. Prescott was recently appointed to an NFL committee to review the best practices of financial and business operations under the labor agreement extension and revenue sharing system.

Prescott is also responsible for the financial operations of other Wayne Weaver-related entities, such as the DAR Group, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation and the Weaver Family Foundation. He has been involved with the Jaguars since their inception and has also handled the Weavers' finances since 1980. Prescott met Weaver while he worked as a tax manager for Deloitte & Touche. In 1989, Prescott joined Grill, Gilhuly, Prescott & Co. CPAs as a partner, where he continued to work with the Weavers.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Prescott is a graduate of Pace University with a degree in accounting and a master's degree in taxation. He is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Prescott is the former chairman for the Mohawk District of the Boy Scouts of North Florida, an urban scouting program serving the at-risk youth of Jacksonville. His hobbies include tennis and skiing. Prescott was born May 7, 1956. He has two sons, Christopher and Michael. He and his wife, Kim, live in Ponte Vedra Beach.





SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Tim Connolly joined the Jaguars in March of 2003 as the team's Vice President of Development. He was responsible for the Jaguars' Super Bowl XXXIX project, an initiative to help fund the capital improvements to Alltel Stadium for the 2005 Super Bowl. In October of 2004, Connolly was named senior vice president, business development and now directs the ticket sales/marketing, ticket operations/customer service, and the special events teams in addition to developing and sustaining new branding and business opportunities.

Connolly previously spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings and seven years with the Kansas City Chiefs. He served as executive vice president and general manager of the Vikings in 1998 and '99. The Vikings posted a 25-7 regular season mark (the most Vikings wins ever in back-to-back seasons), earned two playoff appearances and participated in the NFC championship game (1998 season). While a member of the Kansas City Chiefs' front office from 1989 through 1995, the Chiefs won 72 regular season games and 3 playoff games. The Chiefs posted an 8-7-1 record in 1989; only their second winning season in 15 years, and then earned six consecutive playoff appearances between 1990-1995, including the AFC Championship Game in 1994. During this six year stretch, the Chiefs recorded more wins and playoff appearances than in any other six-year period in Chiefs history.

Connolly is recognized in NFL circles for building strong front office teams and

delivering record-level stadium revenues. In 1999, the Vikings sold the most season tickets in the franchise's 39-year history - 16,000 more than the previous season. In Kansas City, Connolly served as the Chiefs' executive vice president and chief operating officer. He played a key role in the franchise's turnaround effort. When Connolly arrived in Kansas City in 1989, the Chiefs had 25,000 season ticket owners and an average attendance of 47,500 per game. By 1991 Arrowhead Stadium reached sold-out status, beginning a consecutive sell-out streak that has reached 100-plus games. By 1994 the Chiefs led all NFL teams in attendance, and would continue to do so through the end of the decade, averaging almost 77,000 per game.

Connolly began his business career in 1971 with the IBM Corporation and was recognized frequently as a top sales performer and manager. In January of 1986 he was named president and CEO of Bell Atlantic's Cellular Phone Company. In 1987 Bell Atlantic (now Verizon) became the first major cellular company in the world to achieve profitability.

Connolly is a 1971 graduate of George Washington University, is very active in the community and has served on several boards including the Ronald McDonald House (Washington, D.C.) and the Governors Small Business Advisory Board.

He has three grown children - Jenny, Brie and John, and resides with his wife, Nyunok in Jacksonville.





JAMES HARRIS **VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL**

James Harris was named vice president of player personnel for the Jaguars on January 23, 2003. Known as “Shack” to just about everyone who knows him — Harris is responsible for all player acquisitions, including the annual college draft, free agency, undrafted player signings and the scouting and signing of players from other professional leagues.

Harris and his personnel staff, working closely with Jack Del Rio and the coaching staff, has made significant contributions to the Jaguars through the acquisition of several key players; including first round draft picks QB Byron Leftwich ('03) WR Reggie Williams ('04) and WR Matt Jones ('05), in addition to several key veteran free agents.

A veteran of 30+ years in the NFL, Harris played quarterback for 12 seasons before embarking on what is now his 19th year in personnel. His career in personnel began in 1987, as a scout for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). From 1993-96, Harris served as assistant general manager of the New York Jets. Named director of pro personnel for the Baltimore Ravens in 1997, he spent six years with the Ravens where he earned a Super Bowl ring with the Ravens' victory in Super Bowl XXXV in 2000.

As a player, Harris was a pioneer. An eighth-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills in 1969, he played quarterback for the Bills (1969-71). His 12 seasons in the league also included time with the Los Angeles Rams (1973-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). During his stint with the Bills, Harris was the first black in league history to open a regular season as a starting quarterback. In 1976, Harris led the NFC with an 89.8 passer rating, highlighted by a 436-yard passing day against the Miami Dolphins that season. Harris was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl after throwing

for two TDs in a 14-13 victory over the AFC.

In May of 2003 and again in June of 2004, Sports Illustrated named Harris one of the top 50 most influential minorities in sports. In March of 2005, Harris was named one of the 50 most powerful blacks in Sports by Black Enterprise. Harris was awarded the Paul “Tank” Younger award in March, 2006 by the Fritz Pollard Alliance.

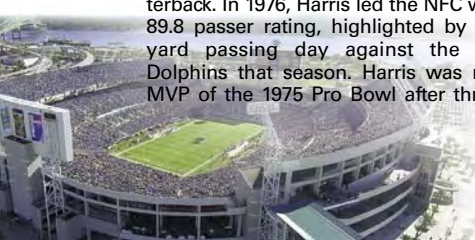
Harris' collegiate days were also impressive. He was recruited and played for one of college football's greatest coaches, the legendary Eddie Robinson of Grambling State. In each of Harris' four seasons with the team (1965-68), the Tigers won or shared the SWAC title. He was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic and was named Pittsburgh Courier Player of the Year in 1968.

Harris was a legendary athlete at Carroll High School in his hometown of Monroe, La., where he received two-time All-State honors as quarterback of the Tigers. He also led Carroll to two undefeated seasons and a State Championship.

Harris earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his contributions to American society during his NFL career.

He is an inductee of the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He is a member of the Fritz Pollard Alliance and a founding member of the Field Generals: The African American Quarterbacks Club, a non-profit group founded by and composed of NFL greats dedicated to teaching and preserving the history of the African American quarterback.

He was born in Monroe, La. on July 20, 1947. He and his wife, Vickie, reside in Jacksonville.





DAN EDWARDS **VICE PRESIDENT, COMMUNICATIONS AND MEDIA**

Dan Edwards was promoted to vice president of communications and media on May 9, 2003. He is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Jaguars' internal and external communications, including media relations, community relations, publications, the team's award-winning web site (www.jaguars.com) and the team's Emmy-winning in-house broadcasting department. jaguars.com has been ranked 16th among 131 pro sports websites, and the broadcasting department received a regional Emmy Award for its special "Making of an NFL Broadcast."

Hired more than a year before the team's first game, Edwards is now in his 23rd season in the NFL and his 13th year with the Jaguars. After nine years with the Pittsburgh Steelers he was named executive director of communications for the Jaguars on May 4, 1994, and he took over responsibility for the broadcasting department in 2001. In 2003 the organization's community relations department and Internet content were added to Edwards' responsibilities. He is one of 18 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Formerly the public relations director for the Steelers (1987-93), he brought to the Jaguars 10 years of NFL experience working with the Steelers, the Miami Dolphins and the league office.

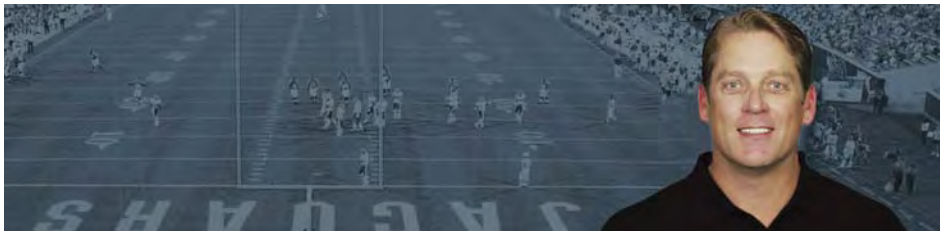
After receiving a scholarship from NFL Charities and serving as a public relations intern in the NFL office in 1984, Edwards spent the 1984 season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins, who played in Super Bowl XIX that year. In 1985 Edwards joined the Steelers as assistant public relations director, and in 1987 he was promot-

ed to director of public relations. In 1991, the Steelers' public relations department received the coveted Pete Rozelle Award, which is presented annually by the Pro Football Writers of America to the NFL's top PR staff. Edwards' Jaguars staff has twice been voted one of three finalists for the award. He has also worked for the NFL on its Super Bowl PR staff at 18 Super Bowls in addition to the 1990 Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL, Edwards worked in professional baseball, spending one season as an administrative assistant with the Eugene (Ore.) Emeralds, a single-A affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds. He played football and baseball for Montgomery College (Md.) before transferring to the University of Oregon. Edwards received his undergraduate degree in business administration/management from the Lundquist College of Business at the University of Oregon in 1981, and a master's degree in sports administration/ facility management from Ohio University in 1984.

Edwards served as chairman of the communications strategy and media hospitality committees for the Jacksonville Super Bowl Host Committee, which hosted Super Bowl XXXIX in Jacksonville. He is a past member of the board of directors for the Florida Sports Awards, and he also served on the Sport Management Advisory Council for Flagler College. He was born January 15, 1959 in Denver, and he grew up in the Washington, D.C. area. Edwards and his wife Tricia have four children: sons Christian and Preston and daughters Danielle and Victoria.





JACK DEL RIO **HEAD COACH**

NFL: 21TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

Under Jack Del Rio the Jaguars broke a five-year playoff drought last season while posting a 12-4 record, the second-best in franchise history. In winning 12 games, the fourth-most in the National Football League in 2005, the Jaguars continued a steady climb that began with Del Rio's arrival in 2003. With records of 5-11, 9-7 and 12-4, Del Rio has directed a steady course of improvement and a return to the playoffs through his first three seasons as head coach of the Jaguars.

Last year the Jaguars won eight of their last nine regular season games, including four straight on the road, en route to a Wild Card playoff berth. Among the team's highlights was the league's sixth-ranked defense which was also sixth in points allowed, 19 defensive interceptions which tied the team record, and a first-place ranking in opponent starting field position. On offense the team increased scoring by 100 points over the previous year and had a team-record and NFL-low six interceptions thrown. The unit ranked fifth in the league in time of possession, second in turnovers, sixth in turnover ratio, ninth in third-down conversions and eighth in red zone scoring.

"I feel good about the roster we have assembled," Del Rio says about the 2006 season. "We've clearly established a mentality of how we're going to approach this, how we're going to play competitive, tough, smart, disciplined and unselfish football. Our development and improvement as a team has been good, and it has to continue."

Now in his 21st year in the NFL and his tenth in coaching, Del Rio, 43, was named head coach on January 17, 2003. He has played for, coached with, and learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. Del Rio was recruited to play at Southern California by John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Frank Gansz, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green. Among other notable coaches he teamed with during his 11-year playing

career are Dom Capers, Dave Campo, Dave Wannstedt, Tony Dungy, Monte Kiffin, Tom Moore, Norv Turner, Butch Davis and Mike Tice. As an assistant coach for six seasons, Del Rio worked on the staffs of Hall of Famer Mike Ditka, Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, and Super Bowl participant John Fox. Among those he was on coaching staffs with are Marvin Lewis and Mike Nolan.

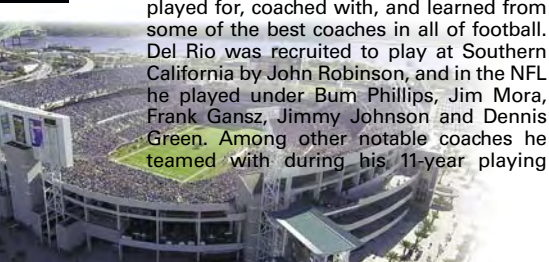
In leading the Jaguars to a 9-7 mark in

"It was clear Jack was not going to be an assistant very long. He has what head coaches need – the ability to teach and motivate, the work ethic, the football knowledge. Jack's bright and has a presence. Plus, he played a long time in this league, and understands better than most how much you can ask of a player."

2004, Del Rio posted the team's first winning record in five seasons along with a second-place finish in the division, the team's highest since 1999. Among the other notable achievements were first-ever road wins at The Coliseum, The RCA Dome and Lambeau Field. Despite losing several defensive ends to injury, the defense led the league in red zone efficiency and ranked seventh in scoring defense, and 11th overall in yards allowed. The special teams, which ranked last in the NFL in 2003, made significant improvement in jumping 16 spots to rank 16th.

In taking over the Jaguars in 2003, Del Rio was the architect of a defense that improved to sixth overall in the NFL, and second against the run. He had inherited a team that had not been in the top 10 in total defense since 1999, ranking 20th in 2002. The defense allowed only one 100-yard rusher in 2003, while the offense allowed just 28 sacks, the fewest in team history, and Fred Taylor rushed for a team-record 1,572 yards with Byron Leftwich starting 13 games as a rookie quarterback. The





Jaguars' 5-11 record included six losses by seven points or less.

The vast improvement in defense was no coincidence since Del Rio was only one year removed from taking the Carolina Panthers defense from 31st in the league to second overall, as defensive coordinator of the Panthers in 2002. Coming off a 1-15 season, the Panthers defense allowed only 290.4 yards per game, led the NFL in fewest rushing yards per attempt, and ranked second in fewest yards per play, third down efficiency, and sacks. The Panthers allowed the fifth-fewest points in the league, did not allow a 300-yard passer, and didn't yield a 100-yard rusher until the season finale.

From 1999 to 2001, Del Rio served as linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens, helping the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants. For those three years, in which the Ravens finished second in total defense three times, Del Rio coached the Ravens' talented linebacker corps which featured Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. During the Ravens' 2000 season the defense set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points and recording four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 record. The group also led the NFL with 49 forced turnovers. The defense continued its domination in the playoffs, allowing just one touchdown in four games.

Del Rio began his coaching career with two seasons in New Orleans under Ditka, as assistant strength coach in 1997 and linebackers coach in 1998.

An 11-year NFL veteran, Del Rio was drafted in the third round by the Saints in 1985, when he was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team and earned the Saints' Rookie of the Year award. Following two seasons in New Orleans, Del Rio played for the Kansas City Chiefs, Dallas Cowboys and Minnesota Vikings. He led the Vikings in tackles three straight years and played in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season. Del Rio finished his career with 1,078 tackles, 12 quarterback sacks, 13 interceptions and more than 100 consecutive starts between 1989 and 1994. He went to the playoffs once with the Cowboys and three times with the Vikings.

Del Rio was a four-year starter from 1981

to '84 at Southern California, where he earned consensus All-America honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award. The Trojans were 30-15-1 during his four seasons, three times ranked among the top 15 teams in the country. He played in the 1982 Fiesta Bowl and was co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. He led the Trojans in tackles for a loss three years in a row and played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Japan Bowl. Del Rio finished his college career with 340 tackles, 58 tackles for loss, five fumble recoveries and one interception.

Drafted out of high school by the Toronto Blue Jays in 1981, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on Southern California's baseball team in 1983 and '84. He was a teammate of current New York Yankees pitcher Randy Johnson and former major league slugger Mark McGwire.

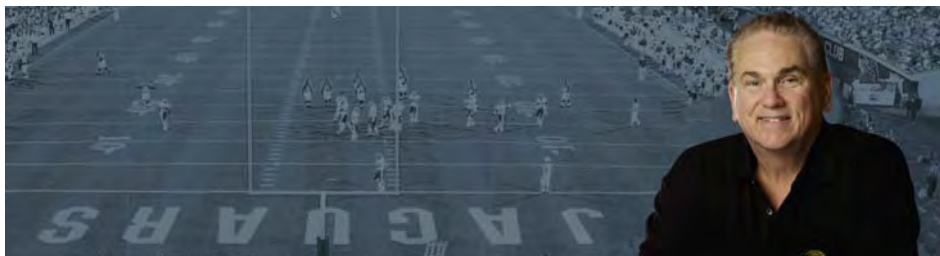
Del Rio graduated from Hayward (Calif.) High School and holds a political science degree from the University of Kansas, which he earned while playing for the Chiefs. Born April 4, 1963 in Castro Valley, Calif., he and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son, Luke.

PHILANTHROPY: The Del Rios have been active in community causes in and around the Jacksonville area since their arrival in 2003. Together they have been instrumental in raising and distributing more than \$250,000. They raised funds for Seamark Ranch through sales of the 2003 JagNet Cookbook, and through the 2004 Jack Del Rio Charity Golf Classic. They also helped to raise money through the American Cancer Society Relay For Life and for The Freedom Alliance Fund. Among the many other charities and events the Del Rios have been involved with over the last three years are The Salvation Army, Cystic Fibrosis, The Ronald McDonald House, Devereaux Day School, St. Catherine Labourer Manor, and Hubbard House.

DAVE CAMPO

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/SECONDARY

NFL: 18TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Dave Campo enters his second season as assistant head coach/secondary for the Jaguars. The Jaguars secondary played a major role on the NFL's sixth-ranked defense in 2005 as the defense tied a franchise record with 19 interceptions and ranked seventh in NFL pass defense. The 19 interceptions were the seventh-most in the NFL.

The Jaguars recorded at least one interception in 11 of 16 games in 2005 and had four players with three-plus interceptions for the first time in franchise history. Rashean Mathis led the club with five interceptions and veteran cornerback Terry Cousin had four interceptions in his first season with the Jaguars.

Campo was named assistant head coach/secondary for the Jaguars on February 17, 2005. Campo is a veteran of 17 years of NFL experience including three as a head coach. Prior to the Jaguars, he had spent the two previous seasons as the Cleveland Browns' defensive coordinator.

Before joining the Browns, Campo spent the previous 14 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, including 11 seasons as an assistant and the last three as head coach from 2000 to 2002. During his tenure in Dallas, he helped the team win consecutive Super Bowl championships in 1992 and 1993 and again in 1995.

In Campo's first two seasons as head coach, the Cowboys defense finished third in the NFL in passing defense and the team finished fourth in total defense in 2001. From 2001 to '02, the Dallas defense ranked among the NFL's elite allowing teams to average 3.7-yards a rush and allowing only 22 rushing touchdowns in 32 games.

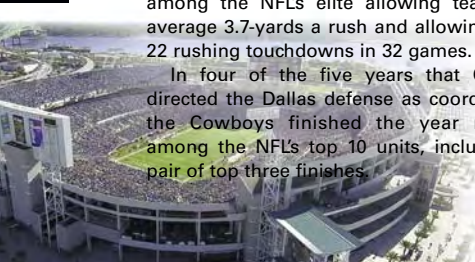
In four of the five years that Campo directed the Dallas defense as coordinator, the Cowboys finished the year ranked among the NFL's top 10 units, including a pair of top three finishes.

Prior to becoming defensive coordinator on Jan. 24, 1995, Campo directed a secondary that had grown into one of the team's deepest and most productive units. His 1994 squad led the NFL in pass defense and tied for fourth in the NFL with 22 interceptions. All-Pro strong safety Darren Woodson became the first Dallas defensive back to earn a starting Pro Bowl berth since Everson Walls.

Campo, 59, was hired by Dallas in 1989 after spending two years at the University of Miami as the secondary coach. At Miami, he helped the Hurricanes to a two-year record of 23-1 and the 1987 National Championship. Safety Bennie Blades was the 1987 Jim Thorpe Award winner before being selected with the third pick in the NFL draft by the Detroit Lions.

Campo began his career at his alma mater, Central Connecticut State, where he spent the 1971-72 seasons. He then moved to the University of Albany (1973), Bridgeport (1974), the University of Pittsburgh (1975), Washington State (1976), Boise State (1977-79), Oregon State (1980), Weber State (1981-82) and Iowa State (1983). In addition to starring at defensive back in college, Campo twice earned All-East honors at shortstop at Central Connecticut State. Born July 18, 1947, he attended Robert E. Fitch High in Groton, Conn. He and his wife, Kay, have six children: Angie, Eric, Becky, Tommy, Shelbie and Michael.

MIKE TICE

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/OFFENSE

NFL: 25TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 1ST SEASON

Mike Tice was named assistant head coach/offense for the Jaguars on February 1, 2006 after spending 14 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings as a player and coach.

Tice, 47, has 24 years of experience in the NFL with 14 as a player and 10 in the coaching ranks. He previously served as head coach of the Vikings from 2002-05. The Vikings posted a winning record in three of four seasons under Tice including a playoff berth in 2004.

Tice brings a wealth of knowledge to the Jaguars offense. The Vikings finished in the top 10 in the NFL for total offense in six of the nine seasons Tice was on the staff. The Vikings set a NFL record for most consecutive games with 300-plus yards of offense (2002-04) with 36.

Tice had been associated with the Vikings since 1992 when he played three seasons (1992-93, 1995) as a tight end. He served as tight ends coach for Minnesota in 1996 and offensive line coach from 1997-2001 before being promoted to head coach.

Tice led the Vikings to the playoffs in 2004 and their first road playoff victory in franchise history with a win at Green Bay. Tice joined Jerry Burns as the only coaches in club history to win their playoff debuts. The Vikings set a team record in 2004 for net yards (6,339) and passing yards (4,754). Daunte Culpepper set numerous club passing records and produced one of the finest seasons in NFL history by a quarterback.

The Vikings finished with a winning record in 2003 for the first time since 2000. The Vikings led the NFL in offense for the first time in their history and sent four players to the Pro Bowl. In Tice's first season as head

coach in 2002, the Vikings led the NFL in rushing for the first time in team history with 2,507 yards.

As an offensive line coach, Tice tutored five different players (Matt Birk, Jeff Christy, Randall McDaniel, Todd Steussie, Korey Stringer) to 10 Pro Bowl appearances. In 1998, the offensive line paved the way for a NFL-record 556 points and then-record 41 touchdown passes. Three offensive linemen from the Vikings started in the Pro Bowl in 1998, the first offensive line trio in club history ever selected to the Pro Bowl.

Tice had 107 receptions for 894 yards and 11 touchdowns in his 14-year career. In addition to playing for the Vikings, he spent 10 seasons with Seattle (1981-88, 1990-91) and one season with Washington (1989). Tice, who started 109 of 177 NFL games, played under legendary head coach Chuck Knox in his final eight seasons in Seattle. He originally retired following the 1993 season, but was signed by the Vikings in December of 1995 to help a tight end position decimated by injuries.

Tice was the recipient of the Byron "Whizzer" White Humanitarian Award in 1987. Tice played collegiately at Maryland where he started two seasons at quarterback. He was born February 2, 1959 in Bayshore, N.Y., and attended Central Islip High School in Long Island where he played for current Central Florida head coach George O'Leary. He and his wife Diane have two children, Adrienne and Nathan.

Carl Smith is in his second season as offensive coordinator for the Jaguars and his 19th season in the NFL. In his first season with the Jaguars, Smith led the offense to a steady improvement in total yards per game and total points scored from 2004.

The offense increased scoring by 100 points from 2004. The Jaguars scored 20-plus points in 12 games, the most under head coach Jack Del Rio. In addition, the offense produced 30-plus points in four games for the most since 2000. Under Smith's direction, the Jaguars ranked second in the NFL in 2005 with only 17 turnovers. The combination of Byron Leftwich and David Garrard produced an NFL-low six interceptions and led the offense to a 15th place ranking in the NFL.

Smith, who brings 33 years of collegiate and professional coaching experience, joined the Jaguars on January 25, 2005. With the Jaguars 12 wins last season coupled with Smith's 93 career wins in New Orleans as offensive coordinator, Smith has called 105 career NFL wins.

Smith spent the previous season at the University of Southern California, where he served as quarterbacks coach. In his one season at USC, he mentored Heisman Trophy winner Matt Leinart and the Trojans won the national championship.

He went to USC after spending three seasons (2001-03) as the quarterbacks coach with the Cleveland Browns.

In Cleveland, Smith helped quarterback Tim Couch throw for a career-high 18 touchdowns in 2002, the most by a Brown since Bernie Kosar had 18 in 1991.

Smith began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo in 1971 and Colorado in 1972. He became the Buffaloes' linebackers coach in 1973 before moving to SW Louisiana, where he handled the defensive line, defensive backs and was offensive coordinator.

He then spent three years as the offensive coordinator at Lamar and the 1982 season as the offensive coordinator at North Carolina State before moving to the pros.

Smith was with the USFL's Philadelphia

(later Baltimore) Stars for three seasons (1983-85), handling special teams the first year and quarterbacks and wide receivers the next two years when the team captured USFL titles.

He spent the next 11 seasons, from 1986 to 1996, as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach with the New Orleans Saints. Smith's offenses in New Orleans annually ranked among the league leaders. The Saints ranked second in the NFL in scoring (26.4 points) in 1987. The Saints allowed only 168 sacks from 1990-96, the fewest in the NFL during that span.

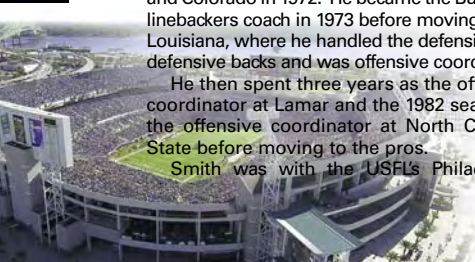
After New Orleans he served with New England for three seasons, as assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach for the first season and tight ends coach for his final two years. Quarterback Drew Bledsoe made the Pro Bowl in 1997 under Smith's tutelage, as did tight end Ben Coates in 1998.

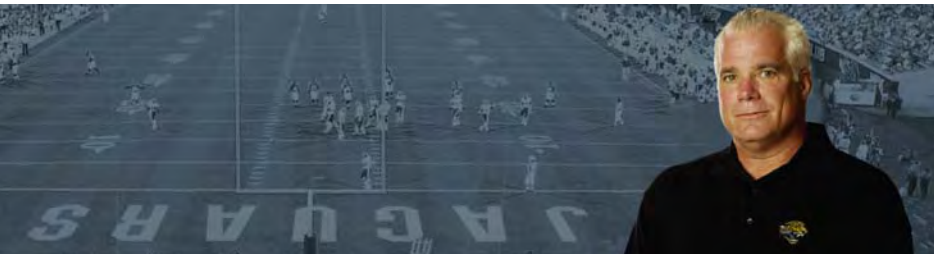
His teams have advanced into the playoffs eight times, as the Saints did so four times (1987-90-91-92 while winning the NFC West title in 1991), the Patriots did so in 1997 and 1998, the Browns did in 2002 and the Jaguars in 2005. He wrote for NFL.com in 2000.

Smith was a two-year (1969-70) letterman defensive back at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo after transferring from Bakersfield (Calif.) Junior College, where he played quarterback in 1966 and 1967. He earned his bachelor's (1971) and master's (1972) degrees in physical education from Cal Poly-SLO, as well as a teaching credential.

Born April 26, 1948, Smith played at Wasco (Calif.) High, where he starred in football, basketball and baseball. He and his wife Dianne, have three sons: Tracy, Tyler, and Nicholas.

MIKE SMITH **DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

NFL: 8TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

Mike Smith enters his fourth year as defensive coordinator for the Jaguars. The Jaguars rank among the NFL's best since Smith took over the defensive reins in 2003. The Jaguars rank 7th in overall defense (301.0), 5th in offensive points allowed (16.5), 6th in rushing defense (99.8) and have allowed the fewest rushing touchdowns (23) from 2003-05.

The Jaguars ranked sixth in total defense (290.9) in 2005 and led the NFL by allowing only four rushing touchdowns. Smith was named to the USA Today All-Joe Team, an award that goes to the players and coaches who have overachieved and are often overlooked. Reggie Hayward (8.5) and Paul Spicer (7.5) helped the club rank third in the NFL with 47 sacks, the third-most in franchise history. The defensive tackle tandem of John Henderson and Marcus Stroud anchored a defense that allowed only three opposing backs to rush for 100-plus yards. Stroud was named a Pro Bowl starter for the third consecutive season.

Linebacker Mike Peterson led the defense in tackles for the third consecutive season with 190 and Rashean Mathis led the club with five interceptions. The Jaguars tied a franchise-record with 19 interceptions.

The Jaguars ranked 11th overall in 2004 and led in red zone efficiency and ranked seventh in scoring defense. Henderson, who earned his first Pro Bowl honor in 2004, led the linemen with 98 tackles and 5.5 sacks.

Smith was named the Jaguars' defensive coordinator on January 21, 2003. A veteran of 25 years of coaching, Smith, 47, has experience in one form or another with almost every position on defense and on special teams.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, he spent the previous four seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, helping them to their Super Bowl championship in 2000. The Ravens' 2000 defense set an NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points. From 1999 to 2001, Smith was the Ravens' defensive assistant/defensive line

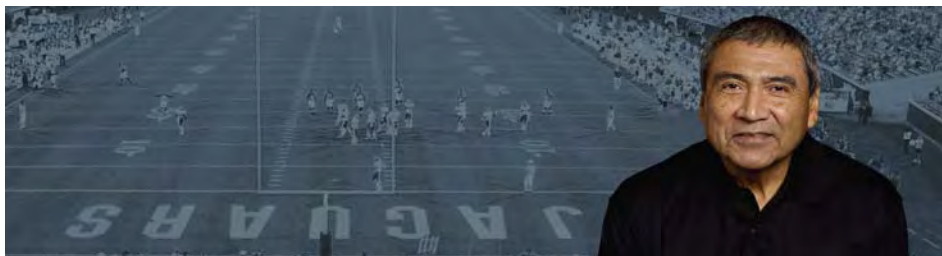
coach, and in 2002 he was the linebackers coach, replacing Jack Del Rio, who became defensive coordinator of the Carolina Panthers. In 2002, Smith coached All-Pro Ray Lewis and Pro Bowler Peter Boulware, who had his finest NFL season, and he was instrumental in the development of second-year pro Ed Hartwell, who made a team-leading 196 tackles.

A native of Daytona Beach and a player in the Canadian Football League, Smith had a 12-year stint at Tennessee Tech (1987-98), the last three as the defensive coordinator. He joined the Tennessee Tech staff as defensive line coach, then served as special teams coordinator from 1988 to '95. He tutored the line for nine seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 1996. With Smith as defensive coordinator, the Golden Eagles' defense finished in the top 10 in the nation in both 1997 and '98. In 1998, Smith was promoted to defensive coordinator/assistant head coach.

Before joining Tennessee Tech, Smith was the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Morehead (Ky.) State. He served as a part-time assistant coach at San Diego State in 1982, and then spent the next three seasons (1983-85) coaching the Aztecs' linebackers. It was at San Diego State where he worked with Brian Billick, who brought him to Baltimore in 1999.

Smith played linebacker for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL in 1982. He played collegiately at East Tennessee (1977-81), where he was named defensive MVP twice at linebacker. As a senior, he led the team with 186 tackles. Smith was a star athlete at Father Lopez High in Daytona Beach and earned All-State honors as a linebacker in 1975. He was born June 13, 1959 in Chicago. He and his wife, Julie, have a daughter, Logan (5/13/00), and live in Jacksonville.

PETE RODRIGUEZ **SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR**

NFL: 19TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 3RD SEASON

Pete Rodriguez enters his third season as special teams coordinator for the Jaguars. Rodriguez has been responsible for the overhaul of the Jaguars' special teams the last two seasons and the development of numerous young players including 2004 fifth-round draft choice Josh Scobee.

Under Rodriguez's tutelage, Scobee has connected on 47 of 61 field goals and has earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors three times in two seasons. Scobee has connected on two 53-yard field goals, including a game-winner in 2004 at Indianapolis. Scobee ranked second in the NFL with 20 touchbacks on 78 kickoffs in 2005, easily surpassing his rookie total of 11 touchbacks.

Chris Hanson led the NFL in 2005 with a team-record 33 of 82 punts inside the 20. Hanson finished the season with a 42.9 average with a 36.9 net. Rookie kick returner Derrick Wimbush had a 91-yard KOR-TD and set a club record with 955 kickoff return yards on 39 returns. Wimbush, who also saw action at running back, recorded the second-most yards from scrimmage for a Jaguars rookie with 993 yards. In 2004, the Jaguars ranked tops in the AFC, allowing opponents to start at the 25 yard line.

Rodriguez was hired by Jacksonville on February 9, 2004 as the Jaguars' special teams coordinator.

Rodriguez, is a veteran of 18 NFL coaching seasons, including six with the Seattle Seahawks. In 2003 he left his mark on the Seahawks' unit, highlighted with Alex Bannister being named to the Pro Bowl. Rookie kicker Josh Brown connected on 22 of 24 field goal attempts inside the 48-yard line.

He is widely regarded as one of the top special teams coaches in the NFL, as evi-

denced by being named Special Teams Coach of the Year in 1992 and Special Teams Coach of the Decade in the '90s by the Dallas Morning News. Rodriguez has tutored five Pro Bowl punters.

Rodriguez entered the NFL as the Los Angeles Raiders special teams coach (1988-89), and served in the same capacity with the Phoenix Cardinals (1990-93) before joining the Washington Redskins staff (1994-97). Prior to entering the NFL he worked with the USFL's Michigan Panthers as a defensive line coach from 1983-84. He also coached with the USFL's Denver Gold (1985) and Jacksonville Bulls (1986), while spending one year in the CFL with the Ottawa Rough Riders (1987).

Rodriguez broke into coaching as a graduate assistant at Arizona (1968-69) and later served as defensive coordinator at Western Illinois (1970-73), Florida State (1974-75), Iowa State (1976-78) and Northern Iowa (1986). He served as head coach at Western Illinois from 1979-82.

He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Western State College in Colorado, and a masters of education from the University of Arizona. Rodriguez and his wife, Sherry, have four children, daughters Regina, Marla and Lori, and son John. They also have four grandchildren, Colby, Riley, Nya and Miles.

KEN ANDERSON **QUARTERBACKS COACH**

NFL: 30TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

One of the top quarterbacks in NFL history, Ken Anderson is in his 30th NFL season and his fourth with the Jaguars as quarterbacks coach after serving as the team's wide receivers coach in 2004. Anderson has played a vital role in the development of fourth-year quarterback Byron Leftwich.

Leftwich, who is entering his fourth season in the NFL, was on pace for the best season of his career in 2005 before suffering an ankle injury in week 12 at Arizona. He finished with 2,123 yards and tied his career-high with 15 touchdowns. David Garrard led the club to a 4-1 mark in the last five games to help the Jaguars earn a playoff berth. The Jaguars threw a team-record and NFL-low six interceptions.

Anderson, 57, played for the Cincinnati Bengals for 16 seasons and was an assistant coach there for 10 years. He joined the team's staff in 1993 and was the quarterbacks coach for three seasons, offensive coordinator from 1996 to 2000, and then quarterbacks coach in 2001-02. Nearly two decades since retiring as a player, Anderson still continues to dominate the Bengals' record book with his career passing marks. He holds the club's all-time marks in completions (2,654), passing yards (32,838) and touchdown passes (197). Twice he has been among the 15 finalists for election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He still holds the NFL record for highest completion percentage in a season: 70.55 in 1982. He won four NFL passing titles, which is tied for third-most in NFL history behind Sammy Baugh and Steve Young, and was named four times to the Pro Bowl. He led the league three times in lowest interception percent-

age, which is tied for second most all-time behind Baugh. Anderson played in 192 games and led the Bengals to an appearance in Super Bowl XVI against the San Francisco 49ers. He had career totals of 2,654 completions in 4,475 attempts for 32,838 yards and 197 touchdowns. He also rushed for 2,220 yards and 20 touchdowns. He is the 24th ranked passer (at 81.9) in NFL history after ranking 10th when he retired.

When Anderson joined the pro coaching ranks as Bengals quarterbacks coach in 1993, he helped quarterback Jeff Blake chip away at a few of his own Cincinnati marks. In 1995, Blake supplanted Anderson in the categories of most completions in a season (326) and most consecutive games with a TD pass (21). He guided Jon Kitna to a single-season record for pass attempts (581 in 2001) and more than 3,000 yards passing in back-to-back seasons.

Until joining the Jaguars, Anderson had played and coached for only the Bengals since completing a record-setting college career at Augustana (Ill.) in 1970. He was a third-round pick from the small school, the 67th selection in the draft. His 16 years of service as a player (1971-86) are the most in Bengals history. Prior to joining the Bengals as a coach, he worked six years in Cincinnati as a sportscaster. Anderson was born February 15, 1949 in Batavia, Ill. He has a son, Matt (6/5/75), and two daughters, Megan (10/24/78) and Molly (2/27/83). He and his wife, Cristy, live in Jacksonville.

MARK ASANOVICH

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

NFL: 12TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

Mark Asanovich is in his fourth season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars and his 12th season as an NFL coach. In his first three seasons in Jacksonville, the Jaguars have been one of the healthiest and most physical teams in the NFL.

Asanovich, 47, oversees the Jaguars strength and conditioning regime that emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts. It is his belief that players who are coached in the weightroom will develop better results. The cornerstone of his program is to "maximize physical potential and minimize physical injury." Asanovich has a year-round internship program for college graduates interested in a career in strength and conditioning.

With the support of Jaguars owner Wayne Weaver, Asanovich oversaw a \$300,000 renovation of the Jaguars weightroom before the 2003 offseason conditioning program.

"Wayne Weaver has given us the resources to win and Jack Del Rio and his staff have given us their support," Asanovich said. "The players have responded and have garnered the results."

Asanovich has been a speaker for five consecutive years at a training seminar in Tokyo that is organized by renowned Japanese trainer Tatsuya Okawa, who works with Japanese Olympians. Several Jaguars' players accompany Asanovich on the trip each year where they speak at selected universities.

In 2002, Asanovich was the assistant strength and conditioning coach of the Baltimore Ravens. He was the head strength and conditioning coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996 through 2001, working under former coach Tony Dungy.

Asanovich spent the 1995 season as assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Minnesota Vikings. From 1987 to '95, he was the strength and conditioning coach at Anoka High School (Minneapolis, Minn.). In 1984, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio State, staying there two years. In 1986 he coached at The Citadel.

Asanovich has published several articles in his field of study and served as a member of the Minnesota Governor's Council on Health & Physical Fitness. He earned a bachelor's degree in education from St. Cloud State and a master's degree in exercise science from Ohio State.

Asanovich was born May 20, 1959 in Duluth, Minn. He played guard and linebacker at Duluth East High School and attended St. Cloud State. He and his wife, Allisen, have two daughters, Haley (8/25/00) and Gracie (11/1/02). They live in Orange Park.

MARK DUFFNER **LINEBACKERS COACH**

NFL: 10TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 1ST SEASON

Mark Duffner was named linebackers coach for the Jaguars on January 31, 2006 after spending the past three seasons in the same capacity for the Green Bay Packers.

Duffner, 53, has more than 30 years of coaching experience, including 11 seasons as a college head coach. At Green Bay, Duffner played a major role in the development of 2003 first-round draft pick Nick Barnett. Green Bay's defense finished the 2005 season as the seventh ranked defense in the NFL (ranked No. 1 against the pass) and Barnett set the team record with 194 tackles (128 solo) and became the first Packer to lead the team in tackles for three consecutive seasons. In 2004, the Packers defense ranked first in the NFL in red zone defense, allowing only five conversions in 21 third-down attempts (23.8 percent).

Duffner entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Cincinnati Bengals where he spent six seasons as linebackers coach (1997-2000) and defensive coordinator (2001-02). In 2001, the Bengals defense allowed the fewest points since 1989 and fewest yards per game since 1983. In addition, the defense set a franchise single-season record for sacks with 48 in 2001.

Prior to joining the Bengals staff, Duffner was head coach at the University of Maryland from 1992-96. He posted a 20-35 overall record that included a 11-11 mark over his final two seasons, the school's best two-season record since 1984-85. Duffner helped

the Terps achieve their first national ranking in nine years when the club ranked as high as No. 17 in 1995. In addition to the success on the field, Duffner improved Maryland's player graduation rate, with three classes in a row ranking among the nation's best (1994-96).

Duffner also served as head coach at Holy Cross where he compiled a 60-5-1 mark that included two 11-0 seasons (1987 and 1991) during his six seasons. He was named national coach of the year five times while at Holy Cross and 'New England Coach of the Year' five times. The 1987 Holy Cross team was ranked No. 1 in the nation in Division I-AA by the Associated Press for a period of time. Duffner initially served as defensive coordinator at the school from 1981-1985.

Duffner's coaching career began as a graduate assistant under Woody Hayes at Ohio State (1975-76) before serving as defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati (1977-80)

Duffner played collegiately at William & Mary and was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1990. He and his wife Kathy, have three children: daughters Christina and Carolyn and son, John.

Les Ebert is in his third season as Jacksonville's assistant strength and conditioning coach. Ebert is responsible for assisting strength and conditioning coach Mark Asanovich in all areas of the club's strength and conditioning program, which emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts.

Ebert, 33, spent the 2003 season as a part-time assistant strength and conditioning coach in Jacksonville. Prior to joining the Jaguars, Ebert spent three seasons, from 1999 to 2001, as the assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

In his three seasons in Tampa Bay, Ebert helped establish arguably one of the fittest squads in the NFL. During his three-year span, the Buccaneers sent 21 players to the Pro Bowl including Warren Sapp, Derrick Brooks, John Lynch and Mike Alstott, who made three consecutive trips each. Each year the team got stronger as the year progressed. In the

final nine games of the regular season from 1999 to 2001 the teams' record was 8-1, 7-2, and 6-3. Those finishes led to three consecutive playoff appearances.

Born October 1, 1972 in Brainerd, Minn., Ebert was strength and conditioning coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School in 1998. In 1997, Ebert served as the Buccaneers' season long strength and conditioning intern.

Ebert earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Minnesota-Duluth and a master's degree in physical education from Emporia State University (Kan.). Ebert is a certified member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

Ebert played center and defensive end at Centennial (Minn.) High School. He and his wife, Rebecca, reside in Orange Park.

RAY HAMILTON **DEFENSIVE LINE COACH**

NFL: 30TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

Ray Hamilton is in his fourth season as the defensive line coach for the Jaguars and has established the defensive line as the cornerstone of the Jaguars' defense.

Defensive tackles Marcus Stroud and John Henderson anchor a defense that ranked sixth in the NFL in 2005. Stroud has started three consecutive Pro Bowls while Henderson earned his first Pro Bowl honor in 2004.

The return of Paul Spicer from injury and addition of unrestricted free agent Reggie Hayward paid immediate dividends for the line in 2005. Hayward led the club with 8.5 sacks and 57 quarterback pressures while Spicer added a career-high 7.5 sacks. Rob Meier and Bobby McCray both registered career-high totals in sacks as well.

The defensive line combined for 32.5 of the club's 47 sacks which ranked third in the NFL and third in franchise history. The defense allowed an NFL-low four rushing touchdowns and only three opposing players rushed for 100-plus yards in 2005.

Hamilton is a longtime NFL veteran who played nine years for the New England Patriots and coached 16 years in the NFL before coming to Jacksonville in 2003. He joined the Jaguars after coaching the defensive line for Cleveland for two seasons. In his first season, the Browns tied for fourth in the AFC with 43 sacks. He spent three seasons as New England's line coach (1997-99), and then joined the Jets for the 2000 season. His 1998 defensive line tallied 25 of the team's 36 sacks, the seventh-best total in the NFL, and New England's 1997 defense registered 45 sacks.

Hamilton served a prior stint as defensive line coach with the Jets (1995-96), where he was instrumental in the development of defensive end Hugh Douglas, who was named the 1995 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Hamilton spent the 1993 and '94 seasons as defensive line coach for the Los Angeles Raiders, where he helped develop Chester McGlockton and the front line of a defense that combined for 83

sacks in his two seasons with the Raiders. In 1992, Hamilton was the defensive line coach at the University of Tennessee, following stints as defensive line coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1991) and head coach of the Bay StateTitans (1990), a semipro team that featured defensive tackle Eric Swann, the sixth overall choice in the 1991 NFL draft.

Hamilton began his coaching career in 1985, spending five seasons as an assistant defensive line coach with New England. He helped the Patriots to their first AFC Championship title and a Super Bowl XX appearance in his first season as a New England coach.

Hamilton was a 14th-round draft choice by the Patriots and a fixture on New England's defensive line from 1973 to '81. He established a Patriots rookie record with seven sacks while starting every game in his first season. Known affectionately as "Sugar Bear" during his playing career, he went on to start a team-record 110 consecutive games and currently ranks fifth on the Patriots' all-time sack list with 54. He played in 132 games in nine seasons.

Hamilton was born January 20, 1951 in Omaha, Neb. He graduated from Oklahoma with a degree in business. He was named All-Conference as a defensive tackle as a junior and senior. Hamilton received a master's degree in public administration in 1977 from Suffolk University while playing for the Patriots.

He has two sons: Kadar (8/24/76) and Damon (6/5/79). Kadar graduated from Stanford and is the Jaguars' BLESTO Scout. Damon graduated from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. Ray and his wife, Phyllis live in St. Augustine.

ANDY HECK **OFFENSIVE LINE COACH**

Former NFL player and collegiate coach Andy Heck was promoted to offensive line coach for the Jaguars on February 1, 2006. Heck joined the Jaguars coaching staff on February 9, 2004 as the offensive assistant/assistant offensive line coach and spent last season as assistant offensive line coach.

Heck was instrumental in the development of Jaguars rookie offensive tackle Khalif Barnes in 2005, the club's second-round draft choice. Barnes started 12 games and did not allow a sack in his first 11 starts.

Heck, 39, is a former long-time NFL standout. He served three seasons on the University of Virginia coaching staff, the first two seasons as a graduate assistant and the final year as tight ends coach.

Heck tutored All-America tight end Heath Miller, who set numerous Atlantic Coast Conference records for a tight end in receiving and scoring. An outstanding blocker, Miller was a first round pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2005.

Prior to joining the Virginia staff, Heck played in the NFL for 12 seasons as a stand-out offensive lineman. He finished his playing career with the Washington Redskins, where he played for two seasons. As the starting left tackle in 1999, he blocked for an offense that ranked second in the NFL. From 1994 to 1998, he was a five-year

starter for the Chicago Bears. In 1995, he gave up no sacks as part of an offensive line that yielded the fewest sacks in the NFL.

Heck was drafted in the first round (15th overall) by the Seattle Seahawks, where he was a unanimous All-Rookie selection in 1989. A five-year starter with the Seahawks, he played five seasons including three without missing a snap.

Heck's fifth grade teacher, Marylou Winkler of Annandale, Va., was named NFL Teacher of the Year in January of 1994, after being nominated by Heck. She received \$5,000 from the NFL and the school received a \$10,000 scholarship in both their names.

A 1989 graduate of Notre Dame, Heck received a bachelor's degree in American studies. A first-team All-American, he co-captained the 1988 national championship team that finished 12-0. Heck was a tight end for the first three seasons at Notre Dame before moving to tackle in spring drills in his senior season.

Heck was born January 1, 1967 in Fargo, North Dakota. He and his wife, Jennifer, have four children: Jonathan, Charlie, Molly and Evelyn, and live in Ponte Vedra Beach.

MARK MICHAELS

Mark Michaels is in his second season as the Jaguars assistant special teams coach. Michaels rejoined special teams coordinator Pete Rodriguez, who served along with Michaels in Seattle from 2001 to 2003.

Michaels joined the Seattle Seahawks on February 8, 2001, as assistant special teams coach, and was promoted to special teams coordinator in 2004 after Rodriguez left for Jacksonville.

The Jaguars special teams improved from 16th in the NFL in 2004 to eight in 2005 in a yearly special teams ranking done by *The Dallas Morning News*. The special teams units also helped the Jaguars to lead the NFL in both offensive and defensive starting position.

In 2004, he coached placekicker Josh Brown, who finished second in the league converting 23 of 25 field goal attempts (92.0 percent) and his squad had the fourth-fewest special teams penalties in the league.

In 2003, his unit featured Pro Bowler Alex Bannister, who helped contribute to 29 punts downed inside the 20, third in the NFL. The Seahawks also led the NFL in lowest opponent punt return average (4.8).

Now in his eighth NFL season, Michaels was the Cleveland Browns quality control coach in 1999 before being promoted to special teams coach for the 2000 season.

Under his guidance, the Browns were second in the NFL in 2000 with four special teams takeaways and were one of five teams without a punt or placekick blocked. Rookie

Dennis Northcutt placed sixth in the AFC (10th NFL) with a 10.7 yard punt return average. Punter Chris Gardocki finished fifth in the NFL with a 37.3 net punting average.

Before joining the professional ranks, Michaels spent five seasons coaching at the collegiate level. He coached linebackers and special teams for one season at Massachusetts in 1998, after serving in the same capacity at Brown University for four seasons. He helped coach the Minutemen to the 1998 I-AA National Championship.

Breaking into coaching at New Haven in 1987, he left in 1991 to become the head coach of the Helsinki (Finland) Roosters, guiding them to the Finnish National Championship, before coaching linebackers for the Utah Pioneers of the Professional Spring Football League in 1992-93.

A 1986 graduate of the University of Connecticut, Michaels was a two-time All-New England first-team pick and the Yankee Conference Co-Defensive Player of the Year in 1985. He holds UConn's career sack record with 27.

Michaels was born August 15, 1963 in Kingston, Pa. He and his wife, Mary, have a daughter, Grace Elizabeth, and a son, Max.

Ted Monachino was named assistant defensive line coach for the Jaguars on February 15, 2006 after spending the past five seasons as defensive line coach for Arizona State University.

Monachino, 39, served on the staff at Arizona State under head coach Dirk Koetter. Terrell Suggs, a first-round draft choice of the Baltimore Ravens in 2003, played under Monachino and set the NCAA single-season record for sacks (24) and tackles for loss (31.5) in 2002. Suggs earned numerous national awards in 2002 including the Bronco Nagurski Award for best defensive player in the nation, and the Rotary Lombardi Award for top interior lineman in the nation. In 2001, Suggs finished second in the Pac-10 in sacks with 10 and third in tackles for loss. In 2003, true freshman Kyle Caldwell was named to the Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

Monachino started his coaching career in the high school ranks in Missouri at

Hannibal High School (1990, 1994-95) and Pacific High School (1991-93) before moving to the collegiate ranks. He served as an assistant coach at Texas Christian (1996-98), James Madison (1998-99), Southwest Missouri State (1999-2000) and Boise State (2000). In 2000, the defensive line helped Boise State lead the Big West in total defense, rushing defense and sacks.

Kennedy Pola is in his second season as the Jaguars' running backs coach and third season in the NFL.

In Pola's first season, the Jaguars improved their rushing yards per game from 2004. Fred Taylor was limited to 11 games due to injuries and finished with three 100-yard rushing games. Second-year pro Greg Jones stepped in and recorded career-highs in attempts and yards and tied LaBrandon Toefield for the team lead with four rushing touchdowns.

Rookies Alvin Pearman and Derrick Wimbush saw significant action in the running game. The Jaguars selected running back/kick returner Maurice Jones-Drew in the second round of the 2006 NFL Draft.

Pola joined the Jaguars coaching staff on January 28, 2005. Pola, 42, completed his first season in the NFL with the Cleveland Browns in 2004.

He joined the Browns after working as running backs coach (2000, 2002-03) and special teams coordinator (2001-03) at the University of Southern California. He helped the Trojans capture the Associated Press 2003 National Championship.

Pola began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at UCLA (1992-93) and helped the Bruins reach the Rose Bowl in his final season. He then spent three seasons as running backs coach at San Diego State, guid-

ing two rushers, Wayne Pittman (1994) and George Jones (1995), to 1,000-yard seasons. Pola also worked with the special teams in 1996. After two seasons as running backs coach at the University of Colorado, Pola returned to San Diego State and spent the 1999 season as linebackers coach.

A four-year standout at Southern California (1982-85), Pola started at fullback for four seasons after being moved from linebacker during his freshman year.

Pola comes from a football family. His brother, Al, played collegiate football at Penn State (1985-87). He has two nephews, Troy Polamalu (Pittsburgh Steelers) and Nicky Sualua (Dallas Cowboys, Cincinnati Bengals), who have played in the NFL, and three additional nephews who played Division I-A college football.

Alvin Reynolds is in his fourth season as the Jaguars defensive backs coach. The Jaguars tied a franchise-record with 19 interceptions in 2005 with Rashean Mathis leading the club with five. Starting nickel back Terry Cousin finished with four.

The secondary features one of the strongest pair of safeties in the AFC in Donovan Darius and Deon Grant. Darius will return to the lineup after missing 12 games last year with an ACL injury. Unrestricted free agent Brian Williams will man the right cornerback spot opposite Mathis.

Second-year pros Gerald Sensabaugh and Scott Starks will play a major role in the secondary and on special teams.

Reynolds has over a decade of NFL coaching experience, developing his craft in Denver, Baltimore and Carolina under such coaches as Wade Phillips, Mike Shanahan, Ted Marchibroda, George Seifert and John Fox.

Reynolds, 47, was hired by the Jaguars as the defensive backs coach in 2003 after spending four seasons (1999-2002) as a defensive assistant with the Panthers. He was in Baltimore for the first three seasons of the Ravens franchise (1996-1998), serving as secondary coach. He began his coaching career as a defensive assistant in Denver, spending three seasons with the Broncos (1993-95). During his career, Reynolds has worked with some of the top defensive backs in the NFL, including safeties Steve Atwater and Dennis Smith in Denver and Rod Woodson in Baltimore. In Carolina, he worked with then-defensive coordinator Jack Del Rio, helping with tape breakdown, game plan preparation and statistical tendencies. He also assisted with the Panthers' secondary. Reynolds began his coaching

career at his alma mater, Indiana State, in 1982 as a graduate assistant. He was named the team's secondary coach in 1983, and in 1990 became assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator, in addition to serving as secondary coach. He coached two All-America players, including former NFL star Vencie Glenn.

As a player at Indiana State (1978-81), Reynolds starred at strong safety and received two votes for the Heisman Trophy as a senior. His four-year career statistics included 225 tackles, 21 passes defended, five fumble recoveries and five interceptions. In addition to his football accomplishments, Reynolds was president of the University Club and served as a member of several groups, including the President's Committee on Ethnic Diversity, the Indiana Black Expo, the Charles T. Hyte University Center and the Minority Students Retention Program Committee. While in Denver, he was active in 100 Black Men of America, which emphasizes education and job training.

Reynolds was born June 24, 1959, in Pineville, La. He attended West Jefferson High School in Harvey, La., and was an All-America football player and two-time Most Valuable Player on the track team. He received a degree in business management from Indiana State in 1982 and a master's degree in political science from the school in 1990. Reynolds and his wife, Carla, reside in St. Augustine with their children.

Alfredo Roberts is in his fourth season as Jaguars tight ends coach. Roberts was considered one of the best blocking tight ends during his six-year NFL playing career.

With the Jaguars he will be responsible for the development of 2006 first-round pick Mercedes Lewis. Roberts also tutors veterans Kyle Brady and Todd Yoder, in addition to promising young players in George Wrihster and Brian Jones.

Roberts attended the University of Miami from 1983 to 1987 where he received a degree in Criminal Justice. While at Miami he was a member of two national championship teams. The first was under Howard Schnellenberger in 1983, which was the school's first championship, and again in 1987 under Jimmy Johnson. Roberts played on five bowl teams for the Hurricanes, in two Orange Bowls, two Fiesta Bowls and one Sugar Bowl.

Selected in the eighth round of the 1988 draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, Roberts played tight end for the Chiefs for three seasons. He joined the Dallas Cowboys in 1991 and was part of the two Super Bowl champion teams under Jimmy Johnson, in 1992 and 1993. Roberts played in all 16 games for five

straight seasons until his career ended in 1994 following a 1993 foot injury.

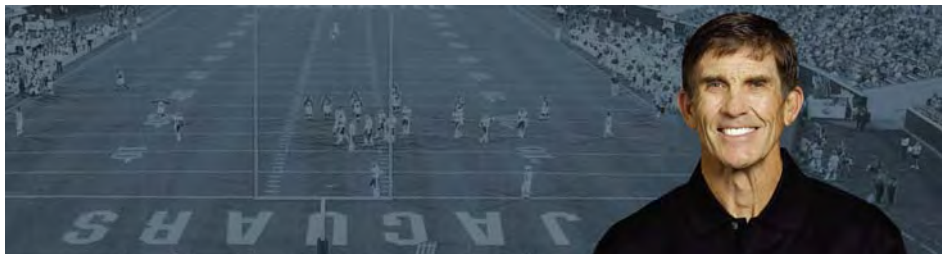
Roberts co-owned a successful restaurant in Dallas, Cowboy Café, from 1993 until starting his coaching career in 1999. In 1999 he joined the inaugural coaching staff at Florida Atlantic University under Schnellenberger. STEVE WALTERS WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

NFL: 24TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Steve Walters is in his second season as the Jaguars wide receivers coach. Walters is responsible for the development of the Jaguars young receiving corps which includes former first-round picks Matt Jones and Reggie Williams along with third-year pro Ernest Wilford.

Jones, who converted to receiver from collegiate quarterback, ranked third among all rookie wide receivers in 2005 with 36 receptions and set the Jaguars rookie record with five touchdowns. Under Walters, Wilford set career-highs in receiving with 41 receptions for 681 yards and a team-high seven touchdowns.

Walters joined the Jaguars on January 28, 2005 after six seasons with the Tennessee Titans. Walters, a 34-year veteran of coaching, including 23 in the NFL, joined the Titans coaching staff in 1999 after spending two seasons as wide receivers coach with New England.

In 2004, Titans WR Derrick Mason became the only player in franchise history to record four consecutive 1,000-yard receiving seasons, as he tallied 96 receptions for 1,168 yards and seven touchdowns. The maturation of Mason over a four-year span (2001-04) led to eye-popping numbers. His four year totals (4,610 yards on 343 receptions and 29 touchdowns) are the among the best in the franchise in 40-years.

Walters helped Drew Bennett, who came to the Titans as a walk-on player at UCLA as a part-time quarterback and wide receiver, register a career-high 80 receptions for 1,247 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2004.

In 2001, the Titans tandem of Derrick Mason and Kevin Dyson totaled 1,953 yards and 16 touchdowns. The 16 touchdowns ranked third in the league among receiving tandems. Additionally, Mason and Dyson each posted 100-yard performances in the same game in consecutive weeks – a feat

that had not been accomplished since 1961.

Walters spent two coaching stints with New England. He began his NFL coaching career with New England in 1982, serving as defensive backs coach for three seasons before serving as wide receivers coach with the New Orleans Saints for 11 seasons (1986-96). During his tenure in New Orleans, his wide receivers set the record for most single-season receptions in franchise history.

Walters began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Virginia Tech in 1971. After two seasons, he accepted his first full-time position coaching receivers at Tampa University in 1973. He coached the defensive backs for two seasons at Northeast Louisiana before moving on to Morehead State as the quarterbacks and receivers coach. From 1977-78, Walters served as wide receivers coach at the University of Tulsa. In 1979, he coached quarterbacks at Memphis State before spending two seasons as secondary coach at Southern Methodist.

Born June 16, 1948 in Springdale, Ark., Walters played defensive back at the University of Arkansas. He lettered in football and basketball at Springdale High in Arkansas. He earned his bachelor's degree at Arkansas and added his master's degree in physical education from Morehead State in 1976. Steve and his wife Susan are the parents of two children, Kirk and Kasey.

Charles Bailey brought 23 years of scouting and front office experience with him when he was named the Jaguars' director of pro personnel in 2003. Since his arrival, the team has signed several key unrestricted free agents during the offseason.

Bailey is responsible for overseeing the scouting and evaluation of all pro personnel, as well as advance scouting. He is also an integral part of the Jaguars draft along with James Harris, Jack Del Rio and Gene Smith. He spent 14 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers and New Orleans Saints.

Bailey was the Saints' assistant general manager from 1999 to 2001, and spent the 2002 season as the organization's director of community affairs/assistant director of government affairs. As the Saints' assistant general manager, Bailey was responsible for scouting and evaluating talent for the Saints around the NFL, as well as college scouting and other administrative

duties. He also served as a member of the executive board for the 2002 Super Bowl Host Committee in New Orleans.

Bailey was with the Steelers from 1989 to '99 and was an integral part of the club's Super Bowl XXX appearance after the 1995 season. In his 10 years with the Steelers, he served three years in college scouting and seven years as the club's pro personnel coordinator. Bailey joined the Steelers following eight years of scouting with National Football Scouting, Inc. (1981-88).

A native of Winston-Salem, N.C., Bailey attended North Carolina Central University, where he was a scholarship student-athlete from 1969 to '73. After graduation, he earned his master's degree from North Carolina A&T. Bailey was inducted into the North Carolina Central University Hall of Fame in October 2005. GENE SMITH **DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING**

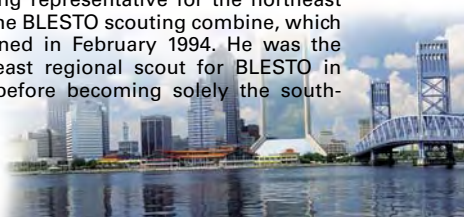


After seven years as a Jaguars college scout, Gene Smith was promoted to director of college scouting in 2000, and he has guided the team's NFL draft for the last six years. His responsibilities include the scouting and evaluation of hundreds of college players on an annual basis, as well as directing a staff of seven college scouts. Smith also has some additional pro personnel responsibilities, including the evaluation of selected unrestricted free agents.

Smith is one of 18 staff members who

joined the franchise in 1994. He has been a part of building Jaguars teams that have made nine playoff game appearances, including two AFC Championship games.

Smith was previously the team's college scout responsible for the southeast United States. He joined the Jaguars on May 1, 1994 and was originally the team's scouting representative for the northeast with the BLESTO scouting combine, which he joined in February 1994. He was the southeast regional scout for BLESTO in 1995 before becoming solely the south-





east regional scout for the Jaguars. Smith had previously been an assistant coach at the college level for eight years. He worked at Edinboro University from 1989 to '94, serving as an assistant coach, recruiting coordinator, and strength and conditioning coordinator. From 1986 to '88 Smith worked at Ohio University, where he began his college coaching career as a graduate assistant and later served as an assistant coach.

Smith graduated from Heidelberg University, serving as captain of the foot-

ball team while playing as a defensive lineman. He graduated in 1986 with a degree in education and in 1987 received his master's degree with emphasis in athletic administration from Ohio University. He also served as a captain of the Monroeville (Ohio) High School football team, under head coach Steve Ringholz.

Born December 31, 1963, Smith is a native of Monroeville, Ohio. He and his wife, Debbie, have two daughters, Alana and Carlie. They live in Fleming Island.



Louis Clark was promoted to assistant director, pro personnel on May 13, 2003, after serving as a college scout for the Jaguars since 1997. A former wide receiver for the Seattle Seahawks and Green Bay Packers, Clark assists Charles Bailey in the scouting and evaluation of pro personnel. He handles the advance scouting, and also assists in college player evaluation.

Clark attended Mississippi State, where he played wide receiver from 1983 to '86. He graduated with a degree in

educational psychology in 1994. Clark was selected in the 10th round of the 1987 college draft by the Seahawks. He played six seasons in Seattle. In 1993, Clark signed with Green Bay as an unrestricted free agent and spent his final season with the Packers.

Following his playing career, he spent four years in private business. Clark was born July 3, 1964 in Tupelo, Miss. He and his wife, Carla, have a son, Antonio, and a daughter, Antonece. They live in Jacksonville.



Terry McDonough was named a Jaguars executive scout on May 13, 2003. He scouts the top collegiate players throughout the country. Additionally, McDonough does crosschecks, attends all major all-star practices and selective spring player workouts of the top draft-eligible players. He also has some addi-

tional pro personnel responsibilities.

McDonough joined the Jaguars from the Baltimore Ravens, for whom he scouted the eastern half of the country for the previous three years as the Ravens' eastern college supervisor. He also helped evaluate free agent prospects for the pro personnel department during





the free agency period, working with James Harris.

A Boston native, McDonough began his NFL scouting career with an internship with the San Francisco 49ers in 1989. Following his graduation from Massachusetts with a sports management degree, he was named player personnel director of the Barcelona Dragons of the World League in 1990. While with the Dragons (1990-92), McDonough handled a variety of personnel assignments, serving as West Coast scout for the league and helping each team prepare for the WFL drafts. McDonough toured both NFL and CFL training camps to grade potential WFL players. The 1991 Barcelona team finished with a 9-3 record, losing the league title to

London in the World Bowl. The following season, the Dragons captured the European title.

In 1992, McDonough was hired by the Cleveland Browns as the southeast area scout, and he moved to Baltimore with the franchise in 1996.

At Hingham (Mass.) High School, McDonough was All-Conference as a running back in football as well as in baseball, and he also lettered in basketball. He transferred to Bridgton Academy, where a serious knee injury that required reconstructive surgery ended his playing career. McDonough has three children, Patrick, Caroline, and Brendan, and lives in Raleigh, N.C.

Tim Minge has been with the Jaguars since 1994, serving as a college scout for nine years before being named executive scout in 2003. He has the responsibility of scouting the southeast region of the United States. Additionally, Minge does selective crosschecks and attends all major all-star practices and spring player workouts of the top draft-eligible players. He also coordinates the post-draft college free agency process and has some additional pro personnel responsibilities.

Minge is one of 18 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994.

Before joining the Jaguars, Minge spent 11 years as a college assistant coach and then 10 years as a recruiting coordinator. His college coaching career began in 1973 as defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach at St. Joseph College (Ind.), where he had been a three-year varsity letterman as a defensive back. He was a graduate assistant at Western Michigan

from 1974 to '75, then served as defensive coordinator at Loyola Academy in 1976 before returning to Western Michigan as an assistant coach from 1977 to '81. In 1982, Minge was coach of the secondary at East Carolina, and in 1983 he coached at Miami (Ohio) University as defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach.

In 1984, he was named the recruiting coordinator at the United States Military Academy. He served there until 1987, and then spent 1988 to '90 as recruiting coordinator at Tennessee. In 1991, Minge returned for three more years at the U.S. Military Academy before joining the Jaguars.

Minge received a bachelor of science degree in physical education from St. Joseph College in 1972 and a master of arts in physical education in 1976 from Western Michigan. Minge was born January 1, 1950 in Chicago.

FOOTBALL OPS/FACILITIES

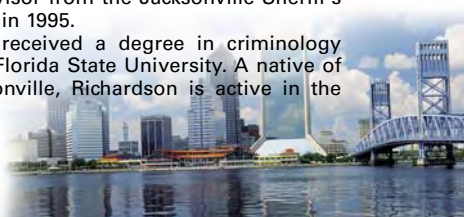

19 carries (5.8 average). Became the second Jaguar to have back-to-back 100-yard rushing games in the postseason, joining Natrone Means (1996) ...

1998: Had at the time the best season by a running back in Jaguars history, setting 29 team records ... Rushed 264 times for 1,223 yards (4.6-yard average) and 14 touchdowns and caught 44 passes for 421 yards and three TDs ... Led all NFL rookies with 1,223 rushing yards and 1,644 total yards despite having fewer than seven carries in a game five times ... Finished rookie campaign as the sixth-leading rusher in AFC and 10th in NFL ... Led all rookie rushers despite starting only 12 games ... Posted then-team-record six 100-yard rushing games, the most by an NFL rookie since 1995 (Curtis Martin, nine) ... Was the only NFL player with TDs of more than 75 yards both running and receiving ... Scored 17 total touchdowns (tied for second in NFL) and 14 rushing TDs, team single-season records ... Tied for the second-most TDs in the NFL behind Terrell Davis (23) ... Only player in NFL with more than 1,200 yards rushing, 12 rushing TDs, a 4.5-yard average per carry, 40 or more receptions and 1,600 yards total offense ... Finished fourth in AFC with 1,644 total yards from scrimmage ... His 4.6-yard rushing average was fifth in NFL ... Selected as second alternate running back for the Pro Bowl ... In his first three games as the main ballcarrier, had runs of 52, 49 and 77 yards, making him only the 11th player in the NFL since 1950 to have runs of 40 or more yards in three consecutive games. 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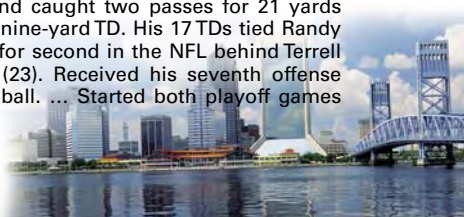

Inactive Oct. 18 at Buffalo ... Returned to the lineup Oct. 25 at Denver, but was sidelined early after taking a blow to the head ... Scored two TDs for the second time with a franchise-best 78-yard receiving TD and a one-yard run, earning his fourth offense game ball on Nov. 1 at Baltimore. Turned in 165 combined yards with 87 rushing on 22 carries and 78 receiving on his reception. The 78-yard catch topped the previous record 75-yard non-scoring catch by Jimmy Smith on 11/9/97 vs. Kansas City ... Posted his third 100-yard game Nov. 8 vs. Cincinnati, with 118 yards on 27 carries and his sixth rushing TD. Became the first player in Jaguars history to have three 100-yard rushing games in a season. Total of 27 carries tied for the second most in team history. Marked the sixth straight game in which he played that he scored a TD ... Broke free for a 70-yard game-win-

ning TD run with 2:40 left to clinch a 29-24 comeback win on Nov. 15 vs. Tampa Bay, earning his fifth offense game ball. Finished with 128 rushing yards (fourth 100-yard game) to tie his own team record for rushing yardage and scored three TDs for the first time in his career (also scored on runs of six and three yards). Finished with 196 combined yards (128 rush, 68 receiving) for the then second most of his career and then third most in team history. Broke two team records: total TDs scored in a season (11, topping Stewart's 10 in 1996) and single-season rushing attempts by a rookie (142, topping Stewart's 137 in 1995). Tied two team records: rushing TDs in a season (nine, matching Natrone Means' in 1997) and consecutive games scoring a TD (four, matching Means' in 1997). Marked the seventh straight game in which he played that he scored at least one TD ... On Nov. 22 at Pittsburgh, scored a team-record 10th rushing TD of the season on a two-yard run, breaking Means' record. Also broke Means' team mark for consecutive games scoring a rushing TD, with five. Had a breakout game Dec. 6 vs. Detroit with a then-franchise-record 183 rushing yards on a record 32 carries and scored two TDs, becoming the first 1,000-yard rusher in team history with 1,005 yards. Turned in his fifth 100-yard rushing game to earn another offense game ball. Finished with 206 combined yards, including 23 on three receptions. Had a 31-yard run for his eighth play of 30-plus yards on the season. Eclipsed his own previous team record of 128 rushing yards, as well as the rushing attempt record of 29 by James Stewart. Marked his fourth game with two or more TDs ... Got his sixth 100-yard game of the season Dec. 20 at Minnesota, rushing for 105 yards on 23 carries. With 42 receptions on the season broke the team's rookie record, topping Pete Mitchell's 41 catches in 1995. Was team's leading rusher as well as leader in receptions for the third time ... Scored two TDs in the Dec. 28 season finale vs. Pittsburgh and finished his rookie season with 17 total TDs to tie for third among rookies in NFL history, both for rushing TDs and total TDs. Rushed for 71 yards on 21 carries, with a 12-yard TD run, and caught two passes for 21 yards and a nine-yard TD. His 17 TDs tied Randy Moss for second in the NFL behind Terrell Davis (23). Received his seventh offense game ball. ... Started both playoff games





... Posted the third-best game by a rookie running back in NFL postseason history on Jan. 3 vs. New England with 162 yards on a career-high 33 carries. Also scored one touchdown and earned another offense game ball. Scored on 13-yard run in the second quarter for a 12-0 lead and had 46-yard run in the first quarter, which was the second-longest run in team's postseason history. Also turned in the third 100-yard rushing game by a Jaguar in postseason (Means had two), and his 162 yards were the second most in team postseason history to Means' 175 on 12/28/96 at Buffalo. His rushing total of 162 ranks third in NFL postseason history for a rookie, trailing only 204 by Washington's Timmy Smith (1/31/88 vs. Denver) and 165 by L.A. Chargers' Paul Lowe (1/1/61 vs. Houston). With 33 carries broke Means' team postseason record of 31 on 12/28/96 at Buffalo and topped Taylor's regular-season mark of 32 carries on 12/6/98 vs. Detroit. Named NFL Offensive Player of the Week for the Wild-Card weekend, becoming the first rookie to win the award ... Limited by New York Jets defense to 86 yards on 20 carries in the Jan. 10 Divisional Playoff game ... His 248 rushing yards in two postseason games moved him to fifth in NFL history for rushing yards by a rookie in post-season behind Washington's Timmy Smith (342 in 1987), Dallas' Duane Thomas (313 in 1970), Cincinnati's Ickey Woods (307 in 1988) and Houston's Earl Campbell (264 in 1978) ... Drafted ninth overall and second running back picked after Curtis Enis ... Selected with a choice obtained from Buffalo (along with a fourth-round pick) in exchange for quarterback Rob Johnson.

COLLEGE: Ranked fourth on school's all-time rushing list with 3,075 yards ... Carried 537 times for a 5.7-yard average and 31 touchdowns ... Played in three bowl games in four years ... HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1989

Aug. 17 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, a partnership to lead the community effort to win an NFL franchise is formed. The group, led by Tom Petway, includes Jeb Bush, Hamilton Jordan and Arthur "Chick" Sherrer.

1990

April 4 — National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue announces that the League will expand by two teams no later than the 1993 season.

July 26 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1993 season.

1991

Feb. 12 — In a unanimous vote, the Jacksonville City Council votes to commit \$60 million to renovate the Gator Bowl, contingent upon the City being awarded an expansion football team.

May 15 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends the League expand by two teams for the 1994 season, contrary to the July 26, 1990 vote.

May 22 — At the owners' meeting in Minneapolis, a plan is approved that will add two expansion teams to the League for the 1994 season.

May 30 — Florida Governor Lawton Chiles signs into law the Professional Sports Facilities Program, a state statute that provides state funding of up to \$2 million for 30 years for funding new sports facilities that operate in the state of Florida.

June 25 — The lease that includes the recently approved \$60 million package to renovate the Gator Bowl is approved by City Council.

July 17 — The NFL announces it will accept applications for expansion teams.

Sept. 16 — The City of Jacksonville files an expansion application with the League, one of 11 cities to apply.

Oct. 1 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. submits its ownership application to the League. The nine-member partnership includes local businessman and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. general partner Tom Petway. J. Wayne Weaver is one of the eight limited partners, along with Jeb Bush, Lawrence DuBow, Earl Hadlow, Preston Haskell, Sandy McArthur, Charles Towers and Ron Weaver.

Oct. 24 — David Seldin is named president and chief operating officer of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

Dec. 6 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. announces that the team name will be the

Jacksonville Jaguars if an expansion team is awarded.

Dec. 10 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. and City officials make the group's first presentation to commissioner Tagliabue and other NFL officials in New York.

1992

March 17 — At the League's annual winter meeting in Phoenix, the list of expansion candidate cities is cut from 11 to seven. Jacksonville is one of the seven; Nashville, San Antonio, Raleigh-Durham, and Honolulu are eliminated.

May 19 — The five finalists in the expansion race are named: Jacksonville, Charlotte, Baltimore, Memphis, St. Louis. Sacramento and Oakland are eliminated.

Oct. 20 — Citing complications surrounding the ongoing labor situation, the NFL votes to delay the expansion announcement to its 1993 fall meeting in Chicago and for expansion teams to begin play in 1995.

1993

Jan. 6 — A seven-year Collective Bargaining Agreement is reached between the League and its players. With the labor situation resolved, a new expansion timetable is expected in March.

March 18 — J. Wayne Weaver is introduced as managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

March 23 — The expansion race is officially resumed by the NFL.

April 12 — After a tour with Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. representatives, NFL officials indicate that additional renovations beyond those already planned would be necessary to renovate the Gator Bowl to NFL standards.

June 25 — Negotiations for a new lease between Jacksonville Mayor Ed Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. break down.

July 1 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. resume negotiations and agree on a plan that caps stadium renovation costs at \$112 million and protects the city from cost overruns. Mayor Austin sends the lease to City Council for approval.

July 21 — The Jacksonville City Council fails to approve the newly-negotiated \$112 million stadium proposal. As a result, Weaver announces that Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. is ending its bid for an NFL expansion franchise.

July 22 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. closes offices and club seat and executive suite deposits are returned.

Aug. 20 — The *Florida Times-Union* reports that negotiations between Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. and the City have resumed, encouraged by the NFL and at the





request of Times-Union publisher Carl Cannon and Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert.

Aug. 21 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville! reach an agreement on a new stadium lease capping stadium renovation costs at \$121 million, \$53 million to come from city funds and \$68 million from team and team related sources. As project manager, Touchdown Jacksonville! assumes responsibility for any cost overruns.

Aug. 22 — Facing the challenge of selling 9,000 club seats, a committee of civic and business leaders is formed called NFL Now!, headed by Carl Cannon and Adam Herbert.

Aug. 23 — The City Council votes 14-4 to approve the new lease.

Aug. 24 — With the new public/private partnership, Weaver and Mayor Austin meet with Commissioner Tagliabue, who welcomes Jacksonville back into the expansion race.

Aug. 25 — NFL Now! begins a 10-day drive to sell the required club seats.

Aug. 26 — Former Kansas City Chiefs defensive back Deron Cherry joins Touchdown Jacksonville! as the ninth member of the ownership group.

Sept. 3 — Carl Cannon of NFL Now! announces that 9,737 club seats have been sold, a number that rises to 10,112 once all the applications are processed.

Sept. 21 — Weaver and other Touchdown Jacksonville! officials make their presentation to the NFL finance and expansion committees.

Oct. 26 — In Chicago, NFL owners select the Carolina Panthers for an expansion team but delay the announcement of the second expansion city.

Nov. 30 (4:12 p.m. ET) — **In Chicago, Jacksonville is awarded the 30th franchise in the National Football League.**

Dec. 1 — A victory celebration in the Gator Bowl, as 25,000 Jaguars fans battle cold and rain to welcome Wayne Weaver, Jaguars officials, city officials and community leaders upon their return from Chicago.

1994

Jan. 3 — Demolition of the Gator Bowl begins.

Jan. 6 — The Jaguars announce a season ticket sellout for their first three seasons. Over 56,000 season tickets are sold through Dec. 31, just one month after the awarding of the team.

Feb. 21 — Tom Coughlin is hired as Jaguars head coach. The former Boston College head coach and assistant with the New York Giants brings six of his assistants with him.

Aug. 24 — The Jaguars announce they will hold their first training camp in 1995 at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

Sept. 14 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Inc. is established, under the direction of Delores Barr Weaver and Dr. Gregory S. Gross.

Sept. 28 — The NFL announces specific plans to stock the expansion teams.

Nov. 1 — The Jaguars hold their first official workout at Bishop Kenny High School. Thirteen offensive linemen work out in front of 1,500 fans.

Nov. 2 — The NFL announces its plans for division alignment, putting the Jaguars in the AFC Central Division along with the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, Houston Oilers and Pittsburgh Steelers. The Carolina Panthers will join the NFC West Division.

Dec. 15 — The Jaguars sign the first 10 players in team history: WR Shannon Baker, LB Hillary Butler, DE Ferric Collons, OL Greg Huntington, RB Randy Jordan, DE Ernie Logan, OT Rickie Shaw, DE Jason Simmons, DE Ricky Sutton, DE Chris Williams.

1995

Jan. 12 — Dick Jauron is hired as defensive coordinator. Jauron had spent nine years with the Green Bay Packers as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

Jan. 14 — Kevin Gilbride is introduced as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He had previously been the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers.

Jan. 20 — The Jaguars unveil their new logo and team uniform.

Jan. 21 — Larry Pasquale is hired as the team's special teams coordinator.

Feb. 14 — The Jaguars draft 31 players in the expansion draft. The first player selected is Arizona quarterback Steve Beuerlein. During the draft, the Jaguars acquire such veteran players as Desmond Howard, Keith Goganious, Darren Carrington, Reggie Cobb, Eugene Chung, Derek Brown and Willie Jackson.

Feb. 28 — The Jaguars sign their first unrestricted free agents: guard Shawn Bouwens and defensive linemen Joel Smeenge and Don Davey. Within 15 days, six more unrestricted free agents are signed: cornerback Vinnie Clark, punter Bryan Barker, cornerback Mickey Washington, defensive tackle Kelvin Pritchett, defensive end Jeff Lageman and center Dave Widell.

March 23 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation awards its first grants to eight local organizations totaling \$139,850.

April 21 — The first trade in Jaguars history: Jacksonville acquires quarterback Mark Brunell from the Green Bay Packers in exchange for draft picks in the third and fifth rounds of the 1995 draft.

April 22 — Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli becomes the Jaguars' first-ever selection in the college draft, the second overall pick. Later in the first round, running back James Stewart is chosen 19th overall after the Jaguars trade up in the round. The Jaguars select a total of 10 players during the two-day draft.

April 28-30 — The first minicamp is held on the practice fields adjacent to the new stadium.





June 1 — The Jaguars sign their entire first class of draft choices at the same time, an event unprecedented in NFL history.

June 2-8 — The second minicamp is held, with one practice session being conducted in front of 2,500 fans at Bishop Kenny High.

June 10 — “The Roar of the Jaguars,” the team’s cheerleader squad, is introduced at The Landing in downtown Jacksonville. The squad includes 36 cheerleaders.

July 8 — The Jaguars’ first-ever training camp opens at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

July 29 — The Jaguars play their first pre-season contest in the Pro Football Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, but lose to the Carolina Panthers 20-14 when a last-minute drive ends at the Panthers’ two-yard line.

Aug. 18 — Jacksonville Municipal Stadium opens, as the Jaguars host their first home pre-season game. However, they lose to the St. Louis Rams, 27-10.

Sept. 3 — The Jaguars play their inaugural game in front of 72,363 fans but lose to the Houston Oilers, 10-3.

Oct. 1 — The Jaguars get their first win, 17-16, at Houston in the fifth week of the regular season — the third-fastest first victory in NFL expansion history and the fastest to earn a win on the road.

Oct. 8 — The Jaguars defeat AFC Central rival Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 for their first home victory, the only time in NFL history an expansion team has ever defeated a team that would go on to play in the Super Bowl in the same season.

Dec. 3 — Jaguars wide receiver Jimmy Smith scores a team-record three touchdowns three different ways at Denver — on a blocked punt, off a lateral on a kickoff return and on a pass reception — an extreme rarity in NFL history.

Dec. 24 — The Jaguars break the previous record for victories by an expansion team with a last-second, 24-21 win over Cleveland in the Browns’ final game before a three-year absence.

1996

Feb. 18 — Pittsburgh Steelers offensive tackle Leon Searcy becomes the first unrestricted free agent to sign with the Jaguars in 1996.

March 1 — Free agent Eddie Robinson signs from Houston, bolstering a young line-backer corps.

March 2 — Keenan McCardell, Cleveland’s leading wide receiver in 1995, signs a free agent contract with the Jaguars.

April 20 — Illinois outside linebacker Kevin Hardy is selected with the Jaguars’ first pick in the 1996 college draft, the second overall player chosen. By the early third round, the Jaguars also draft defensive end Tony Brackens, center Michael Cheever and

defensive back Aaron Beasley.

July 19 — The Jaguars open their second training camp, their first at Ferrell Fields at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. The practice fields were named in memory of Roger Ernest Ferrell Sr. in a morning dedication.

Sept. 1 — The Jaguars open their second season with a 24-9 victory over the defending AFC-champion Pittsburgh Steelers. It marks the first game the Jacksonville defense does not allow a touchdown.

Sept. 22 — Mark Brunell throws for a team-record 432 yards and three touchdowns, but the Jaguars lose their first-ever overtime game, 28-25, at New England.

Sept. 29 — In the first regular-season game between the two 1995 expansion teams, Jacksonville beats Carolina, 24-14, as James Stewart runs for two TDs and the Jaguars rush for a team-record 179 yards.

Oct. 20 — Keenan McCardell catches 16 passes — tied for the third-highest total in pro football history — for a team-record 232 yards. However, despite breaking or tying 28 team records for single-game performances, the Jaguars lose at St. Louis, 17-14.

Nov. 24 — The Jaguars win at Baltimore, 30-27 for their first overtime victory on a 34-yard field goal by Mike Hollis.

Dec. 12 — Keenan McCardell becomes the first Jaguar voted to the Pro Bowl. Mark Brunell and Tony Boselli are later added as replacements, and Brunell goes on to win MVP honors in the Feb. 2 game in Honolulu.

Dec. 22 — The Jaguars clinch their first playoff berth in franchise history with a 19-17 victory over the Atlanta Falcons, as Morten Andersen’s 30-yard field goal attempt goes wide left.

Dec. 28 — The first second-year expansion franchise in NFL history to play a postseason game, the Jaguars become the first team to defeat the Buffalo Bills in a playoff game in Rich Stadium. Natrone Means leads the way in the 30-27 victory by running for 175 yards.

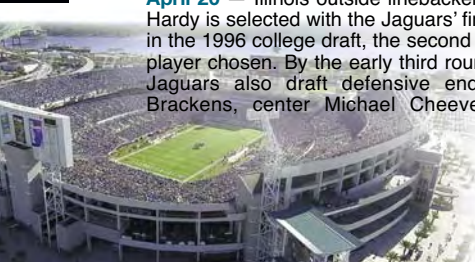
1997

Jan. 4 — The Jaguars post the biggest upset in the NFL since Joe Namath led the Jets to victory in Super Bowl III, as they stun the football world and the Denver Broncos with a 30-27 victory. After flying back to Jacksonville, the team finds 40,000 fans waiting for them at 1:30 a.m. in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

Jan. 12 — The Jaguars’ Cinderella season ends short of the Super Bowl, as Jacksonville is defeated by the New England Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. Jaguars turnovers led to 17 of the Patriots’ 20 points in a game played in a wind chill of zero degrees.

Jan. 23 — David Seldin resigns as Jaguars president but remains a partner.

Feb. 5 — Chris Palmer is named offensive coordinator, replacing Kevin Gilbride who had become head coach of the San Diego Chargers.





March 5 — The Jaguars sign their only 1997 unrestricted free agent, Pittsburgh cornerback Deon Figures.

April 18 — Alltel Stadium becomes the new name for Jacksonville Municipal Stadium in a sponsorship agreement with the information technology and communications provider.

April 19 — Jacksonville selects defensive tackle Renaldo Wynn of Notre Dame with the 21st pick of the first round of the NFL draft. In all, the Jaguars draft seven players.

Aug. 9 — QB Mark Brunell suffers a knee injury in a preseason game against the New York Giants and misses the next four games, including the first two of the regular season.

Aug. 31 — In his first NFL start, Rob Johnson leads the Jaguars to a 28-27 victory at Baltimore in the season opener. Johnson displayed incredible courage in returning twice from a severe ankle sprain, setting a team record with 20 completions in 24 attempts (83.3 percent), 2 TD passes and a 25-yard TD run.

Sept. 7 — The Jaguars win their home opener, 40-13, over the New York Giants as Steve Matthews makes his first NFL start for an injured Rob Johnson. The Jaguars started 2-0 for the first time in team history and set a franchise record with 40 points. It marked the first time in 30 years that a team won twice with two different quarterbacks making their first start in consecutive games.

Sept. 22 — Mark Brunell returns and leads the Jaguars to a 30-21 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in the Jaguars' first appearance on "Monday Night Football." Brunell threw for 306 yards, but the victory wasn't clinched until the final play, when Clyde Simmons blocked a 40-yard game-winning field goal attempt and Chris Hudson returned the ball 58 yards for a touchdown as time expired.

Oct. 12 — James Stewart rushes for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the visiting Philadelphia Eagles. It marks only the fourth time in NFL history and the first time since 1963 that a player scored five TDs rushing in a game, and Stewart became one of only 12 NFL players with five or more touchdowns in one game.

Dec. 11 — Five Jaguars are named to the AFC squad for the Pro Bowl: Tony Boselli, Bryan Barker and Mike Hollis as starters, and Mark Brunell and Jimmy Smith as backups.

Dec. 14 — The Jaguars clinch a playoff berth for the second straight year after defeating the Bills, 20-14, in Buffalo one week before the end of the regular season. Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith both go over the 1,000-yard mark, becoming the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

Dec. 21 — The Jaguars win their team-record 11th game of the season by defeating the Oakland Raiders. The victory gave the team a 4-4 mark on the road for the first time ever, and matched division-winner Pittsburgh's 11-5 record. It takes five tie-breaker steps to determine the Steelers win the division.

Dec. 27 — The Jaguars' third season comes to an end in Denver, with the eventual Super Bowl-champion Broncos winning the Wild-Card playoff, 42-17.

1998

Feb. 13 — Quarterback Rob Johnson is traded to the Buffalo Bills for the ninth pick in the first round and a fourth-round choice in the 1998 NFL draft.

Feb. 16 — The Jaguars sign Buffalo Bills linebacker Bryce Paup, an unrestricted free agent.

April 18-19 — The Jaguars draft 11 players, their most ever, in the NFL draft. Two players are selected in the first round: running back Fred Taylor from the University of Florida with the ninth pick and safety Donovan Darius from Syracuse with the 25th choice.

May 12 — Rick Reiprish, who had been responsible for the Jaguars' first four successful drafts, is promoted to director of player personnel. Fran Foley is named director of pro scouting, and Rick Mueller is named director of college scouting.

Sept. 20 — Running back James Stewart is injured on the Jaguars' second play of the game and lost for the season. But first-round draft choice Fred Taylor takes over and runs 52 yards for a touchdown on his first carry. The Jaguars defeat the Baltimore Ravens, 24-10, for their third win of the season.

Oct. 12 — The Jaguars post a franchise-best 5-0 start, beating the visiting Miami Dolphins 28-21 on "Monday Night Football" when Mark Brunell and Keenan McCardell hook up for two touchdown passes in the fourth quarter. Fred Taylor ran for a 77-yard TD on the game's first play from scrimmage.

Nov. 1 — The Jaguars explode for a team-record number of points in a 45-19 victory at Baltimore. Jacksonville scored six TDs in the first half — the seventh-most ever in a half in NFL history — jumping out to a 42-7 lead. Taylor's 78-yard TD reception becomes the longest play from scrimmage in team history.

Dec. 13 — Mike Hollis becomes the most accurate field goal kicker in NFL history by making two attempts, giving him an 81.45 percentage in four seasons (101 of 124), dethroning Philadelphia's Chris Boniol.

Dec. 20 — The Jaguars clinch their first-ever AFC Central Division championship prior to kickoff of a Sunday night game at Minnesota, dethroning the Pittsburgh Steelers after a four-year run.

Dec. 28 — With a 21-3 victory over the Steelers on "Monday Night Football," the Jaguars win their 11th game for the second straight year and becomes the NFL's first expansion team to qualify for the playoffs three times in its first four seasons. Fred Taylor finishes the year with 17 touchdowns, tied for the third-most ever by a rookie in NFL history.





1999

Jan. 3 — In their first-ever home playoff game, the Jaguars defeat the New England Patriots, 25-10. Mark Brunell returns after missing three games with an ankle injury to throw a TD pass and Mike Hollis kicks four field goals, as Jacksonville claims its first postseason win in two years.

Jan. 10 — The Jaguars' fourth season ends with a 34-24 loss to the New York Jets in the divisional playoffs.

Jan. 13 — Head coach Tom Coughlin is rewarded with a contract extension through the 2003 season.

Jan. 26 — Dom Capers, the former head coach of the Carolina Panthers, is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dick Jauron, who became head coach of the Chicago Bears.

Feb. 12 — On the first day of free agency, the Jaguars sign two unrestricted free agents: DT Gary Walker of the Tennessee Titans and S Carnell Lake of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Feb. 16 — The Jaguars sign TE Kyle Brady, a transition free agent from the New York Jets, to an offer sheet. The next day, the Jets decline to match the offer, making Brady a Jaguar.

April 24-25 — The Jaguars draft eight players in the NFL draft, including Fernando Bryant, a cornerback selected in the first round from Alabama.

Sept. 12 — The Jaguars open their fifth season with a 41-3 victory over the San Francisco 49ers at Alltel Stadium.

Nov. 7 — Jacksonville makes a team-record nine sacks and forces four turnovers in a 30-7 win at Atlanta.

Nov. 28 — The Jaguars score 23 points (three touchdowns, two two-point conversions) in the fourth quarter at Baltimore and leave with a 30-23 victory.

Dec. 11 — The Jaguars win their 11th consecutive game, setting a team record, as they defeat the Cleveland Browns, 24-14.

2000

Jan. 2 — The Jaguars conclude the regular season with a 14-2 mark — the best record in the NFL — and head into the playoffs as the No. 1 seed in the AFC. Jimmy Smith catches 14 passes to finish the year with 116 receptions, the most in the league and the sixth-highest total in NFL history. The defense allows only 217 points, the 12th-fewest allowed since the 16-game schedule began in 1978.

Jan. 15 — The Jaguars trounce the Miami Dolphins 62-7 in the Divisional Playoffs in what would be the last game for Dan Marino and Jimmy Johnson. Jacksonville's 62 points and 55-point margin are the second most ever in NFL postseason history, and

Fred Taylor's 90-yard run is the longest ever in an NFL playoff game.

Jan. 23 — Tennessee claims its third win of the season over the Jaguars in the AFC Championship game. Jacksonville led 14-10 at halftime before losing 33-14.

Feb. 10 — Tony Brackens is designated as a franchise player before the start of free agency.

Feb. 22 — Jacksonville signs middle linebacker Hardy Nickerson, an unrestricted free agent from the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

April 15-16 — The Jaguars select wide receiver R. Jay Soward from Southern California in the first round of the draft. Altogether, 11 players are drafted by Jacksonville.

Sept. 10 — Jimmy Smith catches 15 passes for 291 yards — the fifth-highest receiving total in NFL history in a game against the Baltimore Ravens, who would go on to win the Super Bowl and set an NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season.

Sept. 17 — The Jaguars win their home opener 13-0 over Cincinnati, the first shutout in team history.

Oct. 29 — The Jaguars defeat the Dallas Cowboys 23-17 in overtime on a 37-yard TD pass from Mark Brunell to Alvis Whitted to snap a five-game losing streak.

Nov. 1 — At their annual fall meeting in Atlanta, NFL owners award Super Bowl XXXIX to the city of Jacksonville. The game will be played at Alltel Stadium on February 6, 2005.

Nov. 19 — Fred Taylor rushes for 234 yards, setting a Jaguars record and at the time what was the 12th-most rushing yards in a game in NFL history (and the most ever at Three Rivers Stadium), as the Jaguars beat the Steelers 34-24. Taylor scored four touchdowns in the game.

Nov. 26 — Jacksonville defeats Tennessee 16-13 on a last-second 38-yard field goal by Mike Hollis, ending a five-game losing streak to the Titans.

Dec. 3 — The Jaguars shut out the Browns 48-0 in the most dominating game in team history. Cleveland has only two first downs and 53 yards on offense. For the Jaguars, Fred Taylor runs for 181 yards and three TDs to pass the 1,000-yard rushing mark, Jimmy Smith surpasses 1,000 yards receiving for the fifth straight season and Mark Brunell reaches the 3,000-yard mark passing.

Dec. 17 — Fred Taylor rushes for more than 100 yards in his ninth consecutive game, tying Walter Payton for the third-longest streak in NFL history. However, the Jaguars lose on the road to the Bengals 17-14 after allowing 10 points in the final 1:15 of the game.

Dec. 23 — The Jaguars lose their season finale 28-25 to the Giants, finishing 7-9 and marking their first losing season since 1995.





2001

Jan. 12 — Bob Petrino, who had been the team's quarterbacks coach the previous two seasons, is promoted to offensive coordinator.

Feb. 6 — Gary Moeller is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dom Capers, who became head coach of the Houston Texans.

March 30 — The Jaguars sign quarterback Mark Brunell to a new four-year contract.

Sept. 16 — The NFL postpones all games for the weekend due to the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington D.C.

Dec. 9 — The Jaguars win at Cincinnati, only their second victory in 11 games. Jimmy Smith surpasses 1,000 yards receiving for the sixth straight season, only the fifth player in NFL history to do so.

Dec. 16 — The Jaguars play their final AFC Central Division game, defeating the Cleveland Browns 15-10 in a game marred by bottle throwing in the final minutes. The Jaguars' intradivision record in the AFC Central closes out at 39-23.

Dec. 23 — The Jaguars defeat the Minnesota Vikings in the Metrodome, completing a sweep of three road victories in three consecutive weeks, a first in the NFL since 1997. Jimmy Smith gets his 100th reception of the season, making him one of only six players in NFL history to do so twice.

2002

Jan. 6 — The Jaguars complete their seventh season with a 6-10 record, losing six games in the final five minutes and 13 seconds.

Feb. 18 — OT Tony Boselli and DTs Gary Walker and Seth Payne are selected in the expansion draft by the Houston Texans.

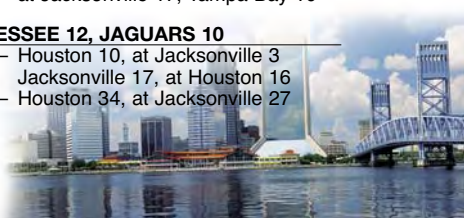

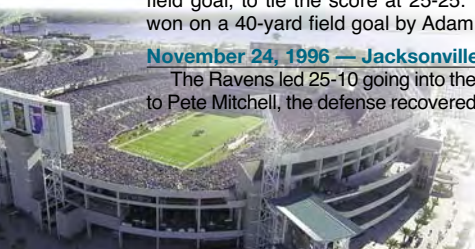

September 22, 1996 — at New England 28, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard receptions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led 25-10 going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie





Jackson six plays later, and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Ravens fumbled, and Jacksonville drove down the field, with Mike Hollis winning the game with a 34-yard field goal.

October 26, 1997 — at Pittsburgh 23, Jacksonville 17

The Jaguars took a 10-0 lead into the second half, but Pittsburgh came back to take a 14-10 fourth-quarter lead. After a Brunell TD pass to Pete Mitchell, the Jaguars took a 17-14 lead. The Steelers scored a 19-yard field goal at the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

October 29, 2000 — Jacksonville 23, at Dallas 17

The Jaguars ended a five-game losing streak with a 23-17 overtime road victory over the Cowboys, with Alvis Whitted scoring on a 37-yard pass from Mark Brunell on the first series of overtime for his second touchdown of the game. Brunell threw for three TDs and tied a team record for passing accuracy, as he completed 20 of 24 passes. Kyle Brady caught 10 of those passes for 134 yards, as he eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the second straight week.

November 14, 2004 — at Jacksonville 23, Detroit 17

The Jaguars continued their dramatic play with a 23-17 overtime win over the Detroit Lions at Aflac Stadium. David Garrard started his first game since 2002 in place of injured Byron Leftwich and led the team with 198 yards passing and two touchdowns. Jimmy Smith caught the game-winning 36-yard touchdown pass from Garrard in overtime. The Lions erased a 17-3 fourth-quarter lead with two Eddie Drummond touchdown returns.

September 25, 2005 — Jacksonville 26, at New York Jets 20

The Jaguars defeated the New York Jets 26-20 on a game-winning 36-yard touchdown pass from Byron Leftwich to Jimmy Smith at the Meadowlands. Both teams began the overtime with interceptions and after forcing the Jets to punt on their third drive, Leftwich threw 36-yards for the game-winner.

October 16, 2005 — Jacksonville 23, at Pittsburgh 17

The Jaguars defeated the Steelers 23-17 in Pittsburgh on a dramatic 41-yard interception return for a touchdown by Rashean Mathis in overtime. The Jaguars improved to 4-2 and won their second overtime game of the season. The Steelers won the toss and Quincy Morgan returned the kick-off 74 yards. On third down Maddox fumbled the snap and Reggie Hayward recovered the ball for Jacksonville. The Jaguars stalled on offense and Chris Hanson recorded his team record-tying ninth punt of the game. Two plays later Mathis ended the game with his interception.

The Jaguars could not recover, as they had three turnovers in the last 16 minutes of the game. Tennessee scored once in the fourth quarter for the 33-14 final score.

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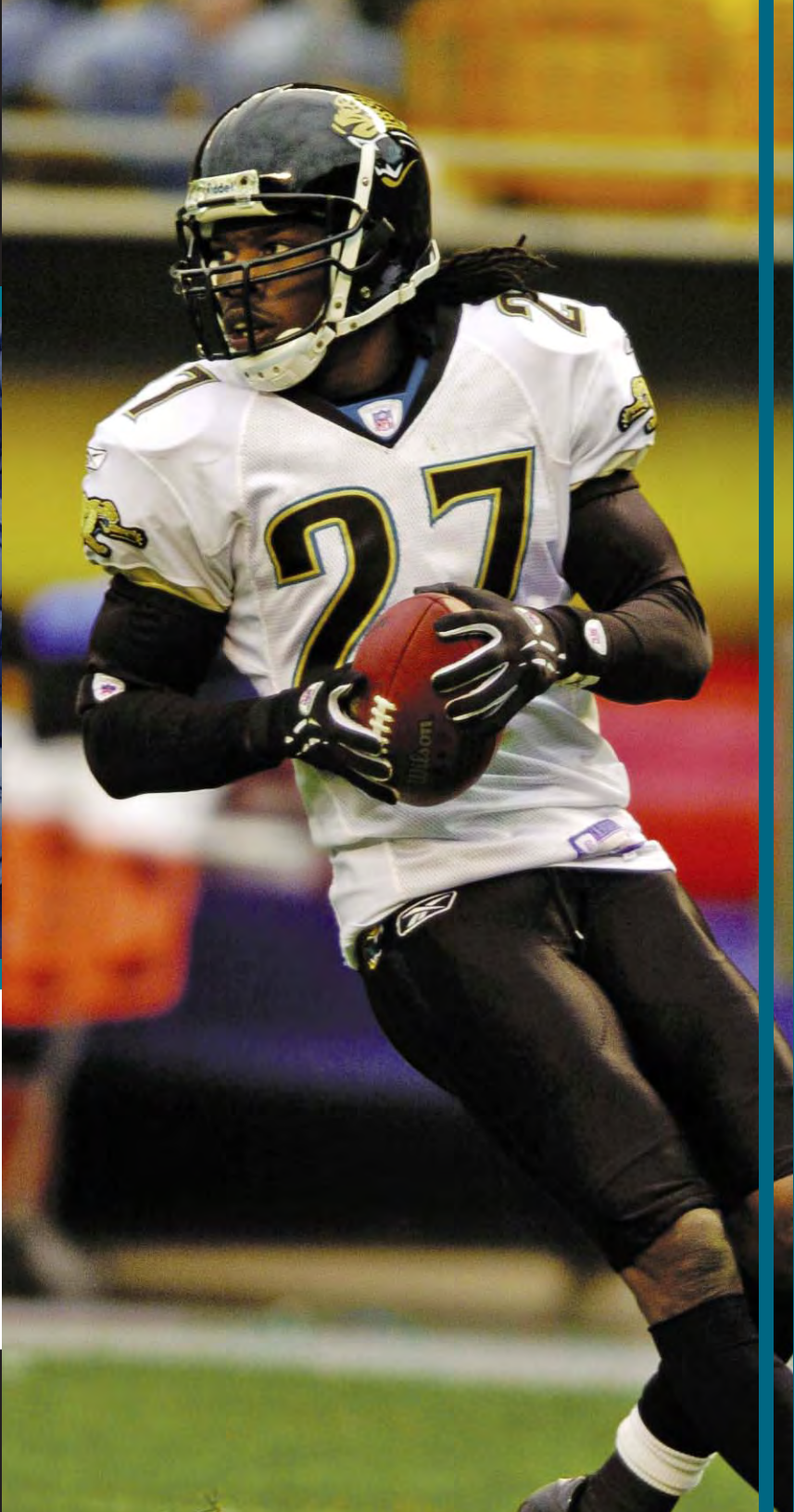

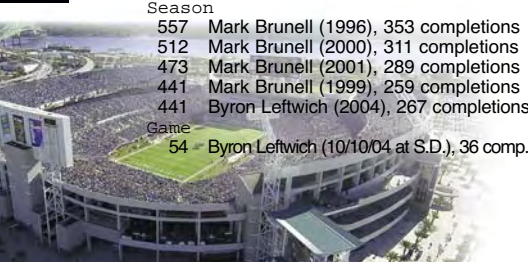

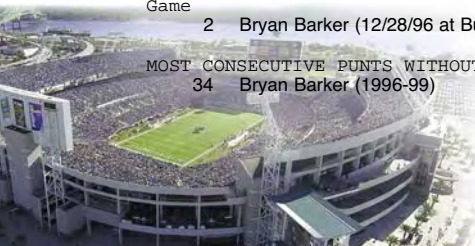

Community outreach plays an important role in the goals of the organization with players, coaches and front office staff involved in appearances; charitable donations and outreach programs with non-profit and community groups. The team's Community Relations Department manages a broad scope of this support, including player involvement; NFL outreach and recognition programs; corporate partner programs; youth football; and other programs. Over 2,500 organizations are assisted annually through the Department's programs and services.

FOOD DRIVE

Since the team's inception in 1995, the Jaguars have organized an annual holiday food drive each fall in conjunction with the Lutheran Social Services Second Harvest Food Bank.

Jaguars staff, players and coaches' wives along with players, cheerleaders and the team mascot volunteer to support this community-wide effort, which culminates with a food collection on game day at Alltel Stadium.

NFL TUESDAY

Our players

recognize the effect they have on the people who they come in contact with. While Tuesdays are generally the only day off for our players during the regular season; it doesn't stop most NFL players from using the day to go to work in their communities.



GATORADE JUNIOR TRAINING CAMP

The Jacksonville Jaguars Gatorade Junior Training camp is a free, year round, grass roots program; which is run by the Jaguars for elementary school kids between the ages of 6 and 12.

Gatorade Junior Training Camp is a program which features educational benefits along with recreational benefits in a safe and fun environment while at the same time puts an emphasis on fun for the day instead of winning and testing skills.

The Jaguars in partnership with several corporate partners identify and host small groups of children for a special day during the team's annual training camp held during the summer on the Jaguars Practice Fields at Alltel Stadium.



HABIJAX

Wayne and Delores Weaver, Jaguars staff, players and cheerleaders volunteer each spring during the homebuilding blitz to offer a hand to those less fortunate who are willing to work and make the commitment of home ownership a reality.

HabiJax is the largest affiliate homebuilder within the Habitat for Humanity organization and continues to make progress through the tireless efforts of countless volunteers and the Delores Barr Weaver Golf Tournament; which has sponsored 62 houses rep-



representing a cash contribution in excess of \$2.1 million since its inception in 1996.

Friends of Habijax; founded by Delores in 2001; the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars together have sponsored 147 houses which represents a contribution of almost \$5.5 million. Delores says "Habijax builds houses and families build homes." Each year; members of the Jaguars front office; The ROAR cheerleaders and players get together for a day of building.



HOMETOWN HUDDLE

Each fall; the Jaguars partner with the United Way of Northeast Florida for a hands-on community service project called Hometown Huddle. The seventh annual Hometown Huddle took place last fall where four Jaguars players delivered the message You can Succeed; Achieve and Accomplish! Terry Cousin; Nick Sorensen; Jamie Winborn and Joe Zelenka; along with ROAR Cheerleaders took this encouraging message to two schools in Duval County as part of this special NFL-wide day of service that provides NFL players from each team the opportunity to take part in a variety of community-service activities.

JAGUARS READERS

This is a special reading program at local elementary schools supported by Jaguars front office staff since 1997. Staff volunteers commit to spend an hour each week at the school where students read some of their favorite books.

HOSPITAL VISITS

Players on any given Tuesday led by long snapper Joe Zelenka make several visits to Wolfson Children's Hospital to meet with kids; sign autographs or to push the Wolfie Cart; a special cart that nurses take around to all the children's rooms containing items such as candy; soft drinks; books; balloons; and stuffed animals. You name it; this cart has it.



JAGUARS COACH OF THE WEEK

Since 1996; the Jaguars have recognized the hard work; dedication and selflessness of area high school coaches in Northeast Florida and in 2003 the Jaguars partnered with the Jacksonville Quarterback Club. Ten weekly winners are chosen during the high school season and each winner is awarded a plaque and \$1;000 for his school. During the final regular season home game; the Coach of the Year is announced at the 50-yard line in a pre-game ceremony. The coach of the year winner receives \$2;000.



JAGUARS ROOKIE CLUB FOOTBALL CAMP

In June of 2003 the Jaguars established the "Rookie Club" for all incoming rookies to assist in the transition from college to the NFL. In 2005; this rookie club held a "Got Skills" football clinic sponsored by Winn Dixie for 200 youths in the Jacksonville area. This clinic was held on the practice fields at Aflac stadium and included instruction; gift bags; autographs and food.

JUNIOR COMMUNITY QUARTERBACK AWARD

Through the Junior Community Quarterback Award; high school and college students are encouraged to apply for grants of \$1;000-\$5;000 to help finance a student-initiated project focused on community betterment. In 2005; six high school and college volunteers represent the spirit of excellence among our local youth; providing significant volunteer leadership in volunteer projects at local non-profit organizations.



NFL TACKLING HUNGER

Campbell Soup Company and the NFL have been working together to tackle hunger across the country since 1997; generating millions of pounds of soup can donations to food banks in NFL communities.





PRACTICE LIKE THE PROS

In 2004 the Jaguars introduced a program called "Practice Like the Pros" which gave six NFL Flag and six Pop Warner teams a chance to practice on the Jaguars' practice fields during training camp. Teams held practices prior to the Jaguars night practices and were invited to stay and watch practice from a covered area and receive autographs from Jaguars players following practice. Last season 16 teams participated in the program.



OPERATION BLESSING

For the past seven years the Jaguars and Operation Blessing International have partnered to bring Operation Blessing to families living on Jacksonville's Eastside. Each November Jaguars players, led by SS Donovin Darius and over 250 Washovia & Winn-Dixie Store volunteers, off-load truckloads of groceries and distribute non-perishable food items donated by growers, food processors and manufacturers that support Operation Blessing International. Since its inception over 21,000 families



have been served.

PLAYS FOR A PURPOSE PROGRAM

The second season of the "Plays for a Purpose" program kicked off during the 2005 season. In 2004, the Jaguars Community Relations Department created this season-long player performance pledge program to help raise money for non-profit organizations in the Jacksonville community based on the players' on-field performance.

Eight local not-for-profit organizations were selected and "placed" with one of eight Jaguars position groups. Jaguars players hand picked local organizations and regularly visited their facilities to lend a hand in support. The program provided a unique way for small businesses or individuals to financially support their favorite local charities. At the end of the 2005 season, a grand total of \$120,281 was raised, surpassing the inaugural year's grand year total by more than \$40,000.

TASTE OF THE NFL

Branching out from the national event held every year at the Super Bowl, Jacksonville is one of several NFL cities which have launched a local Taste of the NFL dinner to help raise awareness in the fight against hunger. Since our inception in 2003, over \$245,000 has been raised for LSS Second Harvest Food Bank.



POP WARNER JUNIOR JAGUARS BOWL

Since 1996, the Jaguars have sponsored the Pop Warner Junior Jaguars Bowl at Aflac Stadium in cooperation with the Greater Jacksonville Pop Warner Association. Thousands of players, cheerleaders and families have enjoyed the fun and spirit of this bowl game format. Participants (8-14 years old) must sign a pledge card with their parents and make a commitment not to use tobacco, alcohol or illegal drugs in order to be involved. The Jaguars have awarded approximately 1,200 tickets to Jaguars home games each fall to Pop Warner youth and coaches as part of the program. The Junior Jaguars Bowl is a three-day event which includes a host party Friday night at the Pepsi Plaza; games played at seven area sites on Saturday and a chance to attend a Jaguars regular season game on Sunday. More than 90 teams participate each year from states as far away as Indiana, Pennsylvania and North Carolina.



SHOP WITH A JAGUARS

The Jacksonville Jaguars and DICK'S Sporting Goods teamed up in 2005 to present the First Annual Shop with a Jaguars. This program is designed to bring holiday joy to children from various community agencies in Jacksonville.



ALLTEL STADIUM



On August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its first season in a new stadium or arena. Not only that, but it was built faster than any major-league stadium had ever been built in North America.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new stadium arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just seconds before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." For its 10th year of operation, Alltel Stadium was the host site of Super Bowl XXXIX, the biggest single-day sporting event in the world.

To ensure that Jacksonville has the finest venue in the NFL, Alltel Stadium underwent a \$63 million renovation. Among the additions were the Terrace Suite, a 25,000-square-foot sports bar called the Bud Zone, a 20,000-square-foot Patio, 20 new escalators and four new elevators, a new secure perimeter fence around the stadium, two new state of the art scoreboards, and newly renovated clubs and suites.

The practice fields that were used from 1995 through 2003 are now a 400,000-square-foot entertainment zone

adjacent to the stadium, known as the Pepsi Plaza. For Jaguars game days, this area includes tailgate cabanas for pregame hospitality, a corporate hospitality area, interactive games, and a stage for pregame and postgame entertainment.

Alltel Stadium signature features include the two Crown Royal Touchdown Clubs, which are located on both sides of the stadium. The Crown Royal Touchdown Clubs and all 10,000 club seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club provides more than 70,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in Alltel Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

Alltel Stadium seats 67,164, but additional temporary seats were added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity to well over 82,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game and Super Bowl XXXIX.

In 1997, Jacksonville Municipal Stadium was re-named Alltel Stadium after the Little Rock, Ark.-based wireless telecommunications and information services company that is listed in Forbes 500 and Fortune 500. Revenue from the 10-year grant of naming rights is shared equally between the Jaguars and the city of Jacksonville.





RADIO BROADCASTERS

Original Jaguars defensive end Jeff Lageman joined the Jaguars Radio Network team in 2003 and pairs with Brian Sexton on all Jaguars games. Lageman handles color analysis on radio for his fourth year, while Sexton continues calling play-by-play.

Sexton, 37, returns for his 12th season as the "Voice of the Jaguars." He has called every game in the Jaguars 11 years and is one of just a handful of observers and the only media member who has witnessed every Jaguars game played. He is one of 18 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Sexton anchors the Jaguars Radio Network's coverage on game day and is also the host of 'The Jack Del Rio Show' on Tuesdays and 'Jaguars This Week' on Wednesdays on the Jaguars flagship radio station (690 WOKV). He also serves as the Jaguars lead TV personality hosting 'The Jack Del Rio Show' and 'The Coggin Pre-game Show' on Sunday mornings prior to kickoff, as well as 'THE Jaguars Show' on Monday evenings, all on WTEV. Additionally he provides commentary and insight on jaguars.com. Sexton has broadcast NFL Europe games for FOX Sports for two seasons including a game with Jaguars tight end Kyle Brady. In 2000 he was a contestant on the highly rated ABC-TV show 'Who Wants to Be A Millionaire?' walking away with \$32,000. In 2002 he was named one of the Jacksonville Business Journal's 'Forty Under Forty' as one of the community's up and coming young leaders. He has become an active and visible part of the Northeast Florida community as a speaker, volunteer and goodwill ambassador. He serves on the Boards of Directors for the United Way of Northeast Florida, The Ronald McDonald House, and Daniel Inc. 2006-07 will mark his

third consecutive year as the Leadership Giving Chairman on the United Way's Campaign Cabinet. An Eagle Scout, he's also active with the Boy Scouts in Northeast and Central Florida and the Diocese of St. Augustine. He and his wife Jennifer live in Atlantic Beach with their sons, Keegan, Rian and Kolbe.

Lageman, 39, played for the Jaguars from 1995 to '98 and was the team's first captain. He started 37 of 40 games played in the Jaguars' first four seasons, making 175 tackles and 12.5 sacks. His final year was ended in the season opener because of a torn right biceps. In 10 NFL seasons, including his first six with the New York Jets, Lageman played in 122 games, making 118 starts. He was a first-round draft choice of the Jets in 1989, the 14th player selected overall. After his retirement he joined the Jaguars' preseason TV booth as color analyst for the 1999 to 2002 preseasons. Lageman also called NFL regular-season games for Fox Sports from 1999 to 2001. He is a co-host of the "Jaguars This Week" radio show along with Sexton and Vic Ketchman on Wednesday nights on WOKV. He also continues as co-host of "THE Jaguars Show" on television along with Sexton. For the last eight years, Lageman has been co-host/co-owner of "The Outdoor Show" aired Saturday mornings on WOKV. Since 1996, he has been honorary chairman of the Children's Miracle Network, and is a board member of the Georgia Sheriff's Boy's Home in Hahira, Ga. Lageman and his wife, Misti, live in Jacksonville with their six-year-old son, Dylan.

Also part of the game day team are Cole Pepper and Vic Ketchman on the pregame show, and Pepper with former Oakland Raiders star Pete Banaszak on the postgame show.

PRESEASON TELEVISION

Three of the Jaguars' preseason games in 2006 will be telecast locally in Jacksonville on WTEV Channel 47 (cable Ch. 6), with the game against Tampa Bay on Saturday, August 26 nationally telecast on CBS.

A new broadcast team will make its first appearance this preseason. FOX broadcaster Curt Menefee will call the play-by-play and former Jaguars Pro Bowler Tony Boselli will be the Jaguars' preseason color analyst.

Boselli, 34, was the first draft pick of the Jaguars and played in 91 career games with 90 starts in his six seasons in Jacksonville. He holds the team record with five consecutive Pro Bowl starts. Boselli will begin his first season in the broadcast booth for the Jaguars after spending time as a local Jacksonville radio personality.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: Credential requests are honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials are not issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. Independent web sites cannot be credentialed. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Vice President of Communications and Media, Jacksonville Jaguars, One Alltel Stadium Place, Jacksonville, FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked in the TV truck compound near Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the media will-call window at Gate 1. The Media Will Call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance in the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in a room off the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. High speed internet access, phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information is available.

JACK DEL RIO INTERVIEWS: Head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his weekly news conference on Mondays in the media workroom. He is not available on Tuesdays, but is available to the media on Wednesdays and Fridays.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. Players are available on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance to schedule.
