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JAGUARS FINISH SECOND SEASON IN AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The Jacksonville Jaguars finished their Cinderella second season one game short of the Super Bowl ... but what a super season it was!

Here are just a few of the milestones reached by the Jaguars in 1996:

- Won a team-record 11 games
- Became the NFL's first second-year team ever to win two playoff games
- Were the only NFL team to win a playoff game on the road (and did it twice)
- Finished with an 11-8 record (9-7 in the regular season and 2-1 in the playoffs)
- Won seven consecutive games for the first time ever
- Won four consecutive road games, a team record
- Went 8-2 after their bye week on November 3, the best mark in the AFC in that time
- Scored 60 points in the first two playoff games against Buffalo and Denver — the most ever by a team in its first two postseason games (includes all teams, not just expansion teams).
- Became the first team ever to beat the Buffalo Bills at Rich Stadium in the playoffs
- Became only the second team to defeat the Denver Broncos at Mile High Stadium in the playoffs.

Jacksonville's 30-27 victory over Denver is widely acknowledged as the biggest upset in pro football history since the New York Jets beat the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl III.

That means in three NFL seasons, the Jaguars will have played 24 of the league's 29 other teams. After the 1997 season, the Jaguars will have not played the following five teams: AFC — Miami Dolphins, San Diego Chargers; NFC — Arizona Cardinals, Minnesota Vikings and San Francisco 49ers.

1996 IN REVIEW: In 1996, the Jacksonville Jaguars matured from a struggling second-year franchise into one of the elite teams in the NFL, advancing to the conference championship game in a way that surprised skeptics and fans alike. The Jaguars went 9-7 during the regular season, qualifying for the playoffs on the final weekend of play. They then became the first second-year franchise ever to win a playoff game, and they won two postseason contests — both on the road. They won their final five games of the regular season in a playoff run that seemed preposterous at first and more and more probable as the season wended down. A team that went 14 months without winning consecutive games and 13 months without winning on the road suddenly rattled off seven straight victories — four away from home.

QB Mark Brunell turned into the NFL's hottest — and certainly most exciting — quarterback in the final two months of the season, as he led the NFL in passing yardage. RB Natrone Means came off the bench in the final month of the season, improving his rushing totals each week until he was amassing 100-yard games three weeks in a row. Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith turned into one of the best receiving tandems in pro football, as both gained over 1,000 yards.

Defensively, the Jaguars more than doubled their sack total from their inaugural season, pulling down opposing quarterbacks 37 times. The defense was a molding of youth and experience. Returning veterans DE Jeff Lageman, CB Mickey Washington and DT Don Davey joined with DE Clyde Simmons, DT John Jurkovic and S Dana Hall and combined with rookies OLB Kevin Hardy, DE Tony Brackens and CB Aaron Beasley to give Jacksonville one of the sturdiest corps in the NFL. None of the seven victories were by more than seven points, proving the value of a defense that couldn't afford to let up big plays.

Placekicker Mike Hollis scored in every game and set team records for points (117), field goals (30) and extra points (27). His 83.3 percent accuracy ranked third in the AFC.

The 1996 season began with a 24-9 victory at home over the defending AFC Champion Pittsburgh Steelers, marking the second straight year the Jaguars have defeated Pittsburgh in Jacksonville. Three losses followed, to Houston, Oakland and New England, although all three games were decided in the final three minutes of play — a portent of things to come in the following weeks. The Carolina Panthers came to Jacksonville on the final weekend of September and the Jaguars handed a 24-14 loss to their 1995 expansion brethren.

In 1995, October was the month in which the Jaguars won three of their four games on the season. In 1996, October turned out to be a month of misery and heartbreak. A loss at New Orleans was followed by a narrow home victory over the New York Jets. Then came a date with the St. Louis Rams, in which the Jaguars' offense seemingly rolled down the field at will, only to come to a crashing halt. Brunell threw five interceptions in that game, all of them inside of the Rams' 15-yard line and one leading to a 92-yard interception return for a touchdown. A fumbled kickoff also led to a Rams' TD. The Jaguars still had a chance to tie the game in the final seconds, but the clock expired with Jacksonville on the St. Louis five-yard line. The following week, the Jaguars lost at Cincinnati after allowing three fourth-quarter TDs. A bye week was much needed, though nobody could have guessed what was to follow after a 4-7 start.

The Baltimore Ravens came to town on November 10 and left with a 30-27 loss. The Jaguars traveled to Pittsburgh and had their most decisive loss of the season, 28-3, although turnovers led to three Pittsburgh touchdowns. The following weekend, with the Baltimore Ravens up 27-11 and the season slowly fading, the Jaguars put on a rush that would be reminiscent of the remainder of the season. They scored two touchdowns and two two-point conversions and then won the game in overtime with a Mike Hollis field goal. Victories over Cincinnati and Houston followed and the suddenly-on-a-roll Jaguars were 7-7 and in the middle of the playoff race.

The country's football fans had their first real chance to see the Jaguars play on the night of December 15 when they hosted the Seattle Seahawks in front of an ESPN national TV audience. Three fourth-quarter scores gave the Jaguars a 20-13 victory, but two TD passes from Brunell to Smith and a spectacular game by rookie Tony Brackens showed the nation that the Jacksonville Jaguars were not just any second-year franchise. Brackens had an interception, a sack, 12 tackles and three tipped passes in the game.

In the season finale, the Jaguars just had to win and they were in the playoffs. A 19-17 victory over the Atlanta Falcons was ensured with four seconds left in the game when Morten Andersen missed a 30-yard field goal attempt. People called the Jaguars lucky, but the coming playoffs were to prove they were indeed worthy.

The Jaguars traveled to Buffalo on the last weekend of December and became the first second-year NFL franchise ever to play in the postseason. After their 30-27 victory, they left town as the first second-year team ever to win a playoff game and the first ever to beat the Bills in Rich Stadium in the playoffs. Natrone Means rushed for 175 yards and one TD and Clyde Simmons scored on the return of an intercepted shovel pass, while Brunell passed and ran through the stunned Buffalo defense.

A week later, the Jaguars went to Denver, where the Broncos had lost only once in the postseason. Again, Jacksonville won 30-27. But the victory was such a tremendous surprise that it was being called the greatest upset in the NFL since Super Bowl III, 18 years earlier. Brunell had one of his greatest games against Denver, as he passed for 245 yards and two scores and scrambled for 44 yards.

The season finally came to an end in New England, as the Jaguars were defeated by the Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. What had haunted the Jaguars in the first half of the season — turnovers and a lack of big plays — but had seemingly disappeared during the seven-game streak, came back once again. Four turnovers and no plays longer than 15 yards halted the Jaguars offense, while two big miscues on special teams were too much to overcome. The season ended one game short of the Super Bowl, but it was still a super season indeed.

1996 STATS AND SUCH: The Jaguars scored 33 touchdowns and kicked 30 field goals during the 1996 season, both team records. They scored 31 TDs and kicked 20 field goals in 1995. Their 19 TD passes tied the team record set in '95. ... The Jaguars had at least one play of 30-plus yards in 14 of their 16 games this year after doing so in only seven games in 1995. They had 26 plays which gained 30-plus yards after totaling only 12 30-plus plays in 1995. ... Three players had at least one reception in every regular-season game — WRs Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith and TE Pete Mitchell. Mitchell's active streak of 25 games with a reception leads the team, with Smith's string of 24 ranking second. ... The Jaguars outscored their opponents in the third (80-65) and fourth quarters (94-80) and were outscored in the first (68-70) and second (80-117) quarters. ... In two seasons, the Jaguars are 2-7 in September, 4-5 in October, 2-4 in November and 5-3 in December. ... Four offensive players started all 16 games during the regular season (QB Mark Brunell, G Ben Coleman and OTs Tony Boselli and Leon Searcy). On defense, two players started every game: CB Mickey Washington and FS Chris Hudson.

JAGUARS AMONG THE LEAGUE LEADERS: In the 1996 regular season, the Jaguars ranked second in the NFL in offense and 16th in defense. Only six other teams can claim statistical rankings higher than Jacksonville — Denver (first in offense and fourth in defense), Green Bay (fifth in offense and first in defense), Philadelphia (fourth in offense and fifth in defense), San Francisco (sixth in offense and seventh in defense), Pittsburgh (15th in offense and second in defense) and Oakland (eighth in both offense and defense). ... The Jaguars led the NFL in passing with 4,110 net yards, an average of 256.9 per game, and they had 5,760 total yards on offense, 360.0 a game. They allowed 5,204 yards, 325.3 per game (111.3 rushing and 207.1 passing). ... With 325 first downs, the Jaguars ranked sixth in the NFL. Their 41.8 third-down conversion percentage tied for sixth best in the league. ... Mark Brunell ranked fourth in the AFC and seventh in the NFL in passing with a 84.0 passer rating. His 4,367 passing yards led the NFL and was 190 yards ahead of Baltimore's Vinny Testaverde, who ranked second. Brunell's completion percentage of 63.4 led the AFC and was third best in the NFL. ... Mike Hollis was fifth in the conference and 10th in the NFL among kickers with 117 points. His field goal percentage of 83.3 (30 of 36) was third best in the conference and ninth in the league. ... James Stewart, who missed almost all of the last four games with a toe injury, tied for eighth in the AFC and 14th in the NFL with 10 TDs. Stewart was also 13th in the AFC in rushing with 723 yards. ... Keenan McCardell tied for fourth in the AFC and 11th in the league with 85 receptions, and Jimmy Smith was seventh in the conference with 83 catches. Smith's 1,244 yards receiving led the AFC and was third best in the NFL. McCardell was sixth in the AFC and 12th in the NFL with 1,129 yards. Smith was eighth in the AFC in total yards, and McCardell was 14th. ... Bryan Barker was 10th in the conference with a 35.6-yard net punting average. ... Chris Hudson was fifth in the conference and 10th in the NFL with a 10.9-yard punt return average. ... DE Clyde Simmons tied for 14th in the AFC with 7.5 sacks.

COMING ON STRONG . . . From November 10 until the end of the season, the Jaguars had the second-best record in the NFL behind only their expansion brethren Carolina. The only two games the Jaguars lost in the last two months were at Pittsburgh and at New England in the AFC Championship game. They defeated Baltimore (twice), Cincinnati, Houston, Seattle and Atlanta in the regular season and Buffalo and Denver in the playoffs.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR MAKES? In 1996, the Jaguars won nine games, five more than they won in their inaugural season of 1995, when they finished 4-12. There are major statistical differences between 1995 and 1996. Here is how the Jaguars rank this season as compared to 1995.

JAGUARS INJURY REPORT: Injured against in the AFC Championship game were: RB Natrone Means (sprained right ankle), TE Rich Griffith (sprained left ankle) and QB Mark Brunell (bruised hand), though none of the injuries were serious. Six players finished the season on the Injured Reserve list, although all will be ready for the team's offseason conditioning program that begins in March. The six players are: DT Andre Davis (broken ankle), LB Nate Dingle (Achilles), S John Fisher (broken ankle), LB Bryan Schwartz (knee), DE Joel Smeenge (broken jaw) and CB Dave Thomas (broken leg).

LAST GAME: The Jaguars were defeated by the New England Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. It marked the second game all season that the Jaguars did not score a touchdown and their 289 yards on offense was their fourth-least of the season. The Patriots scored 17 of their 20 points after miscues by the Jaguars (bad snap on a punt, fumbled punt return and a fumble returned for a TD). The New England offense gained only 234 yards, its fourth-lowest output of the year, as the Patriots had fewer yards rushing (73 to 101) and passing (161 to 188) than the Jaguars and had the ball less time (25:17 to Jacksonville's 34:43). The Jaguars also turned the ball over four times, the most since their seven-game winning streak began on November 24.

NOTES FROM THE PATRIOTS GAME: The temperature at kickoff was 27 degrees (0 wind chill), making it the coldest game the Jaguars have ever played. ... The Jaguars' 6 points was their fewest since their last loss, which was 28-3 at Pittsburgh on November 17. ... The Jaguars converted 5 of their 14 third-down plays (36%), while New England converted just 2 of 13 third-down plays (15%) — the worst percentage ever by a team against Jacksonville in two years. Jacksonville also had 18 first downs to New England's 13. ... Natrone Means rushed 19 times for 43 yards (2.3 average) and sustained a sprained ankle. James Stewart gained 40 yards on 7 carries, his best outing since November 17. ... Mark Brunell completed 20 of 38 passes for 190 yards, only the second time all season he threw for fewer than 200 yards in a game. ... Pete Mitchell led the Jaguars with 7 catches for 63 yards, while Keenan McCardell had 6 receptions for 62 yards. ... Mike Hollis kicked two field goals in two attempts and scored all six points for the Jaguars. ... OLB Eddie Robinson led the team with 12 tackles (8 solo), followed by MLB Tom McManus with 10 tackles (7 solo). CB Aaron Beasley had the team's only interception, which was his first in a playoff game. DT Don Davey made one sack and Robinson and DE Clyde Simmons had half a sack each. ... The only players who dressed but did not play were QB Rob Johnson, C Michael Cheever and G Jeff Novak. Inactive were: QB Todd Philcox, C/G Greg Huntington, OT Jimmy Herndon, FB Chris Griffin, WR Kendrick Bullard, WR Curtis Marsh, DE Ernie Logan and DE Jose White. ... Jaguars captains were OT Tony Boselli, OT Leon Searcy, WR Keenan McCardell, DE Jeff Lageman, DE Clyde Simmons and CB Mickey Washington.

FROM COACH TOM COUGHLIN: "The very thing that brought us (to the AFC Championship game), the quality of our play, left us in the New England game. We turned the ball over and we didn't make enough plays. Our defense played outstanding, and we certainly had our opportunities. Errors cost us the football game, and there isn't any denying that fact. We had a legitimate opportunity to win the game. We scored 30 points in the first two playoff games and I kept thinking that, at some point, we'd break loose and make some plays."

"I'm very proud of our football team and what it accomplished during the season. It's important for our football team to realize that only one team feels good about itself at the end of the year, and the rest of us go home and try to figure out a way to be that one team. I told the players that from this point on we have to resolve to come back and not get beat in the AFC Championship game next year but to go on to the Super Bowl. We're a pretty good football team. We're not all the way there yet, but we're working toward that and we look forward to making ourselves a better team in 1997."

"We won seven straight football games. Over the course of those seven games, some great things happened and we began to play real good solid football. Those are the things that we're going to take away from this season. The first half of our season was marred by inconsistencies. Special teams would have a bad game, the offense would have a bad game, and everyone wasn't playing well together. There were too many turnovers and not enough big plays, and that also plagued us again against New England. But the first half of the season was also a time of trying to discover who we were and from the bye (week) on, I think we found out who we were and I think we have a lot to be excited about here. I'm very, very proud of our players who stood up for what they believed in and who refused to be affected by the outside factors, the media, everybody telling us we weren't a very good football team, and they just took a stand and made something happen. And, as we accumulated wins, more and more people became aware of what was being accomplished here in Jacksonville. Our city became alive again with football and with the Jaguars. The playoff run was certainly an exciting time, and we'll always remember the 40,000 people in the stands at our stadium at 1:30 in the morning following the Denver game."

FROM QB MARK BRUNELL: "The Patriots were aggressive, and they certainly outplayed us. We had some opportunities that we didn't take advantage of. This loss is going to bother me, but looking back over the season, I'm proud of our accomplishments and how far we've come. We did a lot of good things this season. We grew a lot as the season went on. To come from a 3-6 record at one point and go to the AFC Championship game is quite an accomplishment. I know I improved over the course of the season. I had some good games and some not-so-good games. There's still room for improvement in a lot of areas. That's what the offseason is for. Our franchise has a bright future and we'll be here (in the AFC Championship game) again."

FROM OT LEON SEARCY: "We're going home earlier than we wanted to. Right now I want this to hurt, I want this to sting, so during the offseason I will know what to dedicate myself to and do what I have to do to help this team win. I won't reflect on what we did in the past. We came so close and didn't come away with a victory, and that's very disappointing. The way we lost — coming so far but not getting to the big show — should inspire the younger guys to do whatever it takes this offseason to make another run at it. I think there's going to be a shift of power in the AFC. We're a team to be reckoned with. We just have to keep doing the things that got us to this point. Everybody will have to be totally dedicated to what we want to accomplish next year."

FROM WR KEENAN MCCARDELL: "We were one of the four teams that were playing for the Super Bowl. I've told some of the younger guys to remember what this taste is — feel it — because we can be back here. Next year maybe we can have this game in Jacksonville. We're a young team. This game was a big stepping stone for us."

FROM RB NATRONE MEANS: "We'll take some time off and have a chance to get over the loss and then reflect on the season and we'll see that we did some good things this year. We definitely have something to build on."

BRUNELL, PART I: In 1996, Jaguars QB Mark Brunell led the NFL in passing yards (4,367) and led all quarterbacks in rushing yards (396), becoming the first quarterback since Baltimore's Johnny Unitas in 1963 to lead the NFL in both categories. Unitas had 3,481 yards passing and 224 yards rushing (tied with Cleveland's Frank Ryan).

BRUNELL, PART II: In 1996, Jaguars QB Mark Brunell moved into 13th place on the list of most yards passing in a single season in NFL history. He threw for 4,367 yards, an average of 272.9 yards per game.

THE BIG TWO IS NUMBER TWO: Jacksonville's two starting wide receivers — Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith — combined for the second-most receptions (tied) and second-most yards of any team's top two wideouts. McCardell and Smith caught a combined 168 passes for 2,373 yards this season.

However, McCardell and Smith started a total of only 24 games between them this season, with Smith starting only nine times. He moved into the starting role after the November 18th release of Andre Rison (he started four games earlier in the season as the third wide receiver in multiple-receiver formations).

With 85 catches for 1,129 yards, McCardell, who was the first Jaguar to be named to the Pro Bowl, set team and personal records for most receptions in a season and a career-high in receiving yardage. Of his 85 catches, 57 went for first downs. McCardell caught at least one pass in all 16 games this season.

Since replacing Rison in the starting lineup, Smith had three 100-yard receiving games in five starts and he set career single-game highs for receptions (8 on Nov. 24 at Baltimore and again on Dec. 15 against Seattle) and yards (162 on 7 catches on Dec. 1 vs. Cincinnati). The first receiver signed by the Jaguars (February 28, 1995) after spending the 1994 season out of the NFL, Smith has caught at least one pass in 27 consecutive games, including postseason. For the season, he caught 83 receptions for a team-leading 1,244 yards, which led the AFC. His 29 catches on third downs were the second most in the NFL, and his seven TD receptions set a Jaguars single-season record.

McCardell and Smith were the 26th tandem to each have 1,000 receiving yards in a season. Along with Mark Brunell's 4,145 passing yards this season, it marked the 15th time in NFL history that a team had a 4,000-yard passer and two 1,000-yard receivers in the same year.

THE MEANS TO VICTORY: RB Natrone Means led the Jaguars to their two playoff victories, but he was equally a force in the team's stretch run late in the season. His highlights:

- In the playoffs, rushed for 175 yards at Buffalo and 140 yards at Denver, which are Means' two best rushing games of his four-year career.
- Had three consecutive 100-yard rushing games
- Had the 13th, 14th and 15th 100-yard rushing games of his career
- Had three consecutive 100-yard games for the first time as a Jaguar and for his first time since Sept. 10, 17 and 24, 1995 when he was with San Diego.
- Had the most rushing yards ever vs. the Buffalo Bills in a postseason game and the second-most rushing yards ever allowed by the Denver Broncos in a postseason game (only Timmy Smith's 204 yards for Washington in Super Bowl XXII bettered Means' total).
- Had the fourth most rushing yards in one postseason. Means gained 358 yards in three games, ranking fourth behind John Riggins (610 yards in 1982), Marcus Allen (466 yards in 1983) and Thurman Thomas (390 yards in 1990).
- Ranks sixth on the all-time postseason list for average yards per carry (minimum 500 yards) with an average of 4.55 (134 carries for 610 yards) behind Steve Young, Marcus Allen, Eric Dickerson, Chuck Muncie and Tony Dorsett.
- Had a season-high 6.7-yards-per-carry average (bettering his mark of 5.6 yards a week earlier vs. Buffalo) at Denver. His average-per-carry was also a personal-best for his 15 career 100-yard games.
- Had the most rushing yards ever by a player in his team's postseason debut. The previous record was held by San Diego's Paul Lowe, who ran for 165 yards in 1961.

Means led the Jaguars in rushing in each of the last eight games (including playoffs). Here's a quick look at his numbers in that time:

DON'T FORGET ABOUT STEWART: Until injuring his toe in the 12th game of the season, RB James Stewart was on pace to gain 1,000 yards for the season. For the year, Stewart led the team with 723 yards rushing. Until his injury, he was projected to gain 1,015 yards for the season. Stewart also scored 10 touchdowns (eight rushing, two receiving) in 1996, which ranked 14th in the NFL despite playing little the final four games.

Here's how Stewart compares to the four other running backs who were drafted in the first round of the 1995 draft.

SIMMONS IS BIG-PLAY MAKER: At 32, Clyde Simmons is the oldest starter on the Jaguars and the second-oldest player on the team (P Bryan Barker is five weeks older than Simmons). Simmons was noted for making big plays all season.

Simmons blocked three kicks during the season (a field goal and an extra point during the regular season and an extra point in the playoffs). That gives him 11 blocked kicks during his career (five field goals and six extra points).

In the Jaguars' first-ever playoff game on December 28 at Buffalo, Simmons scored the team's first touchdown in a play-off game when he ran 20 yards with an intercepted shovel pass. He has intercepted four passes during his 11-year career, and he has returned three of them for touchdowns. He also had the first 2.5 playoff sacks of his career in the 1996 postseason.

During the regular season, Simmons led the team with 7.5 sacks and ranked sixth on the team with 66 tackles. His 100.5 career sacks in the regular season ranks 13th in NFL history and ninth among active players.

McCARDELL IS A RECORD MAKER: On October 20 at St. Louis, Jaguars WR Keenan McCardell caught 16 passes for 232 yards, which ranks third in the NFL Record Book for most catches in a single game.

JUST FOR KICKS: In the seven games following the Jaguars' bye week — in which time the team won six games — Mike Hollis led the NFL with 69 points. Hollis finished the regular season with 117 points, fifth in the AFC.

And, in the Jaguars' three playoff games, Hollis scored another 30 points. Thus, in his last 10 games, Hollis scored 99 points. Here's a look at his 10-game streak:

During the regular season, Hollis made 30 field goals in 36 attempts, an 83.3% accuracy mark that ranked third in the AFC. His 30 field goals broke his team record of 20 that was set in 1995, when he was successful on 20 of 27 attempts and scored 87 points. Hollis converted 14 of his last 15 field goal attempts, and he was 28 of 32 after the bye week. He has scored in 31 of the Jaguars' 32 regular-season games, the lone exception being the 44-0 loss at Detroit in 1995, giving him a 17-game scoring streak during the regular season.

THE SACK IS BACK: The Jaguars set a team record for most sacks in a season and tied for 10th in the NFL with 37 sacks, more than double the number they had a year ago when they ranked last in the NFL with only 17 sacks. For the season, the Jaguars ranked behind Carolina (60); Pittsburgh (51); Buffalo (48); Seattle (47); Minnesota (43) San Francisco (42); New Orleans (41); Denver and Philadelphia. (40), and were tied with Miami, Dallas and Green Bay.

Clyde Simmons, who led the Jaguars with 7.5 sacks (14th in the AFC), became only the 14th player in NFL history and one of nine active players to get 100 career sacks on November 24, when he made one at Baltimore to give him 100.5 for his career. Simmons holds Jaguars records for sacks in both a single game (2.5 sacks at Cincinnati on Oct. 27) and a season (7.5). Simmons has made 154 career starts and played in 172 NFL games.

Following Simmons are the Jaguars' top two draft choices who ranked second and third among this year's rookies in sacks. DE Tony Brackens, the Jaguars' second-round draft choice, had seven sacks, second on the team and behind only Arizona's Simeon Rice, who had 12.5 sacks, among rookies. Kevin Hardy, Rice's college teammate, had 5.5 sacks for the season.

In the Jaguars' three playoff games, they made six sacks — 2.5 by Simmons, 1.5 by Eddie Robinson, 1.0 by Don Davey and 1.0 by Tony Brackens.

JAGUARS HAVE THREE OF TEN 400-, 200-, 200-YARD PERFORMANCES: This year's NFL total of 10 400-yard passing, 200-yard rushing and 200-yard receiving performances surpassed the 1995 total of seven. There were five 400-yard passing games — two by Jacksonville's Mark Brunell, one 200-yard rushing game and four 200-yard receiving games — one by Jacksonville's Keenan McCardell. Following is a list of 400-, 200-, 200-yard performances this season:

DEFENSIVELY SPEAKING: The Jaguars held three of their 16 opponents to under 200 yards in total offense in 1996, including the Pittsburgh Steelers twice.

In 1995, the Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys never held an opponent to fewer than 200 yards in a single game. In fact, the fewest yards a Cowboys opponent gained all season was 211 by the New York Giants. In the NFL in 1995, there were only 24 games in which a team was held to less than 200 yards on offense. The Houston Oilers limited five opponents to fewer than 200 yards in a game; no other team did it more than twice (and 14 teams never accomplished this feat). Here are the Jaguars' three games in which they yielded fewer than 200 yards:

The Jaguars' two field goals came after drives ended at the New Orleans' 18- and 2-yard lines, and the Jaguars also fumbled on the Saints' 1-yard line.

The Jaguars also fumbled a kickoff at their own 17-yard line. JAGUARS PLAYED WITH 23 NEW FACES IN 1996: The Jaguars' current roster includes 23 players who are new to the team (22 plus G Rich Tylski, who was on the practice squad in 1995). Of the 23 new players, 12 are veterans, 3 are first-year players and 8 are rookies. There are 29 players who were with the Jaguars for all or part of the 1995 season. Of those 29, 11 played in all 16 games last year but just 5 started all 16 games (CB Mickey Washington, DT Don Davey, G Brian DeMarco (at OT), DT Kelvin Pritchett and C Dave Widell).

Of the Jaguars' 22 starters, 10 were new to the team in 1996 (Means, Tylski, McCardell, Searcy, Simmons, Jurkovic, Robinson, Hardy, Beasley and Hall) and four were second-year players (Boselli, Stewart, McManus and Hudson).

ROSTER ANALYSIS: The Jaguars started a total of 36 players during the 1996 regular season. ... The starting lineup in the AFC Championship game included 12 free agents (8 unrestricted), 4 players from the 1995 and '96 college drafts, 3 players obtained on waivers, 2 from the 1995 expansion draft and 1 player obtained in a trade. ... The youngest player on the 53-man roster is defensive end Tony Brackens, who turned 22 on December 26. ... The roster includes 12 of the 20 players drafted by the team (six from 1995 and six from this year), 11 players signed as unrestricted free agents and just five of the 31 players selected in the 1995 expansion draft. Three other players were acquired by trade, and five others were claimed off waivers. ... Three members of the Original 10 Jaguars who signed contracts on December 15, 1994 are still with the team: RB Randy Jordan, a backup halfback who scored the first TD in franchise history last year vs. Cincinnati; DE Ernie Logan, a backup left defensive end who started one game in 1995 and tied for second on the team with three sacks; and C/G Greg Huntington, who has played in five games over two seasons. ... Three of the five current starters on the Jaguars' offensive line were selected within the first 40 picks of the NFL draft. Only center Dave Widell, the 94th player chosen in 1988, and RG Rich Tylski, who was not drafted, do not meet that standard. ... The Jaguars have eight players on their roster who were first-round selections in the college draft: DE Jeff Lageman (1989, New York Jets), DT Kelvin Pritchett (1991, Dallas Cowboys, but traded to Detroit on Draft Day), TE Derek Brown (1992, New York Giants), OT Leon Searcy (1992, Pittsburgh Steelers), S Dana Hall (1992, San Francisco 49ers), OT Tony Boselli (1995, Jacksonville Jaguars), RB James Stewart (1995, Jacksonville Jaguars), LB Kevin Hardy (1996, Jacksonville Jaguars).

JAGUARS OFFENSE ROLLED UP THE YARDS: The Jaguars gained 5,760 yards on offense in 1996 — more total yards in their second season than eight of the NFL's 29 other teams have ever gained in a season. Here's a look at the total offense record for the NFL's 30 teams.
