JAGUARS FINISH 11-5; WIN FIRST PLAYOFF GAME SINCE 1999 SEASON

TEAM 6-2 AT HOME FOR 3RD STRAIGHT YEAR

2007 IN REVIEW: The Jacksonville Jaguars advanced to the postseason for the second time in the last three seasons and won their first postseason game since the 1999 season. The Jaguars finished the regular season with a 11-5 mark, tied for the fifth-best record in the NFL, and won six of their last eight games.

Jack Del Rio completed his fifth season as head coach with a record of 45-35. The Jaguars rank sixth in the NFL since 2004 with a 40-24 mark.

RECORD-BREAKING SEASON BY OFFENSE: The Jaguars set the franchise single-season record for points (411, 25.7 avg.), touchdowns (50), touchdown passes (28) and yards per play (5.6). The Jaguars ranked seventh in the NFL in offense (357.4), tied for the second-highest ranking in franchise history. The Jaguars totaled 400-plus yards in a team-record seven games including a team-record five consecutive games, and scored 24 or more points in 10 consecutive games for the first time in team history.

2007 TEAM/INDIVIDUAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The Jaguars defense ranked 12th in the NFL (313.8) and 10th in scoring defense at 19.0 points per game. The unit held opponents to 17 points or less in 10 of 16 games, tied for the most in the NFL (New England, Green Bay, San Diego). The Jaguars tied the franchise single season record with 20 interceptions as 11 different players had interceptions.
- The Jaguars led the NFL with 33 fourth down attempts and 19 conversions, the most attempts in the NFL since 1996 when New England had 34.
- The Jaguars had the fewest penalties in franchise history with 76.
- QB David Garrard began the season as the starter for the first time in his career. Garrard ranked third in the NFL with a 102.2 passer rating and led the NFL in third down passing at 128.8. He set the franchise single-season record for highest passer rating and completion percentage (64.0). He attempted 230 consecutive passes without an interception to start the season over a span of eight games, both team records.
- WR Reggie Williams set the franchise single-season record with 10 touchdown receptions, surpassing the previous high of eight set by Jimmy Smith in three different seasons (1998, 2000, 2001).
- Rookie safety Reggie Nelson recorded a team-high five interceptions, the most by a rookie in team history and tied for the most by a NFL rookie in 2007.
- The running back duo of Fred Taylor (223-1,202, 5 TDs) and Maurice Jones-Drew (167-768, 9 TDs) ranked second in the NFL for the second consecutive season as they finished with 1,970 rushing yards.
- Fred Taylor earned the first Pro Bowl trip of his 10-year career. Taylor ranked fifth in the AFC in rushing with 1,202 rushing yards and led the AFC with a 5.4 average per rush. Taylor tied for first in the NFL with four rushes of 50-plus yards and finished with two of the four longest rushes in the NFL this season. He was the only player in the NFL to record five straight 100-plus yard rushing games. He became the 21st player in NFL history to reach 10,000 career rushing yards and set the franchise's career record for yards from scrimmage and all-purpose yards.
- DE Paul Spicer led the club with 7.5 sacks and 41 quarterback pressures.

2008 SCHEDULE STORYLINES

■ Features four teams that qualified for the 2007 postseason (Indianapolis, Tennessee, Pittsburgh, Green Bay). In addition, the Jaguars will play 10 games against teams that finished .500 or better in 2007.

■ The Jaguars will play Pittsburgh for the 20th time in the regular season with the Jaguars leading the series 11-8. It will be fifth time (including postseason) the teams will square off under Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio. The teams have met every season since 1995 except the 2003 season. The Jaguars have won four consecutive games in the series (including postseason).

■ Minnesota will visit Jacksonville Municipal Stadium for the first time.

■ The Jaguars will travel to Detroit for the first time since their inaugural season in 1995.

■ The Jaguars face three non-division foes for the second consecutive season in Pittsburgh, Buffalo and Denver. The Jaguars will travel to Denver for the second consecutive season while the Bills will make their second straight trip to Jacksonville.

2008 NFL DRAFT

The 2008 NFL Draft will be held on April 28-29. The Jaguars own the 28th pick, but could move as high as 26th.

The New York Giants (26th pick) and San Diego Chargers (27th pick) are scheduled to select ahead of the Jaguars and the Jaguars could move up if either the Giants or Chargers reach the Super Bowl.

If the Jaguars select 28th, it will tie for the second-latest pick in franchise history. The Jaguars owned the 29th pick in the 2000 draft and the 28th pick in the 2006 draft. The Jaguars selected 26th in the 1999 draft.

12/28/96	at Buffalo (Wild card)	W 30-27	The Jaguars won their first-ever playoff game and gave the Bills their first postseason loss at Rich Stadium. It was the final game for Hall of Fame quarterback Jim Kelly. Natrone Means rushed for 175 yards and Mike Hollis connected on three field goals including the game-winner with 3:07 to play.
1/ 4/97	at Denver (Divisional)	W 30-27	The Jaguars pulled off a shocking upset of No. 1 seed Denver who came into the game with a 13-3 record. The Jaguars had six straight scoring drives to give the Broncos their only home loss of the season and first playoff loss at Mile High Stadium since 1984.
1/12/97	at New England (AFC Champ.)	L 6-20	In their second season, the Jaguars saw their hopes of reaching the Super Bowl end in the AFC Championship game as they committed four turnovers. Despite the miscues, the Jaguars trailed only 13-6 in the fourth quarter.
12/27/97	at Denver (Wild card)	L 17-42	The Broncos jumped out to a 21-0 lead early in the second quarter and the Jaguars were not able to recover. The Broncos rushed for 310 yards and had 511 yards of total offense with five rushing touchdowns.
1/ 3/99	vs. New England (Wild card)	W 25-10	In the first-ever playoff game at Alltel Stadium, Fred Taylor rushed for 162 yards and one touchdown as the Jaguars advanced to the divisional round.
1/10/99	at New York Jets (Divisional)	L 24-34	With temperatures in the mid-20s, the Jets jumped out to a 17-0 lead and never looked back. Jimmy Smith had 104 receiving yards along with two touchdowns. Mark Brunell tossed three touchdown passes and three interceptions.
1/15/00	vs. Miami (Divisional)	W 62-7	In Dan Marino's final NFL game, the Jaguars scored on their first five possessions. The 62 points were the second-most in postseason history and the 55-point margin was the second-largest in NFL postseason history.
1/23/00	vs. Tennessee (AFC Champ.)	L 14-33	The Jaguars got out to a quick start in front of a record crowd of 75,206 as they took a 14-10 halftime lead. The Titans scored 23 unanswered points in the second half and the Jaguars turned the ball over three times in the final 16 minutes of the game.
1/ 7/06	at New England (Wild Card)	L 3-28	The Jaguars returned to the postseason for the first time since 1999. The Patriots had a 7-3 lead at halftime, but began the second half with back-to-back touchdown drives to put the game out of reach.
1/ 5/08	at Pittsburgh (Wild Card)	W 31-29	The Jaguars claimed their first postseason win since the 1999 season as they became the first team to win at Pittsburgh twice in the same season. The Jaguars had three interceptions and set a team-record with six sacks, but had to overcome a late Steelers rally.
1/12/08	at New England (Divisional)	L 20-31	The game was tied 14-14 at halftime, but the Patriots outscored the Jaguars 14-3 in the third quarter which proved to be the difference. 2007 JAGUARS POSTSEASON NOTES

JAGUARS MAKE POSTSEASON FOR 2ND TIME IN THREE SEASONS: The Jaguars were one of six teams to qualify for the playoffs that were not in the postseason the year before (Green Bay, Pittsburgh, Tampa Bay, Tennessee, Washington). The Jaguars joined Green Bay as the only two of those six teams to win a game in the postseason. In addition, the Jaguars advanced to the playoffs for the second time in the last three seasons. The Jaguars were one of 10 teams to accomplish the feat, joining New England, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, San Diego, Seattle, Chicago, Tampa Bay, Dallas and the New York Giants.

GARRARD SETS SINGLE-GAME RECORD FOR PASSING YARDS, COMPLETIONS AND COMPLETION PERCENTAGE:

QB David Garrard set a franchise single-game postseason record at New England in the AFC Divisional Playoff Game with 278 passing yards, 22 completions and a 66.7 completion percentage. Garrard finished 22 of 33 for 278 yards with 2 TDs/1 INT for a 100.3 passer rating. Garrard hooked up with Matt Jones for an eight-yard touchdown in the first quarter and connected with Ernest Wilford for a six-yard score in the second quarter. Garrard moved into second place in team history during the postseason for most career completions (34), career attempts (62) and career touchdown passes (3).

JAGUARS SET FRANCHISE RECORD WITH SEVEN SACKS: The Jaguars set a franchise-record in the postseason with seven sacks. The Jaguars set a single-game franchise record with six sacks in the AFC Wild Card Game at Pittsburgh. **The Jaguars had nine defensive linemen dressed for the game against the Steelers and six of them recorded sacks.** John Henderson notched a sack in both postseason games.

DURANT SHOWS NO JITTERS: Rookie LB Justin Durant led the Jaguars with 31 tackles in the postseason. Durant had 17 tackles (12 solo) in the AFC Wild Card Game at Pittsburgh. The 17 tackles were the second-most by a Jaguar in postseason history (23, Kevin Hardy, 1/10/99 at N.Y. Jets.). Durant finished with 14 tackles (11 solo) against New England in the AFC Divisional Playoff Game.

JONES-DREW SCORES TWO TDs IN POSTSEASON DEBUT:

Maurice Jones-Drew picked up where he left off in the regular season as he scored two touchdowns (one rushing, one receiving) at Pittsburgh in his postseason debut. In addition, Jones-Drew had a franchise postseason record 96-yard kickoff return in the first quarter. It was the seventh-longest in NFL history and longest since 2001. Jones-Drew led the team with six receptions at New England in the AFC Divisional Playoff Game. The six receptions tied for the second-most by a Jaguar in a postseason game. **Jones-Drew led the Jaguars with seven receptions for 192 yards in the postseason.** In addition, he had a team-high 140 yards from scrimmage and 297 all-purpose yards.

MATHIS RECORDS INTERCEPTION ON BACK-TO-BACK POSSESSIONS: CB Rashean Mathis had two interceptions at Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game and joined Aaron Beasley (1/15/00) as the only Jaguars to have two interceptions in a postseason game. Mathis picked off Ben Roethlisberger in the second quarter and returned it a team-record 63 yards for a touchdown. The 63-yard return was the 12th-longest return in NFL postseason history and ninth longest return for a touchdown. Mathis came right back on the ensuing Steelers possession and intercepted a pass on the sideline intended for Najeh Davenport. The 64 total interception return yards are the most in team history.

LANDRI MAKES MOST OF HIS OPPORTUNITY: Rookie DT Derek Landri made the most of his first postseason action as he finished with a sack, interception, fumble recovery and three quarterback pressures in the AFC Wild Card Game at Pittsburgh. Landri saw action in 51 plays, the second-most among the Jaguars defensive linemen (Rob Meier, 73 plays). Landri intercepted Ben Roethlisberger with 57 seconds remaining in the first half as the Steelers were at the Jaguars 21-yard line. Landri recovered a Roethlisberger fumble on the Steelers final offensive play of the game on a sack by Bobby McCray.

2007 POSTSEASON NOTES:

- The Jaguars became the first team in NFL history to win at Pittsburgh twice in the same season. The Jaguars won 29-22 during the regular season on December 16.
- The Jaguars picked up their first road playoff win since 1/4/97 at Denver.
- The Jaguars scored six touchdowns in two postseason games, tied for the second-most in team history (1996). The Jaguars had a postseason franchise-record 10 touchdowns during the 1999 postseason.
- The Jaguars tied a franchise-record with three interceptions at Pittsburgh, all in the second quarter.
- TE Mercedes Lewis had four receptions for a team-high 74 yards at New England.
- LB Daryl Smith led the team with 15 tackles (11 solo) at New England and totaled 26 tackles in the two postseason games.

During the month of December, Taylor started four games and rushed for 494 yards on 64 carries (7.7 avg.) with three touchdowns. The Jaguars were 3-1 in those games. Named FedEx Ground Player of the Week following the Jaguars' 29-22 win at Pittsburgh on 12/16. Taylor finished with a season-high 147 yards on 25 carries with the game-winning touchdown on a 15-yard run. Named to NFL All-Interview Team by NFL.com writer Vic Carucci.

■ **QB David Garrard** - Named FedEx Express Player of the Week following the Jaguars' 29-22 win at Pittsburgh on 12/16. Garrard completed 17 of 33 passes for 197 yards with three touchdowns, tied for the most of his career.

■ **DT Paul Spicer** - Named AFC Defensive Player of the Week following the Jaguars' 37-17 win over Houston on 10/14. Spicer had seven tackles, one for a loss, one sack, one forced fumble and four quarterback pressures.

■ **K Josh Scobee** - Named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week following the Buffalo game on 11/25. Scobee connected on career-high five of five field goals along with two touchbacks. The five field goals tied a team-record.

■ **FB Greg Jones** - Selected by his teammates as the Ed Block Courage Award Recipient. Jones returned to the lineup this season after missing the entire 2006 season after suffering an ACL injury in his left knee during the preseason.

■ **S Reggie Nelson** - Named to Pro Football Weekly All-Rookie Team.

■ **Head Coach Jack Del Rio, G Vince Manuwai, DE Paul Spicer, QB David Garrard, DT Rob Meier**- Selected to USA Today All-Joe Team. The award is named after former Kansas City Chiefs player Joe Phillips and goes to the players and coaches who have overachieved and are often overlooked.

JAGUARS HIT WITH INJURIES

The Jaguars concluded the regular season with 12 players on injured reserve, including three starters in G Chris Naeole, DT Marcus Stroud and TE George Wrihster. The Jaguars were forced to place 15 players on injured reserve in 2006. LB Mike Peterson was inactive the final six regular season games and the two postseason games with a fractured right hand suffered against San Diego on 11/18. Naeole ruptured his quad tendon on 11/4 at New Orleans and was placed on injured reserve. Naeole has played in 154 games with 150 starts over 11 seasons. Wrihster (knee) and backup TE Greg Estandia (shoulder) both suffered injuries against San Diego on 11/18 and were lost for the season. Stroud, a three-time Pro Bowl selection, suffered an ankle injury on 12/9 against Carolina.

ROAD WARRIORS

The Jaguars finished 5-3 on the road in the regular season. The Jaguars were the only team in 2007 to have three straight road games and they finished 2-1 on the road trip with Quinn Gray starting at QB in all three games. The Jaguars won their first three road games for only the second time in team history (1999). The Jaguars own a 18-14 mark on the road since 2004, the sixth-best mark in the NFL.

JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS HEAD COACH JACK DEL RIO

JACK DEL RIO COMPLETES FIFTH SEASON AS HEAD COACH: Jack Del Rio finished his fifth season as the Jaguars' head coach with a record of 45-35. Del Rio joined a group of 16 current NFL head coaches with 40 career wins with the win at Tennessee on 11/11. Del Rio was named to the post on January 17, 2003, becoming the second head coach in Jaguars history. Over the last four years the Jaguars rank sixth in regular season wins among the 32 NFL teams with 40. In 2006 Del Rio led the Jaguars to their third consecutive non-losing season at 8-8, despite losing 15 players to injured reserve. The Jaguars defense has thrived under the guidance of Del Rio as they ranked fourth in the NFL over the past five seasons in yards allowed (300.1) and fourth in points allowed (18.2) while the offense was fourth in rushing yards (135.2) and second in fewest turnovers (114).

Del Rio completed his 22nd year in the NFL, his 11th as a coach. Del Rio spent 11 years as an NFL linebacker and had a standout college career at the University of Southern California. He previously coached in New Orleans (1997-98), Baltimore (1999-2001), and Carolina (2002). He was the Panthers' defensive coordinator, and in his only season with the club the defense improved from 31st in the NFL to second, the biggest one-season defensive improvement in NFL history. Del Rio was the linebackers coach for three seasons in Baltimore, where the Ravens' defense also ranked second each season. He helped the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants and coached the Ravens' talented linebackers, overseeing the development of Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. Prior to coaching, Del Rio played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-1991) and Minnesota (1992-95), playing in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season.

Del Rio was a starter at linebacker for Southern California (1981-84), where he earned All-America honors, was a runner-up for the Lombardi Award and co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. Del Rio is one of three NFL head coaches (Jeff Fisher, Mike Holmgren) who graduated from USC. Del Rio has learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to USC and played for John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green. As an assistant coach, he has worked for Hall of Famer Mike Ditka and Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, as well as Super Bowl participant John Fox. Among other notable coaches Del Rio has worked with are Dom Capers, Tony Dungy, Dave Wannstedt, Monte Kiffin, Mike Tice, Tom Moore, Norv Turner and Butch Davis. Drafted by baseball's Toronto Blue Jays, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on USC's baseball team in 1983 and 1984 with future stars Randy Johnson and Mark McGwire. He was a third-round choice by the New Orleans Saints in 1985 and was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team.

NFL HEAD COACHES WITH NFL PLAYING EXPERIENCE: Jack Del Rio has the longest playing tenure in the NFL among active head coaches. Del Rio played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-91) and Minnesota (1992-95). NEW COACHES: Head coach Jack Del Rio made several changes on his coaching staff during the offseason. The team added six new coaches: Dirk Koetter (Offensive Coordinator), Joe DeCamillis (Special Teams Coordinator), Todd Monken (Wide Receivers Coach), Robert Prince (Assistant Wide Receivers Coach), Mike Shula (Quarterbacks Coach) and Tom Williams (Assistant Special Teams Coach). Koetter (Arizona State) and Shula (Alabama) were both head coaches on the collegiate level in 2006. DeCamillis brings 19 years of coaching experience to the Jaguars, including the last 14 seasons as a NFL special teams coach.

JAGUARS LEAD NFL WITH THREE FORMER DIVISION I-A HEAD COACHES: The Jacksonville Jaguars were the only NFL team to have three former NCAA Division I-A head coaches on their staff. Dirk Koetter joined the staff in 2007 as offensive coordinator after spending the past nine seasons as a head coach on the collegiate level. Mike Shula completed his first season as quarterbacks coach after serving as head coach at Alabama from 2003-06. Linebackers coach Mark Duffner finished his second season with the Jaguars and served as head coach at Maryland from 1992-96. The seven games with 400-plus yards tied for the second-most in the NFL in 2007 (New England 12; Green Bay, 7). The Jaguars joined the New England Patriots (8 games) as the only teams to record 400-plus total yards in five consecutive games.
- The Jaguars scored 24 or more points in 10 consecutive games for the first time in team history and were one of only six teams to accomplish the feat in 2007 (Dallas, New England, Cleveland, Indianapolis, Green Bay). **The Jaguars ranked sixth in the NFL by averaging 25.7 points per game.**
- The Jaguars ranked sixth in the NFL with a 45.7 third down conversion percentage.
- The Jaguars scored at least three touchdowns in 10 consecutive games, the most in team history.
- The Jaguars ranked seventh in the NFL in offense with a 357.4 average per game, tied for the second-highest ranking in team history. The highest final offensive ranking in team history was second in 1996 and the club finished seventh in 1997, 1999 and 2000.
- The Jaguars tied for sixth in the NFL with 60 plays of 20-plus yards (16 runs, 44 passes). The 60 plays are the second-most in team history (66, 1997).

"The only thing I can tell you is that we just do the things that we think give our team the best opportunity to win games. There are a lot of different factors and sometimes possessing the ball is important, sometimes playing to win a particular circumstance is important. A lot of different factors go into it, but ultimately it comes down to what we think gives us the best opportunity to win the game. That's what the choices have to be about."

FOURTH DOWN RUSH: The Jaguars converted their only fourth down attempt in the AFC Wild Card Game at Pittsburgh, but it was definitely the most important conversion of the season. Trailing 29-28, the Jaguars were faced with a fourth-and-two at the Steelers 43-yard line. QB David Garrard called his own number as he weaved his way through the Steelers defense for a 32-yard gain to set up the game-winning field goal by Josh Scobee.

DEFENSIVE NOTES:

- The Jaguars held opponents to 17 points or less in 10 of 16 games, tied for the most in the NFL (New England, Green Bay, San Diego). The Jaguars allowed 14 or fewer points in eight games. The Jaguars gave up 20-plus points in four of their five losses.
- The Jaguars recovered 10 opponents fumbles in 2007. In 2006, the Jaguars finished with only four fumble recoveries.
- The Jaguars ranked 11th in the NFL in rushing defense as they allowed 100.3 yards per game. The Jaguars allowed fewer than 100 rushing yards in nine of 16 games. The Jaguars held Kansas City to 10 rushing yards on Oct. 7, the fewest by an opponent in team history and the second-fewest by a NFL team in 2007. It was the fewest rushing yards by the Chiefs since December 19, 1965 vs. Denver. In addition, the Chiefs had only 10 rushing attempts, the fewest by a Jaguars opponent in team history.
- Opponents had only 17 drives of five minutes or more, tied for the fifth-fewest in the NFL.

THE SKINNY ON FRED TAYLOR:

■ First round pick (9th overall) of the Jaguars in 1998. He is the only player who remains on the Jaguars roster from 1998. He has played in seven of the club's 11 playoff games.

■ Jaguars career, single-season and single-game rushing leader. Owns the top seven single-season club marks for rushing yards.

■ Tied with Jimmy Smith for most touchdowns in team history with 69.

■ Set the franchise record for yards from scrimmage against San Diego on 11/18, surpassing Jimmy Smith (12,285) and surpassed Smith for the most all-purpose yards in team history on 12/23 vs. Oakland. Taylor's 12,978 yards from scrimmage ranks 36th in NFL history.

■ Has started 123 of 127 games in 10 seasons, the second-most in team history in both categories.

TAYLOR-MADE FOR STRETCH RUN: Fred Taylor rushed for 100-plus yards in five consecutive games to close out the regular season. Taylor did not play at Houston in the regular season finale. **Taylor was the only NFL player in 2007 to have 100-plus rushing yards in five consecutive games.** Taylor has recorded 47 career 100-yard rushing games with 20 of his last 26 100-yard games coming after November 1. Taylor rushed for a season-high 147 yards on 25 carries at Pittsburgh on 12/16, the most rushing yards since he had 165 on 10/30/05 at St. Louis. He had a season-high six rushes of 10-plus yards against the Steelers and followed with four rushes of 10-plus yards against Oakland. Here's a look at Taylor's totals the last five games:

TAYLOR AMONG THE BEST: Fred Taylor ranks 17th in NFL history for most rushing yards with career totals of 2,285 carries for 10,715 yards and 61 rushing touchdowns in 127 games. He has led the Jaguars in rushing in eight of the last 10 seasons. Taylor ranks among the NFL's all-time best in several categories. Here's the list:

■ Ranks 8th in rushing yards per game (84.4) in NFL history.

■ Ranks 10th in yards from scrimmage per game (102.2) in NFL history and ranks 36th in NFL history with a team-record 12,978 yards from scrimmage.

■ Ranks fifth in NFL history and leads all active players with 311 rushes of 10-plus yards.

■ Ranks fourth in NFL history with 13 rushes of 50-plus yards including a career-high four 50-plus rushes in 2007.

■ Tied for the third-best yards per carry average (4.7) among the top 25 rushers in NFL history.

■ Taylor became the 21st player in NFL history to reach 10,000 career rushing yards as he accomplished the feat on 11/11 at Tennessee.

■ Taylor trails only Arizona's Edgerrin James (2,849-11,607) among active running backs in rushing yards.

■ One of 28 players in NFL history with 2,000-plus carries.

■ Tied with O.J. Simpson and Herschel Walker in 34th place in NFL history with 61 career rushing touchdowns.

■ Surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for the season at Pittsburgh on 12/16, his seventh career season with 1,000 rushing yards. The seven seasons are tied for the ninth-most in NFL history.

■ Taylor broke free for a team-record 80-yard touchdown run against Carolina on 12/9 in the fourth quarter. Taylor finished with two of the four longest rushes in the NFL this year as he had a 76-yard run against Houston on October 14.

■ **Taylor had four rushes of 50-plus yards in 2007, the most by Taylor in a season.** He scored on a 50-yard touchdown run on the club's opening possession against Buffalo on 11/25 and went 62 yards for a score on the club's first play from scrimmage against Oakland on 12/23.

RUNNING WILD

The Jaguars rushed for 100-plus yards in 13 of 16 games in 2007, 150-plus yards in eight games and 200-plus yards in three games. The 13 games with 100-plus rushing yards were the second-most under head coach Jack Del Rio (2006, 14 games). **The Jaguars have rushed for the two-highest totals in team history the last two seasons as they finished with 2,391 yards (149.4) in 2007 and a franchise-record 2,541 yards (158.8) in 2006.** The Jaguars ranked second in rushes of 10-plus yards (68), tied for fourth in rushes of 20-plus yards (16) and led the NFL with six rushes of 50-plus yards.

JAGUARS RANK 2ND IN RUSHING IN 2007 AND FIRST FROM 2006-07: The Jaguars led the AFC and ranked second in the NFL in rushing with a 149.4 average and first from 2006-07 (last 32 games) with a 154.1 average. The Jaguars ranked first in the AFC and third in the NFL in 2007 with a 4.7 average per rush. The Jaguars set a single-season franchise record for rushing yards (2,541) in 2006 as they averaged 158.8 yards per game. In addition, the Jaguars set a franchise record with a 5.0-yard rushing average in 2006.

AGE NOT A PROBLEM

Jaguars running back Fred Taylor surpassed the 1,000 yard mark on 12/16 at Pittsburgh, becoming one of 11 players to rush for 1,000 yards at the age of 31 or older since 2000. Tiki Barber (age 31) and Warrick Dunn (age 31) both accomplished the feat in 2006. Curtis Martin (1,697, 2004) has the most rushing yards in NFL history for players who were 31 or older on opening day. TAYLOR OWNS RUSHING MARK AT TWO STADIUMS

Jaguars RB Fred Taylor owns the record for most rushing yards by an opponent at Three Rivers Stadium and Heinz Field and has more rushing and receiving touchdowns against Pittsburgh than against any other team. Taylor recorded 30 carries for a team-record 234 yards with 3 TDs rushing and three receptions for 14 yards and 1 TD receiving at Pittsburgh on 11/19/00. The 234 yards were the most in Three Rivers Stadium history. Taylor finished with a season-high 147 rushing yards on 12/16/07 at Pittsburgh, the most by an opposing back in Heinz Field history. Taylor was the first opposing back to rush for 100 yards at Pittsburgh since Rudi Johnson of Cincinnati had 123 yards on 10/3/04.

DAVID GARRARD LEADS OFFENSE: Quarterback David Garrard entered the season as the club's starter for the first time in his career and he took advantage of the opportunity, leading the Jaguars to a 9-3 mark in 12 starts. Garrard did not play at Houston in the regular season finale. Garrard joined Mark Brunell as the only two Jaguars quarterbacks to win nine games as a starter in a season and he joined Brunell as the only two Jaguars quarterbacks to win a postseason game. Garrard's nine wins as a starter are the most wins since Brunell posted a 13-2 record as a starter in 1999. Garrard completed 208 of 325 passes for a career-high 2,509 yards with 18 touchdowns and a 102.2 rating in the regular season. Garrard, a fourth-round pick in 2002, has played in 40 games with 30 starts over six seasons and owns a 19-11 career record. He missed three weeks with an ankle injury and returned to action on 11/18 against San Diego. **He recorded a 100-plus rating in a career-high seven games this season and he threw for multiple touchdowns in five of the last six games.** Garrard tied his career-high on 12/16 at Pittsburgh with three touchdown passes as he hooked up with Ernest Wilford (12 yards), Reggie Williams (three yards) and Dennis Northcutt (55 yards). Garrard had two touchdown passes against Oakland on 12/23 including a 37-yard toss to Matt Jones.

GARRARD SNAPS STREAK AT 230 ATTEMPTS WITHOUT AN INTERCEPTION: David Garrard snapped his team-record streak of passes without an interception at 230 after being intercepted by Antoine Bethea in the fourth quarter at Indianapolis on 12/2. Garrard holds the team record at eight consecutive games without throwing an interception. He surpassed his previous team record of 175 straight pass attempts without an interception and six straight games from 12/11/05 to 11/5/06.

MR. CONSISTENCY: David Garrard had a 60.0 percent completion percentage in nine of the last 11 regular season games. Garrard finished with a career-high 82.7 completion percentage at Indianapolis on 12/2 as he completed 24 of 29 passes for 257 yards with two touchdowns. The 82.7 completion percentage is fourth-highest in team history and highest since 2003 (Mark Brunell, at Carolina, 9/7/03, 23 of 27 att.).

SPREADING IT AROUND: The Jaguars had 14 players record receptions in 2007 including six with at least 20 receptions. The Jaguars had six players with 300-plus receiving yards, tied for the second-most in the NFL this season (New Orleans, 7; Miami, 6; New England, 6). Ernest Wilford led the team in receptions with a career-high 45 while Reggie Williams recorded a team-high 629 receptions. Williams led the club with a franchise single-season record 10 receiving touchdowns while Dennis Northcutt and Matt Jones ranked second with four touchdown receptions. RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew recorded 40 receptions for 407 yards, his second consecutive season with 40 or more receptions (46, 2006). The Jaguars added Northcutt in the offseason as an unrestricted free agent from Cleveland.

WILLIAMS SETS SINGLE-SEASON RECORD WITH 10 TD RECEPTIONS:

WR Reggie Williams set the franchise single-season record with 10 touchdown receptions in 2007, surpassing the previous high of eight set by Jimmy Smith in three different seasons (1998, 2000, 2001). Williams concluded the regular season with a touchdown reception in four consecutive games, the longest streak in team history. Williams led the team with a career-high 629 receiving yards and a 16.6 average on 38 receptions. Williams ranks third in team history with 15 career touchdown receptions. Williams had two touchdowns for 50-plus yards in 2007, marking only the second player in team history to have two touchdown receptions of 50-plus yards in a season (Keenan McCardell, 1998). Williams took a short pass from David Garrard on 11/25 against Buffalo and raced 59 yards to the end zone. He hooked up with Quinn Gray for an 80-yard score on 11/4 at New Orleans, the second-longest reception in team history and tied for the sixth-longest in the NFL this season. Williams recorded his first career 100-yard receiving game against the Saints as he finished with six receptions for 128 yards.

TOUCHDOWN MAKER: Maurice Jones-Drew ranks fifth in franchise history with 26 touchdowns in only 31 games. Jones-Drew has all 26 touchdowns in the last 29 regular season games and ranks tied for fourth in the NFL in overall touchdowns from 2006-07. He has 22 rushing touchdowns, two receiving touchdowns and two kickoff returns for touchdowns.

TRIPLE THREAT: Maurice Jones-Drew has shown the ability to be a threat as a rusher, receiver and returner in his first 31 games (did not play in '07 finale) as a Jaguar, averaging 82.3 yards from scrimmage and 137.5 all-purpose yards per game. He led the team with 2,014 all-purpose yards this season and ranked second with 768 rushing yards. His 10 touchdowns (9 rushing, 1 return) were tied with Reggie Williams for a team-high. Jones-Drew posted his second 100-yard rushing game of the season on 11/11 at Tennessee with 101 yards, the fifth of his career. Jones-Drew had three scoring plays of 50-plus yards in 2007 as he broke loose for a 52-yard touchdown run at Kansas City on 10/7 and followed with a 57-yard touchdown run against Houston on 10/14, the second-longest run of his career (74t, 12/24/06 vs. New England).

TAKING IT TO THE HOUSE: Maurice Jones-Drew returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown on 11/4 at New Orleans, the longest return in team history. He is the only player in team history to record two career kickoff returns for touchdowns as he scored on a 93-yard kickoff return on 12/10/06 vs. Indianapolis. He became the club's all-time kickoff return leader for yards (1,671) at Pittsburgh on 12/16, surpassing Reggie Barlow (1,634, 1996-2000).

YARDS, YARDS AND MORE YARDS: Maurice Jones-Drew finished seventh in the NFL in 2007 with 2,014 all-purpose yards. He owns four of the franchise's top eight marks for all-purpose yards including a team-record 303 against Indianapolis on 12/10/06. JONES-DREW LEADS 2006 DRAFT CLASS: Jaguars running back Maurice-Jones Drew was one of six running backs selected in the first two rounds of the 2006 draft. Jones-Drew, the 60th overall pick, leads the group in several statistical categories including 26 total touchdowns and 4,264 total yards. NELSON MAKES DIFFERENCE: Reggie Nelson started 15 of 16 games at free safety in his rookie season, the most starts by a rookie defensive player since Rashean Mathis started all 16 games in 2003. Nelson, the club's 2007 first-round pick from Florida, led the team in the regular season with five interceptions. The five interceptions were the most by a rookie in team history and tied for the most by a NFL rookie in 2007.

SPICER LEADS CLUB WITH 7.5 SACKS; LONG WAY FROM CFL: DE Paul Spicer led the team with 7.5 sacks and finished the regular season with a sack in three of the last five games. Spicer picked up his first career postseason sack at Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game. The 7.5 sacks tied for the most of his career (7.5, 2005) and ranked tied for ninth in the AFC. In addition, Spicer also led the team with 41 quarterback pressures. Spicer had a sack of Ben Roethlisberger and forced a fumble in the second quarter at Pittsburgh on 12/16. Spicer had 2.5 sacks and seven quarterback pressures along with a forced fumble in two games against Indianapolis this season. Spicer won the AFC Defensive Player of the Week award following the Houston game on 10/14 as he finished with seven tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and four quarterback pressures. Spicer has 25.0 career sacks which ranks fourth in team history. Spicer, who is in his eighth NFL season, spent portions of the 1998 season with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League after being released by Seattle in training camp. He played two games with Detroit in 1999 before signing with the Jaguars prior to the 2000 regular season.

SMITH SILENTLY LEADS THE DEFENSE: LB Daryl Smith led the team with six tackles for loss and ranked second on the club in 2007 with 117 tackles (79 solo) along with eight passes defended. Smith had a 77-yard fumble return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter against Houston on 10/14, the third-longest fumble return in team history (90t, Aaron Beasley, 11/8/98 vs. Cincinnati; 83t, Donovan Darius, 11/1/98 at Baltimore) and longest since 1998. Smith moved from the outside to the middle on 11/25 against Buffalo with the injury to Mike Peterson. Smith recorded double-digit tackles in four of five games since his move to the middle including a team-high 10 tackles and one sack against Carolina on 12/9. Smith split a sack at Indianapolis on 12/2 and had 10 tackles. Smith moved from the outside to the middle for the final 11 games in 2006 when Peterson went down and responded with a career-high 170 tackles. The 170 tackles were the third-most in the NFL.

VETERANS ADD LEADERSHIP: The Jaguars signed two defensive veterans prior to the regular season who brought with them 25 years of NFL experience and rank in the top four among active players in interceptions. Sammy Knight, who started 15 of 16 games in 2007, has played in 174 games with 168 starts at strong safety. Knight led the Jaguars with a career-high 132 tackles (95 solo). Knight has produced 54 career takeaways (42 ints, 12 FRs) including four interceptions as a Jaguar. He intercepted Philip Rivers on the Chargers final drive with 1:32 remaining on 11/18. Cornerback Aaron Glenn has started 175 of 201 games in 14 NFL seasons and has 41 career interceptions with six returned for touchdowns. Glenn, a three-time Pro Bowl selection, picked off Jeff Garcia at Tampa Bay on 10/28 and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown. Glenn was originally the 12th overall pick in the 2004 draft by the New York Jets and has spent time with Houston and Dallas.

RASHEAN MATHIS IS CREAM OF THE CROP FROM 2003 DRAFT

CLASS: Jaguars cornerback Rashean Mathis became the first Jaguars cornerback to be voted to the Pro Bowl after he tied for third in the NFL in 2006 with a team-record eight interceptions. Mathis owns the club's career record with 21 interceptions and 290 interception return yards. Mathis ranks second among all defensive backs selected in the 2003 draft in interceptions with 21 and he ranks fifth in the NFL from 2004-07 with 19 interceptions. He had two interceptions at Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game including one returned for a 63-yard touchdown.

"BIG HEN" CLOGS UP THE MIDDLE: Defensive tackle John Henderson is regarded as one of the NFL's top defensive linemen and is a menace to opposing running backs. Henderson has recorded 451 tackles (349 solo), 24.0 sacks, 124 quarterback pressures, 34 tackles for loss, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in his first six NFL seasons (95 games). Henderson ranked third on the team in 2006 with 3.5 sacks. Additional notes on Henderson include:

■ Henderson, the ninth overall pick in 2002, earned his first Pro Bowl appearance in 2004 and returned in 2006. He was the highest-drafted defensive lineman ever by the Jaguars and second defensive tackle drafted overall in 2002.

■ In 2004, Henderson posted a career-high 98 tackles and 40 quarterback pressures along with 5.5 sacks. He combined with defensive tackle Marcus Stroud in 2004 for 10 sacks, the third-best mark in the NFL among defensive tackle tandems.

■ Ranks fifth in team history with 24.0 sacks in 95 career games. Has three career multi-sack games.

■ **Missed the first game of his career at Denver on 9/16 with a head injury, snapping a streak of 82 consecutive games played.**

SCOBEE HEADS KICKING GAME: Kicker Josh Scobee connected on 12 of 13 field goals in eight regular season games this season and scored a team-high 62 points. In addition, Scobee recorded 12 touchbacks on 46 kickoffs this season (26.1 pct.). Scobee had his only miss of the season at Indianapolis on 12/2 as he misfired from 46 yards, but later was good from 47 yards. Scobee connected on a career-high five field goals against Buffalo on 11/25 and scored a career-high 18 points, tied for the third-most in team history and tied for the most by a kicker (Mike Hollis, 18, 9/10/00 at Balt.). Scobee hit on field goals from 46, 33, 22, 23 and 20 yards. Scobee returned to action against San Diego on 11/18 after missing eight games. Scobee injured his right quad during pregame warmups prior to the season opener against Tennessee. He was immediately called upon in his first game back as he connected on a 48-yard field goal on the club's opening possession against the Chargers. It was the longest field goal for the Jaguars this season and longest for Scobee since 12/10/06 vs. Indianapolis.

LEWIS BECOMES AN OFFENSIVE WEAPON: TE Mercedes Lewis led the Jaguars tight ends with a career-high 37 receptions for 391 yards along with two touchdowns. **Lewis, the club's 2006 first-round pick, has the most receiving yards by a Jaguars tight end since 2002 (Kyle Brady, 461).** Lewis scored his first touchdown of the season against San Diego on 11/18 on a one-yard pass from David Garrard. Lewis was hampered by injuries as a rookie and finished with 13 receptions for 126 yards and one touchdown. The Jaguars lost both of their backup tight ends for the season against San Diego on 11/18 with George Wrihster (knee) and Greg Estandia (shoulder) both suffering injuries.

ROOKIE CHAD NKANG LEADS SPECIAL TEAMS; SETS TEAM RECORD: Rookie Chad Nkang made his presence known on special teams after making the roster as a seventh-round pick from Elon. Nkang set the team-record for special teams tackles with 30, including six against Oakland on 12/23. Danny Clark (2000) and Brant Boyer (1997) previously held the franchise record with 25.

GRAY FILLS IN NICELY: Quinn Gray became the 10th starting quarterback in franchise history as he made his first career start at Tampa Bay on 10/28. Gray replaced David Garrard who suffered a sprained left ankle against Indianapolis on 10/22 and missed three games. Gray led the club to a 2-1 mark in his three starts, all on the road, and also started at Houston in the regular season finale. Gray completed 80 of 144 passes for a career-high 896 yards and 10 touchdowns for a 85.6 rating. Gray joined Mark Brunell as the only two Jaguars quarterback to throw for four touchdowns in a game. Gray has played in 11 career games since being signed as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2002 out of Florida A&M. He served as the backup to Garrard for 10 games in 2006 and saw extensive action in the season-finale at Kansas City on 12/31. Gray appeared in NFL Europe in 2003 and led the Frankfurt Galaxy to the World Bowl.

DEFENSE PROVIDES POINTS: The Jaguars tied a franchise record with three defensive touchdowns (3, 1999). LB Daryl Smith returned a fumble 77 yards for a touchdown on 10/14 vs. Houston. CB Aaron Glenn intercepted Jeff Garcia at Tampa Bay on 10/28 and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown. LB Clint Ingram recorded his first career touchdown on a 39-yard interception return against Carolina's Vinny Testaverde on 12/9.

EXPERIENCED GROUP

12 Jaguars players on the roster at the end of the season have played in 100 or more games during their careers: CB Aaron Glenn (201 games, 175 starts), S Sammy Knight (174 games, 168 starts), CB Terry Cousin (156 games, 68 starts), DT Grady Jackson (155 games, 102 starts), TE/LS Joe Zelenka (141 games, 0 starts), RB Fred Taylor (127 games, 123 starts), LB Mike Peterson (120 games, 117 starts), DT Rob Meier (123 games, 34 starts), C Brad Meester (119 games, 119 starts), WR Dennis Northcutt (114 games, 56 starts), DE Paul Spicer (101 games, 53 starts) and OL Maurice Williams (100 games, 95 starts). Only Taylor (127), Meier (123), Meester (119), Zelenka (112) and Williams (100) have played in 100 games as a Jaguar. Spicer has played in 99 regular season games as a Jaguar.

JAGUARS 2007 DRAFT CLASS: The Jaguars had 11 total selections in the 2007 draft, tied for the most in franchise history (1998, 2000). In 2006, the Jaguars had six selections in the draft and four players remain on the roster.

2007 ROOKIE REVIEW: The Jaguars had six rookies on their 53-man roster, all 2007 draft picks. Here's a recap of the Jaguars' 2007 draft class:

■ S Reggie Nelson (1st round, 21st pick) — Played in 16 games with 15 starts and started both postseason games. Stepped into the starting role in week two following the season-ending injury to Gerald Sensabaugh. Led team and all NFL rookies with five interceptions, the most in team history by a rookie. Ranked fourth on the team with 82 tackles (57 solo) along with one sack, 12 passes defended and two forced fumbles

■ LB Justin Durant (2nd round, 48th pick) — Played in 13 games with eight starts and started both postseason games. Inserted into the starting lineup on 11/25 vs. Buffalo with injury to Mike Peterson and started final six games. Recorded double-digit tackles in five of the last seven games. Finished with 70 tackles (50 solo), one interception, one forced fumble, five quarterback pressures and three tackles for loss. Led the team in the postseason with 31 tackles including 17 against Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game, the second-most by a Jaguar in postseason history.

■ WR Mike Walker (3rd round, 79th pick) — Was placed on injured reserve on Sept. 1 with knee injury.

■ P Adam Podlesh (4th round, 101st pick) — Assumed the role as Jaguars punter to start the season and had 54 punts for a 41.6 average. Recorded 14 punts inside the 20 and had a 36.9 net average. The Jaguars finished with the fewest punts in team history.

■ DE Brian Smith (4th round, 113th pick) — Was placed on PUP on August 26 with hip injury and was later placed on injured reserve on November 27.

■ G Uche Nwaneri (5th round, 149th pick) — Played in nine games with one start. Provided depth at guard behind Vince Manuwai and Maurice Williams. Started in regular season finale at Houston.

■ DT Derek Landri (5th round, 166th pick) — Played in 13 games as a reserve in the defensive line rotation and played in both post-season games. Totaled 15 tackles (13 solo) and saw action on at least 30 plays in the last five regular season games. Recorded an interception, sack and fumble recovery at Pittsburgh in AFC Wild Card Game.

■ WR John Broussard (7th round, 229th pick) — Saw action in eight games before being placed on injured reserve on December 28 with an ankle injury. Scored first career touchdown on a 47-yard pass from David Garrard in the season-opener on 9/9 against Tennessee. The 47-yard touchdown reception by Broussard was the longest by a Jaguars rookie wide receiver in team history. Had a 56-yard reception on 11/4 at New Orleans. Injured his ankle on 11/11 at Tennessee was inactive for six games.

■ S Chad Nkang (7th round, 251st pick) — Played in all 16 games and excelled on special teams. Set franchise-record for special teams tackles with 30. Danny Clark (2000) and Brant Boyer (1997) previously held the franchise record with 25. Had season-high six special teams tackles on 12/23 against Oakland.

■ OT Andrew Carnahan (7th round, 252nd pick) — Spent preseason with the club before being waived on Aug. 27. Signed to practice squad on Sept. 20 where he spent the remainder of the season.

JAGUARS OWN 14-6 MARK AGAINST NFC UNDER DEL RIO; 10-0 AT HOME: The Jaguars own a 14-6 mark against the NFC under head coach Jack Del Rio since 2003 with a 10-0 mark at home. ■ Temperature at kickoff against Atlanta on 9/16 was 88 degrees, the warmest kickoff temperature at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium in franchise history.

■ The Jaguars finished with 186 rushing yards on 47 carries on 9/23 at Denver, tied for the second-most rushing attempts in franchise history.

■ The Jaguars held Kansas City to 10 rushing yards on 10/7, the fewest by an opponent in team history. It was the fewest rushing yards by the Chiefs since December 19, 1965 vs. Denver. In addition, the Chiefs had only 10 rushing attempts, the fewest by a Jaguars opponent in team history.

■ The Jaguars had 457 yards of total offense on 10/14 against Houston, the most since Dec. 10, 2000 vs. Arizona (469). The Jaguars finished with 244 rushing yards on 26 carries for a 9.4 average against Houston last week, the highest single-game average in team history and tied for the second-most rushing yards in team history.

■ The Jaguars were the only team in the NFL to have three consecutive road games in 2007 and they finished 2-1 on the trip. It marked the fifth time in team history (1997, 1998, 2001, 2005) the club played three consecutive road games. The Jaguars were faced with three consecutive road games in 2001 and 2005 and the team won all six games.

■ Improved to 14-6 against the NFC under head coach Jack Del Rio with a 10-0 record at home. The Jaguars finished 3-1 against the NFC in 2007, their fourth consecutive season with a 3-1 mark against NFC opponents.

■ The Jaguars held Carolina to 149 total yards on 12/9, the fewest by an opponent this season. The Jaguars did not allow a touchdown for the only time this season and first time since 11/20/06 vs. New York Giants.

■ The Jaguars had a team-record 20-play drive on 12/16 at Pittsburgh to start the second half, tied for the second-longest in the NFL this season.

■ The Jaguars set a franchise record with 49 points against Oakland on 12/23, surpassing the previous high of 48 points on 12/3/00 vs. Cleveland. The 49 points are tied for the sixth-most in the NFL this season.

■ The Jaguars set a franchise record with seven touchdowns against the Raiders, surpassing the previous high of six on 11/1/98 at Baltimore and 12/3/00 vs. Cleveland.

2007 TRENDS

■ The Jaguars scored on their first three possessions in three games. In addition, the Jaguars scored on their opening possession in seven of the last nine games and scored a touchdown in the first quarter in eight of the last 10 games. Under head coach Jack Del Rio since 2003, the Jaguars own a 31-6 mark when they score first and 20-5 record when they score on their first possession.

■ The Jaguars held an advantage in time of possession in 10 of 16 games this season and ranked third in the NFL with a 32:08 average time of possession. The Jaguars controlled the ball a season-high 38:58 on 12/9 against Carolina and followed with a 37:39 time of possession at Pittsburgh on 12/16. The Jaguars had a time of possession of 30 minutes or more in 10 games this season and owned a 8-2 record in those games. The Jaguars ranked third in the NFL with 30 drives of five minutes or more and have scored 17 touchdowns on those drives.

■ The Jaguars are 35-6 when leading after the third quarter under head coach Jack Del Rio. The Jaguars have won 21 consecutive games when they lead after the third quarter. Their last defeat when leading after the third quarter was at St. Louis on October 30, 2005.

■ The Jaguars are 35-11 since 2003 under head coach Jack Del Rio when they score 20-plus points including a 10-3 mark in 2007. When the Jaguars hold an opponent to less than 20 points, the club has a 35-7 record since 2003.

■ The Jaguars were stingy on the opponents' first possession in the regular season as they allowed only nine points (3 FGs) and forced a NFL-high 12 punts. The Jaguars were the only team to not allow a touchdown on the opening possession. Opponents were held scoreless in the first quarter in seven of the last eight games and 10 of 16 games.

CAREER MARKS: Fred Taylor (1st round, 1998 draft) is the only player who has been with the club more than nine seasons in Jacksonville. Taylor holds a prominent place in the Jaguars career record books as he holds every career rushing mark and surpassed Jimmy Smith (12,285) for the most yards from scrimmage and most all-purpose yards this season.
