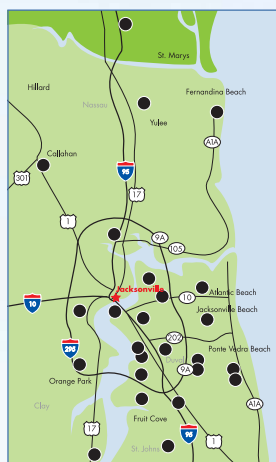

MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefiting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

FOUNDATION'S GRANT AWARDS TOP \$10 MILLION

When the Jaguars were named as the 30th franchise in 1993, the Weaver's vision was to give back to the community in a substantial manner. The Foundation was announced on September 14, 1994, and awarded its first grants in March of 1995, well before the team played its first game. In June of 2007, the Foundation reached a new milestone: its total grant making since 1995 topped \$10 million dollars. This level of giving is among the top few in professional sports. Through a fair and objective evaluation process, grants are allocated to serve the needs of economically and socially disadvantaged youth in Northeast Florida.

PROGRAMS:

STRAIGHT TALK™: Straight Talk is a unique partnership with local media, the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy and co-sponsor Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida to help prevent teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections. Under the leadership of Foundation Chair and CEO, and Jaguars owner, Delores Barr Weaver; WJXT 4, WJCT PBS 7, WTLV ABC 12, WCWJ CW 17, WJXX ABC 25, WAWS FOX 30, WTEV CBS 47, Comcast Cable, The Florida Times-Union / jacksonville.com, Clear Channel Outdoor and PRI Productions collaborate to produce an annual prime time television town hall forum, "Teens & Sex...the Real Truth." The show offers candid information on teens and sex and the consequences faced by sexually active teenagers. Broadcast each May (National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month), the 2007 show was hosted by local broadcast personality Jennifer Candelino. Jaguars players Ernest Wilford and Joe Zelenka were featured along with ROAR member, Michelle, radio personality DJ Dr. Doom, a panel of experts including adolescent health expert Dr. Linda Dinerman and the Honorable Libby Senterfitt, Duval County District Court Judge; with a special performance by national recording artist Rodney "Yung Rod" Gibson. The Straight Talk program, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, has also awarded more than \$1.6 million in grants to local programs specifically dealing with this issue. HONOR ROWS®: In partnership with Reebok, this unique program, now in its 13th year, uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for youth ages 9 to 17 to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. Youth can earn their seat to a game if they achieve specific goals in the areas of academic improvement, personal behavior, volunteer community service, and nutrition and physical fitness activities. In addition, all Honor Rows youth pledge to remain free from illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco. Nearly 4,300 seats will be awarded in 2007 to more than 40 nonprofit agencies. A volunteer committee reviews all Honor Rows proposals. At the game, participants receive a meal, Honor Rows t-shirt and hat, and special recognition by the Weavers and fans. The United Way of

Northeast Florida mobilizes game-day volunteers who ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of the participants.

In addition to the Honor Rows, the Jaguars Foundation awards seats to other charitable organizations, including Habijax for volunteer recognition; US Navy/Sailors Aweigh for youth whose parents are on deployment; inner-city youth football associations; Ronald McDonald House guest families and others that meet Foundation guidelines for support. Each season, the Foundation allocates approximately 11,800 seats for charitable purposes with an in-kind value exceeding \$430,000.

THE OFFICIAL PLAYBOOKS® READING PROGRAM: Through a partnership with Pepsi, Reebok and local public libraries, this award winning innovative program inspires young people to read. The 2007-08 Official Playbooks booklet features Jaguars owners, players, Head Coach



and cheerleaders with books featuring cities from among the Jaguars 2007 season opponents, as well as books featuring the Jacksonville area. Youth can pick-up a copy of Playbooks during the football season at area public libraries. Playbooks can also be accessed year-round at jaguars.com. The Foundation also awards approximately \$300,000 in grants annually to programs that promote literacy. In addition, since 2003, through a partnership with the nonprofit FIRST BOOK, major book publishers and local co-sponsors, the Jaguars Foundation has distributed more than 450,000 new children's books into the homes of low-income families including 130,000 books in 2007.

CHILDHOOD OBESITY PREVENTION: In partnership with Baptist Health, the NFL, the American Heart Association (AHA), and the Duval County Public Schools, the Jaguars Foundation initiated a local effort in early 2007 to develop programs that address the risks of poor nutrition and lack of physical fitness which can lead to childhood obesity. Utilizing a fitness curriculum created by the NFL and the AHA entitled "What Moves U," and working with select local nonprofits and public schools, programs will offer both educational and hands-on activities designed to prevent and reduce the occurrence of childhood obesity.

ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against tobacco use. The signature "Jaguars Don't Smoke" logo, showing a vibrant Jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw, appears on the scoreboard and signage throughout Jacksonville Municipal Stadium; Jaguars' publications and autograph cards; and on television. The stadium has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. The Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from their game-day program, since followed by the entire league.



AWARDS AND RECOGNITION: The Jaguars Foundation was the proud recipient of the 2006 Steve Patterson Sports Philanthropy Award from The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Sports Philanthropy Project for outstanding leadership in philanthropy in professional sports, both for our work in Jacksonville and our leadership in guiding other professional teams in the development of grant making and other programs in their local markets. The Foundation's Straight Talk program received the Wilmer Shields Rich Bronze Award for Excellence in Communications (2005) by the Council on Foundations. The Jaguars Foundation was named Jacksonville's Outstanding Foundation in 2003 by the Association of Fundraising Professionals-Florida First Coast Chapter. Also in 2003, the Foundation received the Governor's Community Investment Award in recognition of its juvenile justice crime and youth violence prevention programs for youth. Other awards include: Florida Department of Education's Commissioner's Business Recognition Award (2001); Bridge Builder Award (1997); WTLV-12 Top of the Class Award (1996) for Playbooks; Governor's Community Investment Award (1996) for Honor Rows, and Grantmakers in Health Award (1996 and 1995). The Jaguars Foundation's innovative programs have been recognized in national media, including the January/February 2005 issue of FOUNDATION News and Commentary, as well as in articles in the New York Times, Forbes, Grantsmanship Center Magazine, St. Anthony Messenger, and on ESPN and the "Osgood File" radio program.

DELORES BARR WEAVER CHAIR/CEO, JAGUARS FOUNDATION



Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Georgia and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 52 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, a seventeen-year-old granddaughter, Morgan and a four-year-old grandson, Nash. Leigh and her friend, Beau Gage, are the artists of TOUCHDOWN, the 16' long and 6' high bronze jaguar that stands outside the Crown Royal touchdown Club located on the west side of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all seven local television stations and their affiliates along with Comcast Cable, Cox Radio, Clear Channel Radio and Outdoor, as well as the local newspaper and their website Jacksonville.com, have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy, AIDS, and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and to heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville. The annual Straight Talk program is broadcast each May during National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month. In addition, the Jaguars Foundation, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, has also awarded in excess of \$1.7 million dollars in grants to local programs specifically addressing the issue of teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars who "open the doors and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September, 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, grants to eight local agencies in the amount of \$140,000 were made and through June, 2007, the Foundation has allocated more than \$10.4 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit her Jaguars partners for their generous financial support and staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term impact.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating sexism, racism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally, Delores serves on the Governing Board of the USO Council, WJCT Foundation and she serves as Trustee Emeritus of the United Way of Northeast Florida. She also serves on the Advisory Boards of Ronald McDonald House, The Bridge of Northeast Florida, and the Cathedral Arts Project, Inc., the Honorary Board of Dreams Come True and WJCT Public Broadcasting. And as a very concerned citizen in regard to public education, she and husband, Wayne, have committed \$1.2 million to bring Teach for America to Jacksonville beginning in the 2008/09 school year. In addition and after a ten year tenure as a Board of Trustees member of the Community Foundation, she now serves on its Quality Education for All Committee. Delores is a staunch supporter of the four local domestic violence shelters: Betty Griffin House, Hubbard House, Micah's Place and Quigley House, as well as Planned Parenthood, and is a member of The International Women's Forum and the Women's Giving Alliance. She served as chair of the Delores Barr Weaver Golf Tournament benefiting Habijax, Jacksonville's affiliate of Habitat for Humanity from 1996-2006. Since its inception in 1996, the tournament sponsored 65 houses, representing a cash contribution in excess of \$2.2 million.

Delores is the Founder of FRIENDS of Habijax. Through the Florida Sales Tax Refund Program to build low-income housing, a total of 25 organizations are designated Charter Members of FRIENDS and together they have sponsored 148 houses with an additional 5 houses by other FRIENDS entities for a total of 153 houses. The golf tournament and FRIENDS have sponsored a total of 218 houses, representing a cash contribution to Habijax in excess of \$7.9 million. Delores says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home." Under Delores' guidance, the Weaver Family Foundation has contributed over \$18.6 million to Jacksonville agencies and organizations, of which \$1.5M has been contributed to United Way of Northeast Florida and an additional \$500,000 is committed over the next two years. The Weavers also contributed \$1 million to United Way of America for designated programs directed toward Hurricane Katrina Relief.

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of NFL Charities, New York, Taste of the NFL/Hunger Related Events, Minnesota, the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge, Boston, and a Founding Member of the Sports Philanthropy Project in New England. Delores and Wayne created the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research at the Dana-Farber in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1957. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures, and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease, will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised over \$34 million.

And yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars; she has not missed a game in the twelve year franchise history, and readily admits she is both nervous and excited on game day. She knows the best is yet to come on both the field of life and the football field.





PETER RACINE
EXEC. DIRECTOR, JAGUARS FOUNDATION



Prior to joining the Foundation in September of 2000, Peter Racine developed and administered programs for abused, neglected, homeless and runaway children, including eight years as Executive Director of the Northeast Florida Exchange Club Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse. From 1987 to 1992, as Executive Director for Covenant House in Honduras, Central America, he established programs for Honduran street children. Prior to that, he helped begin Covenant House programs in Houston and Toronto after working at their New York City site. Racine has partnered with various national and international initiatives, including: Community Partnerships for Protecting Children with the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation; Early Childhood Violence Prevention Project with the U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; Outreach to Urban Street Children with the European Economic Community and the Sports Philanthropy Project with The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

Racine received his B.A. at Rutgers University in New Jersey, and his M.T.S. at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. He, his spouse Kelly and daughter Miriam reside in Jacksonville.

Marjorie Sabio Marquez has been with the Jaguars Foundation since its inception in 1994. She served as Coordinator of Grants and Special Programs prior to being named a Program Officer. Her responsibilities include management of Straight Talk, the Foundation's teen pregnancy prevention initiative which includes grant making and an annual televised forum; Playbooks, the reading program which includes contests and an annual publication; and, grant making and evaluation.

Marquez graduated from Boston College, with a degree in English and a concentration in Communication in 1990. She and her husband Rodnie live in Jacksonville.

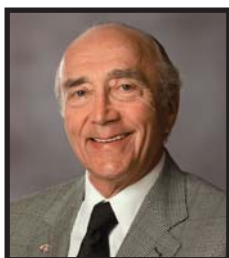

Under Wayne Weaver's leadership, the Jacksonville Jaguars organization established itself as the most successful expansion franchise in league history, with four playoff berths in the team's first five seasons. Adding two division titles and two appearances in the AFC Championship game, the franchise has proven competitive throughout its brief history. These achievements have been the result of Weaver's commitment to winning. One goal remains: a Super Bowl championship.

Over the past ten seasons, the Jaguars are tied for sixth in the league with an 89-71 (.556) regular season record. The only franchises ahead of them during that span are New England, Denver, Green Bay, Pittsburgh and Indianapolis. And in the last three years the Jaguars are tied for seventh in the league with a 29-19 mark.

In 2005, the team's 11th season, the Jaguars posted a 12-4 regular season record, which was the second-best in franchise history, and returned to the postseason after a five-year playoff drought.

"As an organization we have experienced success, but we are reminded every season how difficult it is to win in this league," Weaver says. "The challenge each year is to be better in every area and to win our division. We believe in what we're doing and we're committed to winning. We strive to represent Jacksonville with distinction, both on the playing field and in our community."

Weaver and his partners surprised the football world by winning an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville on November 30, 1993. In 1994 Weaver presided over the building of one of the NFL's showpiece stadiums, and in the 1995 inaugural season his young team claimed four victories.

In 1996 Weaver saw his second-year dream team win seven consecutive late-

season games, including two playoff games in Buffalo and Denver, and advance to within one win of the Super Bowl. That year's playoff victory over the Broncos is regarded as one of pro football's biggest upsets ever.

The 1997 Jaguars won 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team had

ever won, and in 1998 the Jaguars claimed their first AFC Central division title as the franchise hosted its first-ever home playoff game. In 1999 the Jaguars finished with the NFL's best record, a 14-2 regular season mark, as the team hosted the AFC Championship game in Jacksonville.

In 2000 Weaver led the effort to bring the Super Bowl to Jacksonville, as the city was selected in a vote of his fellow owners. In hosting Super Bowl XXXIX in Jacksonville on February 6, 2005, Weaver put an exclamation point on the first decade of NFL football in Jacksonville. The smallest city to host the league's crown jewel, Jacksonville saw its leaders and citizens rally together to create a successful and memorable Super Bowl experience.

A highly successful entrepreneur throughout his business career, Weaver

brought with him to Jacksonville great energy, enthusiasm and keen business acumen. He wanted a model football franchise and a team that would contend for the playoffs in a short time. Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has long proven to be a winning way.

But if football is his passion, Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers that is based in Evansville, Ind. He also serves as chairman and CEO of Liz Claiborne Shoes, a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country that is headquartered in Jacksonville. Previously Weaver was co-owner, president and CEO of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear.

Throughout his business career,

Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores Weaver have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars Foundation.

Weaver is a member of four NFL committees: Finance, Investment, Business Ventures, and Compensation. He is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York, and also serves on the boards of Stein Mart, the Jacksonville Zoo and the Alliance for World Class Education.

Weaver was born on January 14, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West.

Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 52 years and have a daughter Leigh, a son Bradley, and two grandchildren, Morgan and Nash.



Paul Vance has served as senior vice president of football operations since November, 2001 after serving as general counsel to the team since the inception of the Jaguars. He is one of 15 current staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Vance is responsible for the Jaguars' salary cap strategy and player contract negotiations. He also oversees the team training, medical, video and equipment departments as well as team travel and logistics.

In 2002 he was credited with developing, with former Coach Tom Coughlin, the plan to solve the Jaguars salary cap problems for the 2002 season. The plan involved the drastic but necessary decision to offer Pro Bowl tackle Tony Boselli, Gary Walker and Seth Payne to the Houston Texans in the Expansion Draft, as well as the implementation of fiscal restraint in player contracts and acquisition for the 2002 and 2003 seasons.

Since taking over in 2001, Vance has been responsible for the negotiation of extensions to retain the many current veterans who form the core of the team, such as Rashean Mathis, Marcus Stroud, Fred Taylor, John Henderson, Vince Manuwai, Daryl Smith, Brad Meester, Maurice Williams, Chris Naeole, and Paul Spicer and contracts with free agents who joined the Jaguars, including Brian Williams, Reggie Hayward, Mike Peterson and Tony Pashos. Notable rookies signed during this period include John Henderson, Byron Leftwich, Reggie Williams, Matt Jones, Mercedes Lewis and Maurice Jones-Drew.

After the coaching change was announced at the end of the 2002 season, Vance assisted owner Wayne Weaver in the identification and interview of prospective candidates. The process led to the signing of head coach Jack Del Rio and vice president of player personnel James Harris. Del Rio, Harris and Vance

have established a close working relationship that emphasizes consideration and balance of all coaching, player personnel and salary cap aspects in the player acquisition and roster building process.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, Vance had been in private practice for 21 years in Connecticut. While there, he represented Wayne Weaver during the expansion process. Since coming to Jacksonville, he has been of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars.

He graduated from the University of Rochester in 1969 with a degree in economics. While at Rochester, he played varsity baseball and captained the school's basketball team. He received his J.D. in 1973 from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

Among his community activities, he is a member of the board and the executive committee of the Alliance for World-Class Education, a coalition of business and charitable interests formed to support efforts to improve public school education in Jacksonville. He also is currently a member of the Business Advisory Council of the University of North Florida's Coggin School of Business and the Advisory Board of Florida Coastal School of Law. He has previously served on the board and executive committee of Jacksonville's Museum of Science and History and of the MaliVai Washington Kids Foundation. He has also served as a member of the steering committee of Downtown Visions, Inc., which successfully organized a business improvement district in downtown Jacksonville.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Paul and his wife, Jane, live in Jacksonville. They have four children: daughters, Kerry and Jamie, and sons, Jordan and Derek.





Bill Prescott is the senior vice president, stadium operations/chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He is responsible for managing the Jaguars areas of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium as well as stadium concession operations on a year-round basis. Prescott serves as the liaison for the Jaguars and the City of Jacksonville on lease matters and SMG facility and game day operations issues.

Prescott oversaw the design and construction of the recent \$63 million renovation of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. All of the renovations were completed in time for Super Bowl XXXIX, which was played on February 6, 2005.

As CFO, he oversees the financial operations and information technology of the team. Prescott interacts with the NFL on financial matters and works closely on league-wide revenue sharing issues. He also serves on an NFL committee to review the best practices of financial and

business operations.

Prescott is also responsible for the financial operations of other Wayne Weaver-related entities, such as the DAR Group, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation and the Weaver Family Foundation. He has been involved with the Jaguars since their inception and has also handled the Weavers' finances since 1980.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Prescott is a graduate of Pace University with a degree in accounting and a master's degree in taxation. He is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Prescott is the former chairman for the Mohawk District of the Boy Scouts of North Florida, an urban scouting program serving the at-risk youth of Jacksonville. Prescott was born May 7, 1956. He has two sons, Christopher and Michael. He and his wife, Kim, live in Ponte Vedra Beach.



Tim Connolly joined the Jaguars in March of 2003 when he took over responsibility for the Jaguars' Super Bowl XXXIX project, an initiative to help fund the capital improvements to the stadium for the 2005 Super Bowl. In October of 2004, Connolly was named senior vice president, business development and now directs the ticket sales/marketing, ticket operations/customer service, and the special events teams in addition to developing and sustaining new branding and business opportunities.

Connolly previously spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings and seven years with the Kansas City Chiefs. He served as executive vice president and general manager of the Vikings in 1998 and '99. In 1999, the Vikings sold the most season tickets in the franchise's 39-year history - 16,000 more than the previous season.

In Kansas City, Connolly served as the Chiefs' executive vice president and chief operating officer as a member of the team's front office from 1989 through



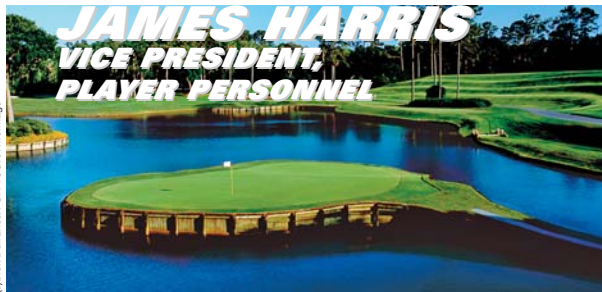


1995. By 1991 Arrowhead Stadium reached sold-out status, beginning a consecutive sell-out streak that has reached 100-plus games. By 1994 the Chiefs led the NFL in attendance, averaging almost 77,000 per game.

Connolly began his business career in 1971 with the IBM Corporation. In January of 1986 he was named president and CEO of Bell Atlantic's Cellular Phone

Company.

Connolly is a 1971 graduate of George Washington University, is very active in the community and has served on several boards including the Ronald McDonald House (Washington, D.C.) and the Governors Small Business Advisory Board. He has three grown children - Jenny, Brie and John, and resides with his wife, Nyunok in Jacksonville.



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James Harris, named vice president of player personnel on January 23, 2003, is known as "Shack" to just about everyone familiar with him. Harris is responsible for all player acquisitions, including the annual college draft, free agency, undrafted player signings and the scouting and signing of players from other professional leagues.

Harris and his personnel staff, working closely with Jack Del Rio and the coaching staff, have made significant contributions to the Jaguars roster through the acquisition of several key players. This includes first-round draft picks Byron Leftwich, Reggie Williams, Matt Jones, Mercedes Lewis and Reggie Nelson; second round picks Rashean Mathis, Daryl Smith and Maurice Jones-Drew, as well as several key late-round selections and veteran free agents.

A veteran with over 30 years experience in the NFL, Harris played quarterback for 12 seasons before embarking on a personnel career that is now in its 20th year. His career began in 1987 as a scout for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). From 1993-96, Harris served as assistant general manager of the New York Jets. Named director of pro personnel for the Baltimore Ravens in 1997, he spent six years with the Ravens where he earned a Super Bowl ring with the Ravens' victory in Super Bowl XXXV in 2000.

As a player, Harris was a pioneer. He was one of a handful of blacks drafted as quarterback. In 1969, he was selected in the eighth round by Buffalo, where he played quarterback from 1969-71. His 12

seasons in the league included time with the Los Angeles Rams (1973-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). During his stint with the Bills, Harris was the first black in league history to open a regular season as a starting quarterback. In 1976, Harris led the NFC with an 89.8 passer rating, highlighted by a 436-yard passing day against the Miami Dolphins that season. He was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl after throwing for two TDs in a 14-13 victory over the AFC.

In May of 2003 and again in June of 2004, Sports Illustrated named Harris one of the top 50 most influential minorities in sports. In March of 2005, Harris was named one of the 50 most powerful blacks in Sports by Black Enterprise. He was awarded the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger award in March, 2006 for his outstanding efforts over the years to help level the playing field and improve life for minorities. Also, later that year, he founded the Shack Harris Doug Williams Foundation, a non-profit, tax-exempt organization dedicated to creating opportunities for economically disadvantaged youth. In February 2007, he was featured along with other members of the Field Generals in ESPN's "Third and a Mile: The Trials and Triumphs of the Black Quarterback" by William Rhoden.

Harris' collegiate days were equally impressive. He was recruited and played for one of college football's greatest coaches, the legendary Eddie Robinson of Grambling State. In each of Harris' four seasons with the Tigers (1965-68), the team won or shared the SWAC title. He





was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic and was named Pittsburgh Courier Player of the Year in 1968.

A legendary athlete at Carroll High School in his hometown of Monroe, La., Harris received two-time All-State honors as quarterback of the Tigers. He also led Carroll to two undefeated seasons and a State Championship.

Harris earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his contributions to American society during

his NFL career. He is an inductee of the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He is a member of the Fritz Pollard Alliance and a founding member of the Field Generals: The African American Quarterbacks Club, a non-profit group founded by and composed of NFL greats dedicated to teaching and preserving the history of the African American quarterback.

He was born in Monroe, La. on July 20, 1947. He and his wife, Vickie, reside in Jacksonville.



Dan Edwards, the Jaguars' vice president of communications and media, is in his 14th year with the Jaguars and his 24th season in the NFL. He is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Jaguars' communications division, which includes media relations, community relations, publications, broadcasting, and the team's web site, www.jaguars.com.

Edwards joined the Jaguars on May 4, 1994 following nine years with the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 2003 the organization's community relations department and Internet content were added to his responsibilities when he was promoted to vice president. He is one of 15 current staff members who have been with the franchise since 1994.

Previously he was the public relations director for the Steelers (1987-93) after beginning his career as a public relations intern in the NFL office. Edwards spent the 1984 football season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins before join-

ing the Steelers in 1985. He has also worked for the NFL on its Super Bowl PR staff at 19 Super Bowls in addition to the 1990 Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL, Edwards worked in professional baseball as an administrative assistant with the Eugene (Ore.) Emeralds, a single-A affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds. He played football and baseball for Montgomery College (Md.) before transferring to the University of Oregon. Edwards received his undergraduate degree in business administration/management from the Lundquist College of Business at the University of Oregon in 1981, and a master's degree in sports administration/facility management from Ohio University in 1984.

Born January 15, 1959 in Denver, Edwards grew up in the Washington, D.C. area. He and his wife Tricia have four children: sons Christian and Preston and daughters Danielle and Victoria.

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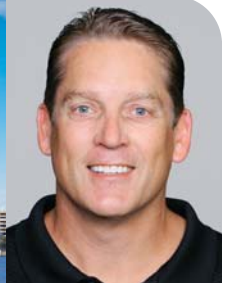
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JACK DEL RIO



Over the last three years the Jacksonville Jaguars are tied for seventh in regular season wins among the 32 National Football League teams. Their 29-19 mark during that time includes a 16-8 record at home. With Jack Del Rio as head coach, the Jacksonville defense ranks fourth in the league over the past four seasons in yards allowed (296.6 per game) and third in points allowed (16.1), while the offense is sixth in rushing yards (131.6) and third in fewest turnovers (93).

In 2006 Del Rio led the Jaguars to their third consecutive non-losing season at 8-8, despite losing 15 players to injured reserve. Nine key players missed a combined total of 100 games due to injury. The campaign included a 5-3 result against playoff teams and seven losses by seven points or less. Among the highlights were a franchise-record 2,541 rushing yards, an average of 158.8 yards per game, and just 30 sacks allowed on offense. The defense posted the highest ranking in team history at second overall, contributed a team-record 20 interceptions, and posted two shutouts.

"This is a good football team that we have built, with a deep roster," Del Rio says about his 2007 squad. "This season we have several key veterans returning from injuries, coupled with a core of younger, talented players who have benefitted from gaining valuable playing time."

Del Rio was named the second head coach in Jaguars history on January 17, 2003. Now in his 22nd year in the NFL and his 11th in coaching, he has spent 25 seasons playing and coaching in college and professional football. During that time Del Rio has played for, coached with, and learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to play at Southern California by John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Frank Ganzs, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green.

Among other notable coaches he teamed with during his 11-year playing career are Dom Capers, Dave Campo, Dave Wannstedt, Tony Dungy, Monte Kiffin, Tom Moore, Norv Turner, Butch Davis and Mike Tice. As an assistant coach for six seasons, Del Rio worked on the staffs of Hall of Famer Mike Ditka, Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, and Super Bowl participant John Fox. Among

those he was on coaching staffs with are Marvin Lewis and Mike Nolan.

Del Rio, 44, had the longest playing career among the league's eight current head coaches who also played in the NFL. His 11 seasons top Herman Edwards (10), Gary Kubiak (9), Ken Whisenhunt (9), Dick Jauron (8), Jeff Fisher (5), Tony Dungy (3) and Sean Payton (1).

This year Del Rio was appointed to serve as a member of the NFL Coaches Subcommittee to the powerful NFL Competition Committee. He has participated in many hours of committee meetings and discussions to help advance the game.

In 2005 the Jaguars won eight of their last nine regular season games, including four straight on the road, en route to a 12-4 record and a Wild Card playoff berth. Among the team's highlights was the league's sixth-ranked defense which was also sixth in points allowed, 19 defensive interceptions, and a first-place ranking in opponent starting field position. On offense the team increased scoring by 100 points over the previous year and had a team-record and NFL-low six interceptions thrown. The unit ranked fifth in the league in time of possession and second in turnovers.

Del Rio posted the team's first winning record in five seasons along with a second-place finish in the division, the team's highest since 1999, in leading the Jaguars to a 9-7 mark in 2004. Among the notable achievements that year were first-ever road wins at The Coliseum, The RCA Dome and Lambeau Field. Despite losing several defensive ends to injury, the defense led the league in red zone efficiency and ranked seventh in scoring defense and 11th overall in yards allowed. The special teams, which ranked last in the NFL in 2003, made significant improvement in jumping 16 spots to rank 16th.

In taking over the Jaguars in 2003, Del Rio was the architect of a defense that improved to sixth overall in the NFL, and second against the run. He had inherited a team that had not been in the top 10 in total defense since 1999, ranking 20th in 2002. The defense allowed only one 100-yard rusher in 2003, while the offense allowed just 28 sacks, the fewest in team history, and Fred Taylor rushed for a team-record 1,572 yards

with Byron Leftwich starting 13 games as a rookie quarterback. The Jaguars' 5-11 record included six losses by seven points or less.

The impressive rise on defense was no coincidence since Del Rio was only one year removed from taking the Carolina Panthers defense from last in the league to second overall as defensive coordinator of the Panthers in 2002. Coming off a 1-15 season, the Panthers defense allowed 290.4 yards per game, led the NFL in fewest rushing yards per attempt, and ranked second in fewest yards per play, third down efficiency, and sacks. The Panthers allowed the fifth-fewest points in the league, did not allow a 300-yard passer, and didn't yield a 100-yard rusher until the season finale.

From 1999 to 2001, Del Rio served as linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens, helping the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants. For those three years, in which the Ravens finished second in total defense three times, Del Rio coached the Ravens' talented linebacker corps which featured Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. During the Ravens' 2000 season the defense set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points and recording four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 record. The group also led the NFL with 49 forced turnovers. The defense continued its domination in the playoffs, allowing just one touchdown in four games.

Del Rio began his coaching career in New Orleans under Ditka, spending two seasons as assistant strength coach in 1997 and linebackers coach in 1998.

Del Rio was drafted in the third round (68th overall) by the Saints in 1985, when he was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team and earned the Saints' Rookie of the Year award. Following two seasons in New Orleans, Del Rio played for the Kansas City Chiefs, Dallas Cowboys and Minnesota Vikings. He led the Vikings in tackles three straight years and played in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season. An 11-year NFL veteran, Del Rio finished his career with 1,078 tackles, 12 quarterback sacks, 13 interceptions and more than 100 consecutive starts between 1989 and 1994. He went to the playoffs once with the Cowboys and three times with the Vikings.

Del Rio was a four-year starter from 1981 to '84 at Southern California, where he earned consensus All-America honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award. The Trojans were 30-15-1 during his four seasons, three times ranked among the top 15 teams in the country. He played in the 1982 Fiesta Bowl and was co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. He led the Trojans in tackles for a loss three years in a row and played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Japan Bowl. Del Rio finished his college career with 340 tackles, 58 tackles for loss, five fumble recoveries and one interception.

Drafted out of high school by the Toronto

Blue Jays in 1981, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on Southern California's baseball team in 1983 and '84. He was a teammate of current Arizona Diamondbacks pitcher Randy Johnson and former major league slugger Mark McGwire.

Del Rio graduated from Hayward (Calif.) High School, where he played football, baseball and basketball. He holds a political science degree from the University of Kansas, which he earned while playing for the Chiefs. Born April 4, 1963 in Castro Valley, Calif., he and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son, Luke.

PHILANTHROPY: The Del Rio Family has been extremely active in Jacksonville since arriving in 2003. Together they have been instrumental in raising and distributing money for numerous organizations. The family supports the American Cancer Society and are members of The Laureate Society of Jacksonville, for those who give \$10,000 or more to the American Cancer Society.

The Del Rios raised funds for the Seamark Ranch through sales of the 2003 JagNet Cookbook, and through the 2004 Jack Del Rio Charity Golf Classic. They have also helped to raise money through the American Cancer Society Relay for Life and Freedom Alliance Fund. A list of organizations the family has supported includes Wolfson Children's Hospital, St. Jude Children's Hospital, St. Vincent's Hospital, Leukemia Lymphoma Society, Families First, The Salvation Army, Cystic Fibrosis, The Ronald McDonald House, Devereaux Day School, St. Catherine Labouré Manor, and Hubbard House.

In 2007 Del Rio was named to the prestigious University of North Florida Brooks College of Health Dean's Council, joining several executives from local companies. Del Rio participated in the 2006 Murray Brothers Caddyshack Charity Golf Tournament in St. Augustine to benefit St. Vincent's Foundation Mobile Health Outreach Ministry and Brave Kids.

In addition, Del Rio supports numerous charities in his hometown of Hayward, Calif., and New Orleans, La., where he spent time as a player and coach for the Saints. He served as the honorary chairman for a Hayward High Football Alumni Golf Tournament in June of 2007 to raise money for his alma mater's program. He is part of the Hayward High Football Alumni, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation founded by a group of former Hayward High School players for the purpose of supporting the academic and athletic development of the young men in the community.

Dave Campo enters his third season as assistant head coach/secondary for the Jaguars. The Jaguars secondary helped the NFL's second-ranked defense set a franchise record with 20 interceptions in 2006, surpassing the previous record of 19 set in 2005.

Under Campo, the Jaguars rank tied for fourth in the NFL from 2005-06 with 39 interceptions. Rashean Mathis became the first Jaguars cornerback to be voted to the Pro Bowl as he ranked tied for third in the NFL with a team-record eight interceptions last year. The Jaguars had two-plus interceptions in seven of 16 games in 2006.

Campo was named assistant head coach/secondary for the Jaguars on February 17, 2005. Campo is a veteran of 18 years of NFL experience including three as a head coach. Prior to the Jaguars, he had spent the two previous seasons as the Cleveland Browns' defensive coordinator.

Before joining the Browns, Campo spent the previous 14 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, including 11 seasons as an assistant and the last three as head coach from 2000 to 2002. During his tenure in Dallas, he helped the team win consecutive Super Bowl championships in 1992 and 1993 and again in 1995.

In Campo's first two seasons as head coach, the Cowboys defense finished third in the NFL in passing defense and the team finished fourth in total defense in 2001. From 2001 to '02, the Dallas defense ranked among the NFL's elite allowing teams to average 3.7-yards a rush and allowing only 22 rushing touchdowns in 32 games.

In four of the five years that Campo directed the Dallas defense as coordinator, the Cowboys finished the year ranked among the NFL's top 10 units, including a pair of top-three finishes.

Prior to becoming defensive coordinator on Jan. 24, 1995, Campo directed a secondary

that had grown into one of the team's deepest and most productive units. His 1994 squad led the NFL in pass defense and tied for fourth in the NFL with 22 interceptions. All-Pro strong safety Darren Woodson became the first Dallas defensive back to earn a starting Pro Bowl berth since Everson Walls.

Campo, 60, was hired by Dallas in 1989 after spending two years at the University of Miami as the secondary coach. At Miami, he helped the Hurricanes to a two-year record of 23-1 and the 1987 National Championship. Safety Bennie Blades was the 1987 Jim Thorpe Award winner before being selected with the third pick in the NFL draft by the Detroit Lions.

Campo began his career at his alma mater, Central Connecticut State, where he spent the 1971-72 seasons. He then moved to the University of Albany (1973), Bridgeport (1974), the University of Pittsburgh (1975), Washington State (1976), Boise State (1977-79), Oregon State (1980), Weber State (1981-82), Iowa State (1983) and Syracuse (1984-86). In addition to starring at defensive back in college, Campo twice earned All-East honors at shortstop at Central Connecticut State.

Campo has hosted an annual golf tournament in Hartford, Ct. to raise money for Focus on Kids, a charity that supplies eyeglasses for underprivileged children. Born July 18, 1947, he attended Robert E. Fitch High in Groton, Conn. He and his wife, Kay, have six children: Angie, Eric, Beckie, Tommy, Shelbie and Michael.

Mike Tice is in his second season with the Jaguars as assistant head coach and will also be responsible for the tight ends in 2007.

Tice joined the Jaguars on February 1, 2006 after spending 14 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings as a player and coach.

Tice, 48, has 25 years of experience in the NFL with 14 as a player and 11 in the coaching ranks. He previously served as head coach of the Vikings from 2002-05. The Vikings posted a winning record in three of four seasons under Tice including a playoff berth in 2004.

In Tice's first season with the Jaguars, the club ranked 10th in offense, the highest ranking since 2000. The Jaguars set a single-season franchise rushing record with 2,541 yards (158.8). In addition, the club set a franchise record with a 5.0-yard rushing average and 5.5 average per play.

The Vikings finished in the top 10 in the NFL for total offense in six of the nine seasons Tice was on the staff. The Vikings set a NFL record for most consecutive games with 300-plus yards of offense (2002-04) with 36.

Tice had been associated with the Vikings since 1992 when he played three seasons (1992-93, 1995) as a tight end. He served as tight ends coach for Minnesota in 1996 and offensive line coach from 1997-2001 before being promoted to head coach.

Tice led the Vikings to the playoffs in 2004 and their first road playoff victory in franchise history with a win at Green Bay. Tice joined Jerry Burns as the only coaches in club history to win their playoff debuts. The Vikings set a team record in 2004 for net yards (6,339) and passing yards (4,754). Daunte Culpepper set numerous club passing records and produced one of the finest seasons in NFL history by a quarterback.

The Vikings finished with a winning record in 2003 for the first time since 2000. The

Vikings led the NFL in offense for the first time in their history and sent four players to the Pro Bowl. In Tice's first season as head coach in 2002, the Vikings led the NFL in rushing for the first time in team history with 2,507 yards.

As an offensive line coach, Tice tutored five different players (Matt Birk, Jeff Christy, Randall McDaniel, Todd Steussie, Corey Stringer) to 10 Pro Bowl appearances. In 1998, the offensive line paved the way for a NFL-record 556 points and then-record 41 touchdown passes. Three offensive linemen from the Vikings started in the Pro Bowl in 1998, the first offensive line trio in club history ever selected to the Pro Bowl.

Tice had 107 receptions for 894 yards and 11 touchdowns in his 14-year career. In addition to playing for the Vikings, he spent 10 seasons with Seattle (1981-88, 1990-91) and one season with Washington (1989). Tice, who started 109 of 177 NFL games, played under legendary head coach Chuck Knox in his final eight seasons in Seattle. He originally retired following the 1993 season, but was signed by the Vikings in December of 1995 to help a tight end position decimated by injuries.

Tice was the recipient of the Byron "Whizzer" White Humanitarian Award in 1987. Tice played collegiately at Maryland where he started two seasons at quarterback. He was born February 2, 1959 in Bayshore, N.Y., and attended Central Islip High School in Long Island where he played for current Central Florida head coach George O'Leary. He and his wife Diane have two children, Adrienne and Nathan.

Dirk Koetter was named offensive coordinator for the Jaguars on January 10, 2007. Koetter, known for his expertise of the passing offense, has 25 years of coaching experience and has spent the last nine seasons as a head coach at the collegiate level. He previously served as head coach at Arizona State from 2001-06 and at Boise State from 1998-2000.

Koetter led Arizona State to four bowl games in his six seasons, including a third straight bowl game in 2006. He finished with a 40-34 mark at Arizona State. While also serving as offensive coordinator, Koetter helped the Sun Devils average nearly 30 points per game over the last six seasons and the team was ranked in the top 20 in the nation in passing offense in five of his six seasons. Five of the six Sun Devil teams during Koetter's tenure produced a 1,000-yard receiver and the quarterback threw for 20 or more touchdown passes in five of six seasons.

Koetter molded Arizona State's all-time leading passer in Andrew Walter, its top career receiver in Derek Hagan and the top tight end in Sun Devils history in Zach Miller during his tenure. Walter, who played his final three seasons under Koetter, left as the Pac-10's career leader for touchdown passes with 85, surpassing John Elway who threw for 77 touchdowns while at Stanford from 1979-82. Hagan, who was a third-round pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2006, finished with a school-record 14 career 100-yard receiving games. Miller finished the 2006 season as the school's all-time leader in receptions and receiving yards for a tight end and was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award.

In 2005, ASU finished second in the nation in total offense, averaging 519.1 yards per game and third in the nation with 373.4 passing yards per game. In 2004,

Koetter led ASU to a 9-3 record and third-place finish in the Pac-10. The Sun Devils defeated Purdue in the Sun Bowl and finished the season ranked 19th in the Associated Press Poll. After finishing 4-7 in his first season at ASU, Koetter directed the program to an 8-6 mark in 2002 and a berth in the Holiday Bowl.

Prior to taking over ASU, Koetter spent three seasons as head coach at Boise State where he compiled a 26-10 mark and two consecutive bowl appearances. He was a two-time Big West Coach of the Year honoree and two-time conference champion. He spent two years as the offensive coordinator at the University of Oregon (1996-97).

A native of Pocatello, Idaho, Koetter played four seasons at Idaho State where he was part of the program that won a Division I-AA national championship. Following his graduation, he became head coach at Highland High at age 23 where he compiled a career record of 19-4 and won the 1984 state championship.

He spent the 1985 season as offensive coordinator at San Francisco State and from 1986-88 as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Texas El Paso. Prior to taking over at Boise State, Koetter served as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Missouri from 1989-93 and offensive coordinator at Boston College (1994-95) and Oregon (1996-97).

Koetter, 47, and his wife, Kim, have two daughters, Kaylee and Kendra, and two sons, Derek and Davis.

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Mike Smith enters his fifth year as defensive coordinator for the Jaguars. The Jaguars rank among the NFL's best since Smith took over the defensive reins in 2003. The Jaguars rank 4th in overall defense (296.6), 3rd in offensive points allowed (16.1), 5th in rushing defense (99.3) and have allowed the third fewest rushing touchdowns (37) from 2003-06.

Smith was named the Jaguars' defensive coordinator on January 21, 2003. A veteran of 26 years of coaching, Smith, 48, has experience in one form or another with almost every position on defense and on special teams.

The Jaguars ranked second in total defense (283.6) in 2006, the highest ranking in team history. The defense set a franchise-record with 20 interceptions and finished with the second-fewest net yards allowed in team history. The defense was dominant at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium as they allowed a NFL-low 11 points per game including two shutouts in their eight home games.

Smith was forced to deal with numerous injuries on defense as three starters were placed on injured reserve in Reggie Hayward, Mike Peterson and Donovan Darius. Cornerback Rashean Mathis and defensive tackle John Henderson were voted to the Pro Bowl, the fourth consecutive year a defensive player has been honored. Defensive end Bobby McCray, who replaced Hayward on the line, led the team with a career-high 10 sacks, becoming only the fourth Jaguar in team history to have a least 10 sacks in a season. Linebacker Daryl Smith ranked third in the NFL and led the club with a career-high 170 tackles.

The Jaguars ranked sixth in total defense (290.5) in 2005 and led the NFL by allowing only four rushing touchdowns. Daryl Smith was named to the USA Today All-Joe Team, an award that goes to the players and coaches who have overachieved and are often overlooked. The Jaguars led NFL in 2004 in red zone efficiency and ranked seventh in scoring defense.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, Smith spent the previous four seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, helping them to their Super Bowl championship in 2000. The Ravens' 2000

defense set an NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points. From 1999 to 2001, Smith was the Ravens' defensive assistant/defensive line coach, and in 2002 he was the linebackers coach, replacing Jack Del Rio, who became defensive coordinator of the Carolina Panthers. In 2002, Smith coached All-Pro Ray Lewis and Pro Bowler Peter Boulware, who had his finest NFL season, and he was instrumental in the development of second-year pro Ed Hartwell, who made a team-leading 196 tackles.

A native of Daytona Beach, Smith had a 12-year stint at Tennessee Tech (1987-98), the last three as the defensive coordinator. He joined the Tennessee Tech staff as defensive line coach, then served as special teams coordinator from 1988 to '95. He tutored the line for nine seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 1996. With Smith as defensive coordinator, the Golden Eagles' defense finished in the top 10 in the nation in both 1997 and '98. In 1998, Smith was promoted to defensive coordinator/assistant head coach.

Before joining Tennessee Tech, Smith was the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Morehead (Ky.) State. He served as a part-time assistant coach at San Diego State in 1982, and then spent the next three seasons (1983-85) coaching the Aztecs' linebackers. It was at San Diego State where he worked with Brian Billick, who brought him to Baltimore in 1999.

Smith played linebacker for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL in 1982. He played collegiately at East Tennessee (1977-81), where he was named defensive MVP twice at linebacker. As a senior, he led the team with 186 tackles. Smith was a star athlete at Father Lopez High in Daytona Beach and earned All-State honors as a linebacker in 1975. He was born June 13, 1959 in Chicago. He and his wife, Julie, have a daughter, Logan (5/13/00), and live in Jacksonville.

Joe DeCamillis is in his first season as the Jaguars' special teams coordinator. DeCamillis, who is known as one of NFL's top special teams coaches, has 19 years of NFL coaching experience and he has spent the past 14 seasons as a NFL special teams coach.

DeCamillis, 41, previously directed the special teams for the Atlanta Falcons from 1997-2006 with the last three seasons as special teams coordinator.

In DeCamillis' tenure, the Falcons punt coverage team allowed an NFL-low 6.1 yards per punt return and only one return for a touchdown. In addition, the Falcons had the third-most touchbacks (126), the second-most kickoff returns for touchdowns (8) and second-most total return touchdowns (13) during that span. A player on DeCamillis' special teams returned either a punt or a kickoff for a touchdown in 12 of the last 13 seasons.

In 2006, the Falcons led the NFL as opponents had an average starting position of the 23.6-yard line. They ranked fourth in the NFL with 47 kickoff returns of 20-plus yards and second in allowing only 26 kickoff returns of 20-plus yards.

In 2005, the Falcons were one of four teams to be ranked in the NFL's top 10 in both kickoff coverage (1st) and punt coverage (8th). PK Todd Peterson made 18 consecutive field goals and had the second-highest percentage in franchise history. PR Allen Rossum finished second in the NFL in punt returns in 2004 (12.4) and was named

to the Pro Bowl. The Falcons special teams ranked second in the NFL for kickoff and punt return units in 2003.

Jay Feely set the franchise record for most field goals (32) and most points (138) in a season in 2002 while punter Chris Mohr led the NFL in net punting average (38.7) in the same season. DeCamillis' punt return unit in 1999 had only 26 punts returned against them for 119 yards, which was the lowest in the NFL and 10th-lowest in the league since 1978. His 1998 unit surrendered only 112 punt return yards, the seventh-lowest in the NFL in a single season since 1978.

DeCamillis spent four seasons (1993-96) as special teams coach with the New York Giants under Dan Reeves. In 1996 with the Giants, his special teams led the NFL with 32 punts downed inside the 20-yard line and the punt return unit ranked sixth in the NFL (11.4 avg.) with two touchdowns scored.

DeCamillis started his coaching career in Denver as defensive quality control and assistant special teams coach from 1988-92.

DeCamillis was an all-state quarterback and wrestler at Arvada (Co.) High School and went on to become an All-America wrestler at Wyoming. DeCamillis and his wife, Dana, have two daughters, Caitlin and Ashley.

Mark Asanovich is in his fifth season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars and his 13th season as an NFL coach.

Asanovich, 48, oversees the Jaguars strength and conditioning program. The program emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts. It is his belief that players who are coached in the weightroom will develop better results. The cornerstone of the program is to "maximize physical potential and minimize physical injury."

With the support of Jaguars owner Wayne Weaver, Asanovich oversaw a \$300,000 renovation of the Jaguars weightroom before the 2003 offseason conditioning program.

"Wayne Weaver has given us the resources to win and Jack Del Rio and his staff have given us their support," Asanovich said. "The players have responded and given great effort."

Asanovich has an internship program beginning each March for college graduates interested in a career in strength and conditioning.

Asanovich has been a speaker for six consecutive years at the Strong-S seminar in Tokyo that is organized by the renowned Japanese trainer Tatsuya Okawa. Several Jaguars players accompany Asanovich on the trip each year where they speak at selected universities and other venues.

In 2002, Asanovich was the assistant strength and conditioning coach of the

Baltimore Ravens. He was the head strength and conditioning coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996 through 2001, working under former coach Tony Dungy.

Asanovich spent the 1995 season as assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Minnesota Vikings. From 1987 to '95, he was the strength and conditioning coach at Anoka High School (Minneapolis, Minn.). In 1984, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio State, staying there two years. In 1986 he coached at The Citadel.

Asanovich has published several articles in his field of study and served as a member of the Minnesota Governor's Council on Health & Physical Fitness. He earned a bachelor's degree in education from St. Cloud State and a master's degree in exercise science from Ohio State.

Asanovich was born May 20, 1959 in Duluth, Minn. He played guard and linebacker at Duluth East High School and attended St. Cloud State. He and his wife, Allisen, have two daughters, Haley (8/25/00) and Gracie (11/1/02). They live in Orange Park.

Mark Duffner is in his second season as the linebackers coach for the Jaguars. Duffner was named to the post on January 31, 2006 after spending the previous three seasons in the same capacity for the Green Bay Packers.

Duffner, 54, has more than 31 years of coaching experience, including 11 seasons as a college head coach. Under Duffner, Jaguars 2006 third-round pick Clint Ingram stepped into a starting role and ranked second on the team and fourth among all rookies with 117 tackles. Daryl Smith, who moved to the middle with the season-ending injury to Mike Peterson, ranked third in the NFL in 2006 with a career-high 170 tackles along with three sacks.

At Green Bay, Duffner played a major role in the development of 2003 first-round draft pick Nick Barnett. Green Bay's defense finished the 2005 season as the seventh ranked defense in the NFL (ranked No. 1 against the pass) and Barnett set the team record with 194 tackles (128 solo) and became the first Packer to lead the team in tackles for three consecutive seasons. In 2004, the Packers defense ranked first in the NFL in red zone defense, allowing only five conversions in 21 third down attempts (23.8 percent).

Duffner entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Cincinnati Bengals where he spent six seasons as linebackers coach (1997-2000) and defensive coordinator (2001-02). In 2001, the Bengals defense allowed the fewest points since 1989 and fewest yards per game since 1983. In addition, the defense set a franchise single-season record for sacks with 48 in 2001.

Prior to joining the Bengals staff, Duffner

was head coach at the University of Maryland from 1992-96. He posted a 20-35 overall record that included a 11-11 mark over his final two seasons, the school's best two-season record since 1984-85. Duffner helped the Terps achieve their first national ranking in nine years when the club ranked as high as No. 17 in 1995. In addition to the success on the field, Duffner improved Maryland's player graduation rate, with three classes in a row ranking among the nation's best (1994-96).

Duffner also served as head coach at The College of Holy Cross where he compiled a 60-5-1 mark that included two 11-0 seasons (1987 and 1991) during his six seasons. He was named national coach of the year five times while at Holy Cross and 'New England Coach of the Year' five times. The 1987 Holy Cross team was ranked No. 1 in the nation in Division I-AA by the Associated Press. Duffner initially served as defensive coordinator at the school from 1981-1985.

Duffner's coaching career began as a graduate assistant under Woody Hayes at Ohio State (1975-76) before serving as defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati (1977-80).

Duffner played collegiately at William & Mary and was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1990. He and his wife, Kathy, have three children: daughters Christina and Carolyn and son, John.

Les Ebert is in his fourth season as Jacksonville's assistant strength and conditioning coach. Ebert is responsible for assisting strength and conditioning coach Mark Asanovich in all areas of the club's strength and conditioning program, which emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts.

Ebert, 34, spent the 2003 season as a part-time assistant strength and conditioning coach in Jacksonville. Prior to joining the Jaguars, Ebert spent three seasons, from 1999 to 2001, as the assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

In his three seasons in Tampa Bay, Ebert helped establish arguably one of the fittest squads in the NFL. During his three-year span, the Buccaneers sent 21 players to the Pro Bowl including Warren Sapp, Derrick Brooks, John Lynch and Mike Alstott, who made three consecutive trips each. Each year the team got stronger as the year progressed. In the final nine games of the reg-

ular season from 1999 to 2001 the teams' record was 8-1, 7-2, and 6-3. Those finishes led to three consecutive playoff appearances.

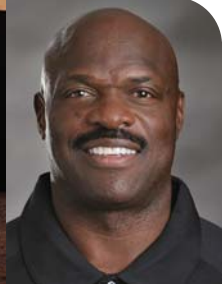
Born October 1, 1972 in Brainerd, Minn., Ebert was strength and conditioning coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School in 1998. In 1997, Ebert served as the Buccaneers' season long strength and conditioning intern.

Ebert earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Minnesota-Duluth and a master's degree in physical education from Emporia State University (Kan.). Ebert is a certified member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

Ebert played center and defensive end at Centennial (Minn.) High School. He and his wife, Rebecca reside in Orange Park with their son, Matthew.

Ray Hamilton is in his fifth season as the defensive line coach for the Jaguars and has established the defensive line as the cornerstone of the Jaguars' defense.

Defensive tackles Marcus Stroud and John Henderson anchor a defense that ranked second in the NFL in 2006. Stroud has started three Pro Bowls while Henderson earned Pro Bowl honors in 2004 and 2006.

Under Hamilton, defensive end Bobby McCray has developed into one of the AFC's premier pass rushers as he led the Jaguars with a career-high 10 sacks in 2006. The defensive front was forced to shuffle their rotation in 2006 due to injuries. Starting end Reggie Hayward was placed on injured reserve following the season-opener and Stroud missed five games with an ankle injury. Veteran Rob Meier, who plays both tackle and end, ranked second on the club with five sacks. The defensive line combined for 29.5 of the club's 35 sacks in 2006. The defense ranked fourth in the NFL in rushing yards allowed per game.

Hamilton is a longtime NFL veteran who played nine years for the New England Patriots and coached 16 years in the NFL before coming to Jacksonville in 2003. He joined the Jaguars after coaching the defensive line for Cleveland for two seasons. In his first season, the Browns tied for fourth in the AFC with 43 sacks. He spent three seasons as New England's line coach (1997-99) and then joined the Jets for the 2000 season. His 1998 defensive line tallied 25 of the team's 36 sacks, the seventh-best total in the NFL, and New England's 1997 defense registered 45 sacks.

Hamilton served a prior stint as defensive line coach with the Jets (1995-96), where he was instrumental in the development of defensive end Hugh Douglas, who was named the 1995 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Hamilton spent the 1993 and '94 seasons as defensive line coach for the Los Angeles Raiders, where he helped develop Chester McGlockton and the front line of a defense that combined for 83 sacks in his

two seasons with the Raiders. In 1992, Hamilton was the defensive line coach at the University of Tennessee, following stints as defensive line coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1991) and head coach of the Bay State Titans (1990), a semipro team that featured defensive tackle Eric Swann, the sixth overall choice in the 1991 NFL draft.

Hamilton began his coaching career in 1985, spending five seasons as an assistant defensive line coach with New England. He helped the Patriots to their first AFC Championship title and a Super Bowl XX appearance in his first season as a New England coach.

Hamilton was a 14th-round draft choice by the Patriots and a fixture on New England's defensive line from 1973 to '81. He established a Patriots rookie record with seven sacks while starting every game in his first season. Known affectionately as "Sugar Bear" during his playing career, he went on to start a team-record 110 consecutive games and currently ranks fifth on the Patriots' all-time sack list with 54. He played in 132 games in nine seasons.

Hamilton was born January 20, 1951 in Omaha, Neb. He graduated from Oklahoma with a degree in business. He was named All-Conference as a defensive tackle as a junior and senior. Hamilton received a master's degree in public administration in 1977 from Suffolk University while playing for the Patriots.

He has two sons: Kadar (8/24/76) and Damon (6/5/79). Kadar graduated from Stanford and is the Jaguars' Northeast Scout. Damon graduated from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. Ray and his wife, Phyllis, live in St. Augustine.

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Former NFL player and collegiate coach Andy Heck is in his second season as offensive line coach and fourth season with the Jaguars.

Heck was promoted to offensive line coach for the Jaguars on February 1, 2006. Heck joined the Jaguars coaching staff on February 9, 2004 as the offensive assistant/assistant offensive line coach and spent the 2005 season as assistant offensive line coach.

In Heck's first season as offensive line coach, the line paved the way to a single-season franchise-record for rushing yards (2,541) and allowed only 30 sacks, the second-fewest in team history. The Jaguars set a franchise-record with a 5.0 rushing average and 5.5 average per play.

The Jaguars rushed for a franchise-record 375 yards against Indianapolis on December 10. The Jaguars outgained their opponents in 12 of 16 games. Heck has been instrumental in the development of 2005 second-round pick tackle Khalif Barnes.

Heck, 40, is a former long-time NFL standout. He served three seasons on the University of Virginia coaching staff, the first two seasons as a graduate assistant and the final year as tight ends coach.

Heck tutored All-America tight end Heath Miller, who set numerous Atlantic Coast Conference records for a tight end in receiving and scoring. An outstanding blocker, Miller was a first round pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2005.

Prior to joining the Virginia staff, Heck

played in the NFL for 12 seasons as a stand-out offensive lineman. He finished his playing career with the Washington Redskins, where he played for two seasons. As the starting left tackle in 1999, he blocked for an offense that ranked second in the NFL. From 1994 to 1998, he was a five-year starter for the Chicago Bears. In 1995, he gave up no sacks as part of an offensive line that yielded the fewest sacks in the NFL.

Heck was drafted in the first round (15th overall) by the Seattle Seahawks, where he was a unanimous All-Rookie selection in 1989. A five-year starter with the Seahawks, he played five seasons including three without missing a snap.

Heck's fifth grade teacher, Marylou Winkler of Annandale, Va., was named NFL Teacher of the Year in January of 1994, after being nominated by Heck. She received \$5,000 from the NFL and the school received a \$10,000 scholarship in both their names.

A 1989 graduate of Notre Dame, Heck received a bachelor's degree in American studies. A first-team All-American, he co-captained the 1988 national championship team that finished 12-0. Heck was a tight end for the first three seasons at Notre Dame before moving to tackle in spring drills in his senior season.

Heck was born January 1, 1967 in Fargo, North Dakota. He and his wife, Jennifer, have four children: Jonathan, Charlie, Molly and Evelyn, and live in Ponte Vedra Beach.

Ted Monachino is in his second season as the Jaguars' assistant defensive line coach. Monachino joined the Jaguars staff on February 15, 2006 after spending the previous five seasons as defensive line coach for Arizona State University.

Monachino played a major role in the development of rookie defensive ends Brent Hawkins and Kenny Pettway along with third-year pro Jorge Cordova. Hawkins recorded two sacks in six games before being placed on injured reserve while Pettway had two sacks in seven games.

Monachino, 40, served on the staff at Arizona State under Jaguars' first-year offensive coordinator Dirk Koetter from 2001-05. Terrell Suggs, a first-round draft choice of the Baltimore Ravens in 2003, played under Monachino and set the NCAA single-season record for sacks (24) and tackles for loss (31.5) in 2002. Suggs earned numerous national awards in 2002 including the Bronco Nagurski Award for the best defensive player in the nation, and the Rotary Lombardi Award for top interior lineman in the nation. In 2001, Suggs finished second in the Pac-10 in sacks with 10 and third in tackles for loss. In 2003, true fresh-

man Kyle Caldwell was named to The Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

Monachino started his coaching career in the high school ranks in Missouri at Hannibal High School (1990, 1994-95) and Pacific High School (1991-93) before moving to the collegiate ranks. He served as an assistant coach at Texas Christian (1996-98), James Madison (1998-99), Southwest Missouri State (1999-2000) and Boise State (2000). In 2000, the defensive line helped Boise State lead the Big West in total defense, rushing defense and sacks.

A native of Council Bluffs, Iowa, Monachino was a three-year letterwinner in football at the University of Missouri where he graduated in 1990. Born October 15, 1966 in Council Bluffs, Monachino and his wife, Amy, have three children, daughter Mikalee and sons Sam and Michael.

Todd Monken is in his first season as the Jaguars wide receivers coach. Monken, a 17-year coaching veteran, previously served as wide receivers coach/passing game coordinator at LSU from 2005-2006.

During his tenure at LSU, Monken developed numerous receivers including Skyler Green, Dwayne Bowe and Craig Davis. Green was selected in the fourth round of the 2005 NFL draft by the Dallas Cowboys. Bowe combined with Davis and Early Doucet to form one of the nation's premier receiving corps in 2006. The trio combined for 180 receptions, 2,598 yards and 24 TDs. Bowe finished his career with 154 catches for 2,403 yards and a school-record 26 touchdowns. His 26 career TDs ranks eighth in SEC history.

Prior to his stint at LSU, Monken spent three seasons (2002-04) at Oklahoma State as pass game coordinator/wide receivers coach. In his three seasons at Oklahoma State, the Cowboys averaged over 32 points each season. Monken tutored 2004 first-round pick Rashaun Woods, who was selected with the 31st pick by the San Francisco 49ers. Woods was a two-time All-America honoree and concluded his career with 293 receptions for 4,414 yards and 42 touchdowns.

Monken helped engineer one of the nation's best passing attacks in his two seasons (2000-01) at Louisiana Tech - one year as the running backs coach and the other as wide receivers coach. In 2001, Louisiana Tech ranked eighth in the nation in passing, averaging 313 yards through the air per game. A year earlier, Tech ranked seventh in the nation averaging 313 yards passing per game.

Monken, 41, spent seven seasons at Eastern Michigan (1993-99) with the last two as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He also spent time at Grand Valley State (1989-90) and Notre Dame (1991-92).

A native of Wheaton, Illinois, Monken was a three-year letterwinner at quarterback for Knox College. He earned a bachelor's degree in economics and followed with a master's degree in education leadership from Grand Valley State. Monken and his wife, Terri, have one son, Travis.

Kennedy Pola is in his third season as the Jaguars' running backs coach and fourth season in the NFL. The Jaguars set a single-season franchise record for rushing yards (2,541) in 2006 as they averaged 158.8 yards per game, the third-highest in the NFL.

The running back duo of Fred Taylor (231-1,146, 5 TDs) and rookie Maurice Jones-Drew (166-941, 13 TDs) ranked second in the NFL with 2,087 rushing yards, the most by a duo in team history. The Jaguars came within 59 yards of becoming only the fifth team in NFL history to have two 1,000 yard rushers in a season.



The Jaguars, who rushed for a franchise-record 375 yards against Indianapolis on December 10, rushed for 100-plus yards in a team-record 12 consecutive games. Taylor finished the season with four 100-yard rushing games while Jones-Drew registered three. Jones-Drew ranked second on the team and second among AFC running backs with 46 receptions. The 46 receptions were the most by a rookie in team history.



Pola joined the Jaguars coaching staff on January 28, 2005. Pola, 43, completed his first season in the NFL with the Cleveland Browns in 2004. He joined the Browns after working as running backs coach (2000, 2002-03) and special teams coordinator (2001-03) at the University of Southern California. He helped the Trojans capture the Associated Press 2003 National Championship.



Pola began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at UCLA (1992-93)



and helped the Bruins reach the Rose Bowl in his final season. He then spent three seasons as running backs coach at San Diego State, guiding two rushers, Wayne Pittman (1994) and George Jones (1995), to 1,000-yard seasons. Pola also worked with the special teams in 1996. After two seasons as running backs coach at the University of Colorado, Pola returned to San Diego State and spent the 1999 season as linebackers coach.

A four-year standout at Southern California (1982-85), Pola started at fullback for four seasons after being moved from linebacker during his freshman year.

Pola comes from a football family. His brother, Al, played collegiate football at Penn State (1985-87). He has two nephews, Troy Polamalu (Pittsburgh Steelers) and Nicky Sualua (Dallas Cowboys, Cincinnati Bengals), who have played in the NFL, and three additional nephews who played Division I-A college football.

Pola was born on Nov. 22, 1963 in Pago, Pago, American Samoa, and was named after John F. Kennedy, who was assassinated the day Pola was born. He earned a bachelor's degree in history from USC in 1987. Pola and his wife, Diane, have three sons: Kennedy Christopher, Matthew Aotoa and Raymond Tre.

Robert Prince is in his first season as the Jaguars' assistant wide receivers coach. Prince joined the Jaguars staff after spending the last three seasons on the Atlanta Falcons coaching staff.

Prince, 42, spent two seasons as Falcons' offensive assistant (2004-05) before being promoted to assistant quarterbacks coach in 2005. Prince served under Falcons running backs coach Ollie Wilson from 2004-05 and the club led the NFL in rushing in each of those two seasons.

Prior to joining the NFL, Prince spent 15 seasons in the collegiate ranks. He served as wide receivers coach at Boise State in 2001-02 before adding the duties of passing game coordinator in 2003 under head coach Dan Hawkins. Boise State finished with a 13-1 record in 2003 and led the NCAA in scoring offense (43.0 points per game). Prince spent three seasons (1998-2000) at Portland State in various capacities, including offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and wide receivers coach.

During his time on the collegiate level, Prince also served NFL internships with San Francisco (2000), San Diego (2001) and the 49ers again in 2002.

Prince's coaching background includes stops at Humboldt State (graduate assistant, 1989-90) Montana State (assistant offensive line coach, 1991), Sacramento State (wide receivers coach, 1992-93), Fort Lewis College (offensive coordinator, 1994-95) and Recruit Seagulls, Japan (offensive coordinator, 1996-97).

Prince earned both his bachelor's (mathematics) and master's (physical education) degrees from Humboldt State. Prince and his wife, Susan, have three children, Hayden, Tyson and Jasmin.

Alvin Reynolds is in his fifth season as the Jaguars defensive backs coach. The Jaguars set a franchise record with 20 interceptions in 2006 with cornerback Rashean Mathis leading the club with a team-record eight.

The Jaguars secondary features one of the strongest pair of corners in the NFL in Mathis and Brian Williams. Mathis, who starts at left cornerback, was voted a starter for the Pro Bowl and named Associated Press All-Pro. Reynolds will be responsible for the development of 2007 first-round pick Reggie Nelson.

Reynolds has over a decade of NFL coaching experience, developing his craft in Denver, Baltimore and Carolina under such coaches as Wade Phillips, Mike Shanahan, Ted Marchibroda, George Seifert and John Fox.

Reynolds, 48, was hired by the Jaguars as the defensive backs coach in 2003 after spending four seasons (1999-2002) as a defensive assistant with the Panthers. He was in Baltimore for the first three seasons of the Ravens franchise (1996-98), serving as secondary coach. He began his coaching career as a defensive assistant in Denver, spending three seasons with the Broncos (1993-95).

During his career, Reynolds has worked with some of the top defensive backs in the NFL, including safeties Steve Atwater and Dennis Smith in Denver and Rod Woodson in Baltimore. In Carolina, he worked with then-defensive coordinator Jack Del Rio, helping with tape breakdown, game plan preparation and statistical tendencies. He also assisted with the Panthers' secondary.

Reynolds began his coaching career at

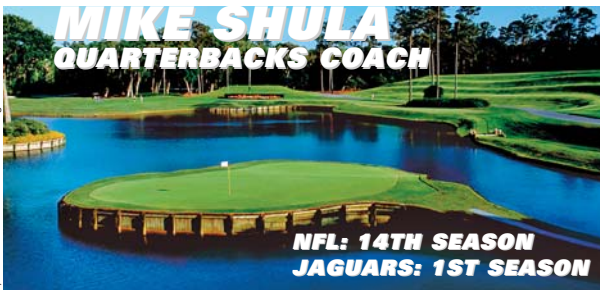
his alma mater, Indiana State, in 1982 as a graduate assistant. He was named the team's secondary coach in 1983, and in 1990 became assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator, in addition to serving as secondary coach. He coached two All-America players, including former NFL star Venice Glenn.

As a player at Indiana State (1978-81), Reynolds starred at strong safety and received two votes for the Heisman Trophy as a senior. His four-year career statistics included 225 tackles, 21 passes defended, five fumble recoveries and five interceptions. In addition to his football accomplishments, Reynolds was president of the University Club and served as member of several groups, including the President's Committee on Ethnic Diversity, the Indiana Black Expo, the Charles T. Hyte University Center and the Minority Students Retention Program Committee. While in Denver, he was active in 100 Black Men of America, which emphasizes education and job training.

Reynolds was born June 24, 1959, in Pineville, La. He attended West Jefferson High School in Harvey, La., and was an All-America football player and two-time Most Valuable Player on the track team. He received a degree in business management from Indiana State in 1982 and a master's degree in political science from the school in 1990. Reynolds and his wife, Carla, reside in St. Augustine with their children.

Mike Shula is in his first season as the Jaguars' quarterbacks coach. Shula has 18 years of coaching experience, 14 years in the NFL, and spent four seasons as head coach at Alabama.

Shula, who finished with a 26-23 mark in four seasons at Alabama, led the Crimson Tide to three consecutive bowl games including a 10-2 mark and invitation to the Cotton Bowl in 2005. Shula played a major role in the development of quarterback Brodie Croyle at Alabama. Croyle holds the school's career record for pass attempts, completions and yards. He set the school's single-season record with 2,499 passing yards in 2005 and was drafted by the Kansas City Chiefs in the third round of the 2006 draft.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Shula spent three seasons as quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins from 2000-02 under Dave Wannstedt. It was Shula's second stint with Miami as he spent two seasons (1991-92) as a Dolphins coaching assistant. Quarterback Jay Fiedler compiled a 21-10 record as a starter during Shula's tenure as Miami's quarterback coach. Fiedler became just the second quarterback in team history to surpass the 3,000-yard passing mark in 2002. He finished with a 60.7 completion percentage, the highest by a Dolphin since 1995.

Shula served four seasons as offensive coordinator with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996-99 under head coach Tony Dungy. The Buccaneers qualified for the playoffs in two of Shula's four seasons and in 1999 won the NFC Central Division and reached the NFC Championship game.

Shula began his NFL coaching career as offensive assistant for the Buccaneers from 1988-89 and spent the 1990 season as quarterbacks coach. He also spent time as tight ends coach for the Chicago Bears under Wannstedt from 1993-95.

Shula was a three-year letterman (1984-86) at quarterback for Alabama and finished his career with a 32-15-1 record as a starter. He was a 12th-round pick of Tampa Bay in 1987 and remained on the roster for part of the 1987 season. He earned his bachelor's degree in labor relations in 1987. He is the son of former Miami Dolphins head coach Don Shula (1970-95), the winningest coach in NFL history, and brother of former Cincinnati Bengals head coach Dave Shula (1992-96).

Shula, 41, and his wife, Shari, have two daughters, Samantha and Brooke.

Tom Williams joined the Jaguars in 2007 as assistant special teams coach after spending the past 11 seasons as an assistant on the collegiate level. Williams previously served as co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at San Jose State from 2005-06.

While at San Jose State, Williams engineered a defense that saw its points allowed decrease by 21.8 points from 2004 to 2006. The Spartans gave up 20.8 points per game in 2006, the lowest since the 1990 season. The Spartans finished with a 9-4 mark and a win in the New Mexico Bowl. In his first season with San Jose State, three linebackers finished among the WAC's top-10 tacklers.

Among the players Williams coached was New Mexico Bowl Defensive Most Valuable Player Matt Castelo, a 2006 second team All-WAC selection. The Spartans' middle linebacker was third in the country in tackles per game in 2005 and second in 2006.

Prior to joining San Jose State, Williams spent three seasons at Stanford (2002-04).

He coached linebackers, served as the co-defensive coordinator in 2002 and 2003 and was the associate head coach in 2004. Williams, a standout linebacker at Stanford, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Stanford in 1993 under Pro Football Hall of Fame coach Bill Walsh.

Williams, 37, spent three seasons (1996-98) at Hawaii including one season as defensive coordinator. At Hawaii, he was the youngest linebackers coach in 1996 and 1997 and one of the youngest defensive coordinators in 1998. Williams served as linebackers coach at the University of Washington from 1999-2001 and helped the Huskies to three consecutive bowl games including a win in the 2001 Rose Bowl.

Williams earned his master's degree from Stanford in university administration. He and his wife, Tonya, have two daughters, Grace and Ana, and a son, Tre.

Charles Bailey brought 23 years of scouting and front office experience with him when he was named the Jaguars' director of pro personnel in 2003. Since his arrival, the team has signed several key unrestricted free agents during the offseason.

Bailey is responsible for overseeing the scouting and evaluation of all pro personnel, as well as advance scouting. He is also an integral part of the Jaguars draft along with James Harris, Jack Del Rio and Gene Smith. He spent 14 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers and New Orleans Saints.

Bailey was the Saints' assistant general manager from 1999 to 2001, and spent the 2002 season as the organization's director of community affairs/assistant director of government affairs. As the Saints' assistant general manager, Bailey was responsible for scouting and evaluating talent for the Saints around the NFL, as well as college scouting and other administrative duties. He also served as a member of the

executive board for the 2002 Super Bowl Host Committee in New Orleans.

Bailey was with the Steelers from 1989 to '99 and was an integral part of the club's Super Bowl XXX appearance after the 1995 season. In his 10 years with the Steelers, he served three years in college scouting and seven years as the club's pro personnel coordinator. Bailey joined the Steelers following eight years of scouting with National Football Scouting, Inc. (1981-88).

A native of Winston-Salem, N.C., Bailey attended North Carolina Central University, where he was a scholarship student-athlete from 1969 to '73. After graduation, he earned his master's degree from North Carolina A&T. Bailey was inducted into the North Carolina Central University Hall of Fame in October 2005. GENE SMITH **DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING**



After six years as a Jaguars college scout, Gene Smith was promoted to director of college scouting in 2000, and he has guided the team's NFL draft for the last seven years. His responsibilities include the scouting and evaluation of hundreds of college players on an annual basis, as well as directing a staff of eight college scouts. Smith also has some additional pro personnel responsibilities, including the evaluation of selected unrestricted free agents.

Smith is one of 15 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. He has been a part of building Jaguars teams that have made nine playoff game appearances, including two AFC Championship games.

Smith was previously the team's college scout responsible for the southeast

United States. He joined the Jaguars on May 1, 1994 and was originally the team's scouting representative for the northeast with the BLESTO scouting combine, which he joined in February 1994. He was the southeast regional scout for BLESTO in 1995 before becoming solely the southeast regional scout for the Jaguars. Smith had previously been an assistant coach at the college level for eight years. He worked at Edinboro University from 1989 to '94, serving as an assistant coach, recruiting coordinator, and strength and conditioning coordinator. From 1986 to '88 Smith worked at Ohio University, where he began his college coaching career as a graduate assistant and later served as an assistant coach.





Smith graduated from Heidelberg College, serving as captain of the football team while playing as a defensive lineman. He graduated in 1986 with a degree in education and in 1987 received his master's degree with emphasis in athletic administration from Ohio University.

Clark attended Mississippi State, where he played wide receiver from 1983 to '86. He graduated with a degree in

educational psychology in 1994. Clark was selected in the 10th round of the 1987 college draft by the Seahawks. He played six seasons in Seattle. In 1993, Clark signed with Green Bay as an unrestricted free agent and spent his final season with the Packers.

Following his playing career, he spent four years in private business. Clark was born July 3, 1964 in Tupelo, Miss. He and his wife, Carla, have a son, Antonio, and a daughter, Antonece. They live in Jacksonville.

LARRY WRIGHT ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PRO PERSONNEL



Larry Wright Jr. joined the Jaguars on February 1, 2003. As assistant director, pro personnel, Wright assists in scouting college players, evaluating players in NFL Europa, the Arena League and the Canadian Football League, scouting NFL restricted and unrestricted free agents and evaluating players on other teams' rosters, as well as assisting in advanced scouting of Jaguars' opponents.

Wright was the head coach at Ringgold (La.) High School in 2001 and '02, and pre-

viously was a graduate assistant at Grambling, a scouting intern with the Baltimore Ravens, and a volunteer strength and conditioning coach for the Grambling basketball team.

Terry McDonough was named a Jaguars executive scout on May 13, 2003. He scouts the top collegiate players throughout the region. Additionally, McDonough does crosschecks, attends all major all-star practices and selective spring player workouts of the top draft-eligible players. He also has some additional pro personnel responsibilities.

McDonough joined the Jaguars from the Baltimore Ravens, for whom he scouted the eastern half of the country for the previous three years as the Ravens' eastern college supervisor. He also helped evaluate free agent prospects for the pro personnel department during the free agency period, working with James Harris.

A Boston native, McDonough began his NFL scouting career with an internship with the San Francisco 49ers in 1989. Following his graduation from Massachusetts with a sports management degree, he was named player personnel director of the Barcelona Dragons of the World League in 1990. While with

He also coordinates the post-draft college free agency process and has some additional pro personnel responsibilities.

Mingey is one of 15 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Before joining the Jaguars, Mingey spent 11 years as a college assistant coach and then 10 years as a recruiting coordinator. His college coaching career began in 1973 as

defensive coordinator/ inside linebackers coach at St. Joseph College (Ind.), where he had been a three-year varsity letterman as a defensive back. The previous six years were spent as a regional scout with the Baltimore Ravens. Perkins' experience as a professional football player, coach, and administrator spans more than 30 years. He also has some additional pro personnel responsibilities.

A fourth-round draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams in 1962, Perkins was named to the All-Rookie team as a running back. KADAR HAMILTON REGIONAL SCOUT, NORTHEAST

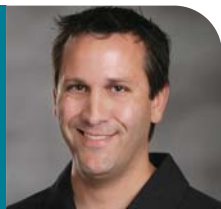

Although thousands of entries were received when a contest was held to name the team, a majority of hundreds agreed with the name "Jacksonville Jaguars." Of those who submitted the name Jaguars, Jacksonville resident Ray Potts was randomly selected as the contest winner and for his contribution was provided a trip to the Super Bowl that year.

Considered the most aggressive and feared big cats in North America, the Jacksonville Jaguars look to pay tribute to their namesake in championship form.

September 22, 1996 — at New England 28, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard completions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led 25-10 going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell





to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie Jackson six plays later, and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Steelers scored on a 19-yard field goal at the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

October 29, 2000 — Jacksonville 23, at Dallas 17

The Jaguars ended a five-game losing streak with a 23-17 overtime road victory over the Cowboys, with Alvis Whitted scoring on a 37-yard pass from Mark Brunell on the first series of overtime for his second touchdown of the game. Brunell threw for three TDs and tied a team record for passing accuracy, as he completed 20 of 24 passes. Kyle Brady caught 10 of those passes for 134 yards, as he eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the second straight week.

November 14, 2004 — at Jacksonville 23, Detroit 17

The Jaguars continued their dramatic play with a 23-17 overtime win over the Detroit Lions at Alltel Stadium. David Garrard started his first game since 2002 in place of injured Byron Leftwich and led the team with 198 yards passing and two touchdowns. Jimmy Smith caught the game-winning 36-yard touchdown pass from Garrard in overtime. The Lions erased a 17-3 fourth-quarter lead with two Eddie Drummond touchdown returns.

September 25, 2005 — Jacksonville 26, at New York Jets 20

The Jaguars defeated the New York Jets 26-20 on a game-winning 36-yard touchdown pass from Byron Leftwich to Jimmy Smith at the Meadowlands. Both teams began the overtime with interceptions and after forcing the Jets to punt on their third drive, Leftwich threw 36 yards for the game-winner.

October 16, 2005 — Jacksonville 23, at Pittsburgh 17

The Jaguars defeated the Steelers 23-17 in Pittsburgh on a dramatic 41-yard interception return for a touchdown by Rashean Mathis in overtime. The Steelers won the toss and Quincy Morgan returned the kickoff 74 yards. On third down Maddox fumbled the snap and Reggie Hayward recovered the ball. The Jaguars stalled on offense and Chris Hanson recorded his team record-tying ninth punt of the game. Two plays later Mathis ended the game with his interception.

October 1, 2006 — at Washington 36, Jacksonville 30

Jacksonville erased a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter to force overtime, but Washington scored on the opening possession of the extra period on a 68-yard touchdown reception by Santana Moss from Mark Brunell to claim a 36-30 win at FedExField.

Then came a safety of Mark Brunell, and on the free kick Derrick Mason returned the ball 80 yards for a touchdown. The Jaguars could not recover, as they had three turnovers in the last 16 minutes of the game. Tennessee scored once in the fourth quarter for the 33-14 final score.

The Jaguars returned to the postseason for the first time since 1999 but saw their season end at New England with a 28-3 loss to the Patriots. The first quarter ended scoreless as both teams punted on their first two possessions. The Jaguars stopped the Patriots on downs on fourth-and-10 to end the quarter. The Patriots began the scoring with a six-play, 37-yard drive that was capped off with an 11-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Troy Brown. The Jaguars next drive was thwarted after 33 yards when Alvin Pearman lost a fumble at the Patriots' 44-yard line. After two punts, the Jaguars scored their only points on a Josh Scobee 36-yard field goal with 1:05 remaining in the half. The Patriots erupted with back-to-back touchdown drives to start the second half. Each drive ended with Brady touchdown passes, the first to David Givens for three yards and the second for 63 yards to Benjamin Watson. On the Jaguars ensuing drive, Byron Leftwich was intercepted on fourth-and-five by Asante Samuel, who returned the pick 73 yards for a touchdown. David Garrard replaced Leftwich for the final three drives which ended with a 41-yard missed field goal and two turnovers on downs.

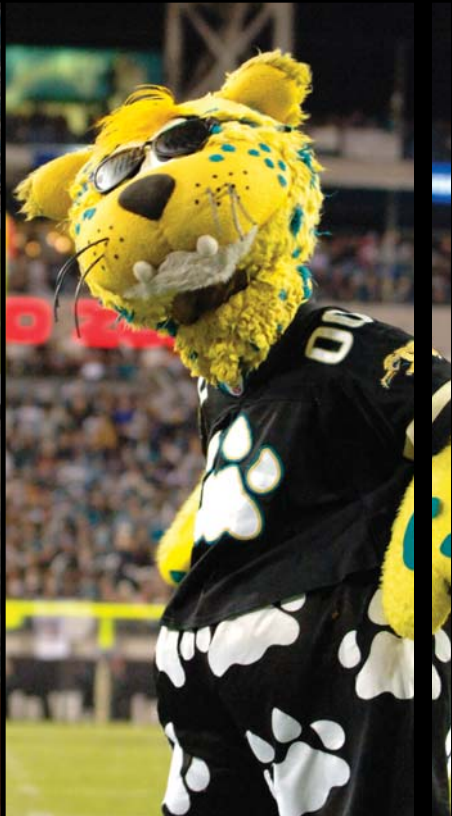
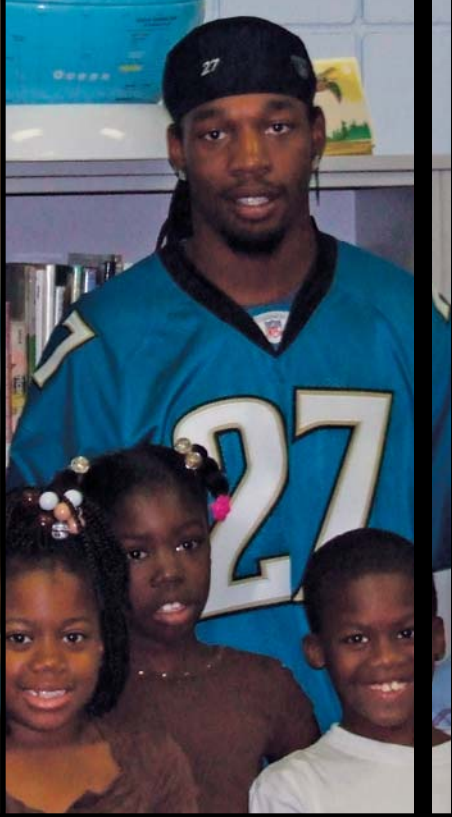

FOOD DRIVE

Oct. 30, 2006 launched the Jaguars 12th Annual Food Drive. At the time, the food bank's supplies were at their lowest level in six years, and with the holidays approaching, the need was great. Winn-Dixie donated a 42,000-pound truckload of food to launch the drive.

First Coast area residents donated 96,600 pounds of canned goods at Winn-Dixie stores during the two-week period, as well as at Jacksonville Municipal



Stadium when the Jaguars hosted the Houston Texans on Nov. 12. Monetary contributions by fans during the Texans game helped purchase another 75,000 pounds of food. The final calculation of all donations received during the two week campaign brought in more than **213,000 pounds** of food - enough to feed more than **100,000 people**.

Since the team's inception in 1995, the Jaguars have organized an annual holiday food drive each fall in conjunction with the Lutheran Social Services Second Harvest

Food Bank.

Jaguars staff, players and coaches' wives along with players, cheerleaders and the team mascot volunteer to support this community-wide effort, which culminates with a food collection on game day.

GATORADE JUNIOR TRAINING CAMP

The Jacksonville Jaguars Gatorade Junior Jr. Training camp is a free, year-round, grass roots program, which is run by the Jaguars for elementary school kids between the ages of 6 and 12. Gatorade Junior Training Camp is a program which features educational benefits along with recreational benefits in a safe and fun environment while at the same time puts an emphasis on fun for the day instead of winning and testing skills.

HABIJAX

The Jaguars' annual Habijax homebuilding blitz kicks-off each spring to offer a hand to those less fortunate. Led by Wayne and Delores Weaver, Jaguars staff, players and cheerleaders invest sweat and labor into making the dream of a future homeowner a reality.

Habijax is the largest affiliate homebuilder within the Habitat for Humanity organization and continues to make progress through the tireless efforts of countless vol-



unteers and the Delores Barr Weaver Golf Tournament, which has sponsored 65 houses representing a cash contribution in excess of \$2.2 million since its inception in 1996.



Friends of Habijax, founded by Delores in 2001, the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars together have sponsored 153 houses which represents a contribution in excess





of \$5.7 million. Delores says "HabiJax builds houses and families build homes." Each year, members of the Jaguars front office, The ROAR cheerleaders and players get together for a day of building.

Since 2001, the Jaguars have sponsored 15 houses for HabiJax. Of those fifteen houses, four have been worked on by the Jaguars staff, players and cheerleaders.

HOMETOWN HUDDLE

Each fall, the Jaguars partner with the United Way of Northeast Florida for a hands-on community service project called Hometown Huddle.

The eighth annual Hometown Huddle You Can...Succeed, Achieve and Accomplish Life Skills Workshop took place last fall where juniors and seniors from three area high schools received information and helpful tips on resume writing/job training as well as life and social skills. The aim was to instill in the minds of the students that no matter what obstacles are forthcoming, if they apply themselves everyday to doing their best and are true to themselves, they will discover that they have taken one step closer in meeting the goals and dreams they have established for themselves. Four Jaguars players, including Pro Bowl cornerback Rashean Mathis, helped reinforce this message.

HOSPITAL VISITS

Players make several visits to Wolfson Children's Hospital to meet with kids, sign autographs or to push the Wolfie Cart, a special cart that nurses take around to all the children's rooms containing items such as candy, soft drinks, books, balloons, and stuffed animals. You name it, this cart has it.



JAGUARS COACH OF THE WEEK

Since 1996, the Jaguars have recognized the hard work, dedication and selflessness of area high school coaches in Northeast Florida and in 2003 the Jaguars partnered with the Jacksonville Quarterback Club. Ten weekly winners are chosen during the high school season and each winner is awarded a plaque and \$1,000 for his school. During the final regular season home game, the Coach of the Year is announced at the 50-yard line in a pre-game ceremony. The coach of the year winner receives \$2,000.

JAGUARS/MORGAN STANLEY COMMUNITY LEADER

Jacksonville Jaguars running back Alvin Pearman was named the 2006 Jaguars/Morgan Stanley Community Leader of the Year. As a result, Children's Home Society/Buckner Division received a \$6,000 donation on behalf of Pearman from team sponsor Morgan Stanley.



"When you get involved in organizations and give of your time, you don't think about the way the community will view you or honor you like today," said Pearman. "It truly is a blessing and I thank the Lord every day for what he is continuing to do in my life and continuing to do through me."

Since 2001, the Jaguars and Morgan Stanley have partnered for this annual award presented monthly during the NFL season to the Jaguars player who demonstrates exemplary community involvement. Previous winners include: 2001 - SS Donovin Darius, 2002 - LB Wali Rainer, 2003 - LS Joe Zelenka, 2004 - WR Ernest Wilford and 2005 - CB Scott Starks.

JAGUARS READERS

This is a special reading program at local elementary schools supported by Jaguars front office staff since 1997. Staff volunteers commit to spend an hour each week at the school where students read some of their favorite books.



JAGUARS ROOKIE CLUB FOOTBALL CAMP

In June of 2003 the Jaguars established the "Rookie Club" for all incoming rookies to assist in the transition from college to the NFL. In 2005, this rookie club held a "Got Skills" football clinic sponsored by Winn Dixie for 200 youths in the Jacksonville area. This clinic was





held on the practice fields at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium and included instruction, gift bags, autographs and food.

MILITARY VISITS

Since the first of the year Jaguars players have made a number of visits to both local military bases, Mayport Naval Station and NAS JAX. While on these visits players were given the opportunity to tour a naval vessel, eat lunch with the military personnel, and offer words of encouragement and appreciation to our local service men and women returning or preparing to deploy overseas.



Last summer the Jaguars Rookie Class received special treatment on their tour of the USS Kennedy. "It takes special people to go out there and put their life on the line everyday like these people do," said second-year tight end Mercedes Lewis. "I appreciate it, and I know the rest of the rookies do too. Just coming out here and getting a chance to do this really opens our eyes." During their tour the players were shown all the amenities of the ship including meeting some of the ships crew. For some of the players this was their first time on ship.



OPERATION BLESSING



The 8th Annual Operation Blessing event took place at A. Philip Randolph Park, an open event for those living in the surrounding neighborhoods to come out and take part in this special day led by former safety Donovan Darius serving as spokesperson for the program. Helping out Jacksonville families one bag at a time, last season's event helped many families in need on the Eastside of Jacksonville.



"The Jaguars franchise is dedicated to positively impacting the Jacksonville community with the message of care. Each year, the Jaguars have an opportunity to demonstrate their support in the community through their Thanksgiving Food Distribution program in partnership with Wachovia Bank, Winn-Dixie and Operation Blessing," Pam Erickson, vice president of procurement and corporate relations.



Each November Jaguars players, led by SS Donovan Darius and over 250 Wachovia & Winn-Dixie Store volunteers, off-load truckloads of groceries and distribute non-perishable food items donated by growers, food processors and manufacturers that support Operation Blessing International. Since it's inception over 21,000 families have been served.

POP WARNER JUNIOR JAGUARS BOWL

Since 1996, the Jaguars have sponsored the Pop Warner Junior Jaguars Bowl at Alltel Stadium in cooperation with the Greater Jacksonville Pop Warner Association. Thousands of players, cheerleaders and families have enjoyed the fun and spirit of this bowl game format. Participants (8-14 years old) must sign a pledge card with their parents and make a commitment not to use tobacco, alcohol or illegal drugs in order to be involved. The Jaguars have awarded approximately 1,200 tickets to Jaguars home games each fall to Pop Warner youth and coaches as part of the program. The Junior Jaguars Bowl is a three-day event which includes a host party Friday night at the Pepsi Plaza, games played at seven area sites on Saturday and a chance to attend a Jaguars regular season game on Sunday. More than 90 teams participate each year from states as far away as Indiana, Pennsylvania and North Carolina.



PRACTICE LIKE THE PROS

In 2004 the Jaguars introduced a program called "Practice Like the Pros" which gave six NFL Flag and six Pop Warner teams a chance to practice on the Jaguars' practice fields during training camp. Teams held practices prior to the Jaguars night practices and were invited to stay and





watch practice from a covered area and receive autographs from Jaguars players following practice. Last season 16 teams participated in the program.



PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS

This past season, Baptist Cancer Institute held two free Prostate Screenings where Jaguars defensive end Reggie Hayward attended the second screening to lend his support and encourage men, especially those living in Northeast Florida, to get checked for prostate cancer.

Offensive tackle Maurice Williams joined Hayward by serving as spokesperson for the second consecutive year. Williams attended the first of the two screenings to continue to help raise awareness about prostate cancer.

This program is designed to bring holiday joy to children from various community agencies in Jacksonville.

The 4th Annual Jacksonville Jaguars Taste of the NFL was triumphant in bringing in over \$92,000 to benefit the LSS Second Harvest Food Bank.



Branching out from the national event held every year at the Super Bowl, Jacksonville is one of several NFL cities which have launched a local Taste of the NFL dinner to help raise awareness in the fight against hunger. Since our inception in 2003, over \$365,000 has been raised for LSS Second Harvest Food Bank.

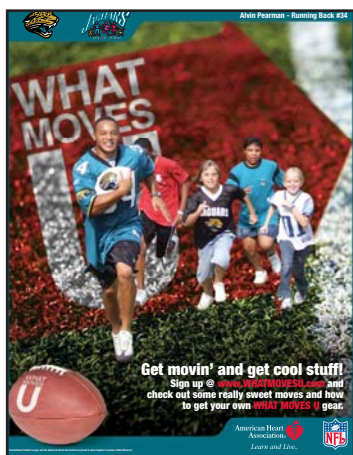
WHAT MOVES U

Brian Sexton and former Jaguars defensive end Jeff Lageman are in their fifth season together calling all Jaguars games on WOKV AM & FM (690, 106.5). Sexton, 38, called every game in the Jaguars' first 12 seasons and is one of just a handful of observers who have witnessed every Jaguars game played. Sexton anchors the Jaguars Radio Network's coverage on game day and is also the host of 'The Jack Del Rio Show' on Tuesdays and 'Jaguars This Week' on Wednesdays on WOKV. He also hosts 'The Jack Del Rio Show' and 'The Coggin Pregame Show' on Sunday mornings prior to kickoff on WTEV-TV, CBS 47.

Lageman, 40, played for the Jaguars from 1995 to '98 and was the team's first captain. He started 37 of 40 games played in the Jaguars' first four seasons, making 175 tackles and 12.5 sacks. In 10 NFL seasons, including his first six with the New

York Jets, Lageman started 118 of 122 games played. He was a first-round draft choice of the Jets in 1989, the 14th player selected overall. After his retirement he joined the Jaguars' preseason TV booth as color analyst for the 1999 to 2002 seasons. He is a co-host of the "Jaguars This Week" radio show along with Sexton and Vic Ketchman on Wednesday nights on WOKV. He also serves as co-host of "THE Jaguars Show" on WTEV.

PRESEASON TELEVISION

Three of the Jaguars' preseason games in 2007 will be telecast locally in Jacksonville on WTEV-TV, CBS 47, with the game against Green Bay on Thursday, August 23 nationally broadcast on FOX. JACKSONVILLE MUNICIPAL STADIUM

STADIUM



On August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first home preseason game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its inaugural season in a new stadium or arena. Not only that, but it was built faster than any major-league stadium had ever been built in North America.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new stadium arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." In its 10th year of operation, the stadium was the host site of Super Bowl XXXIX, the biggest single-day sporting event in the world.

Jacksonville Municipal Stadium underwent a \$63 million renovation in preparation for Super Bowl XXXIX. Among the additions were the MPS Group Terrace Suite, a 25,000-square-foot sports bar called the Bud Zone, a 20,000-square-foot Sky Bar, 20 new escalators and four new elevators. A new secure perimeter fence was also installed around the stadium, along with two new

state of the art scoreboards and renovations to the clubs and suites.

The practice fields that were used from 1995 through 2003 were converted into a 400,000-square-foot entertainment zone adjacent to the stadium, known as the Pepsi Plaza. For Jaguars game days, this area includes tailgate cabanas for pregame hospitality, an interactive game area, and a stage for pregame and postgame entertainment.

Jacksonville Municipal Stadium signature features include the two Crown Royal Touchdown Clubs, which are located on the East and West sides of the stadium. The Crown Royal Touchdown Clubs and all 11,200 club seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club provides more than 70,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

Jacksonville Municipal Stadium seats 67,164, but additional temporary seats can be added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity to well over 82,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game and Super Bowl XXXIX.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: Credential requests are honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials are not issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. Independent web sites cannot be credentialed. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Vice President of Communications and Media, Jacksonville Jaguars, One Stadium Place, Jacksonville, FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked in the TV truck compound near Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the media will-call window at Gate 1. The Media Will Call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance in the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in a room off the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. High speed internet access, phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information is available.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. Players are available on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance to schedule.
