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JAGUARS FINISH 10TH SEASON WITH 9-7 RECORD TEAM FINISHES ONE GAME SHY OF THE PLAYOFFS; HAS FOUR GAME IMPROVEMENT FROM DEL RIO'S FIRST SEASON

2004 IN REVIEW: The Jaguars made forward progress in ending the 2004 season with a 9-7 record and establishing a core group of players that will be the foundation for the future. The Jaguars under second-year coach Jack Del Rio finished with a four game improvement over his first year and posted the franchise's first winning record since 1999. The Jaguars won three of their final four games but fell one game short of qualifying for the postseason, which would have been their fifth playoff berth in 10 seasons of play.

"Our goal coming into this season was to make the playoffs and we didn't quite get that done. The AFC is very strong this year. We finished seventh in the AFC and there are only six spots, so we don't get to go," said Del Rio. "It's what we earned and certainly we'd like to be there. I do believe that what we were able to do this year, in terms of coming together and building a core group of guys that understand how we're going to do things, the attitude, the effort, the fact we were able to do some things that were very difficult, some tough spots on the road and some tough ballgames. I think we showed a certain character that bodes well for the future of this franchise."

The Jaguars finished the season ranked 21st in the league on offense and 11th on defense. They allowed the seventh fewest points in the NFL with 280 while scoring 261 points offensively. The defense ranked tops in the league in red zone efficiency allowing only a 38.3 touchdown percent to opponents.

Del Rio emphasized the importance of playmakers and in the second half of the season, running back Fred Taylor rose to the occasion. Taylor had rushed for only one 100-yard game in the first half of the season, but rebounded in the second half with four 100-yard games in six contests. He averaged 64 rushing yards a game in the first eight games and finished averaging 119 rushing yards in his final six games. He missed the final two games of the season with a knee injury.

The Jaguars defense also improved dramatically in the second half of the season. The secondary led by Donovan Darius and Rashean Mathis, who both finished the season with a career-high five interceptions each, had intercepted three passes in the first half of the season and tripled their production in the second half with 12 interceptions over the final eight games. The pass defense also improved from 32 passes defended in the first half to 59 passes defended over the final eight games.

The defensive line, behind tackles Marcus Stroud and John Henderson, started to affect the quarterback in the second half with the additions of converted linebacker Greg Favors and seventh-round pick Bobby McCray. Both were thrust into the starting lineup because of injuries. The team doubled their sack total from the first half of the season, from 12 sacks to 25 sacks over the final eight contests.

Special teams, under new coordinator Pete Rodriguez, proved to be the one constant throughout the season. Rookie kicker Josh Scobee connected on 24 of 31 field goals with 11 touchbacks. Chris Hanson returned from his leg injury to punt 84 times with a 42.8-yard average and 28 punts downed inside the 20 yard line. The kickoff coverage finished the season tops in the AFC, allowing opponents to start on average at their own 25 yard line.

- Played games against six teams in the 2005 playoffs (3-4 in seven games)
- Finished first in the NFL in red zone defense, allowing only 38.3 touchdown percentage to opponents
- Had 19 plays of 30 or more yards, the most in four seasons
- The franchise's 10-year record improved to 82-78
- The offense ranked 21st in the NFL in yards gained (16th rushing, 19th passing)
- The defense ranked 11th in yards allowed (11th rushing, 16th passing)
- Allowed only 280 points (17.5 points per game), 51 points lower than 2003
- Scored 261 points (16.3 points per game)
- Fred Taylor rushed for 1,224 yards on 260 attempts and two touchdowns in 14 games
- Jimmy Smith caught 74 passes for 1,172 yards and six touchdowns
- QB Byron Leftwich passed for 2,941 yards and 15 touchdowns and finished with a QB rating of 82.2 in 14 games
- K Josh Scobee scored 93 points (seventh most in team history) on 24 of 31 field goal attempts (77.4) and 21 of 21 extra points
- DT Marcus Stroud was selected to his second consecutive Pro Bowl
- Averaged 69,433 in home attendance (tickets distributed), and averaged 64,620 in 10 seasons
- Will select 21st in the 2005 NFL Draft (April 24-25)

LAST GAME: The Jaguars defeated the Oakland Raiders 13-6 in the regular season finale at Network Associates Coliseum in Oakland in a steady rainstorm. The Jaguars ended their season at 9-7 but missed the playoffs by one game, finishing as the AFC's seventh place team. The Raiders began the scoring with a 12-play, 67-yard drive that was capped off with a Sebastian Janikowski 35-yard field goal. The Jaguars tied the score on a Josh Scobee 26-yard field goal in the second quarter. Jimmy Smith lost a fumble with 29 seconds left in the half and the Raiders capitalized with a 27-yard field goal by Janikowski. Scobee connected on his second field goal from 22-yards in the third quarter and on the ensuing drive Greg Jones scored on a one-yard touchdown run. Ernest Wilford caught a 46-yard one-handed catch on third-and-nine

from the 48-yard line to keep the drive alive. The Raiders drove the ball inside the red zone on their final two drives, but both ended with a Donovan Darius interception and a Kerry Collins' fumble on fourth down to end the Raiders' comeback attempt. The Jaguars ended the game with four takeaways – two interceptions by Darius and one by Rashean Mathis, and a fumble recovery by John Henderson.

NOTES FROM THE JAGUARS AT RAIDERS GAME: The Jaguars won on the road in Oakland for the second time in three trips. They finished with a record of 5-3 in road games this season which is their best record since finishing 7-1 on the road in 1999. ... Jimmy Smith has now caught at least one pass in 60 consecutive games, the third-longest streak in Jaguars' history. He also started his team-record 134th game for the Jaguars. ... The Jaguars recorded three interceptions off Oakland and now have at least two interceptions in three consecutive games for the first time in team history. The eight total interceptions in the last three contests are the most ever in a three-game stretch. ... CB Rashean Mathis intercepted a Kerry Collins pass and finished with a career-high five interceptions on the season which tied for third place in team history. ... S Donovan Darius intercepted two passes for the first time in his career. He finished the season with five interceptions and four fumble recoveries. His nine takeaways ranks first in team history surpassing Aaron Beasley and Marlon McCree, who both had six interceptions in 1999 and 2002, respectively. His 20 career takeaways (14 interceptions and six fumbles) also ranks tops in team history. He surpasses Beasley (15 interceptions and three fumbles) and Tony Brackens (five interceptions and 13 fumbles). ... Josh Scobee connected on two field goals and one extra point and finished the season with 93 points ranking second in team history for rookies behind Fred Taylor's 102 points in 1998. He ranks seventh overall in team history. With his second field goal, he has the fourth-most field goals in a season in team history along with Mike Hollis' 24 field goals in 2000. Hollis holds the single-season record with 31 in 1997 and 1999.

JAGUARS IN REGULAR SEASON FINALES: In the Jaguars' first 10 seasons in the NFL, they have a record of 6-4 in their regular season finales, winning their first five (1995-99), losing the next four (2000-03) and winning this season in Oakland 13-6. This was the fifth consecutive year the Jaguars closed the regular season on the road and the first win in those five games. They lost to the Atlanta Falcons 21-14 in Del Rio's first year as the Jaguars head coach in 2003. Here are the regular season finales in Jaguars history:

HEAD COACH JACK DEL RIO: Jack Del Rio was named Jaguars head coach on January 17, 2003, becoming the second head coach in Jaguars' history. He led the team to a 5-11 record in his first season and his 9-7 finish in year two marked the team's first winning record in five years. At 41, Del Rio is the second youngest head coach in the NFL (four months older than Jon Gruden). Del Rio spent 11 years as an NFL linebacker and had a standout college career at the University of Southern California. He previously coached in New Orleans (1997-98), Baltimore (1999-2001), and Carolina (2002). He was the Panthers' defensive coordinator, and in his only season with the club the defense improved from 31st in the NFL to second, the biggest one season defensive improvement in NFL history. Del Rio was the linebackers coach for three seasons in Baltimore, where the Ravens' defense also ranked second each season. He helped the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants and coached the Ravens' talented linebackers, overseeing the development of Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. Prior to coaching, Del Rio played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-1991) and Minnesota (1992-95), playing in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season. Del Rio was a starter at linebacker for Southern California (1981-84), where he earned All-America honors, was a runner-up for the Lombardi Award and co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. Del Rio has learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to USC and played for John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green.

As an assistant coach, he has worked for Hall of Famer Mike Ditka and Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, as well as Super Bowl participant John Fox. Drafted by baseball's Toronto Blue Jays, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on USC's baseball team in 1983 and 1984 with future stars Randy Johnson and Mark McGwire. He was a third-round choice by the New Orleans Saints in 1985 and was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team.

HEAD OF THE CLASS: Jacksonville Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio has shown the most improvement out of all the incoming coaches in 2003. The four-win differential is the most significant in the league from Year One to Year Two. They will look to continue the trend going into the 2005 season. The Jaguars winning record this season gives them their first winning season since 1999.

NFL HEAD COACHES WITH NFL PLAYING EXPERIENCE: Jack Del Rio has the second longest playing tenure in the NFL among active head coaches. He played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-1991) and Minnesota (1992-95). In Minnesota he played alongside Mike Tice, who has the longest playing tenure of any head coach. Here are the head coaches with the longest stay in the NFL as a player:

ROSTER NOTES: The Jaguars' 53-man roster featured 24 players who were new to the team this past year and 29 returning players. There were 39 players who joined the team in 2003 or 2004, and just 15 who were on the roster prior to 2003 ... Just four players remain from the Jaguars' last postseason game, the 1999 AFC Championship against Tennessee: WR Jimmy Smith, RB Fred Taylor, TE Kyle Brady, and S Donovan Darius ... Of the 53 active roster players, 21 were drafted by the Jaguars including four from 2003 and eight from the 2004 class. There are two undrafted rookies who made the opening day roster: TE Brian Jones and CB David Richardson ... The youngest player on the roster is WR Reggie Williams (21 years, 7 months). The oldest is WR Jimmy Smith (35 years, 10 months).

2004 POSITION ANALYSIS: Here is a position-by-position breakdown of the Jaguars:

Quarterbacks (3) — Byron Leftwich was selected with the seventh overall pick in the 2003 draft and proceeded to start 13 games as a rookie in 2003. He entered his second season after passing for 2,819 yards and 14 touchdowns on 239 of 418 passes in his rookie season. His passing yardage was the fourth most ever by a rookie quarterback. He finished the 2004 season with career highs in passing, completing 267 of 441 passes for 2,941 yards and 15 touchdowns. David Garrard, a fourth-round pick in 2002, returned to the team after overcoming his offseason battle with Crohn's Disease and was the No. 2 behind Leftwich. Garrard made his second career start in a 23-17 win over Detroit, and his third in Week 11 vs. Tennessee. Quinn Gray, who spent the majority of the 2003 season on the Jaguars' practice squad, earned the second backup role.

Running Backs (6) — Fred Taylor ended his streak of starting 46 consecutive games, which was the third-longest active streak among NFL running backs. He has established himself as one of the dominant all-purpose backs in the NFL, rushing for a career-high 1,572 yards and six touchdowns on 345 carries in 2003. He also caught 48 passes for 370 yards and a score. Over his first seven seasons in the NFL, he had five years with at least 1,200 yards and scored 55 touchdowns. In 2004, he started 14 games, rushing 260 times for 1,224 yards and two touchdowns. He was the team's third-leading receiver with 36 receptions for 345 yards and a score. Behind Taylor were 2003 fourth-round draft choice LaBrandon Toefield, who collected 320 yards from scrimmage and rookie second-round pick Greg Jones. Jones, a rookie from Florida State who rushed for over 2,500 yards and 23 touchdowns in four seasons, started three games while rushing for 162 yards and three touchdowns. Marc Edwards, who caught 31 passes for 226 yards in 2003, split time in his second season with the Jaguars with seventh-year veteran Chris Fuamatu-Ma'afala, who rushed for 69 yards and a touchdown in 2004. David Allen was re-signed in Week 13 and served as the team's main kick and punt returner.

Wide Receivers (5) — Jimmy Smith completed his 12th NFL season and remains one of the NFL's top receivers. He has surpassed 1,000 yards receiving eight of the last nine seasons and has passed the 11,000 yards receiving mark. The Jaguars used the ninth pick in the draft to select Washington's Reggie Williams. Williams averaged almost 1,200 yards a season in college along with 22 touchdowns. The 6-4, 223-pounder, caught 27 passes for 268 yards and a touchdown. Troy Edwards finished second on the team with 50 receptions for 533 yards and a touchdown. His catches and yards were his most since his rookie season in 1999. Cortez Hankton (nine catches for 81 yards and two touchdowns) and rookie fourth-round draft pick Ernest Wilford (19 catches for 271 and two touchdowns) provided the Jaguars with young receivers to build their offense around.

Tight Ends (4) — Kyle Brady has been the Jaguars' starting tight end for the past six seasons. In those six seasons with the Jaguars, Brady caught 218 passes, ranking among the top NFL tight ends in that time. He is also a fine blocker in the running game, helping the Jaguars surpass 2,000 yards rushing four times in his six years. George Wrihster was placed on injured reserve in Week 15. Todd Yoder, an unrestricted free agent from Tampa Bay, caught a career-high 14 passes for 157 yards, and undrafted rookie Brian Jones, who caught six passes, played extensively for the Jaguars. Joe Zelenka served as the team's long snapper.

Offensive Line (10) — The offensive line has stood as one of the team's strongest positions over the past two seasons. The O-line established themselves during 2003 by allowing a team-record low 28 sacks and helped the running backs rush for over 2,000 yards. This season, the line helped the team rush for 1,850 yards and allowed 32 sacks without left tackle Mike Pearson, who was lost to IR early in the season. In the interior of the offensive line, Brad Meester, who has started all 80 career games for the longest streak in team history, manned the center spot for the second consecutive season. The two Hawaiians, eighth year veteran Chris Naeole and second-year pro Vince Manuwai, started at the two guard spots. At right tackle Maurice Williams established himself as one of the top tackles in the AFC. At left tackle incoming free agent Ephraim Salaam was given the starting role after Pearson injured his left knee and was placed on injured reserve. Depth at tackle was provided by 13-year veteran Bob Whitfield, who was signed after being waived by Atlanta in the preseason. Depth at center and guard was provided by second-year lineman Brett Romberg and veteran Mike Compton. C Dennis Norman was signed in Week 13 and G Derrick Fletcher was added from the practice squad in Week 15.

Defensive Line (8) — The defensive line was a mixture of talented veterans and young upstarts. Anchoring the line was defensive tackle Marcus Stroud, who started in his first career Pro Bowl appearance last season and earned his second trip to Hawaii this season. Third-year pro John Henderson gave the Jaguars two of the biggest and best tackles in the NFL. Stroud recorded 80 tackles, 4.5 sacks and 32 quarterback pressures, while Henderson tallied 98 tackles, 5.5 sacks and 39 pressures on the season. The backups in the middle were seventh year pro Derrick Ransom, who entered 2004 with 26 career starts, and rookie draft pick Anthony Maddox who was elevated from the practice squad after 12 weeks. Rob Meier started eight games at end before being placed on injured reserve. Regulars at end were converted linebacker Greg Favors (39 tackles, 5.5 sacks), seventh round pick Bobby McCray (27 tackles, 3.5 sacks) and Jason Gildon, who was signed after Week Seven and recorded three sacks. Second-year pro Elton Patterson, who was claimed off Cincinnati's practice squad, helped provide depth on the line.

Linebackers (5) — Linebacker was perhaps the most competitive position on the Jaguars. Mike Peterson, who signed with the team in 2003, following four years with the Indianapolis Colts, manned the middle and ran the defense. He led the team with 178 tackles and five sacks, both career highs, after finishing with 167 tackles and three interceptions in 16 starts in 2003. Akin Ayodele, a third-year pro, finished second on the team with 131 tackles and two sacks. He started on the outside along with rookie second-round pick Daryl Smith, who recorded 78 tackles, two sacks, one interception and a safety. Tommy Hendricks provided depth on the outside, with Tony Gilbert behind Peterson in the middle.

Defensive Backs (10) — The Jacksonville secondary had an entire new look in 2004. Rashean Mathis finished his second season and first full season at corner. He led the secondary with five interceptions and 22 passes defensed along with his 71 tackles. Opposite Mathis was Dewayne Washington, who signed from Pittsburgh and completed his 10th season. He finished with 86 tackles, 18 passes defensed and two interceptions. He now has 31 career interceptions. Juran Bolden, who signed from Atlanta, provided quality depth. At safety the Jaguars signed a top free agent in Carolina's Deon Grant. The 6-2, 210 pounder was in his fifth NFL season and recorded 84 tackles, two interceptions and two sacks. He was named a first alternate to the Pro Bowl. He lined up next to Donovan Darius, who led the Jaguars secondary in tackles (125) for the sixth straight season. Darius had his best season with five interceptions and four fumble recoveries.

Backups at corner included Kiwaukee Thomas, rookie draft pick Chris Thompson and David Richardson. At safety, Deke Cooper and Nick Sorensen provided depth and were strong contributors on special teams.

Kickers (2) — Chris Hanson returned after spending most of 2003 on the injured reserve. He punted 84 times for a 42.8-yard average. At placekicker, the Jaguars entered training camp with a three-way competition, but rookie fifth-round pick Josh Scobee won the job after an injury to Seth Marler. He was the second kicker taken in the draft after finishing as Louisiana Tech's all-time record holder in career field goals. Scobee finished the season 24 of 31 in field goal attempts for 93 points and had 11 touchbacks on his kickoffs.

JAGUARS RECORD BY MONTH: The Jaguars finished January at 1-0 (2-1 all-time) after finishing in December with a 2-2 record and are now 22-19 overall in December. The Jaguars also have 22 wins in November. Here is how the Jaguars have fared in regular season games in each month in their 10 seasons:

STRONG FINISHERS: This season the Jaguars finished with a record of 8-3 in games decided by 7 points or less, including 5-2 in games decided by 3 points or less. Their 8 wins in 7-point games eclipsed the previous record in 1996 when they were 7-5 in such games. The franchise is 43-45 all-time in games decided by a touchdown or less, including 12-9 the last two seasons under Jack Del Rio.

In 3-point games, the Jaguars' 5-2 mark this season is the best mark in team history topping the previous best of 4-2 in 1996. The Jaguars are 21-22 all-time in games decided by 3 points or less, including 6-4 the last two seasons under Del Rio.

SCORE FIRST/WIN OFTEN: When the Jaguars take the ball down the field and score on their first possession it usually means a Jacksonville victory is not too far behind. In their 10-year history, the Jaguars have scored on their first possession 48 times and won 35 of those games. This season the Jaguars scored on their first possession three times, and they have won all three games.

HISTORICALLY GOOD ON THE GROUND: Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio believes that running the football and stopping the run is the key to success. Behind the bruising running of tailback Fred Taylor, the Jaguars racked up 9,644 yards since the start of the new millennium and have the ninth best rushing attack during that stretch. CATS DIG THE LONG BALL: Since head coach Jack Del Rio arrived in Jacksonville the Jaguars have completed 29 passes of 30 yards or more. This is the most the Jaguars have completed in a two-year span since 1999-2000. They also had seven runs of 30 yards or more in 2003-2004.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE: The 2004 Jaguars were plus-6 this season after finishing minus-4 in 2003. Here are the turnover comparisons from this season to Del Rio's first season:

BIG CONTRIBUTIONS FROM RESERVES: The Jaguars starters played well pushing the team's final record to 9-7 this season, but a lot of the credit must also be passed down to the Jaguars reserve players. Time and time again down the stretch someone off the bench came up with the big play.

On offense, quarterback David Garrard subbed for an injured Byron Leftwich in weeks 10 and 11. He started a game for the first time since 2002 and passed for almost 200 yards and two touchdowns in the first start. Reserve wide receivers Ernest Wilford and Cortez Hankton came off the bench to catch game-winning touchdowns in the fourth quarter. Reserve wide receiver Troy Edwards ranked second on the team in receptions with 50 for 533 yards. He also filled in as the Jaguars' return man in Weeks 7 and 8, amassing 170 yards on seven kickoff returns. Veteran offensive linemen Mike Compton, Ephraim Salaam and Bob Whitfield all stepped in along the offensive line for the injured Mike Pearson and Vince Manuwai. Reserve tight ends Todd Yoder and Brian Jones collected 20 catches for 244 yards.

The spoils not only extended to the offense but the defense as well. The Jaguars lost defensive ends Paul Spicer, Lionel Barnes, Rob Meier and Brandon Green to season-ending injuries, but reserve ends Bobby McCray, Greg Favors and Jason Gildon helped the defense notch six sacks in a win over Kansas City in Week 6, the most since December 3, 2000 vs. Cleveland. Favors notched his second sack of the season against Peyton Manning in Week 7, and added two more in Week 11 against Tennessee. Jason Gildon and Elton Patterson, who were signed midseason, combined for four sacks and a fumble recovery in a four game stretch after being signed.

DEFENSE STINGY IN THE POINTS DEPARTMENT: The Jaguars defense may not have possessed the gaudy statistical numbers that it collected in 2003, but it still has laid the foundation for the future. You won't find them in the top five in the NFL against the run or the pass, but what this defense has managed to do is make points a hard thing to come by.

The Jacksonville defense faced some tough tests this season. Buffalo, Indianapolis, Kansas City, Minnesota, San Diego, Denver, Pittsburgh and Green Bay were in the top 10 among scoring offenses this season. The Jaguars defense held each team well under their scoring average and forced key turnovers in each game. Here is a breakdown of how the defense has stacked up against high-powered offenses:

Week 2 vs. Denver – Held the Broncos rushing attack to 106 yards on 35 carries (3.0 avg.) and the offense to a total of six points. Defense recovered a fumble with 37 seconds remaining to preserve the win.

Week 3 at Tennessee – Sacked Steve McNair three times and held him to 143 yards passing, and 18 yards rushing with one interception.

Week 4 vs. Indianapolis – Held Peyton Manning to 220 yards passing on 29 attempts. Limited wide receiver Marvin Harrison to four catches and running back Edgerrin James to 83 yards on 19 rushes.

Week 6 vs. Kansas City – Held Chiefs running back Priest Holmes to 75 yards on 19 attempts (3.9) and sacked Trent Green a team-record six times.

Week 7 at Indianapolis – Held the Colts offense to less than 25 points for the second time in three weeks, and forced two fumbles. Limited running back Edgerrin James to 87 yards on 18 carries. James has never rushed for 100 yards against Jacksonville. Harrison hasn't had a 100-yard game against Jacksonville since the 2000 season.

Week 8 at Houston – Held the Houston offense to only 13 points while limiting the Texans to 93 yards rushing on 32 attempts for a 2.9-yard per carry average. The Jaguars also held Domanick Davis, last year's rookie of the year, to only 56 yards rushing on 22 carries (2.5-yard per carry average).

Week 10 vs. Detroit – Held the Detroit offense to three points and only 190 total yards and only 54 offensive plays. Limited Joey Harrington to 11 completions for 121 yards and one interception for a passer rating of 32.5. First round pick Kevin Jones rushed for 81 yards and no touchdowns on 19 carries.

Week 12 at Minnesota – Held Vikings offense to 20 points, which was seven points under their average, while intercepting Daunte Culpepper once and sacking him four times. The Jaguars held Onterio Smith to 72 yards on 20 carries and the team to a 3.7-yard per carry average. Randy Moss, Marcus Robinson and Nate Burleson combined for 10 catches for 109 yards.

Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh – Held the Steelers to only 17 points, almost seven under their season average. Limited Duce Staley to 51 yards on 17 carries (3.0) and Bettis to only 17 yards. Pittsburgh rushed for 120 yards including 40 from Ben Roethlisberger which was just under 40 yards under their season average. Staley and Bettis had combined for eight 100-yard games coming into the game.

Week 14 vs. Chicago – Jaguars' defense had their best game of the season holding the Bears to a season-low three points. Allowed Thomas Jones to rush 13 times for 26 yards and held the Bears to 31 yards rushing (2.2 average) and no rushing first downs. Chad Hutchinson completed only 52 percent of his passes for 212 yards and an interception for a passer rating of 59.2, while being sacked five times. Extended a stretch of only six points in the last six quarters of play.

Week 15 at Green Bay – Held the Packers to only 94 yards rushing more than 33 yards under their season average, and intercepted Brett Favre three times. Also recovered two fumbles. Allowed the Packers' offense to score 18 points with only a field goal in the first half.

Week 16 vs. Houston – Held the Texans to 14 points on offense and did not allow the offense to score in the second half. Deon Grant and Dewayne Washington intercepted David Carr passes in the first half. Akin Ayodele blocked a 34-yard Kris Brown field goal attempt.

Week 17 at Oakland – Held the high scoring Raiders to only six points on two field goals. The Raiders were averaging 28.6 points a game entering that contest. Oakland was also averaging 248.3 yards passing and the Jaguars held Kerry Collins to 134 net yards. The Jaguars sacked him twice, intercepted three of his passes and recovered a fumble.

HARD TO GET ON THE BOARD AGAINST THE JAGUARS: The Jaguars allowed the seventh fewest points in the NFL this season. They allowed 280 points after allowing 331 points the previous season. They were one of only eight teams to allow under 300 points on the season. The 280 points allowed is the second-fewest allowed in team history ahead of the 289 points scored in 2001, which was the previous second-lowest total. PROTECTING THE ROCK: Head coach Jack Del Rio has put a heavy emphasis on protecting the football. The Jaguars drastically improved from 2003 in limiting the number of turnovers.

'WE WILL AFFECT THE QUARTERBACK': Jack Del Rio proclaimed at the conclusion of the preseason this year that his defense would affect the quarterback. Despite releasing two defensive ends that were on the roster last season, the franchise's all-time sack leader Tony Brackens, and the NFL's fourth active sack leader Hugh Douglas, the Jaguars did affect the quarterback. Not to mention that Jacksonville lost five defensive ends to injured reserve this season. They significantly improved their pass rush over last season.

2003 SEASON: 24 sacks (added Hugh Douglas and Tony Brackens from IR; two defensive ends on injured reserve)

2004 SEASON: 37 sacks (five defensive ends on injured reserve)

TWO-POINT CONVERSIONS' 10TH ANNIVERSARY: The Jaguars were not the only ones celebrating their 10th anniversary in the NFL. The institution of the two-point conversions also celebrated its 10th year in the league. Since 1995 the Jaguars have converted 21 of 31 attempts (68 percent) while holding opponents to only 8 of 29 attempts (28 percent). Here is the breakdown:

CHANGES ON DEFENSE: The Jaguars defense took on a new identity from Jack Del Rio's first season as head coach in 2003. Five new starters joined the team while two players – Rashean Mathis at cornerback and Mike Peterson at middle linebacker – began their second seasons in their new positions.

The most visible change was at defensive end where converted linebacker Greg Favors and rookie seventh-round pick Bobby McCray finished the season as the starting ends. Paul Spicer and Rob Meier had started the season but both were placed on injured reserve midway through the season. In the secondary, former Carolina Panthers free safety Deon Grant was also acquired to quarterback the defense along with Dewayne Washington who was signed from Pittsburgh. The two combined for 32 starts, four interceptions and 29 passes defended.

The linebacking corps also took on a new look with rookie outside linebacker Daryl Smith starting 13 games finishing with 78 tackles, two sacks and an interception. Fifth-year linebacker Tommy Hendricks served as the primary backup after being signed as an unrestricted free agent.

BUILT FROM THE GROUND UP: Seven of the 11 starters on the Jaguars defense were drafted by the Jaguars including three first round picks in S Donovin Darius (1998), DT Marcus Stroud (2001) and DT John Henderson (2002), two second round picks in CB Rashean Mathis (2003) and LB Daryl Smith (2004), one third round pick in LB Akin Ayodele (2001) and one seventh round pick in DE Bobby McCray (2004).

Six of the 11 starters on the Jaguars offense were drafted by the Jaguars including three first round picks in RB Fred Taylor (1998), QB Byron Leftwich (2003) and WR Reggie Williams (2004), two second round picks in C Brad Meester (2000) and RT Maurice Williams (2001), one third round pick in G Vince Manuwai (2003). LT Mike Pearson was drafted in the second round in 2002 and started before being placed on injured reserve after Week 4.

IRON MEN: Five players in Jaguars history have started all 16 games as a rookie including three current players in C Brad Meester, OT Maurice Williams and CB Rashean Mathis. Reggie Williams started 15 of the 16 games this season while Daryl Smith missed the Lions game in Week 10 with a knee injury after starting the first eight games, but he made 13 starts. Three other draft picks – RB Greg Jones (3 starts), PK Josh Scobee and DE Bobby McCray (7 starts) – played in every game this season.

RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS ALLOWED FROM 2003-04: In his season-ending press conference, Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio praised his team's defense in its ability to keep teams out of the end zone. Another one of Del Rio's points of emphasis for his team is shutting down the opposing team's running game. By not allowing teams to get into the end zone and by controlling the running game Del Rio has shown that it is going to be extremely tough to score a rushing touchdown on his defense. Since Del Rio has arrived in Jacksonville in 2003, the Jaguars are tied for fourth in the NFL in rushing touchdowns allowed.

300 YARDS PASSING/100 YARDS RECEIVING/100 RUSHING FOR THE JAGUARS: When David Garrard was called upon to start at quarterback in place of injured Byron Leftwich in Week 10 against the Lions, he responded with a win. His teammates, Fred Taylor and Jimmy Smith, helped lead that effort with each player surpassing the 100-yard mark in the game. It marked the 16th time Jaguars teammates have eclipsed 100-yards rushing and receiving in the same game.

The Jaguars' big three – QB Byron Leftwich (300), RB Fred Taylor (107) and WR Jimmy Smith (113) – became the fifth trio in Jaguars history to rush for 100 yards, catch 100-yards receiving and throw for 300 yards in a game in Week 7 at Indianapolis. MAKING HISTORY: Jacksonville opened the 2004 regular season making history as the first NFL team to open a season with three African-American quarterbacks on its roster with Byron Leftwich, David Garrard and Quinn Gray. The Jaguars' vice president of player personnel James "Shack" Harris was one of the NFL's first African-American quarterbacks when he played from 1969 until 1981 with the Buffalo Bills, the Los Angeles Rams and the San Diego Chargers.

JIMMY SMITH AND THE DEEP BALL: Wide receiver Jimmy Smith continued to be a threat to opposing defensive backs after catching three touchdowns in the last four games including two 31-yard scores. He also surpassed 1,000 yards receiving for the eighth time in Week 14. He caught seven passes for 109 yards and the 36-yard game-winning touchdown in an overtime win against the Lions in Week 10. He caught nine passes for 117 yards against the Texans in Houston in Week 8 after catching five balls for 113 and a score in Week 7 against the Colts in Indianapolis. He now has 43 100-yard games in his career. He had caught a 25-yard touchdown pass as well as a 65-yard pass in the Jaguars' first ever win in Indianapolis. He had a 43-yard reception from Byron Leftwich against Minnesota and had a 40-yard touchdown pass from Leftwich against the Indianapolis Colts in the matchup at ALLTEL Stadium. The reception was his 10th career touchdown pass of

WHERE THERE'S A WILFORD, THERE'S A WAY: Rookie wide receiver Ernest Wilford has contributed a ton of big plays to Jaguars this season. He has shown the ability to make game-winning touchdown catches and receptions in the clutch. His play will only continue to improve into next season. Wilford finished the season leading receivers drafted in the fourth round or later in receptions and yards. He actually outperformed some of the receivers drafted before him, even some first rounders. A game winning touchdown and a one handed catch were all accolades to a very impressive season by the rookie receiver.

Here are his big games this season:

■ **vs. Buffalo** – He made a game-winning 7-yard touchdown reception in the back of the end zone to give the Jaguars their first regular season road victory in nine games. It was the first time in team history that the Jaguars won on a touchdown pass on the final play of the game.

■ **vs. Denver** – His 12-yard touchdown catch in the second quarter from quarterback Byron Leftwich proved to be the game-winner. This gave the rookie receiver a touchdown in consecutive games for the first time in franchise history.

■ **vs. Indianapolis** – He had a season high 6 receptions for 56 yards. A critical 24-yard catch was made in the fourth quarter, which set up a Josh Scobee field goal to cut into the Colts lead.

■ **vs. Pittsburgh** – He made an outstanding 36-yard grab going across the middle on third down in the fourth quarter to help line up Josh Scobee for a 29-yard field goal to slice the Steelers lead to one point.

■ **at Oakland** – He made a highlight reel 46-yard one-handed catch that helped position the Jaguars for their only touchdown of the game. The 46-yard catch was his longest of the season.

MAN OF TROY: Troy Edwards had 50 catches for 533 yards in 2004, both his highest since his rookie campaign in 1999. Edwards led all Jaguars' receivers and was tied for first place among receivers in the AFC in third down catches, with 25. Fourteen of those 25 catches went for first downs.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: The Jaguars' defensive tackles, Pro Bowler Marcus Stroud and John Henderson, have become the most feared defensive tackle tandem in the league. Their ability to clog the middle of the field and get after the quarterback is what makes them so dangerous. These two stalwarts in the middle were both drafted by the Jaguars in 2001 and 2002. Stroud and Henderson combined to notch 13 sacks in 2002 and eight sacks in 2003. This season they combined for 10 sacks, which was the third-best mark in the NFL among DT tandems.

BALL HAWK: Jaguars LB Mike Peterson started out this season leading the team in tackles in nine consecutive games before ending his streak against the Titans in Week 11. This streak was the best mark all-time in Jaguars history, surpassing the record of eight straight games that was previously held by Hardy Nickerson from 11/8/01 until 1/6/02. After finishing 2003 as the team's leading tackler with 167 total tackles, fourth in Jaguars history, Peterson has picked up where he left off. He had a total of 178 tackles this season, leading the team. He also had five sacks, a forced fumble and one recovery. Peterson has flourished making the transition from the outside linebacker spot to the middle in his two seasons with the Jaguars.

PETE'S ROOKIE KICKERS: Jaguars special teams coordinator Pete Rodriguez has a reputation of developing young placekickers. In his 16 seasons in the NFL as a coordinator, he has had three first-year kickers and all have had successful seasons. In 2004 he guided Jaguars rookie Josh Scobee, who was drafted in the fifth round of the NFL draft with the 137th overall pick, to a successful rookie campaign. Here is the list of Rodriguez's first-year kickers:

■ **Scott Blanton (1996)** — Blanton was an undrafted rookie who missed his entire rookie season with a groin injury and came back in 1996 under Rodriguez to connect on 26 of 32 field goal attempts and all 40 extra point attempts. He finished the season with 118 points and his 81.3 field goal percentage was the second-best in Redskins history.

■ **Rian Lindell (2000)** — Lindell was an undrafted rookie in 2000 who took over the placekicking duties in Week 5. He missed only two kicks and converted 15 of 17 kicks and was 25 of 25 on extra points for 70 points.

■ **Josh Brown (2003)** — Brown was drafted in the seventh round of the 2003 NFL draft with the 222nd overall selection. He played in all 16 games and hit on 22 of 30 field goals including converting 22 of 24 inside of 48 yards. He connected on all 48 extra points for 114 total points.

■ **Josh Scobee (2004)** — Scobee was drafted in the fifth round of the 2004 draft with the 137th overall pick. In his first season with the Jaguars, Scobee connected on 24 of 31 field goal attempts and all 21 of his extra point attempts. Scobee converted all four field goal attempts at Indianapolis in Week 7 including a 53-yard game winner with 38 seconds remaining. In addition to his team-leading 93 points, he also had 11 touchbacks, which ranks tied for third in the AFC.

THE KID'S GOT A STRONG LEG: Jaguars kicker Josh Scobee was one of the many bright spots for the Jaguars this season. His big leg has continually pinned opponents deep in their own territory to start drives all season long. Scobee tied for third in the AFC in touchbacks with 11 touchbacks. He became very reliable as well as accurate with his field goals. Scobee hit on 24 of his 31 attempts this season including a 53-yard game winning field goal on the road against the Indianapolis Colts.

If you look at our season, to be able to start the year going into Buffalo, which has proven to be a very good football team, to be able to go there and win, Buffalo is always a tough place to play. To be able to go to Tennessee and win on the road there, which has never been done here. To be able to go into Indianapolis and beat a team that's, we'll see how far they can go in the playoffs, but obviously a very good football team. Go up to Green Bay and beat them in the frozen tundra, and then travel a couple time zones and win in Oakland. Oakland is not an easy place to win either. They had been red hot offensively. Winning on the road, we talked about the need to do that. Last year that was not an area that we were able to get it done. This year we really focused on being road warriors and getting it done and I'm just proud of the fact that we were able to do that with some big wins. Looking at where we were outside of our division, 7-3. We beat some real good football teams. That's pretty doggone good. Inside the division, particularly at home, 2-1 on the road in the division and then not able to get it done at all at home in the division. So, looking back that's an area we will spend a lot of time studying and making sure we give ourselves every opportunity to be better. So areas where we took a step forward, defensively, we pride ourselves on stopping the run. We weren't as good stopping the run this year, but the bottom line is holding people out, keeping them out of the end zone and reducing points. We were able to finish seventh in the league in terms of number of points allowed and first in red zone efficiency holding people out down there. We ended up winning a close game (at Oakland) and needed every bit of that effort down there in the red zone to keep them out, so I'm real proud of that."

(on the game in Oakland) "The Jaguars won their ninth game yesterday on the road. A gutsy performance. As word spread through the sideline, and I didn't acknowledge it even, I was just so focused on the game, but word was spreading through there, I believe, that it wasn't going our way in Denver. I think our guys just showed grit. They played with tremendous passion. I think that is what the story is about. This is a Jaguars football team on the rise, one that has a solid nucleus, a solid foundation. I said when I first took this job that I wanted to surround myself with people that love the game of football. I really think yesterday was a gut check. The odds were against us being able to get in. There are a lot of reasons why. You go out west, on New Year's Day, travel and all that, and not put forth the kind of effort we did. I'm just proud of the way the guys fought. To end the season on that note to me is very rewarding."

(with third down conversations problems and low end zone scoring, is that something you specifically address in the off-season?) "That's something we have to take a good hard look at. I think it really showed up in the off-season in terms of our preseason. We didn't generate much offensively in the preseason and we kept hope that we would be able to work at it and continue to be better. We showed signs and

sputtered. We showed on occasion that we'd be able to get it done, but in terms of consistency and in terms of being productive and being efficient, we just really never got on track. It's something we'll look hard at and try to determine the best options for us to make sure we have improvement. We have got to improve in that area in order to go forward as a playoff football team."

(was the problem more in execution or scheme?) "We're going to spend some time and look at it. I don't really care to try and sum it up today. We'll take our time and take a good look at it. We're going to give ourselves every opportunity to win going forward and that's an area we have to be better in."

(what is missing from Reggie Williams' game?) "I think the biggest thing missing is opportunities, chances to make plays. If you look at a guy like (Michael) Clayton in Tampa who had a tremendous year, he got a lot of opportunities and he made some plays. It's a little different situation. There in a little different situation offensively but you talk about another rookie receiver that came in the league and had a big year. The future, we will see. I think this will all play out rather than trying to get into a snapshot assessment of an individual player at this point. I think it's a little premature for that."

(on being careful or aggressive in free agency) "We're going to be smart about what we do. We're not going to be timid in free agency. We're going to be wise and understand that decisions you make have long term ramifications. So we will continue to be smart in terms of assigning a value on a guy and then going after those guys if you feel they can help upgrade your roster. We're not going to shy away from a high price guy because we had a high price guy not pan out."

(on Byron Leftwich's accuracy on short throws) "I thought Byron was making tremendous improvement prior to his injury. I really believe that coming back from his injury that his footwork, and part of it is due to his leg and battling through, but I don't think it was every quite as crisp, quite as sharp. The mechanics were just not quite as tight as they were early in the year. That's something we'll focus on and emphasize with Byron. He's a terrific player and is going to be a great player in this league for a long time. I have every confidence in that. But everybody has things they have to be better at. Marcus Stroud, as well as he played, Big John (Henderson), those guys, they have things they can be better at. With all of our guys, we will look to be better."

(do you need more playmakers?) "That's part of the question we have to get answered. I do believe we have some playmakers. In the first game of the year when Ernest (Wilford) goes up and makes that play on the top shelf in Buffalo, that's making a play. The same guy yesterday shows up and makes a huge SportsCenter type catch that leads to our only touchdown. Certainly that's one guy right there that you can say made some plays. It's not just limited to offense. Daryl Smith and the sack he had for a safety, those are playmakers making plays. There was a play Daryl Smith made yesterday that may not ever be discussed publicly, but he came across in the end zone and tipped the ball away. There was a guy open who was about to catch a touchdown and he came across on a goal line situation and tipped the ball away. It was a huge play. We have added some playmakers and we will continue to look at playmakers as we build this football team. Overall the one quality that I think we could really add to help us is explosiveness. We've added some real strong, big, tough guys. I think we could use some explosiveness so we'll look to address that."

(is this team better just because you won four more games?) "First of all, you can look at it objectively and say yeah, they're four wins better and it's a winning season. That's the first time in five years. Objectively, you could say absolutely. I think on a subjective level, the chemistry, the closeness of this group, the core, the guys believing in the message and how we're going to do things and how we approach things, I just believe that is well underway. I believe very much in the chemistry of teams coming together. I think this team did that. I think we came together, played hard for each other and I just believe those types of things pay off for you in the end."

(are you going to be more involved in the drafting and the personnel acquisitions this year than you have in the past?) "I don't know that I could possibly be any more involved. I am a guy that really likes that aspect of the business. I watch tons of tape. I get out on the road and look at guys in person. I believe that's one of the strengths that I bring to the organization is my willingness to work at that and a feel for that. I think the relationship I have with Shack (James Harris) in terms of evaluating players and looking players and understanding what we're looking for, we started this in Baltimore when I was an assistant coach and we went in the 'Barber Shop' and kind of had this type of discussion all the time all the time. We will continue to work together to build this team and to add players to help us win a championship."

(does this team have the leaders that a really good playoff team has?) "I think from where we started to where we are, we've really developed leadership. I am continuing to look to build in that area. I think what we've seen the last two years is some of our younger talented guys emerge. I think John Henderson and Marcus Stroud have taken a more active, vocal role in leading guys. Mike Peterson has been more vocal. I know this, it's important for a football team to have good leadership. It's something we identified as an area of need when we got here. We've been building it. Two years into this process, we have helped bring about some of that leadership. We're going to continue to look for guys that have those qualities and look to add those kind of guys."

(did you think the special teams' problems were solved this season?) "Absolutely. We'll continue to look to be better. We were fourth, I believe is what the ranking was, in kick-off coverage which was very good. With the exception of a couple unfortunate plays against Detroit, our punt coverage was good all year. We enjoyed a field position advantage in most of our football games. The one area we have not been as dynamic as I would like is in our return game. I think we still have some work to do in that area. But overall in terms of a sound physical approach, I think we really made strides this year with our special teams and I think that's contributed to us being able to win. The two major areas are special teams and not turning the ball over really helped us win football games this year."

(do you expect Donovan Darius to return next year?) "Donovin, like many of our free agents, we would like to keep all the guys we can. In free agency there is an opportunity for guys to make a choice and an opportunity for a team to make a choice. I think he had a heck of a football season for us. I think he really excelled in some of the areas that he needed to improve in. He made a huge play yesterday in the red zone. He intercepted the ball five times and made plays on the ball in the passing game. He's always been a force against the run. We'll look at that like we do with everybody and as we put together the roster and how we're going to allocate the money that we're going to

spend, we'll make that decision. But I like Donovan as a football player."

(on expectations being pretty high in the third year) "It's what I expect. I think we all do. We know that we're building something. We have to go out and earn it, but what we earned this year was an increase in wins, a chance to be in the playoff hunt until the very last week and as we go forward, I'm not going to want to settle for that, I want more and I believe we'll get more. Guys are giving great effort. There is great energy being expended to be a championship team here in Jacksonville and that's where our energy is going to be focused. We put together the best squad we can and go out and compete like crazy and then we're proud of the results. If the results are not great, we're proud of the way we approached it and don't have any regrets, and that's the important that we give ourselves every opportunity to go out and challenge people and then live with the results and let them speak for themselves."

(on affecting the quarterback) "I took a peek at the sack numbers. We went from 24 to 37. I said we'd be able to affect the quarterback. I think we affected the quarterback better this year. It's an area we'll continue to want to be even more dominant in. Ideally you have strength there where a quarterback just knows he's going to get hit in the back of the head if he doesn't get rid of the ball real quick. So we were able to do some things with our package and by design to generate some things. That's certainly an area we'll look at real strongly in the off-season."

(has Fred Taylor return to his injury days?) "It's crazy to even talk like that. You're talking about a guy that has played extremely hard, very tough. To me, I just don't believe that discussion about Fred is fair or accurate. I think he's earned more than that, especially here locally. You guys see the effort he's put out, the shots he's taken to get up and do it again. We have to give him his due. I think he's earned more than that. I think especially locally. If the national guys don't get it because they don't see him as much, that's different. But I think you guys ought to have a healthy appreciation for how he works, how good he is, what he's capable of, so I think to continue to feed that, I don't think that's right."

(on why the last two teams ran the ball so effectively) "We did the best we could with what we had available. At the end of the season, we had 235 pound defensive ends. They played with heart. They gave us everything they had. Oakland, late in the second half, decided to go after that part. That's just what it is. I think those guys did a tremendous job battling. Greg Favors moves over and ends up being our starting defensive end after being a linebacker all his career and being a linebacker in camp for us. I think it's tremendous what he was able to do for this football team this year. So rather than beat him up I think you ought to acknowledge how incredible it was that he could just move down in there and help us function at a high level. They may have run the ball more effectively than we'd like, but they didn't score points. We did what we had to do to give ourselves a chance to win by minimizing the opponent's opportunity to score points. That's all part of it. From a staff standpoint, I'm proud of the way Mike (Smith) and guys got the most out of the guys we had. The guys in their part gave us everything they had in terms of effort and focus. So those are all positive things."

QB Byron Leftwich ranked 10th in the AFC with a 82.2 passer rating. ... RB Fred Taylor ranks 7th in the AFC with 1,224 rushing yards. ... WR Jimmy Smith ranked 5th in the AFC with 1,172 yards receiving and ranked 12th in the AFC with 74 receptions. ... RB Fred Taylor ranked 6th in the AFC with 1,569 yards from scrimmage and WR Jimmy Smith ranked 16th in the AFC with 1,172 yards from scrimmage. ... CB Rashean Mathis and S Donovan Darius tied for 6th in the AFC with five interceptions apiece. ... S Donovan Darius tied for first in the NFL with four defensive fumble recoveries. ... P Chris Hanson ranked 6th the AFC in gross punting with a 42.8 yard average and 9th in the AFC with a 35.5 net-yard average. ... DT John Henderson and DE Greg Favors tied for 23rd in the AFC with 5.5 sacks apiece and LB Mike Peterson tied for 28th in the AFC with five sacks. ... DT Marcus Stroud tied for 37th in the AFC with 4.5 sacks.

2004 STATS AND SUCH: The Jaguars used turnovers to score 29 points, while their opponents had scored 60 points off Jaguars' turnovers. ... The Jaguars had 20 plays of 30 or more yards in 2004, their most in four years. They had 18 plays of 30-plus yards in 2003, 16 in 2002, 11 in 2001, 26 in 2000, 23 in 1999, 29 in 1998, 22 in 1997, 26 in 1996 and 12 in 1995. The Jaguars allowed 17 30-plus plays this season. ... Of the Jaguars' 305 completed passes, 180 were to wide receivers, 44 to tight ends, 80 to running backs and 1 to quarterbacks. Seventeen different players caught passes, the most in franchise history, after 16 different players caught passes in 2003. Both seasons were under Del Rio. ... The Jaguars were 10 for 18 on fourth-down conversions; their opponents were 5 for 10 ... On 45 drives inside the opponent's 20, the Jaguars scored 19 touchdowns and 19 field goals. In 10 seasons, the Jaguars are 21 for 31 on two-point conversions, while their opponents are 10 for 31. ... In 10 seasons, the Jaguars' record for each month is: 1-0 in August, 19-17 in September, 16-24 in October, 22-17 in November, 22-19 in December and 2-1 in January.

Byron Leftwich is 13-14 in 27 regular-season starts. David Garrard is 1-2 in three regular season starts. ... The Jaguars have 12 players that started all 16 games in 2004 – eight on defense and four on offense. Of those 12 players, seven were drafted by the Jaguars. ... WR Jimmy Smith has played in 155 of the 160 games in Jaguars history. Of the current players, next are S Donovan Darius (103) and TE Kyle Brady (88). ... The longest streak of consecutive starts by a Jaguar is held by C Brad Meester (team-record 80), followed by WR Jimmy Smith (67) and then two players with 48 consecutive starts: DT Marcus Stroud and G Chris Naeole (who has 88 straight starts dating back to 1999 with New Orleans) ... The Jaguars' current longest streak of games played is held by C Brad Meester with 80. ... Ten players have played in 100 or more games during their careers: OT Bob Whitfield (188), CB Dewayne Washington (175), DE Jason Gildon (167), WR Jimmy Smith (162), OL Mike Compton (151), TE Kyle Brady (150), FB Marc Edwards (125), G Chris Naeole (115), S Donovan Darius (103) and DE Greg Favors (101). ...
