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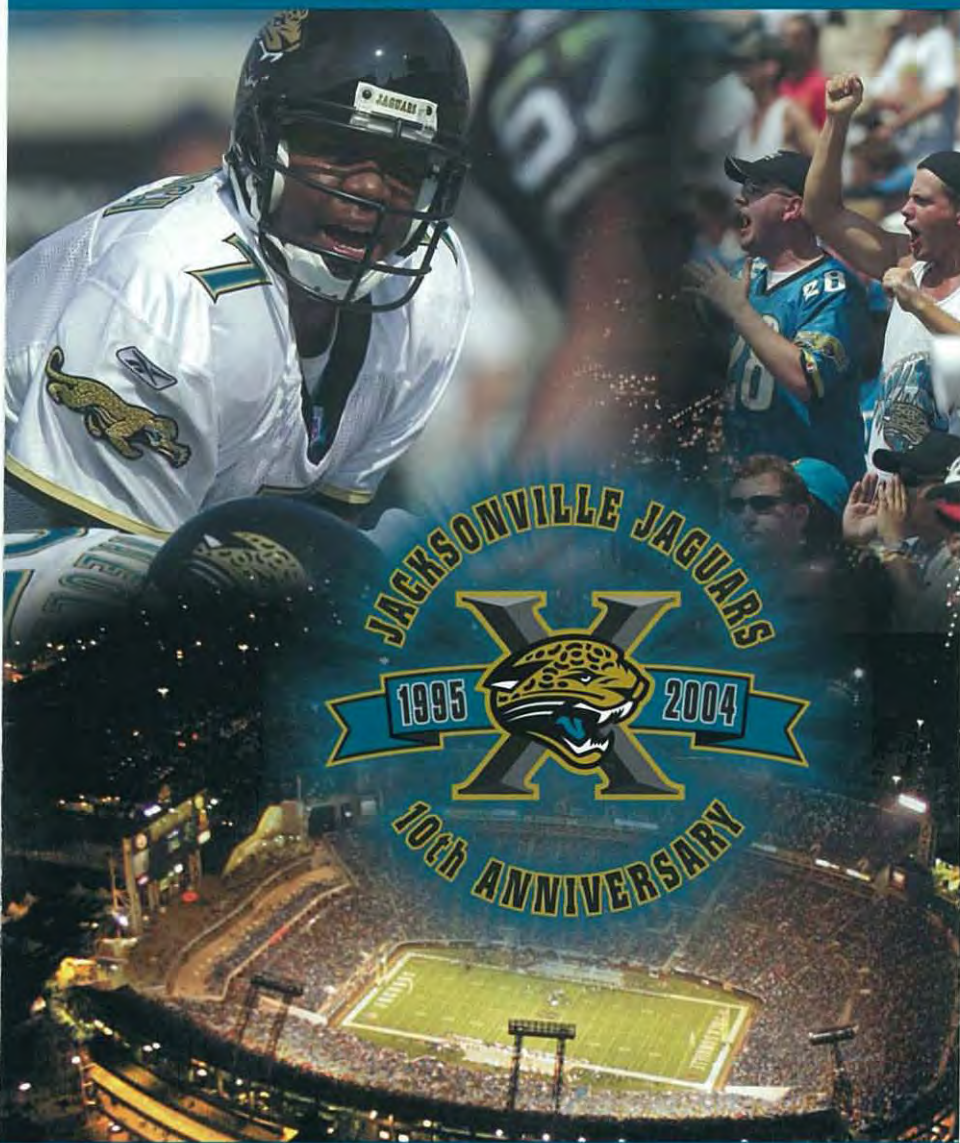

MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefitting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

PROGRAMS:

GRANTMAKING: As we celebrate the Jaguars 10th season on the field, the Jaguars Foundation is celebrating our 10th anniversary of grant making and programs to support children in Jacksonville. When the Jaguars were named as the 30th franchise in 1993, the Weaver's vision was to give back to the community in a substantive manner. The Foundation was announced on September 14, 1994, and awarded its first grants in 1995 before the team played its first game. From March 1995 through June 2004, the Jaguars Foundation has allocated more than \$7.4 million in grants. This level of giving is among the top few in professional sports. Through a fair and objective evaluation process, grants are allocated to serve the needs of economically and socially disadvantaged youth throughout Northeast Florida.

STRAIGHT TALK: Straight Talk is a unique partnership with local media and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida to help prevent teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections. Under the leadership of Foundation Chair and CEO, and Jaguars owner, Delores Barr Weaver, all local television stations, along with other area media collaborate to produce an annual prime time television town hall forum. The show offers candid information on teens and sex

and the consequences faced by sexually active teenagers. The cornerstone of the Straight Talk program, "Teens & Sex...the Real Truth," is broadcast each May and this year was hosted by Jennifer Candelino and featured Jaguars Long Snapper/Tight End Joe Zelenka; ROAR member Jill; and radio personalities Amadeus and DJ Dr. Doom. There was also a panel of experts, special guests from the Dr. Phil show, a middle school studio audience, an exciting new student PSA contest and a new and improved Straight Talk website. The Straight Talk program, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, has awarded more than \$950,000 in grants to local programs specifically dealing with this issue. HONOR ROWS: In partnership with Reebok and ALLTEL, this unique program, now in its 10th year, uses seats at Jaguars home



games as incentives for youth to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. Youth earn their seat to a game for academic achievement, behavioral improvement and participation in community service projects. In addition, all Honor Rows youth pledge to remain free from illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco. For 2004, approximately 3,500 seats are being awarded to 34 agencies. Each agency has the flexibility and creativity necessary to determine how best to use seats as motivational goals. A diverse volunteer committee reviews all applications. At the game, participants receive a meal, Honor Rows t-shirt and hat, and special recognition by the Weavers and fans. The United Way of Northeast Florida mobilizes game-day volunteers who ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of the participants.

Beyond Honor Rows, the Jaguars Foundation awards seats to other charitable organizations, including HabiJax, for volunteer recognition; Sailors Aweigh, for youth whose parents are on deployment with the Navy; youth football associations; Ronald McDonald House, and others who meet Foundation guidelines for support. The Jaguars Foundation allocates approximately 11,800 seats each season for charitable purposes, with a total in-kind value now exceeding \$470,000.



PLAYBOOKS READING INITIATIVE: Through a partnership with Pepsi, Reebok and local libraries, this award winning innovative program was begun to inspire young people to read. In The Official Playbooks, Jaguars owners, players, coaches, cheerleaders and staff recommend books they found particularly motivating as youth or as adults today. Youth can pick-up The Official Playbooks during the football season at local libraries. Playbooks can also be accessed year-round at jaguars.com where children can submit book reports and are eligible to win prizes. The Foundation also awards approximately \$300,000 annually to programs that promote literacy. In addition, players, cheerleaders and team mascot Jaxson de Ville visit dozens of schools, libraries and youth-serving agencies to encourage reading.

ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against tobacco use. The signature "Jaguars Don't Smoke" logo, shows a vibrant Jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw, appears on the scoreboard and signage throughout ALLTEL Stadium; Jaguars' publications and autograph cards; and on television. The stadium has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. The Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from their game-day program, since followed by the entire league.



AWARDS AND RECOGNITION: The Jaguars Foundation was named Jacksonville's outstanding foundation by the Association of Fundraising Professionals-Florida First Coast Chapter (AFP) in November 2003.

The Foundation also received the Governor's Community Investment Award in 2003 in recognition of its prevention programs for youth. This award was also received in 1996 for the Honor Rows program. Other awards include: WTLV-12 Top of the Class Award (1996) for Playbooks; Bridge Builder Award (1997); Grantmakers in Health (1995 and '96); and Florida Department of Education's Commissioner's Business Recognition Award (2001). The Jaguars Foundation's innovative programs have also been nationally recognized, including articles in the New York Times, Forbes, Grantmanship Center Magazine, St. Anthony Messenger, and on the "Osgood File" radio program. Also, through the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Sports Philanthropy Project, the Jaguars Foundation serves as a national demonstration site for other professional teams' foundations, to help increase the level of philanthropy in professional sports.

SPONSORS: Many of the Jaguars Foundation's programs and initiatives are funded in part by Reebok, ALLTEL, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida, Pepsi, and The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Georgia and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 49 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, a fourteen-year-old granddaughter, Morgan and a twenty month old grandson, Nash. Leigh and her friend, Beau Gage, are the artists of TOUCHDOWN, the 16' long and 6' high bronze jaguar that stands outside the West Touchdown Club at ALLTEL Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all seven local television stations and their affiliates, as well as the local newspaper, have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy, AIDS, and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and to heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars who "open the doors and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September, 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, grants to eight local agencies in the amount of \$140,000 were made and through June, 2004, the Foundation will have allocated more than \$7.4 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit Jaguars partners for their generous financial support and staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term impact.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating sexism, racism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally, Delores serves on the Governing Boards of the Jacksonville Community Foundation, USO Council, WJCT Public Broadcasting, Ritz Theatre and LaVilla Museum, and she serves as Trustee of Fresh Ministries and the United Way of Northeast Florida. She also serves on the Advisory Boards of Ronald McDonald House and The Bridge of Northeast Florida, the Honorary Board of Dreams Come True and Edward Waters College Board of Visitors. Delores is a staunch supporter of the four local domestic violence shelters: Betty Griffin House, Hubbard House, Micah's Place and Quigley House, as well as Planned Parenthood, and is a member of The International Women's Forum. She is Chair of the Delores Barr Weaver Golf Tournament benefiting Habijax, Jacksonville's affiliate of Habitat for Humanity. Since its inception in 1996, the tournament has sponsored 46 houses, representing a cash contribution of over \$1.5 million. In addition, she is the Founder of Friends of Habijax. Through the Florida Sales Tax Refund Program to build low-income housing, a total of 25 organizations have been designated Charter Members of Friends and together they have sponsored 117 houses, representing a cash contribution to Habijax of over \$5.7 million. Delores says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home."

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of Martha Graham Dance Company, and NFL Charities, both of New York, Taste of the NFL/Hunger Related Events of Minnesota, and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge and the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute of Boston, where Delores and Wayne created the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1957. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures, and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease, will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised almost \$19 million.

And yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars; she attends every game, and readily admits she is both nervous and excited on gameday.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, JAGUARS FOUNDATION

Peter Racine joined the Foundation in September of 2000. For the past 25 years, he has developed and administered programs for abused, neglected, homeless and runaway children, including eight years as Executive Director of the Northeast Florida Exchange Club Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse. From 1987 to 1992, as Executive Director for Covenant House in Honduras, Central America, he established the agency's programs in Honduras for street children. Prior to that, he worked at Covenant House in Houston, New York City, and Toronto, Canada. Racine has been a partner in various national and international initiatives, including: Community Partnerships for Protecting Children, sponsored by the Edna McGonnell Clark Foundation; Early Childhood Violence Prevention Project, funded by the U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; Outreach to Urban Street Children, supported by the European Economic Community and the Sports Philanthropy Project, in partnership with The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

Racine received his B.A. at Rutgers University in New Jersey, and his M.T.S. at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. He and his wife, Kelly, have one daughter, Miriam.

Marjorie Sabio Marquez has been with the Jaguars Foundation since its inception in 1994. She served as Coordinator of Grants and Special Programs prior to being promoted to Program Officer in the spring of 2001. 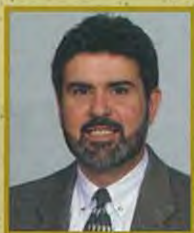
Marquez received her B.A. in English, with a concentration in Communication from Boston College in 1990. She recently married Romualdo "Rodnie" Marquez, Jr.

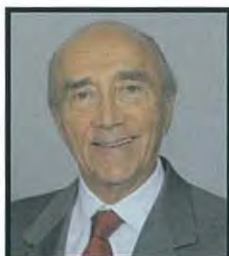

WAYNE WEAVER **CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER**

Upon giving NFL football a home in Jacksonville ten years ago, Wayne Weaver was driven to build the most successful expansion franchise in league history. That was accomplished in the first five years, with four playoff appearances and two division title games. What Weaver has done in the past decade is significant and impressive - not only bringing the Jaguars to Jacksonville and overseeing the construction of four playoff teams in the first five years, but then making sweeping changes in 2003 to open a new era in Jaguars history. It has been a decade of great success as well as a great challenge for Wayne Weaver, and he thrives on both.

In bringing Super Bowl XXXIX to town on February 6, 2005, Weaver will be putting an exclamation point on the first decade of NFL football in Jacksonville.

Weaver gave the organization a much-

ning again and guiding the Jaguars back into the upper echelon of the NFL.

In ten years under Weaver's ownership, the Jaguars have grown from an expansion team into one of the most successful teams in the league. From 1996 through 1999 the Jaguars were the winningest franchise in the NFL. Over the last four seasons the team has fought to return to post-season play, and optimism is high in 2004 that the breakthrough is just around the corner.

"We are committed to winning and to building a championship team, and that commitment has never been stronger," Weaver says as the tenth season opens. "This organization has gone through many changes in the last ten years, and we are as optimistic and positive as ever. Our goal is to get back into the playoffs, and we feel that we are building a team that can contend for that."

Jaguars football began in 1993, when Weaver surprised everybody by winning an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville. In 1994 he presided over the building of one of the NFL's showpiece stadiums, and in the 1995 season his inaugural team claimed four victories.

In 1996 Weaver watched his second-year dream team win seven in a row including two playoff games - the victory over the Denver Broncos is one of pro football's biggest upsets ever - and reach within one game of the Super Bowl. In 1997 Weaver saw his Jaguars win 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team has ever won. In 1998, the Jaguars won their first division championship and the franchise hosted its first-ever home playoff game. In 1999, the Jaguars finished with the NFL's best record, a 14-2 mark that is tied for the fourth-

needed jump start in 2003, overhauling the football operation and setting it on a path to return to the playoffs. After three straight losing seasons, Weaver hired a new head coach and new vice president of player personnel to run his football team. He also assumed a greater role in running his organization. In the NFL, winning is what matters, and Weaver is intent on win-





most victories ever in league history, as the Jaguars hosted the AFC Championship game. And in 2000, Weaver helped bring a Super Bowl to Jacksonville, as the city was selected by his fellow owners to host Super Bowl XXXIX on February 6, 2005.

As the Jaguars head into their 10th season, they are still the most successful expansion franchise in NFL history. Champions of the AFC Central Division in 1998 and '99, they qualified for the playoffs four straight seasons from 1996 to '99. Those kinds of milestones are the result of Weaver's commitment to winning. Every year a new mountain to climb. Every year a new success. Every year even higher dreams. One goal remains: a Super Bowl championship. But first, he knows, is to get back into the playoffs.

One of the nation's most successful entrepreneurs, Weaver brought his enthusiasm and business acumen to Jacksonville, a city that was yearning for professional football. He wanted a model franchise and a team that would contend for the playoffs in a short time. He also wanted success both on and off the field. Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has long proven to be a winning way.

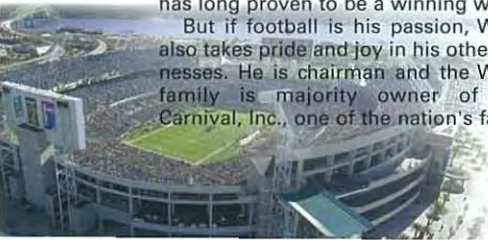
But if football is his passion, Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-

growing shoe retailers that is based in Evansville, Ind. He also serves as chairman and CEO of Liz Claiborne Shoes, a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country that is headquartered in Jacksonville. Weaver, previously, was co-owner, president and CEO of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores Weaver have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars Foundation.

Weaver is a member of five NFL committees: Finance, Audit, Investment, Business Ventures and the Pro Football Hall of Fame Board of Trustees. He is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York, and also serves on the boards of Stein Mart, the Cummer Museum of Arts and Gardens, the Jacksonville Zoo and the Alliance for World Class Education.

Weaver was born on January 14, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West. Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 49 years and have a daughter Leigh, a son Bradley, a 13-year-old granddaughter Morgan, and a 20-month-old grandson Nash.





PAUL VANCE **SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL** **OPERATIONS/ GENERAL COUNSEL**

Paul Vance was promoted to senior vice president football operations in November, 2001 after serving as general counsel to the team since the inception of the Jaguars. Vance is responsible for the Jaguars' salary cap strategy and planning and contract negotiations. He also oversees the team training and medical functions, the team video and equipment departments and team travel and logistics. He continues to serve as general counsel.

Vance is credited with developing, with former Coach Tom Coughlin, the plan to solve the Jaguars salary cap problems for the 2002 season. The plan involved the drastic but necessary decision to offer Pro Bowl tackle Tony Boselli, Gary Walker and Seth Payne to the Houston Texans in the Expansion Draft, as well as the implementation of fiscal restraint in player contracts and acquisition for the 2002 and 2003 seasons. As of 2004, the Jaguars have emerged with one of the healthiest cap situations in the NFL.

Since taking over in 2001, Vance has been responsible for the negotiation of extensions for veterans such as Fred Taylor, Jimmy Smith, Brad Meester, Kyle Brady, Tony Brackens, Chris Hanson and Paul Spicer and contracts with free agents including Chris Naeole, Deon Grant, Mark Edwards, Hugh Douglas, Mike Peterson. Notable rookies signed during this period include John Henderson, Byron Leftwich, Rasheen Mathis, Mike Pearson and Vince Manuwai.

After the coaching change was announced at the end of the 2002 season, Vance assisted owner Wayne Weaver in the identification and interview of prospective

candidates. The process led to the signing of head coach Jack Del Rio and vice president of player personnel James Harris. Del Rio, Harris and Vance have established a close working relationship that emphasizes consideration and balance of all coaching, player personnel and salary cap aspects in the player acquisition and roster building process.

Vance has been with the Jaguars since July 1994, following 21 years of private practice in Connecticut. While there, he represented Wayne Weaver during the expansion process. Since coming to Jacksonville, he has been of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars.

Vance graduated from the University of Rochester in 1969 with a degree in economics. While at Rochester, he played baseball and captained the school's basketball team. He received his J.D. in 1973 from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

Vance serves on the board of Jacksonville's Museum of Science and History and the MaliVai Washington Kids Foundation. He is a member of the Business Advisory Council of the University of North Florida Coggin School of Business. He has also served as a member of the steering committee of Downtown Visions, Inc., which successfully organized a business improvement district in downtown Jacksonville. Vance was born November 12, 1947 in Buffalo, N.Y. He and his wife, Jane, live in Jacksonville. They have four children: daughters, Kerry and Jamie, and sons, Jordan and Derek.





BILL PRESCOTT
SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, STADIUM
OPERATIONS/CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Bill Prescott is the senior vice president of stadium operations/chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He oversees the financial operations and information technology of the team. He is responsible for managing the Jaguars' portion of ALLTEL Stadium year-round, as well as the relationships with SMG (facility and game day operations) and Centerplate and Levy Restaurants (concession operations). Prescott also interacts with the NFL and city of Jacksonville on financial matters.

Last year, Prescott oversaw the design and construction of a \$43 million renovation of ALLTEL Stadium which included amenities such as escalators, the Bud Zone, and the new Terrace Suite. For the 2004 season, he will oversee \$17 million of stadium renovations in preparation for Super Bowl XXXIX in February 2005. These renovations include remodeling of the clubs and suites, retrofitting the scoreboards for new 24'x84' video displays, and the opening of the new Pepsi Plaza in the location of the old practice fields.

Prescott is also responsible for the financial operations of other Wayne Weaver-related entities, such as the DAR

Group, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation and the Weaver Family Foundation. He has been involved with the Jaguars since their inception and has also handled the Weavers' finances since 1980. Prescott met Weaver while he worked as a tax manager for Deloitte & Touche. In 1989, Prescott joined Grill, Gilhuly, Prescott & Co. CPAs as a partner, where he continued to work with the Weavers.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Prescott is a graduate of Pace University with a degree in accounting and a master's degree in taxation. He is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the Connecticut Society of CPAs and the Financial Executive Institute. He holds CPA licenses in both Connecticut and Florida. Prescott was recently appointed chairman for the Mohawk District of the Boy Scouts of North Florida, an urban scouting program serving the at risk youth of Jacksonville. His hobbies include tennis, sailing and skiing. Prescott was born May 7, 1956. He has two sons, Christopher and Michael. He and his wife, Kim, live in Ponte Vedra Beach.





JAMES HARRIS **VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL**

James Harris was named vice president of player personnel for the Jaguars on January 23, 2003. Harris came to Jacksonville from the Baltimore Ravens, where he played an important role in all aspects of the team's personnel decisions and acquisitions. With the Jaguars, Harris — known as "Shack" to just about everyone who knows him — is responsible for all player acquisitions, including the annual college draft, unrestricted free agents, veteran free agents, trades and undrafted rookies.

Since joining the team, Harris and the player personnel staff have made significant contributions through the acquisition of first-round draft choices QB Byron Leftwich in 2003 and WR Reggie Williams in 2004, in addition to several veteran free agents, including All-Pro DE Hugh Douglas. In May 2003, Sports Illustrated named him the 36th most influential minority person in sports, writing that his background as one of the first black quarterbacks in the NFL as well as being the first to start a playoff game "groomed Harris as a leader." It further described him as "a terrific talent evaluator."

Harris was the director of pro personnel for the Ravens from 1997 until joining the Jaguars, working closely with Baltimore's executive vice president/general manager Ozzie Newsome. Harris was a key component in the Ravens' success in acquiring key free agents, including Pro Bowlers such as QB Jeff Blake (1995 Pro Bowl) and TE Shannon Sharpe (eight Pro Bowls). During his first two seasons with Baltimore, Harris recommended DE Michael McCrary (1998-99 Pro Bowls), DT Tony Siragusa and S Rod Woodson (1999-2001 Pro Bowls). The Ravens also signed key free agents DT Sam Adams from

Seattle (2000-01 Pro Bowls) and QB Trent Dilfer from Tampa Bay prior to the team's Super Bowl run in 2000.

Harris was the New York Jets' assistant general manager for four years (1993-96) after scouting for six seasons for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). A former quarterback, he played for three teams: Buffalo Bills (1969-71), L.A. Rams (1972-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). He was drafted in the eighth round by the Buffalo Bills in 1969 out of Grambling. During his 12-year career in the NFL as a quarterback, Harris led the NFL with an 89.8 passer rating in 1976 and was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl when he rallied the NFC to a 14-13 victory with two touchdown passes. His best day came against Miami in 1976 with 17 completions in 29 attempts for 436 yards and two touchdowns.

Harris was coached by college football's winningest coach, Grambling's Eddie Robinson. The Tigers won or shared the SWAC title in each of his four seasons with the team from 1965 to '68. He was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic and was named Pittsburgh Courier Player of the Year in 1968.

Harris earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his contributions to American society during his NFL career. He was a legendary athlete at Carroll High School in his hometown of Monroe, La., winning 39 consecutive games. He has been inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame.

Harris serves on the NFL's subcommittee on college relations.

He and his wife, Vicki, reside in Jacksonville.





TIM CONNOLLY **VICE PRESIDENT, DEVELOPMENT**

Long-time football executive Tim Connolly joined the Jaguars on March 31, 2003 as the team's vice president of development. He is primarily responsible for the Jaguars' Super Bowl XXXIX project, an initiative to help fund the capital improvements to ALLTEL Stadium to prepare for the 2005 Super Bowl.

Connolly previously spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings and seven years with the Kansas City Chiefs. He served as executive vice president and general manager of the Vikings in 1998 and '99. The Vikings posted a 15-1 record and played in the NFC Championship game in his first season. In his nine years of working in a managerial role in the National Football League, seven with the Chiefs (1989-95) and two with the Vikings (1998-99), Connolly has been with teams that have posted a 97-46-1 record on the field. Connolly is best known for building strong front office teams and delivering record-level stadium revenues.

In 1999, the Vikings sold the most season tickets in the franchise's 39-year his-

tory, 16,000 more than the previous season. In Kansas City, Connolly served as the Chiefs' executive vice president and chief operating officer. He was a key element of the franchise's turnaround effort, helping position the Chiefs as one of the dominant teams of the 1990s on and off the field. When Connolly arrived in Kansas City, the Chiefs had 25,000 season ticketholders and had participated in only one playoff game in 17 years. In Connolly's first year in Kansas City, the team's attendance rose 55 percent, and the Chiefs led the NFL in home attendance in 1994 and '95.

Connolly began his business career in 1971 with the IBM Corporation, and served as the President and CEO of two Bell System subsidiaries prior to joining the NFL. Connolly graduated from George Washington University in 1971. He was born in San Diego, CA in 1948, has three grown children Jenny, Brie and John and resides with his wife, Nyunok, in Jacksonville.





DAN EDWARDS **VICE PRESIDENT, COMMUNICATIONS AND MEDIA**

Dan Edwards was promoted to vice president of communications and media on May 9, 2003. He is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Jaguars' internal and external communications, including media relations, community relations, publications, the team's award-winning web site (www.jaguars.com) and the team's Emmy-winning in-house broadcasting department. jaguars.com was ranked 16th among 131 pro sports websites in 2004. The broadcasting department received a 2002 regional Emmy Award for its special "Making of an NFL Broadcast" and is eligible for more Emmys in 2004.

Hired more than a year before the team's first game, Edwards is now in his 21st season in the NFL and his 11th year with the Jaguars. He was named executive director of communications on May 4, 1994, and he took over responsibility for the broadcasting department in 2001. Formerly the public relations director for the Pittsburgh Steelers (1987-93), he brought to the Jaguars 10 years of NFL experience working with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Miami Dolphins and the league office.

After receiving a scholarship from NFL Charities and serving as a public relations intern in the NFL office in 1984, Edwards spent the 1984 season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins, who played in Super Bowl XIX that year. In 1985 Edwards joined the Steelers as assistant public relations director, and in 1987 he was named director of public relations. In 1991, the Steelers' public relations department

received the coveted Pete Rozelle Award, which is presented annually by the Pro Football Writers of America to the NFL's top PR staff. Edwards' Jaguars staff in both 1996 and '98 was voted one of three finalists for the award. He has also worked for the NFL Super Bowl staff at 16 Super Bowls in addition to the 1990 Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL, Edwards worked in professional baseball, spending one season as an administrative assistant with the Eugene (Ore.) Emeralds, a single-A affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds. He played football and baseball for Montgomery College (Md.) before transferring to the University of Oregon. Edwards received his undergraduate degree in business administration/management from the Charles H. Lundquist College of Business at the University of Oregon in 1981, and a master's degree in sports administration/facility management from Ohio University in 1984.

Edwards currently serves as chairman of the communications strategy committee for the Jacksonville Super Bowl Host Committee, which is busy preparing for Super Bowl XXXIX in Jacksonville at the end of the season. He is a past member of the board of directors for the Florida Sports Awards, and he also served on the Sport Management Advisory Council for Flagler College. He was born January 15, 1959 in Denver, and he grew up in the Washington, D.C. area. Edwards and his wife Tricia have four children: sons Christian and Preston and daughters Danielle and Victoria.





JACK DEL RIO HEAD COACH

NFL: 19TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Jack Del Rio is in his second year as head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars after becoming the second head coach in franchise history on January 17, 2003. After winning three of the final five games a year ago, Del Rio hopes to continue building on the momentum that was begun. In his first season, the Jaguars posted a 5-11 record, with six losses coming by seven points or less.

Del Rio was the architect of a defense that ranked sixth overall in the NFL and second against the run. He had inherited a team that had not been in the top 10 in total defense since 1999 and ranked 20th overall in 2002. In only one season, he took a porous run defense that was ranked 25th in 2002 and elevated it to second in the NFL, and only allowed one 100-yard rusher all year. This vast improvement was no coincidence since Del Rio was only one year removed from taking the Panthers defense from 31st in the league to second overall as defensive coordinator of Carolina.

The Jaguars stout defense should continue its improvement this season with the additions of free agent defensive backs Juran Bolden, Deon Grant and Dewayne Washington, as well as 2004 draft picks LB Daryl Smith, DE Jorge Cordova and DT Anthony Maddox. Proving that he could also coach the offensive side of the ball, Del Rio oversaw an offensive line that in 2003 allowed the fewest sacks in team history while Fred Taylor rushed for a career-high

1,572 yards and Byron Leftwich started 13 games as a rookie QB.

Del Rio
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defensive coordinator of the Carolina Panthers in 2002, his sixth season as an NFL assistant coach. He previously spent 11 years as an NFL linebacker and had a standout college career at the University of Southern California. At 41, Del Rio is the second-youngest head coach in the NFL, just four months older than Tampa Bay's Jon Gruden.

Del Rio has learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to USC and played for John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Frank Gansz, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green. As an assistant coach, he has worked for Hall of Famer Mike Ditka and Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, as well as Super Bowl participant John Fox.

Del Rio joined the Carolina Panthers' staff on January 27, 2002 as the team's defensive coordinator. In his only season with Carolina, the defense improved to second in the league from 31st in 2001. Despite coming off a 1-15 season, the Panthers' defense allowed only 290.4 yards per game, behind only the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Carolina led the NFL in fewest rushing yards per attempt (3.7) and were second in three other categories: fewest yards per play, third down efficiency and sacks (52). The Panthers allowed only 302 points, fourth fewest in the league. They did not allow a 300-yard passer and didn't yield a 100-yard rusher until the season finale. The Panthers' Julius Peppers was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

From 1999 to 2001, Del Rio was the linebackers coach of the Baltimore Ravens, helping the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants. For those three years, all of which the Ravens finished sec-





ond in total defense, Del Rio coached the Ravens' talented linebackers, overseeing the development of Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. During the Ravens' Super Bowl championship season in 2000, Baltimore's defense set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points and recording four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 record. The group also led the NFL with 49 forced turnovers. The defense continued its domination in the playoffs, allowing just one touchdown in four games. The lone score allowed in the Ravens' 34-7 Super Bowl win over the New York Giants came on a kickoff return.

Del Rio coached two seasons in New Orleans, as the linebackers coach in 1998 and the assistant strength coach in 1997.

An 11-year NFL veteran, Del Rio was a third-round choice by the New Orleans Saints in 1985. He was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team and earned the Saints' Rookie of the Year award in 1985. Following two seasons in New Orleans, Del Rio played for the Kansas City Chiefs (1987-88), Dallas Cowboys (1989-91) and Minnesota Vikings (1992-95). He led the Vikings in tackles three straight years (1992-94) and played in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season. During his career, Del Rio recorded 1,078 tackles, registered 12 quarterback sacks, made 13 interceptions and started more than 100 consecutive games between 1989 and 1994. He went to the playoffs once with the Cowboys and three times with the Vikings.

Del Rio was a four-year starter from

1981 to '84 at Southern California, where he earned consensus All-America honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award. The Trojans were 30-15-1 during his four seasons, three times ranked among the top 15 teams in the country. He played in the 1982 Fiesta Bowl and was co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. He led the Trojans in tackles for a loss three years in a row and played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Japan Bowl. Del Rio finished his career with 340 tackles, 58 for a loss, five fumble recoveries and one interception.

Drafted out of high school by the Toronto Blue Jays in 1981, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on Southern California's baseball team in 1983 and '84. He was a teammate of current Arizona Diamondbacks pitcher Randy Johnson and former major league slugger Mark McGwire.

Del Rio graduated from Hayward (Calif.) High School and holds a political science degree from the University of Kansas, which he finished while playing for the Chiefs. Born April 4, 1963 in Castro Valley, Calif., he and his wife, Linda, have three daughters: Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son: Luke.

STEVE SHAFER ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

NFL: 20TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Steve Shafer enters his second season with the Jaguars serving as the team's assistant head coach. Shafer, 63, also helps coach the defensive backs. Shafer is in his 36th year of coaching, after coming out of retirement in 2003. As the Jaguars' assistant head coach, he helps Jack Del Rio in various administrative roles, and also assists defensive backs coach Alvin Reynolds.

In his 19 years coaching defensive backs in the NFL, Shafer has helped his players reach the Pro Bowl 14 times. He spent three seasons in Baltimore (1999-2001) as the Ravens' assistant head coach/secondary coach, including the 2000 season when the Ravens were Super Bowl champions. That year, Baltimore's defense set an NFL 16-game record for fewest points allowed (165). Shafer's secondary, led by future Hall of Famer Rod Woodson, set a team record with 23 interceptions and led the NFL with 49 takeaways. The Ravens allowed only 11 TD passes in 20 games, tops in the NFL. Before joining Brian Billick's staff, Shafer coached the Carolina Panthers' defensive backs in 1998, and the Panthers tied for fourth in the NFL that season with 19 interceptions. He coached the Oakland Raiders' secondary for three seasons (1995-97) after serving as defensive coordinator at San Diego State in 1994. Shafer coached the defen-

sive backs for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1991 to '93 and the Los Angeles Rams' defensive backs from 1983 to '90.

Shafer began his coaching career in 1968 at San Mateo (Calif.) Junior College, where he was defensive coordinator for five seasons before taking over as head coach for the 1973-74 seasons. He then coached defensive backs at San Diego State from 1975 to '82 before going into the NFL. He was drafted in the 11th round in 1963 by the San Francisco 49ers, and he played defensive back for the British Columbia Lions in the Canadian Football League for five seasons (1963-67). He was a quarterback and defensive back for two seasons at College of the Sequoias and two seasons at Utah State after graduating from Burbank (Calif.) High School. Shafer was born December 8, 1940 in Glendale, Calif. He and his wife, Jane, live in Jacksonville. They have a son, Don (6/15/64) and a daughter, Shawn (5/6/67).

NFL: 12TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Bill Musgrave begins his second season as offensive coordinator in Jacksonville. Quarterback Byron Leftwich returns for his first full season as the starter and newly drafted players Reggie Williams and Greg Jones join an already talented squad headlined by Jimmy Smith, Fred Taylor and Kyle Brady.

Musgrave spent six years as a quarterback in the NFL, four years as an NFL assistant coach and two years coaching on the collegiate level. Musgrave returned to the NFL in 2003 following two successful seasons as the offensive coordinator at the University of Virginia. Previously, he served as the offensive coordinator for the Carolina Panthers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Musgrave was a fourth-round draft choice of the Dallas Cowboys in 1991. He played for the San Francisco 49ers from 1991 to '94, backing up Steve Young and playing in the 49ers' Super Bowl XXIX victory over San Diego. He spent 1995 and '96 with the Denver Broncos, playing behind another future Hall of Famer in John Elway.

Musgrave's coaching career began before his playing days were over. He was released by the Broncos during the 1997 preseason and was quickly hired by the Oakland Raiders as quarterbacks coach. That year, he helped guide Jeff George to a league-leading 3,919 yards passing and an AFC-best 29 touchdown passes. In 1998, Musgrave went to training camp with the Indianapolis Colts. After being released, he joined the Philadelphia Eagles' coaching staff as offensive coordinator for the final 10 games of the season. He joined the Carolina Panthers as quarterbacks coach in 1999, playing an instrumental role in a Pro Bowl season for

Steve Beuerlein, who passed for nearly 4,500 yards and 36 touchdowns, as the Panthers had the NFL's No. 2-ranked passing offense. Musgrave was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2000.

He spent the last two years as the offensive coordinator at the University of Virginia. Named the "Best Coordinator" in the ACC by The Sporting News in 2002, he was instrumental in the development of quarterback Matt Schaub. One of a host of players who flourished under Musgrave's innovative schemes, Schaub almost completely rewrote the Virginia record book for passing and was named ACC Player of the Year. Overall, Virginia threw 32 touchdown passes in 2002, including a record 28 by Schaub.

Musgrave was a four-year starting quarterback and three-year captain at Oregon. He finished his collegiate career as the Ducks' all-time leading passer while setting a total of 15 school records. His 60 career passing touchdowns ranked second only to Elway in Pac-10 history. He was a three-time All-Academic selection and was the nation's All-Academic Player of the Year as a senior. He received a bachelor's degree in finance in 1990. Musgrave was born November 11, 1967 in Grand Junction, Colo. He was a standout athlete at Grand Junction High School and was named the Colorado High School Athlete of the Year in 1985. He and his wife, Neely, have two sons, Carter and Eli, and two daughters, Miranda and Delaney. They reside in Jacksonville.

MIKE SMITH **DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

NFL: 7TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

After being named the Jaguars' defensive coordinator on January 21, 2003, Mike Smith proceeded to lead the Jaguars defense to new heights immediately. The defense finished the 2003 season as the sixth ranked defense in the NFL, second against the run and 18th against the pass, the highest overall ranking since 1999. Smith also presided over a run defense which allowed only 3.2 yards per rush, best in the NFL.

Leading the way for Smith's defense was defensive tackle Marcus Stroud, who was named a starter in his first Pro Bowl after notching 101 tackles and 4.5 sacks. Linebacker Mike Peterson finished with a team-best 167 tackles and three of the Jaguars' 17 interceptions. Rookie defensive back Rashean Mathis started every game and was named AFC Defensive Rookie of the Month in December, and defensive end Tony Brackens returned from microfracture surgery and registered a team-high six sacks in 15 starts.

A veteran of 23 years of coaching, Smith, 44, has experience in one form or another with almost every position on defense and on special teams.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, he spent the previous four seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, helping them to their Super Bowl championship in 2000. The Ravens' 2000 defense set an NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points. From 1999 to 2001, Smith was the Ravens' defensive assistant/defensive line coach, and in 2002 he was the linebackers coach, replacing Jack Del Rio, who became defensive coordinator of the Carolina Panthers. In 2002, Smith coached All-Pro Ray Lewis and Pro Bowler Peter Boulware, who had

his finest NFL season, and he was an instrumental

factor in the development of second-year pro Ed Hartwell, who made a team-leading 196 tackles. From 1999 to 2001, Smith worked on all aspects of the defensive game plan and also assisted with special teams.

A native of Daytona Beach and a player in the Canadian Football League, Smith had a 12-year stint at Tennessee Tech (1987-98), the last three as the defensive coordinator. He joined the Tennessee Tech staff as defensive line coach, then served as special teams coordinator from 1988 to '95. He tutored the line for nine seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 1996. With Smith as defensive coordinator, the Golden Eagles' defense finished in the top 10 in the nation in both 1997 and '98. In 1998, Smith was promoted to defensive coordinator/assistant head coach.

Before joining Tennessee Tech, Smith was the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Morehead (Ky.) State. He served as a part-time assistant coach at San Diego State in 1982, and then spent the next three seasons (1983-85) coaching the Aztecs' linebackers. It was at San Diego State where he worked with Brian Billick, who brought him to Baltimore in 1999.

Smith played linebacker for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL in 1982. He played collegiately at East Tennessee (1977-81), where he was named defensive MVP twice at linebacker. As a senior, he led the team with 186 tackles. Smith was a star athlete at Father Lopez High School in Daytona Beach and earned All-State honors as a linebacker in 1975. He was born November 30, 1959 in Chicago. He and his wife, Julie, have a daughter, Logan (5/13/00), and live in Jacksonville.

PETE RODRIGUEZ **SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR**

NFL: 16TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 1ST SEASON

Pete Rodriguez was brought to Jacksonville on February 9, 2004 as the Jaguars' new special teams coordinator. His new responsibility will be to build a special teams unit that will become a force in the AFC. At his disposal will be Pro Bowl punter Chris Hanson, who returns from injured reserve in 2003, and a three-headed monster at kicker with incumbent Seth Marler, free agent Jeff Chandler and draftee Josh Scobee.

Rodriguez, 63, is a veteran of 16 NFL coaching seasons, including the last six with the Seattle Seahawks. In 2003 he left his mark on the Seahawks' unit, highlighted with Alex Bannister being named to the Pro Bowl. Rookie kicker Josh Brown connected on 22 of 24 field goal attempts inside the 48 yard line. Tom Rouen placed 29 punts inside the 20 against only three touchbacks.

He is widely regarded as one of the top special teams coaches in the NFL, as evidenced by being named Special Teams Coach of the Year in 1992 and Special Teams Coach of the Decade in the '90s by the Dallas Morning News. Rodriguez has tutored five Pro Bowl punters.

Rodriguez entered the NFL as the Los Angeles Raiders special teams coach (1988-89), and served in the same capacity with the Phoenix Cardinals (1990-93) before joining the Washington Redskins

staff (1994-97). Prior to entering the NFL he worked with the USFL's Michigan Panthers as a defensive line coach from 1983-84. He also coached with the USFL's Denver Gold (1985) and Jacksonville Bulls (1986), while spending one year in the CFL with the Ottawa Rough Riders (1987).

Rodriguez broke into coaching as a graduate assistant at Arizona (1968-69) and later served as defensive coordinator at Western Illinois (1970-73), Florida State (1974-75), Iowa State (1976-78) and Northern Iowa (1986). He served as head coach at Western Illinois from 1979-82.

He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Western State College in Colorado, and a masters of education from the University of Arizona. Rodriguez and his wife, Sherry, have four children, daughters Regina, Marla and Lori, and son John. They also have three grandchildren, Colby, Riley and Nya.

KEN ANDERSON **WIDE RECEIVERS COACH**

NFL: 28TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

One of the top quarterbacks in NFL history, Ken Anderson begins his first season as wide receivers coach after serving as the Jaguars' quarterbacks coach last season. With the exception of veterans Jimmy Smith and Troy Edwards, Anderson inherits a position with a great deal of youth and potential. He will be looked upon to develop rookies Reggie Williams and Ernest Wilford as well as continue the progress of players like Cortez Hankton and Jimmy Redmond.

Anderson, 55, played for the Cincinnati Bengals for 16 seasons and was an assistant coach there for 10 years. He joined the team's staff in 1993 and was the quarterbacks coach for three seasons, offensive coordinator from 1996 to 2000, and then quarterbacks coach in 2001-02. Nearly two decades since retiring as a player, Anderson still continues to dominate the Bengals' record book with his career passing marks. He holds the club's all-time marks in completions (2,654), passing yards (32,838) and touchdown passes (197). Twice he has been among the 15 finalists for election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He still holds the NFL record for highest completion percentage in a season: 70.55 in 1982. He won four NFL passing titles, which is tied for third most in NFL history behind Sammy Baugh and Steve Young, and was named four times to the Pro Bowl. He led the league three times in lowest interception percentage, which is tied for second most all time behind Baugh. Anderson played in 192 games and led the Bengals

to an appearance in Super Bowl XVI against the San Francisco 49ers. He had career totals of 2,654 completions in 4,475 attempts for 32,838 yards and 197 touchdowns. He also rushed for 2,220 yards and 20 touchdowns. He is the 19th ranked passer in NFL history after ranking 10th when he retired.

When Anderson joined the pro coaching ranks as Bengals quarterbacks coach in 1993, he helped quarterback Jeff Blake chip away at a few of his own Cincinnati marks. In 1995, Blake supplanted Anderson in the categories of most completions in a season (326) and most consecutive games with a TD pass (21). He guided Jon Kitna to a single-season record for pass attempts (581 in 2001) and more than 3,000 yards passing in back-to-back seasons.

Until joining the Jaguars, Anderson had played and coached for only the Bengals since completing a record-setting college career at Augustana (Ill.) in 1970. He was a third-round pick from the small school, the 67th selection in the draft. His 16 years of service as a player (1971-86) are the most in Bengals history. Prior to joining the Bengals as a coach, he worked six years in Cincinnati as a sportscaster. Anderson was born February 15, 1949 in Batavia, Ill. He has a son, Matt (6/5/75), and two daughters, Megan (10/24/78) and Molly (2/27/83). He and his wife, Cristy, live in Jacksonville.

MARK ASANOVICH **STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH**

NFL: 10TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Mark Asanovich is in his second season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars and his 10th season as an NFL coach. In his first season, the Jaguars were one of the healthiest and most physical teams in the NFL.

Asanovich, 45, brought to the Jaguars a new strength and conditioning regime that emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts. The cornerstone of his program is to "coach reps rather than merely count reps." It is his belief that players who are coached in the weightroom will develop better results from what is inspected rather than what is expected. With the support of Jaguars owner Wayne Weaver, Asanovich oversaw a \$300,000 renovation of the Jaguars weightroom since the 2003 offseason conditioning program. "Wayne Weaver has given us the resources to win and Jack Del Rio and his staff have given us their support," Asanovich said. "The players have responded and have garnered the results."

In 2002, Asanovich was the assistant strength and conditioning coach of the Baltimore Ravens. He was the head strength and conditioning coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996 through

2001 working under former coach Tony Dungy.

Asanovich spent the 1995 season as assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Minnesota Vikings. From 1987 to '95, he was the strength and conditioning coach at Anoka High School (Minneapolis, Minn). In 1984, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio State, staying there two years. In 1986 he coached at The Citadel. Asanovich has published several articles in his field of study and served as a member of the Minnesota Governor's Council on Health & Physical Fitness. He earned a bachelor's degree in education from St. Cloud State and a master's degree in exercise science from Ohio State. Asanovich was born May 20, 1959 in Duluth, Minn. He played guard and linebacker at Duluth East High School and attended St. Cloud State. He and his wife, Allisen, have two daughters, Haley (8/25/00) and Gracie (11/1/02). They live in Orange Park.

PAUL BOUDREAU OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

NFL: 18TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

In his first year as offensive line coach for the Jaguars, Paul Boudreau made arguably the largest impact of any of the new coaches on his squad. His offensive line broke the Jaguars record by allowing only 28 sacks, including only six allowed in the final eight games. Boudreau was also instrumental in the development of rookie guard Vince Manuwai and in moving Brad Meester to center after three years at guard. His line blocked for running back Fred Taylor, whose 1,572 yards rushing was a career record.

Boudreau, 54, was hired on January 27, 2003 and brought a reputation as one of the outstanding offensive line coaches in the NFL. He joined the Jaguars from the Carolina Panthers, where he spent two seasons. Under his tutelage, the Panthers set a club record of only 31 sacks allowed in 2001 after giving up 69 the previous year. In 2002, Carolina allowed 44 sacks for the season but none in four games.

In addition to working with the Panthers, Boudreau has overseen stellar offensive lines in New Orleans, Detroit, New England and Miami. He has coached lines that blocked for eight 1,000-yard rushers, including Barry Sanders and Curtis Martin.

His NFL run of success began in 1987 in New Orleans, where the Saints were perennially ranked among the league leaders in fewest sacks allowed. Overall, the Saints placed in the top three in that category four times in Boudreau's seven seasons. In those seven years, New Orleans allowed a total of only 167 sacks (23.9 per season), third lowest in the NFL. In 1992, they surrendered a league-low 15 sacks.

A move to Detroit in 1994 resulted in more success, as the Lions led the NFL

in total offense in 1995, and running back Barry Sanders attained the 1,500-yard rushing plateau in all three of Boudreau's seasons. During Boudreau's stay in Detroit, offensive tackle Lomas Brown and center Kevin Glover were Pro Bowl selections. Boudreau moved to New England in 1997 and coached two seasons with the Patriots. In his first season, he helped the Patriots win their second consecutive division title, a first in franchise history. His offensive line allowed just 30 sacks and ranked fourth in the NFL in sacks allowed per pass attempt (18.7 pass plays/sack). As coach of Miami's offensive line (1999-2000), he developed a unit that paved the way for Lamar Smith to rush for 1,139 yards, giving the Dolphins their first 1,000-yard rusher since 1996, and surrendered just 28 sacks, tied for the fourth-lowest total in the NFL.

Prior to entering the NFL, Boudreau was the offensive line coach for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League from 1983 to '86. As a college coach, he worked at Boston College, Maine, Dartmouth, and Navy. He also spent a season coaching at Oxford (Mass.) High.

Boudreau was born December 30, 1949 in Arlington, Mass. He was a letterman in both football and baseball at Boston College (1971-73). He and his wife, Joan, have a son, Paul (6/2/75), and a daughter, Jill (9/22/77). Paul is an assistant football coach at Brown University. He has a step-granddaughter Kalyn and grandson Zach.

ASSISTANT STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Les Ebert enters his first season as Jacksonville's assistant strength and conditioning coach. Ebert is responsible for assisting strength and conditioning coach Mark Asanovich in all areas of the club's strength and conditioning program, which emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts.

Ebert spent last season as a part-time assistant strength and conditioning coach in Jacksonville. He, along with Asanovich, helped strengthen the Jaguars' offensive and defensive lines that proved to be the anchor of the Jaguars. The offensive line allowed the fewest sacks in team history and the defense ranked second in the league in run defense.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, Ebert spent three seasons from 1999 to 2001 as the assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

In his three seasons in Tampa Bay, Ebert helped establish arguably one of the fittest squads in the NFL. During his three year span, the Buccaneers sent 21 players to the Pro Bowl including Warren Sapp,

Derrick Brooks, John Lynch and Mike Alstott, who made three consecutive trips each. Each year the team got stronger as the year progressed. In the final nine games of the regular season from 1999 to 2001 the teams' record was 8-1, 7-2, and 6-3. Those finishes led to three consecutive playoff appearances.

Ebert was strength and conditioning coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School in 1998. In 1997, Ebert served as the Buccaneers' season long strength and conditioning intern.

Ebert earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Minnesota-Duluth and a master's degree in physical education from Emporia State University (Kan.). Ebert is a certified member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

Ebert played center and defensive end at Centennial (Minn.) High School. He and his wife, Rebecca, reside in Orange Park.

MIKE HALUCHAK **LINEBACKERS COACH**

NFL: 19TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Mike Haluchak's second season in Jacksonville will be an intriguing one. He returns starting linebackers Mike Peterson and Akin Ayodele, who started every game in 2003, but new to his squad will be top draft picks Daryl Smith and Jorge Cordova, as well as free agents Greg Favors and Tommy Hendricks. His job will be to mold this young, talented group into a highly productive unit.

Haluchak, 54, joined the Jaguars from the St. Louis Rams, where he coached for three seasons, including an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVI. He guided Rams' second-round draft choice Tommy Polley to the All-Rookie team in 2000. In addition, he has coached players to six Pro Bowls: Jessie Armstead (1997-99), Ken Harvey (1995-96), and Junior Seau (1991). Haluchak began his NFL coaching career with the San Diego Chargers in 1986, staying there six seasons. He has also coached with the Cincinnati Bengals (1992-93), Washington Redskins (1994-96) and New York Giants (1997-99).

Haluchak was a starting linebacker and safety at Southern California during one of the most memorable periods in the storied history of USC football. He played in the 1969 and 1970 Rose Bowl games against Ohio State and Michigan.

He was a high school coach in Southern California from 1972 to '75 and entered the collegiate ranks as a graduate assistant at USC (1976-77). He moved to Cal State-Fullerton in 1978 as defensive backfield coach. Haluchak's first tour as a linebackers coach was at Pacific in 1979 and '80. He coached at California (1981), North Carolina State (1982) and then coached three seasons with the Oakland Invaders of the USFL (1983-85).

Haluchak was born November 28, 1949 in Concord, Calif. He holds a degree in history from Southern California and a master's degree in secondary education from California Lutheran. Haluchak and his wife, Carol, live in Ponte Vedra Beach.

RAY HAMILTON **DEFENSIVE LINE COACH**

NFL: 27TH SEASON
JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON

Under Ray Hamilton the Jaguars defensive line was a stalwart in the NFL in stopping the run. Fifteen starting backs failed to rush for 100 yards against the Jaguars second-ranked run defense. DT Marcus Stroud was named to his first Pro Bowl under Hamilton and the Jaguars return the entire starting line with Stroud and John Henderson inside and veterans Hugh Douglas and Tony Brackens at end.

A longtime NFL veteran who played nine years for the New England Patriots and coached 16 years in the NFL before coming to Jacksonville in 2003, Hamilton is the team's first defensive line coach who played in the NFL. Hamilton joined the Jaguars after coaching the defensive line for the Cleveland Browns for two seasons. In his first season in Cleveland, the Browns tied for fourth in the AFC with 43 sacks. He spent three seasons as the New England Patriots' defensive line coach (1997-99), and then joined the Jets for the 2000 season. His 1998 defensive line tallied 25 of the team's 36 sacks, the seventh best total in the NFL, and New England's 1997 defense registered 45 sacks.

Hamilton, 53, served a prior stint as defensive line coach with the Jets (1995-96), where he was instrumental in the development of defensive end Hugh Douglas, who was named the 1995 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Hamilton spent the 1993 and '94 seasons as defensive line coach for the Los Angeles Raiders, where he helped develop Chester McGlockton and the front line of a defense that combined for 83 sacks in his two seasons with the Raiders. In 1992, Hamilton was the defensive line coach at the University of Tennessee, following stints as defensive line coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1991) and head coach of the Bay State Titans (1990), a semipro team that featured defensive tackle Eric Swann, the sixth overall choice in the 1991 NFL draft.

Hamilton began his coaching career in 1985, spending five seasons as an assistant defensive line coach with New England. He helped the Patriots to their first AFC Championship title and a Super Bowl XX appearance in his first season as a New England coach.

Hamilton was a 14th-round draft choice by the Patriots and a fixture on New England's defensive line from 1973 to '81. He established a Patriots rookie record with seven sacks while starting every game in his first season. Known affectionately as "Sugar Bear" during his playing career, he went on to start a team-record 110 consecutive games and currently ranks fifth on the Patriots' all-time sack list with 54. He played in 132 games in nine seasons.

Hamilton was born January 20, 1951 in Omaha, Neb. He graduated from Oklahoma with a degree in business. He was named All-Conference as a defensive tackle as a senior in 1972. Hamilton received a master's degree in public administration in 1977 from Suffolk University while playing for the Patriots.

He has two sons: Kadar (8/24/76) and Damon (6/5/79). Kadar graduated from Stanford on a football scholarship, attended two NFL training camps (St. Louis and New England) and played in NFL Europe; Damon graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. Hamilton lives in St. Augustine.

Former NFL player and collegiate coach Andy Heck joined the Jaguars coaching staff on February 9, 2004 as the offensive assistant/assistant offensive line coach. He will assist the offensive coaching staff in all aspects of game preparation, and he will assist Paul Boudreau in coaching the offensive line.

Heck, 37, is a former long-time NFL standout. He recently completed his third season at the University of Virginia, the final year as tight ends coach. He served the previous two seasons as a graduate assistant coach, working with the tight ends.

Heck worked with freshman All-American Heath Miller, who set the ACC touchdown record for a tight end with nine, and in his sophomore season Miller led the team in receiving with 70 catches for 835 yards and six touchdowns en route to first-team All-ACC honors.

Prior to joining the Virginia staff, Heck played in the NFL for 12 seasons as a standout offensive lineman. He finished his playing career with the Washington Redskins, where he played for two seasons. As the starting left tackle in 1999, he blocked for an offense that ranked second in the NFL. From 1994 to 1998, he was a five-year starter for the Chicago

Bears. In 1995, he gave up no sacks as part of an offensive line that yielded the fewest sacks in the NFL.

Heck was drafted in the first round (15th overall) by the Seattle Seahawks, where he was a unanimous All-Rookie selection in 1989. A five-year starter with the Seahawks, he played three seasons without missing a snap.

Heck's fifth grade teacher, Marylou Winkler of Annandale, Va., was named NFL Teacher of the Year in January of 1994, after being nominated by Heck. She received \$5,000 from the NFL and the school received a \$10,000 scholarship in both their names.

A 1989 graduate of Notre Dame, Heck received a bachelor's degree in American studies. A first-team All-American, he co-captained the 1988 national championship team, that finished 12-0. Heck started at tight end for the first three seasons at Notre Dame before moving to tackle in spring drills in his senior season.

Todd Howard enters his second season with the Jaguars as the Jaguars' defensive assistant. He also helps coach the defensive line with line coach Ray Hamilton.

Howard, 39, has 10 years of experience coaching in college and three in the NFL, in addition to having played in the NFL for three seasons. He spent three seasons as the linebackers coach at Louisiana Tech, following two years (1998-1999) as a defensive assistant with the St. Louis Rams, who won the Super Bowl in Howard's second season. Bob Ligashesky was hired by the Jaguars on February 9, 2004 as the team's assistant special teams coach under new coordinator Pete Rodriguez. Although this is Ligashesky's first season in the NFL, he brings 19 years of experience at the collegiate level coaching tight ends, linebackers and special teams. He served as assistant head coach in his final season at Bowling Green.

Ligashesky, 42, just finished his fourth season at the University of Pittsburgh, where he served as tight ends coach and special teams coordinator. The tight ends thrived under Ligashesky's guidance. Senior Kris Wilson averaged 14.6 yards per catch in 2003 and finished second on the team in receptions behind Larry Fitzgerald with 44 catches for 643 yards and nine touchdowns. He was a finalist for the 2003 John Mackey Award. Punter Andy Lee finished his career as two-time Big East Co-Special Teams Player of the Year.

Ligashesky joined Pittsburgh after serving the previous nine years (1991-99) at Bowling Green, where he coached the linebackers and special teams. During Ligashesky's Bowling Green tenure, the Falcons captured two Mid-

American Conference championships (1991 and 1992) and earned a pair of bowl berths. He was promoted to assistant head coach prior to the 1999 season.

Prior to Bowling Green, Ligashesky coached the outside linebackers and worked with the special teams at Kent State for two years (1989-90). ANTHONY LYNN **RUNNING BACKS COACH**

The Jaguars running backs excelled in 2003 under the tutelage of coach Anthony Lynn. Fred Taylor rushed for a career and team-record 1,572 yards. Each of his three backs, Taylor, Chris Fuamatu-Ma'afala and LaBrandon Toefield, averaged more than four yards per carry. Fullback Marc Edwards added 239 yards and a score. In 2004 Lynn's stable of backs only improved with the addition of rookie Greg Jones, who was drafted in the second round.

Lynn is only the second running backs coach in Jaguars history. When he arrived he brought to Jacksonville 10 years of experience in the NFL — seven as a player and three as a coach.

Lynn, 35, spent three seasons (2000-02) as an offensive assistant and assistant special teams coach with the Denver Broncos. He joined the Broncos' staff in August 2000 after his playing career was cut short because of repeated occurrences of neck stingers.

Lynn was one of the NFL's top special teams players during his six-year career as a running back with the Denver Broncos and San Francisco 49ers. He entered the NFL as an undrafted rookie with the New York Giants in 1992 and made his first NFL roster with the Broncos in 1993. He was on

the injured reserve in 1994, then played for the San Francisco 49ers in 1995 and '96. He re-joined the Broncos in 1997 for his final three seasons before turning to coaching. Lynn was a member of the Broncos' back-to-back Super Bowl champions in 1997 and '98. During his playing career, Lynn appeared in 83 games and made one start, rushing 28 times for 177 yards and catching three passes for 35 yards. He also recorded one forced fumble and one fumble recovery on special teams. Lynn also played in nine postseason games and made six special teams tackles with one forced fumble.

Lynn was standout at Texas Tech, rushing for 1,911 yards and 17 touchdowns on 481 carries in his career. He earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a junior, when he ran for 884 yards and eight touchdowns on 224 carries. He graduated with a degree in exercise sports science in 1992. A native of Celina, Texas, Lynn was born December 21, 1968 in McKinney, Texas. He and his wife, Cynda, have two children, D'Anton (10/24/89) and Danielle (12/31/93). They live in Jacksonville.

ALVIN REYNOLDS **DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH**

Alvin Reynolds begins his second season as the Jaguars defensive backs coach and will have the most new players of any position on the team. Highly touted free agents Deon Grant, Juran Bolden and Dewayne Washington are some of the new players in this revamped secondary, along with last year's starters Donovan Darius, this year's franchise player, Deke Cooper and Rashean Mathis, who as a rookie started games at safety and cornerback.

Reynolds has over a decade of NFL coaching experience, developing his craft in Denver, Baltimore and Carolina under such coaches as Mike Shanahan, Ted Marchibroda, George Seifert and John Fox.

Reynolds, 44, was hired by the Jaguars as the defensive backs coach in 2003 after spending four seasons (1999-2002) as a defensive assistant with the Panthers. He was in Baltimore for the first three seasons of the Ravens franchise (1996-1998), serving as secondary coach. He began his coaching career as a defensive assistant in Denver, spending three seasons with the Broncos (1993-95). During his career, Reynolds has worked with some of the top defensive backs in the NFL, including safeties Steve Atwater and Dennis Smith in Denver and Rod Woodson in Baltimore. In Carolina, he worked with then-defensive coordinator Jack Del Rio, helping with tape breakdown, game plan preparation and statistical tendencies. He also assisted with the Panthers' secondary. Reynolds began his coaching career at his alma mater, Indiana State, in 1982 as a graduate assistant. He was named the team's secondary coach in 1983, and in

1990 became assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator, in addition to serving as secondary coach. He coached two All-America players, including former NFL star Vencie Glenn.

As a player at Indiana State (1978-81), Reynolds starred at strong safety and received two votes for the Heisman Trophy as a senior. His four-year career statistics included 225 tackles, 21 passes defended, five fumble recoveries and five interceptions. In addition to his football accomplishments, Reynolds was president of the University Club and served as a member of several groups, including the President's Committee on Ethnic Diversity, the Indiana Black Expo, the Charles T. Hyde University Center and the Minority Students Retention Program Committee. While in Denver, he was active in 100 Black Men of America, which emphasizes education and job training. Reynolds was born June 24, 1959, in Pineville, La. He attended West Jefferson High School in Harvey, La., and was an All-America football player and two-time Most Valuable Player on the track team. He received a degree in business management from Indiana State in 1982 and a master's degree in political science from the school in 1990. Reynolds and his wife, Carla Antonia, reside in St. Augustine with son Alvin Jr. (9/2/85) and daughter Ana Gabriella Naomi (6/12/02).

ALFREDO ROBERTS **TIGHT ENDS COACH**

NFL: 7TH SEASON

Tight ends coach Alfredo Roberts was considered one of the best blocking tight ends in the NFL during his six-year career with the Kansas City Chiefs and Dallas Cowboys. He now enters his second season as the Jaguars tight ends coach. Roberts was a member of two Super Bowl championship teams in Dallas and two NCAA national championship teams in college at Miami (Fla.).

Roberts, 39, coached at Florida Atlantic University under Howard Schnellenberger from 1999 through 2002 prior to joining the Jaguars staff. He was part of the first group of coaches hired for the Boca Raton school's inaugural football team and was instrumental in the first class of recruits. He coached the school's receivers in 2001 and '02.

Roberts was recognized as one of the NFL's top blocking tight ends and was a key figure in Emmitt Smith's rise to the NFL rushing title in 1991. Originally selected in the eighth round of the 1988 draft by Kansas City, he played for the Chiefs for three seasons, blocking for All-Pro running back Christian Okoye. He joined Dallas in 1991 and was a member of the Cowboys' two Super Bowl champion

teams under Jimmy Johnson in 1992 and '93. He played in all 16 games for five straight seasons, catching 48 passes and scoring two touchdowns, though he was noted more for his blocking prowess. His career ended following a foot injury in 1993.

Roberts was also a member of two national championship teams at Miami (Fla.), in 1983 under Schnellenberger, which was the school's first championship, and again in 1987 under Johnson. He was on five bowl teams (two Orange, two Fiesta and one Sugar). Roberts graduated with a degree in criminal justice. After ending his NFL career in 1994, Roberts was part owner of a Dallas restaurant until starting his coaching career in 1999. Born March 17, 1965 in Fort Lauderdale, Roberts attended South Plantation High, where he was second-team All-State in both football and baseball. He and his wife, Angel, have three children: twin sons Avery and Austin (12/3/95) and daughter Alyssa (6/10/00). They live in Jacksonville.

Charles Bailey brought 23 years of scouting and front office experience with him when he was named the Jaguars' director of pro personnel on May 13, 2003. After a promising start in 2003 when Bailey and his staff brought in various free agents including Mike Peterson, Marc Edwards, and Troy Edwards, he continues building the Jaguars in 2004. His eight unrestricted free agents signees this offseason include Deon Grant and Greg Favors who started in the Super Bowl last season for the Carolina Panthers.

Bailey is responsible for overseeing the scouting and evaluation of all pro personnel, as well as advance scouting. He spent 14 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers and New Orleans Saints, helping both of those teams to several playoff appearances.

Bailey was the Saints' assistant general manager of football operations from 1999 to 2001, and spent the 2002 season as the organization's director of community affairs/assistant director of government affairs. As the Saints' assistant gen-

eral manager, Bailey was responsible for scouting and evaluating talent on the Saints and around the NFL, as well as college scouting and other administrative duties. He also served as a member of the executive board for the 2002 Super Bowl Host Committee in New Orleans.

Bailey was with the Steelers from 1989 to '99 and was an integral part of the club's Super Bowl XXX appearance after the 1995 season. In his 10 years with the Steelers, he served three years in college scouting and seven years as the club's pro personnel coordinator. Bailey joined the Steelers following eight years of scouting with National Football Scouting, Inc. (1981-88). A native of Winston-Salem, N.C., Bailey spent six years on the coaching staff at Winston-Salem State (1975-1980). GENE SMITH **DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING**

After six years as a Jaguars college scout, Gene Smith was promoted to director of college scouting in 2000, and he has guided the team's NFL draft for the last four years. His responsibilities include the scouting and evaluation of hundreds of college players on an annual basis, as well as directing a staff of seven college scouts. Smith will also have some additional pro personnel responsibilities, including the evaluation of selected unrestricted free agents.

Smith is one of 18 staff members celebrating their 10th anniversary with the Jaguars this year.

Smith was previously the team's college scout responsible for the southeast United States. He joined the Jaguars on May 1, 1994 and was originally the team's scouting representative for the northeast with the BLESTO scouting combine, which he joined in February 1994. He was the southeast regional scout for BLESTO in 1995 before becoming solely the southeast regional scout for the Jaguars.

Smith had previously been an assistant coach at the college level for eight years. He worked at Edinboro University from 1989 to 1994, serving as an assistant coach, recruiting coordinator, and strength and conditioning coordinator. From 1986 to '88 Smith worked at Ohio University, where he began his college coaching career as a graduate assistant and later served as an assistant coach.

Smith graduated from Heidelberg University, serving as captain of the football team while playing as a defensive lineman. Jaguars since 1997. A former wide receiver for the Seattle Seahawks



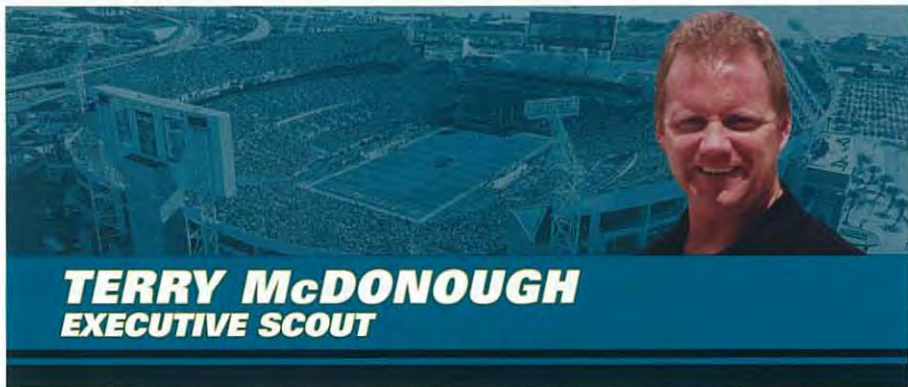

McDonough joined the Jaguars from the Baltimore Ravens, for whom he scouted the eastern half of the country for the previous three years as the Ravens' eastern college supervisor. He also helped evaluate free agent prospects for the pro personnel department during the free agency period, working with James Harris.

A Boston native, McDonough began his NFL scouting career with an internship with the San Francisco 49ers in 1989. Following his graduation from Massachusetts with a sports management degree, he was named player personnel director of the Barcelona Dragons

of the World League in 1990. While with the Dragons (1990-92), McDonough handled a variety of personnel assignments, serving as West Coast scout for the league and helping each team prepare for the WFL drafts. McDonough toured both NFL and CFL training camps to grade potential WFL players. The 1991 Barcelona team finished with a 9-3 record, losing the league title to London in the World Bowl. Before joining the Jaguars, Minge spent 11 years as a college assistant coach and then 10 years as a recruiting coordinator. His college coaching career began in 1973 as defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach at St. Joseph College (Ind.), where he had been a three-year varsity letterman as a defensive

back. He was a graduate assistant at Western Michigan from 1974 to '75, then served as defensive coordinator at Loyola Academy in 1976 before returning to Western Michigan as an assistant coach from 1977 to '81. WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2004

- The Jaguars to have a winning season again for the fifth time in 10 years in the NFL.
- Fred Taylor to have his third consecutive 1,000 yard season and fifth in his seven seasons in the NFL. With 2,121 all-purpose yards in 2004, Taylor would surpass 10,000 career all-purpose yards and would be the second Jaguars player to do so. He enters 2004 with 7,879 yards.
- Jimmy Smith to have his eighth 1,000 yard season of his career. Smith currently ranks 17th all-time with 718 career receptions and 18th all-time with 10,092 receiving yards. Smith averages 87 catches for 1,225 yards a season since 1996, at that pace, he will enter the top 10 in all-time receptions and top 12 in receiving yards.
- If Dewayne Washington intercepts one pass, he will extend his streak of having at least one interception in each of his 10 NFL seasons. Washington can also extend his active streak of 128 straight games played since 1996.
- Tony Brackens to lead the Jaguars in sacks for the fifth time in six years.
- Donovan Darius to lead the secondary in tackles for the seventh consecutive season and to have over 100 tackles for the sixth time in seven seasons.
- Marc Edwards to extend his streak of playing in 112 straight games since entering the NFL in 1997.
- Brad Meester to extend his team record of starting all 64 career games since being drafted in 2000.
- Mike Peterson to lead his team in tackles for the third consecutive season and to surpass 100 tackles for the fifth time in sixth seasons in the NFL. With two or more interceptions, Peterson will have at least two interceptions in five consecutive seasons.
- Marcus Stroud to surpass 100 tackles for the second consecutive season and return to the Pro Bowl for a second straight year.
- Hugh Douglas to surpass 90 sacks for his career and return to the Pro Bowl for the fourth time in five years. He enters 2004 with 77 career sacks and has averaged over 10 sacks a year for the past four seasons.

... Became only the second player in NFL history to lead the league in receiving the same year that his team led the league in rushing (only other player was San Francisco's Billy Wilson in 1954) ... Marked only the 23rd time in NFL history a player had 100 receptions in a season (was the 19th player) ... Had game of his career in 2000 at Baltimore, when he caught 15 passes for 291 yards and three touchdowns. Reception total is tied for seventh most in NFL history, and yardage total is the fifth highest ... From 1996 to 2001, the Smith-Keenan McCardell tandem combined for 1,061 receptions, more than any other duo over any six-year span in NFL history ... Smith and McCardell were also only the second tandem in NFL history in which each player had 1,000 yards receiving in the same season four times, tying the NFL record held by Minnesota's Jake Reed and Cris Carter ... Also became the eighth tandem in NFL history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons (1996 and '97, then again in 2000 and 2001) ... 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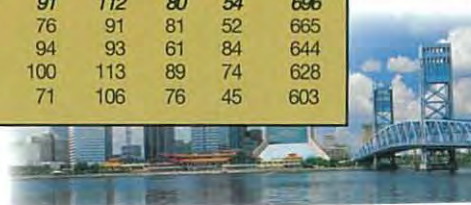

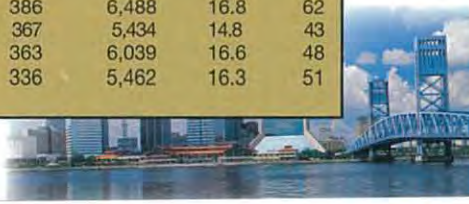

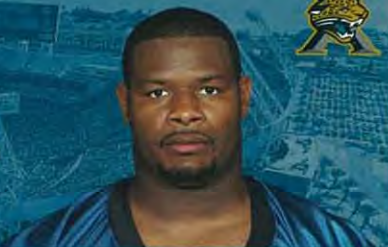

not play in the second half ... Inactive next two games (Oct. 11 at N.Y. Jets and Oct. 17 vs. Cleveland) ... 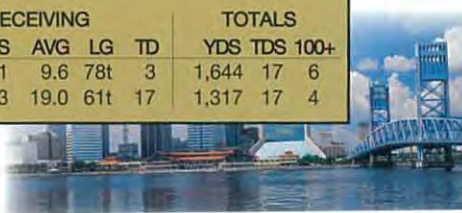

Chargers' Paul Lowe (1/1/61 vs. Houston). With 33 carries broke Means' team postseason record of 31 on 12/28/96 at Buffalo and topped Taylor's regular-season mark of 32 carries on 12/6/98 vs. Detroit. Named NFL Offensive Player of the Week for the Wild-Card weekend, becoming the first rookie to win the award ... Limited by New York Jets defense to 86 yards on 20 carries in the Jan. 10 Divisional Playoff game ... His 248 rushing yards in two postseason games moved him to fifth in NFL history for rushing yards by a rookie in postseason behind Washington's Timmy Smith (342 in 1987), Dallas' Duane Thomas (313 in 1970), Cincinnati's Ickey Woods (307 in 1988) and Houston's Earl Campbell (264 in 1978) ... Drafted ninth overall and second running back picked after Curtis Enis ... Selected

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1989

Aug. 17 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, a partnership to lead the community effort to win an NFL franchise is formed. The group, led by Tom Petway, includes Jeb Bush, Hamilton Jordan, and Arthur "Chick" Sherrer.

1990

April 4 — National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue announces that the League will expand by two teams no later than the 1993 season.

July 26 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1993 season.

1991

Feb. 12 — In a unanimous vote, the Jacksonville City Council votes to commit \$60 million to renovate the Gator Bowl, contingent upon the City being awarded an expansion football team.

May 15 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1994 season, contrary to the July 26, 1990 vote.

May 22 — At the owners' meeting in Minneapolis, a plan is approved that will add two expansion teams to the League for the 1994 season.

May 30 — Florida Governor Lawton Chiles signs into law the Professional Sports Facilities Program, a state statute that provides state funding of up to \$2 million for 30 years for funding new sports facilities that operate in the state of Florida.

June 25 — The lease that includes the recently approved \$60 million package to renovate the Gator Bowl is approved by City Council.

July 17 — The NFL announces that it will accept applications for expansion teams.

Sept. 16 — The City of Jacksonville files an expansion application with the League, one of 11 cities to apply.

Oct. 1 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. submits its ownership application to the League. The nine-member partnership includes local businessman and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. general partner Tom Petway. J. Wayne Weaver is one of the eight limited partners, along with Jeb Bush, Lawrence DuBow, Earl Hadlow, Preston Haskell, Sandy McArthur, Charles

Towers and Ron Weaver.

Oct. 24 — David Seldin is named president and chief operating officer of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

Dec. 6 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. announces that the team name will be the Jacksonville Jaguars if an expansion team is awarded.

Dec. 10 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. and City officials make the group's first presentation to commissioner Tagliabue and other NFL officials in New York.

1992

March 17 — At the League's annual winter meeting in Phoenix, the list of expansion candidate cities is cut from 11 to seven. Jacksonville is one of the seven; Nashville, San Antonio, Raleigh-Durham, and Honolulu are eliminated.

May 19 — The five finalists in the expansion race are named: Jacksonville, Charlotte, Baltimore, Memphis, St. Louis. Sacramento and Oakland are eliminated.

Oct. 20 — Citing complications surrounding the ongoing labor situation, the NFL votes to delay the expansion announcement to its 1993 fall meeting in Chicago and for expansion teams to begin play in 1995.

1993

Jan. 6 — A seven-year Collective Bargaining Agreement is reached between the League and its players. With the labor situation resolved, a new expansion timetable is expected in March.

March 18 — J. Wayne Weaver is introduced as managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

March 23 — The expansion race is officially resumed by the NFL.

April 12 — After a tour with Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. representatives, NFL officials indicate that additional renovations beyond those already planned would be necessary to renovate the Gator Bowl to NFL standards.

June 25 — Negotiations for a new lease between Jacksonville Mayor Ed Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. break down.

July 1 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. resume negotiations and agree on a plan that caps stadium renovation costs at \$112 million and protects the city from cost overruns. Mayor Austin sends the lease to City Council for approval.

July 21 — The Jacksonville City Council fails to approve the newly negotiated \$112 million stadium proposal. As a result, Weaver announces that Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. is ending its bid for an NFL expansion franchise.





July 22 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. closes offices and club seat and executive suite deposits are returned.

Aug. 20 — The *Florida Times-Union* reports that negotiations between Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. and the City have resumed, encouraged by the NFL and at the request of Times-Union publisher Carl Cannon and Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert.

Aug. 21 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville! reach an agreement on a new stadium lease capping stadium renovation costs at \$121 million, \$53 million to come from City funds and \$68 million from team and team related sources. As project manager, Touchdown Jacksonville! assumes responsibility for any cost overruns.

Aug. 22 — Facing the challenge of selling 9,000 club seats, a committee of civic and business leaders is formed called NFL Now!, headed by Carl Cannon and Adam Herbert.

Aug. 23 — The City Council votes 14-4 to approve the new lease.

Aug. 24 — With the new public/private partnership, Weaver and Mayor Austin meet with commissioner Tagliabue, who welcomes Jacksonville back into the expansion race.

Aug. 25 — NFL Now! begins a 10-day drive to sell the required club seats.

Aug. 26 — Former Kansas City Chiefs defensive back Deron Cherry joins Touchdown Jacksonville! as the ninth member of the ownership group.

Sept. 3 — Carl Cannon of NFL Now! announces that 9,737 club seats have been sold, a number that rises to 10,112 once all the applications are processed.

Sept. 21 — Weaver and other Touchdown Jacksonville! officials make their presentation to the NFL finance and expansion committees.

Oct. 26 — In Chicago, League owners select the Carolina Panthers for an expansion team but delay the announcement of the second expansion city.

Nov. 30 (4:12 p.m. ET) — In Chicago, Jacksonville is awarded the 30th franchise in the National Football League.

Dec. 1 — A victory celebration in the Gator Bowl, as 25,000 Jaguars fans battle cold and rain to welcome Wayne Weaver, Jaguars officials, city officials and community leaders upon their return from Chicago.

1994

Jan. 3 — Demolition of the Gator Bowl begins.

Jan. 6 — The Jaguars announce a season ticket sellout for their first three seasons. Over 56,000 season tickets are sold through Dec. 31, just one month after the awarding of the team.

Feb. 21 — Tom Coughlin is hired as head coach of the Jaguars. The former Boston College head coach and assistant with the

New York Giants brings six of his assistants with him.

Aug. 24 — The Jaguars announce that they will hold their first training camp in 1995 at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

Sept. 14 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Inc. is established, under the direction of Delores Barr Weaver and Dr. Gregory S. Gross.

Sept. 28 — The NFL announces specific plans to stock the expansion teams.

Nov. 1 — The Jaguars hold their first official workout at Bishop Kenny High School. Thirteen offensive linemen work out in front of 1,500 fans.

Nov. 2 — The NFL announces its plans for division alignment, putting the Jaguars in the AFC Central Division along with the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, Houston Oilers and Pittsburgh Steelers. The Carolina Panthers will join the NFC West Division.

Dec. 15 — The Jaguars sign the first 10 players in team history: WR Shannon Baker, LB Hillary Butler, DE Ferric Collons, OL Greg Huntington, RB Randy Jordan, DE Ernie Logan, OT Rickie Shaw, DE Jason Simmons, DE Ricky Sutton, DE Chris Williams.

1995

Jan. 12 — Dick Jauron is hired as defensive coordinator. Jauron had spent nine years with the Green Bay Packers as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

Jan. 14 — Kevin Gilbride is introduced as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He had previously been the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers.

Jan. 20 — The Jaguars unveil their new logo and team uniform.

Jan. 21 — Larry Pasquale is hired as the team's special teams coordinator.

Feb. 14 — The Jaguars draft 31 players in the expansion draft. The first player selected is Arizona quarterback Steve Beuerlein. During the draft, the Jaguars acquire such veteran players as Desmond Howard, Keith Goganious, Darren Carrington, Reggie Cobb, Eugene Chung and Derek Brown.

Feb. 28 — The Jaguars sign their first unrestricted free agents: guard Shawn Bouwens and defensive linemen Joel Smeenge and Don Davey. Within 15 days, six more unrestricted free-agents are signed: cornerback Vinnie Clark, punter Bryan Barker, cornerback Mickey Washington, defensive tackle Kelvin Pritchett, defensive end Jeff Lageman and center Dave Widell.

March 23 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation awards its first grants to eight local organizations totaling \$139,850.

April 21 — The first trade in Jaguars history: Jacksonville acquires quarterback Mark





Brunell from the Green Bay Packers in exchange for draft picks in the third and fifth rounds of the 1995 draft.

April 22 — Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli becomes the Jaguars' first-ever selection in the college draft, the second overall pick. Later in the first round, running back James Stewart is chosen 19th overall after the Jaguars traded up in the round. The Jaguars select a total of 10 players during the two-day draft.

April 28-30 — The first minicamp is held on the practice fields adjacent to the new stadium.

June 1 — The Jaguars sign their entire first class of draft choices at the same time, an event unprecedented in NFL history.

June 2-8 — The second minicamp is held, with one practice session being conducted in front of 2,500 fans at Bishop Kenny High School.

June 10 — "The Roar of the Jaguars," the team's cheerleader squad, is introduced at The Landing in downtown Jacksonville. The squad includes 36 cheerleaders.

July 8 — The Jaguars' first-ever training camp opens at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

July 29 — The Jaguars play their first pre-season contest in the Pro Football Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, but lose to the Carolina Panthers 20-14 when a last-minute drive ends at the Panthers' two-yard line.

Aug. 18 — Jacksonville Municipal Stadium opens, as the Jaguars host their first home pre-season game. However, they lose to the St. Louis Rams 27-10.

Sept. 3 — The Jaguars play their inaugural game in front of 72,363 fans but lose to the Houston Oilers 10-3.

Oct. 1 — The Jaguars get their first win 17-16 at Houston in the fifth week of the regular season — the third-fastest first victory in NFL expansion history and the fastest to earn a win on the road.

Oct. 8 — The Jaguars defeat AFC Central rival Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 for their first home victory, the only time in NFL history an expansion team has ever defeated a team that would go on to play in the Super Bowl the same season.

Dec. 3 — Jaguars wide receiver Jimmy Smith scores a team-record three touchdowns three different ways at Denver — on a blocked punt, off a lateral on a kickoff return and on a pass reception — an extreme rarity in NFL history.

Dec. 24 — The Jaguars break the previous record for victories by an expansion team with a last-second 24-21 win over Cleveland in the Browns' final game before a three-year absence.

1996

Feb. 18 — Pittsburgh Steelers offensive tackle Leon Searcy becomes the first unrestricted free agent to sign with the Jaguars in 1996.

March 1 — Free agent Eddie Robinson signs from Houston, bolstering a young linebacker corps.

March 2 — Keenan McCardell, Cleveland's leading wide receiver in 1995, signs a free agent contract with the Jaguars.

April 20 — Illinois outside linebacker Kevin Hardy is selected with the Jaguars' first pick in the 1996 college draft, the second overall player chosen. By the early third round, the Jaguars also draft defensive end Tony Brackens, center Michael Cheever and defensive back Aaron Beasley.

July 19 — The Jaguars open their second training camp, their first at Ferrell Fields at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. The practice fields were named in memory of Roger Ernest Ferrell Sr. in a morning dedication.

Sept. 1 — The Jaguars open their second season with a 24-9 victory over the defending AFC champion Pittsburgh Steelers. It marks the first game the Jacksonville defense does not allow a touchdown.

Sept. 22 — Mark Brunell throws for a team-record 432 yards and three touchdowns, but the Jaguars lose their first-ever overtime game 28-25 at New England.

Sept. 29 — In the first regular-season game between the two 1995 expansion teams, Jacksonville beats Carolina 24-14 as James Stewart runs for two TDs and the Jaguars rush for a team-record 179 yards.

Oct. 20 — Keenan McCardell catches 16 passes — tied for the third-highest total in pro football history — for a team-record 232 yards. However, despite breaking or tying 28 team records for single-game performances, the Jaguars lose at St. Louis 17-14.

Nov. 24 — The Jaguars win at Baltimore 30-27 for their first overtime victory on a 34-yard field goal by Mike Hollis.

Dec. 12 — Keenan McCardell becomes the first Jaguar voted to the Pro Bowl. Mark Brunell and Tony Boselli are later added as replacements, and Brunell goes on to win MVP honors in the Feb. 2 game in Honolulu.

Dec. 22 — The Jaguars clinch their first playoff berth in franchise history with a 19-17 victory over the Atlanta Falcons, as Morten Andersen's 30-yard field goal attempt goes wide left.

Dec. 28 — The first second-year expansion franchise in NFL history to play a postseason game, the Jaguars become the first team to defeat the Buffalo Bills in a playoff game in Rich Stadium. Natrone Means leads the way in the 30-27 victory by running for 175 yards.

1997

Jan. 4 — The Jaguars post the biggest upset





in the NFL since Joe Namath led the Jets to victory in Super Bowl III, as they stun the football world and the Denver Broncos with a 30-27 victory. After flying back to Jacksonville, the team finds 40,000 fans waiting for them at 1:30 a.m. in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

Jan. 12 — The Jaguars' Cinderella season ends short of the Super Bowl, as Jacksonville is defeated by the New England Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. Jaguars turnovers led to 17 of the Patriots' 20 points in a game played in a wind chill of 0 degrees.

Jan. 23 — David Seldin resigns as Jaguars president but remains as a partner.

Feb. 5 — Chris Palmer is named offensive coordinator, replacing Kevin Gilbride who had become head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

March 5 — The Jaguars sign their only 1997 unrestricted free agent, Pittsburgh cornerback Deon Figures.

April 18 — ALLTEL Stadium becomes the new name for Jacksonville Municipal Stadium in a sponsorship agreement with the information technology and communications provider.

April 19 — Jacksonville selects defensive tackle Renaldo Wynn of Notre Dame with the 21st pick of the first round of the NFL draft. In all, the Jaguars draft seven players.

Aug. 9 — Quarterback Mark Brunell suffers a knee injury in a preseason game against the New York Giants and misses the next four games, including the first two of the regular season.

Aug. 31 — In his first NFL start, Rob Johnson leads the Jaguars to a 28-27 victory at Baltimore in the season opener. Johnson displayed incredible courage in returning twice from a severe ankle sprain, setting a team record with 20 completions in 24 attempts (83.3 percent), 2 TD passes and a 25-yard TD rushing.

Sept. 7 — The Jaguars win their home opener 40-13 over the New York Giants as Steve Matthews makes his first NFL start for an injured Rob Johnson. The Jaguars started 2-0 for the first time in team history and set a franchise record with 40 points. It marked the first time in 30 years that a team won twice with two different quarterbacks making their first start in consecutive games.

Sept. 22 — Mark Brunell returns and leads the Jaguars to a 30-21 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their first appearance on "Monday Night Football." Brunell threw for 306 yards, but the victory wasn't clinched until the final play, when Clyde Simmons blocked a 40-yard game-winning field goal attempt and Chris Hudson returned the ball 58 yards for a touchdown as time expired.

Oct. 12 — James Stewart rushes for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the visiting Philadelphia Eagles. It marks only the fourth time in NFL history that a player scored five TDs rushing in a game and the first time since 1963, and Stewart became one of only 12 NFL players with five

or more touchdowns in one game.

Dec. 11 — Five Jaguars are named to the AFC squad for the Pro Bowl: Tony Boselli, Bryan Barker and Mike Hollis as starters, and Mark Brunell and Jimmy Smith as backups.

Dec. 14 — The Jaguars clinch a playoff berth for the second straight year after defeating the Bills 20-14 in Buffalo one week before the end of the regular season. Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith both went over the 1,000-yard mark, becoming the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

Dec. 21 — The Jaguars win their team-record 11th game of the season by defeating the Oakland Raiders. The victory gave the team a 4-4 mark on the road for the first time ever, and matched division-winner Pittsburgh's 11-5 record. It takes five tie-breaker steps to determine that the Steelers win the division.

Dec. 27 — The Jaguars' third season comes to an end in Denver, with the eventual Super Bowl-champion Broncos winning the Wild-Card playoff 42-17.

1998

Feb. 13 — Quarterback Rob Johnson is traded to the Buffalo Bills for the ninth pick in the first round and a fourth-round choice in the 1998 NFL draft.

Feb. 16 — The Jaguars sign Buffalo Bills linebacker Bryce Paup, an unrestricted free agent.

April 18-19 — The Jaguars draft 11 players, their most ever, in the NFL draft. Two players are selected in the first round: running back Fred Taylor from the University of Florida with the ninth pick; and safety Donovan Darius, from Syracuse, with the 25th choice.

May 12 — Rick Reiprish, who had been responsible for the Jaguars' first four successful drafts, is promoted to director of player personnel. Fran Foley is named director of pro scouting, and Rick Mueller is named director of college scouting.

Sept. 20 — Running back James Stewart is injured on the Jaguars' second play of the game and lost for the season. But first-round draft choice Fred Taylor takes over and runs 52 yards for a touchdown on his first carry. The Jaguars defeat the Baltimore Ravens 24-10 for their third win of the season.

Oct. 12 — The Jaguars post a franchise-best 5-0 start, beating the visiting Miami Dolphins 28-21 on "Monday Night Football" when Mark Brunell and Keenan McCardell hook up for two touchdown passes in the fourth quarter. Fred Taylor ran for a 77-yard TD on the game's first play from scrimmage.

Nov. 1 — The Jaguars explode for a team-record number of points in a 45-19 victory at Baltimore. Jacksonville scored six TDs in the





first half — the seventh most ever in a half in NFL history — as they jumped out to a 42-7 lead. Fred Taylor's 78-yard TD reception becomes the longest play from scrimmage in team history.

Dec. 13 — Mike Hollis becomes the most accurate field goal kicker in NFL history by making two attempts, giving him an 81.45 percentage in four seasons (101 of 124), dethroning Philadelphia's Chris Boniol.

Dec. 20 — The Jaguars clinch their first-ever AFC Central Division championship prior to kickoff of a Sunday night game at Minnesota, dethroning the Pittsburgh Steelers after a four-year run.

Dec. 28 — With a 21-3 victory over the Steelers on "Monday Night Football," the Jaguars win their 11th game for the second straight year and becomes the NFL's first expansion team to qualify for the playoffs three times in its first four seasons. Fred Taylor finishes the year with 17 touchdowns, tied for the third-most ever by a rookie in NFL history.

1999

Jan. 3 — In their first-ever home playoff game, the Jaguars defeat the New England Patriots 25-10. Mark Brunell returns after missing three games with an ankle injury to throw a TD pass and Mike Hollis kicks four field goals, as Jacksonville claims its first postseason win in two years.

Jan. 10 — The Jaguars' fourth season ends with a 34-24 loss to the New York Jets in the divisional playoffs.

Jan. 13 — Head coach Tom Coughlin is rewarded with a contract extension through the 2003 season.

Jan. 26 — Dom Capers, the former head coach of the Carolina Panthers, is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dick Jauron, who became head coach of the Chicago Bears.

Feb. 12 — On the first day of free agency, the Jaguars sign two unrestricted free agents: DT Gary Walker of the Tennessee Titans and S Carnell Lake of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Feb. 16 — The Jaguars sign TE Kyle Brady, a transition free agent from the New York Jets, to an offer sheet. The next day, the Jets decline to match the offer, making Brady a Jaguar.

April 24-25 — The Jaguars draft eight players in the NFL draft, including Fernando Bryant, a cornerback selected in the first round from Alabama.

Sept. 12 — The Jaguars open their fifth season with a 41-3 victory over the San Francisco 49ers at ALLTEL Stadium.

Nov. 7 — Jacksonville makes a team-record nine sacks and forces four turnovers in a 30-7 win at Atlanta.

Nov. 28 — The Jaguars score 23 points (three touchdowns, two two-point conversions) in the fourth quarter at Baltimore and leave with a 30-23 victory.

Dec. 11 — The Jaguars win their 11th consecutive game, setting a team record, as they defeat the Cleveland Browns 24-14.

2000

Jan. 2 — The Jaguars conclude the regular season with a 14-2 mark — the best record in the NFL — and head into the playoffs as the No. 1 seed in the AFC. Jimmy Smith catches 14 passes to finish the year with 116 receptions, the most in the league and the sixth-highest total in NFL history. The defense allows only 217 points, the 12th-fewest allowed since the 16-game schedule began in 1978.

Jan. 15 — The Jaguars trounce the Miami Dolphins 62-7 in the Divisional Playoffs in what would be the last game for Dan Marino and Jimmy Johnson. Jacksonville's 62 points and 55-point margin are the second most ever in NFL postseason history, and Fred Taylor's 90-yard run is the longest ever in an NFL playoff game.

Jan. 23 — Tennessee claims its third win of the season over the Jaguars in the AFC Championship game. Jacksonville led 14-10 at halftime before losing 33-14.

Feb. 10 — Tony Brackens is designated as a franchise player before the start of free agency.

Feb. 22 — Jacksonville signs middle linebacker Hardy Nickerson, an unrestricted free agent from the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

April 15-16 — The Jaguars select wide receiver R. Jay Soward from Southern California in the first round of the draft. Altogether, 11 players are drafted by Jacksonville.

Sept. 10 — Jimmy Smith catches 15 passes for 291 yards — the fifth-highest receiving total in NFL history in a game against the Baltimore Ravens, who would go on to win the Super Bowl and set an NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season.

Sept. 17 — The Jaguars win their home opener 13-0 over Cincinnati, the first shutout in team history.

Oct. 29 — The Jaguars defeat the Dallas Cowboys 23-17 in overtime on a 37-yard TD pass from Mark Brunell to Alvis Whitted to snap a five-game losing streak.

Nov. 1 — At their annual fall meeting in Atlanta, NFL owners award Super Bowl XXXIX to the city of Jacksonville. The game will be played at ALLTEL Stadium on February 6, 2005.

Nov. 19 — Fred Taylor rushes for 234 yards, setting a Jaguars record and at the time what was the 12th-most rushing yards in a game in NFL history (and the most ever at





Three Rivers Stadium), as the Jaguars beat the Steelers 34-24. Taylor scored four touchdowns in the game.

Nov. 26 — Jacksonville defeats Tennessee 16-13 on a last-second 38-yard field goal by Mike Hollis, ending a five-game losing streak to the Titans.

Dec. 3 — The Jaguars shut out the Browns 48-0 in the most dominating game in team history. Cleveland has only two first downs and 53 yards on offense. For the Jaguars, Fred Taylor runs for 181 yards and three TDs to pass the 1,000-yard rushing mark, Jimmy Smith surpasses 1,000 yards receiving for the fifth straight season and Mark Brunell reaches the 3,000-yard mark passing.

Dec. 17 — Fred Taylor rushes for more than 100 yards in his ninth consecutive game, tying Walter Payton for the third-longest streak in NFL history. However, the Jaguars lose on the road to the Bengals 17-14 after allowing 10 points in the final 1:15 of the game.

Dec. 23 — The Jaguars lose their season finale 28-25 to the Giants, finishing 7-9 and marking their first losing season since 1995.

2001

Jan. 12 — Bob Petrino, who had been the team's quarterbacks coach the previous two seasons, is promoted to offensive coordinator.

Feb. 6 — Gary Moeller is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dom Capers, who became head coach of the Houston Texans.

March 30 — The Jaguars sign quarterback Mark Brunell to a new four-year contract.

April 20-21 — The Jaguars select defensive tackle Marcus Stroud from Georgia in the first round of the draft. A total of 10 players are drafted by Jacksonville.

May 22 — NFL owners approve a realignment plan which will place the Jaguars into a new AFC South Division — along with the expansion Houston Texans, Indianapolis Colts and Tennessee Titans — beginning with the 2002 season.

Sept. 9 — The Jaguars win their sixth straight season opener, 21-3 over the Pittsburgh Steelers at ALLTEL Stadium. It is the second-longest active streak in the NFL.

Sept. 16 — The NFL postpones all games for the weekend due to the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington D.C.

Dec. 9 — The Jaguars win at Cincinnati, only their second victory in 11 games. Jimmy Smith surpasses 1,000 yards receiving for the sixth straight season, only the fifth player in NFL history to do so.

Dec. 16 — The Jaguars play their final AFC Central Division game, defeating the Cleveland Browns 15-10 in a game marred by bottle throwing in the final minutes. The Jaguars' intradivision record in the AFC Central closes out at 39-23.

Dec. 23 — The Jaguars defeat the Minnesota Vikings in the Metrodome, completing a sweep of three road victories in three consec-

utive weeks, a first in the NFL since 1997. Jimmy Smith gets his 100th reception of the season, making him one of only six players in NFL history to do so twice.

2002

Jan. 6 — The Jaguars complete their seventh season with a 6-10 record, losing six games in the final 5 minutes and 13 seconds.

Feb. 18 — OT Tony Boselli and DTs Gary Walker and Seth Payne are selected in the expansion draft by the Houston Texans.

April 20-21 — The Jaguars select nine players in the draft, including John Henderson, a defensive tackle from Tennessee in the first round.

June 13 — The Jaguars sign their sixth unrestricted free agent of the offseason, their most since 1995, including WRs Patrick Johnson and Bobby Shaw and G Chris Naeole. The team also signed veteran free agents DE Marco Coleman and TE Pete Mitchell and acquired MLB Wali Rainer in a draft day trade.

Oct. 6 — The Jaguars defeat the Philadelphia Eagles to finish the first month of the season with a 3-1 record and are one of the surprise teams in the NFL.

Nov. 17 — WR Jimmy Smith joins the NFL's top 20 leading all-time receivers. He would finish the season in 19th place among career receivers with 664 catches.

Dec. 29 — The Jaguars lose their season finale 20-13 in Indianapolis and finish their eighth season with a 6-10 record, their third consecutive losing season.

Dec. 30 — Wayne Weaver asks Tom Coughlin to step down as head coach, following eight seasons in which he led the team to a 68-60 record and four playoff appearances.

2003

Jan. 17 — Jack Del Rio is hired as the second head coach in franchise history. More than 2,200 fans cheer as Del Rio is introduced at ALLTEL Stadium.

Jan. 21 — The team's new coordinators are announced: Bill Musgrave (offense), Mike Smith (defense) and Bill Bates (special teams).

Jan. 23 — James Harris is hired as the vice president of player personnel, joining the team from the Baltimore Ravens, where he was the pro personnel director.

September 22, 1996 — at New England 28, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard receptions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led at the end of the first half 16-10, and built a 25-10 lead going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie Jackson six plays later, and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Ravens fumbled, and Jacksonville drove down the field, with Mike Hollis winning the game with a 34-yard field goal.

October 26, 1997 — at Pittsburgh 23, Jacksonville 17

The Jaguars took a 10-0 lead into the second half, but Pittsburgh came back to take a 14-10 lead in the fourth-quarter. After a Brunell TD pass to Pete Mitchell, the Jaguars took a 17-14 lead. The Steelers scored a 19-yard field goal at





the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

October 29, 2000 — Jacksonville 23, at Dallas 17

The Jaguars ended a five-game losing streak with a 23-17 overtime road victory over the Cowboys, with Alvis Whitted scoring on a 37-yard pass from Mark Brunell on the first series of overtime for his second touchdown of the game. Brunell threw for three TDs and tied a team record for passing accuracy, as he completed 20 of 24 passes. Kyle Brady caught 10 of those passes for 134 yards, both career highs, as he eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the second straight week.

Original Jaguars defensive end Jeff Lageman joined the Jaguars Radio Network team in 2003 and pairs with Brian Sexton on all Jaguars games. Lageman will handle color analysis on radio for his second year, while Sexton will continue calling play-by-play.

Sexton, 35, returns for his 10th season as the "Voice of the Jaguars." He has called every game in the Jaguars nine years and is one of just a handful of observers and the only media member who has witnessed every Jaguars game played. Sexton anchors the Jaguars Radio Network's coverage on Game Day and is also the host 'The Jaguars Reporters' on Mondays, 'The Jack Del Rio Show' on Tuesdays and 'Jaguars This Week' on Wednesdays on the Jaguars flagship radio station (690 WOKV). He also serves as the Jaguars lead TV personality hosting 'The Jack Del Rio Show' on Mondays, and 'THE Jaguars Show' and 'The Coggin Pre-game Show' on Sunday mornings prior to kickoff all on WTEV. Additionally he provides commentary and insight on jaguars.com. Sexton has broadcast NFL Europe games for FOX Sports the last two years including a game in May with Jaguars tight end Kyle Brady. In 2000 he was a contestant on the highly rated ABC-TV show 'Who Wants to Be A Millionaire?' walking away with \$32,000. In 2002 he was named one of the Jacksonville Business Journal's 'Forty Under Forty' as one of the community's up and coming young leaders. He has become an active and visible part of the Northeast Florida community as a speaker, volunteer and goodwill ambassador. He serves on the Boards of Directors for the United Way of Northeast Florida, The Ronald McDonald House, Daniel Grove

House of Jacksonville. In 2004-05, he'll serve as the Leadership Giving Chairman on the United Way's Campaign Cabinet. An Eagle Scout, he's also active with the Boy Scouts in Northeast and Central Florida, as well as with the Devereaux Day School in St. Augustine. He and his wife Jennifer live in Atlantic Beach with their three-year old son Keegan.

Lageman, 36, played for the Jaguars from 1995 to '98 and was the team's first captain. He started 37 of 40 games played in the Jaguars' first four seasons, making 175 tackles and 12.5 sacks. His final year was ended in the season opener because of a torn right biceps. In 10 NFL seasons, including his first six with the New York Jets, Lageman played in 122 games, making 118 starts. He was a first-round draft choice of the Jets in 1989, the 14th player selected overall. After his retirement he joined the Jaguars' preseason TV booth as color analyst for the 1999 to 2002 preseasons. Lageman also called NFL regular-season games for Fox Sports from 1999 to 2001. He has been co-host of the "Jaguars This Week" radio show along with Sexton and Vic Ketchman on Wednesday nights on WOKV, and he will continue in that role. He will also continue as co-host of "THE Jaguars Show" on television along with Sexton. For the last seven years, Lageman has been co-host/co-owner of "The Outdoor Show" aired Saturday mornings on WOKV. Since 1996, he has been honorary chairman of the Children's Miracle Network, and is a board member of the Georgia Sheriff's Boy's Home in Hahira, Ga. Lageman and his wife, Misti, live in Jacksonville with their three-year-old son, Dylan.

Also part of the game day team are Cole Pepper and Vic Ketchman on the pregame show, and Pepper with former Oakland Raiders star Pete Banaszak on the postgame show.

The preseason finale on Thursday, September 2 against the New England Patriots in Gillette Stadium will be telecast at 6:45 p.m.

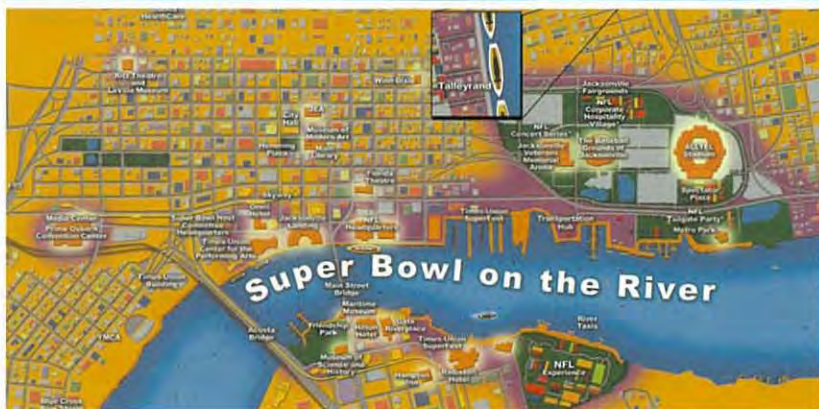

On February 6, 2005, Jacksonville will become the 12th city in the country to host America's premier sporting event - the Super Bowl. They said it couldn't be done. They said it wouldn't be ready. But on August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its first season in a new stadium or arena. Not only that, but it was built faster than any major-league stadium had ever been built in North America.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new stadium arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just seconds before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." Now in its 10th year of operation, ALLTEL Stadium is still drawing raves, and on February 6, 2005, ALLTEL Stadium will be the host site of Super Bowl XXXIX, the biggest single-day sporting event in the world. The city of Jacksonville was awarded the game on November 1, 2000 in a vote among NFL owners.

To ensure that Jacksonville has the finest venue in the NFL, ALLTEL Stadium underwent a \$60 million renovation. Among the additions are a Terrace Suite for 700 people, a 25,000-square-foot sports bar called the Bud Zone, a 20,000-square-foot Patio, 20 new escalators and four new elevators, a new secure perimeter fence around the stadium, two new state of the art

scoreboards, and newly renovated clubs and suites.

The practice fields that were used from 1995 through 2003 are being developed into a 400,000-square-foot entertainment zone adjacent to the stadium and available for other events in the sports and entertainment complex. For Jaguars game days, this area will include tailgate cabanas for pregame hospitality, a corporate hospitality area, interactive games, and a stage for pregame and postgame entertainment.

ALLTEL Stadium signature features are the two Touchdown Clubs, which are located on both sides of the stadium. The Touchdown Clubs and all 10,000 club seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club — provides more than 70,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in ALLTEL Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

ALLTEL Stadium seats 76,877, but additional temporary seats are added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity to well over 82,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game and Super Bowl XXXIX.

In 1997, Jacksonville Municipal Stadium was re-named ALLTEL Stadium after the Little Rock, Ark.-based wireless telecommunications and information services company that is listed in Forbes 500 and Fortune 500. ALLTEL also has a regional office in Jacksonville that employs more than 1,000 employees. Revenue from the 10-year grant of naming rights is shared equally between the Jaguars and the city of Jacksonville.

CREDENTIALS: Credential requests are honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials are not issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Vice President of Communications and Media, Jacksonville Jaguars, One ALLTEL Stadium Place, Jacksonville FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialing media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked in the TV truck compound near Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the media will-call window at Gate 1. The Media Will Call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers and videographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance on the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in a room off the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. Phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information is available. The phone number in the media workroom is (904) 633-6312.

JACK DEL RIO INTERVIEWS: Head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his weekly news conference at 3:30 p.m. on Mondays in the media workroom. He is not available on Tuesdays, but is available to the media on the field at the end of practice on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

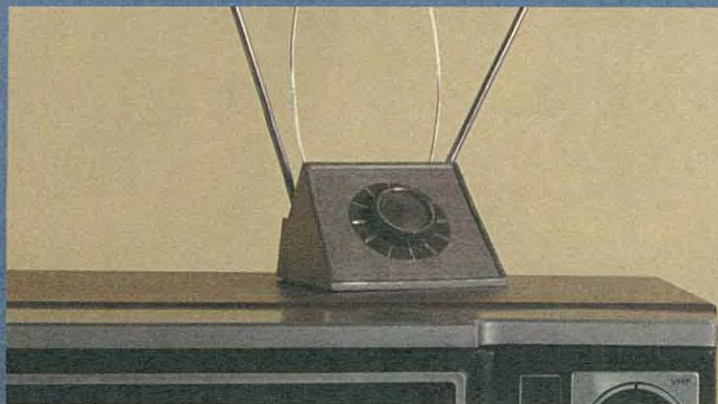
