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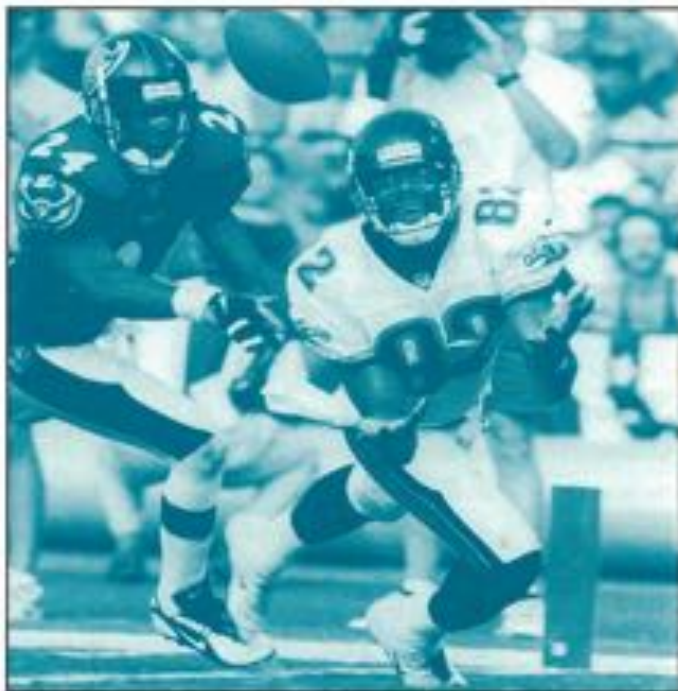

MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefitting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

PROGRAMS:

The Jaguars Foundation's innovative programs have been nationally recognized, including stories in the *New York Times* and the syndicated "Osgood File" radio program.

GRANTMAKING: From March 1996 to June 1998, the Jaguars Foundation has allocated approximately \$1.2 million dollars in grants. This level of giving is among the top few, if not the highest, in professional sports, and we believe that the support will continue to increase. More important, there is a fair, objective and coherent evaluation process to determine support. Grants have been allocated to serve such needs and opportunities as the establishment of a model elementary school-based health center; the purchase of land to expand a multi-service youth program in the inner-city, case management to prevent teen pregnancy and AIDS, and creation of a program to increase teaching and accountability standards for day-care facilities.

HONOR ROWS: This unique program uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for agencies, young people and volunteer mentors to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. It provides for flexibility and creativity by allowing agencies to determine how best to use seats as motivational goals. All applications are reviewed by a diverse volunteer committee. Goal setting involves academic achievement, behavioral improvement, and providing public service. In 1998, more than 3,000 seats have been awarded to more than 40 agencies for regular-season home games. That number increased steadily to about 2,800 seats in 1997 (from 1,700 in 1996 and 1,300 seats in 1995). In addition, all Honor Rows youth earning a seat fulfilled a pledge to remain alcohol, tobacco and drug free. The Jaguars Foundation partners with Nike and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation in support of this program and with the United Way to mobilize volunteers to ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of Honor Rows participants. The Jaguars Foundation received the 1996 Governor's Community Investment Award for this program. In the past year, more than 7,000 tickets were allocated by the Foundation for charitable purposes through Honor Rows and other community efforts, representing more than \$225,000 in ticket value. In addition to seats, Honor Rows participants receive a free meal, a special T-shirt, hat, pledge card, certificate and recognition at the stadium during the game.

NIKE/JAGUARS FOUNDATION COMMUNITY SCHOLARS PROGRAM: Nike and the Jaguars Foundation have partnered with the University of North Florida to create the Nike/Jaguars Foundation Community Scholars program, a novel scholarship program that will involve UNF Honor students in mentoring incoming inner-city students who have participated in the Honor Rows program or the Let Us Play Sports Camp. Student candidates also must be nominated by their youth agency and have demonstrated a commitment to public service. Scholarship recipients will receive full tuition for four years as well as mentorship support before and during their college experience, increasing their chances for lasting academic, volunteer and professional success.

IN-KIND SUPPORT NETWORK: Having substantial fan, business and media attention allows the Jaguars and its Foundation to act as an intermediary between people and business that have resources with which to assist others and those in need of resources. Examples of acting as a conduit to assist others include free distribution of such things as used computers from a corporation to assist inner-city schools, electric wheelchairs for needy youth, smoke detectors from a hardware store for use in day-care centers, food products from corporations to local nonprofits and eyeglasses for children from an eyeglass distributor. On a larger scale, this conduit function has also involved significant participation of the team's player and coach spouses. With the help of the Jaguars' Special Events Department, Second Harvest Food Bank and Winn-Dixie partnered with the Jaguars spouses to establish a food drop-off at the stadium and supermarkets prior to Thanksgiving, yielding about 14 tons of food over two years for allocation to families and soup kitchens (players' spouses recognized donors by giving out autographed photos of their husbands). Also, the Jaguars Foundation has partnered with Nike on its Re-Use-A-Shoe Program, the first such effort in the NFL. The Jaguars Foundation collected thousands of shoes that were turned into recreational court surfaces through Nike's reprocessing of shoe materials. This collaboration saved a local youth agency about \$50,000 in construction costs.

PLAYBOOKS READING INITIATIVE: The PLAYBOOKS initiative involves development and distribution to public libraries of 20,000 colorful booklets in which Jaguars players and coaches list and describe books that they found particularly motivating as youth, thereby encouraging young people to read and better utilize local public libraries. Youth receive PLAYBOOKS by obtaining or showing their public library card. Players, cheerleaders and team mascot Jaxxon de Ville have visited dozens of libraries encouraging youth and parental reading. The Foundation received WTLV Channel 12's "Top of the Class" Award for PLAYBOOKS.

STRAIGHT TALK: Given the team's power to bring together people from disparate backgrounds and sectors, the Foundation has attempted to leverage this ability to convene people to collaborate on particularly important topics. Under the leadership of Foundation chair and CEO, Delores Weaver, the first such effort convened all of Jacksonville's local television stations on the issue of teen pregnancy, a key Foundation focus. On December 15, 1995, an unprecedented effort called "Straight Talk," involved six local stations in simultaneously roadblocking airtime and showing a live town hall forum on teen pregnancy and AIDS. That program involved a crisis and referral line for young people and adults who wanted information or assistance. Since then, several grants and Honor Rows programs focused on preventing teen pregnancy and AIDS.

ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against youth tobacco use. The stadium is smoke-free and has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. Additionally, the Jaguars Foundation has partnered with the nation's largest private health supporter, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, to develop a program aimed at reducing youth tobacco use and sending a clear message that smoking is neither "cool" nor conducive to athletic performance. This novel effort involves the development of a large lighted sign in the center of the south scoreboard which states "Jaguars Don't Smoke" and shows a vibrant full-color Jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw. This signage is also used on concourses throughout the stadium, as well as on autograph cards used by athletes, coaches and cheerleaders. This effort has been recognized on the "Osgood File" radio show, the nation's second-most-listened-to radio program. Further, this initiative involves public address announcements during games as well as television public service announcements. Also, the Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from the back cover of the Jaguars game program. Since then the entire league has followed the Jaguars' lead and removed that ad.

Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Ga. and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need, and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and her husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 43 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, and an eight-year-old granddaughter, Morgan. Leigh is the artist of TOUCHDOWN, the 16-foot-long and six-foot-high bronze jaguar that stands outside the West Club at ALTEL Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all six Jacksonville television stations and the local newspaper have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy. AIDS and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars, who "open the doors, and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has already made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, the first grants to 10 local agencies in the amount of \$50,000 were made, and through June 1996 the Foundation had allocated approximately \$1.2 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit the Jaguars' partners for their generous financial support and the staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term effect.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating sexism, racism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally, Delores serves on the Governing Boards of the Jacksonville Community Foundation, LaVilla Cultural and Heritage Association, USO Council and WJCT Public Broadcasting, and she serves as a Trustee of Fresh Ministries and the United Way of Northeast Florida. She is a member of the Ronald McDonald House Advisory Board, a staunch supporter of Hubbard House and a volunteer for Habijax House Raising Week. She is Co-Chair of the Sam Kouvaris/Delores Barr Weaver Habijax Golf Tournament, which, in three years, has built six houses for deserving families who have earned a "hand up." The 1996 tournament raised \$143,385, with a net profit of \$124,500. She says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home."

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of Martha Graham Dance Company and NFL Charities, both of New York, and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge and the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute of Boston, where Delores and Wayne have created the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1957. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised \$6.3 million.

And, yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars. She attends every game and is as excited and nervous as Wayne on game day.

GROSS

PRESIDENT, JAGUARS FOUNDATION

Dr. Gregory Gross was named president of the Jaguars Foundation after serving as a consultant to Wayne and Delores Weaver on charitable giving. A native of Chicago, he earned a B.A. from the University of Wisconsin, where he received four letters in soccer. He then coordinated a National Science Foundation project at Yale University and co-founded and directed an international education organization in Washington D.C., which was connected to the International Pugwash Conference on Science and World Affairs, the group that won the 1995 Nobel Peace Prize.

Dr. Gross received his master's degree at Harvard and later consulted for Digital Equipment Corporation. After working for several years in the Boston medical complex, he returned to complete his Doctorate at the Harvard Graduate School of Education while consulting in nonprofit management. Having received a research award from the Aspen Institute, he wrote a dissertation on how grantmaking foundations served the disadvantaged. He serves on the Harvard-Outward Bound Advisory Board, the University of North Florida Dean's Advisory Board, Communities in Schools Board, and Policy Task Force of the Council on Foundations. He co-founded the Dana-Faber Marathon Challenge and has run numerous Boston Marathons raising funds for cancer research. Dr. Gross and his wife, Wendy, have a daughter, Jamie.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 1998

- The Jaguars to go over .500 as a franchise in the regular season. They are 24-24 in three seasons.
- Mark Brunell to go over 10,000 yards passing. He has 9,911 yards entering the 1998 season. Brunell is also one of only six quarterbacks who have ranked among the NFL's top 10 passers each of the last two seasons.
- Jimmy Smith and Keenan McCardell to be the second tandem in NFL history with three consecutive 1,000 yard seasons (Minnesota's Cris Carter and Jake Reed have achieved the mark four consecutive seasons).
- Mike Hollis to make 19 field goals to qualify for the NFL's all-time accuracy list. After three seasons, Hollis has been successful on 81 of 99 field goal attempts, a 81.8 accuracy percentage that would rank second in NFL history behind Philadelphia's Chris Boniol (83.06). A player must have 100 successful field goals to qualify, and Hollis has kicked more than 19 in each of his three seasons.
- Bryce Paup to become the 35th player in NFL history to record at least 70 career sacks. He has 65.5 entering the 1998 season. In addition, Paup will be trying to make the Pro Bowl for his fifth consecutive season.
- Tony Brackens to record seven sacks or more to become the first Jaguars player to record at least seven sacks in three consecutive seasons. In addition, Brackens can increase his team career records for forced fumbles (11) and fumbles recovered (four).
- James Stewart to go over 2,000 yards rushing. He has 1,803 yards entering the 1998 season. He can also increase his team-record 22 touchdowns.
- Kevin Hardy to go over the 300-tackle milestone in his first three seasons. He has 203 entering the 1998 season.
- Chris Hudson to again start every game. He is the only defensive player to have done so in 1996 and '97.
- Jeff Lageman to start all 16 games for the sixth time in his 10 NFL seasons. Lageman also has three or more sacks in eight of his nine NFL seasons.
- Pete Mitchell to record 150 catches for his career. He has 128 entering the 1998 season, which is more than any of the other 11 tight ends who were drafted in 1995.
- Bryan Schwartz to surpass 400 tackles in his first four years. He has 368 (team record) entering the 1998 season.
- Leon Searcy to start every game, making it six consecutive seasons (96 games in a row) he has done so.
- Bryan Barker to average 40.0-yards-plus in gross punting and 35.0-yards-plus in net punting for the eighth consecutive season.

WEAVER**CHAIRMAN, PRESIDENT AND
CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER**

When the Jacksonville Jaguars were born on November 30, 1993, Wayne Weaver had many goals for his franchise.

They haven't all been realized yet — the Super Bowl still remains the ultimate goal — but in just three years, the Jaguars have become the most successful expansion franchise in National Football League history. They are the NFL's only expansion team to qualify for the playoffs twice in its first three seasons and the first team to finish over .500 in two of its first three years. Those milestones are the result of Weaver's commitment to winning.

In 1993, Weaver won an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville. In 1994, he hired a winning coach in Tom Coughlin. In 1995 he presided over the building of one of the NFL's showpiece stadiums and four victories for his inaugural team. In 1996 he watched his dream team win two playoff games — one over the Denver Broncos in one of pro football's biggest upsets ever — and reach within one game of pro football's pinnacle, the Super Bowl. And in 1997 Weaver saw his Jaguars win 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team has ever won, while advancing to the playoffs for a second time.

"We want to take another step forward in 1998," said Weaver. "We're going to have a very competitive football team. Our goal is to win our division, and then we'll take our chances in the postseason. If we have a home playoff game and maybe an AFC Championship game here in Jacksonville, I like our chances a lot."

One of the nation's most successful entrepreneurs, Weaver brought his enthusiasm and business acumen to Jacksonville, a city that was yearning for professional football ... and a city which Wayne and his wife, Delores, call home.

Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman, president and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his hand-picked staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has proven to be a winning way.

On March 18, 1993, J. Wayne Weaver was introduced as the managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville!, the group that was trying to win an expansion franchise for the city. Fewer than nine months later, the Jacksonville Jaguars were born.

Weaver has been called a dreamer. He is. But he also makes dreams happen.

In winning the NFL's 30th franchise, Weaver led Jacksonville to what has been called one of the greatest upsets in sports history and the fulfillment of Jacksonville's more than 15-year dream of an NFL franchise.

Since that time, he has been named chairman of the NFL Properties executive committee, and he is a member of the league's stadium committee and the special committee on opportunities & challenges.

But Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. For what Henry Ford was to automobiles and Bill Gates is to computers, Weaver is the acknowledged leader in the women's shoe business.

He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers. Based in Evansville, Ind., Shoe Carnival, Inc., is a retail family shoe company with \$246 million in annual revenue. Weaver has nurtured

Shoe Carnival from modest beginnings of four stores in 1985 to a current portfolio of 97 stores.

Weaver became the majority owner, chairman and chief executive of LC Footwear, LLC with the acquisition of this company in July 1995 from Liz Claiborne, Inc.

LC Footwear is a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country. Headquartered in Jacksonville, the company is opening Liz Claiborne retail shoe stores nationwide and should have 25 stores open by the end of 1998.

Previously, Weaver was co-owner, president and chief executive officer of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear, from 1978 to its initial public offering in February 1993. Nine West is credited with revolutionizing the women's shoe market, as sales grew under Weaver's leadership from \$9 million in 1978 to more than \$550 million in 1993.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, in addition to their long-standing commitment to the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute at Harvard Medical School. Wayne and Delores serve on the Institute's Board of Directors, and through the Claudia Adams Barr Program, founded in memory of Delores' mother, they have raised \$6.3 million for Dana-Farber.

Weaver is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York. He has also been active as director and executive committee member of the Two/Ten International Footwear Foundation and currently serves as a director of First Union National Bank of Florida. He is also a member of the board of directors of the Jacksonville Symphony Association and the Cummer Museum of Arts and Gardens.

Weaver was born on January 14, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West.

Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 43 years and have a son, Bradley, a daughter, Leigh, and an eight-year-old granddaughter. An avid sportsman and skier, Weaver ran the Boston Marathon in 1991 to support the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

MICHAEL

HUYGHUE

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Michael Huyghue is considered one of the brightest young executives in professional sports. In each of the Jaguars' four seasons, Huyghue has set the pace for all of the league's teams when it comes to signing draft choices. In 1995 the team's first rookie class was signed collectively on June 1 — a first in the NFL — and this year Huyghue again led all clubs in signing their rookie draft choices.

Huyghue (pronounced "hewg") was one of the first people Wayne Weaver sought after gaining the franchise in November 1993. He joined the Jaguars in March 1994 as vice president of football operations, and he was promoted to senior vice president in 1996.

Huyghue directs all football operations for the Jaguars, with primary responsibility for negotiating player contracts and administering the salary cap, as well as overall team administration. He also plays an active role in league-wide administrative affairs, serving on the Management Council's working committee, and the college relations advisory committee.

Huyghue was previously the Detroit Lions' vice president of administration and general counsel. He oversaw the day-to-day administrative responsibilities, negotiated player contracts and was instrumental in guiding the Lions to the NFC Central Division championship in 1993.

In 1992 Huyghue served as vice president/administration and general counsel for the World League. During the 1991 season he was the general manager of the Birmingham Fire, which he directed to the North American West Division Championship.

From 1987 to '90, Huyghue was labor relations counsel to the NFL's Management Council, where he advised the then-28 member clubs on interpretation and enforcement of Collective Bargaining Agreement provisions between the league and the NFL Players Association. During his first year with the Management Council, he was also an integral member of the Council's staff which directed member clubs in the signing of replacement players during the 1987 players' strike. Rounding out his labor experience, Huyghue also served briefly in the legal department of the NFL Players' Association in 1987.

Huyghue earned a bachelor's degree in communication arts from Cornell University, where he excelled in baseball and was a three-year starter at wide receiver on the football team. He went on to earn a juris doctor degree from the University of Michigan Law School in 1987 and is a member of the State Bar in New York, New Jersey, and Michigan.

Huyghue is very active in the Jacksonville community and is a board member of the Urban League, the YMCA and Communities in Schools.

Huyghue was born September 21, 1961, in Windsor, Conn. He and his wife, Kimberly, have two daughters, Kristen Nicole and Kathryn Leigh.

CONNELL**SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT,
MARKETING**

Dan Connell joined the Jaguars on March 16, 1994, but his involvement with the team predated his hiring. As executive vice president of First Union Bank of Jacksonville, Connell was instrumental in rallying the Jacksonville business community in support of the city's expansion bid. His creativity and effort were instrumental in making possible Jacksonville's club seat drive in which NFL NOW! sold more than 10,000 premium seats in just 10 days in August 1993, a \$75 million show of community support that the NFL expansion committee was not able to overlook.

As the Jaguars' senior vice president of marketing, Connell oversees all team marketing efforts, including sponsorships, communications, special events, broadcasting and creative services, as well as interaction with the NFL office on marketing issues and city public relations.

During his 28 years as a resident of Jacksonville, Connell has been deeply involved in the community, serving on various boards. In 1997 he was chairman of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce and a commissioner on the Jacksonville Economic Development Commission. He presently serves on the board of trustees for The Boiles School, is a member of the First Union National Bank Advisory Board and is a trustee of Longleaf Partners Fund Trust. He is director emeritus and past president of the University of North Florida Foundation, Inc.

Connell received a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Florida in 1970. He was born October 7, 1948 in Orlando. He and his wife, Mary, have two sons, Andrew and Russell.

Bill Prescott is the chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He oversees the finance department, ticket operations and sales, and facilities, concessions and information systems. While he was with Cummings & Lockwood, he represented Wayne Weaver and Touchdown Jacksonville during the expansion process. Vance is also of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars.

As vice president and general counsel for the team, Vance is responsible for all legal matters, including business contracts, licensing and litigation. He also oversees the team's employee and human resource issues and policies and serves on the executive committee.

In his 21 years with Cummings & Lockwood, Vance emphasized corporate and transactional work and was elected to the partnership in 1981. He joined Cummings & Lockwood after completing his law studies at Columbia University.

Vance did his undergraduate studies at the University of Rochester, where he received a bachelor's degree in economics in 1969. Dan Edwards is responsible for overseeing the Jaguars' media relations and community relations operations, as well as the team's publications and the content for its award-winning Internet site (www.jaguarsnfl.com).

Now in his 15th season in the NFL and his fifth with the Jaguars, Edwards was named executive director of communications on May 4, 1994. Formerly the public relations director for the Pittsburgh Steelers (1985-93), he brought to the Jaguars 10 years of National Football League experience working with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Miami Dolphins and the league office.



After receiving a scholarship from NFL Charities and serving as a public relations intern in the NFL's New York office in 1984, Edwards spent the 1984 football season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins, who played in Super Bowl XIX that year. In 1985 Edwards joined the Steelers as assistant public relations director, and in January 1987 he was named director of public relations.

In 1991, the Steelers' public relations department received the coveted Pete Rozelle Award, which is presented annually by the Pro Football Writers of America to the NFL's top PR staff. TOM

COUGHLIN

HEAD COACH

In three seasons, Tom Coughlin has guided the Jaguars from their infancy to two playoff berths and an AFC Championship game appearance, and they now head into each season with the Super Bowl as the goal, not just a dream.

Coughlin laid the foundation for a winning team in Jacksonville by preaching discipline and hard work, and his tenacity and determination quickly turned an expansion franchise into a playoff team and a contender for the division title.

Firm, fair, honest and demanding are the four words that describe Coughlin best. "I have very high levels of expectations, and I think players need that," he says. "Players want discipline; they want organization. We emphasize responsibility and accountability, and all the little things that help you win in the long run."

And win the Jaguars have done. In three seasons, they have become the most successful expansion franchise in NFL history.

The Jaguars are the NFL's only expansion team to qualify for the playoffs twice in its first three seasons and the first to finish over .500 two of its first three years. They are also one of only seven NFL teams to make the playoffs each of the last two years.

A loss to the Denver Broncos in the 1997 Wild-Card game put perspective on the 1997 season, but it was still a season of accomplishment.

- The Jaguars won a team-record 11 regular-season games and finished with the same record as AFC Central Division champion Pittsburgh (losing the division title on the fifth tiebreaker)

- Won seven of eight games at home for the second consecutive season

- Increased their winning streak at home to 13 consecutive games before losing the home finale

- Improved their all-time record against AFC Central rivals to 15-9 (9-3 at home and 6-6 on the road)

- Evened the franchise's three-year record in the regular season at 24-24

In 1996, Coughlin's Jaguars won seven straight games and advanced all the way to the AFC Championship game, just one victory short of the Super Bowl in only the 35th game in the young franchise's history. Jacksonville's 30-27 victory over Denver in that season's playoffs is widely acknowledged as the biggest upset in pro football history since the New York Jets beat the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl III. Coughlin was named the 1996 AFC Coach of the Year by United Press International.

And in 1995, Coughlin led the Jaguars to four victories in their inaugural season, breaking the previous record for wins by an expansion team.

Coughlin was named head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars on February 21, 1994, the hand-picked choice of owner Wayne Weaver. "One of the things I was tremendously impressed with was Tom's discipline, attitude and decisiveness of how he would build this franchise," Weaver said. "It was apparent to me that Tom was not only a brilliant football coach, but he's also an extraordinarily bright man who understands the organization, administration and detail that are needed to build something from the beginning."

A veteran of 28 years in the coaching profession, Coughlin had 25 years of coaching experience before he took over the Jaguars, including seven years as a college head coach and seven seasons as an NFL assistant coach.



"Our players have been challenged in the off-season to use the power of purpose to move forward. He spent the 1984 and '85 seasons as the wide receivers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, and he was with the Green Bay Packers in 1986 and '87 as the receivers coach. He served with the New York Giants from 1988 to '90 as the receivers coach, contributing to the Super Bowl XXV victory over Buffalo in his last season with the Giants. In 1993, Coughlin was offered the opportunity to return to the Giants as their head coach, but he declined the job so he could continue building the Boston College football program.

Coughlin's arrival in Jacksonville followed three seasons (1991-93) as head coach at Boston College, where he turned a struggling football program into a Top 20 team. Posting a 21-13-1 record in three seasons, Coughlin capped his Boston College tenure with a 9-3 record in 1993 which included eight consecutive wins, a 41-39 defeat of No. 1-ranked Notre Dame and a victory over Virginia in the Carquest Bowl. His last Boston College team was ranked 13th in the Associated Press poll and 12th in the USA Today/CNN coaches poll, despite beginning the season with an 0-2 start.

He led Boston College to an 8-2-1 record in 1992, including a Hall of Fame Bowl berth, after posting a 4-7 mark in his first season.

It was at Boston College where Coughlin met Jay McGillis, a special young player who died of leukemia at the age of 21. In 1996 Coughlin started the Jay Fund Foundation in honor of McGillis, and in the last three years the annual Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation Celebrity Golf Classic has awarded more than \$272,000 to Jacksonville-area pediatric leukemia patients and their families.

"It's hard enough to undergo a family crisis of health. But on top of that to have the questions of whether or not the family can function as a unit because of impending bills, that has to be catastrophic," said Coughlin. "So I think whatever we can do along those lines is a

great thing — and in Jay's name."

Coughlin began his coaching career in 1969 as a graduate assistant at Syracuse, his alma mater. The next season he began a four-year stint at Rochester Institute of Technology, where he served as head coach from 1970 to '73, putting together a record of 16-15-2. Coughlin returned to Syracuse under Frank Maloney in 1974 and held the position of offensive coordinator from 1977 to '80, directing an offense that led the Orangemen to a berth and victory in the 1979 Independence Bowl, Syracuse's first postseason appearance in 13 years.

In 1981 Coughlin went to Boston College for the first time, as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under Jack Bicknell. He helped the Eagles win their first bowl bid in 40 years while coaching Doug Flutie, the 1984 Heisman Trophy winner. In 1983, Coughlin's last season as a Boston College assistant coach, the team earned the Lambert-Meadowlands Trophy as Eastern Champion, the first won by the Eagles since 1942.

Coughlin's playing career began as a standout scholastic star at Waterloo (N.Y.) Central High School in his hometown. He attended Syracuse University, where he was a three-year letterman for legendary coach Ben Schwartzwalder from 1965 to '67. A wingback for the Orangemen, Coughlin played alongside All-America backs Larry Csonka and Floyd Little. As a senior in 1967, he broke the Syracuse single-season pass receiving record, which had stood since the 1950s. An excellent student, he also won Syracuse's Orange Key Award that year as the university's outstanding scholar athlete. He graduated in 1968 with a bachelor's degree in education, and in 1969 he received his master's degree in education.

Thomas Richard Coughlin was born August 31, 1946 in Waterloo, N.Y. He and his wife, Judy, have two daughters, Kelli (10/6/69) and Katie (9/11/81), and two sons, Tim (2/6/72) and Brian (7/17/77).

The Jaguars' thrilling success in Coughlin's first three seasons as head coach have raised the level of expectations as the team prepares for Year Four and another run at the Super Bowl.

"We must have a better football team in 1998 than the one that lost at Denver last year in the playoffs," Coughlin said. "We pride ourselves as an organization on trying to do everything right, so we'll do whatever it takes to accomplish our goals."

Joe Baker serves as the Jaguars' assistant special teams coach, working under special teams coordinator Larry Pasquale, in addition to serving as administrative assistant to head coach Tom Coughlin. Baker, 29, was named to his post on February 25, 1995 after having served as the Jaguars' manager of football operations since June 1994.

One of the youngest assistant coaches in the NFL, Baker is directly involved in all areas of special teams, including the preparation of game plans and sideline coaching. In 1997, the Jaguars' special teams were ranked the NFL's best by the *Dallas-Morning News*, and the two kickers, punter Bryan Barker and placekicker Mike Hollis, were voted to the Pro Bowl.

A wide receiver at Princeton, Baker was on the school's Ivy League champion team in 1989. He has worked in coaching and administrative positions for the last six years. In 1991 Baker was the player personnel coordinator for the World League's Birmingham Fire.

Baker also served as a consultant and scout for the World League until joining the coaching staff at Samford University in Birmingham, Ala. in January 1993. While at Samford he coached running backs and wide receivers in addition to his duties in recruiting.

Baker was born June 29, 1969 in Glen Ridge, N.J. and raised in Hamilton, N.Y. He graduated from Princeton in 1991 with a degree in history. He and his wife, Jill, live in Jacksonville.

Pete Carmichael joined the Jaguars as wide receivers coach on March 3, 1994 after 13 consecutive seasons at Boston College (18 overall), the last three as wide receivers coach under Tom Coughlin. Carmichael, 57, is in his 34th year in coaching.

He has been responsible for the development of the Jaguars' wide receiving corps, which has sent a player to the Pro Bowl each of the last two years — Keenan McCardell (1996) and Jimmy Smith (1997). In fact, McCardell and Smith are only the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. McCardell has caught 85 passes each of the last two seasons, and Smith has the third most receiving yards in the NFL the last two years (2,568).

Carmichael began his coaching career in 1963 at Watchung Hills (N.J.) High School and went to Clark (N.J.) High in '64. In 1965 he spent a year at Virginia Military Institute, then he went to Madisonboro (N.J.) High. That was followed by stints at New Hampshire (1967), Columbia (1974-77) and on Joe Yukica's Boston College staff (1968-72). He was head coach at Trenton State College in 1973. After three years as an assistant at Columbia, he earned his second head coaching assignment from 1977 to '80 at the Merchant Marine Academy. In 1981 he returned to Boston College to begin a 10-year stint as defensive backs



coach under Jack Bicknell.

When Coughlin took over the Boston College program in 1991 he retained Carmichael to coach the team's wide receivers. Carmichael coached in six bowl games: Citrus, Liberty, Cotton, Carguest and twice in the Hall of Fame game.

Carmichael played one year as a quarterback at Dayton (1961) before transferring to Montclair State College, where he continued his playing career. He graduated from Montclair State in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He was born March 4, 1941 in Plainfield, N.J. and attended North Plainfield High School, where he lettered three years in both football and baseball.

Carmichael and his wife, Elaine, have two daughters, Layri (11/15/67), who is married to John Ratcliffe (and their daughter, Madeline Grace); and Kathleen (3/8/70), who is married to Doug Hight; and a son, Pete (10/6/71), who is an assistant coach at Louisiana Tech and is married to Tina.

Perry Fewell was named the Jaguars' secondary coach on February 16. He replaced Randy Edsall, who is now the defensive coordinator at Georgia Tech.

Now in his 14th year in coaching, the 35-year-old Fewell joined the Jaguars from Vanderbilt, where he served as secondary coach from 1995 to '97 and was also assistant head coach last year. In 1997, Vanderbilt had its best overall defense in school history and led the Southeastern Conference for the first time ever. Fewell was largely responsible for the development of Corey Chavous, who was selected by Arizona with the 33rd pick in this year's draft.

Fewell now has the challenge of tutoring a secondary that in 1997 set Jaguars records for interceptions in a season but ranked 24th in the NFL in passing yards allowed. The secondary returns all five players who started games last year, and it has been bolstered by the addition of safety Donovan Darius and cornerback Cordell Taylor, who were selected in the first and second rounds, respectively, of this year's draft.

He attended South Point High in Belmont, N.C., where he played football and participated in track. He went to Lenoir-Rhyne College, graduating with a degree in business administration in 1985. He lettered four years in football and was named the team's Most Improved Player in 1983. Following his playing career he spent one year as a graduate assistant at his alma mater.

Fewell was a graduate assistant at the University of North Carolina in 1985 and '86. He was the defensive backs coach at Army in 1987, then coached wide receivers at Kent State from 1988 to '91 before returning to Army as the defensive line coach from 1992 to '94.

Fewell was born September 7, 1962 in Gastonia, N.C. He is engaged to Kathleen Daniel and lives in Jacksonville.

Greg Finnegan was named assistant strength and conditioning coach of the Jaguars on February 10, 1998. He serves as the assistant to Jerry Palmieri in the development and implementation of the Jaguars' strength and conditioning program.

Finnegan, 29, previously was the director of strength and conditioning at Boston College, a position he held since January 1995 when Palmieri left BC to join the Jaguars. Finnegan worked as a graduate assistant with Palmieri at Kansas State in 1992 and '93, then rejoined Palmieri in 1994 as an assistant strength coach at Boston College.

Finnegan was born February 21, 1969 in Toledo, Ohio. He earned a degree in nutritional science in 1992 from Cornell University, where he was an All-Ivy League center on the football team. He earned a master's degree in exercise physiology in 1994 from Kansas State. Finnegan is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association, as well as the American College of Sports Medicine. He has written several articles focusing on topics such as nutritional supplements and football training.

He and his wife, Lyn, live in Jacksonville and have a daughter, Abigail (2/22/95) and a son, Benjamin (10/5/96).



FRED

HOAGLIN**TIGHT ENDS COACH****NFL: 32ND SEASON****JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON**

Fred Hoaglin has been around the NFL longer than any member of the Jaguars' coaching staff — 32 years dating back to 1966 when he was a rookie center with the Cleveland Browns.

Hoaglin joined the Jaguars' coaching staff from the New England Patriots on February 11, 1997, replacing Nick Nicolau, who is now the assistant head coach of the San Diego Chargers. Hoaglin, now in his 21st season as an NFL assistant coach, has been a member of three Super Bowl staffs, winning twice as the offensive line coach for the New York Giants in Super Bowls XXI and XXV.

In 1997, he coached tight ends for the first time in his career after serving as an offensive line coach for the previous 19 years. The Jaguars' tight ends combined for seven touchdowns, the third most of any NFL team's group of tight ends last year. Hoaglin was also responsible for the development of rookie Damon Jones, who came on strong the last month of the season and is being touted as a future star in the NFL.

After retiring as a player in 1976, Hoaglin was hired by the Detroit Lions in 1978, coaching there through 1984. In 1985, he was hired by Bill Parcells in New York and a year later the Giants won their first Super Bowl. Hoaglin remained with the Giants through 1992, coaching on a second Super Bowl championship team in 1990, along with Tom Coughlin,



who was then the Giants' receivers coach. Hoaglin re-joined Parcels in New England in 1993, coaching the Patriots' offensive line for four seasons. The Patriots allowed only 102 sacks in Hoaglin's four seasons.

Hoaglin was drafted in the sixth round by the Cleveland Browns in 1966, and he broke into the starting lineup as a rookie. A versatile player, he spent the majority of his 11-year career at center. In 1969, his peers elected him to the Pro Bowl, and he put together a string of 69 consecutive starts in the late 1960s. He played seven years in Cleveland before being traded to Baltimore in 1973. He spent the following two seasons (1974-75) with the Houston Oilers before finishing his career in 1976 with the expansion Seattle Seahawks.

Hoaglin was a starter at both center and linebacker at the University of Pittsburgh and was selected to play in the North-South All-Star game his senior year. He also earned two varsity letters in golf while in college. He received a degree in industrial engineering in 1968.

Hoaglin was born January 28, 1944 in Alliance, Ohio. He and his wife, Janet, have two children: Patricia Compton (3/5/88) and George III "Rick" (9/23/70), a son-in-law, Derek Compton, and two grandchildren: Andrew (5/28/87) and Kristina Compton (4/11/89).

Jerald Ingram was named to the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as running backs coach at Boston College under Tom Coughlin. Ingram, 37, is in his 15th year of coaching.

Ingram is responsible for the Jaguars' running game, which in 1997 ranked 18th in the NFL in rushing yards but totaled a team-record 20 touchdowns, which was second most in the league. This year he will groom Fred Taylor, the team's first draft pick, who will compete with veteran James Stewart — the only holdover at the position with much game experience — for the starting job at running back. Ingram will also have a new No. 1 fullback, with second-year pro Daimon Shelton and 1998 sixth-round choice Kevin McLeod vying for the role.

Following his college days as a running back at Michigan, Ingram was a graduate assistant at Michigan in 1984. In 1985 he joined the Ball State coaching staff as tight ends coach, followed by five seasons (1986-90) as running backs coach. In Ingram's last three seasons at Ball State, the team posted a 22-10-2 record, the best among the nine Mid-American Conference schools. In 1991, Ingram joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff.

Ingram earned three letters and was a member of five bowl teams as a fullback for Michigan from 1979 to '84. He played for the Wolverines' two Big Ten champion squads that advanced to the Rose Bowl, in addition to playing in the Sugar, Gator and Bluebonnet Bowls. Ingram graduated from Michigan in 1984 with a degree in general studies.

Ingram was born December 24, 1960 at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio and grew up in Beaver, Pa. He and his wife, Kathleen, have a son, Julian (7/27/97), and they live in Jacksonville.



JAURON**DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR****NFL: 23RD SEASON****JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON**

Dick Jauron is the architect of the Jaguars' steadily improving defense that set numerous team records in 1997, including allowing only 318 points. The Jacksonville defense also sacked opposing quarterbacks 48 times (sixth in the NFL) and forced a team-record 29 takeaways.

In 1996, the Jaguars held three of their 16 opponents under 200 yards in total offense, including the Pittsburgh Steelers twice. And, with the playoffs on the line, the Jaguars' defense gave up just 47 points in the final three games, as the Jaguars won all three by a touchdown or less and made the playoffs. In the Jaguars' inaugural season in 1995, Jauron oversaw a unit that allowed an average of 25.3 points per game, second-best ever among previous NFL expansion teams.

Jauron, 47, was named the Jaguars' defensive coordinator on January 11, 1995. He and Fred Hoaglin are the team's only coaches who also played in the NFL. The 1998 season is Jauron's 23rd in the NFL, including nine as a player and 14 in coaching.

Before joining the Jaguars, Jauron was defensive backs coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1986 to '94. In his nine years with the Packers, Jauron worked under three different head coaches. He joined the organization in 1986 under Forrest Gregg, and was retained when Lindy Infante took over in 1988 and in 1992 when Mike Holmgren was named Green Bay's head coach. The Packers reached the playoffs each of Jauron's last two years, and in his nine seasons in Green Bay, the defense made 168 interceptions in 143 games.

A former NFL defensive back, Jauron began his coaching career in 1985 with the Buffalo Bills under Hank Bullough. The following season he moved to Green Bay to join Gregg's staff, along with Tom Coughlin. Coughlin and Jauron were together on the Packers' coaching staff for the 1986 and '87 seasons.

Jauron was drafted by the Detroit Lions in the fourth round of the 1973 draft. He played for the Lions through 1977, making the Pro Bowl in 1974. In 1978 Jauron was waived by the Lions, but he signed with the Cincinnati Bengals six days later and continued his career in Cincinnati until suffering a knee injury during the 1980 season. By the end of his playing career Jauron had made 26 interceptions, including six as a Bengals starter in 1979, and he returned two for touchdowns.

Jauron received a degree in history from Yale, where he played running back and still holds the school's all-time record for career rushing with 2,947 yards.

Jauron was born October 7, 1950 in Peoria, Ill. He and his wife, Gail, have two daughters, Kacy and Amy.

Mike Maser joined the Jaguars' staff on March 3, 1994 following 13 seasons at Boston College, the last three under Tom Coughlin. Maser, 51, is a veteran of 29 seasons in coaching.

Maser coaches one of the best young offensive lines in the NFL, one that has paved the way for a Jaguars' offense that ranked second in the NFL in 1996 and seventh in '97. His bookend tackles, Tony Boselli and Leon Searcy, are considered the league's best tandem at the position. Maser has a solid veteran group of guards in Ben Coleman, Rich Tylski and Brian DeMarco, and he'll be working with a new center this season, with third-year pro Michael Cheever and free-agent acquisition Quentin Neujahr battling for the job that Dave Widell held in the Jaguars' first three seasons.

A guard in college, Maser began his coaching career in 1969 as a student assistant at the University of Buffalo. In 1970, he coached for one year at Darien High School in Darien, Conn. A service veteran, Maser coached at the U.S. Military Academy Prep School at Fort Belvoir, Va. in 1971 and '72. In 1973, he was the assistant offensive line coach at Marshall. From 1974 to '78, Maser served as offensive coordinator and head of recruiting for Bluefield State College in West Virginia.

In 1979 and '80, Maser was an assistant under Jack Bicknell at Maine, and in 1981 he joined Bicknell's staff at Boston College. When Coughlin was named head coach at Boston College in 1991 he retained Maser as offensive line coach. During Maser's tenure at Boston College, the team played in six bowl games.

Maser attended the University of Buffalo, where he was a three-year starter at guard. He graduated in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation. In 1974 he received a master's degree in physical education from Marshall University.

Maser was born March 2, 1947 in Clayton, N.Y. He and his wife, Barbara, have a daughter, Brigitte (12/2/73), and two sons, Greg (5/3/75) and Brian (8/14/76).

John McNulty is the newest member of the Jaguars' staff, joining the team on February 28, 1998. McNulty, 30, is responsible for assisting the coaching staff in all aspects of game preparation, including scouting reports, opponent breakdown and writing the playbook.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Michigan in 1991, and he worked with the team's defensive line in 1993 and the wide receivers in 1994. While at Michigan, the team won two Big 10 titles, earning trips to the Rose Bowl against Washington both years. In the 1991 game Mark Brunell's Huskies



won, while in 1992 Michigan earned the victory. McNulty also coached in the Holiday Bowl (1994) and the Hall of Fame Bowl (1993). In 1995 he joined the staff at the University of Connecticut working with wide receivers and special teams. He coached 1,000-yard receivers in 1996 and '97 and an All-American in 1997.

McNulty was born May 29, 1968 in Scranton, Pa. and was a high school standout at Abington Heights High in Clarks Summit, Pa. He graduated from Penn State in 1990 with a degree in business management and business law. He played four years as a safety at Penn State under Joe Paterno, playing in bowl games each of his four seasons.

McNulty is single and lives in Jacksonville.

The Jaguars' offense didn't miss a beat in 1997, Chris Palmer's first season as the team's offensive coordinator. The team ranked seventh in the NFL in total offense and scored a team-record 394 points, which ranked third in the league. But that wasn't a surprise, because Palmer is no stranger to success in the NFL, having coached successful offenses with both the Houston Oilers and New England Patriots over the previous seven seasons, capped by an appearance in Super Bowl XXXI before joining the Jaguars. This is Palmer's 27th year in coaching.

Palmer was hired on February 5, 1997 to replace Kevin Gilbride, who is now the head coach of the San Diego Chargers. He served as the Patriots' quarterbacks coach in 1996 after three seasons coaching the team's wide receivers. Prior to that, Palmer was the Houston Oilers' receivers coach from 1990 to '92.

But never did he have a more difficult task than in 1997, when the Jaguars started three different quarterbacks and went 3-0 in the first three games of the season. After Mark Brunell was injured in the preseason, Rob Johnson made his first NFL start in the season opener as the Jaguars won at Baltimore. With Johnson sidelined with an ankle injury, Palmer quickly groomed Steve Matthews, whom the Jaguars had signed six days before the season began. Matthews led Jacksonville to a 40-13 victory over the New York Giants in the home opener, as the Jaguars set a franchise record for points scored in one game. Then, after a bye week, Brunell returned to the lineup and led the Jaguars to a thrilling victory over the Steelers on "Monday Night Football."

With New England in 1996, Palmer retooled the mechanics of Drew Bledsoe, who ended the season leading the NFL in passing attempts and completions and finishing third in passing yards and touchdowns. When Palmer was the Patriots' receivers coach in 1994, the team set an NFL first when five players caught more than 50 passes each. In Houston, Palmer worked with Gilbride, who was then the Oilers' offensive coordinator, and from 1990 to '92, Houston boasted the top-ranked passing offense in the NFL.

Palmer was the head coach at Boston University in 1988 and '89, installing the run-and-shoot and producing one of the country's most exciting offenses. He was the head coach at the University of New Haven in 1986 and '87, with his teams posting consecutive 8-2 records and setting more than 50 school records.

Palmer's first professional coaching appearance came in 1983 when he was the offensive line coach for the Montreal Concordes in the CFL. In 1984, he coached receivers for the USFL's New Jersey Generals, and the following season he was promoted to quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator. That year, Palmer's offense featured quarterbacks Doug Flutie and Brian Sipe and running back Herschel Walker, who set a pro football single-season rushing record of 2,411 yards.

Palmer began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Connecticut in

1972, coaching the defensive line and wide receivers. In 1975 he moved to Lahigh as the wide receivers coach. The following season he was named the offensive coordinator at Colgate, where he coached for seven years (1976-82). In 1977, the Red Raiders led the nation in offense, averaging 486 yards per game.

Palmer played quarterback for Southern Connecticut State from 1968 to '71 and was selected to the New Haven Gridiron Club following his senior season. He received both bachelor's and master's degrees at SCSU. He was born September 23, 1949 in Mt. Kisco, N.Y. He and his wife, Donna, have two children, Mark (2/24/77) and Kristin (9/22/80).

PALMIERI

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Jerry Palmieri was named strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars on January 11, 1995. He previously had served as director of strength and conditioning operations at Boston College since August 1993.

Under Palmieri's guidance, the Jaguars have had nearly 100 percent attendance for their offseason conditioning program each of the last three years — one player lived in another state in 1996, another player completed his college degree in 1997, and in '98 all 57 veteran players participated four days a week (two others played in the NFL Europe League).

Palmer's philosophy is two-fold. Intangibly, he uses a scriptural verse: "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might ..." (Ecclesiastes 9:10). Each athlete is challenged to work hard and reach his fullest potential — tangibly, its strength and power. Palmieri's goal is to help each athlete increase in size, strength and speed, which ultimately produces a more powerful athlete. "Coach Coughlin wants our team to play physical on the field," says Palmieri. "Our job is to make our players more physical and more powerful, so that their play will be physical in competition."

Prior to his stint at Boston College, Palmieri spent six years overseeing the strength and conditioning program at Kansas State. He began his career as a strength coach in 1982 at North Carolina, followed by three years (1984-87) at Oklahoma State.

In addition to his coaching experience, Palmieri has taught college physical education classes and written articles about strength and conditioning for national publications. He has also produced videos on strength and speed training and is active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

A 1980 graduate of Montclair State, Palmieri received a master's degree in exercise physiology from the University of North Carolina in 1984. He is a three-time Golden Gloves champion (1976-78) and competed in international competition as a member of the 1978 and 1979 USA Boxing Teams. He was born October 30, 1958 in Englewood, N.J. Jerry and his wife, Ellen, have a son, Tony (12/18/85), and a daughter, Annamarie (10/2/87).

PASQUALE**SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR****NFL: 19TH SEASON****JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON**

Larry Pasquale is one of the top special teams coaches in the NFL. A veteran of 19 years as an NFL coach, he was named the Jaguars' special teams coordinator on January 21, 1995.

In three seasons coaching the Jaguars' special teams, Pasquale's units have blocked 11 kicks (three extra points, three field goals and five punts) while having only two blocked. The Jaguars have scored five touchdowns on special teams while allowing only one. In addition, the Jaguars led the NFL in that time with six onside kicks recovered in 13 attempts, whereas their opponents had tried nine onside kicks and recovered none.

In 1995, Pasquale was one of six coaches nominated for the Special Teams Coach of the Year Award, and last year was voted the runner-up for Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers. In addition, the *Dallas Morning News*, in a ranking of the 19 most important statistical categories, named the Jaguars' special teams as the best in the NFL in 1997.

Last year, punter Bryan Barker and placekicker Mike Hollis were voted to the Pro Bowl, marking only the fourth time a team's two kickers were both named to an AFC-NFC Pro Bowl squad. Hollis led the NFL in scoring with 134 points, and Barker was the league leader in both net and gross punting most of the season.

During his coaching career, Pasquale's special teams units have produced 38 touchdowns in the regular season and preseason, while allowing only four blocked punts in 19 years.

Pasquale, 57, is in his 36th year in coaching, which includes four seasons at the high school level, 10 in college and two in the CFL. After serving as wide receivers and special teams coach for the Montreal Alouettes in 1978 and '79, he entered the NFL in 1979 as special teams coach for the Detroit Lions. In 1980 he joined the New York Jets as wide receivers coach, then he took over the Jets' special teams the following year for the next nine seasons.

With the Jets, Pasquale led an impressive run of high special teams rankings. The Jets had the NFL's top-ranked punt-coverage teams in 1981 and from 1986 to '88, as well as a second-place ranking in 1989. In 1984, the Jets also had the top-ranked kickoff return team. Under Pasquale, the Jets had an 80 percent success rate on fake field goals and fake punts while never allowing an opponent to convert a faked kick.

In 1990 and '91 Pasquale coached San Diego's special teams, which he boosted to the top ranking among all NFL teams in kickoff return average and punt coverage in his first season. In 1990, he was selected the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers. He coached Philadelphia's special teams from 1992 through '94.

Pasquale played college football at the University of Bridgeport (Conn.), where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education. He has also completed post-graduate work at Columbia and Fairfield University. Pasquale was born March 21, 1941 in Brooklyn, N.Y. He and his wife, Joann, have two daughters, Lisa (8/11/66) and Lauren (10/22/72), a son, Darrell (4/19/70), and a son-in-law, Ben.

PEASE

DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

NFL: 13TH SEASON

JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

John Pease was named defensive line coach on January 12, 1995 following nine seasons as defensive line coach for the New Orleans Saints. Pease, 54, is a veteran of 28 years in coaching, a career that also includes 13 years at the college level and three in the USFL.

Pease rotates seven or eight players throughout every game at both tackle and end, and the Jaguars' defensive statistics have made huge strides since the 1995 inaugural season. In the last two seasons, the Jaguars have made a dramatic improvement in quarterback sacks, going from 17 in 1995 — last in the NFL — to 37 sacks in '96 and 48 sacks in '97, ranking sixth in the league. Fifteen players had sacks, and four had five or more. In 1997 the defensive line allowed only 108.4 rushing yards per game, an improvement from the 111.3 yards a game it yielded in 1996 and the 125.2 yards per game in '95. And last year's numbers were compiled by a unit that started two rookies at defensive tackle the last seven weeks of the season after three veterans were lost to season-ending injuries.

Pease began his fulltime coaching career at Fullerton College in 1970, serving four years there as defensive coordinator. He also had stints at Long Beach State (1974-76), Utah (1977) and Washington (1978-82). From 1983 to '85, he was on the coaching staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL under head coach Jim Mora. The Stars won the USFL championship in 1984 and '85. When Mora was named head coach of the Saints, Pease joined him in New Orleans, where he was from 1986 until joining the Jaguars in 1995. The Saints were a playoff team three of Pease's last five seasons.

A graduate of the University of Utah, Pease began college at Fullerton Junior College, where he was a two-time Junior College All-America selection. He transferred to Utah and was named All-Western Athletic Conference as a senior wingback. From 1965 to '67, he served in the military in Puerto Rico and coached at Antilles High School. In 1968 and '69, he was a graduate assistant at Utah prior to moving to Fullerton the next year.

Pease was born October 14, 1943 in Pittsburgh. He was on the training camp roster of the Los Angeles Rams after his final collegiate season. John has two daughters, Tracy and Kristen. He and his wife, Chris, live in Jacksonville.

SELMON

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH

NFL: 4TH SEASON

JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

Lucious Selmon, a former All-America defensive lineman for Oklahoma, was named outside linebackers coach on January 17, 1995. Selmon, 47, joined the Jaguars after serving as outside linebackers coach at Oklahoma, where he coached the previous 19 years.

He is primarily responsible for coaching the team's strongside linebackers. That starter in 1996 will be Bryce Paup, who was signed as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason. In 1996 and '97, Selmon coached Kevin Hardy, the 1996 No. 1 draft choice and the team's highest-selected defensive player ever. The addition of Paup moved Hardy to weakside linebacker. As a rook-



ie, Hardy exceeded expectations by making 130 tackles (second on the team), as well as 5.5 sacks and two interceptions, and he was named to the All-Rookie team.

The oldest of the three famed Selmon brothers who were all consensus All-Americans at Oklahoma, Selmon graduated in 1974 with a degree in special education. He was a letterman from 1971 to '73 and was a teammate with his younger brothers, Dewey and Lee Roy, for one season. As a senior in 1973, Selmon served as team captain and was a finalist for the Heisman Trophy, runner-up for the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award, Defensive Player of the Year in the Big Eight Conference and Chevrolet Player of the Year.

After his college career, Selmon played in the World Football League for the Memphis Southmen in 1974 and '75. He returned to Oklahoma in 1976 to begin his coaching career as an assistant on Barry Switzer's staff. From 1976 to '83 Selmon was the defensive line coach before serving as outside linebackers/defensive ends coach from 1984 to '94. Selmon coached under Switzer for 13 seasons and was retained on head coach Gary Gibbs' Oklahoma staff in '89.

In 1989 and '90, Selmon spent training camps working with the coaching staff of the Denver Broncos. During that time he helped coach the Broncos' linebackers and defensive ends.

Selmon was born March 15, 1951 in Muskogee, Okla. He and his wife, Clarice, have a son, Lucious III, and two daughters, Raeshawn and Tiffanie.

SZABO

INSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH

NFL: 4TH SEASON

JAGUARS: 4TH SEASON

Steve Szabo joined the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as defensive coordinator at Boston College. Now in his 30th year of coaching, Szabo spent 25 seasons at the college level, including three years as a college head coach.

Because the Jaguars employ a 4-3 "under" defense, Szabo coaches the team's inside linebackers — Bryan Schwartz, Tom McManus and Kevin Hardy. In all three Jaguars seasons, Szabo has coached the Jaguars' leading tackler (Schwartz, 161 tackles as a rookie in 1995 and 165 tackles in '97, and Eddie Robinson, 165 tackles in 1996). Hardy, the second overall pick in the 1996 NFL draft, has moved to weakside linebacker this season and will be learning a new position.

In 1996, Szabo groomed McManus as an able replacement for Schwartz, who was lost for the season after an injury in the fourth game. McManus, who was out of football in 1993 and '94, finished with 119 tackles, third on the squad. In 1997, McManus was lost for the season with a knee injury, and Schwartz had to carry the load while he rehabilitated his '96 knee injury.

A former college running back and defensive back, Szabo began his coaching career in 1969 at Johns Hopkins followed by stops at Toledo (1970), Iowa (1971-73), Syracuse (1974-76), Iowa State (1977-78), Ohio State (1979-81), Western Michigan (1982-84), Northern Iowa (1988) and Colorado State (1989-90). From 1985 to '87 Szabo was head coach at Edinboro (Pa.) University.

After serving two seasons as defensive coordinator under Earl Bruce at Colorado State, Szabo joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff in 1991. In all, Szabo coached in a total of nine bowl games representing five different colleges.

As a halfback and defensive back at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1961 to '64, Szabo was a teammate of Heisman Trophy winner Roger Staubach. As a junior in 1963, Szabo played on the Navy team that ranked second and played for the national championship in the Cotton Bowl. He also played lacrosse for three national championship teams at the Naval Academy. Szabo graduated in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in naval science. After graduation he was stationed at Quantico from 1965 to '69, where he continued playing football for the Marines.

Szabo was born September 11, 1943 in Evergreen Park, Ill. He has two children from a previous marriage, Christine (5/12/72) and Mike (1/26/75), and he and his wife, Patti, have a son, Zack (7/28/88).

DIRECTOR, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Rick Reiprish was promoted to director of player personnel on May 12, 1998 after four years as the Jaguars' director of college scouting, in which he oversaw the four drafts that built the nucleus of a team that has been to the playoffs each of the last two seasons.

Those drafts brought to the Jaguars players such as Tony Boselli and Bryan Schwartz in 1995, defensive starters Kevin Hardy, Tony Brackens and Aaron Beasley in 1996, Renaldo Wynn and Damon Jones in 1997 and first-rounders Fred Taylor and Donovan Darius this year.

Working under head coach Tom Coughlin, Reiprish has direct responsibility for the pro and college scouting departments, which are headed by Fran Foley and Rick Mueller, respectively. Reiprish will continue to oversee the scouting of college players and the annual draft, as well as trades and the evaluation and procurement of veteran free agents.

A veteran of 19 years of NFL scouting, Reiprish was hired as the Jaguars' director of college scouting May 15, 1994 after serving 10 years with the Seattle Seahawks, the last five as Eastern scout supervisor.

Reiprish began his scouting career as a Southeast area scout with BLESTO from 1979 to '82. From 1982 to '84 he was a personnel scout for the Kansas City Chiefs before going to Seattle as an area scout in 1984. He was named Eastern scout supervisor in 1989.

He coached receivers and running backs at Austin Peay State University from 1973 to '76 before going to East Tennessee in 1977, where he coached the offensive backfield and quarterbacks. In 1978 he was the assistant offensive line coach at North Alabama.

Reiprish received a degree in education from Villanova University in 1972 and earned a master's degree in education-administration and supervision from Austin Peay State University in 1974. He was born Sept. 14, 1950 in Shamokin, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Janet live in Jacksonville and have a son, Andrew.

DIRECTOR, PRO SCOUTING

Fran Foley was named director of pro scouting on May 12 following four years as the assistant director of pro personnel under Ron Hill, who is now with the Atlanta Falcons. He is also involved in the Jaguars' decisions during the NFL free-agent signing periods.

He joined the Jaguars on March 3, 1994 from Boston College and was one of Tom Coughlin's earliest staff hires. During his three years at BC, Foley coordinated the Eagles' recruiting efforts, one of the top ranked in the nation.

Foley began his stint at Boston College in 1991, serving as tight ends and kickers coach in addition to handling recruiting duties. He was the position coach for current Green Bay All-Pro tight end Mark Chmura. His last two years were focused on personnel recruiting and



team logistics. Prior to joining the coaching staff at Boston College, Foley had stints at Rutgers University as tight ends/specialists coach in 1986 and operations director from 1987 to '90. He also worked at The Citadel, coaching defensive ends in 1985 and at Colgate University as defensive line coach in 1984, when he began his college coaching career.

Foley attended Framingham (Mass.) State College, where he played offensive tackle from 1980 to '83. He graduated in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in English literature.

Foley is also director and treasurer of the Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation, which, in the last three years, has raised \$272,000 for Jacksonville-area pediatric leukemia patients and their families. DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING

After four years as a college scout for the Jaguars, Rick Mueller was promoted to director of college scouting on May 12, 1998. His responsibilities include the scouting and evaluation of hundreds of college players on an annual basis, as well as directing a staff of six college scouts.

Mueller was previously the team's college scout responsible for the western United States. He joined the Jaguars on June 4, 1994 after spending the 1993 season as director of player personnel for the Canadian Football League's Sacramento Gold Miners.

Mueller spent the spring and summer of 1992 with the World League's Sacramento Surge, serving as defensive assistant and special teams coach. The Surge went 8-2 and capped the season as World Bowl champions. Following the World League season, Mueller served as one of five pro scouts for the World League.

RYAN

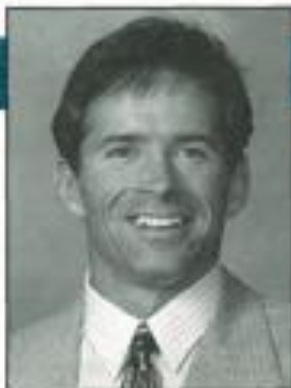
HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER/ PHYSICAL THERAPIST

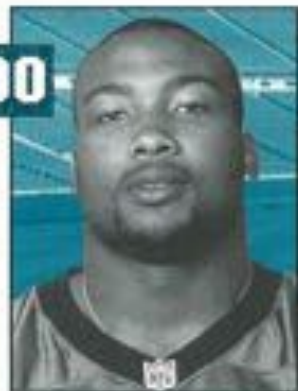
WHY JAGUARS?

Finalists in the contest to name the NFL's expansion team in Jacksonville included Sharks, Songrays and even Panthers, but it was "Jaguars" that was ultimately selected and announced on December 5, 1991. Utilizing the services of the marketing experts from NFL Properties' Creative Services division and with the partners of Touchdown Jacksonville, the enthusiastic fans of Jacksonville finally had a name to call what just less than two years later would become the 30th franchise to join the NFL.

Although thousands of entries were received when a contest was held to name the team, a majority of hundreds agreed with the name "Jacksonville Jaguars." Of those who submitted the name Jaguars, Jacksonville resident Ray Potts was randomly selected as the contest winner and for his contribution was provided a trip to the Super Bowl that year.

Considered the most aggressive and feared big cats in North America, the Jacksonville Jaguars look to pay tribute to their namesake in championship form.

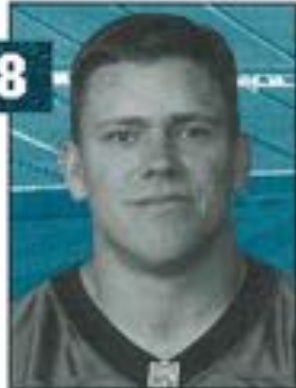
DID YOU KNOW?

The Jacksonville Jaguars are the only team in the NFL that has its training camp and practices and plays all of its home games at one facility — ALLTEL Stadium. In other words, the only time Mark Brunell ever leaves his locker is for the 10 road games each season. The rest of the year (even for the offseason conditioning program), Brunell never has to leave his locker.

The Jaguars hold their training camp and all in-season practice sessions at Furrell Fields, which is adjacent to ALLTEL Stadium (and practically underneath the south endzone scoreboard).

Every other NFL team either holds training camp at another site or plays its home games at a stadium separate from its practice facilities.

Named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for the first time Nov. 10 vs. Baltimore when he threw for 354 yards on 24 of 37 passing (64.9 percent) with one TD and one interception and also led the team in rushing with 58 yards on seven carries, including a one-yard bootleg for the game-winning TD with 41 seconds remaining. Directed four consecutive scoring drives in the second half for a franchise-record 27 second-half points and ran for a career-best 33-yarder in the fourth-quarter scoring drive. Received the offensive game ball ... Started team's five-game winning streak to end the season by passing for 306 yards and two TDs on Nov. 24 at Baltimore and adding a two-point conversion plunge which tied game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining in regulation. Received the offense game ball for the second time ... Threw for a stadium-record 358 yards vs. Cincinnati in a continuous downpour on Dec. 1, completing 21 of 34 with one TD for his 15th consecutive game with 200-plus passing yards. Received the offense game ball along with the offensive line ... Got his first playoff victory in his first postseason action, completing 18 of 33 (54.6 percent) for 238 yards with one TD and two interceptions at Buffalo on Dec. 28 ... Improved his record to 2-0 as starter in the postseason on Jan. 4 with a two-TD, 245-yard effort at Denver. Completed 18 of 29 and ran for 44 yards on seven carries, including a 29-yard scamper in the fourth quarter to set up the final touchdown. Earned the offensive game ball as well as NFL Offensive Player of the Week honors ... Completed 20 of 38 for 190 yards with two late interceptions in a fourth-quarter comeback effort in the AFC Championship game Jan. 12 at New England. Also ran for 34 yards on six carries ...

1995: Led the Jaguars to all four of their victories in their inaugural season ... Became the highest-rated passer ever for an NFL expansion team ... Took over as starter at quarterback for the last 11 weeks of the season, finishing with an 82.6 passer rating to rank seventh in the AFC and 15th in the NFL ... Started 10 of 13 games played, missing three of the last five with a strained hamstring ... Completed 201 of 345 (58.1 percent) for 2,168 yards with 15 touchdowns and only seven interceptions ... Got his second win as starter, throwing for 164 yards and 1 TD while running a career-high 11 times for 58 yards in a 23-15 victory at Cleveland Oct. 22 ... Made his sixth straight start Nov. 19 at Tampa Bay and completed 15 of 21 passes for 169 yards before leaving the game with a strained right hamstring at the start of the fourth quarter. and dressed but was inactive as the third QB Dec. 3 at Denver because of the hamstring injury ... Made his first start in three weeks vs. Indianapolis Dec. 10 and had a career-best 312 passing yards with his second three-TD game. Completed 26 of 39 (66.7 percent), with two TD passes to Willie Jackson and one to Jimmy Smith. Played the entire game despite aggravating hamstring injury ... Dressed but was inactive as the third QB due to his hamstring injury Dec. 17 at Detroit ... Returned to the starting lineup Dec. 24 vs. Cleveland and led the Jaguars to their fourth victory by throwing for one TD and running a then-team-record 27 yards for the other. Directed two scoring drives in that Rose Bowl, completing seven of eight passes for 89 yards and one TD ... Finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, given to the nation's top senior passer, in 1992 ... Was redshirted in 1988 and won varsity letters 1990-92 ... STEWART'S RECORD DAY

James Stewart put himself in some exclusive and historic company on October 12, 1997 when he rushed for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles. His five touchdowns is a Jaguars single-game record.

It marked the first time an NFL player scored had five rushing touchdowns in a game since 1963. Stewart also became one of only 12 players in NFL history with five or more touchdowns in one game. Ernie Nevers, Dub Jones and Gale Sayers hold the single-game record with six touchdowns, and Stewart tied eight other players who have scored five touchdowns in one game. Stewart also became the first player to score three touchdowns in one quarter since San Diego's Rod Bernsine on December 15, 1991. Stewart had three rushing TDs in the first quarter of the game.

The Jaguars made their first appearance on "Monday Night Football" one to remember. In front of a then-stadium-record 73,016 fans, QB Mark Brunell returned from a preseason knee injury and led Jacksonville to a 30-21 victory that was decided on the final play of the game. On the first drive, Brunell was 4 of 5 as the Jaguars drove 68 yards in 10 plays and scored on a one-yard touchdown run by Natrone Means. The Steelers countered on the next drive, with Kordell Stewart tying the game on a six-yard run. Tony Brackens sacked Stewart and forced a fumble, which was recovered by Eddie Robinson at the Steelers' 38-yard line. The Jaguars took a 14-7 lead on an 11-yard TD pass from Brunell to Jimmy Smith. After a missed field goal attempt by Mike Hollis, Aaron Beasley intercepted Stewart at the Steelers' 35-yard line. Hollis' 20-yard field goal gave the Jaguars a 17-7 lead at the half. Pittsburgh scored on a four-yard pass from Stewart to Yancey Thigpen and Hollis' second field goal of the night to make it 20-14. The Steelers took a 21-20 lead on a one-yard pass from Stewart to Mark Bruener. A Hollis field goal gave the Jaguars a 23-21 lead with 4:14 remaining. The Steelers drove to the Jaguars' 22-yard line, where, with only six seconds on the clock, they lined up to attempt a game-winning field goal. Norm Johnson got the kick off, but it was blocked by Clyde Simmons. The ball was picked up by Chris Hudson and returned 58 yards for a Jaguars' touchdown to end the game. Brunell ended the game with 306 yards passing, his ninth career 300-yard game. It was the first 300-yard passing performance allowed by Pittsburgh since 1995.

The Jaguars had held Bettis to 99 yards rushing, but Yancey Thigpen caught 11 passes for 196 yards.

The Jaguars got the ball moving late in the second quarter, scoring on a 20-yard pass from Brunell to Keenan McCardell. Mike Hollis missed a 44-yard field goal on the opening drive of the second half and Vinatieri made a 33-yard field goal to give the Patriots a 23-7 lead. The Jaguars forced New England to punt and scored with a 12-yard TD pass from Brunell to McCardell, though a two-point pass failed. The Patriots recovered an onside kick and Vinatieri kicked his fourth field goal for a 26-13 lead. On the Patriots' kickoff, Barlow returned the ball 92 yards for a touchdown, the first of his career and only the second kickoff return for a touchdown in team history. The Jaguars again tried an onside kick but were unsuccessful. Vinatieri missed a field goal attempt and the Jaguars got the ball back with 29 seconds remaining. Brunell's desperation pass was knocked down at the two-yard line to end the game. The loss ended the Jaguars' 13-game home winning streak in front of a record crowd of 73,446.

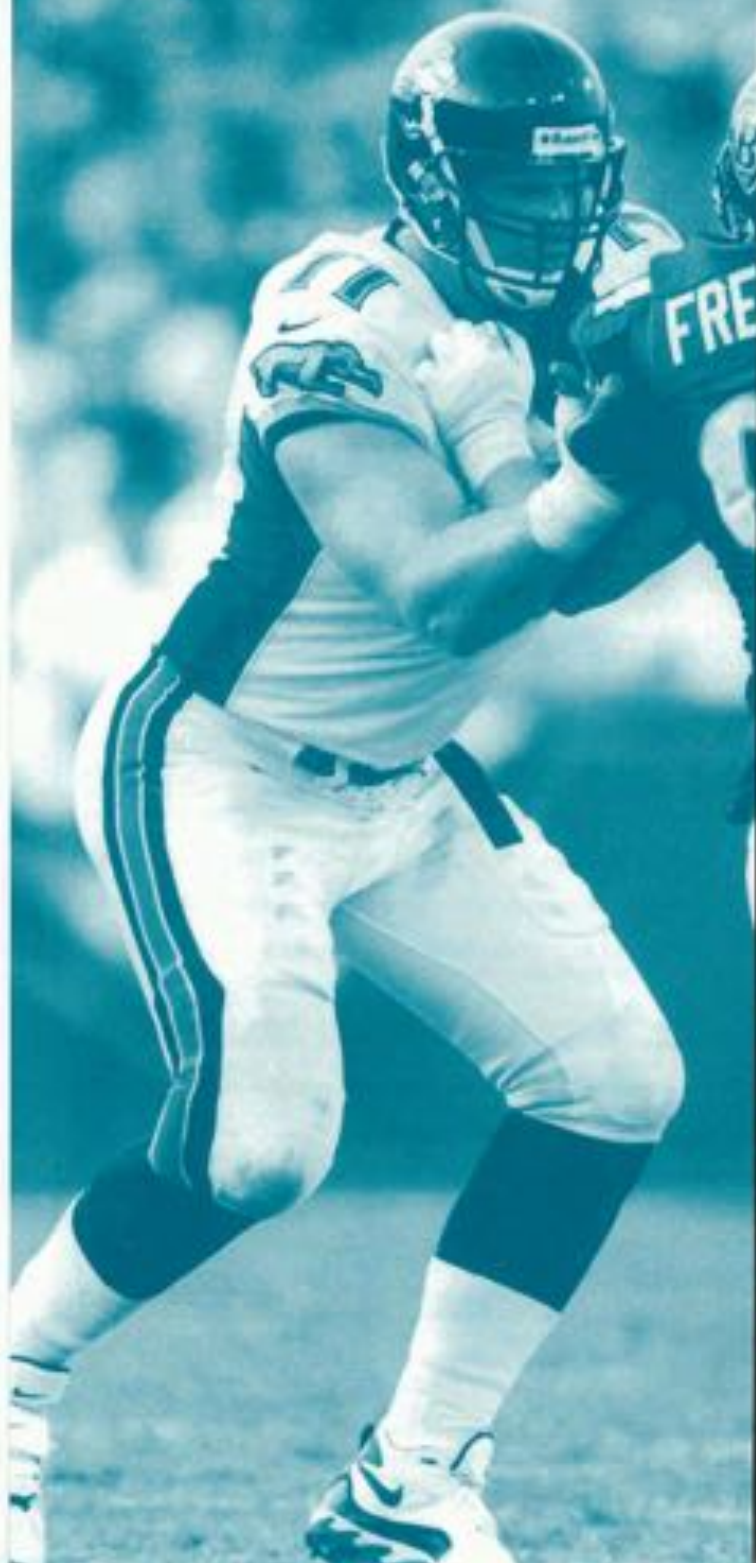

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1989

AUG. 17 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, a partnership to lead the community effort to win an NFL franchise is formed. The group, led by Tom Petway, includes Jeb Bush, Hamilton Jordan, and Arthur "Chick" Sherrer.

1990

APRIL 4 — National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue announces that the League will expand by two teams no later than the 1993 season.

JULY 26 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1993 season.

1991

FEB. 12 — In a unanimous vote, the Jacksonville City Council votes to commit \$60 million to renovate the Gator Bowl contingent upon the City being awarded an expansion football team.

MAY 15 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1994 season, contrary to the July 26, 1990 vote.

MAY 22 — At the owners' meeting in Minneapolis, a plan is approved that will add two expansion teams to the League for the 1994 season.

MAY 30 — Florida Governor Lawton Chiles signs into law the Professional Sports Facilities Program, a state statute that provides state funding of up to \$2 million for 30 years for funding new sports facilities that operate in the state of Florida.

JUNE 25 — The lease that includes the recently approved \$60 million package to renovate the Gator Bowl is approved by City Council.

JULY 17 — The NFL announces that it will accept applications for expansion teams.

SEPT. 16 — The City of Jacksonville files an expansion application with the League, one of 11 cities to apply.

OCT. 1 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. submits its ownership application to the League. The nine-member partnership includes local businessman and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. general partner Tom Petway. J. Wayne Weaver is one of the eight limited partners, along with Jeb Bush, Lawrence DuBow, Earl Hadow, Preston Haskell, Sandy McArthur, Charles Towers and Ron Weaver.

OCT. 24 — David Sekin is named president and chief operating officer of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

DEC. 6 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. announces that the team name will be the Jacksonville Jaguars if an expansion team is awarded.

DEC. 10 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. and City officials make the group's first presentation to commissioner Tagliabue and other NFL officials in New York.

1992

MARCH 17 — At the League's annual winter meeting in Phoenix, the list of expansion candidate cities is cut from 11 to seven. Jacksonville is one of the seven; Nashville, San Antonio, Raleigh-Durham, and Honolulu are eliminated.

MAY 19 — The five finalists in the expansion race are named: Jacksonville, Charlotte, Baltimore, Memphis, St. Louis, Sacramento and Oakland are eliminated.

OCT. 20 — Citing complications surrounding the ongoing labor situation, the NFL votes to delay the expansion announcement to its 1993 fall meeting in Chicago and for expansion teams to begin play in 1995.

1993

JAN. 6 — A seven-year Collective Bargaining Agreement is reached between the League and its players. With the labor situation resolved, a new expansion timetable is expected in March.

MARCH 18 — J. Wayne Weaver is introduced as managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

MARCH 23 — The expansion race is officially resumed by the NFL.

APRIL 12 — After a tour with Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. representatives, NFL officials indicate

that additional renovations beyond those already planned would be necessary to renovate the Gator Bowl to NFL standards.

JUNE 25 — Negotiations for a new lease between Jacksonville Mayor Ed Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. break down.

JULY 1 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. resume negotiations and agree on a plan that caps stadium renovation costs at \$112 million and protects the city from cost overruns. Mayor Austin sends the lease to City Council for approval.

JULY 21 — The Jacksonville City Council fails to approve the newly negotiated \$112 million stadium proposal. As a result, Weaver announces that Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. is ending its bid for an NFL expansion franchise.

JULY 22 — Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. closes offices and club seat and executive suite deposits are returned.

AUG. 20 — The Florida Times-Union reports that negotiations between Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. and the City have resumed, encouraged by the NFL, and at the request of Times-Union publisher Carl Cannon and Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert.

AUG. 21 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville reach an agreement on a new stadium lease capping stadium renovation costs at \$121 million, \$53 million to come from City funds and \$68 million from team and team related sources. As project manager, Touchdown Jacksonville assumes responsibility for any cost overruns.

AUG. 22 — Facing the challenge of selling 9,000 club seats, a committee of civic and business leaders is formed called NFL Now!, headed by Carl Cannon and Adam Herbert.

AUG. 23 — The City Council votes 14-4 to approve the new lease.

AUG. 24 — With the new public/private partnership, Weaver and Mayor Austin meet with commissioner Tagliabue, who welcomes Jacksonville back into the expansion race.

AUG. 25 — NFL Now! begins a 10-day drive to sell the required club seats.

AUG. 26 — Former Kansas City Chiefs defensive back Deron Cherry joins Touchdown Jacksonville as the ninth member of the ownership group.

SEPT. 3 — Carl Cannon of NFL Now! announces that 9,737 club seats have been sold, a number that rises to 10,112 once all the applications are processed.

SEPT. 21 — Weaver and other Touchdown Jacksonville officials make their presentation to the NFL finance and expansion committees.

OCT. 26 — In Chicago, League owners select the Carolina Panthers for an expansion team but delay the announcement of the second expansion city.

NOV. 30 (4:12 p.m. ET) — In Chicago, Jacksonville is awarded the 30th franchise in the National Football League.

DEC. 1 — A victory celebration in the Gator Bowl, as 25,000 Jaguars fans battle cold and rain to welcome Wayne Weaver, Jaguars officials, city officials and community leaders upon their return from Chicago.

JAN. 3 — Demolition of the Gator Bowl begins.

JAN. 6 — The Jaguars announce a season ticket sellout for their first three seasons. Over 56,000 season tickets are sold through Dec. 31, just one month after the awarding of the team.

FEB. 21 — Tom Coughlin is hired as head coach of the Jaguars. The former Boston College head coach and assistant with the New York Giants brings six of his assistants with him.

AUG. 24 — The Jaguars announce that they will hold their first training camp in 1995 at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

SEPT. 14 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Inc. is established, under the direction of Delores Barr Weaver and Dr. Gregory S. Gross.

SEPT. 28 — The NFL announces specific plans to stock the expansion teams.

NOV. 1 — The Jaguars hold their first official workout at Bishop Kenny High School. Thirteen offensive linemen work out in front of 1,500 fans.

NOV. 2 — The NFL announces its plans for division alignment, putting the Jaguars in the AFC Central Division along with the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, Houston Oilers and Pittsburgh Steelers. The Carolina Panthers will join the NFC West Division.

DEC. 15 — The Jaguars sign the first 10 players in team history: WR Shannon Baker, LB Hillary Butler, DE Ferric Collons, OL Greg Huntington, RB Randy Jordan, DE Ernie Logan, OT Rickie Shaw, DE Jason Simmons, DE Ricky Sutton, DE Chris Williams.

1995

JAN. 12 — Dick Jauron is hired as defensive coordinator. Jauron had spent nine years with the Green Bay Packers as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

JAN. 14 — Kevin Gilbride is introduced as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He had previously been the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers.

JAN. 20 — The Jaguars unveil their new logo and team uniform.

JAN. 21 — Larry Pasquale is hired as the team's special teams coordinator.

FEB. 14 — The Jaguars draft 31 players in the expansion draft. The first player selected is Arizona quarterback Steve Bueverlein. During the draft, the Jaguars acquire such veteran players as Desmond Howard, Keith Gogginous, Darren Carrington, Reggie Cobb, Eugene Chung and Derek Brown.

FEB. 28 — The Jaguars sign their first unrestricted free agents: guard Shawn Bouwens and defensive linemen Joel Smeenge and Don Davey. Within 15 days, six more unrestricted free-agents are signed: cornerback Vinnie Clark, punter Bryan Barker, cornerback Mickey Washington, defensive tackle Kelvin Pritchett, defensive end Jeff Lageman and center Dave Widell.

MARCH 23 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation awards its first grants to eight local organizations totaling \$139,850.

APRIL 21 — The first trade in Jaguars history: Jacksonville acquires quarterback Mark Brunell from the Green Bay Packers in exchange for draft picks in the third and fifth rounds of the 1995 draft.

APRIL 22 — Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli becomes the Jaguars' first-ever selection in the college draft, the second overall pick. Later in the first round, running back James Stewart is chosen 19th overall after the Jaguars trade up in the round. The Jaguars select a total of 10 players during the two-day draft.

APRIL 28-30 — The first minicamp is held on the practice fields adjacent to the new stadium.

JUNE 1 — The Jaguars sign their entire first class of draft choices at the same time, an event unprecedented in NFL history.

JUNE 2-8 — The second minicamp is held, with one practice session being conducted in front of 2,500 fans at Bishop Kenny High School.

JUNE 10 — "The Roar of the Jaguars," the team's cheerleaders squad, is introduced at The Landing in downtown Jacksonville. The squad includes 36 cheerleaders.

JULY 8 — The Jaguars' first-ever training camp opens at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

JULY 29 — The Jaguars play their first preseason contest in the Pro Football Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, but lose to the Carolina Panthers 20-14 when a last-minute drive ends at the Panthers' two-yard line.

AUG. 18 — Jacksonville Municipal Stadium opens, as the Jaguars host their first home preseason game. However, they lose to the St. Louis Rams 27-10.

SEPT. 3 — The Jaguars play their inaugural game in front of 72,363 fans but lose to the Houston Oilers 10-3.

OCT. 1 — The Jaguars get their first win 17-16 at Houston in the fifth week of the regular season — the third-lastest first victory in NFL expansion history and the fastest to earn a win on the road.

OCT. 8 — The Jaguars defeat AFC Central rival Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 for their first home victory, the only time in NFL history an expansion team has ever defeated a team that would go on to play in the Super Bowl the same season.

OCT. 22 — The Jaguars record their third win of the season at Cleveland with a 23-15 victory.

DEC. 3 — Jaguars wide receiver Jimmy Smith scores a team-record three touchdowns three different ways at Denver — on a blocked punt, off a lateral on a kickoff return and on a pass reception — an extreme rarity in NFL history.

DEC. 24 — The Jaguars break the previous record for victories by an expansion team with a last-second 24-21 win over Cleveland in the Browns' final game in their 55-year history.

1996

FEB. 18 — Pittsburgh Steelers offensive tackle Leon Searcy becomes the first unrestricted free agent to sign with the Jaguars in 1996.

MARCH 1 — Free agent Eddie Robinson signs from Houston, bolstering a young linebacker corps.

MARCH 2 — Keenan McCardell, Cleveland's leading wide receiver in 1995, signs a free agent contract with the Jaguars.

APRIL 20 — Illinois outside linebacker Kevin Hardy is selected with the Jaguars' first pick in the 1996 college draft, the second overall player chosen. By the early third round, the Jaguars also draft defensive end Tony Brackens, center Michael Cheever and defensive back Aaron Beasley.

JULY 19 — The Jaguars open their second training camp, their first at Ferrell Fields at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. The practice fields were named in memory of Roger Ernest Ferrell Sr. in a morning dedication.

SEPT. 1 — The Jaguars open their second season with a 24-9 victory over the defending AFC champion Pittsburgh Steelers. It marks the first game the Jacksonville defense does not allow a touchdown.

SEPT. 22 — Mark Brunell throws for a team-record 432 yards and three touchdowns, but the Jaguars lose their first-ever overtime game 28-25 at New England.

SEPT. 29 — In the first regular-season game between the two 1995 expansion teams, Jacksonville beats Carolina 24-14 as James Stewart runs for two TDs and the Jaguars rush for a team-record 179 yards.

OCT. 20 — Keenan McCardell catches 16 passes — tied for the third-highest total in pro football history — for a team-record 232 yards. However, despite breaking or tying 28 team records for single-game performances, the Jaguars lose at St. Louis 17-14.

NOV. 24 — The Jaguars win at Baltimore 30-27 for their first overtime victory on a 34-yard field goal by Mike Hollis.

DEC. 12 — Keenan McCardell becomes the first Jaguar voted to the Pro Bowl. Mark Brunell and Tony Boselli are later added as replacements, and Brunell goes on to win MVP honors in the Feb. 2 game in Honolulu.

DEC. 22 — The Jaguars clinch their first playoff berth in franchise history with a 19-17 victory over the Atlanta Falcons, as Morten Andersen's 30-yard field goal attempt goes wide left.

DEC. 28 — The first second-year expansion franchise in NFL history to play a postseason game, the Jaguars become the first team to defeat the Buffalo Bills in a playoff game in Rich Stadium. Natrone Means leads the way in the 30-27 victory by running for 175 yards.

1997

JAN. 4 — The Jaguars post the biggest upset in the NFL since Joe Namath led the Jets to victory in Super Bowl III, as they stun the football world and the Denver Broncos with a 30-27 victory. After flying back to Jacksonville, the team finds 40,000 fans waiting for them at 1:30 a.m. in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

JAN. 12 — The Jaguars' Cinderella season ends short of the Super Bowl, as Jacksonville is defeated by the New England Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. Jaguars turnovers led to 17 of the Patriots' 20 points in a game played in a wind chill of 0 degrees.

JAN. 23 — David Sekdin resigns as Jaguars president but remains as a partner.

FEB. 5 — Chris Palmer is named offensive coordinator, replacing Kevin Gilbride who had become head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

MARCH 5 — The Jaguars sign their only 1997 unrestricted free agent, Pittsburgh cornerback Deon Figures.

APRIL 18 — ALLTEL Stadium becomes the new name for Jacksonville Municipal Stadium in a sponsorship agreement with the information technology and communications provider.

APRIL 19 — Jacksonville selects defensive tackle Renaldo Wynn of Notre Dame with the 21st pick of the first round of the NFL draft. In all, the Jaguars draft seven players.

AUG. 9 — Quarterback Mark Brunell suffers a knee injury in a preseason game against the New York Giants and misses the next four games, including the first two of the regular season.

AUG. 31 — In his first NFL start, Rob Johnson leads the Jaguars to a 28-27 victory at Baltimore in the season opener. Johnson displayed incredible courage in returning twice from a severe ankle sprain, setting a team record with 20 completions in 24 attempts (83.3 percent), 2 TD passes and a 25-yard TD rushing.

SEPT. 7 — The Jaguars win their home opener 40-13 over the New York Giants as Steve Matthews makes his first NFL start for an injured Rob Johnson. The Jaguars started 2-0 for the first time in team history and set a franchise record with 40 points. It marked the first time in 30 years that a team won twice with two different quarterbacks making their first start in consecutive games.

SEPT. 22 — Mark Brunell returns and leads the Jaguars to a 30-21 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their first appearance on "Monday Night Football." Brunell threw for 306 yards, but the victory wasn't clinched until the final play, when Clyde Simmons blocked a 40-yard game-winning field goal attempt and Chris Hudson returned the ball 58 yards for a touchdown as time expired.

OCT. 12 — James Stewart rushes for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the visiting Philadelphia Eagles. It marks only the fourth time in NFL history that a player scored five TDs rushing in a game and the first time since 1963, and Stewart became one of only 12 NFL players with five or more touchdowns in one game.

DEC. 11 — Five Jaguars are named to the AFC squad for the Pro Bowl: Tony Boselli, Bryan Barker and Mike Hollis as starters, and Mark Brunell and Jimmy Smith as backups.

DEC. 14 — The Jaguars clinch a playoff berth for the second straight year after defeating the Bills 20-14 in Buffalo one week before the end of the regular season. Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith both went over the 1,000-yard mark, becoming the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

DEC. 21 — The Jaguars win their team-record 11th game of the season by defeating the Oakland Raiders. The victory gave the team a 4-4 mark on the road for the first time ever, and matched division-winner Pittsburgh's 11-5 record. It takes five tie-breaker steps to determine that the Steelers were the division champion.

DEC. 27 — The Jaguars' third season comes to an end in Denver, with the eventual Super Bowl-champion Broncos winning the Wild-Card playoff 42-17.

1998

FEB. 13 — Quarterback Rob Johnson is traded to the Buffalo Bills for the ninth pick in the first round and a fourth-round choice in the 1998 NFL draft.

FEB. 16 — The Jaguars sign Buffalo Bills linebacker Bryce Paup, an unrestricted free agent.

APRIL 18-19 — The Jaguars draft 11 players, their most ever, in the NFL draft. Two players are selected in the first round: running back Fred Taylor from the University of Florida with the ninth pick; and safety Donovan Darius, a safety from Syracuse, with the 25th choice.

MAY 12 — Rick Flepish, who had been responsible for the Jaguars' first four successful drafts, is promoted to director of player personnel. Fran Foley is named director of pro scouting, and Rick Mueller is named director of college scouting.

JULY 24 — The Jaguars open their fourth training camp at ALLTEL Stadium.

September 22, 1996 — at New England 28, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard receptions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led at the end of the first half 16-10, and built a 25-10 lead going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie Jackson six plays later and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Ravens fumbled, and drove down field, with Mike Hollis winning the game with a 34-yard field goal.

October 26, 1997 — at Pittsburgh 23, Jacksonville 17

The Jaguars took a 10-0 lead into the second half, but Pittsburgh came back to take a 14-10 lead in the fourth-quarter. After a Brunell TD pass to Pete Mitchell, the Jaguars took a 17-14 lead. The Steelers scored a 19-yard field goal at the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

September 24, 1995 — Green Bay 24, at Jacksonville 14 — Sunday night (TNT)

The Jaguars lost their fourth straight game at the beginning of their inaugural season. They fell behind 17-0 before getting on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter with two touchdown passes from Mark Brunell to Willie Jackson. It was Brunell's second start at quarterback and the first time he had played against his former team.

December 15, 1996 — Jacksonville 20, vs. Seattle 13 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars battled back from a 13-7 deficit by scoring on three consecutive fourth-quarter possessions to win their eighth game of the season. Jimmy Smith scored his second touchdown of the game on a pass from Mark Brunell, and Mike Hollis kicked two field goals. Tony Brackens starred with 12 tackles, a sack, an interception, three tipped passes and his fourth takeaway of the season.

September 22, 1997 — Jacksonville 30, vs. Pittsburgh 21 — Monday night (ABC)

In the Jaguars' first appearance on "Monday Night Football," Mark Brunell returned from a preseason knee injury to lead the Jaguars to the win. The Jaguars had a 17-7 lead at the half. After a Steeler touchdown and a Mike Hollis field goal, the Jaguars held on to a 20-14 lead. The Steelers scored in the fourth quarter to take a 21-20 lead, but the Jaguars regained the lead with a Hollis field goal with 4:14 left. With six-seconds remaining in the game, the Steelers 40-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Clyde Simmons and returned by Chris Hudson 58 yards for a touchdown to end the game.

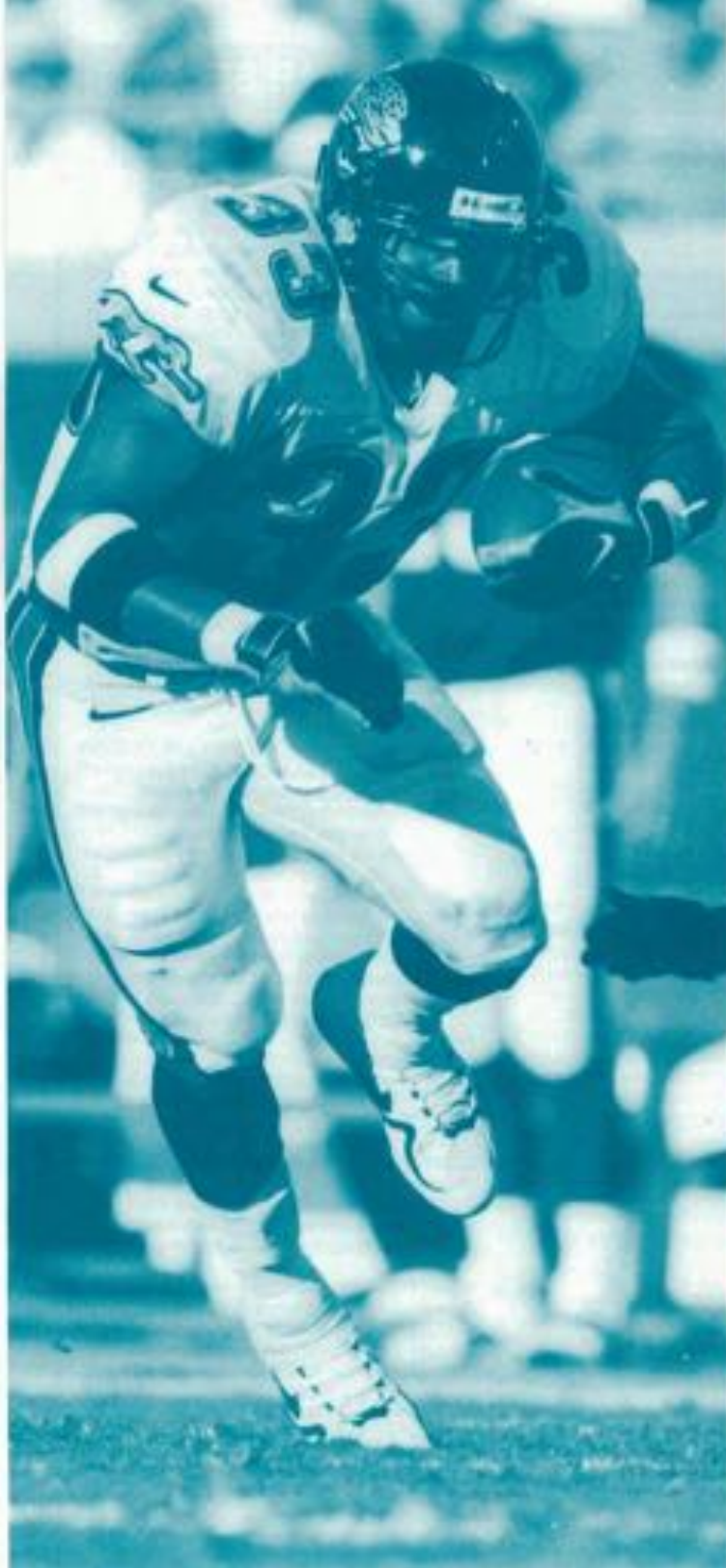

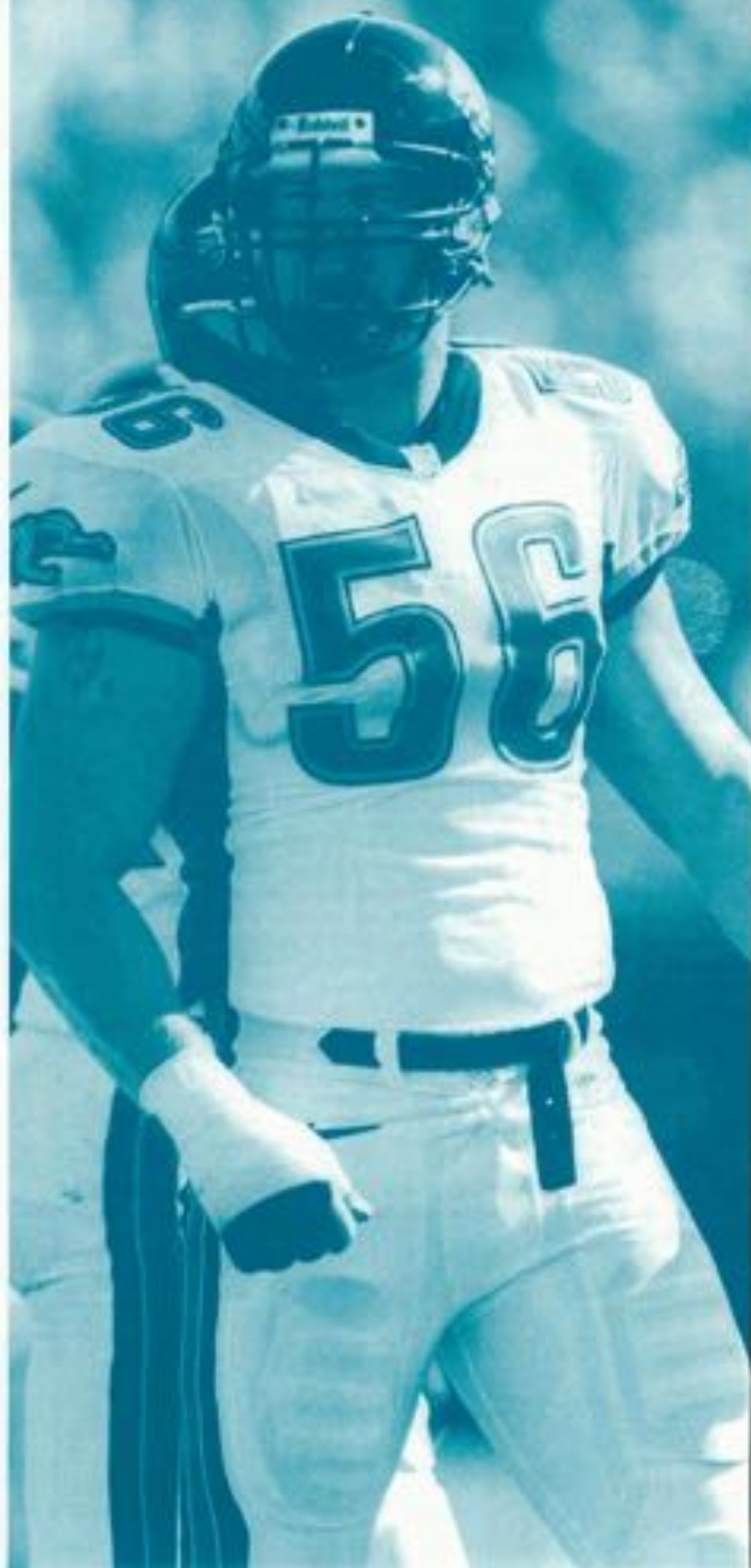

Returning for their fourth year of broadcasting Jacksonville Jaguars football on the Jaguars Radio Network are Brian Sexton and Matt Robinson. Sexton again handles the play-by-play, while Robinson adds analysis.

Sexton, 29, is the voice of the Jaguars. He is the co-host, along with Robinson, of the "Monday Morning Quarterback" which airs at 8 a.m. on WOKV and "Jaguars this Week", which airs on Wednesdays at 7 p.m. on WBWL. Sexton also is the host of "The Longhorn Kickoff Show," which airs on Fridays at 6 p.m. on WBWL. Formerly sports director at WOKV, he came to Jacksonville from Wichita, Kan., where he served as assistant sports director at KNSS in 1993 and hosted various pregame and postgame shows in addition to handling play-by-play for the Wichita State University Radio Network. He is also the host of The Tom Coughlin Show, which airs on WOKV at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday nights. He and his wife, Jennifer, live in Jacksonville.

Robinson, 43, a former NFL and USFL quarterback, has expertise on the other side of the microphone. A former University of Georgia star, he played six seasons in the NFL for the New York Jets, Denver Broncos and Buffalo Bills. Robinson came to Jacksonville in 1984 as captain and quarterback for the Bulls of the USFL. After his retirement in 1986, he remained in Jacksonville with several business interests in the area. Robinson is the host of "Monday Night Live", which airs at 7 p.m. and "The Tom Coughlin Show", which airs at 6:30 p.m. on Saturdays. Both shows can be seen on WTLV Channel 12. In 1997, he broadcast two World League games for Fox Sports. He sits on the board of trustees of the North Florida Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and the St. Johns County United Way and is a member of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce Sports Council. Robinson and his wife, Neccole, have a son, Tyler, and a daughter, Mattison.

Joining Sexton and Robinson on Jaguars radio broadcasts are Jennifer Kurmik, Cole Pepper and Vic Ketchman on the pre-game show, and Pepper joins former Oakland Raiders star Pete Banaszak on the post-game show.

ALLTEL STADIUM



They said it couldn't be done. They said it wouldn't be ready. But, on August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its first season in a new stadium or arena.

Two years later, on April 18, 1997, Jacksonville Municipal Stadium was re-named ALLTEL Stadium after the Little Rock, Ark.-based wireless telecommunications and information services company that is listed in Forbes 500 and Fortune 500. ALLTEL also has a regional office in Jacksonville that employs more than 1,000 employees. Revenue from the 10-year grant of naming rights — a total of \$6.2 million — is shared equally between the Jaguars and the city of Jacksonville.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new spectacle arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. ALLTEL Stadium was built faster than any major-league stadium has ever been built in North America.

And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just seconds before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." Now in its third year of operation, ALLTEL Stadium is still drawing raves.

The stadium features two unique "signature" features, both of them state-of-the-art. The first are the two Stadium Clubs, which are located on both sides, and the enormous twin 60-by-156-foot scoreboards with 24 by 32-foot Sony JumboTron screens.

The Clubs and all 10,000 Club Seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club — with entrances that are glass-enclosed, 100-foot-high atriums — provides more than 65,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selectors. In all, 75 percent of the seats in ALLTEL Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

ALLTEL Stadium seats 73,000, but additional temporary seats are added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity from 73,000 to more than 80,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game, the Gator Bowl ... and perhaps someday a Super Bowl.

The construction of ALLTEL Stadium in the record 19 1/2 months was unprecedented. As with a football team, 12 different consulting companies shaped the construction. Demolition began on the old Gator Bowl on January 3, 1994, with approximately 90 percent of the old stadium torn down. In fact, the only portion salvaged was the west upper deck, which had been added in 1982.

A total of 121 subcontractors had a hand in the job ... all in all, thousands of people worked on the stadium from start to finish. And on Friday, August 18, 1995, ALLTEL Stadium opened its doors to more than 70,000 Jaguars faithful.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: Credential requests will be honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials will not be issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Executive Director of Communications, Jacksonville Jaguars, One ALLTEL Stadium Place, Jacksonville FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked adjacent to Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL-CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the Southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the credential will-call window at Gate 1. The credential will-call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the will-call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers and videographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance on the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Tom Coughlin conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in the hallway outside the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. Phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information are available. The phone number in the media workroom is (904) 633-6312.

TOM COUGHLIN INTERVIEWS: Head coach Tom Coughlin will conduct his weekly news conference at 12:15 on Mondays in the media workroom. He is not available on Tuesdays, but is available to the media from 12:15 to 12:30 on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. On Mondays, players will only be available from 11:45 to 12:15, and on Tuesdays there will be no availability as this is the players' off day. The lockerroom is open to the media on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 11:45 to 12:15 and on Fridays from 11:15 to 11:45. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance when possible to schedule.
