MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefitting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. By doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

PROGRAMS:

GRANTMAKING: In less than two years since the Jaguars Foundation was formed on September 14, 1994, it has presented nearly \$250,000 to Jacksonville-area agencies and community projects. A record sum of \$139,850 was granted to eight agencies even before the team had played its first game in 1995. The next series of grants will be announced in late 1996.

HONOR ROWS: This unique program uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for agencies and young people (ages 10-16) to set and achieve academic, behavioral and public service goals. The program will provide seats for 1,700 people from 29 local agencies in 1996. The program was honored with the 1996 Governor's Community Investment Award.

IN-KIND SUPPORT NETWORK: The Foundation acts as an intermediary between people and businesses that have resources to assist others and those in need of resources, through programs such as a Thanksgiving food drive and a holiday toy and food drive at Regency Square.

VOLUNTEERISM: The Foundation serves as a matchmaker between interested players and young people and agencies in rewarding leadership and mentorship roles.

ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a leadership position in partnership with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to reduce tobacco use among youth.

STRAIGHT TALK: The Foundation currently focuses on reducing teen pregnancy through grants and Honor Rows programs, as well as collaborating with the media.

WEAVER

CHAIR / CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, JAGUARS FOUNDATION



In a brief time, Delores Barr Weaver has chaired the Jaguars Foundation into a variety of areas that follow her passionate vision of helping prevent obstacles from standing in the way of young people and families leading self-sufficient, meaningful lives. As an example, in December 1995, under her leadership, all six of Jacksonville's local television stations rallied together in unprecedented fashion to produce and simultaneously air "Straight Talk," a town hall forum with adolescents focused on how to prevent teen pregnancy and AIDS, while examining ways to increase male responsibility.

Mrs. Weaver volunteers for Habijax (the Jacksonville affiliate of Habitat for Humanity); serves as a board member of NFL Charities, the local USO and Advisory Board of Ronald McDonald House; and is a trustee of the United Way.

She is also actively involved on the Governing Board of Boston's Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, where she was instrumental in establishing the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge, in which runners participate in the Boston Marathon to raise funds toward cancer research. Those funds are applied to the Claudia Adams Barr Program In Innovative Basic Research, named in honor of Mrs. Weaver's mother. In 1996, about \$1 million was raised through the Marathon Challenge.

GROSS

PRESIDENT, JAGUARS FOUNDATION



Dr. Gregory Gross was named president of the Jaguars Foundation after serving as a consultant to Wayne and Delores Weaver on charitable giving. A native of Chicago, he earned a B.A. from the University of Wisconsin, where he received four letters in soccer. He then coordinated a National Science Foundation project at Yale University and co-founded and directed an international education organization in Washington D.C., which was connected to the International Pugwash Conference on Science and World Affairs, the group that won the 1995 Nobel Peace Prize.

Dr. Gross received his master's degree at Harvard, and later consulted for Digital Equipment Corporation. After working for several years in the Boston medical complex, he returned to complete his Doctorate at the Harvard Graduate School of Education while consulting in nonprofit management. Having received a research award from the Aspen Institute, he wrote a dissertation on how grantmaking foundations served the disadvantaged. Dr. Gross came to Jacksonville with his wife, Wendy, and daughter, Jamie.

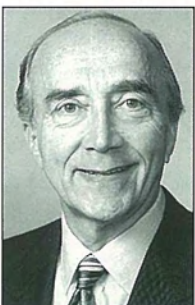

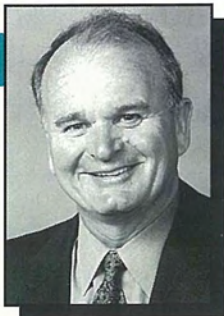

WEAVER**CHAIRMAN / CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER**

Wayne Weaver has truly weaved a dream come true for the football fans of Jacksonville. His vision and drive made the Jacksonville Jaguars a reality and a team which, in its first year of play in 1995, broke the previous record for most victories by an NFL expansion team.

One of the nation's most successful entrepreneurs, Weaver brought his enthusiasm and business acumen to Jacksonville, a city that was yearning for professional football ... and a city which Wayne and his wife, Delores, now call home.

Weaver's goal is to build the Jaguars into the NFL's most successful franchise. The team's inaugural season — four thrilling victories and a packed new stadium for every game — was just a start. The 1996 season and those in the future will display the true destiny of the Jaguars.

And Weaver's background and history show that the future shines bright.

On March 18, 1993, J. Wayne Weaver was introduced as the managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville!, the group that was trying to win an expansion franchise for the city. Fewer than nine months later, the Jacksonville Jaguars were born.

In winning the NFL's 30th franchise on November 30, 1993, Weaver led Jacksonville to what has been called one of the greatest upsets in sports history and the fulfillment of Jacksonville's

more than 15-year dream of an NFL franchise.

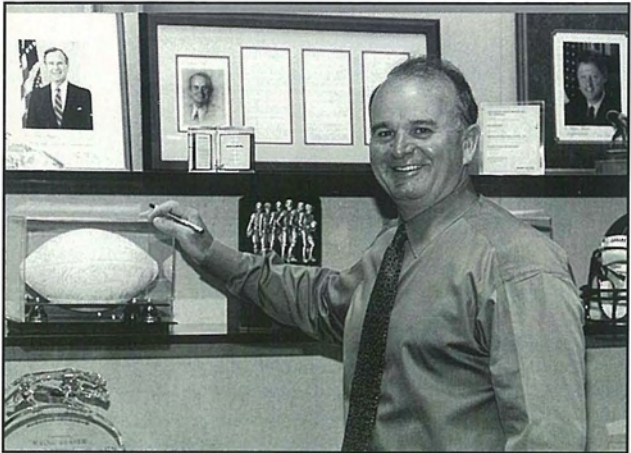
Since that time, Weaver has been named a member of the NFL Properties executive committee and the league's stadium committee.

But he also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. For what Henry Ford was to automobiles and Bill Gates is to computers, Weaver is the acknowledged leader in the women's shoe business.

He is chairman, chief executive officer and majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers based in Evansville, Ind. Shoe Carnival, Inc., is a retail family shoe company with \$225 million in annual revenue. Weaver has nurtured Shoe Carnival from modest beginnings of four stores in 1985 to a current portfolio of 91 stores.

Weaver became the majority owner, chairman and chief executive of LC Footwear, L.L.C. with the acquisition of this company in July 1995 from Liz Claiborne, Inc. LC Footwear is a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country. The company is headquartered in Jacksonville and will open Liz Claiborne retail shoe stores in upscale malls nationwide.

Previously, Weaver was co-owner, president and chief executive officer of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and



marketer of women's footwear, from 1978 to its initial public offering in February 1993. Nine West is credited with revolutionizing the women's shoe market, as sales grew under Weaver's leadership from \$9 million in 1978 to more than \$550 million in 1993.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. With the award of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and his wife Delores have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, in addition to their long-standing commitment to the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute at Harvard Medical School. Wayne and Delores serve on the Institute's Board of Directors, and through the Claudia Adams Barr Program, founded in memory of Delores' mother, they have raised more than \$8 million for Dana-Farber.

Weaver is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York. He has also been active as director and executive committee member of the Two/Ten International Footwear Foundation and currently serves as a director of First Union National Bank of Florida. As of July 1, he is a member (for a three-year term) of the board of directors of the Jacksonville Symphony Association.

Weaver was born on January 1, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West.

Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 41 years and have a son, Bradley, and a daughter, Leigh, and a six-year-old granddaughter. An avid sportsman and skier, Weaver ran the Boston Marathon in 1991 to support the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

DAVID**SELDIN****PRESIDENT / CHIEF
OPERATING OFFICER**

In the last three years, David Seldin has led the Jaguars along a path that started in a small conference room and led to the beginning of one of the NFL's highest quality organizations, the building of the best stadium in the NFL in the shortest time, and to the franchise's first victories.

And Seldin's path is still moving forward in many directions.

As president and chief operating officer of the Jaguars, he oversees the day-to-day operation of the entire franchise. Since November 30, 1993, when the Jacksonville Jaguars were born, Seldin has teamed with owner Wayne Weaver to build an organization that gives the fans of Jacksonville the winning team they deserve.

Seldin was the point man on the construction of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium, which was built in 19 1/2 months — faster than any stadium has ever been built in North America and in time for all 10 home games in the Jaguars' inaugural season. During the construction of the new stadium, which is truly a spectacle on the St. Johns River, Seldin worked closely with the stadium's architects, designers, contractors and construction team in beating the tight deadline to have the stadium ready for the Jaguars' first home game on August 18, 1995.

This year, Seldin has focused his time on the transition of progressing from a start-up franchise to an on-going organization that is a leader among its peers in the NFL. He also represents the team in league matters and is increasingly sought as an expert on stadium construction.

But building a winning franchise is the central core of Seldin's endeavors, and one that he relishes.

He joined Jacksonville's football efforts on October 24, 1991 when Tom Petway appointed him president of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. Seldin had been working with Touchdown Jacksonville! as a consultant when Petway and then-partner Earl Hadlow convinced him to relocate to Jacksonville and direct the city's expansion race.

Before joining Touchdown Jacksonville!, Seldin spent five years with the Pritzker Organization in Chicago. Previously he had been a manager in the Chicago office of the Boston Consulting Group.

Seldin is a graduate of the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania. He graduated summa cum laude in 1982 with a bachelor of science degree in economics. In 1983 Seldin received his MBA in finance and marketing from the University of Chicago.

Born October 24, 1961 in Henderson, Nev., Seldin and his wife Judy live in Jacksonville with their three daughters: Abigail, Hannah and Sarah. An avid runner, Seldin ran the 1992 Boston Marathon to support the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

PRESCOTT

CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER



Bill Prescott is the chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He oversees the finance department, ticket operations, concessions and information systems.

He is also responsible for the financial operations of other Weaver-related entities, such as Liz Claiborne Shoes, the DAR Group, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation and the Weaver Family Foundation.

Prescott has been involved with the Jaguars since their inception, and has also handled Weaver's finances since 1980. Prescott met Weaver while he worked as a tax manager for Deloitte & Touche. In 1989, Prescott joined Grill, Gilhuly, Prescott & Co. CPAs as a partner, where he continued to work with Wayne and Delores Weaver.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Prescott is a graduate of Pace University with a degree in accounting and a master's degree in taxation. He is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Connecticut Society of CPAs, and he holds CPA licenses in both Connecticut and Florida. His hobbies include tennis, sailing and skiing.

He lives in Ponte Vedra Beach, and has two sons, Christopher and Michael.

MICHAEL

HUYGHUE

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS



Michael Huyghue is one the brightest young executives in professional sports. In 1995, he helped assemble the talent that won more games than any previous NFL expansion squad in its inaugural season, and in each of the last two years he has set the pace for all of the league's teams when it comes to signing draft choices.

Huyghue (pronounced "hewg") was one of the first people Wayne Weaver and David Seldin sought after gaining the franchise in November 1993. He joined the Jaguars in March 1994 as vice president of football operations, and he was promoted to senior vice president this year.

Huyghue directs all football operations for the Jaguars, with primary responsibility for negotiating player contracts and administering the salary cap, as well as overall team administration.

Huyghue was previously the Detroit Lions' vice president of administration and general counsel. He oversaw the day-to-day administrative responsibilities, negotiated player contracts and was instrumental in guiding the Lions to the NFC Central Division championship that season.

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In 1992 Huyghue served as vice president/administration and general counsel for the World League. During the 1991 season he was the general manager of the Birmingham Fire, which he directed to the North American West Division Championship.

From 1987 to '90, Huyghue was labor relations counsel to the NFL's Management Council, where he advised the 28 member clubs on interpretation and enforcement of Collective Bargaining Agreement provisions between the league and the NFL Players Association. During his first year with the Management Council, he was also an integral member of the Council's staff which directed member clubs in the signing of replacement players during the 1987 players' strike. Rounding out his labor experience, Huyghue also served briefly in 1987 in the legal department of the NFL Players' Association.

Huyghue earned a bachelor's degree in communication arts from Cornell University, where he excelled in baseball and was a three-year starter at wide receiver on the football team. He went on to earn a juris doctor degree from the University of Michigan Law School in 1982 and is a member of the State Bar in New York, New Jersey, and Michigan. Huyghue is very active in the Jacksonville community and is a board member of the Urban League.

Huyghue was born on September 21, 1961, in Windsor, Conn. He and his wife, Kimberly, have two daughters, Kristen Nicole and Kathryn Leigh.

PAUL

VANCE

GENERAL COUNSEL



Paul Vance has been the general counsel for the Jaguars since July 18, 1994 following 21 years with the Stamford, Conn., law firm of Cummings & Lockwood. While he was with Cummings & Lockwood, he represented Wayne Weaver and Touchdown Jacksonville! during the expansion process. Vance, 48, is also of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars.

As general counsel for the team, Vance is responsible for all legal matters, including business contracts, licensing and litigation.

In his 21 years with Cummings & Lockwood, Vance emphasized corporate and transactional work and was elected to the partnership in 1981. He joined Cummings & Lockwood after completing his law studies at Columbia University.

Vance did his undergraduate studies at the University of Rochester, where he received a bachelor's degree in economics in 1969. While at Rochester, he played varsity baseball and was captain of the varsity basketball team. He received his juris doctor degree in 1973 from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

He serves on the board of the Museum of Science and History and the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Vance was born November 12, 1947 in Buffalo, N.Y. He and his wife, Jane, live in Jacksonville. They have four children: daughters Kerry and Jamie and sons Jordan and Derek.

CONNELL

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, MARKETING

Dan Connell joined the Jaguars on March 16, 1994, but his involvement with the team predated his hiring. As executive vice president of First Union Bank of Jacksonville, Connell was instrumental in rallying the Jacksonville business communi-



ty in support of the city's expansion bid. His creativity and marketing strategies were instrumental in making possible Jacksonville's club seat drive in which NFL NOW! sold more than 10,000 premium seats in just 10 days, a \$75 million show of community support that the NFL expansion committee was not able to overlook.

As the Jaguars' senior vice president of marketing, Connell oversees the team's sponsorships, communications, special events, broadcasting and creative services.

During his 26 years as a resident of Jacksonville, Connell has been deeply involved in the community, serving on various boards. He is Chairman-Elect of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce, and he will become Chairman in January 1997. He is on the board of trustees for The Bolles School and the First Union Advisory Board, and he also serves with the Jacksonville Sports Development Authority and on the Board of the Chamber of Commerce.

Connell received a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Florida in 1970. He was born on October 7, 1948 in Orlando. He and his wife, Mary, have two sons, Andrew and Russell.

SELDIN

VICE PRESIDENT, TICKET OPERATIONS

Judy Seldin, the Jaguars' vice president of ticket operations, is responsible for the marketing and operations for all Jaguars tickets, including suites, club seats, season tickets, group sales and three-game packages.

Her planning helped enable Jaguars fans to begin purchasing season tickets within hours of the expansion announcement on November 30, 1993. She and her ticketing staff successfully coordinated and implemented the unprecedented one-month season ticket sellout that would follow.

The Jaguars ranked seventh in the NFL in attendance in 1995, and Seldin coordinated everything from seat assignments to ticket distribution for the expansion franchise.

Seldin worked for Touchdown Jacksonville! as a volunteer during the initial club seat drive in 1993. As vice president of startup operations, she led the team's ticket drive in addition to managing vendors and staff for such startup issues as computers and creative services.

Prior to moving to Jacksonville, Seldin spent six years working for the international management consulting firm of Booz, Allen & Hamilton and two years at The Boston Consulting Group.

Seldin attended the University of Pennsylvania, where she was



a Benjamin Franklin Scholar and was graduated magna cum laude in 1982 with degrees in economics and Soviet studies. In 1986 she received her master of management degree with a marketing major from Northwestern, where she was an Austin Scholar and a United Airlines Fellow.

Seldin was born on June 7, 1961 in Los Angeles. She and her husband David have three daughters, Abigail, Hannah and Sarah.

DAN

EDWARDS

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, COMMUNICATIONS

Dan Edwards is responsible for overseeing the Jaguars' media relations and community relations, as well as the team's publications.

Now in his 13th season in the NFL, Edwards was named executive director of communications on May 4, 1994. Formerly the public relations director for the Pittsburgh Steelers, he brought to the Jaguars 10 years of National Football League experience working with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Miami Dolphins and the league office.

After receiving a scholarship from NFL Charities and serving as a public relations intern in the NFL's New York office in 1984, Edwards spent the 1984 football season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins, who played in Super Bowl XIX that year. In 1985 Edwards joined the Steelers as assistant public relations director, and in January 1987 he was named public relations director.

In 1991, the Steelers' public relations department received the coveted Pete Rozelle Award, which is presented annually by the Pro Football Writers of America to the outstanding NFL public relations staff. Edwards has also worked for the NFL staff at 10 of the last 11 Super Bowls in addition to the 1990 Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL, Edwards worked in professional baseball, spending one season as an administrative assistant with the Eugene Emeralds, a single-A affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds. Edwards received his undergraduate degree in business administration/management from the University of Oregon in 1981 and a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University in 1984.

He was born January 15, 1959 in Denver, and he grew up in the Washington, D.C. area. He and his wife Tricia have two sons: Christian and Preston, and a daughter: Danielle.

Kim Dodson was named director of finance for the Jaguars on August 1, 1995.

She has been involved with the franchise since its inception while working as tax manager for Grill, Gilhuly, Prescott & Co.

Carroll was involved in the planning of seven Super Bowls. She participated in the planning of the 1992 World Bowl in Montreal and five American Bowls, as well as numerous league meetings.

Carroll received a degree in business administration from Adelphi University in 1987, where she earned four letters in basketball. A native of Bellmore, N.Y., Carroll has completed three New York Marathons. She was born March 30, 1965 in Long Island, N.Y.

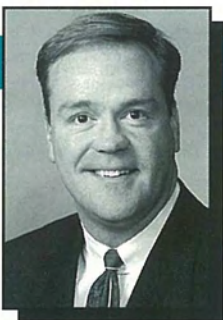
ROWAN

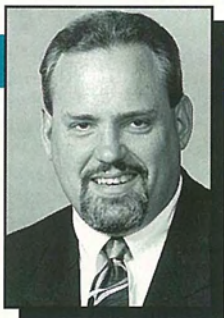
SWINDELL

A former cornerback with the Miami Dolphins, Lankford joined the Jaguars as director of player programs on January 11, 1995. He also coordinated the team's inaugural training camp at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

After retiring from football in 1992, Lankford worked for the Florida Marlins as sales manager and was responsible for season and group ticket sales, in addition to coordinating the team's community relations programs. He has worked as a volunteer in the Miami and Ft. Lauderdale communities with the Boys & Girls Clubs, The Miami Project to Cure Paralysis, The Cystic Fibrosis Association, ChildHelp USA and the Don Shula Scholarship Fund.

Lankford graduated from Penn State in 1982 with a degree in health planning and administration. He played 10 seasons for the Dolphins after being drafted in 1982. Lankford retired after the 1991 season with 13 career interceptions after starting in 78 games.

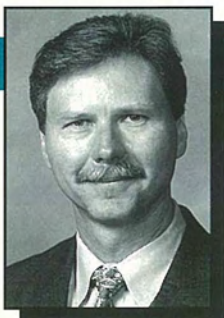
DIRECTOR, SECURITY

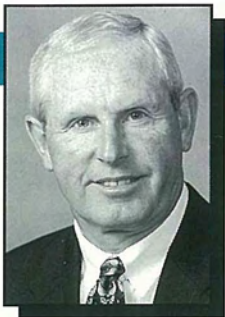

Tom Coughlin was named head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars on February 21, 1994. Twenty-two months later, on December 24, 1995 after the Jaguars had defeated the Cleveland Browns in the final game of their inaugural season, Coughlin ran off the field at Jacksonville

Municipal Stadium with the knowledge of what his team had accomplished in his first season as an NFL head coach — the Jaguars won more games than any previous NFL expansion team.

But he also left the field knowing that the season could have been better than the 4-12 final record ... and that much more work and dedication was ahead before he and the Jaguars would reach their goals ... winning seasons, the playoffs ... and eventually the Super Bowl.

Jaguars fans learned a lot about Coughlin in 1995 ... about his determination, his studious habits, his attention to detail and his tireless work schedule.

In 1995, that was all geared toward building a team. Coughlin took that task quite literally.

"Our entire focus has been the development of the 'team' concept," he says. "I believe that attitude determines success. And we wanted to instill in our players the correct attitude."

That attitude enabled the Jaguars to win four games under Coughlin's guidance, and to be competitive in nearly all of the others. In fact, the

Jaguars were in position to tie or take the lead late in the fourth quarter in 12 of their 16 games in 1995. They lost six games

by eight points or fewer, despite the fact that Coughlin was molding the second-youngest squad in the NFL. At the end of last season, the Jaguars' 53-man roster included 18 rookies and first-year players.

A veteran of 26 years in the coaching profession, Coughlin was previously a college head coach for seven seasons and an NFL assistant coach for seven.

He spent 1984 and '85 as the wide receivers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, and he was with the Green Bay Packers in 1986 and '87 as the receivers coach. He served with the New York Giants from 1988 to '90 as the receivers coach, contributing to the Super Bowl XXV victory over Buffalo in his last season with the Giants. In 1993, Coughlin was offered the opportunity to return to the Giants as head coach, but he declined the job so he could continue building the Boston College football program.

Coughlin's arrival in Jacksonville followed three seasons (1991-93) as head coach at Boston College, where he turned a struggling football program into a Top 20 team. Posting a 21-13-1 record in three seasons, Coughlin capped his Boston College tenure with a 9-3 record in 1993 which included eight consecutive wins, a 41-39 defeat of top-ranked Notre Dame and a victory over Virginia in the Carquest Bowl. His last Boston College team was ranked 13th in



the Associated Press poll and 12th in the *USA Today/CNN* coaches poll, despite beginning the season with an 0-2 start.

He led Boston College to an 8-2-1 record in 1992, including a Hall of Fame Bowl berth, after posting a 4-7 mark in his first season.

Coughlin began his coaching career in 1969 as a graduate assistant at Syracuse, his alma mater. The next season he began a four-year stint at Rochester Institute of Technology, where he served as head coach from 1970 to '73, putting together a record of 16-15-2. Coughlin returned to Syracuse under Frank Maloney in 1974 and held the position of offensive coordinator from 1977 to '80, directing an offense that led the Orangemen to a berth and victory in the 1979 Independence Bowl, Syracuse's first postseason appearance in 13 years.

In 1981 Coughlin went to Boston College for the first time, as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under Jack Bicknell. He helped the Eagles win their first bowl bid in 40 years while coaching Doug Flutie, the 1984 Heisman Trophy winner. In 1983, Coughlin's last season as a Boston College assistant coach, the team earned the Lambert-Meadowlands Trophy as Eastern Champion, the first won by the Eagles since 1942.

Coughlin's playing career began as a standout scholastic star at Waterloo (N.Y.) Central High School in his hometown. He attended Syracuse University, where he was a three-year letterman for legendary coach Ben Schwartzwalder from 1965 to '67. A wingback for the Orangemen, Coughlin played alongside All-America backs Larry Csonka and Floyd Little. As a senior in 1967, he broke the Syracuse single-season pass receiving record, which had stood since the 1950s. An excellent student, he also won Syracuse's Orange Key Award that year as the university's outstanding scholar athlete. He graduated in 1968 with a bachelor's degree in education, and in 1969 he received his master's degree in education.

Coughlin was born August 31, 1946 in Waterloo, N.Y. He and his wife, Judy, have two daughters, Keli and Katie, and two sons, Tim and Brian.

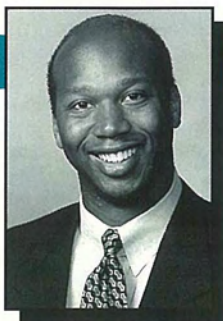

Joe Baker is the Jaguars' assistant special teams coach, working under special teams coordinator Larry Pasquale, in addition to serving as administrative assistant to head coach Tom Coughlin. Baker, 27, was named to his post on February 25, 1995 after having served as the Jaguars' manager of football operations since June, 1994.

One of the youngest assistant coaches in the NFL, he is directly involved in all areas of special teams, including the preparation of game plans and sideline coaching.

A wide receiver at Princeton, Baker was on the school's Ivy League champion team in 1989. He has worked in coaching and administrative positions for the last five years. In 1991 Baker was the player personnel coordinator for the World League's Birmingham Fire.

Baker also served as a consultant and scout for the World League until joining the coaching staff at Samford University in Birmingham, Ala. in January 1993. While at Samford he coached running backs and wide receivers in addition to his duties in recruiting.

Pete Carmichael joined the Jaguars as wide receivers coach on March 3, 1994 after 13 consecutive seasons at Boston College (18 overall), the last three as wide receivers coach under Tom Coughlin. Carmichael, 55, is in his 32nd year in coaching.

He is responsible for the development of the Jaguars young wide receiving corps, which this season includes three players (Willie Jackson, Jimmy Smith and Curtis Marsh) who had never caught an NFL pass prior to 1995, in addition to four drafted rookies. Carmichael also assists in coaching the punt and punt return teams.

Carmichael began his coaching career in 1965 at Virginia Military Institute, followed by stints at New Hampshire (1967), Columbia (1974-77) and on Joe Yukica's Boston College staff (1968-72). He was head coach at Trenton State College in 1973. After three years as an assistant at Columbia, he earned his second head coaching assignment from 1977 to '80 at the Merchant Marine Academy. In 1981 he returned to Boston College to begin a 10-year stint as defensive backs coach under Jack Bicknell.

When Coughlin took over the Boston College program in 1991 he retained Carmichael to coach the team's wide receivers. Carmichael coached in six bowl games — Citrus, Liberty, Cotton, Carquest and twice in the Hall of Fame game.

Carmichael played one year as a quarterback at Dayton (1961) before transferring to Montclair State College, where he continued his playing career. He graduated from Montclair State in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He was born March 4, 1941 in Plainfield, N.J. He attended North Plainfield High School, where he lettered three years in both football and baseball.

Carmichael and his wife, Elaine, have two daughters, Layni Ratcliffe, 28, and Kathleen, 26, who live in Massachusetts, and a son, Pete, 24, who lives with his wife, Tina, in Ruston, La., where he is an assistant football coach at Louisiana Tech.

Randy Edsall joined Tom Coughlin's Jaguars staff on March 3, 1994. Now in his 17th year in coaching, Edsall was an assistant to Coughlin at Boston College for three seasons.



In 1995, Edsall had two veteran cornerbacks in Mickey Washington and Vinnie Clark, but he had to develop cohesion at

safety with a group of young and relatively inexperienced players. The secondary didn't allow an opposing passer to throw for more than 300 yards in a game until the final weekend of the season, which was still a Jaguars victory.

A former quarterback at Syracuse, Edsall began his coaching career at his alma mater. He served as a graduate assistant coach at Syracuse from 1980 to '82, and in 1983 was named to Dick MacPherson's fulltime staff as running backs coach. He coached running backs in 1983-84 and 1986, and served as tight ends coach in 1985. In 1987, Edsall became defensive backs coach for the Orangemen for three seasons and was also the school's recruiting coordinator for the 1989 and '90 seasons.

In 1991 Edsall was hired by Coughlin at Boston College. He played for Coughlin from 1976 to '79 when Edsall was a quarterback for Syracuse and Coughlin was the team's quarterback coach and offensive coordinator. As a senior at Syracuse in 1979, Edsall received the Joseph Alexander Award for excellence in football, scholarship and citizenship. He graduated in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education, and in 1982 earned a master's degree in health and physical education.

Edsall was born August 27, 1958 in York, Pa. He and his wife, Eileen, have a daughter, Alexi, and a son, Corey.

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Kevin Gilbride is one of the most innovative and respected offensive coordinators in the NFL, and is also responsible for coaching the Jaguars' quarterbacks. He was named the Jaguars' offensive coordinator on January 14, 1995.

Last season, Gilbride developed Mark Brunell from an inexperienced quarterback who had played in just two previous NFL games into the top-ranked passer ever for an expansion team. The Jaguars' offense, despite not having the same lineup twice all season, scored an average of 17.2 points per game, second-highest ever among previous NFL expansion teams.

The 45-year-old Gilbride is a veteran of 22 years in coaching, including seven seasons in the NFL. He was the assistant head coach/offense for the Houston Oilers in 1993 and '94 after serving four seasons as the Oilers' offensive coordinator. Under Gilbride, the Oilers' offense ranked first in the NFL in passing yards from 1990 through '92 and was third in 1993. For four consecutive seasons (1990-93), the Oilers ranked among the NFL's top three teams in total offense (No. 1 in 1990), and entering the 1994 campaign the Oilers had scored more points over a four-year span than 26 of the other 27 NFL teams. During that same span, the Oilers also ranked among the NFL's top five clubs in third-down efficiency and first downs.

A former quarterback and tight end for Southern Connecticut State, Gilbride began his coaching career in 1974 at Idaho State. He also had stops as defensive coordinator at Tufts (1976-77) and American International (1978-79) before gaining his first head coaching job at Southern Connecticut State (1980-84). While at SCSU, Gilbride posted a 35-14-2 record and was named New England Coach of the Year

in 1983 and NCAA Division II Coach of the Year (1982-83).

In 1985 and '86 Gilbride was with the Ottawa Rough Riders in the Canadian Football League, the first season as quarterbacks/receivers coach before being elevated to offensive coordinator in 1986. He then went back to the college ranks at East Carolina as passing game coordinator in 1987 and offensive coordinator in 1988 prior to joining the Oilers.

Gilbride was born August 27, 1951 in New Haven, Conn. He graduated from Southern Connecticut State University with a degree in physical education and received his master's degree in sports administration from Idaho State. He and his wife, Deborah, have two daughters, Kelly and Kristen, and a son, Kevin.

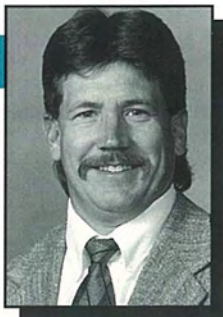

Jeff Hurd was named the Jaguars' assistant strength and conditioning coach on March 12, 1995. He serves as the assistant to Jerry Palmieri, and he also assists the defense with quality control.

Hurd previously coached strength and conditioning at five colleges and with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a graduate assistant at Fort Hays (Kan.) State in 1984 and the head strength and conditioning coach at Delta State in 1985 and '86. Hurd served as Clemson's assistant strength coach in 1986 and '87 and was the head strength coach at Western Michigan from 1987 to '93.

He spent three training camps with the Kansas City Chiefs from 1990 to '92, and was a strength and conditioning intern with the Chiefs in 1993 and '94. Prior to joining the Jaguars, he was the head strength coach at Tulsa.

Jerald Ingram was named to the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as running backs coach at Boston College under Tom Coughlin. Ingram, 35, is in his 13th year of coaching.



Ingram is responsible for the development of the Jaguars' running game, which, in 1995, featured five backs who had totaled only 11 NFL starts between them entering the season. That group of runners, however, helped the Jaguars rank 17th in the league in rushing and ninth in average gain per carry. Ingram also helps coach the team's kick returners.

Following his college days as a running back at Michigan, Ingram was a graduate assistant at Michigan in 1984. In 1985 he joined the Ball State coaching staff as tight ends coach, followed by five seasons (1986-90) as running backs coach. In Ingram's last three seasons at Ball State, the team posted a 22-10-2 record, the best among the nine Mid-American Conference schools.

In 1991, Ingram joined Coughlin's Boston College staff, where he coached 1992 Big East rushing champion Chuckie Dukes and Darnell Cambell, the NCAA's third-leading scorer in 1993.

Ingram earned three letters and was a member of five bowl teams as a fullback for Michigan from 1979 to '84. He played for the Wolverines' two Big Ten champion squads that advanced to the Rose Bowl, in addition to playing in the Sugar, Gator and Bluebonnet Bowls. Ingram graduated from Michigan in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in general studies.

Ingram was born December 24, 1960 in Beaver, Pa. He and his wife, Kathleen, live in Jacksonville.

JAURON

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

NFL: 21ST SEASON

JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON



As defensive coordinator of the Jaguars in their inaugural season, Dick Jauron oversaw a unit that allowed an average of 25.3 points per game, second-best ever among previous NFL expansion teams.

Jauron, 45, was named defensive coordinator of the Jaguars on January 11, 1995. He is the team's only coach who also played in the NFL. The 1996 season is his 21st in the NFL, including eight as a player and 13 in coaching.

Before joining the Jaguars, Jauron was defensive backs coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1986 to '94. In his nine years with the Packers, Jauron worked under three different head coaches. He joined the organization in 1986 under Forrest Gregg, and was retained when Lindy Infante took over in 1988 and in 1992 when Mike Holmgren was named Green Bay's head coach. The Packers reached the playoffs each of Jauron's last two years, and in his nine seasons in Green Bay, the defense made 168 interceptions in 143 games.

A former NFL defensive back, Jauron began his coaching career in 1985 with the Buffalo Bills under Hank Bullough. The following season he moved to Green Bay to join Gregg's staff, along with Tom Coughlin. Coughlin and Jauron were together on the Packers' coaching staff for the 1986 and '87 seasons.

Jauron was drafted by the Detroit Lions in the fourth round of the 1973 draft. He played for the Lions through 1977, making the Pro Bowl in 1974. In 1978 Jauron was waived by the Lions, but he

signed with the Cincinnati Bengals six days later and continued his career in Cincinnati until suffering a knee injury during the 1980 season. By the end of his eight-year playing career Jauron had made 26 interceptions, including six as a Bengals starter in 1979, and he returned two for touchdowns.

Jauron received a degree in history from Yale, where he played running back and still holds the school's all-time record for career rushing yards with 2,947 yards.

Jauron was born October 7, 1950 in Peoria, Ill. He and his wife, Gail, have two daughters, Kacy and Amy.

Mike Maser joined the Jaguars' staff on March 3, 1994 following 13 seasons at Boston College, the last three under Tom Coughlin. Maser, 49, is a veteran of 27 seasons in coaching.

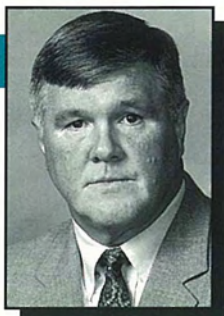
In 1995, Maser coached an offensive line that featured two rookies — Tony Boselli and Brian DeMarco — at tackle, but it was a unit that improved greatly from the first game to the season finale. The offensive line allowed only six sacks in the final three games, a streak in which the running game had three of its nine 100-yard games and the passing game had two of its three best outings.

A guard in college, Maser began his coaching career in 1969 as a student assistant at the University of Buffalo. In 1970, he coached for one year at Darien High School in Darien, Conn. A service veteran, Maser coached at the U.S. Military Academy Prep School at Fort Belvoir, Va. in 1971 and '72. In 1973, he was the assistant offensive line coach at Marshall. From 1974 to '78, Maser served as offensive coordinator and head of recruiting for Bluefield State College in West Virginia.

In 1979 and '80, Maser was an assistant under Jack Bicknell at Maine, and in 1981 he joined Bicknell's staff at Boston College. When Coughlin was named head coach at Boston College in 1991 he retained Maser as offensive line coach. During Maser's tenure at Boston College, the team played in six bowl games.

Maser attended the University of Buffalo, where he was a three-year starter at guard. He graduated in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation. In 1974 he received a master's degree in physical education from Marshall University.

Maser and his wife, Barbara, have a daughter, Brigitte, and two sons, Greg and Brian. Mike was born March 2, 1947 in Clayton, N.Y.



NICK**NICOLAU****TIGHT ENDS COACH****NFL: 17TH SEASON****JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON**

Nick Nicolau was named the Jaguars' tight ends coach on February 2, 1995 following three years as the offensive coordinator for the Indianapolis Colts. He is a veteran of 17 seasons as an NFL assistant coach.



In 1995, Nicolau lost his starting tight end (Derek Brown) to a season-ending injury in the final preseason game. His starter for 15 games was Rich Griffith, who previously had seen action in only three pro games, and his top receiver was rookie Pete Mitchell, who joined the team just seven days before the season opener. Mitchell caught 41 passes, second among rookie tight ends, and Griffith caught 16 passes and had the team's best average per reception.

Nicolau, 63, began his NFL coaching career in 1980 as running backs coach for the New Orleans Saints. He held the same position with the Denver Broncos the following year and was on the Broncos' staff through the 1987 season. During Nicolau's tenure in Denver, the Broncos played in Super Bowls XXI and XXII.

In 1988, Nicolau served as wide receivers coach for the Los Angeles Raiders before joining the Buffalo Bills in 1989. He spent three seasons with the Bills as receivers coach, helping direct the team to appearances in Super Bowls XXV and XXVI.

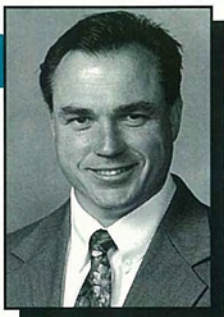
Nicolau's 38-year coaching career includes two years at the high school level and 17 at the college level, with coaching stints at Southern Connecticut State (1960), Springfield College (1961), the University of Bridgeport (1962-69), Massachusetts (1970), Connecticut (1971-72), Kentucky (1973-75) and Kent State (1976).

In 1977, Nicolau coached with the Canadian Football League's Hamilton Tiger-Cats before spending the 1978 and '79 seasons as director of player personnel/running backs coach for the Montreal Alouettes. Montreal made Grey Cup appearances both seasons that Nicolau was on the staff.

A native of New Bedford, Mass., Nicolau was born May 5, 1933. He was a running back at Southern Connecticut from 1951 to '53 and 1956. He earned a master's degree from Indiana University and a doctorate from Springfield College. Nick and his wife, Eleanor, have six children: Tracey, Duane, Shari, Vickie, Wendy and Randy.

JERRY**PALMIERI****STRENGTH AND
CONDITIONING COACH****NFL: 2ND SEASON****JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON**

Jerry Palmieri was named strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars on January 11, 1995. He previously served as director of strength and conditioning operations at Boston College since August 1993.



Under Palmieri's tutelage, Jaguars players have shown marked improvement in both speed and strength the last two years. The team has 30 players who can bench press more than 400 pounds, 35 players who can safe squat 700 pounds or more, and 29 players who can vertical jump at least 30 inches. In the 1996 off-season conditioning program, the team's players, on average, were 11/100ths of a second faster in the 40-yard dash and showed improvements of 26 pounds in the bench press, 105 pounds in the safe squat and 1.37 inches in the vertical jump.

Prior to his stint at Boston College, Palmieri spent five years overseeing the strength and conditioning program at Kansas State. He began his career as a strength coach in 1982 at North Carolina, followed by three years (1984-87) at Oklahoma State.

In addition to his coaching experience, Palmieri has taught college physical education classes and written articles for national publications about strength and conditioning. He has also produced videos on strength and speed training and is active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

A 1980 graduate of Montclair State, Palmieri received a master's degree in exercise physiology from the University of North Carolina in 1983. SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

NFL: 17TH SEASON

JAGUARS: 2ND SEASON



Larry Pasquale is one of the top special teams coaches in the NFL, and last season was one of six nominated for the Special Teams Coach of the Year Award.

A veteran of 17 years as an NFL coach, Pasquale (pronounced pas-KWALL-ee) was named the Jaguars' special teams coordinator on January 21, 1995. Last season he molded a group of players who had never played together before into units that ranked among the best in the NFL. The Jaguars led the NFL in net punting, ranked fifth in opponents' punt return average and broke the previous record for points scored by an expansion kicker. In addition, Pasquale's special teams recovered four of nine onside kicks in 1995, whereas the NFL's other 29 teams combined for only four onside kick recoveries all season. The entire league had 49 onside attempts; the Jaguars had nine of those.

During his coaching career, Pasquale's special teams units have produced 35 touchdowns in the regular season and preseason, while allowing only four blocked punts in 17 years. When he was named special teams coordinator for the Eagles in 1992, he inherited the NFL's 27th-ranked unit, but he transformed it in one season to a fifth-place ranking. That unit scored two touchdowns.

Pasquale, 55, is in his 34th year in coaching, which includes four seasons at the high-school level, 10 in college and two in the CFL. After serving as wide receivers and special teams coach for the Montreal Alouettes in 1978 and '79, Pasquale entered the NFL in 1979 as special teams coach for the Detroit Lions. In 1980 he joined

the New York Jets as wide receivers coach, then he took over the Jets' special teams the following year for the next nine seasons.

With the Jets, Pasquale led an impressive run of high special teams rankings. The Jets had the NFL's top-ranked punt-coverage teams in 1981 and from 1986 to '88, as well as a second-place ranking in 1989. In 1984, the Jets also had the top-ranked kickoff return team. Under Pasquale, the Jets had an 80 percent success rate on fake field goals and fake punts while never allowing an opponent to convert a faked kick.

In 1990 and '91 Pasquale coached San Diego's special teams, which he boosted to the top ranking among all NFL teams in kickoff return average and punt coverage in his first season. In 1990, he was selected the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers.

Pasquale played college football at the University of Bridgeport (Conn.), where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education. He has also completed post-graduate work at Columbia and Fairfield University. Pasquale was born March 21, 1941 in Brooklyn, N.Y. He and his wife, Joann, have two daughters, Lisa and Lauren, a son, Darrell, and a son-in-law, Ben.

John Pease was named defensive line coach on January 12, 1995 following nine seasons as defensive line coach for the New Orleans Saints. Pease, 52, is a veteran of 26 years in coaching, a career that also includes 13 years at the college level and three in the USFL.

Last season, the Jaguars' defensive line allowed only 125.2 rushing yards per game and ranked 17th in the league in average yards allowed per carry. Pease blended together a line that featured veterans Jeff Lageman, Kelvin Pritchett and Joel Smeenge with younger, less-experienced players who gained valuable playing experience. He also assists in coaching the field goal block unit.

Pease began his fulltime coaching career at Fullerton College in 1970, serving four years there as defensive coordinator. He also had stints at Long Beach State (1974-76), Utah (1977) and Washington (1978-82).

From 1983 to '85, he was on the coaching staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL under head coach Jim Mora. The Stars won the USFL championship in 1984 and '85. When Mora was named head coach of the Saints, Pease joined him in New Orleans, where he had been from 1986 until joining the Jaguars last year. The Saints were a playoff team three of Pease's last five seasons.

A graduate of the University of Utah, Pease began college at Fullerton Junior College, where he was a two-time Junior College All-America selection. He transferred to Utah and was named All-Western Athletic Conference as a senior wingback. From 1965 to '67, Pease served in the military in Puerto Rico and coached at Antilles High School. In 1968 and '69, he was a graduate assistant at Utah prior to moving to Fullerton the next year.

Pease was born October 14, 1943 in Pittsburgh. He was on the training camp roster of the Los Angeles Rams after his final collegiate season. He and his wife, Chris, have two daughters, Tracy and Kristen.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH

Lucious Selmon, a former All-America defensive lineman for Oklahoma, was named outside linebackers coach on January 17, 1995. Selmon, 44, joined the Jaguars after serving as outside linebackers coach at Oklahoma, where he coached the previous 19 years.

This year he coaches the Jaguars' No. 1 draft choice Kevin Hardy, the team's highest-selected defensive player ever.

The oldest of the three famed Selmon brothers who were all consensus All-Americans at Oklahoma, Selmon graduated in 1974 with a degree in special education. He was a teammate with his younger brothers, Dewey and Lee Roy, for just one season but was a letterman from 1971 to '73. As a senior in 1973, Selmon served as team captain and was a finalist for the Heisman Trophy, runner-up for the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award, Defensive Player of the year in the Big Eight Conference and Chevrolet Player of the year.

After his outstanding college career, Selmon played in the World Football League for the Memphis Southmen in 1974 and '75. He returned to Oklahoma in 1976 to begin his coaching career as an assistant on Barry Switzer's staff. From 1976 to '83 Selmon was the school's defensive line coach before serving as outside linebackers/defensive ends coach from 1984 to '94. Selmon coached under Switzer for 13 seasons and was retained on head coach Gary Gibbs' Oklahoma staff in 1989.

In 1989 and '90, Selmon spent training camps working with the coaching staff of the Denver Broncos. During that time he helped coach the Broncos' linebackers and defensive ends.

Selmon was born March 15, 1951 in Muskogee, Okla. He and his wife, Clarice, have a son, Lucious III.

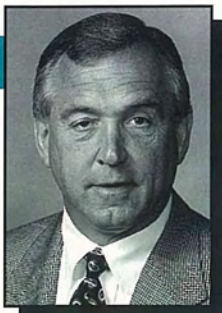

Steve Szabo joined the Jaguars coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as defensive coordinator at Boston College. A veteran of 25 seasons in coaching at the college level, Szabo also served three years as a college head coach.

As inside linebacker coach in 1995, Szabo tutored Bryan Schwartz, a rookie who led the Jaguars with 161 tackles, despite starting only nine games. The Jaguars' inside linebackers accounted for more than 33 percent of the team's total tackles in 1995.

A former college running back and defensive back, Szabo began his coaching career in 1969 at Johns Hopkins followed by stops at Toledo (1970), Iowa (1971-73), Syracuse (1974-76), Iowa State (1977-78), Ohio State (1979-81), Western Michigan (1982-84), Northern Iowa (1988) and Colorado State (1989-90). From 1985 to '87 Szabo was head coach at Edinboro University in Pennsylvania.

After serving two seasons as defensive coordinator under Earl Bruce at Colorado State, Szabo joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff in 1991. In all, Szabo has coached in a total of nine bowl games representing five different colleges.

As a halfback and defensive back at the United States Naval Academy from 1961 to '64, Szabo was a teammate of Heisman Trophy winner Roger Staubach. As a junior in 1963, Szabo played on the Navy team that ranked second in the nation and played for the national championship in the Cotton Bowl. He also played lacrosse for three national championship teams at the Naval Academy. Szabo graduated in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in naval science. After graduation he was stationed at Quantico from 1965 to '69, where he continued playing football for the Marines.

Szabo was born September 11, 1943 in Evergreen Park, Ill. He has two children from a previous marriage, Christine and Mike, and he and his wife, Patti, have a son, Zack.

Utilizing the services of the marketing experts from NFL Properties' Creative Services division and with the partners of Touchdown Jacksonville!, the enthusiastic fans of Jacksonville finally had a name to call what just less than two years later would become the 30th franchise to join the NFL.

Although thousands of entries were received when a contest was held to name the team, a majority of hundreds agreed with the name "Jacksonville Jaguars." Of those who submitted the name Jaguars, Jacksonville resident Ray Potts was randomly selected as the contest winner and for his contribution was provided a trip to the Super Bowl that year.

Considered the most aggressive and feared big cats in North America, the Jacksonville Jaguars look to pay tribute to their namesake in championship form.

REIPRISH

DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING

Rick Reiprish has been the Jaguars' director of college scouting since May 15, 1994 after serving 10 years with the Seattle Seahawks, the last five as Eastern scout supervisor.

A veteran of 17 years of NFL scouting, Reiprish has the responsibility of directing all the Jaguars' college scouting efforts. Working with head coach Tom Coughlin and a staff of six scouts, Reiprish's first two college drafts for the Jaguars have been widely recognized as among the best in the NFL. Those drafts have brought to the Jaguars players such as Tony Boselli, Bryan Schwartz and Brian DeMarco in 1995 and Kevin Hardy and Tony Brackens this year.

Reiprish supervises the geographical distribution of scouts throughout the country, including the personal evaluation of hundreds of players. In addition, he is responsible for the organization and administration of the draft as it pertains to college prospects.

Reiprish began his scouting career as a Southeast area scout with BLESTO from 1979 to '82. From 1982 to '84 he was a personnel scout for the Kansas City Chiefs before going to Seattle as an area scout in 1984. He was named Eastern scout supervisor in 1989.

Reiprish coached receivers and running backs at Austin Peay State University from 1973 to '76 before going to East Tennessee in 1977, where he coached the offensive backfield and quarterbacks. In 1978 he was the assistant offensive line coach at North Alabama.

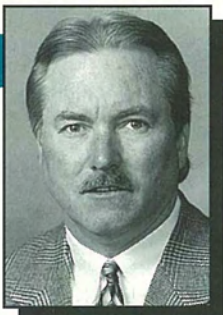
DIRECTOR, PRO PERSONNEL

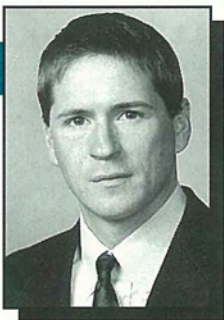
MIKULA

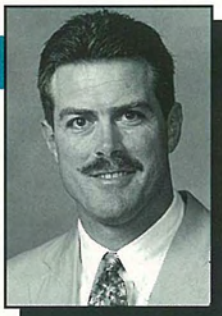
COLLEGE SCOUT

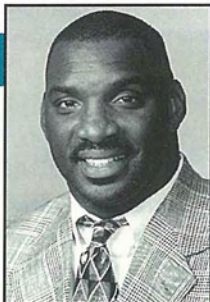
COLLEGE SCOUT

He was born January 19, 1971 in Columbus, Ga. and raised in Eufaula, Ala.



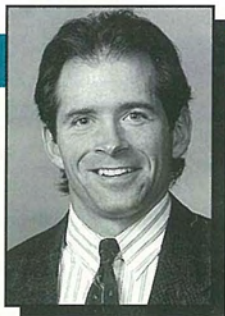

The National Anthem was sung by Boyz II Men and included a jet flyover, and the halftime entertainment was a dance and song-filled extravaganza by 1993 Miss America Leanza Cornett that included two card stunts — much like at a Super Bowl. In the game, the Oilers jumped out to a 7-0 lead when they took the opening kickoff and marched 78 yards downfield, scoring on a 4-yard pass from Chris Chandler to Haywood Jeffires. Al Del Greco later added a 19-yard field goal for the Oilers. Mike Hollis scored the first points in Jaguars history when he booted a 26-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter. Mark Brunell replaced Steve Beuerlein at quarterback and had a chance to tie the game with less than a minute left, but needed an 82-yard drive to do so. However, an interception with 55 seconds to play ended hopes of a comeback and left the Jaguars with an 0-1 record.

However, the Jaguars failed to recover any of three attempted onside kicks and never got closer than 10 points.

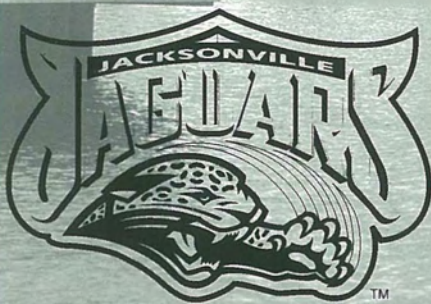

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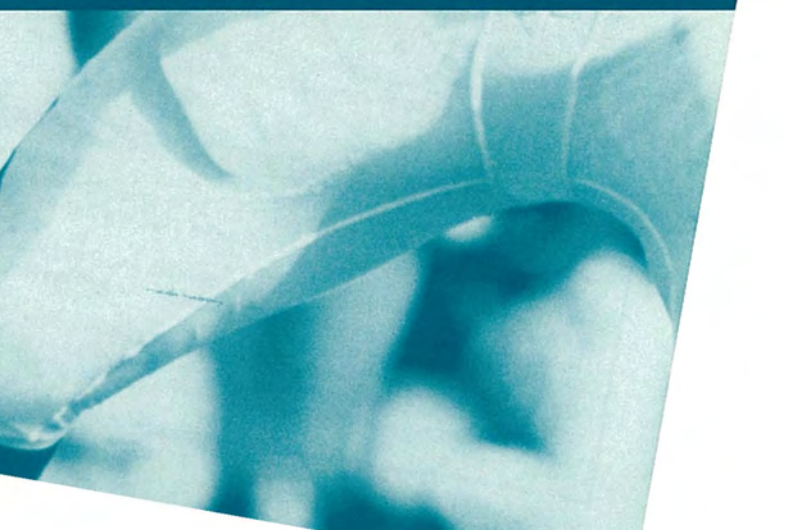

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1989

AUG. 17 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, a partnership to lead the community effort to win an NFL franchise is formed. The group, led by Tom Petway, includes Jeb Bush, Hamilton Jordan, and Arthur "Chick" Sherrer.

1990

APRIL 4 — National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue announces that the League will expand by two teams no later than the 1993 season.

JULY 26 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1993 season.

1991

FEB. 12 — In a unanimous vote, the Jacksonville City Council votes to commit \$60 million to renovate the Gator Bowl contingent upon the City being awarded an expansion football team.

MAY 15 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1994 season, contrary to the July 26, 1990 vote.

MAY 22 — At the owners' meeting in Minneapolis, a plan is approved that will add two expansion teams to the League for the 1994 season.

MAY 30 — Florida Governor Lawton Chiles signs into law the Professional Sports Facilities Program, a state statute that provides state funding of up to \$2 million for 30 years for funding new sports facilities that operate in the state of Florida.

JUNE 25 — The lease that includes the recently approved \$60 million package to renovate the Gator Bowl is approved by City Council.

JULY 17 — The NFL announces that it will accept applications for expansion teams.

SEPT. 16 — The City of Jacksonville files an expansion application with the League, one of 11 cities to apply.

OCT. 1 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. submits its ownership application to the League. The nine-member partnership includes local businessman and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. general partner Tom Petway. J. Wayne Weaver is one of the eight limited partners, along with Jeb Bush, Lawrence DuBow, Earl Hadlow, Preston Haskell, Sandy McArthur, Charles Towers and Ron Weaver.

OCT. 24 — David Seldin is named president and chief operating officer of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

DEC. 6 — Touchdown Jacksonville! Ltd. announces that the team name will be the Jacksonville Jaguars if an expansion team is awarded.

DEC. 10 — Touchdown Jacksonville! Ltd. and City officials make the group's first presentation to commissioner Tagliabue and other NFL officials in New York.

1992

MARCH 17 — At the League's annual winter meeting in Phoenix, the list of expansion candidate cities is cut from 11 to seven. Jacksonville is one of the seven; Nashville, San Antonio, Raleigh-Durham, and Honolulu are eliminated.

MAY 19 — The five finalists in the expansion race are named: Jacksonville, Charlotte, Baltimore, Memphis, St. Louis. Sacramento and Oakland are eliminated.

OCT. 20 — Citing complications surrounding the ongoing labor situation, the NFL votes to delay the expansion announcement to its 1993 fall meeting in Chicago and for expansion teams to begin play in 1995.

JAN. 6 — A seven-year Collective Bargaining Agreement is reached between the League and its players. With the labor situation resolved, a new expansion timetable is expected in March.

MARCH 18 — J. Wayne Weaver is introduced as managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville! Ltd.

MARCH 23 — The expansion race is officially resumed by the NFL.

APRIL 12 — After a tour with Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. representatives, NFL officials indicate that additional renovations beyond those already planned would be necessary to renovate the Gator Bowl to NFL standards.

JUNE 25 — Negotiations for a new lease between Jacksonville Mayor Ed Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. break down.

JULY 1 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. resume negotiations and agree on a plan that caps stadium renovation costs at \$112 million and protects the city from cost overruns. Mayor Austin sends the lease to City Council for approval.

JULY 21 — The Jacksonville City Council fails to approve the newly negotiated \$112 million stadium proposal. As a result, Weaver announces that Touchdown Jacksonville! Ltd. is ending its bid for an NFL expansion franchise.

JULY 22 — Touchdown Jacksonville! Ltd. closes offices and club seat and executive suite deposits are returned.

AUG. 20 — The *Florida Times-Union* reports that negotiations between Touchdown Jacksonville! Ltd. and the City have resumed, encouraged by the NFL and at the request of Times-Union publisher Carl Cannon and Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert.

AUG. 21 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville! reach an agreement on a new stadium lease capping stadium renovation costs at \$121 million, \$53 million to come from City funds and \$68 million from team and team related sources. As project manager, Touchdown Jacksonville! assumes responsibility for any cost overruns.

AUG. 22 — Facing the challenge of selling 9,000 club seats, a committee of civic and business leaders is formed called NFL Now!, headed by Carl Cannon and Adam Herbert.

AUG. 23 — The City Council votes 14-4 to approve the new lease.

AUG. 24 — With the new public/private partnership, Weaver and Mayor Austin meet with commissioner Tagliabue, who welcomes Jacksonville back into the expansion race.

AUG. 25 — NFL Now! begins a 10-day drive to sell the required club seats.

SEPT. 3 — Carl Cannon of NFL Now! announces that 9,737 club seats have been sold, a number that rises to 10,112 once all the applications are processed.

SEPT. 21 — Weaver and other Touchdown Jacksonville! officials make their presentation to the NFL finance and expansion committees.

OCT. 26 — In Chicago, League owners select the Carolina Panthers for an expansion team but delay the announcement of the second expansion city.

NOV. 30 (4:12 p.m. ET) — In Chicago, Jacksonville is awarded the 30th franchise in the National Football League.

DEC. 1 — A victory celebration in the Gator Bowl, as 25,000 Jaguars fans battle cold and rain to welcome Wayne Weaver, Jaguars officials, city officials and community leaders upon their return from Chicago.

1994

JAN. 3 — Demolition of the Gator Bowl begins.

JAN 6 — The Jaguars announce a season ticket sellout for their first three seasons. Over 56,000 season tickets are sold through Dec. 31, just one month after the awarding of the team.

FEB. 21 — Tom Coughlin is hired as head coach of the Jaguars. The former Boston College head coach and assistant with the New York Giants brings six of his assistants with him.

AUG. 24 — The Jaguars announce that they will hold their first training camp in 1995 at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

SEPT. 14 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Inc. is established, under the direction of Delores Barr Weaver and Dr. Gregory S. Gross.

SEPT. 28 — The NFL announces specific plans to stock the expansion teams.

NOV. 1 — The Jaguars hold their first official workout at Bishop Kenny High School. Thirteen offensive linemen work out in front of 1,500 fans.

NOV. 2 — The NFL announces its plans for division alignment, putting the Jaguars in the AFC Central Division along with the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, Houston Oilers and Pittsburgh Steelers. The Carolina Panthers will join the NFC Western Division.

DEC. 15 — The Jaguars sign the first 10 players in team history: WR Shannon Baker, LB Hillary Butler, DE Ferric Collons, OL Greg Huntington, RB Randy Jordan, DE Ernie Logan, OT Rickie Shaw, DE Jason Simmons, DE Ricky Sutton, DE Chris Williams.

1995

JAN. 12 — Dick Jauron is hired as defensive coordinator. Jauron had spent nine years with the Green Bay Packers as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

JAN. 14 — Kevin Gilbride is introduced as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He had previously been the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers.

JAN. 20 — The Jaguars unveil their new logo and team uniform.

JAN. 21 — Larry Pasquale is hired as the team's special teams coordinator.

FEB. 14 — The Jaguars draft 31 players in the NFL Expansion Draft. The first player selected is Arizona quarterback Steve Beuerlein. During the draft, the Jaguars acquire such veteran players as Desmond Howard, Keith Goganious, Darren Carrington, Reggie Cobb, Eugene Chung and Derek Brown.

FEB. 28 — The Jaguars sign their first unrestricted free agents: guard Shawn Bouwens and defensive linemen Joel Smeenge and Don Davey. Within 15 days, six more unrestricted free-agents are signed: cornerback Vinnie Clark, punter Bryan Barker, cornerback Mickey Washington, defensive tackle Kelvin Pritchett, defensive end Jeff Lageman and center Dave Widell.

MARCH 23 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation awards its first grants to eight local organizations totaling \$139,850.

APRIL 21 — The first trade in Jaguars history: Jacksonville acquires quarterback Mark Brunell from the Green Bay Packers in exchange for draft picks in the third and fifth rounds of the 1995 draft.

APRIL 22 — Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli becomes the Jaguars' first-ever selection in the college draft, the sec-

ond overall pick. Later in the first round, running back James Stewart is chosen 19th overall after the Jaguars trade up in the round. The Jaguars select a total of 10 players during the two-day draft.

APRIL 28-30 — The first minicamp is held on the practice fields adjacent to the new stadium.

JUNE 1 — The Jaguars sign their entire first class of draft choices at the same time, an event unprecedented in NFL history.

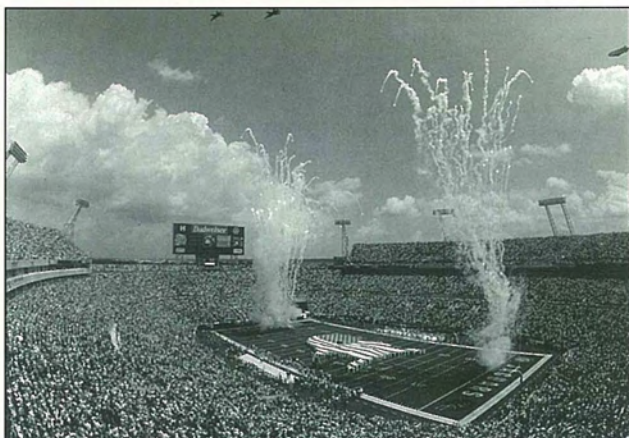
JUNE 2-8 — The second minicamp is held, with one practice session being conducted in front of 2,500 fans at Bishop Kenny High School.

JUNE 10 — "The Roar of the Jaguars," the team's cheerleaders squad, is introduced at The Landing in downtown Jacksonville. The squad includes 36 cheerleaders.

JULY 8 — The Jaguars' first-ever training camp opens at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

JULY 29 — The Jaguars play their first preseason contest in the Pro Football Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, but lose to the Carolina Panthers 20-14 when a last-minute drive ends at the Panthers' two-yard line.

AUG. 18 — Jacksonville Municipal Stadium opens, as the Jaguars host

their first home game. However, they lose to the St. Louis Rams 27-10.

SEPT. 3 — The Jaguars play their inaugural game in front of 72,363 fans but lose to the Houston Oilers 10-3.

OCT. 1 — The Jaguars win their first game 17-16 at Houston in the fifth week of the regular season — the third-fastest first victory in NFL expansion history and the fastest to earn a win on the road.

OCT. 8 — The Jaguars defeat AFC Central rival Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 for their first home victory, the only time in NFL history an expansion team has ever defeated a team that would go on to play in the Super Bowl the same season.

OCT. 8 — The Jaguars record their third win of the season at Cleveland with a 23-15 victory.

DEC. 3 — Jaguars wide receiver Jimmy Smith scores a team-record three touchdowns three different ways at Denver — on a blocked punt, off a lateral on a kickoff return and on a pass reception — an extreme rarity in NFL history.

DEC. 24 — The Jaguars break the previous record for victories by an expansion team with a last-second 24-21 win over Cleveland in the Browns' final game in their 55-year history.

1996

FEB. 18 — Pittsburgh Steelers offensive tackle Leon Searcy becomes

the first unrestricted free agent to sign with the Jaguars in 1996.

MAR. 1 — Free agent Eddie Robinson signs from Houston, bolstering a young linebacker corps.

MAR. 2 — Keenan McCardell, Cleveland's leading wide receiver in 1995, signs a free-agent contract with the Jaguars.

APR. 13 — John Jurkovic signs a free-agent contract with the Jaguars after five seasons with the Packers.

APR. 20 — Illinois outside linebacker Kevin Hardy is selected with the Jaguars' first pick in the 1996 college draft, the second overall player chosen. By the early third round, the Jaguars also draft defensive end Tony Brackens, center Michael Cheever and defensive back Aaron Beasley.

APR. 26-28 — The Jaguars hold their second rookie/veteran mini-camp.

JUNE 3-7 — The Jaguars hold a five-day voluntary pre-camp.

JULY 18 — The Jaguars open their second training camp, their first at the stadium practice facility at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

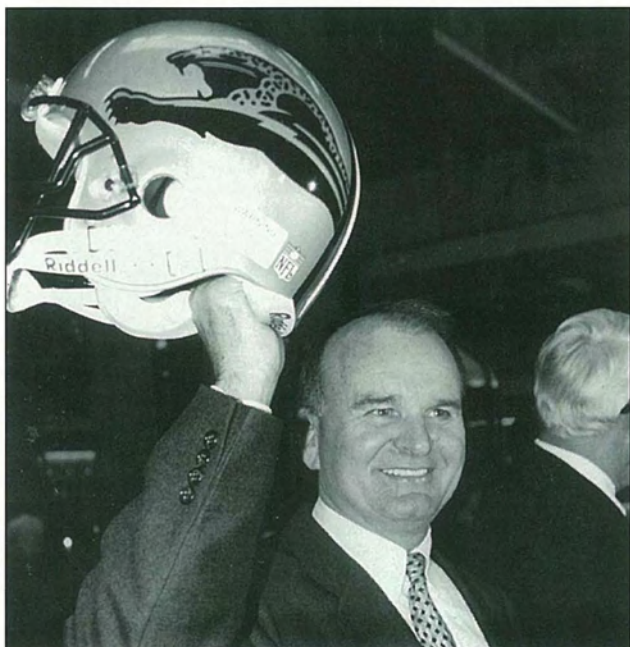
NFL Now! are true Jacksonville football heroes. The Jaguars and the Jacksonville community are grateful to those who were involved in the great 10-day blitz of 1993 which graphically illustrated the community's football passion. Had the community not responded as it did, the hopes for an NFL team in Jacksonville would have died.

With the Jacksonville media playing a supporting role, business leaders enthusiastically joined together to prove that Jacksonville deserved an NFL franchise. Gaining commitments daily from businesses and individuals, NFL Now! came together quickly with an organized campaign which the community embraced and supported.

NFL Now! — A Community Effort, was formed on August 23, 1993. Co-chaired by *Florida Times-Union* publisher Carl Cannon and Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert, the volunteer group of community leaders took the ball and ran with it, successfully completing a 10-day sale of club seats from August 25 to September 3, 1993. The goal was to sell 9,000 club seats before the NFL-imposed deadline of midnight on September 3. By 8:30 that evening a total of 9,737 tickets had been sold, a count that climbed to 10,112 once all orders were in.

The club seat sellout was a significant show of support by the Jacksonville community, and it would prove to be an important factor in the expansion race. NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue, in announcing Jacksonville's successful bid on November 30, 1993, cited Jacksonville's "passion for football" as one of the reasons for the city's selection by the NFL member clubs.

Jacksonville football fans and the business leaders who participated in NFL Now! were an essential part of Jacksonville's expansion victory.

JACKSONVILLE MUNICIPAL STADIUM



They said it couldn't be done. They said it wouldn't be ready. But, on August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first game in the new Jacksonville Municipal Stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its first season in a new stadium or arena.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new spectacle arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. Jacksonville Municipal Stadium was built faster than any major-league stadium has ever been built in North America.

And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just seconds before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America than Jacksonville Municipal Stadium."

Now in its second year of operation, Jacksonville Municipal Stadium is still drawing raves.

The stadium features two unique "signature" features, both of them state-of-the-art. The first are the two Stadium Clubs, that are located on both the east and west sides, and the enormous twin 60-by-156-foot scoreboards with 24 by 32-foot Sony JumboTron screens. The stadium has the greatest square footage of scoreboards anywhere in the country.

The Clubs and all 10,000 Club Seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club—with entrances that are glass-enclosed, 100-foot-high atriums—provides more than 65,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in the stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

The stadium seats 73,000, but additional temporary seats can be added behind the South End Zone—which would expand the capacity from 73,000 to more than 80,000—for the annual Florida-Georgia game, the Gator Bowl... and perhaps someday a Super Bowl.

The construction of the stadium in the record 19 1/2 months was unprecedented. Like with a football team, 12 different consulting companies shaped the construction. Demolition began on the old Gator Bowl on January 3, 1994, with approximately 90 percent of the old stadium torn down. In fact, the only portion salvaged was the west upper

deck, which had been added in 1982.

A total of 121 subcontractors had a hand in the job ... all in all, thousands of people worked on the stadium from start to finish. In fact, for the final few months of the project, crews worked around the clock, 24 hours a day. Even when Hurricane Erin halted outside work one day less than a month before it opened, workers kept going on the inside.

And, at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, August 18, 1995, the stadium opened its doors to more than 70,000 Jaguars faithful.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS: Credential requests will be honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials will not be issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Executive Director of Communications, Jacksonville Jaguars, One Stadium Place, Jacksonville FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked adjacent to Gate 1.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL-CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is at Gate 1, at the Southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the credential will-call window at Gate 1. The credential will-call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the will-call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers and videographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance on the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Tom Coughlin conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in a room adjacent to the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. Phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information are available. The phone number in the media workroom is (904) 633-6312.

TOM COUGHLIN INTERVIEWS: Head coach Tom Coughlin will conduct his weekly news conference at 12:15 on Mondays in the media workroom. He is not available on Tuesdays, but is available for interviews as requested in advance from 12:15 to 12:30 on Wednesdays and Thursdays, and from 12:00 to 12:15 on Friday.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. On Mondays, players will only be available from 11:45 to 12:15, and on Tuesdays there will be no availability as this is the players' off day. The lockerroom is open to the media on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays

from 11:45 to 12:15. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance when possible to schedule.
