GAME SUMMARY

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-0) vs. PHILADELPHIA EAGLES (0-1) Thursday, Aug. 16, 2018 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 7:30 p.m. ET

After opening the preseason at home against the Washington Redskins last Thursday, the Patriots will be home for a second straight week when they host the Philadelphia Eagles in a Week 2 preseason contest at Gillette Stadium on Thursday night.

New England and Philadelphia met last season in Super Bowl LII, a 41-33 Eagles victory. This week's game will be the 23rd preseason meeting between the two teams, the second-most frequent preseason opponent for the Patriots, behind the then 27 preseason meetings with the New York Giants.

The Patriots opened the 2018 preseason last Thursday with a 26-17 victory over the Washington Redskins. After falling behind 17-0 in the first half, the Patriots rallied with 26 unanswered points, including 16 points in the fourth quarter.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is WBZ-TV CBS in Boston. Bob Socci provides play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak in the broadcast booth. Former Patriots linebacker Rob Ninkovich will provide sideline analysis along with WBZ-TV's Steve Burton. Patriots Football Weekly's beat writers Paul Perillo and Andy Hart will also provide insight and analysis.

PATRIOTS LOOK TO KICK OFF ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON

The 2018 New England Patriots have a chance to set or tie several NFL team records, including:

- The Patriots have made the playoffs for nine straight seasons (2009-17), tied with Dallas (1975-83) and Indianapolis (2002-10) for the most in NFL history.
- The New England Patriots enter the 2018 season with 34 postseason wins and need two more playoff victories to tie Pittsburgh for the most postseason wins all-time.
- The Patriots enter this season with 214 regular season wins since 2000. The NFL record for most regular season wins over two consecutive decades is 217 by the San Francisco 49ers (1970s/1980s). The Patriots need just four more wins to surpass the 49ers for the most regular season wins in two consecutive decades.

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
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SERIES HISTORY



The Patriots and Eagles will meet for the 23rd time in the preseason and for the first time in the preseason since 2014 when the Eagles spent time practicing with the Patriots on the fields at Gillette Stadium prior to the preseason contest. It marked the second straight season that the two teams held joint sessions. In 2013, the Patriots traveled to Philadelphia to practice for a few days prior to a preseason game.

This week's game will be a rematch of Super Bowl LII, a 41-33 victory for Philadelphia at US Bank Stadium In Minnesota.

The Patriots and Eagles last met in the regular season on Dec. 6, 2015, when New England fell, 35-28, to Philadelphia at Gillette Stadium.

While the teams have played just 12 times in the regular season, they have played 22 times in the preseason with the Patriots claiming a 12-10 edge in the series.

Philadelphia QB Nick Foles passed for 373 yards and 3 touchdowns, and caught a touchdown pass, as the Eagles earned the first Super Bowl title in franchise history. Foles had started the last three games of the regular season after an injury ended Carson Wentz's season.

The teams combined for a Super Bowl record 1,151 yards, including 613 by the Patriots. Brady was 28 of 48 for a Super Bowl record 505 yards and 3 touchdowns. Gronkowski had 9 catches for 116 yards, Amendola had 8 for 152 and Hogan had 6 receptions for 128 yards.

After an exchange of field goals to open the game, a 36-yard run by LeGarrette Blount set up Foles' 34- yard touchdown pass to Alshon Jeffery. Jake Elliott missed the extra point. On the Patriots' next possession Stephen Gostkowski missed a 26-yard attempt. The Patriots faced fourth-and-5 from the Eagles' 35 a few minutes later, and Tom Brady's pass for Rob Gronkowski fell incomplete. Blount's 21-yard scoring run six plays later was set up by Foles' 19-yard pass to Zach Ertz on third-and-7. Foles' 2-point conversion pass was incomplete, and New England answered with a Gostkowski field goal, an interception by Duron Harmon, and a 26-yard touchdown run by James White. Gostkowski missed the extra point, and a 55-yard pass from Foles to Corey Clement put the Eagles in the red zone. A few plays later, faced with fourth-andgoal from the Patriots' 1 and 38 seconds left in the half, tight end Trey Burton faked a reverse and instead lofted a touchdown pass to Foles for a 22-12 lead.

Gronkowski caught 4 passes, including the 5-yard touchdown toss, to open the second half. Foles completed all three of his third-down passes on the next drive, capped by a 22-yard touchdown pass to Clement. Brady answered with a 26-yard touchdown pass to Chris Hogan to pull within 29-26. On the next possession, the Patriots' defense held the Eagles to an Elliott field goal, and 3 Danny Amendola catches on the next drive set up Gronkowski's 4-yard touch down to give New England the lead for the first time, 33-32, with 9:22 to play.

Foles engineered a 14-play drive that took seven minutes, one second off the clock. Ertz caught a 7-yard pass on third-and-6, 2-yard pass on fourthand-1, and capped the drive with an 11-yard touchdown on third-and-7 with 2:21 left for a 38-33 lead. Two plays later, Brandon Graham had the only sack of the game. Brady fumbled and Derek Barnett recovered at the Patriots' 31. Elliott's 46-yard field goal with 1:05 remaining increased the score to 41-33. The Patriots reached their own 49, but Brady's Hail Mary pass was batted down at the goal line as time expired. Foles was 28 of 43 for 373 yards and 3 touchdowns with 1 interception. Clement had 4 catches for 100 yards.

The Patriots quarterbacks combined for four touchdown passes, the offense gained 250 yards on the ground and the defense forced four turnovers in a 42-35 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles in the preseason home opener at Gillette Stadium.

QB Tom Brady made his 2014 preseason debut and played the first two offensive series, finishing 8-of-10 for 81 yards with one touchdown and one interception. After taking the opening game kickoff and moving to the Philadelphia 30-yard line, Brady had a pass intercepted by CB Cary Williams, who returned the pick 77 yards for an early touchdown. Brady responded by engineering a 9-play, 74-yard drive that ended with a 15-yard touchdown pass to WR Kenbrell Thompkins.

On the Eagles first play of the next drive, LB Dont'a Hightower forced a fumble after a short pass to WR Ifeanyi Momah that was recovered by DL Tommy Kelly at the Philadelphia 28-yard line. Rookie GB Jimmy Garoppolo entered the game after the turnover and threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to FB James Develin to give the Patriots a 14-7 lead. Garoppolo took the Patriots on a 13play, 75-yard drive on the next series that ended with a 4-yard touchdown pass to WR Brandon LaFell for a 21-7 lead. Garoppolo finished the first half and completed 6-of-12 passes for 72 yards with two touchdowns.

The Eagles scored on their final two second quarter possessions to tie the game at 21-21.

Ryan Mallett entered the game in the second half and helped the Patriots score on their first three offensive drives. S Duron Harmon intercepted Eagles QB Mark Sanchez on the second play after halftime and returned the pick 33 yards to the Philadelphia 12-yard line. Three plays later, Mallett scored on a 6-yard run for a 28-21 Patriots lead.

After Philadelphia tied the game on the next series, Mallett drove the Patriots 80 yards in six plays before rookie RB Roy Finch scored on a 10-yard run for a 35-28 lead.

Rookie CB Malcolm Butler forced and recovered a Philadelphia fumble on the first play of the ensuing drive to give the Patriots a first down at the Philadelphia 28-yard line. Four plays later, Mallett connected with WR Brian Tyms for a 17-yard touchdown pass for a 42-28 New England lead.

The Eagles closed the gap to 42-35 heading into the fourth quarter, but Philadelphia was stopped at the New England 1-yard line on a fourth-and-goal situation and the Patriots were able to run out the final 4:39 of regulation to secure the win.

He earned his B.A. from Clark University in Worcester, Mass., his master's degree from Boston University and doctorate from Brandeis University in Waltham, Mass., and several of his business interests remain headquartered in the greater Boston area.
- ★ Eagles special teams coordinator Dave Fipp spent two seasons (1998 safeties, 1999 secondary/special teams coordinator) coaching at Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass.
- ★ Eagles offensive line coach and run game coordinator Jeff Stoutland was a four-year letterman and three-year starter at inside linebacker at Southern Connecticut State. He earned Little All-America honors as a senior and was named a team captain. Stoutland began his coaching career at his alma mater as the inside linebackers coach from 1984-85. In 1988, he returned for his second coaching stint at the school where he served as the team's offensive coordinator for four seasons.
- ★ Eagles defensive quality control/assistant secondary coach Dino Vasso was a four-year defensive back at the University of New Hampshire (2006-10). He started 51 consecutive games and earned first-team AFCA All-American honors as a senior.

After falling behind, 17-0 in the first half, the New England Patriots rallied with 26 unanswered points to claim a 26-17 victory over the Washington Redskins in the 2018 preseason opener at Gillette Stadium.

Rookie RB Ralph Webb ran for two touchdowns and also scored on a pair of 2-point plays in the fourth quarter to help with the comeback. Webb finished with 14 carries for 46 yards.

With QB Tom Brady on the sidelined, backup QB Brian Hoyer was given the reigns. After a sluggish first half that saw the Patriots fall behind 17-0, the Patriots finally put together a scoring drive with 49 seconds to play. Hoyer connected with first-year WR Devin Lucien on a 22-yard pass followed by a 25yard pass to help set up a 52-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski with eight seconds to play to make it 17-3 at halftime.

The Patriots took the second half kickoff, and Hoyer led the Patriots on a 19play, 84-yard drive that took 10:16 off the clock before RB Jeremy Hill scored on a 1-yard touchdown run to cut the Redskins lead to 17-10. The Patriots converted four third-down plays and two fourth-down plays to keep the drive alive.

After stopping Washington on the next series, Hoyer led a 16-play, 90-yard drive that culminated with an 8-yard touchdown run by Webb followed by a 2-point play to give the Patriots an 18-17 lead in the fourth quarter.

Late int he fourth quarter, rookie DL Trent Harris forced a fumble on a sack of Redskins QB Kevin Hogan that was recovered by DL Geneo Grissom, who returned the ball 53 yards to the Washington 1-yard line. Two plays later, Webb scored his second touchdown on a 1-yard run and then added his second 2-point play to give New England a 26-17 lead.

FREQUENT OPPONENT

The Patriots and the Redskins met for the 22nd time in the preseason to match the Philadelphia Eagles (22) for the second-most frequent preseason contests, behind the 27 meetings between the Patriots and the New York Giants. The Patriots will play both Philadelphia and the New York Giants in the 2018 preseason.

EDELMAN RETURNS TO ACTION

WR Julian Edelman made his return and was in the starting lineup after missing the entire 2017 season due to injury.

HIGHTOWER AND RIVERS MAKE THE START

LB Dont'a Hightower and LB Derek Rivers were back in action and in the starting lineup. Hightower was limited to just five games in 2017 due to injury. Rivers, a 2017 third-round pick missed his entire rookie season due to injury.

McCARRON ON SPECIAL TEAMS DUTY

First-year WR Riley McCarron, who spent the majority of the 2017 season on the New England practice squad, returned both punts and kicks against the Redskins. He fair caught one punt and returned two kickoffs for 40 yards.

LUCIEN PROVIDES SPARK

First-year WR Devin Lucien caught a 3-yard pass followed by a 25-yard pass with under a minute to play in the first half to help set up a 52-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski. He finished the game with four receptions for 71 yards.

GOSTKOWSKI GOOD FROM 50

Gostkowski drilled a 52-yard field goal at the end of the first half. He holds the New England record with 23 field goals from 50 or more yards. Gostkowski was 4-for-4 from 50 or more yards in 2017, including a team-record 62-yard field goal against Oakland on Nov. 19 in Mexico City.

BOOK-END SCORING DRIVES

After scoring on a 52-yard field goal in the first half, the Patriots opened the second half with a 19-play, 84-yard drive that took 10:16 off the clock before RB Jeremy Hill scored on a 1-yard touchdown run. Since 2009, the Patriots have scored on the final possession of the first half and the first possession of the second half 22 times, the most in the NFL during that time.

WEBB WEAVES A NICE PERFORMANCE

Rookie free agent RB Ralph Webb from Vanderbilt scored on an 8-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter and then added a two-point play on a pass from QB Brian Hoyer to give the Patriots an 18-17 lead. Later in the fourth quarter he scored on a 1-yard run and then scored again on a two-point play.

11 VETS MAKE PATS DEBUT

Of the 13 veteran players that are new to the Patriots in 2018, 11 saw action in the preseason opener: OL Luke Bowanko, OL Trent Brown, DL Adrian Clayborn, WR Eric Decker, RB Jeremy Hill, OL Ulrick John, WR Cordarrelle Patterson, DB Eddie Pleasant, DL Danny Shelton, OL Matt Tobin and WR Paul Turner. Brown was in the starting lineup at left tackle.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 25th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New

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Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (17), conference crowns (9) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (21) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LII was the ninth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a perod during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 24 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 19 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2017, Kraft earned his 21st winning season in 24 years of owning the franchise.

400-POINT SEASONS

The Patriots extended their NFL record to 11 straight seasons with at least 400 total points (2007-17) after finishing with 458 points in 2017. The 2017 Patriots had four rookie free agents make the 53-man opening day roster - DL Adam Butler, OL Cole Croston, TE Jacob Hollister and LB Harvey Langi. It is the third-most rookie free agents in the Bill Belichick era. The Patriots had six rookie free agents make the team in 2013 and five in 2000.

The 2017 Patriots defense finished the 2017 season by not allowing a fourth quarter touchdown in the final five games. In 14 of 16 games they allowed eight points or less in the fourth quarter.

<u>6-2</u> The 2017 Patriots finished with a 6-2 record against teams that had a winning record.

The Patriots defense had six red zone takeaways in 2017, the most in the NFL. Baltimore was second with five.

The Patriots have 18 first-team All-Pro selections via the draft since 2000, which ranks behind only Carolina (19) over that span.

The Patriots have gone 17 straight seasons without being swept by a division opponent after beating each of the AFC East teams in 2017, extending the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.

The Patriots have won nine or more games in 17 straight seasons, the most in the NFL.

Rob Gronkowski and Tom Brady have connected on 75 touchdown passes. It is the second-most connections between a quarterback and a tight end in NFL history and is fifth overall between quarterbacks and pass-catchers.

Tom Brady has the lowest interception percentage since 2015 with a 1.0 percentage. He has thrown just 17 interceptions on 1,637 pass attempts during that time.

Brady is the only QB with five Super Bowl wins. He joined Hall of Fame DL Charles Haley (5) as the only other NFL player with five Super Bowl wins.

Brady won his eighth conference title in 2017. He moved past DL Mike Lodish for the most Super Bowls played with seven in Super Bowl LI. Lodish played in six (four with Buffalo and two with Denver).

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win five Super Bowl titles. He won more regular season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 44 consecutive years as an NFL coach are second in NFL history to 45 by Dick LeBeau.

MOST CONSEC. DIVISION TITLES

Belichick is the first NFL coach to lead his team to nine consecutive division titles after claiming the title in 2017. Paul Brown (1950-55), Tom Landry (1966-71), Bud Grant (1973-78) and Chuck Noll (1974-79) led their teams to six straight titles.

SUPER COMEBACK

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games where a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 have recorded 2,647 wins, 7 losses and 2 ties, a winning percentage of .997.

PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Once head coach Bill Belichick implemented his coaching design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach who has coached over 40 games since 2001 (including the postseason).

Belichick is the first head coach in NFL history to lead a team to three straight 500-point seasons (2010-12) and four overall (2007-589, 2010-518, 2011-513 and 2012-557). St. Louis is the only other team to have done it three times (1999-526, 2000-540, 2001-503).








CAREER NOTES

Tom Brady has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 196 of his 251 career regular-season starts, compiling a .781 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era (since 1966). Brady's 155 career wins in his first 200 starts are the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 career starts.





WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- ★ If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2018, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in eight seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).
- ★ Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach 35 touchdowns in 2018 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.
- ★ Brady has passed for 4,000 yards nine times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2018, he will be the third player to reach ten seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12).
- ★ Brady led the NFL with 36 touchdowns passes in 2015, his fourth time leading the NFL in passing touchdowns. He tied Drew Brees, Len Dawson, Brett Favre, Peyton Manning, Johnny Unitas and Steve Young for most seasons leading the NFL in touchdown passes.
- ★ Brady has 223 career victories (regular season and postseason) and needs three wins in 2018 to move past Adam Vinatieri (225) for the most wins all-time by an NFL player.
- ★ Brady enters 2018 with 13 regular-season wins at age 40 or older, tied with Brett Favre for the NFL record.
- ★ Brady enters the 2018 season with 559 touchdowns overall (488 in the regular season and 71 in the postseason) and needs 21 touchdown passes in 2018 to move past Peyton Manning to become the all-time leader in touchdown passes.
- Brady has thrown touchdowns to 68 different players in his career, two behind Vinny Testaverde's NFL-record 70 different TD targets.
- ★ Brady enters the 2018 season tied with Drew Brees for third all-time with 488 regular season touchdowns and needs 12 touchdowns to become the third player to reach 500 touchdowns. He would join (Peyton Manning-539) and (Brett Favre-508).

The Patriots have reached 12 conference championship games in the Tom Brady - Bill Belichick era (since 2001 with Brady starting at QB). The Patriots have made 12 title games in the 16 seasons with Brady as the starter.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- ★ Brady enters the 2018 season with 66,159 career passing yards. He needs 3,841 yards this season to become the fourth QB in NFL history with 70,000 career passing yards.
- Brady has 82 300-yard games and needs eight more to become the third NFL player with 90 300-yard games, joining Drew Brees (109) and Peyton Manning [93].
- ★ Brady is tied with seven other NFL players with two games with six or more touchdowns and needs one 6-TD game to tie Peyton Manning, who had three games with six or more touchdowns.
- ★ Tom Brady has won 30 Player of the Week awards to set the NFL record for the most Player of the Week honors, and he also leads with 10 Player of the Month honors.
- ★ Brady leads the NFL with 55 career games with three touchdown passes and no interceptions.
- ★ Brady has started 251 regular season games at quarterback. If he starts all 16 games in 2018 he will move past Peyton Manning (265) and be second all-time with 267 starts, behind Brett Favre (298).
- ★ Brady has played in 253 regular season games entering the 2018 season, which is fifth all-time among NFL quarterbacks. If he plays in all 16 games in 2018 he will move into third place all-time with 269 games played among NFL quarterbacks, behind George Blanda (340) and Brett Favre (302).
- ★ Brady is entering his 19th season in 2018 with the Patriots. He joins Jim Marshall (19-Minnesota), Bruce Matthews (19-Houston/Tennessee), Darrell Green (20-Washington), Jackie Slater (20-LA Rams) and Jason Hanson (21-Detroit) as the only players with at least 19 seasons played with one NFL team.
- Brady (13) needs one more Pro Bowl berth to join Tony Gonzalez (14), Peyton Manning (14), Bruce Matthews (14) and Merlin Olsen (14) as the only NFL players with at least 14 Pro Bowl berths.

Brady led the Patriots to their ninth win of the season in the victory over Miami on Nov. 26, 2017, the most ever by a 40-year old guarterback in the Super Bowl era. Brett Favre in 2009 turned 40 on Oct. 10 and led the Vikings to eight wins in their 12-win season after turning 40. Brady threw four touchdowns to push his 2017 total to 26 touchdowns, the most in a single season by a 40year old guarterback. He moved past Brett Favre (25 in 2009 after he turned 40 in October of that year with Minnesota) and Warren Moon (25 with Seattle in 1997).

Brady led the NFL with 4,577 yards passing in 2017 to become the oldest quarterback to lead the NFL.. The previous oldest player to lead the league in passing was Fran Tarkenton with 3,468 yards in 1978 at age 38. Brady moved past Warren Moon (1997 with 3,678) for the most passing yards in a single season by a 40-year old quarterback

ANOTHER TEAM RECORD

Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). It is the longest run ever by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35-yard run vs. Tampa Bay on (9/3/00).

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told *The Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

UNCONVENTIONAL JOURNEY

Despite a successful three year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Having redshirted his sophomore year of lacrosse, Hogan had an extra year of athletic eligibility following his fourth academic year at Penn State. As the football itch still lurked in the back of his mind, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth football team, and at the end of the season joined in on some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried."

Chris did not get invited to compete in that year's Combine, but turned heads during a Pro Day held at Fordham. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

G TED KARRAS

SCHOOL'S NOT OUT

Although he already owns a bachelor's degree in communications and a master's degree in recreation, sport and tourism from his time at University of Illinois, Ted Karras hasn't completely given up his notebook for an NFL playbook. Along with teammate Joe Thuney, Karras is pursuing his MBA from Indiana University thanks to an NFLPA program that provides tuition assistance for players while navigating a busy NFL schedule.

"It just seems to be that everyone keeps wanting to pay for my school, so I'm not going to turn it down," Karras told the Boston Globe.

Karras and Thuney began their MBA pursuit two weeks after the Patriots Super Bowl LI victory by taking online classes and Skyping with professors from Indiana University's Kelley School of Business up until training camp.

OL SHAO MASON A FAMOUS NAMESAKE

A noted sports fan and basketball enthusiast, Shaq's mother, Alicia McGuire, named him Shaquille Olajuwon Mason in 1993 after her two favorite NBA stars at the time, Shaquille O'Neal and Hakeem Olajuwon. The Tennessee native had the opportunity to meet one of his namesakes at a Memphis Grizzlies game while O'Neal was a member of the Miami Heat, receiving a special meetand-greet and having his jersey signed.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to seven straight Pro Bowls (2011-17) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the seventh straight season in 2017.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe.* "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

OL JOE THUNEY

THUNEY DOES HAVE THE SIZE

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an internal affairs degree and also minored in Spanish.

BACK TO SCHOOL

Along with teammate Ted Karras, Joe Thuney has taken advantage of an NFL-PA program that assists its players in earning college degrees. After earning his degree in accounting while also studying international studies at N.C. State, Thuney is now pursuing his MBA through Indiana University's Kelley School of Business.

During his first offseason, Butler entered a rib eating contest, which judges ruled his team had lost. Butler disagreed and began arguing with the judges. Then Commodore defensive coordinator Bob Shoop was in attendance and witnessed Butler's demeanor and was impressed with his competitive attitude. Shoop convinced then head coach James Franklin to ask Butler to transition to defense.

"Coach Franklin brought me into his office and he asked me what I wanted, and I wanted whatever was best for the team," Butler told *The Tennessean.* "Because we were so short on defensive linemen at that time, that's how it happened."

FLOWERS DOUBLES DOWN AGAIN

DL Trey Flowers had three two-sack games in 2016 and in the second-half of last season, he moved into a starting role. In his final eight games of the season he recorded seven sacks, ranking sixth in the NFL during that span.

HARMON SECURES THE WIN

Duron Harmon picked off Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger in the end zone with five seconds to play to secure a 27-24 win on Dec. 17, 2017. It was the fourth time overall that he has picked off a pass in the end zone to secure a win and the second time in the 2017 season. He intercepted Houston QB De-Shaun Watson in the end zone as time expired to secure the win on Sept. 24, 2017. He picked off Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the end zone with nine seconds to play to secure the Patriots 31-24 win on Sept. 18, 2016, and Harmon intercepted a Joe Flacco pass in the end zone with 1:39 left to preserve the Patriots 35-31 lead in an AFC Divisional win vs. Baltimore on Jan. 10, 2015. Ten of his 14 career interceptions have been in the fourth guarter.

4TH QUARTER PICKS

Throughout his six NFL seasons, Duron Harmon has shown a knack for notching late-game interceptions. Of his 14 career picks, 10 have come in the fourth quarter, with six of those occurring during the final two minutes of the second half.

LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

WEARING BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear

this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

Dont'a Hightower and Russell Maryland (2 national championships at University of Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players with two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

DB DEVIN McCOURTY

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

Devin McCourty enters 2018 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowls as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes had more Pro Bowl invites as a Patriots DB with six.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots this past offseason for his 10th NFL season. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. They look to become the first set of twins to play together on the same team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and was a year behind his brother in eligibility. Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

McCOURTY GOES LONG

McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. N.Y. Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

IN GOOD COMPANY

McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS

Devin, along with twin brother Jason McCourty, has seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

- ★ After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 25 times in its 58-year history. The Patriots have earned 19 of those playoff berths in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 20 division crowns overall (19 AFC East crowns) and has gualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 17th straight year in 2017. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, moving past the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 21 of the 24 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.
