THIS WEEK'S GAME

The Cardinals begin their 11th season at University of Phoenix Stadium this week when they open the preseason against the Oakland Raiders. Arizona has sold out every game (preseason and postseason included) at University of Phoenix Stadium, and this week's game will make it 105 consecutive sellouts.

Arizona enters the 2016 campaign with high expectations coming off one of the most successful seasons in team history. The Cards set a franchise record with 13 wins, capturing the NFC West title and reaching the NFC Championship Game. Arizona finished with the NFL's #1 ranked offense for the first time in franchise history and set team records for points (489), TDs (59), total net yards (6,533) and first downs (373). The defense ranked fifth in the NFL. It marked the first time since 1963 the Cardinals finished in the top five on both offense and defense.

The overwhelming majority of players who led the team in 2015 return this season, including all 13 players who scored an offensive TD for Arizona last season. In fact, the Cardinals offense returns every player who scored a TD, caught a pass or had a rushing attempt last season.

The leader of the Cards offensive attack - QB Carson Palmer - also returns for his fourth season in Arizona. He is coming off a year in which he set franchise single-season records with 4,671 passing yards, 35 TD passes and a 104.6 passer rating and was a finalist for the NFL MVP award. Also returning are WR Larry Fitzgerald, who set a franchise record with 109 receptions in 2015, and second-year RB David Johnson, who led the team with a franchise rookie record 13 total TDs last year.

On defense, the Cardinals added LB Chandler Jones and S Tyvon Branch to a group that includes Pro Bowlers DT Calais Campbell, CB Patrick Peterson and S Tyrann Mathieu, who signed a five-year contract extension with Arizona during the first week of training camp.

Next week the Cardinals will travel to San Diego for two joint practices with the Chargers and then the two teams will meet in the second game of the preseason at Qualcomm Stadium.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

—Arizona begins its 11th season at University of Phoenix Stadium this week when it hosts Oakland in the preseason opener. Arizona has sold out all 104 games played at the venue since it opened in 2006. This week's game will be #105.

—The Cardinals offense returns every player who scored a TD, caught a pass or had a rushing attempt last season.

—The Cardinals roster features 12 players who have been selected to the Pro Bowl, including eight who were voted in last season. Only Carolina (13) has more Pro Bowlers on its roster than Arizona.

—In the past week, the Cardinals have signed Pro Bowlers S Tyrann Mathieu, QB Carson Palmer and WR Larry Fitzgerald to contract extensions.

—The Cardinals are one of five NFL teams that have won at least 10 games in each of the last three seasons, joining Seattle, New England, Denver and Cincinnati.

—On Tuesday and Wednesday of next week the Cardinals will hold joint practices with the Chargers in San Diego during the run-up to their preseason matchup.

CARDS-RAIDERS CONNECTIONS

Raiders Connections

Cardinals QB **Carson Palmer** played for the Raiders from 2011-12. He was traded to Oakland from Cincinnati in 2011 and went on to play in 25 games (24 starts) with the Raiders, and he became the second QB in team history to top 4,000 yards in a season when he threw for 4,018 yards in 2012.

Cardinals T **Jared Veldheer** played with Oakland from 2010-13. He was a third-round pick of the Raiders in the 2010 draft and played in 53 games (48 starts) in four seasons.

Cardinals S **Tyvon Branch** was chosen by the Raiders in the fourth round of the 2008 draft and spent seven years with Oakland (2008-14), playing in 75 games (67 starts) and leading the team in tackles three straight years from 2009-11.

Cardinals CB **Mike Jenkins** played for the Raiders in 2013, starting 15 games and recording a career-best 75 tackles.

Cardinals G **Antoine McClain** spent part of the 2013 season with the Raiders but did not see game action.

Cardinals T **John Wetzel** signed with the Raiders in 2013 as a rookie free agent but was released during training camp.

Cardinals CBs coach **Kevin Ross** coached safeties for the Raiders from 2010-11.

Cardinals LBs coach **Bob Sanders** served in the same position with Oakland from 2013-14.

Cardinals Connections

Raiders DT **Dan Williams** played for the Cardinals from 2010-14. Arizona's first-round pick (26th overall) in 2010, Williams played in 70 games (40 starts) in five seasons with the Cardinals.

Raiders WRs coach **Rob Moore** played with the Cardinals from 1995-2001, recording 322 receptions for 5,110 yards and 27 TDs with Arizona. In 1997, he led the NFL with 1,584 yards (the second-highest single-season total in franchise history) on a career-best 97 catches.

Raiders General Manager **Reggie McKenzie** played for the Cardinals from 1989-90, but was placed on injured reserve both seasons.

CARDS vs. RAIDERS - THE SERIES

This week's matchup between the Cardinals and Raiders marks the 15th time the two teams have met in the preseason. The preseason series between the Cards and Raiders dates back to 1976, a game that was played in Tempe, AZ while the Cards were still based in St. Louis. This week's game marks the eighth meeting between the teams dating back to 2004.

The preseason series is knotted at seven games apiece, with the Cardinals winning five of the last six meetings, including each of the last four games. This week marks the Raiders first visit to University of Phoenix Stadium since 2012.

The Cardinals and Raiders last met in the Week 3 of the 2015 preseason when Arizona traveled to O.co Coliseum and came away with a 30-23 win. Including the regular season, this week's matchup marks the eighth meeting between the two teams in the last 10 years.

Two-time NFL Coach of the Year (2012, 2014), **Bruce Arians** is in his fourth season in Arizona and 24th season coaching in the NFL. Arians became an NFL head coach for the first time when the Cardinals hired him on January 17, 2013. Arizona has posted a 35-15 record (including postseason) under Arians, who is just the 10th coach in NFL history to post three straight 10+ win seasons in his first three years as a head coach in the NFL. Including his tenure as interim head coach with Indy in 2012, Arians has posted a 43-17 regular season record as head coach. Among active NFL head coaches, only Bill Belichick (46) and Pete Carroll (44) have more wins in his last 60 games.

Named the 19th head coach in franchise history on January 15, 2015, **Jack Del Rio** is in his second season with Oakland and his 11th as a head coach in the NFL. The Raiders posted a 7-9 record in 2015 during their first season under Del Rio, which represented a four-win improvement from the previous season. Del Rio joined the team after spending three seasons (2012-14) as the defensive coordinator in Denver, which included a trip to Super Bowl XLVIII. Now in his 31st season in the NFL (including 11 seasons as a player and 20 seasons as a coach), Del Rio served as head coach in Jacksonville for nine seasons (2003-11).

MATHIEU STAYING IN THE NEST

On August 2nd, less than a week after reporting to training camp, the Cardinals announced that the team had agreed to terms with All-Pro S **Tyrann Mathieu** on an extension that keeps him under contract with the team through 2021.



The Cardinals third-round pick (69th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft out of LSU, Mathieu (5-9, 186) was named first-team All-Pro and selected to his first career Pro Bowl last season after tying for the team lead with five INTs (one returned for a TD), leading the Cardinals with 16 passes defended and adding 89 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, a sack and a forced fumble in 14 games. *The 24-year-old Mathieu is the only NFL player with 30+ passes defended, 15+ tackles for loss and 10+ quarterback hits since 2013.*

“I’ve been fortunate to come to an organization that really put their arms around me, believed in me, when a lot of people didn’t,” Mathieu said at the press conference announcing the extension. “Even after my two knee injuries, to still have that kind of support and encouragement. Every day I wake up, it’s the reason why I wake up every day, to try to come to work and be the best teammate, because I know that somebody in this organization believes in me. It’s inspiring for me, it’s encouraging for me, and I plan on doing the same things I’ve been doing.”

ROOKIE FREE AGENTS

An annual part of training camp is watching to see which undrafted free agents can overcome the odds and make the 53-man roster. The Cardinals have 18 rookie free agents in camp this year that are hoping to follow in the footsteps of players such as **Chandler Catanzaro**, **Jaron Brown** and **Tony Jefferson** to make the opening day roster after joining the team as a free agent out of college.

A total of 14 players who entered the NFL as rookie free agents appeared in at least one game for the Cardinals last season. That total includes four players - CB **Cariel Brooks**, LBs **Alani Fua** and **Gabe Martin**, and NT **Xavier Williams** - who signed as rookie free agents in 2015.

Some Notable Former Rookie Free Agents

WR Jaron Brown – Has played in all 48 games in his first three seasons and has 44 receptions for 513 yards and four TDs.

K Chandler Catanzaro – Finished third in the NFL with 137 points last season, which is the second-best season total in franchise history.

TE Darren Fells – Has started 17 of 24 games played the last two seasons, totaling 26 receptions for 382 yards and three TDs. Also has five receptions for 51 yards and two TDs in the postseason.

S Tony Jefferson – Has played every game his first three NFL seasons and has 165 tackles, 3.0 sacks, two INTs, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and 13 special teams tackles.

DT Josh Mauro – Has appeared in 19 games in two seasons with Arizona, registering 22 tackles, a sack, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries in 2015.

FITZ AND PALMER EXTEND THEIR STAYS

Last Friday (8/5) the Cardinals announced that the team signed All-Pro WR **Larry Fitzgerald** and All-Pro QB **Carson Palmer** to contract extensions. Fitzgerald is now under contract through 2017 while Palmer is under contract through 2018.



“Clearly these are two core members of our team who have played major roles in our success,” Cardinals GM **Steve Keim** said in announcing the extensions. “Each of them had contracts that were due to expire in the next year or two so these extensions provide a measure of certainty and clarity for the players and organization, both now and in the years ahead. It also reaffirms our long-stated intention that when the time comes, these two great players end their stellar careers as Cardinals.”

A nine-time Pro Bowler, the 32-year old Fitzgerald is coming off the best season of his career in 2015 after setting a single-season franchise record with a career-high 109 receptions for 1,215 yards and nine touchdowns.

The 36-year-old Palmer (6-5, 235) is also coming off of a career season in 2015 after starting all 16 games when he set single-season franchise records with 4,671 passing yards, 35 TD passes and a 104.6 passer rating. Palmer was also a finalist for the NFL’s Most Valuable Player award.

A DECADE OF DISTINCTION

The Cardinals have been in the Bidwill family since Pro Football Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill purchased the team in 1933. Charles' son Bill handled day-to-day operations for decades before passing the torch to his son, Michael, who is now in his 10th season as team President.



Since **Michael Bidwill** took over as President in 2007, the Cards have gone .500 or better in seven of nine seasons (just twice in previous 20 years) and posted four double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20).

The 2015 season was a banner year for the organization as the team won the NFC West, set a franchise record for wins in the regular season (13) and earned the first postseason bye in team history.

Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's nine years as team President. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

Michael spearheaded the effort that led to the creation of University of Phoenix Stadium, which preceded that aforementioned run of on-field success. The Cardinals have sold out all 104 games played (preseason and post-season included) and the stadium since it opened in 2006; in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium, just 12 games were sold out in time to be televised locally.

The Cardinals success under Bidwill has greatly elevated the team's popularity both locally and nationally. That fact is best measured in the record-setting ratings for Cardinals game broadcasts. Locally, the team established a host of franchise record for the TV broadcasts in both 2015 and 2014. Nationally, the team's exposure is at an all-time high. Having never appeared in more than three primetime games in a single season, the Cardinals played an unprecedented five primetime games during the 2015 regular season and posted a perfect 5-0 record those matchups.

Michael was also the driving force behind the critically-acclaimed series "All Or Nothing" that debuted on Amazon Video in July of this year.

Michael was pivotal not only in helping Arizona land Super Bowl XLIX - the second in eight seasons at University of Phoenix Stadium - but he also secured the 2015 Pro Bowl. Played a week apart, the game delivered a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

Below is a look at the organization's success in the nine seasons since Michael Bidwill was named team President.

KEIM LAYS THE FOUNDATION

The Cardinals are coming off three consecutive 10+ win seasons in **Steve Keim's** first three years as GM. As soon as he was elevated to the position in January of 2013, Keim began re-shaping the roster. The overhaul during his first three years was dramatic - and resulted in a 34-14 record in that span. During his first 36 months as GM, Keim made 592 roster moves, including 182 moves in 2015 as the Cards established a franchise record for wins (13).



He was named Pro Football Talk's Executive of the Year in both 2013 and 2014, and added Sporting News Executive of the Year in 2014. The 2015 campaign was one of the most successful seasons in franchise history. In addition to establishing a record for wins, the team also set franchise marks for total offense, points scored and total TDs. Arizona had the NFL's #1 ranked offense last season, and the Cardinals finished with a defense that ranked in the top five as well. The roster that has accomplished those feats was built from the ground up by Keim and his staff.

- Of the 53 players on the Cardinals final 2015 roster, 44 were acquired by Keim during his time as GM.

- Of the 36 players who started a game last season, 28 were brought in by Keim.

- Arizona's final 53-man roster in '15 featured 21 players who were either drafted by Keim or signed as rookie free agents (15 draft picks, 6 rookie free agents).

PUTTING TOGETHER A PRO BOWL ROSTER

All seven Arizona players selected to the Pro Bowl in 2015 - special teamer **Justin Bethel**, DT **Calais Campbell**, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, G **Mike Iupati**, S **Tyrann Mathieu**, QB **Carson Palmer** and CB **Patrick Peterson** - return for the 2016 season.

In the offseason, the Cardinals acquired 2015 Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in a trade with the Patriots. The team also signed G **Evan Mathis** (2013 and 2014 Pro Bowler) and CB **Mike Jenkins** (2009 Pro Bowl selection) in free agency.

Arizona enters the 2016 season with 12 players on its roster who have been selected to the Pro Bowl, including eight who were chosen in 2015. Only Carolina (13) has more Pro Bowlers on its current roster.

During each of his first three offseasons as GM, Keim signed a free agent who went on to make the Pro Bowl that season (Mike Iupati-2015, Antonio Cromartie-2014, John Abraham-2013). The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to accomplish such a feat.

NINE DAYS - TWO GREAT HIRES

In a nine-day span in January of 2013, Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** hired GM **Steve Keim** (Jan. 8) and head coach **Bruce Arians** (Jan. 17). In the resulting three seasons, the Cardinals won more games (34) than any other three-year span in franchise history.

In January of 2013 there were eight head coach openings. None were hired later than Arians and four of the eight no longer hold those jobs. Keim was one of seven GMs hired in January of 2013. On the seven, only he and Carolina's Dave Gettleman had their teams in the postseason in both 2014 and 2015.

When Leading After Three Quarters (Regular Season)

The Cardinals are 28-1 when leading after three quarters under Arians and have won 28 in a row. Arizona had a 13-0 record in such games in '15.

Dating back to his time as interim head coach with Indianapolis in 2012, Arians has a 31-1 record in games in which he team leads in the fourth quarter and overtime.

When Allowing 20 Points or Fewer (Regular Season)

Arizona has a 28-2 record in games it allows 20 points or fewer under Arians. That included a 10-0 record in 2015.

When Outrushing an Opponent (Regular Season)

The Cardinals are 27-1 under Arians, including 12-0 in 2015, when they outrush their opponent. Arizona has won 27 consecutive games when it outrushes an opponent dating back to the 2013 season.

When Winning the Turnover Battle (Regular Season)

Arizona has a 21-1 record when winning the turnover battle dating back to the beginning of the 2013 season. The Cards have won 14 consecutive games in which it finished with a positive turnover differential.

When Scoring 30+ Points in a Game (Regular Season)

Dating back to the beginning of the 2013 season, the Cardinals have scored 30+ points in a game 14 times – and they have a 14-0 record in those matchups.

THREE STRAIGHT WITH 10 WINS

In leading the Cardinals to a franchise record 13 wins in 2015, **Bruce Arians** became just the 10th head coach in NFL history to win 10+ games in each of his first three seasons as a head coach in the NFL. Of the 10, Arians is one of three to inherit a team that won fewer than six games the year before.

TWO-TIME COACH OF THE YEAR

Bruce Arians was named the Associated Press 2014 NFL Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinals to an 11-5 record and a berth in the post-season.

It marked the second time in three years Arians was awarded NFL Coach of the Year honors (Indianapolis, 2012) and he became the first coach in NFL history to be named Coach of the Year multiple times in a three-year span with multiple teams.

Arians is one of 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times and the sixth to be honored with multiple teams. He is also one of just six coaches in NFL history to earn AP Coach of the Year honors twice in a three-year span.

A STRONG 1ST IMPRESSION

Now in his fifth NFL season and fourth season with the Cardinals, **James Bettcher** is entering his second year as the team's defensive coordinator. After he was promoted to the position in February of 2015, Bettcher led one of the league's highest-rated units.

Under their first-year coordinator the Cardinals defense was a major factor in the team's 13-3 record in 2015. Arizona finished the 2015 season with the NFL's fifth-ranked defense.

A QUICK ASCENT

Bettcher was elevated to defensive coordinator in just his fourth season as an NFL coach, having entered the league in 2012. After nine years in the college ranks, he was hired by the Colts to serve as special assistant to the head coach/outside linebackers coach. When Bruce Arians was hired as head coach in Arizona in 2013, he named Bettcher his linebackers coach, a position he held for two seasons before his promotion to defensive coordinator in 2015.

The 38-year old Bettcher is the third-youngest defensive coordinator in the NFL and the eighth-youngest coordinator overall.

YEAR 2 OF THE BIDWILL FELLOWSHIP

Prior to the 2015 season, the Cardinals established the *Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship*, a program to provide recently-retired NFL players with the opportunity to gain coaching experience at the highest level. The inaugural participant was former Pro Bowl LB **Levon Kirkland**, who is returning for his second season in 2016 to assist LBs coach Bob Sanders as the OLBs coach.

As Cardinals owner, Bill Bidwill has long been at the forefront in providing opportunities to individuals regardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

Arizona was also the first NFL team with an African American GM-head coach tandem (Rod Graves/Dennis Green, 2004), and from 2013-14 the Cardinals were the only NFL team whose offensive and defensive coordinators were both African American (Harold Goodwin & Todd Bowles).

Selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the second round (38th overall) of the 1992 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Kirkland played inside LB for 11 NFL seasons with the Steelers (1992-2000), Seahawks (2001) and Eagles (2002). A two-time Pro Bowler (1996-97) and two-time All-Pro selection (1997-97), he appeared in 176 games (155 starts) and registered 1,110 tackles, 19.5 sacks, 11 INTs, 16 forced fumbles and nine recoveries. He was also one of six LBs selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame's All-1990s Team, joining Junior Seau, Derrick Thomas, Kevin Greene, Hardy Nickerson and Cornelius Bennett.



FROM 32ND TO 1ST UNDER GOODY

When **Harold Goodwin** was named the Cardinals Offensive Coordinator in 2013, he was handed the reins of an offense that - in 2012- finished the year as the league's 32nd ranked unit. Things changed quickly under his watch.

In 2015 - his third at the helm of the offense - the Cardinals had the top ranked offense in the NFL for the first time in franchise history. The team also set team single-season records for points (489), TDs (59), TD passes (35), total net yards (6,533), first downs (373) and first downs passing (237).

- Outscored opponents 489-313 in 2015. That +176 point differential was the second-best total in franchise history (+184 in 1925).
- After finishing the 2014 season ranked 31st in the NFL in rushing, ranked 8th overall in 2015. Marked the first time since 1984 (9th overall) that the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in rushing.
- Scored at least 30 points in a franchise record nine games in 2015. Arizona's nine games with 30+ points were the most in the NFL.
- Averaged an NFL-high 6.28 yards per play (6,533 yards on 1,041 plays). The Cards easily led the NFL in average yards per pass play (7.84) last season.
- The Cardinals gave up just 27 sacks on 562 pass attempts in 2015. Arizona's 27 sacks allowed tied for the fourth-fewest in the NFL last season.

GOODWIN MAKES IT 10 IN A ROW WITH ARIANS

Named Cardinals offensive coordinator on 1/21/13 after working as the Indianapolis Colts offensive line coach in 2012. Cards head coach Bruce Arians was the Colts offensive coordinator/interim head coach that year.

The 2016 season will be the 10th consecutive season Goodwin has worked under Arians after previous assignments with Pittsburgh (2007-11) and Indianapolis (2012).

CARDS OWN OLYMPIAN

While football isn't an Olympic sport, the Cards do have an Olympic gold medalist on their staff in assistant strength and conditioning coach **Roger Kingdom**.

A two-time gold medalist in the 110-meter hurdles (1984, 1988), Kingdom is in his third year with the Cards, having joined the team on 3/6/14. Kingdom is a former world and American record holder and one of only two runners to ever win consecutive Olympic titles (Los Angeles, Seoul) in the 110-meter hurdles.

Kingdom is a five-time United States outdoor champion (1985, 1988-90, 1995) and won gold medals at the Pan American Games (1983, 1985), the World Cup (1989) the World University Games (1989) and the Goodwill Games (1990). He set a world record of 12.92 seconds in the 110-meter hurdles in Zurich, Switzerland in August of 1989, a mark that would last until 1993.

YEAR 11 IN THE NEST

The 2016 season marks the Cardinals 11th season playing at University of Phoenix Stadium, which opened in 2006.

The Cards will play three of their first four regular season games at home in 2016. While that has happened just seven times since 1970, it's occurred four times since the opening of University of Phoenix Stadium and twice the last two years.



When Arizona hosts New England in Week 1, it will represent the seventh time in those 11 seasons (2006, 2009, 2011-12, 2014-16) that the Cardinals will begin the regular season at University of Phoenix Stadium. In 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium, the Cards never played at home in Week 1.

The team has sold out all 104 games played at the stadium since it opened in 2006, including preseason and postseason; this week's game will be #105. In 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium just 12 home games sold out in time to air on local television.

Dating back to 2013, the Cardinals have a 19-5 record at home in the regular season. Their .826 home win percentage during that span is tied for the fourth-best mark in the NFL - and the top mark in the NFC.

CARDS HAVE A NEW SOUND

Starting with the preseason opener vs. Oakland this week, fans will experience a completely enhanced and upgraded audio experience at University of Phoenix Stadium.

The new system represents the most state-of-the-art technology available and provide fans with an unparalleled level of sound crispness and clarity.

"There's no doubt that this will have a profound impact on the fan experience," said Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill**. "As much as the stadium's visual presentation was improved by the recently upgraded scoreboards, this project's impact on the audio presentation will be just as significant, if not more so."

Funded by the Cardinals, the replacement of the stadium's original audio system was completed in August. The new design will feed sound to the entire stadium at once - from the top to bottom - thereby eliminating delays, echoes, and distortion.

SELLOUTS PROVIDE ADVANTAGE

The Cardinals sellout streak at University of Phoenix Stadium continued last season, selling out all 11 games (including preseason and postseason). Entering the 2016 season, the team has sold out all 104 games played at the stadium.



Having a sellout crowd on hand - and the ensuing noise it produces - every game has given the Cardinals one of the NFL's most distinct advantages.

Dating back to the inaugural year at the stadium in 2006, Cardinals opponents have accumulated 134 accepted false start penalties in the regular season, the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

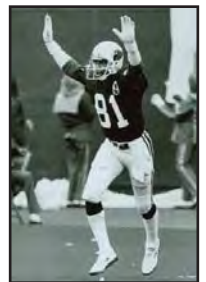

THE RING GOES GREEN

During halftime of the Week 4 contest vs. the Rams at University of Phoenix Stadium, the Cardinals will induct WR **Roy Green** into the Ring of Honor.



A true triple-threat who excelled on offense, defense, and special teams, Green spent 12 seasons (1979-90) with the Cardinals after joining the team as a fourth-round selection (89th overall) in the 1979 NFL Draft out of Henderson State. He was a two-time Pro Bowl selection (1983-84) and two-time All-Pro selection (1983-84).

Green's place among the franchise's all-time greats is clearly demonstrated by his stellar career numbers. He ranks second in Cardinals history in career TDs (69), third in all-purpose yards (10,798), and fourth in 100-yard receiving games (20). His 26 TDs scored between 1983-84 are the most by any player in franchise history over a two-year span. He had three 1,000-yard receiving seasons (1983, '84, '88) and had a career-high 14 TDs in 1983 and 12 TDs in 1984.

He finished his Cardinals career with 522 receptions for 8,496 yards and 66 receiving TDs in 168 regular season games (127 starts). He also returned 84 kickoffs for 1,932 yards (23.0 yard avg.) and one TD, had 27 punt returns for 230 yards and one TD and had 140 yards and one TD on 23 rushes. Green also played defensive back with the Cardinals and had four interceptions and four fumble recoveries. He played his final two NFL seasons (1991-92) with Philadelphia where he appeared in 22 games with three starts before retiring in 1993.

Green will become the 16th member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor, the creation of which coincided with the opening of University of Phoenix Stadium in 2006. He will be the first wide receiver in the group whose other 15 members include Charles W. Bidwill, Sr. (Owner), Jimmy Conzelman (Coach), T Dan Dierdorf, HB John "Paddy" Driscoll, HB/DB Marshall Goldberg, CB Dick "Night Train" Lane, HB Ollie Matson, HB Ernie Nevers, S Pat Tillman, HB Charley Trippi, QB Kurt Warner, CB Roger Wehrli, CB Aeneas Williams, S Adrian Wilson and S Larry Wilson.

- The Cards schedule features four prime time appearances; three are at home, two are on NBC's Sunday Night Football and all four take place in the first seven weeks of the regular season.
- In Weeks 5-7 the Cards play in prime time in three straight: at SF on Thursday Night Football, home vs. the NYJ on ESPN's Monday Night Football and then back on NBC and SNF at home against Seattle. In their history, the Cards have played consecutive prime time games on three occasions (twice last year), but never three straight.
- The Cardinals will play three of their first four games at home. While that has happened just seven times since 1970, it's occurred four times since the opening of University of Phoenix Stadium in 2006 and each of the last two years.
- The Jets and Patriots will be facing the Cards for the first time at University of Phoenix Stadium leaving only the Jaguars and Titans as the only teams never to have played at the venue in the regular season.

PRESEASON ON ABC 15

In 2016, the Cardinals Emmy Award winning Broadcast Network will produce three preseason games that can be seen locally on ABC 15 beginning with this week's matchup vs. Oakland. The other preseason broadcasts include next week's game at San Diego and the preseason finale vs. Denver.

For the fifth consecutive year, the Cardinals regular radio team of Dave Pasch (play-by-play) and Ron Wolfley (analyst) will be joined by Fox Sports Arizona's Jody Jackson (sideline reporter) to call the action. Rich Cellini will join Wolfley and Jackson for the Denver broadcast on September 1.

All three games will be preceded by a half-hour pregame show hosted by Jackson. Coverage of this week's game begins with the pregame show at 6:30 p.m. with kickoff to follow at 7:00 p.m. Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** and GM **Steve Keim** will join the broadcast as guests during each of the two home games.

New for this this season, live TV broadcasts of the first two preseason games will air in Spanish on UniMás Arizona in Phoenix on KFPH UniMás 35 and Tucson on KFTU UniMás 25.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2015

TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Won the NFC West for the first time since 2009 after setting a franchise record with 13 wins during the regular season. Earned the first postseason bye in team history and won the seventh playoff game in franchise history en route to their second ever NFC Championship Game appearance.

Prior to 2015, Arizona had four total wins on SNF in the previous 14 seasons. The Cards had also never won more than two primetime games in a season.

The Cardinals joined the Patriots (5-1) and Broncos (5-0) as the only teams in the NFL with at least five wins in primetime games in 2015.

Prior to 2015, the last team to go 5-0 or better in primetime games in a season was the Indianapolis Colts (5-0) in 2009. Arizona (5-0) and Denver (5-0) both accomplished the feat in '15.

The Cardinals joined the Broncos as the only two teams with three wins on SNF in 2015. Since NBC began airing SNF in 2006, no team has won four SNF matchups in a single season.

The 2015 season marked the first time in franchise history the Cardinals won a primetime game on Monday, Thursday and Sunday night.

In 2014 the Cardinals ranked 31st in the NFL in rushing, averaging 81.8 yards per game on the ground. In 2015, the Cardinals jumped 23 spots and finished eighth in the NFL in rushing, averaging 119.8 yards per game. It marked the first time since 1984 (9th overall) that the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in rushing.

Arizona rushed for 1,917 yards and 16 TDs on 452 carries last season, averaging 4.2 yards per attempt.

HISTORICAL SCORING ON THE DEFENSIVE SIDE

In Week 3 against the 49ers, CB Justin Bethel (21-yard INT return) and S Tyrann Mathieu (33-yard INT return) returned INTs for TDs in the first quarter. Arizona became the first team in NFL history with two INT return TDs in the first six minutes of a game.

The group - led by Iupati and LT Jared Veldheer - produced, leading the way for the NFL's #1 ranked offense while keeping QB Carson Palmer clean and providing lanes for a vastly improved run game.

KEEPING THE QUARTERBACK CLEAN

The Cardinals gave up just 27 sacks on 562 pass attempts in 2015. Arizona's 27 sacks allowed tied for the fourth-fewest in the NFL last season.

A RECORD BREAKING YEAR FOR PALMER IN 2015

By almost every measure, Cardinals QB **Carson Palmer** had the best season of his 13-year career in 2015. It also represented perhaps the best season of any quarterback in franchise history. He led the Cardinals to a franchise-record 13 wins, their first NFC West title since 2009 and was among the top candidates in the NFL's MVP race throughout the season.

Leading the NFL's #1 ranked offense, Palmer completed 342 of 537 pass attempts (63.7%) for 4,671 yards, 35 TDs, 11 INTs and a passer rating of 104.6 last season. **He established franchise-single season records for passing yards (4,671), TD passes (35) and passer rating (104.6)** and ranked in the top five in nearly every other category. Below is a look at where Palmer ranks in the top five in the Cardinals single-season record books.

During the 2005 season with Cincinnati, his second as a starter in the NFL, QB **Carson Palmer** led the NFL in TD passes (32) and was considered among the top QBs in the NFL.

In 2015 - 10 years later - Palmer was back among the ranks of the league's top signal callers after a Pro Bowl season in which he finished at or near the top in a number of passing categories.

HISTORIC START FOR DAVID

Rookie RB **David Johnson** had a record-breaking debut season with the Cardinals in 2015. Arizona's third round selection (86th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft, Johnson established a franchise rookie record with 13 TDs on the year (8 rushing, 4 receiving, 1 kickoff return).

A MILESTONE PERFORMANCE IN PHILADELPHIA

In Week 15 vs. Philadelphia, Johnson rushed for 187 yards and three TDs. He became the first player in franchise history to rush for 180+ yards and three TDs in a game. Prior to Johnson's performance in Philly, just two players in team annals had rushed for 160+ yards and a three TDs in a game – Willis Crenshaw (162 yards and 3 TDs at NY Giants, 12/8/68) and Ollie Matson (163 yards and 3 TDs vs. Washington, 11/21/54).

Johnson joined Hall of Fame RB Jim Brown as the only players in NFL history to rush for 185+ yards and three TDs against the Eagles. His 187 yards were the most by a rookie vs. Philly since Tony Dorsett (206) in 1977.

Johnson's 187 rushing yards in Week 15 represent the fifth-best single game total in franchise history. It also marked the second-highest single-game total in team history by a rookie.

THE ROOKIE STEPS UP

In his five starts following injuries to Chris Johnson and Andre Ellington, **David Johnson** totaled 658 yards from scrimmage and five TDs. He had 442 yards and four TDs rushing on 90 carries (4.9 avg.) and 216 yards receiving and a TD on 17 receptions.

He led all NFL players with his 658 yards from scrimmage and was the only player in the league with 400+ rushing yards and 200+ receiving yards over the final month of the season. His breakout performance earned him NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors for December/January.

Among NFL rookies, Johnson's 658 scrimmage yards in the final month were 230 more than the next highest player (Buck Allen–428 yards) and his 442 rushing yards led all rookies by 130 yards (Todd Gurley–312). Johnson also led all rookies in total touchdowns (five) and his four rushing touchdowns tied Gurley for the NFL lead.

STRONG RESUME IN YEAR ONE

Going back to the 2015 season opener vs. New Orleans, RB **David Johnson** made history throughout his rookie season. Below are some of the highlights from Johnson's rookie campaign:

One of Four In NFL History As Productive

Johnson totaled 1,636 all-purpose yards and a franchise rookie record 13 TDs in 2015. He finished with 581 yards and eight TDs on 125 rushing attempts (4.6 avg.), 457 yards and four TDs on 36 receptions, and 598 yards and a TD on 22 kickoff returns. He became just the fourth player in NFL history to post 500+ rushing yards, 400+ receiving yards, 500+ kickoff return yards and 13+ touchdowns in a season, joining Timmy Brown (1962), Gale Sayers (1965) and Maurice Jones-Drew (2006).

An All-Around Performance in First Two Weeks

Johnson had nine total touches in his first two career NFL games and he accumulated 251 yards and three TDs on those nine touches (had two TDs on his first three NFL touches). Johnson had a 108-yard kickoff-return TD and a 13-yard TD run in the Cardinals win at Chicago in Week 2. Johnson, who had a 55-yard TD reception the week before vs. New Orleans in his NFL debut, was the first player in NFL history with a rushing TD, receiving TD and kickoff-return TD in his first two games to begin a career.

His 108-yard TD against the Bears tied for the second-longest play in NFL history. It's also the longest TD in franchise history.

Johnson also added a rushing TD against the Bears. In doing so, he became the first Cards player to have a kickoff return TD and a rushing TD in the same game since HOFer Ollie Matson on 12/13/58.

Short Route to the Hall of Fame

In the summer of 2015, Johnson visited the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH during the annual NFL Rookie Symposium. Three months later he was being honored at the Hall of Fame for the record-breaking start to his NFL career. The Hall of Fame is recognizing Johnson's achievements by displaying the jersey and cleats he wore in the victory over Chicago when he scored on a kickoff return and rushing attempt.

Despite seeing a limited role in the offense in the early part of the season, Johnson registered six TDs (3 rushing, 2 receiving, 1 KOR) in the first five games in 2015. That tied the franchise record for TDs in a players first five career games. The only other player in Cardinals history with at six TDs in their first five career games was Ollie Matson (6, 1952).



C.J. RETURNS IN 2016

During training camp in 2015, the Cardinals signed RB **Chris Johnson** to a one-year contract. In his first year with Arizona, Johnson helped lead a revived Cardinals rushing attack. He led the team with 814 rushing yards on 196 carries and his four 100-yard rushing games were the most by a Cardinal in a single season since current RBs coach Stump Mitchell also had four in 1985.



Johnson was among the league rushing leaders last season prior to suffering a knee injury in Week 12 that landed him on the injured reserve/designated to return list. Johnson returns to the Cardinals this season, having re-signed with Arizona as a free agent.

In his 11 appearances last season (9 starts), Johnson rushed to the top of the NFL rushing yardage list. At the time of his injury, he ranked 4th in the NFL in rushing yards.

Johnson rushed for 122 yards in the Cardinals Monday Night victory over the Ravens in Week 7 and followed that up with 109 yards on 30 attempts against the Browns in Week 8. He became the first Cardinals RB to rush for 100+ yards in consecutive games since Edgerrin James in 2006 (games 12-13).

CARDS HAVE ONE OF THE BEST IN C.J.

Dating back to 2008, his first NFL season, Johnson's 40 100-yard performances are the second-most in the NFL.

A three-time Pro Bowler, Johnson was a first-team All-Pro selection in 2009 when he was also named NFL Offensive Player of the Year with Tennessee after leading the league with 2,006 rushing yards.

He became the sixth player in league history to top 2,000 rushing yards in a season and remains one of just seven players in NFL history to accomplish that feat.

Johnson has rushed for an NFL record six TDs of at least 80 yards in his career. He has double the number of such rushing TDs than any other player in NFL history. Jamaal Charles, Ahman Green, Bob Hoernschemeyer, Hugh McElhenny, Adrian Peterson, Barry Sanders and O.J. Simpson are all tied for second place with three career rushing TDs of 80+yards.

A DIFFERENT LOOK OFFENSIVE LINE

Under the tutelage of Offensive Coordinator **Harold Goodwin**, the Cardinals offensive line was one of the team's most improved units from 2014 to 2015. After signing Pro Bowl guard **Mike Iupati** last offseason, the line made further strides, leading the way for the NFL's #1 ranked offense while keeping QB Carson Palmer clean. The line also helped Arizona boast its best rushing attack in years.

This offseason saw changes to three of the five spots along the line. With the departure of starters C Lyle Sendlein, LT Bobby Massie and G Ted Larsen, three new faces will fill in. The opening at RG will be filled by two-time Pro Bowl **Evan Mathis**, who was signed as a free agent after winning a Super Bowl last season in Denver.

At RT, 2015 first round signee **D.J. Humphries** is expected to take over the starting role. A product of the University of Florida, Humphries was the 24th overall pick in last year's draft.



At center, 2015 free agent signing A.Q. Shiley and fourth-year vet **Earl Watford** are in a training camp battle with 2016 fourth round selection (128th overall) **Evan Boehm**.

Returning from last year's unit are LT **Jared Veldheer** and G **Mike Iupati**. The latter was signed by the Cardinals as a free agent in 2015 and went on to earn his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl nod during his first season in Arizona.

BEHIND THE LINE IN 2015

Keeping the QB Clean

The Cardinals gave up just 27 sacks on 562 pass attempts in 2015. Arizona's 27 sacks allowed tied for the fourth-fewest in the NFL last season.

A Greatly Improved Run Game

In 2014 the Cardinals ranked 31st in the NFL in rushing. Behind the offensive line in 2015, the Cardinals jumped 23 spots and finished eighth in the NFL in rushing, averaging 119.8 yards per game.

Arizona rushed for 1,917 yards and 16 TDs on 452 carries last season, averaging 4.2 yards per attempt.

RBs **Chris Johnson** (4) and **David Johnson** (1) combined for five individual 100-yard rushing performances last season. That is the most in a single season since 1988 when Earl Ferrell (3) and Stump Mitchell (2) combined for five 100-yard performances.

Arizona posted 50 runs of 10+ yards during the 2015 regular season. The Cardinals had just 31 such runs in 2014. Arizona's 12 rushing plays of 20+ yards in 2015 doubled the total they accumulated in 2014 (6).

ADDING ANOTHER PRO BOWL GUARD

In 2015 the Cardinals signed Pro Bowl LG Mike Iupati in free agency. This offseason, the team dipped back into that well, signing Pro Bowl G **Evan Mathis** to man the right side. Mathis signed a one-year contract with the Cards after spending the 2015 season with the Denver, where he started for the Super Bowl champion Broncos.

A two-time Pro Bowler (2013-14) and 2013 first-team All-Pro selection, Mathis has appeared in 130 career games (90 starts) since entering the league as a third-round pick of the Carolina Panthers in the 2005 NFL Draft. He has also started four of five postseason games played in his career.

Mathis started 12 of 16 regular season games and all three postseason contests at LG last season in Denver.

According to Stats, Inc. Mathis's 5.5 sacks allowed since 2011 are the lowest total among all starting NFL guards during that span (min. 50 starts). Mathis was also named the top guard in the NFL by ProFootballFocus.com from 2011-13 and No. 2 ranked guard in 2014.

In Arizona, Mathis reunites with QB **Carson Palmer**, who was his teammate in Cincinnati from 2009-10.

BREAKING HIS OWN RECORD

WR **Larry Fitzgerald** enjoyed one of the best seasons of his career in 2015. He finished the year with 109 receptions for 1,215 yards and nine TDs. His 109 receptions represent a franchise single-season record, surpassing his previous mark of 103, set in 2005.

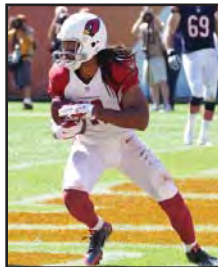

He is among just 11 players in NFL history with 100+ TD receptions, including playoffs – Jerry Rice (219), Randy Moss (166), Terrell Owens (158), Cris Carter (138), Marvin Harrison (130), Tony Gonzalez (115), Steve Largent (104), Antonio Gates (105), Tim Brown (103) and Don Hutson (100).

THE YOUNGEST TO 1,000

Fitzgerald reached 1,000 receptions for his career at St. Louis in Week 13 last season. **At 32 years, 97 days old Fitzgerald became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receptions for their career.**

DOMINANT IN THE POSTSEASON

During the 2008 postseason, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** had the most prolific playoff run of any wide receiver in NFL history. He shattered NFL records for receiving yards in a single postseason (546), receptions (30) and TDs (7). Fitzgerald recorded four 100-yard games in the postseason as well, a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100-yards receiving.



In the Divisional matchup vs. Green Bay last season, Fitzgerald looked just as dominant. He caught eight passes for 176 yards and scored the game-winning TD in the Cardinals OT victory over the Packers. His 176 receiving yards set a new franchise postseason record.

Fitzgerald surpassed his own franchise record of 166 yards at Carolina (1/10/09) in the 2008 Divisional round.

Fitzgerald is the only player in NFL history to average at least 100+ receiving yards and a TD in every game played in the postseason.

Fitzgerald has more receiving yards (942) than any player in NFL history through his first nine career postseason games.

Fitzgerald and Hall of Fame WR Fred Biletnikoff (2 straight in 1968) are the only players in NFL history with 150+ receiving yards in back-to-back postseason games.

Fitzgerald had 170 yards and a TD receiving in the second half/OT against the Packers. No player in NFL history had more receiving yards in the second half/OT of a postseason game. The previous record was 157 yards by Jerry Rice on 1/22/89 vs. Cincinnati in Super Bowl XXIII.

Fitzgerald now has at least one TD reception in six of nine playoff games. He is one of just seven players in NFL history with at least 10 TD receptions in the postseason. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22) and John Stallworth (12) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

Of the seven players in NFL history that have at least 10 career TD receptions in the postseason, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games.

HEADING TO THE HALL?

Below is a look at the career of **Larry Fitzgerald** through his first 186 career games compared to the 25 modern era WRs currently in the HOF and where they stood at that point in their career.

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (1,018) than all of the receivers enshrined in Canton had through 186 games except for Marvin Harrison (1,087) and Jerry Rice (1,037). Fitzgerald also has more receiving yards (13,366) than all HOF receivers through 186 games played except Rice (16,265) and Harrison (14,422).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass those of many receivers that are currently in the HOF. He has more career receptions than 21 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940) and Reed (951).

He has more career receiving yards than 20 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089) and Reed (13,198).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,018), receiving yards (13,366), receiving TDs (98), total TDs (98) and 100-yard receiving games (41). His seven 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.

A PAIR GO OVER 1,000

WRs **Larry Fitzgerald** (1,215) and **John Brown** (1,003) both went over 1,000 yards receiving in 2015. It represented just the fifth time in team history - and first time since 2009 - that the Cardinals had multiple receivers go over 1,000 yards in a single season.

For Fitzgerald, it was his seventh career 1,000-yard season. Of the five seasons in which the Cardinals had multiple 1,000-yard receivers, Fitzgerald has been involved in four. Brown reached 1,000 yards receiving for the first time in his career last season.

A STRONG FINISH IN 2015

Now in his fifth NFL season, 2012 first-round selection WR **Michael Floyd** was the team's leading receiver between 2013 and 2014 with 1,882 receiving yards. In that same period, he ranked second on the team in receptions (112) and receiving TDs (11) behind perennial Pro Bowler Larry Fitzgerald.

After suffering a hand injury during training camp, Floyd saw limited action to begin the 2015 season. Through the first five games, Floyd had eight receptions for 104 yards as he worked his way back from the injury. In his final 10 games played, Floyd looked like the player he had been over the previous two years.

Floyd caught six passes for 111 yards against the Packers in Week 16 last season. It marked his fifth game with 100+ receiving yards in a span of seven games played. Prior to that seven-game stretch, Floyd had posted 100+ receiving yards just six times in 55 career games. His five 100-yard receiving games in 2015 represent a career high for a single season.

FLOYD COVERS GREAT DISTANCES

During his first three seasons, Floyd provided the Cardinals with a big-play threat at the receiver position. Last season, he posted a team-high nine receptions of 30+ yards, including catches of 49, 45, 41 and 32 yards in the final four games.

The 42-yard TD reception against the Vikings in Week 14 was the 19th TD catch of Floyd's career. Of his 19 career TD receptions, 13 have covered at least 20 yards. Of his last 15 TD receptions, 12 have covered at least 20 yards. Dating back to the Cardinals Week 8 victory over Cleveland, Floyd has hauled in TD catches of 60, 27, 35 and 42 yards.

11 TIMES OVER 100

Cardinals players combined for 11 individual 100-yard receiving performances last season. The 2015 season represented just the fourth time in franchise history - and first time since 2008 - that the Cardinals had at least 11 individual 100-yard performances in a single season.

The Cardinals had multiple players reach 100+ receiving yards in a game twice last year - Week 10 at Seattle (Fitzgerald, Floyd) and Week 13 at St. Louis (Brown, Floyd). Prior to facing the Cardinals in Week 10, the last time the Seahawks had allowed multiple 100-yard receivers in a game was in 2008 - against the Cardinals.

BROWN SHINES IN FIRST TWO SEASONS

In his first two seasons NFL seasons, WR **John Brown** - the team's third round selection (91st overall) in the 2014 NFL Draft - been a potent weapon in the Arizona passing attack.

In 31 career games, he has registered 113 receptions for 1,699 yards and 12 TDs. In franchise history, only three players had more receptions than Brown in their first two seasons (Larry Fitzgerald-161, Anquan Boldin-157, Frank Sanders-121).

Brown entered the league with a record-breaking season as a rookie in 2014, setting an NFL rookie record with four game-winning TD receptions. In 2015, despite being hampered by a hamstring injury, he totaled 65 receptions for 1,003 yards and seven TDs. Brown posted the biggest game of the season - and his career - in Week 6 at Pittsburgh, when he hauled in a career-high 10 receptions for a career-high 196 yards.

His 196 receiving yards tied for the sixth-best single-game total in franchise history and were the most for a Cardinals player since Anquan Boldin had 217 yards at Detroit on 9/7/03. Brown's 196 yards against the Steelers also marked the fourth-highest single-game receiving yardage total in the NFL last season.

NELSON BREAKS LOOSE

Rookie WR **J.J. Nelson** - the team's fifth round selection (159th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft - saw an increased role against the Bengals in Week 11 last year due to an injury to WR Michael Floyd. Nelson responded with four receptions for a game-high 142 yards (35.5 avg.) against Cincinnati, including a 64-yard TD catch in the third quarter. Nelson's 142 receiving yards were the most by a rookie in a game in 2015.

Nelson also made an impact in Cardinals wins over the 49ers and Rams. He had catches of 34 and 19 yards against the 49ers in Week 12 and he hauled in two passes for 34 yards against the Rams in Week 13, including a 22-yard TD catch in the first quarter. On the year, Nelson had 11 receptions for 299 yards and two TDs. He averaged 27.2 yards per catch. Nelson's 11 receptions in '15 covered 38, 20, 12, 23, 64, 36, 19, 19, 34, 22 and 12 yards.

A PRO BOWL TALENT

CB **Patrick Peterson** earned his fifth Pro Bowl selection - and fourth at cornerback - (Kick Returner, 2011; Cornerback, 2012-15) in 2015. He was also named first-team All-Pro at corner for the second time in his career (2013, '15).

He joins RBs Jim Brown, Barry Sanders and Emmitt Smith as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to five Pro Bowls before their 26th birthday. He is the only defensive player in NFL history to earn that distinction.

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft and in his first five NFL seasons he earned five Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. He has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history.

In addition to being one of the top corners in the NFL, Peterson has broken numerous NFL punt return records and spent time on the offensive side of the ball, becoming the first NFL defender to post a reception and complete a pass in the same game.



Peterson's most important role has been as a shutdown CB on one of the league's top defenses. Peterson has started all 80 games at CB in his five NFL seasons. Despite opposing QBs avoiding his side of the field, Peterson has registered 17 INTs since 2011, the fourth-highest total in the NFL during that span.

Dating back to his rookie season in '11 only Richard Sherman, Charles Woodson and Reggie Nelson have more INTs than Peterson.

A STELLAR SEASON CUT SHORT

After entering the season at full health for the first time since his rookie season in 2013, third-year S **Tyrann Mathieu** was having an All-Pro season in '15 and was among the candidates for Defensive Player of Year before he suffered a torn ACL while recording an INT in the Week 15 win over Philly. Despite the injury, Mathieu was named to his first Pro Bowl and earned first-team All-Pro honors from the Associated Press.



In 14 games played last season, Mathieu registered 89 tackles, a team-high 16 passes defended, 5 INTs (TD), 11 tackles for loss and a forced fumble. His five INTs were tied for third in the NFC at the time of the injury.

MATHIEU'S SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

NFC Player of the Month

Mathieu was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in November. He helped lead the Cardinals to an undefeated record in November (4-0) by posting 27 tackles (24 solo), two INTs and five passes defended. He became just the second player in team history to be named "Defensive Player of the Month" (Kwamie Lassiter, 2001).

Wreaking Havoc in the Division

In five division games last season, Mathieu registered four INTs (1 TD), 33 tackles, eight passes defended and a forced fumble.

Mathieu finished the Cardinals Week 12 victory over San Francisco with a career-high 13 tackles, an INT, two passes defended and a tackle for loss.

Shining in Primetime

Mathieu finished the Sunday Night Football matchup against the Eagles in Week 15 with five tackles, an INT and a pass defended. In the Cardinals five primetime wins this season Mathieu had 34 tackles, four tackles for loss, a sack, two INTs and six passes defended.

A Career Performance Against the Niners in Week 3

Mathieu played the best game of his NFL career against the 49ers in Week 3, finishing with five tackles, a tackle for loss and two INTs. He returned the first of his two INTs 33 yards for a TD. It marked his first career multi-INT game and the TD was Mathieu's first since 2011, when he scored four TDs (2 punt return; 2 fumble return) during his sophomore season at LSU. Mathieu was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his effort against the Niners.

NEW FACES AND ALL-PROS

One of the Cardinals greatest strengths over the past few seasons has been the secondary. In 2015 that group was anchored by a pair of All-Pros in CB **Patrick Peterson** and S **Tyrann Mathieu**. They join a group in 2016 that mixes familiar faces with new arrivals.



In addition to Peterson and Mathieu, safeties **Tony Jefferson** and **D.J. Swearingin** and CB **Justin Bethel** also return from last season.

The new faces in the secondary include include a mix of veterans and newcomers. S **Tyvon Branch** and CB **Mike Jenkins** - signed during free agency - both enter their ninth NFL season in 2016. Recently signed CB **Alan Ball** is entering his 10th NFL season. Together, they bring a combined 300 games (183 starts) worth of experience.

The newcomers include a trio of 2016 draft picks: CB **Brandon Williams** (2nd round, 92nd overall out of Texas A&M), S **Marqui Christian** (5th round, 167th overall out of Midwestern State) and CB **Harlan Miller** (6th round, 205th overall out of Southeastern Louisiana).

A VERSATILE DEFENDER

When the Cardinals selected **Deone Bucannon** in the first round (27th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft, he became just the second safety ever selected by the team in the first round - and first since 1978.

As a rookie in 2014, Bucannon was named the PFWA's All-Rookie team at safety after recording 75 tackles, 2.0 sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. What made Bucannon so unique during his inaugural season was his ability to play inside the box as a dollar linebacker.

Bucannon flourished in that role again last season as the team utilized a player with a rare combination of size and speed.

In his second NFL season, Bucannon led the team with 127 total tackles. Bucannon also tied for the team lead with 17 tackles for loss, while adding three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, three sacks and an INT he returned 39 yards for a TD. Bucannon led or tied for the team lead in tackles in eight of 16 games last season and he had at least seven tackles in 12 of 16 games.

According to Stats, Inc., Bucannon and Carolina first-team All-Pro LB Thomas Davis were the only players in the NFL last season with 100+ tackles, 3.0+ sacks, an INT, and at least three forced fumbles.

In Week 15 at Philadelphia, Bucannon earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after recording the first INT of his career against the Eagles, returning it 39 yards for his first career TD. Bucannon's TD was his first since scoring as a WR during his senior season at Vanden (Fairfield, CA) High School.

In his first two seasons, Bucannon has appeared in all 32 games (25 starts) and registered 202 tackles, 5.0 sacks, 21 tackles for loss, and INT (TD), six passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.



CALAIS CONTINUES CLIMB IN '16

The Cardinals second-round selection (50th overall) in the 2008 NFL Draft out of the University of Miami (FL), DT **Calais Campbell** is a two-time team captain who was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl in 2015.

Arizona's longest tenured defensive player (only All-Pro WR Larry Fitzgerald has spent more seasons with the team), Campbell appeared in 122 games during his first eight NFL seasons.

After posting 5.0 sacks in '15, Campbell now has 48.5 sacks for his career, putting him in fourth place on the franchise all-time sacks list.

Campbell enters the 2016 season on the verge of moving a few spots up the list. He needs 2.5 sacks to pass former DE Curtis Greer (50.5) for third place and 5.5 sacks to pass former DE Simeon Rice (53.5) for second place on the Cards all-time sacks list.

Campbell Earns Second Pro Bowl Selection in 2015

In addition to being named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career in 2014, Campbell also earned second-team All-Pro honors from the Associated Press. Campbell was named to the Pro Bowl again in 2015, becoming just the fifth D-lineman in team history to make multiple Pro Bowl appearances.

Defending The Pass

Dating back to 2011, Campbell has registered 28 passes defended. Among all NFL defensive linemen, only Houston's J.J. Watt has more in that span. Campbell is one of just nine NFL defensive linemen with at least 20 passes defended over the past five seasons.

TRADING FOR A SACK LEADER

When the Cardinals completed a trade with the Patriots to acquire Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in March, they acquired one of the NFL's premier pass rushers. Since entering the NFL in 2012, Jones has collected 36.0 sacks, 10 forced fumbles and 217 tackles in his four seasons.

He joins Houston's J.J. Watt and Washington's Ryan Kerrigan as the only three players in the NFL with 200+ tackles, 36+ sacks and 10+ forced fumbles since 2012.

Jones is one of just 10 players in the NFL with at least 30.0 sacks over the last three seasons (2013-15).

With a career-high 12.5 sacks in 2015 along with 11.5 in 2013, Jones became one of just four Patriots players with multiple double-digit sack seasons. His 36.0 sacks rank second only to Hall of Famer Andre Tippett (43.5) for most sacks by a Patriots player in his first four seasons.

Jones has 10 career multi-sack games, setting a career high with 3.0 sacks at Buffalo in Week 2 of the 2015 season.

MARKUS WAS GOLDEN IN 2015

The Cardinals second round pick (58th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft, LB **Markus Golden** was one of Arizona's breakout rookies last season.

In Week 15 against the Eagles, he had four tackles, a sack, a forced fumble and two QB hits. He recorded a sack and forced his second career fumble when he took down QB Sam Bradford in the third quarter.

He had a career game in Week 16 vs. Green Bay, tying a season-high with six tackles, and adding two tackles for loss and a half-sack. For the year (he missed the finale vs. Sea), Golden totaled 37 tackles, 4.0 sacks, five tackles for loss, two forced fumbles, a team-high 16 QB pressures and 14 QB hits.



MINTER HITS THE 100 MARK

The Cardinals second-round selection (45th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft out of LSU, LB **Kevin Minter** had the best season of his three-year career in 2015. A college teammate of CB Patrick Peterson and S Tyrann Mathieu, Minter established career highs in virtually every category last season.

He started every game for the first time in his career and established career highs in tackles (110), tackles for loss (13), passes defended (6) and added his first career forced fumble. He also added 15 tackles, including four for a loss, in two postseason games.



CATANZARO'S RECORD SEASON

K **Chandler Catanzaro** connected on 28 FG attempts and tied the franchise record with 53 PATs in 2015. His 137 total points ranked third in the NFL in 2015.

GAME-WINNERS FOR CATANZARO

Catanzaro hit the first game-winning FG of his NFL career against the Bengals in Week 11 last season, connecting a 32-yard FG with just six seconds remaining. Catanzaro provided another the game-winner in Week 14, making a season-long 47-yard FG with 1:23 remaining in the fourth quarter to give the Cardinals a 23-20 victory over the Vikings. He was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

RECORD-SETTING ROOKIE CAMPAIGN

Catanzaro had a record-breaking rookie year in 2014. Most notably, he connected on his first 17 FG attempts, tying Washington K Kai Forbath (17 in 2012) for the NFL record for most consecutive FGs to begin a career. That record was topped in 2015 by Browns K Travis Coons (18 straight).

Catanzaro totaled 114 points (29 FGs, 27 PATs) in '14, shattering the franchise record for points in a season by a rookie (73, Bill Gramatica, 2001).

THE BUTLER DID IT

The 2015 season was P **Drew Butler**'s second season with the Cardinals. Butler originally joined the Cardinals in 2014, on the same day the Cardinals played their regular season opener vs. San Diego. He went on to land 34 punts inside the 20-yard line, tying Philadelphia's Donnie Jones for the most in the NFL in 2014.

Butler's signing with the Cardinals was also notable because he is the son of **Kevin Butler**, the former Cardinals (1996-97) and Bears (1985-95) kicker. The Butlers joined WR/KR **Eric Metcalf** (1998) and RB **Terry Metcalf** (1973-77) as the only known father-son combo to play for the Cardinals.

A COMPETITION TO REPLACE LEACH

After 16 NFL seasons - the last seven of which came in a Cardinals uniform - LS **Mike Leach** retired in the offseason. One of the NFL's most consistent long snappers during his long career, Leach played in all 117 games (post-season included) during his time in Arizona and had appeared in 216 consecutive regular season games at the time of his retirement.

In 2016 the Cardinals long snapper will go from being one of the NFL's most tenured players to a rookie free agent. During training camp and pre-season, a pair of rookies - **Kameron Canaday** (Portland State) and **Daniel Dillon** (Campbell University) - will be in competition to replace Leach.

Canaday (6-4, 245) appeared in 41 games for the Vikings and was named an FCS third team All-American following his senior season. A Eugene, OR native, Canaday was the Vikings long snapper for four seasons (2012-15) and had three special teams tackles and one fumble recovery.

Dillon (6-3, 235) appeared in 43 career games at Campbell University, serving as the long snapper for four seasons. He had seven tackles and a forced fumble on special teams and helped the Camels rank as one of the top special teams units in the FCS. In 2015, Dillon played in all 11 games and was honorable mention All-Pioneer League while also being named to the PFL Academic Honor Roll four times in his career.

ONE OF THE BEST IN THE GAME

In December of 2015, CB **Justin Bethel** signed a three-year contract extension that keeps the three-time Pro Bowler in Arizona through the 2018 season.

The Cardinals sixth-round selection (177th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, Bethel has been named to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer each of the last three seasons. During his first three NFL seasons, Bethel registered 54 special teams tackles, a fumble recovery and three blocked FGs. He led the team with 14 special teams tackles again last season. No other player on the team had more than seven.

With Arizona holding a 14-10 lead, Cowboys K Dan Bailey lined up for a 35-yard FG attempt with just three seconds remaining in the first half. Bethel came around the end and blocked the kick, preserving the Cards four-point lead.

Just like the attempt in Dallas, Houston was attempting a FG on the final play of the first half. With the Texans leading 17-14, Randy Bullock lined up for a 40-yard attempt with four seconds remaining in the second quarter. Bethel came off the edge to blocked the attempt, and Arizona would come back to win the game by three points (27-24).

9/15/13 vs. Detroit

The Cardinals trailed the Lions 21-19 early in the fourth quarter when Bethel blocked a 47-yard FG attempt by Detroit's David Akers. Two possessions later, Arizona scored the go-ahead TD in the 25-19 win.

ARIZONA BLOCK PARTY

Dating back to 2008, the Cardinals have blocked an NFL-high 19 FG attempts. After registering three blocked kicks in '14, Arizona registered multiple kicks in seven consecutive seasons (2008-14), including five seasons with at least three blocks in that span.
