AB: A Country of Water by Mahogany L. Browne. The 29 piece was commissioned by the New York 30 Philharmonic and vocalized by the author. Once 31 32 again, Mahogany L. Browne is the first-ever 33 poet-in-residence for Lincoln Center. 34 (SLIGHT PAUSE) AB: This week's concert concludes with music of 35 36 Beethoven. We're going to hear the Philharmonic's former artist-in-residence 37 Daniil Trifonov as soloist in Beethoven's Piano 38 39 Concerto No. 4. 40 41 42 43 AB: The fourth piano concerto was written between 44 1805 and 1806-one of the composer's most 45 fruitful periods of creativity. (The same rough time period also saw the birth of the Choral 46 47 Fantasy, The Fifth Symphony, the Pastoral 48 Symphony and numerous other masterpieces.) 49 Of the five he completed, the fourth piano 50 51 concerto is considered by many to be Beethoven's most inward, his most lyrical, and 52 many artists consider it to be his most 53 54 demanding.

These were private recitals 61 62 for one of his patrons. The following year, 63 Beethoven presented it to the public in Vienna. Due to his rapidly decaying sense of hearing, 64 the composer would never play the keyboard in 65 66 public again. 67 (APPLAUSE) 68 69 AB: ...and we head back to the stage, at Alice Tully 70 Hall, for the piano concerto No. 4 in G major, 71 op. 58 by Beethoven.
