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The Artists



Chris Thile — MacArthur Fellow and Grammy Award–winning mandolinist, singer, and songwriter — is a founding member of the critically acclaimed bands Punch Brothers and Nickel Creek. For four years he hosted the public radio favorite *Live from Here with Chris Thile* (formerly known as *A Prairie Home Companion*). With his broad outlook, he creates a distinctly American canon and a new musical aesthetic for performers and audiences alike. He serves as the NY Phil's 2022–23 season Creative Partner.

Most recently, Thile recorded *Laysongs*, released in June 2021 on Nonesuch. The album is his first truly solo album — just Thile, his voice, and his mandolin on new recordings of six original songs and three covers, all of which is contextualized with banter that includes his ideas about spirituality. Recorded in a converted upstate New York church during the pandemic, *Laysongs's* centerpiece is the three-part Salt (in the Wounds) of the Earth, which was inspired by C.S. Lewis's The Screwtape Letters. The album also features a song that Thile wrote about Dionysus;

a performance of the fourth movement of Bartók's Sonata for Solo Violin; *God Is Alive*, *Magic Is Afoot*, based on Buffy Sainte-Marie's adaptation of a Leonard Cohen poem; a cover of bluegrass legend Hazel Dickens's *Won't You Come and Sing for Me*; and *Ecclesiastes 2:24*, an original instrumental loosely modeled after the Prelude from J.S. Bach's Partita for Solo Violin in E major.



Recognized by audiences, critics, and fellow musicians as one of today's most gifted young artists, 28-year-old **Jacob Collier** already has an extensive list of a chievements.

including five Grammy wins along with II Grammy nominations, including for Album of the Year in 2021.

As a result, Collier's roster of collaborators is astoundingly varied and vibrant. His voice has been featured on recent songs by Coldplay, SZA, Stormzy, and Kehlani. In his own projects, Collier has worked with an unpredictable cast of artistic powerhouses, from Malian singer Oumou Sangaré to John Mayer, T-Pain, Ty Dolla \$ign, Daniel Caesar, and Tori Kelly.

Exploding onto the global stage with the viral success of his multi-frame, multiinstrumental YouTube covers, Collier caught the attention of Quincy Jones and under his mentorship released his debut album, *In My Room*, in 2016, which was recorded, produced, and played entirely by Collier.

Djesse, his most recent four-volume album project, has been a natural progression from the one-man process of *In*

My Room, expanding to include collaborators from all over the world. The resulting volumes of Diesse have delivered on Collier's ambitious promise, featuring an incredible array of artistic peers and musical themes that encompass everything from orchestral composition to folk songwriting, R&B, rap, and pop.

Ultimately, although Collier has already achieved more than most artists could hope for in a lifetime, he is still restlessly creative. Alongside the upcoming release of Diesse Vol 4. he has plans for future projects centered on solo piano, orchestras, film scoring, teaching, musical theater. and more.



Madison Cunningham is a 26-vear-old Grammv Awardwinning artist and sonawriter. Cunningham first picked up a guitar at age seven, and by age twelve was singing

and performing alongside her five siblings in church. As a teenager she met Tyler Chester, who would go on to be a close collaborator and producer of several of her projects, including Who Are You Now (2019).

Cunningham's latest effort, Revealer,

won the 2023 Grammy for Best Folk Album. Revealer finds her working once again with producer Tyler Chester along with Mike Elizondo and Tucker Martine. Written and recorded during all states of the pandemic, Revealer, Cunningham says, is "bound together" by its titular theme: "the hand that slowly chips away at the mirror in which you see yourself and the world and replaces it with the reflection that is most true." The album is full of intimations and hard truths -aself-portrait of a young artist who is full of doubt and uncertainty yet bursting with exciting ideas about music and life.

Jaap van Zweden and the New York Philharmonic



Jaap van Zweden became Music Director of the New York Philharmonic in 2018; in the 2022–23 season he presides over the Orchestra's return to the new David Geffen Hall. He is also Music Director of the Hong Kong Philharmonic, since 2012, and becomes Music Director of the Seoul Philharmonic in 2024. He has appeared as guest with the Orchestre de Paris; Amsterdam's Royal Concertgebouw and Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestras; Vienna, Berlin, and Los Angeles philharmonic orchestras; and London Symphony, Chicago Symphony, and Cleveland orchestras.

Jaap van Zweden's NY Phil recordings include David Lang's *prisoner of the state* and Julia Wolfe's Grammy-nominated *Fire in my mouth* (Decca Gold). He conducted the first performances in Hong Kong of Wagner's *Ring* Cycle, the Naxos recording of which led the Hong Kong Philharmonic to be named the 2019 *Gramophone* Orchestra of the year. His performance of Wagner's *Parsifal* received the Edison Award for Best Opera Recording in 2012.

Born in Amsterdam, Jaap van Zweden became the youngest-ever concertmaster of the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra at age 19 and began his conducting career almost 20 years later. He was named *Musical America's* 2012 Conductor of the Year, was profiled by CBS 60 Minutes on arriving at the NY Phil, and has received the prestigious Concertgebouw Prize. In 1997 he and his wife, Aaltje, established the Papageno Foundation to support families of children with autism. The **New York Philharmonic** connects with millions of music lovers each season through live concerts in New York and around the world, as well as broadcasts, recordings, and education programs. The 2022–23 season marks a new chapter in the life of America's longest living orchestra with the opening of the new David Geffen Hall and programming that engages with today's cultural conversations through explorations of *HOME*, *LIBERATION*, *SPIRIT*, and *EARTH*, in addition to the premieres of 16 works. This marks the return from the pandemic, when the NY Phil launched NY Phil Bandwagon, presenting free performances across the city, and 2021–22 concerts at other New York City venues.

The Philharmonic has commissioned and / or premiered important works, from Dvořák's *New World* Symphony to Tania León's Pulitzer Prize-winning *Stride*. The Orchestra has released more than 2,000 recordings since 1917, streams performances on NYPhil+, and shares its extensive history free online through the New York Philharmonic Shelby White & Leon Levy Digital Archives.

Founded in 1842, the New York Philharmonic is the oldest symphony orchestra in the United States, and one of the oldest in the world. Jaap van Zweden became Music Director in 2018–19, following titans including Bernstein, Toscanini, and Mahler; he will be succeeded by Gustavo Dudamel (as Music Director Designate in 2025–26, Music and Artistic Director beginning in 2026–27).
