If you take your friend's garment as a security you shall return it to him before sunset. For it alone is his clothing; it is his garment for his skin, and in what should he lie down? If he will cry out to Me, I will listen, for I am compassionate.

It would seem to be enough if the פָסוּק would end with the words אָלָי וְשָׁבְעָק אָלַי (וְהָדָה בָּי יִבְעָק אָלַי (וְשָׁבְעָת הָי What is the meaning of the extra words גָּי מַנּוּן אָנָי, for I am compassionate? Why does די "explain" His reason for listening to the prayer of the poor person?

In answering this question, the רְמָבְּיין teaches us a fascinating insight into הָפָסיָם: These words in the פָסיּם are referring to a scenario where the poor person was someone who was not righteous. די is cautioning any dishonest people who may think they can take a garment belonging to a person who is not righteous as a security and still feel confident that they will not be punished. They falsely reason that they do not need to worry about transgressing any of keeping the poor man's clothing as security, because even if the borrower cries out, τ certainly will not heed the prayers of the wicked. Therefore, τ stresses that He accepts the prayers of even those who are not righteous or deserving. τ is promising that *He will listen, because He is compassionate.*

One must never think, *Why should I daven? יייש quotes the מְכִילְתָּא that questions why dogs were singled out for reward by being given אָרָפָה meat. The מְכִילְתָּא explains that this is to teach us an important lesson: יד does not deprive any creature of its deserved reward. יד held back the dogs from their natural desire to bark during מְכָרֹרָת a dog will not sharpen its tongue (יאַמוּ מָאוֹן), therefore די showed gratitude and commanded, "Give him his reward!"

A dog, which is not a בַּעַל בְּחִיָרָה (and does not have a choice in the matter), is rewarded forever for the pain it had for being forced to control its instincts. Imagine how precious it is to יד, and how great the reward will be, when a person, who is a בַּעָל בְּחִירָה, is able to control his natural emotions — יַלָּשֵׁם די!
