PARASHAH

STILL RIGHTEOUS

Oznayim L'Torah – Insights in the Torah by Rav Zalman Sorotzkin

וַיִּשָּׁתַחוּ יִשְּׂרָאֵל עַל ראשׁ הַמְּטֵה.

Then Yisrael prostrated himself towards the head of the bed. (47:31).

"In gratitude that 'his bed was flawless,' i.e. none of his children was a sinner; even Yosef, although a king, had remained righteous" (*Rashi*).

Why did Yaakov Avinu notice only now that Yosef was still righteous?

When a man becomes king of a foreign country,

he strives to show that he loves his new land with all his soul. Sometimes he makes himself more patriotic than the natives.

How happy he is if he can point to the grave of his father in his new land, thereby proving that he is already a second-generation citizen.

It is certainly a mistake for such a ruler to take his deceased father for burial in his old homeland. His subjects, believing that

he still misses his homeland and is unacclimated to his new country, may complain, "Look at the stranger who judges us." Yaakov therefore feared that Yosef would be unwilling to bury him in Canaan, or at least make no effort to do so, lest he lose favor with Pharaoh and the Egyptians.

However, Yosef not only swore to bury Yaakov in

Canaan (v. 31), but promised to command his children to do the same for him (v. 30). It was this act of piety that so impressed Yaakov. Although Yosef had his position in Egypt to worry about, he was still willing to fulfill his father's request.

Among the children who comprised Yaakov's "bed," Yosef was the "head," the one who had been made a king, but even he had remained in the fold. It was this knowledge

that made Yaakov bow down in gratitude, for now he knew that all his children had remained faithful to G-d.

May the angel who redeems me from all evil bless the lads, and my name be declared upon them, and the names of my forefathers Avraham and Yitzchak, and may they proliferate abundantly like fish within the land (48:16).

A simple calculation can tell us that Menashe and Ephraim were, at this time, 22 years of age:

• Yosef was 30 years old when he was brought before Pharaoh (41:46). That marked the beginning of the seven years of plenty.

 Yosef was 34 years old when Menashe and Ephraim

were born (*Sefer HaYashar*). Obviously, when the years of famine commenced, they were three years old.

The Power of Simchah by Rabbi Meyer Yedid

Years ago, I attended a very powerful lecture that has resonated with me until today, and I would like to pose the same challenge to each reader that the speaker posed to the audience back then:

Stop reading for a moment, and take a piece of paper and divide it into two columns. In the right column, write down as many things you can think of that you do

have in life. If your parents are alive, put that on the list; if only one parent is alive, write that down. Write about your children, friends, eyes, legs, fingers, knees... Then you can move onto your house, job, car, and all other material possessions.

Obviously, one column on a paper will barely hold all of it, but it is a good start.

When you finish with that list, use the left column to record the things you are missing in life.

The speaker predicted something amazing back then, and I suspect the same thing happened with all of you: For every member of the audience, the column on the right was endless, while the column on the left had only a few entries. For some people, it might have been five or ten things, for some a bit more, but no one had a long list.

But it wasn't only that the list on the left was shorter. The items on the left side of the list were far less significant as well.

Take a look at the lists you drew up. What did you have on the list of things you're miss-

ing? \$20 million

in your bank account?

Now look at the right side of your list. How much is each eye worth? If eye transplants were possible, and a blind rich person offered you \$20 million for your eye, would you give it up?

Every item on the right side of your list likely eclipses the items on the left in a one-for-one comparison.

And, the speaker said, if you have all those items on the right side of your list and you are still not happy, why would you think that adding just one item from the left side of the list will suddenly change things for you?

Our emotions might tell us that it's that one thing that will make us happy, but intellectually, it's ridiculous. 🍯

- · Yaakov came down to Egypt following two years of famine (45:6). Menashe and Ephraim would then have been 5.
- Yaakov lived in Mitzrayim for 17 years (48:28). Therefore, Menashe and Ephraim were now 22 years old.

In Midrash Mishlei (1:4), Rav Yishmael says that the appellation נָעַר, a young man, can only be applied to someone who is under the age of 20. After that point, he can no longer be called naar. How could Yaa-

kov have referred to his 22-year-old grandsons here as נערים?



"TRY ME OUT"

Rav Nota - The Story of Rav Nota Greenblatt by Shmuel Botnick

There was something unique about the relationship between Rav Moshe Feinstein and Ray Nota Greenblatt. The mutual love they had for each other can only be described as that of father and son. This, in fact, is the precise description that Rav Moshe himself used on multiple occasions. In the countless letters that Ray Moshe sent

to Rav Nota over the years, the opening line would be a greeting and a blessing, often referring to him as "yakar v'chaviv li k'bni (as precious and dear to me as my son)."

"We took daily walks, along the East River or the

Hudson River," Rav Nota recalled. "Rav Moshe told me things that he never told anyone. He told me about the first time he finished Shas! He said it was in his early teens - he couldn't recall his age exactly, but he said that the date was the fourth of Adar."

Rav Nota spent several years in Mesivta Tiferes Yerushalayim, studying under Rav Moshe from 1942 until 1945. During this time, the two grew incredibly close and Rav Nota spent much time in the Feinstein home, where the phone rang incessantly with a plethora of *halachic* questions. It was his responsibility to answer the phone and present the questions to Rav Moshe. But at some point, Rav Moshe appointed Rav Nota to take on a role that was more than clerical. "If you know the answer to the question," said Rav Moshe, "answer it

> yourself. If you can't answer it yourself, come to me."

> An interesting dialogue once resulted from that arrangement. The phone rang and Rav Nota picked up. The caller — who spoke with a rich Polish accent but did not

mention his name — asked to speak with Rav Moshe.

"Rav Moshe is not available," said Nota. "What's your question?"

The caller demurred, explaining that he really wanted to speak with Rav Moshe.

"Try me out," said Nota. "If I don't have the answer, I'll ask Rav Moshe."

The man wasn't giving in easily. "What's your name?" he wanted to know.

"Greenblatt."

"How old are you?"

"Nineteen."

"Are you married?"

"No."

"Okay, I'll ask you the question."

The fellow went on to describe his question and nineteen-year-old Rav Nota rattled out a rapid response.

"Ze'ir qut, very good," said the caller, and then, "Zug Rav Moshe az Hutner hut gerufen — Tell Rav Moshe that Hutner called." It was none other than Rav Yitzchak Hutner, the legendary rosh yeshivah of Yeshivas Rabbeinu Chaim Berlin.

The following day, the phone in Rav Moshe's home rang again. It was the same familiar voice. This time, however, he did not request to speak with Rav Moshe. "Iz Greenblatt duh? Is Greenblatt there?" Rav Hutner wanted to know. Rav Nota took the phone and the two discussed various topics in halachah. The same thing repeated itself for the next several days and Rav

Nota developed somewhat of a relationship with Rav Hutner. 🔟

1,000-POUND WEIGHTS

A man decides it's time to crack down and exercise and heads to the gym. In no time, he's lifting five-pound weights, one after the other, very quickly, doing multiple reps. The bystanders are amazed. "Wow, look at this quy. Look at what he's doing! Look at how he keeps lifting those weights!"

In the other corner, a man is lifting a 1,000-pound weight. He can hardly move an inch, and he's wincing in pain as he picks it up. Nobody seems too impressed by his efforts.

Who's greater? Whose exercise has more of an impact?


The one who's lifting the five-pound weights has no resistance; his muscles aren't being strengthened, no matter how impressive he looks.

Conversely, the one who's straining to lift the 1,000-pound


weight and can barely move it an inch is the real hero, because his workout involves resistance training — an exercise designed to improve muscular fitness by exercising a muscle or a muscle group against external resistance.

That's what's going on with us. Considering the amount

of resistance we face today — in regard to modesty, propriety, and general boundaries — it may look like you're hardly moving or accomplishing, but you are actually accomplishing great things. You are lifting 1,000-pound weights.






was on Menashe's head!
