


Bundle Dyeing Workshop A Common Thread


## ACT

When you stitch around the edge of a circle then pull on the thread the borderline is gathered together and brought to the centre.

Envision the links between people and environment as threads which can gather our social fabric. By conducting workshops in nature we can pull on these threads, gather people together and centre matristic values and women's skills previously left on the periphery.

Our ambition is to re-build connections between nature and society by celebrating and sharing the work of marginalised groups, who use techniques which are ecological, such as bundle dyeing.






ACT's objective is to break the stigma around *women's work* and enable heritage skill sharing within inclusive environments.

Bundle dyeing involves taking natural dyes, such as onion skins, turmeric and flowers, and wrapping them up in the fabric you want to dye, forming a bundle. The bundle is then steamed to activate the dye.

In this workshop we used rectanglar pieces of natural fabric, such as linen and cotton, soaked in mordant which were then covered in natural dyes and rolled up from one end to the other. This was then rolled in a spiral to look like a snail shell. String was tied around each bundle to keep everything in place.







Each layout was unique and beautiful creating a singular pattern that can never be repeated.





The workshop began with members sharing their memories of women's work. This encompassed cooking, gardening and weaving amongst other skills. The yarn was passed to next person who spoke having resonated with what had just been said. This created a network of string which webbed its way around the room. This created tangile threads which connected the people in the room physically as well as metaphorically.

At the end of the workshop the bundles were collected ready for steaming.








Almost everything was used which helped us keep the workshop as low waste as possible.






