1. Spend time with Books

- a. Take time to read with your child every day in the language most comfortable to you!
- b. Mastery of their home language has a direct impact on school readiness and success. Switching between two languages help children develop a more flexible approach to problem solving.
- c. Children might need to run around while you are reading to them that's okay!



- d. Have your kids see you read! Modeling is important.

- 4. Writing and drawing are a great way to build literacy skills no matter their age or drawing/writing ability.
 - a. Hang your children's drawings on the wall! Help build their confidence!
 - b. Leave paper and crayons out for your child to use whenever inspiration strikes!
 - i. You can turn these papers into a book and have your child tell you a story that goes along with it.
