On the second day students were able to demonstrate their learning by organising and using correct industry methods to be used in preparing for and running a BBQ for a group of people.

Tania has visited the school in previous years so it was great that she was able to talk to our students about past Ruapehu College Students currently at Massey.

Year 10 OPC Camp to Great Barrier Island

This year, our year 10s were once again lucky enough to go to Aotea Great Barrier Island for the Hillary Outdoors experience. It was a journey to get there with a long drive to Leigh, north of Auckland, and then a two-hour boat ride to Orama in Karaka Bay where they were staying. This place was just north of Port Fitzroy and luckily had a jetty where they were dropped off. It was noticeably warmer when they arrived and the bay was beautiful. There was no mobile phone coverage and the electricity only came on for certain hours in the day. Orama use to be a Christian community that had fallen into disrepair. Eleven years ago, Hilary Outdoors leased some of their buildings and used it as another adventure base. Since then, the community has had a revival and now all sorts of groups visit.



The first activity on Monday was surf kayaking and boogie boarding at Maybe's beach just over the hill from Port Fitzroy. The long sandy beach had perfect waves and the beach day was enjoyed by all. On Tuesday the students headed out for the famous coasteerring activity. This was the epic 5km kayak trip past Rabbit Island to the small island of Okokewa where they went coasteering (walking and swimming) around the island itself. Students got to jump from the rocks into the sea below. After this, they kayaked back to camp. Again the weather was perfect.

On Wednesday the group navigated rock climbing via serrata. This means they had to negotiate a rock climb on a long rope. This was quite a challenge. In the afternoon, they went to Mikes Beach and set up tents for the overnighter. It was a calm night and all enjoyed a fire as the sun went down. On Thursday they tramped out via Haratonga and completed the beautiful coastal walk.

It was a great camp with students attempting everything. They were brave and hardy. Thank you to teachers Miss Bam and Mr Mackrell and to our two instructors Joel Halliwell and Nick who encouraged the team all the way. Also thank you to Pub Charities' who provided funding for the trip. It was a great experience for our students.
