


PRINCIPAL'S REPORT


Although USA is the number one country chosen and have the most exchange students, New Zealand is also very popular. Why is this?


The senior ball somehow always turns out to be one of the biggest social events of the year. This year was no exception. Here's how it all shaped up:

12.20 pm, Friday 14 August: the murals are still incomplete but the tickets have long been sold. The prizes have been collected from the many businesses who most generously donated them.



The Underwater Ball was, without a doubt, one of the biggest social events of the year. Nearly 85 people thoroughly enjoyed themselves.










SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE





SWIMMING SPORTS



TRANSITION

This year, Transition students have been working on their Employment Skills Certificate. It is the first time the Certificate has run and on the whole it has been challenging but rewarding for most students.

Units of work have been taken from the fields of Business, Law, Health, Communication, Management and Work and Study Skills. The Certificate takes about 18 months to complete. This means that students are choosing to come back for a seventh form year to complete their certificate. We all feel that this is a very positive direction to be moving in. This qualification is flexible and allows students to demonstrate competencies in alternative fields.

This year the Transition Department has purchased a new computer and has logged on to the Internet. Students continue to develop their computing skills and develop their technological and research skills.

Automotive

Automotive was run in association with HuttValley Polytechnic this year. Our tutor was Doug Eves, for most of the year, with Lawrence Furlong stepping in for six weeks while Mr Eves was overseas.

The course included some audio graphic link ups with HuttValley Polytechnic. Next year we are looking to develop an Internet link to the Polytechnic, which should encourage the development of the theoretical aspect of the subject.

FOOD TECHNOLOGY

This year saw not only a name change for this department but also several programme changes. Students at Level 9, 10 and 12 were lucky enough to be the guinea pigs for the new technology based curriculum and fortunately it was well accepted by all guinea pigs involved. Further programme changes are about to occur with the incorporation of the new health curriculum and the introduction of unit standards at the senior level.

The Guidance Department is responsible for making sure that all students have the support they need.

This support includes things like helping new students settle into school; the 'Health Nurse' service; Special Needs help, matching students up with services outside the school if we are unable to help; educational, careers and personal counselling. (Mrs Ryland will explain more about careers in her report).

This year, we have had the guidance suite extended to give us more space to provide support services. The Health Nurse began holding her clinics in the new rooms in Term 4. The rooms have also been used for small group interviews, Japanese classes, and space to spread out and look at careers information. There have been varied responses to the colour scheme - "You'll need to provide sunglasses." "Yuk - hospital colours." "Who chose the colours?" "Cool." - but Mrs Ryland and I like it!!!!

Lots of people have asked me "What is counselling? What happens when people go to the Guidance Counsellor?" I figure you'll read this magazine from cover to cover so this is a good opportunity to let everyone know the answers to these questions. Through counselling, I will help you develop skills and strategies to deal effectively with your environment. You will be required to look at your way of thinking and behaving to decide if they are helpful to you. If they are not, we will work together and change them.

If changes are required, we will develop both short and long term goals (yes, I hear the groans of you Senior Health students at the mention of goals!!) that will be realistic and worthwhile for you. It will be necessary for you to share equally in the responsibility of counselling. I can not "save you". You must make decisions and carry out actions. I will help you where I can. Your best interests will always be the most important consideration.

This is a confidential service - that means if you tell me things you want kept secret, I won't be able to blab to all the staff!!! Do make use of the support services - they are there for you!!




