*All the students and staff of Ruapehu College.





surely be one to be reckoned with.



Seondary Tertiary Alignment Resource



This fund is awarded to the school to assist in setting up tertiary level courses for students at secondary school. This year we have run several courses that have given credits towards students national certificates: Forty three students have completed their comprehensive first aid course with Red Cross. Five students have been awarded credits towards their National Certificate in hairdressing and eight students have gained credits towards the National Certificate in Agriculture through the Open Polytechnic and Taratahi Agricultural Centre:

Ten students have been working towards their pre-entry to the Automotive Trades Certificate while thirty or more students have participated in the forestry course with ten of these students gaining credits towards their National Certificates. Two students have completed tourism certificates with the Open Polytechnicof New Zealand. Other Open Polytechnic courses being taken by our senior students include food safety, childcare, computers, and work skills.

Twenty five students took a two day camera and darkroom course with Kevin Capon and forty students were awarded KiwiHost certificates. Taster courses for junior and senior students have included modelling, DJ sound technician and DJ, hairdressing, forestry, video production and catering courses.

STAR funded the Wanganui Polytechnic trip for Activities Week this year where students selected a range of courses including sport and recreation, pottery, painting, horticulture, automotive and hairdressing.

Raymond Hemopo and James Beech were funded to attend the trial week at Manawatu School of Design in the hope that they would be accepted on to a fully funded two-year course in 1997. Newsflash

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Rising Demand for

Economics

Demand for Economics and Consumer Studies rose sharply this year, with some classes seeing a 50% increase in student numbers brought about by an increase in student preferences to make money. The ESP saw good profit margins being reached through the sales of hair ties, devil sticks, key-rings and recycled paper (see photo at right). At senior levels the preferences for good grades seemed to be a determining factor but it may well have been the lack of substitutes available which saw such a big swing in demand. The marginal social benefits definitely out weighed the costs.

Supply was very inelastic but is predicted to shift next year due to market forces causing regional differences. Supply may be unstable for the time but will adjust early January as supply and demand find an equilibrium. The changes in supply are suspected to be caused by the costs of production (namely engagement rings) and the price of related goods rising; travel to Patea is expensive) These are thought to be irregular changes and will not affect the area next year. As we look ahead to '97, may our marginal utility be rising, and our cost curves be forever on the downward slope.


Form three and four students worked on programmes based on the new curriculum document. These and remaining programmes will be revised so as to implement Unit Standards for the new National Certificate in the senior school.

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
THE 1996 HORROR BALL


