Mr Cast's Last Report

After just over eight years at Ruapehu College it us with mixed feelings I write my final piece for the magazine. I am sad to be leaving, but looking forward to new challenges Waitara High School will bring.

A school's success is due to a combination of factors and Ruapehu College has been fortunate to have that combination: a committed Board of Trustees, a dedicated and hard working staff, a generally supportive community and a student body that involves itself in school activities which promote the common good of all.

Too often detractors of a school judge that school by the worst students - the ones who for a variety of reasons are not in correct uniform, look untidy around town and generally are not a good "advertisement" for a school. The large majority of students who dress well, behave well and work hard are tarnished with the image those few detractors portray.

Ruapehu is particularly well renowned; much of this is due to students' respect for property and school equipment. There are schools in New Zealand that spend thousands of dollars on repairing vandalism. In 1994 Ruapehu College spent under \$300 on repairing damage. Money that is saved can then be put into resources. This saving plus staff efforts have resulted in one of the best equipped schools, if not the best equipped school of its size in New Zealand. Next time you are in the college look at these resources and appreciate them. Very few schools can match them.

In leaving this area I know that the next principal will get good support and that with the developments in progress Ruapehu College will be providing an even wider range of educational opportunities in the near future.

On a personal note I would like to thank everyone who has contributed in any way to the success of Ruapehu College and who has supported me in my endeavours.

The past year has been challenging, disheartening but also successful. Whatever it took, we can be proud of this year's fourth formers.










Fifth Formers














Fifth Year Profiles





Cultural Exchanges

Kiwi Colleges and Aussie High Schools Just How Different Are They?

Recently I had the opportunity to really experience life in a New Zealand secondary school. This year I was amazed how much I had to change in discipline, conduct and dress. As well as these adjustments, I also found the work harder. Ruapehu College is much more smaller than Peel Technology High School and the students at Ruapehu start college a year later than at Peel. So instead of having six years at college, as at Peel, there are only five.

At Ruapehu College the discipline is much stricter and the way of disciplining is also much different. At Peel there is a fair discipline code. This is judged by the number of pink (good) or yellow (bad) slips awarded. These slips could be given out for anything. A certain number of each colour either raises or drops your level. Level 10 (the highest) gives you privileges such as discounts on disco tickets and first selection for school trips. But if you drop to Level 3 you are suspended for four days. All privileges are lost, no At Ruapehu straight away it's trips or discos. detention. This leads to loss of privileges. To get suspended something major has to be done.

I was quite shocked also to see the differences in how the school uniform has to be worn and how strict Ruapehu is with what can and can't be worn. In Australia the uniform is neat yet multicoloured due to the amount of mufti while Ruapehu has such a neat and tidy uniform. The students are made to take off wrong coloured clothing, tuck in shirts and pull up socks. I think this is good as it means everyone is looking the same.

I don't know whether it is the usual New Zealand standard or just Ruapehu College but the work is really pushed upon you. There is continuous assignments and homework whereas at Peel it was usually carefree and easy, hardly any stress and I was top of most of my subjects.

This year I've enjoyed but I've had to work hard. Both the schools I think have their advantages and disadvantages but I would have to say that Ruapehu College outdoes Peel Technology High in many ways. Well done New Zealand.

- ...Day 3 (would have been) fun without all the hills and there were more than one.
- ...Day 4 (would have been) fun without the b*** walking!
- ... Forest Gump is a really good movie. I cried a little
- ...Day 6 All the day was fun because we were most of the time sitting.

Thai Lad

I flew out of Auckland in April with fifteen other New Zealanders to start my new life as an American Field Scholar in Thailand. Our first real glimpse of Thai life was an exciting ride through Bangkok's crowded streets crammed in a small bus with all our luggage. At the end of the arrival camp my host parents and fifteen year old brother came to pick me up and we drove to what would become my home for the next ten and a half months. We live in a city of of 60,000 about two hour's drive from Bangkok. That's approximately 50 kilometres.

In my first week of school I had to give a short speech in front of over three and a half thousand students half in English and half in Thai. I'm sure no one understood a word I said - in either language. All the students are very friendly, sometimes a little too much so. A farung is something special here, so you have to get used to people calling out your name and, "Hey you!" wherever you go. The students often seem vounger than what they are - both in their looks and in their behaviour. It rubs off too. I was told before I left I would gain ten years in maturity. I think I've lost about five so far. Thai students have to study quite hard. They go to school in the weekends but my school life is very relaxed. I study some regular subjects which I don't understand much, as well as some personal ones, such as Thai history and language. I go to a Thai boxing club every evening. A while back I had a fight with another New Zealand exchange student, with an audience of a couple of hundred people.

The average person in the street here is very friendly, but given to staring at *farungs* which is annoying. The Thais don't like to do things alone at all, and sometimes have trouble understanding my need for independence. Related to this is their lack of respect for privacy. They hold a lot of respect for their elders and the royal family is held in an almost religious awe.

The shopping is excellent, especially when it comes to clothes. I won't buy jeans for more than NZ\$7. Levi shirts are about the same price. I catch a bus into Bangkok quite often (shopping)! The traffic can be a pain though. You can move 100 metres in an hour sometimes. The road rules are simple. The bigger vehicle gets the right of way.

When we arrived, the weather was really hot. It is the rainy season now and the temperature is quite pleasant. It rains heavily for a few hours each evening. I am looking forward to the 'cool' season, which starts in November. I have six weeks holiday at the moment and begin the second term at the start of November. The second term goes through until March. There are only two terms in a year. I go home in February, which I'm not really looking forward to. Another few months would be good.



S McDonough became senior boy champion for the year, P Wikohika was runner-up, E Drylie was third with J McGill and L Jones fourth equal.



At about 12:35 every Monday to Friday, rain or shine, some thirty senior and a few junior boys venture to the area just below the hockey field to display their talents in a game which usually starts off as touch rugby. LISK COURSES

Link courses were set up to provide additional opportunities for students still at school to develop a range of personal, social, academic and work-related skills which will enhance their potential to make a successful transition from school to further education, training, work and adult life. It aims to supplement the school curriculum, provide additional options, expand educational and vocational horizons and provide experience of adult, non-school study. This year at Ruapehu College a variety of Link Courses have been offered. Students were able to take courses in Mechanics, Shearing, Panel Beating and Spray Painting, Hairdressing and Forestry.

In Term Three an Introduction to Beauty Careers run by Taranaki Polytechnic was held at the college over a two day period. Third, fourth and fifth formers were fortunate to be offered a course in Woodturning. This course was taken by Andrew Beggs over a five day period and students spent time in the Waimarino Forest, Dreadnought Mill and the workshops at College. Sixth and seventh formers were given the opportunity to take the Computer Assisted Design course run over two days by the Taranaki Polytechnic.

The Shearing Course

Take one shearing shed, a few woolly sheep, select ten or twelve students, put them together for five days and there you have it, a shearing course, OR something like that.

Earlier this year, with the help of Jim Pearce (a shearing ace) some of we agriculturally aware dudes took up the challenge to learn about shearing. First up we had to crutch the sheep, a supposedly easy task, or so we thought but a bit of sweat, a few cuts, and runaway sheep later, we realised it wasn't as cruisie as it looked.
