2016 has been a successful year as Ruapehu College continues to provide excellent education and opportunities for our students. The education review office (ERO) has returned us to a three year review cycle and this is a testament to the hard work of our senior leadership team and our teaching staff. Our NCEA results continue to improve and we can be safe in the knowledge that Ruapehu College offers students the ability to achieve their dreams whether it be university, business or further education.

Leadership is an important aspect for our school and the year started with a prefect leadership camp to Gisborne. This included some surfing which proved



to still be a challenge for those of us who have never been able to get up on a board! I have really enjoyed working with our prefects this year; Head Boy Caleb Lyon, Deputy Head Boy Daniel Artz, prefect and BoT rep Matthew Laurenson, Head Girl Lais Morris, and prefect Helena Bethell. 

CACTUS is a well established programme implemented nationwide with a proven track record of developing students physical and mental well being, assisting local youth in their personal development and reducing crime.

CACTUS was based on an Armed Forces fitness programme and designed to extend a young person's mind and physical capability and to build motivation, resilience, problem solving skills and self esteem so that they are motivated to reach their potential. This year the physical training component had an increased focus on teamwork, leadership and discipline. It also aimed to build relationships between Police and the school and the wider school community.

CACTUS ran for ten weeks commencing on 10 February 2016. It consisted of physical training sessions each Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings starting at the Ruapehu College gymnasium at 05.45am.

Monday sessions consisted of an indoor circuit session involving high intensity interval training.
 Wednesdays were battle PT sessions where the students would engage in military style exercise working in a team unit to overcome challenges, carrying army stores such as logs, tyres, Jerry cans, ammo tins to various locations with problem solving tasks along the way.

Friday sessions were aerobic fitness sessions
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usually involving a long slow run.



# CACTUS

The fitness levels of the students were gauged throughout the programme through a RFL (required fitness level) test used by both the Police and the Army. This consisted of a 2.4km run, maximum effort press ups and sit ups.

The 'Longest Day' was held on Thursday the 14th and Friday the 15th of April. Students were transported to the Waiouru Army Base where they were set up in the accommodation. Students were then taken to the pool where they were put through a number of challenges requiring them to work as a team to complete tasks.

At 3am, staff woke the group up and asked them to dress appropriately for PT. Students formed in



ranks and were then given the following challenges: Jerry Can relay, tyre stacking challenge, Log carry, assault course.

After students had been fed they were transported to the beginning of Old Coach Road in Horopito. The students ran the track they were faced with the following challenges. Transporting stores the whole way including a long rope, Jerry cans, a plank, and personal water supplies, quiz questions, a memory task, threading a needle and an 'Egg drop' challenge off a viaduct.

Then onto Christie Park in Ohakune where the local volunteer fire brigade had set up a game of 'fire hose football' there students were tasked with completing setup challenges before facing off with fire hoses to blast a ball through their opponent's goal.

Following this, ropes were attached to the fire engine and staff and students joined forces to pull the fire engine the 1.7kms past Ohakune Primary School to Ruapehu College.

The students had endured 12 hours of physical, mental and emotional challenges they all pulled together as a collective to support each other achieve success. Police, Army and College staff were with them for the duration and were able to witness the lengths at which students pushed themselves, and each other, to complete the challenges presented.

# ENGLISH

The festival provided all sorts of opportunities for our students to engage with professional writers. Several students were able to ask various questions of some of their favourite writers. These interviews were later published in the Bulletin. Dan Rolls of the Ohakune New World supermarket and Kath Campbell at NZR Real Estate very kindly gave us some window space for a display of student work. Our Year 10s were able to fill the allocated space with some very sharp looking adverts for the Writer's Festival. As an extra bonus, we have been able to use these advertisements as part of the Year 10 entry into NCEA and the students will gain NCEA credits for their work.

This year we have been trialling a blended curriculum delivery at the senior levels (Levels 2 and 3). This is an exciting innovation. Initially this is a joint project between the English and the Social Sciences departments. The goal is to raise academic achievement at our senior level. The blend is unashamedly academic. Expectations are set high and students are encouraged to read and write at a level that will fully prepare them for a seamless transition into tertiary study.

There has been some interest in this project from several schools from all over the country. The Ministry has taken an interest to the tune of \$50,000 as a grant to assist us in getting the project up and going. This is a challenging project, both for the teachers involved and for the students. However, to achieve a goal of normalising academic achievement and aspiration, the effort will be all worthwhile.

I end this year's report with an apology. Through the year we have been working to link up with Taumarunui High School for a debating competition.

Unfortunately we have not been able to bring this about. I can promise that we will have a debating competition for the Mayoral Cup next year. We will also return to the annual favourite, the Speech Evening.


Some senior students were able to take part in the Curious Minds project, which was great. Year 11 enjoyed their time with the Hot Wheels cars and track,

'theoretical knowledge', but the elements of performance that are often, difficult to teach: confidence, connection, heart or swag. Whatever you call it, it is often reserved for our most-inner circle. Channelling this into a live performance for the enjoyment of others is one of the greatest challenges around. Especially where judgement and critique is almost certainly guaranteed. Our students are doing well to embrace our whakatauki and 'get out there' for the community and themselves.

With the support of The Mountain Rocks Café, we held our first public performance: 'Pumanawa'. Most of the senior performing arts students planned, practiced and executed performances they can be proud of. The community and whanau support we received on the night was outstanding. Literally! As in standing room only and many watching through the windows outside! This seriously raised the spirits of our nervous Artists, along with much raucous applause and hollerin'. It was a memorable night to say the least! A 'pub-style' gig is a valuable experience for aspiring musicians as it can become your 'bread and butter' in the search for a bigbreak. I would like to give a huge thanks to the owner/operators of 'The Rocks', Karl and Maureen Christensen, for their support with 'Pumanawa'. Hopefully we can make it an annual event.



### PERFORMING ARTS

The middle of the year was loaded with basic music theory and a great deal of time looking at various genres of music and how they are essentially all connected. We studied everything from Mozart and Beethoven to Bob Marley and the artist most commonly known as 'Prince'. We absorbed Bowie and listened to the songs of Glen Frey from 'The Eagles'. Appreciating these 'roots' and 'branches' allowed us to be open to engaging with a much more diverse diet of material. I have come to enjoy Reggae and Blues at the hands of my students. In turn, they have come to love Grunge, Rock and everything about the 90's. Other aspects of the course involved exploring composition and how songs are formed. It was a great privilege to work with musician Karl Thomas (K-Dread, House Of Shem) as a part of the NZ Music Commission project celebrating 15 years of NZ Music Month. Both the senior and junior groups created original songs that have the all hallmarks of 'classic-kiwi' hits.

At the time of writing, we are polishing our performances for the NCEA assessment concert. The students have been working hard on the items and I anticipate awarding a number of 'Merits' at the least. Seniors, you have surprised many this year. Well done. Let's keep the surprises coming!

The interest in Performing Arts in the junior years has been infectious with numbers for 2017 trebling! The Year 10 class was small but they made a fantastic group to teach and in all cases: introduce to instruments! Exploring everything from Coldplay to Dave Dobbyn to Guns 'n' Roses, the girls have consistently demonstrated a strong work ethic and commitment to their tasks. Natural talent has been handy too, as they explore multiple instruments. Their potential is very exciting. So too, is that of the Year 9 group. A braveness and desire to share their abilities has allowed them to be every bit a part of our performances, not only holding their own - but often providing a number of highlights. Whether it be Nirvana or Adele, Year 9 gave it everything! The enthusiasm, dedication and desire to perform takes artists a long way towards wonderful careers in the industry. I expect we have a number of future stars in our midst.





I am very excited about the prospects for 2017. We will be driving towards having Ruapehu College

'on the map' as a place where Performina Arts is valued and excelled in. This will include having all students sitting external exams in music notation and aural theory. Keep an eye out for 'RockQuest'. 'Play It Strange', School Production, and other concert events as we continue to 'walk the talk' in Performing Arts. We may even get out and busk to raise much needed funds to



overhaul our instruments!

# GATEWAY

During 2016 the Gateway Programme provided 15

senior students to undertake various vocational programmes which included work-based placements. Thank you to the local employers who supported these programmes. We were delighted to work again this year with Awhi Dairy Farm, Ohakune Automotive, Ohakune i-Site and McCarthy Transport. We were also pleased to welcome further employers including Mt Ruapehu (their



Customer Services team and their Food and Beverage team), **Eves** Construction, Angel Louise Café, Winstone Pulp International (Electrical Team), Carina's

Native Nursery and Carl & Mel Deadman (who supported an agriculture programme). Students on Gateway have the opportunity to work



towards vocational unit standards recognised by their employer's industry sector; an excellent way for these future employees to begin gaining skills, knowledge and credits that will help them when they start to look for employment.

Building on the programmes run in 2015, new programmes for this year included Horticulture, Electrical Engineering, Cafe Skills, Carpentry and Business Services.

The College is hugely grateful for all the employers who supported these students, without them we would not be able to run Gateway programmes.

This year the college once again utilized the STAR funding to facilitate short courses that help to enhance students' skills and knowledge in a variety of work areas. Once again we ran courses in Barista Training, Food Safety in the Workplace, First Aid in an Outdoor Environment, Chainsaw Safety Training, Outdoor Education (Kayaking) and Workplace Health & Safety Training.

Where possible we try to maximise short courses to provide students with the opportunity to gain industry unit standard credits which are recognised by employers and NZQA (and count towards NCEA qualifications). Although not all STAR activities provide opportunities to work towards credit achievement, this year over 50 senior students achieved in excess of 500 credits as a result of STAR activities.

Other STAR activities this year included:

Fire Arms Safety Training and an on-farm "Taster Day" with Awhi Dairy Farm. STAR



funding also enabled Year 13 students to attend the National Young Leaders Day in Wellington. This is New Zealand's largest and longest running leadership event for high school students and aims to develop and inspire student leadership skills.

Later in the year five senior students were supported by STAR funding to attend the jointly run NZ Defence Force & Police Force's "Life Skills" week, run at El Rancho in Waikanae. This five day programme is organised by Blue Light, a registered charity who has been running programmes for young people for over 30 years. The focus of the Life Skills programme is the building of leadership qualities, self-confidence and self-esteem in youth.

## SOCIAL SCIENCES

Year 9 Social Studies began the year learning new skills that would help them throughout the year. Students learned mapping and geography skills as they studied the regions of New Zealand. They also studied many of the amazing physical features that make New Zealand a special place. Following on students studied topics such as economics, government, how the United Nation works and the role that it plays in the world. They also researched different countries from around the world and looked at the ancient civilizations that have influenced the world.

Year 10 Social Studies began the year learning about New Zealand from before the arrival of people through to the writing of the Treaty of Waitangi. From there we studied other indigenous cultures from around the world. Looking at the similarities and differences between these cultures and Maori culture. The students concluded their year by producing a magazine that included work from Science and Social Studies.

Year 11 History learned about the First World War and the significance of this event to New Zealand. We researched many different aspects of the war from the role of women has to conscientious objectors and other topics involving New Zealand and the war. We then moved onto look at topics involving Civil Rights and how this movement influenced the world. Years 12/13 History was our first attempt at blended learning and combined the subjects of History and English. It was a very good learning experience that was taught by Mr. Greene and Mr. Jordan. The purpose of the project was to create a class that stressed academic writing, which could help students going on to further studies after college. Year 13 students



researched a variety of topics from the 1960s and the Year 12 students explored the 1981 Springbok Tour. This subject allowed students to work in both History and English using the same topics to complete work in both subjects.

Overall it has been a fantastic year for the Social Sciences with some very high quality work completed across all levels.



# CURIOUS MINDS

#### CURIOUS MINDS PROJECT IN ASSOCIATION WITH MASSEY UNIVERSITY

As part of a collaboration between Massey University, Aquanet consulting and Ruapehu District Council, a project called "Curious Minds" was proposed. It's intention was to find an answer to the mystery of the National Park Wetland. The wetland as the ability to remove phosphorus, a pollutant to waterways and is the only wetland of its size in New Zealand to do this. The curious minded would ask "why is that so?" A group was gathered from Ruapehu College and we joined the project. Professor Benoit Guieysse from Massey University came and met with us in June and discussed his proposal. We put on our gumboots and headed to the wetland for a look.

Our next meeting was at the council chambers in Ohakune. We discussed our hypothesis and looked at the data that Ruapehu District Council had found. We also got to sit in some very comfortable seats. The method designing and equipment trialing was carried out at the Powderhorn Chateau. Here we were introduced to Max and Paul, students who are both postgraduate students working on their doctorates. The coincidence being, that they are all French. We are all much better at understanding the French accent now! The Mayor Don Cameron came in for a quick chat and was very encouraging of our work.

Day four and five was the actual field work. We took water and soil samples to find out pH (that's how acidic the water is), the oxygen levels, the temperature and tested for aluminium, iron and phosphorous. Once we got the samples we headed back to school to do the tests.

The project grand finale was an overnight trip to Massey University. We really appreciate the work that Benoit did to create such a special trip. Highlights included going to the wildbase centre where the Wildlife Veterinarian told us about their



job and the work that they do. They let us interact with a Kiwi who was missing a digit and a Tuatara that had a misshaped front leg. We toured around other parts of the engineering faculty and checked out the







micro-brewery that all students who do engineering get to use. In the evening we went and played some very fun games of laser tag and enjoyed pizza! The following day we had a tour of the equipment that is available in the engineering faculty and watched the 3D printer and Laser cutters in action. We also had a look at plasma cutters and the aviation simulator. Then a brief discussion about the results of the National Park Wetland. We identified where the phosphorus is getting absorbed but need more enquiry to find out more in depth knowledge of the process! I hope we can continue in the project in 2017!




