I taught English to that year 9 intake and also in the following year when they became year 10's. I was allocated a mentoring role in our school along with the other staff and we would interview our group of students throughout the year. I think this was a great opportunity to be informed about what the students were actually thinking. I got to know their learning habits, their skills, the ones that liked English, the ones who didn't. I got to know the students who took flight with the subject and the ones who needed a bit more support. Most importantly, I got to know them.

My aim was, and is, that our students, all of them, continue to rise to the opportunity of gaining NCEA credits and to achieve their hopes and dreams for the future. And what better way to understand what this looks like than by actually talking to the students and asking them about their future plans. By teaching our students and by mentoring them, our staff and our leadership team work hard to get the best results and I am grateful for this.

Our academic results continue to be very good and our school is very proud of this. If students want to go to University, or other training or into a trade or some other employment, then Ruapehu College is well poised to facilitate this. Our school role continues to grow with a number of students joining us from other towns as their parents move into the area to work. I hope our students are proud of their time at Ruapehu College.

Leadership is an important facet of life here at the College and I was very proud to work with our prefects: Head prefects Judah Lyon and Macy McNaught, Deputies Dylan Budge and Ashley Akapita, and prefects Nash Jordan and Rebecca Csore. They all contributed to the leadership of the school in their own way.

camp to Valhalla and this has continued to be an enjoyable event for all our year 9 students. Our current prefects spent time at the prefect leadership camp in Gisborne learning about peer support and were able to bring this training and knowledge to the other students and then work with our new year 9's when they arrived at the College. The peer support programme works well in assisting the transition to College and our year 9 students enjoy it too.

The student council has met a few times this year and it was good to see their influence in the school with some of them representing youth on the Ruapehu Youth Council and providing reports to the Board of Trustees. Congratulations to Justice-Rose Dennison who was nominated as the new BoT student representative. Our whanau leaders and cultural leaders continue to have a positive impact on our school. The inter whanau kapahaka just keeps getting better. Congratulations to all our leaders.

The sport in our school was very busy this year. One highlight was seeing the netball well and truly established with the influence of our new sports coordinator Miss Shere and our new staff coach Miss Bam. This workshop is designed to be held with groups of 25 students and a team of facilitators, who must include school

staff, Police staff, and NGO/community sector specialists (with at least one facilitator being male). This composition is a fundamental principle of the Loves-Me-Not workshop.

Sports Breakfast

This was an opportunity to celebrate all our sports at the college and to thank coaches and the families who gave up their time to support our students.

The guest speaker was Mr Mike Clamp, staff member at the College and former All Black 1984-85 who spoke about setting goals and what to do to achieve them. Thank you to the volunteers who donated food and cooked the breakfast and to New World who generously supported the event.

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A travelling group of thespian players visited Ruapehu College to perform Romeo and Juliet. The group are part of the Ugly Shakespeare Company and three actors tour New Zealand schools to bring theatre to the towns.

MATHEMATICS

2018 went past so rapidly, indicating more input by teachers and students alike. Arrival of a few whizz students at the year 9 level boosted the credit rating, which augurs well for the future. The presence of several students enrolled for the full Calculus program at the year 13 level has shown the strength of our students as far as mathematics was concerned. The trend for attaining Numeracy has been on the rise for the last five years and we are expecting the same this year. There has been an addition of new and experienced teachers which has bolstered the foundations of the department and we expect some good outcomes this year.



The use of technology is on the rise with its fair share of advantages and some disadvantages. The department strongly emphasises the need for students to document all work and do their basic sums so they can climb the sequenced ladder of learning in mathematics.

Junior students have had the opportunity to share their pathways with mathematics teachers and choose their respective pathways at the senior level mathematics, showing good and flexible teaching. Modern era employees are now well versed with the specific requirements for apprentices via the vocational pathway. They can no longer be misled as minimum requirement for entry seems to be success at level two mathematics, probably in line with the current intentions of the Ministry of Education goals.

Students have been also advised about the level three requirements if they wish to proceed to join university.

ENGLISH

He is also teaching History, proving to be an invaluable resource for the study of the 1981 Springbok Tour.

With Ms Basse leaving English to be deployed (temporarily, it is hoped) in Social Studies and David Sims continuing to teach English at Year 9, we have had the very rare circumstance of being an all-male English department. Entry into university requires at least 14 Level 3 English credits. Level 2 English is an expectation of most employers.

It is a national goal that all school leavers have the minimum qualification of U. E. literacy. English is the one subject with an Achievement

LIBRARY

This year has been a relatively quiet year regarding activity in the library but that doesn't mean it doesn't have an important role to play in the daily activities of Ruapehu College.

This year saw the introduction of Senior Study classes based in the Non - Fiction area of the library. It was an ideal place as there are seven round tables each with four chairs so students can comfortably sit and work, whether it's with books and/or chrome books. Miss Katie Shere who joined the College staff early in the year supervises these classes ensuring students keep focused on their work.

Junior English classes pay regular visits to the library seeking out books to add to their Reading lists and reading logs. Some juniors even venture into the library during break and lunchtime to socialise and may even pick up a book or magazine to read!

We have another type of book installed in the library - the chrome book!

There are 52 chrome books based in the Library workroom and it's my job to supervise their management during a school day. They are light in weight, work fast and are reliable most of the time and are constantly in demand by the teaching staff. They have become an important working tool and are a valuable asset for students and teachers.

I have been School Librarian since October 2008 and in the past ten years I have seen a great change, albeit gradually over that time, in the number of students borrowing books from the school library. In my first 5-6 years at the College there were Junior students literally reading hundreds of books and although they may not have continued reading that many when they became Seniors they still continued to issue books to read for pleasure. Standards course specifically designed with the five reading and five writing credits in mind. These can be done without external examinations and over the course of two years. For most students, however, literacy qualifications should not be the goal. You will get your literacy with your (far more valuable) Level 2 English.

Yes, there is some reading and writing to be done. There is also some opinion forming, some argument proving, a great deal of self-reliance and a challenge that you, in all reality, have to meet in order to give yourself the broadest option when you leave school. SCIENCE

The Science department has been quite different this year. With Miss Wilson away in Term 1 and 2 on the Royal Society Leadership Programme, we welcomed Dr Simon Oakley, who covered Miss Wilson's classes for us. He brought a different viewpoint to the department as an academic, broadening our horizons a little. When she returned Miss Wilson had lots of new ideas which we are slowly implementing into the Junior Science Programme.

Some senior students took part in the 2018 Kiwi 4 Ever programme in term one. They did well and thoroughly enjoyed their experience. It is a wonderful programme sponsored by Untouched World. During the week, the students learn not only about the Kiwi and its biology but also their heritage and the richness of the native forest in the Waimarino. The Kiwi as a New Zealand icon is also covered. On the last morning of the week they took part in presentations about what they had experienced and learned.

Year 12 Science was introduced this year as a course, leading on from Practical Science in year 11. This is for students with an interest in Science in general but not wanting specialist Sciences. Based on only internal assessments, these students studied identification of ions in Chemistry, microscope use in Biology, the volcanic rocks of Mt Ruapehu and the changes in the native bush due to altitude on the mountain.

As part of their internal assessments Year 11 enjoyed their time with the hot wheels cars and track, learning about the physics of movement was cool fun. Also they investigated the action of Rennin on milk in the stomachs of babies by setting up an artificial situation in test tubes in the Lab.

The Junior classes have followed a programme this year with lots of practical work, especially after Miss Wilson's return in term 3 and 4 and one year 10 class looked at designing their own investigations in Metal Chemistry as part of a level 1 NCEA internal assessment trial in term 4.

Some of Year 10 was able to travel to Palmerston North at the start of term 4 to a Year 10 Day at Massey University. They enjoyed 4 sessions in the university labs, seeing and experiencing many new things. Making a solar cell using blueberries in Chemistry, playing with liquid nitrogen in Physics, playing a probability game in Statistics and the cool fruit flies in Biology.

Rachel Wills, our great Lab Tech continues to manage us and our resources. We continue to value her contribution and thank her for her diligence. Without her help the staff would not be able to do so much practical work with their classes.

Science is very relevant to all aspects of our lives and will be increasing in importance in our futures. Work hard and enjoy as you study and understand your life and the connections and influences involved in living.

DESIGN AND INNOVATION RESISTANT MATERIALS

The emphasis of the subject is very much on developing the critical thinking and creativity of the students using resistant materials.

Senior students were involved in the making of a reversible Chess board before working on a range of projects of individual choice. Year 11 also worked on individual projects having completed the making of a Bluetooth speaker lamp.

The Junior school has been involved in a number of smaller projects to develop their skills and knowledge in the subject, including, lighting, phone holders, clocks and chocolate moulds using vacuum forming. Year 10 were entered into NCEA for one standard, with all 8 students passing, Particular congratulations go to Cameron Artz and Keri Baker who achieved a Merit grade.

The focus this year was to get the engineering side of the workshop to a similar level as the wood side and the introduction of Architecture and Interior Design through the Design and Visual Communication course. Students are now using more metal in their projects and a group of 12 students, across all three levels, will form an Interior Design class in 2019.

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DESIGN AND INNOVATION FOOD TECHNOLOGY

Ask any student what they enjoy most about 'Design in Food' and without a doubt the answer would easily be 'THE FOOD'. But dig a bit deeper and it's like burrowing into an all you can eat buffet. Student voice was tremendously humbling and as every kai ako does at the end of each teaching term - reflect to capture student engagement and enjoyment in the classroom to encourage learning. The Junior school is always a place where the curriculum allows more freedom and this was reflected in the students feedback.

Design in Food is described as a place that students have a freedom to explore and create recipes. It's a busy place which at time involves written work and cleaning (the less favourable areas of the subject), but an awesome environment where everyone gets on and gets along.

Highlights are plenty ranging from top of the list – Inter whanau cooking competitions, cooking challenges, cooking meals from other countries, and tasting different food.

At the Senior school things get a bit more serious. More emphasis is put on evidence based learning with cooking. Students can get a little shy about their photos being taken with the products they make (however this doesn't mean it doesn't happen and perhaps should be a prerequisite). A mix of unit standards and achievement standards means there is something for everyone. Outside providers come in to teach students on food safety and coffee essentials as part of the level 2 programme. Our students wow the providers every year with their pristine uniform, appearance and great attitudes.

If I had to sum up my year at Ruapehu College, it would be, 'He aha te mea nui o te ao? He akonga, he akonga, he akonga.'



PERFORMING ARTS

Aretha Franklin famously said: "It's very satisfying. To perform the way you want to. The way you know you can." 2018 has been yet another highly satisfying year for the Performing Arts at Ruapehu College and I am pleased to reflect very much in-line with the wisdom of the late, great "Queen of Soul". There have been a great many reasons for this. Student numbers and interest continues to grow, so much so that 2019 will see NCEA Level 1 in it's own exclusive class for teaching and learning. High quality work, practice and performances by our Seniors continues to help inspire our Junior students to continue their studies in Performing Arts, as well as the variety offered in providing opportunities across multiple disciplines. These are exciting times, indeed!

As was the case last year, the music world was saddened by the passing of a number of industry names, some of them icons in their genre. Some icons across genre. The deaths of Avicci, XXXTentacion, Dolores O'Riordan (The Cranberries) and the "Queen Of Soul" herself - Aretha Franklin – allowed all of our students to explore these genres in depth, allowing them to not only understand where these artists placed in music history, but also how these genre came about and can be linked through the fabric of music. This broad, rich understanding of music, culture, history and society has become an important part of the Performing Arts curriculum. Justified this year by a number of Merit level research projects from Level 2 and 3 in 2018.

27 Performing Arts students from Years 9 to 13 travelled to Palmerston North to see "HIStory", the world's premier Michael Jackson tribute show. The students commented that it was spooky seeing 'Dantanio' on stage as Michael Jackson as he had every move, gesture and costume of the late "King of Pop" perfected. The replication of Jackson's iconic voice was eerily accurate also. All of the group had a fantastic time dancing and singing along to every one of the hits you'd expect to hear. It was a fantastic field trip that lasted into the small hours of the morning and we look forward to next years show.

Following on from 2017, Songwriting and Composition was once again a major focus for our NCEA students. Having attended the Smokefree Rockquest with great success, "etc, etc..." were again determined to take the stage this year. With the addition of Mackenzie Charlton on bass guitar, Nazomi Groot, Ryan Burton and Kate Rowe wrote a bunch of different songs together. Once



these ideas were fully formed, the students were fortunate to travel to Wellington to record their work with musician and sound engineer Scott Wylie at Brooklyn Audio. Mr. Wylie was thoroughly impressed with the ability of our Level 1 students and gave high praise for their talents as instrumentalists, composers and as young people.

The recordings became the basis for Rockquest preparations with the Whanganui Regional Final being held in June. The students created an army of supporters, sold t-shirts and performed at lunchtime in the build up to the big night at the Whanganui Royal Opera House. 30 or so supporters made the trip down to enjoy the music of the best young talent the Whanganui region has to offer. The band performed exceptionally well with charisma and accuracy, enjoying the support of a packed theatre with a mini-mosh-pit of fans. I am exceptionally proud of "etc, etc..." as individuals and as a band. This year they received the "ZM People's Choice" Award, affording them a chance at reaching the National Finals through video submission. The work these four students put in to their craft is truly exceptional and it is no surprise they are already planning for next years event. With the ongoing support of friends and whanau, they are each capable of becoming very successful, professional performers in their own right. The members of "etc, etc..." have all been acknowledged for their ongoing commitment, high standards and achievements in Performing Arts at this years Senior Prizegiving.

Ruapehu College was visited by "The Ugly Shakespeare Company" earlier in the year. This touring group of young actors travel New Zealand presenting a modern take on some of William Shakespeare's best-loved work. This ye ar the English and Performing Arts Departments combined to bring "Romeo & Juliet" to the students. The performance was high-paced, hilarious and full of youthful relatability for the audience and plenty of innuendo for the older crowd. A number of our students enthusiastically participated in dramatic workshops with the players afterwards, which they found to be very beneficial and a great deal of fun.

The school production "There's An App For That?" was a significant highlight of the year. We were very fortunate to welcome Miss Shere on board as Producer. Her organisational skills (and fill-acting) proved invaluable in staging what turned out to be a very high-paced, complex and difficult comedy

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farce over six performances. The students worked very hard and gained new dramatic skills. A focus on comic timing and 'working' an audience was necessary and the finished product was a real triumph. Mackenzie Charlton, Dylan Tekura Bishop and Kate Rowe gave outstanding performances, however all of the core roles were executed to a very high standard. I would like to thank Aiko Groot, Barbara van der Woerd, Jake Fah and Paula Charlton for their assistance behind the scenes with set construction, painting, lighting and audio-visual recording. Without the help of these parents and the support of the wider community, such projects are simply not possible.

The Year 9 taster course initiative allowed all students in this cohort to have a 10-week experience in the Performing Arts classroom. Instrumental opportunities in ukulele, keyboard and percussion were enjoyed by all as well as units exploring music theory and notation, New Zealand Music Month, the Genesis of Modern Pop, Musical Theatre, Genre in Music and basic script work. As well as this, the students learned a number of improvisational skills through drama-based games. It was very encouraging to have some Year 9 students put these skills to use with roles in the Production. Several Year 10 students also gave fine performances this year, with Dalton Jordan a particular highlight. It is very encouraging that the Drama discipline is of high interest in this group. Many are involved in local theatre and there is potential for more specific NCEA Drama standards to be offered in the future with continued trends of growth at this level. Most of Year 10 picked up instruments for the first time, many developing a legitimate passion for playing. These early stages are a very exciting time for a young musician as they work hard to master the basic mechanics of playing accurately and well.









A small cohort of Year 13 students are leaving the department this year. Ashley Akapita, Nicholas McDonnell and Warren Williams have all become widely known at Ruapehu College for their passion for music and the skills they have in their chosen disciplines. We wish you well in the future and hope that your love for making music stays with you and that you continue to share your gifts with others. I am very appreciative of your contributions to the Performing Arts at Ruapehu College. On your journey through the adult world, don't forget to heed Ms Franklin's most famous advice:

"R-E-S-P-E-C-T. Find out what it means to me!"

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

It has been another year of hard work, learning and enjoyment. In PE classes students learn about themselves and how to best interact with others through movement contexts.

Year 9's and 10's started the year learning about Hauora in a practical context. They explored what it looks like to have good physical, social, mental/ emotional and spiritual health through this Maori worldview.

The next assessment involved students creating new games based on hockey skills to test their independent working ability. Other units have involved interpersonal skills, resilience tested through a variety of fitness activities, practical volleyball and socio-critical thought.

The year 13's started the year training for and completing a triathlon in Whanganui. The whole class did well gaining Merit's for their times in the practical assessment. In term two we studied biomechanics and students had to analyse themselves performing a lacrosse shot. We finished the year with the class planning and implementing a two day journey which involved completing the Whanganui River Road. This included on Day 1 a 27km bike ride from Raetihi to Pipiriki, a 22km canoe to Matahiwi, and camping overnight at Matahiwi. Day 2 involved a 40km bike ride from Matahiwi to the end of the river road.

The year 12's began the year planning and implementing an overnight tramp. We completed a challenge tramp to the Waihaha Hut from the Waihora Lagoon. This class has also completed an assessment which involved coaching students at Ohakune Primary School.

As well as completing a 4 week training programme which prepared them to compete against each other in turbo touch and gain fitness for their winter sports.

The year 11's have made the step up into NCEA and had a successful year. They have participated in a range of different activities and sports. Term one involved them being presented with different survivor team building challenges and required them to demonstrate interpersonal skills to solve these. Students have also learnt about bones, muscles and biomechanics and used this knowledge to improve their volleyball skills. This class finished the year learning about selfmanagement and demonstrating this in a series of mastery challenges.

SECONDARY TERTIARY ALIGNMENT RESOURCE (STAR)

This year the College once again utilized the STAR funding to facilitate short courses that helped to enhance students' skills and knowledge in a variety of work areas as well as provide useful resources to enhance learning within the areas of Hospitality, Financial Literacy, Tourism and preparatory work in getting students work ready (includes work on understanding job applications, careers and building their own portfolio to present to potential employers).
