Mrs Julie Downey spent time relieving and then was employed to work with students on achievement support.


STAFF FAREWELLS

Chairman's Report

2015 has been an extremely intense and sometimes frustrating year for the governance and management of our school as the demands of compliance and red tape indicative of current times, have kicked in. However, in working through all of these issues as well as the pains of being a small school with a united and consistent board, and a good management team and staff it has shown our strengths and how well our school is tracking.

Financially we are strong, with a decile change earlier this year, we saw a slight lift in our funding. Thanks to good management we have run well, keeping strictly to our budget and once again we would like to thank Mr David Hilson for his assistance on our finance committee. We are currently working on our 10-year property plan (10YP) which will be finalised and signed ready for the start of the 2016 school year. As promised, we were to see a new hall and performing arts facility as well as changes to the front entrance of our school. This was all on the drawing board for early this year. However, due to extra compliance and red tape, this has been one of the frustrations we have had to contend with, instead of the project being finished we are currently only at the tendering process, with a vision of the construction being ready to start very early in 2016.

With a visit from ERO (Education Review Office) and an NZOA audit we were faced with more compliance. With the success of our NZQA audit where they examine our procedures and policy for our student assessment we will not have to undergo another audit for three years which is a really good outcome. Working with ERO who are due back in term two of 2016 with suggested changes we will be on track for a two to three year review. Working through the issues outlined above has been made possible with an extremely good

management team. I would also like to thank our Senior Advisor from the Ministry of Education, Mrs Lia Tuffield who has been a big part of supporting us and we would like to wish her well in her retirement.

As always on our board we are reviewing policies and term two saw the review of our lock-down

policy which is a part of our Health and Safety, this was timely as Term 3 saw our first ever lock-down. All went well and thanks to Lane Demchy for his continued work on Health and Safety.

We have also seen many other achievements this year, including the running of our first CACTUS programme which was a huge success. We also had our first overseas student from Sweden. We anticipate this being the first of many. Our success on the mountain with our ski and board teams in the NISSC Competition.

So, overall another successful year, a special thank you to my fellow board members, thank you to our student representative Zynaia Winters, and welcome to our new student representative Matthew Laurenson.

Thank you to Kim Basse our principal, and to Jason White and Marama Allen - our senior management team for supporting her.

Thank you to all our staff, without you we would not have a school.

To our staff members and students who are leaving us, all the very best.

VISITORS

Sustainable House Project

Canterbury University Professor Susan Krumdieck, and final year Mechanical Engineering students talked to our school assembly about a project to design and build a 'Ngati Rangi house' later in the year. The Ruapehu Whanau Transformation team and Ruapehu District Council have engaged with the southerners, as part of the project's focus to find environmental, sustainable solutions for the region.

The rural Ruapehu area has many economic challenges including the lack of affordable, healthy, comfortable housing while keeping families health and safety at the forefront of their thinking.

The district's un-insulated homes are contributing to health and socio-economic issues.





Self Defence Course for Girls

The course helped the girls learn ways of dealing with unsafe situations and threats to their safety.

This included how to deal with acquaintance and stranger attacks including being followed, obscene phone calls, and safety issues relating to text and the internet. The course also covered distinguishing between good and bad touching and strategies to deal with inappropriate touching. These skills were reinforced through discussion and the development of verbal and physical skills to help the girls keep themselves and others (e.g. friends / siblings) safe. This course offers each girl the opportunity to take a positive step to reinforce her ability to think confidently, speak strongly, and use her physical skills when necessary.

It was run by qualified trainers through the Self Defence project -Wahine Toa from Geraldine.

SECONDARY TERTIARY ALIGNMENT RESOURCE (STAR)

Again this year the College was able to utilize the STAR funding to facilitate a range of short courses as well as activities away from the classroom. This funding is available to schools to provide senior students with opportunities to gain skills that will help them in their work choices and/or onto Tertiary Education. Courses organised for 2015 include:

- Barista Training
- Basic Food Safety in the workplace
- Chainsaw Safety
- Design and Screen Printing in Textiles
- Livestock Handling
- Outdoor Education Level 1, 2 & 3

- SOND Technology & Music Performance

CAREERS


POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR FOR LEARNING - PB4L

TE REO MAORI






SOCIAL SCIENCE

Year 9 Social Studies began the year learning new skills that would help them throughout the year. Students learned mapping and geography skills as they studied the regions of New Zealand. They also studied many of the amazing physical features that make New Zealand a special place. After that students studied topics such as economics, government, how the United Nation works and the role that it plays in the world. They also researched different countries from around the world and looked at the ancient civilizations that influenced the world.

Year 10 Social Studies began the year learning about New Zealand from before the arrival of people through the writing of the Treaty of Waitangi. From there we studied other indigenous cultures from around the world. Looking at the similarities and differences between these cultures and Maori culture. The students concluded their year by producing a magazine that included work from Science and Social Studies.

Senior History was taught as one class with three different levels this year. Year 11 students covered the



topics of New Zealand Nuclear Issues, Palestine/Israel conflict, and Civil Rights. Year 12 students looked at World War I and II and how they were significant to New Zealand. They also studied the Springbok tour of 1981 and the impact this had on New Zealand. Year 13 students undertook a huge research and paper of their choice. We had topics such as the Women's Movement, Gallipoli, and the history of the All Blacks Haka. Students also studied the use of nuclear weapons in World War II and the impact that has had on global security.

Students in Year 10 Social Studies completed a unit of work in accounting to give them a taster of the subject. This worked really well and will help guide students in their subject choice for 2016.






The Science Roadshow visited the college this year and our junior students enjoyed the many and varied exhibits and hands on activities. The tall guy with the huge feet will be remembered by many.

TECHNOLOGY HARD MATERIALS

Technology Hard Materials started with a trip in the second week for the Year 12s and Year 13s to ITM's prenail and truss fabrication plant in Whatawhata, outside of Hamilton. The class was walked through the plant and learned how the automated process improves quality, saves time and reduces wastage in the modern building environment. The students replicated this process in a truss building assessment in the workshop during Term 1 and 2. In term 3, the seniors planned and worked on several projects including tables, drift trikes, desks and Cape Cod chairs. Students demonstrated advanced skills in workshop technology through working on their own design and construction projects.

The Year 11s worked through the design process and made secure safes and display cabinets within the personal storage item context. The students researched materials, special features and wrote a planning brief. Then students constructed their products in the workshop. Several design disciplines were assessed including skills, processing, working drawing, 3D sketching and trade mathematics. The students made aluminium fish smokers as part of their planning and skills based assessment.

This year, the Year 10 students focused on skills and working safely in the workshop. The students constructed components for drift trikes and gained a range of skills including measurement, lathing steel and welding. The students also learned about timber joints and made small tables in term 3 and 4.

The Year 9s were introduced to workshop safety, design and shield making. 9LB along with a few Y10s also helped with the ANZAC crosses provided for the RSA in April. 9KC helped with making some predator traps for DOC. The demand for traps is in the tens of thousands for Tongariro National Park and DOC is appreciative of any efforts to meet this demand. Mr D Alexander



TEXTILES - SOFT MATERIALS TECHNOLOGY

Textiles

Education Outside the Classroom is often valuable as it can show the subject being used in the real world. Such was our annual trip to Wellington this year to see the show World of Wearable Art. We travelled down in the school van, and students were in high spirits when we arrived in Wellington. Part of the afternoon was spent exploring various textiles related places including Te Papa Tongarewa before getting dressed up to walk to the arena for the show. In the morning after the show we visited the Suzanne Aubert Visitors Centre to see something of our wider local history and saw photos of her with projects she started in Jerusalem, and afterwards visited her burial place. At the show, our students were sitting on the edge of their seats uttering "Wow", as one surprise after another paraded before our eyes. It was an incredible show, and hopefully will be an inspiration for a future Snow Queen show which has become part of the calendar in Ohakune. Our own Snow Queen was an inspiration to a number of students who completed outfits for both the Waimarino Junior Wearable Arts and the Snow Queen. In the Junior competition, Amy Thompson won the Senior section(15-18 years), and Kaiawa Connelly won the Junior (13-15) section. Sophie Couper came third in the Junior section. Amy had used recycled offcuts from safety masks, beads and fabric from old garments. Her short skirt outfit was stunning with a long decorated train. Kaiawa used recycled hessian and rope from the store in the classroom. She had unravelled the rope and couched it to the garment. It was a stunning use of materials.

In the Open Snow Queen, commendable entries were paraded by Kaiawa Connelly, Grace Elliot-Brown, Ayla Story and Amy Thompson, whose garment was modelled by Manaia Toto. In the classroom we have a variety of projects undertaken. The Senior Textiles class began the year in discussion with the teacher to negotiate their own projects, a project that they have had the passion to work through. The Technology matrix allows a wide selection of achievement standards to consider and available for various strengths. The on-line student learning system is used frequently by students. All assessments and resources are posted on-line and students have access to them at home. This is a big help to keep up to date with work.

This year the senior student's context was 'clothing for school leavers' making it a relevant study to do surveys, research and plan for suitable garments. The students opted to make The Traditional Kai Night the place to parade their finished garments. The other major study for Senior classes has been deconstructed screen printing, where the screen is pulled across a design made of textured materials with dye thickened with alginate, and after drying

the clear alginate is used over the screen onto fabric, where the dye is slowly released to give many different prints.

The junior textiles class have two terms each doing Soft Materials Technology, and the course is designed to give as wide a selection of techniques and processes to allow students to have skills from which to make good decisions. This year we have been harakeke weaving, sewing, stencilling, stamping, rubbing, wearable art, discharge printing and making wall hangings, using digital images printed on fabric or painted images.

Textiles Technology is a wonderful subject allowing very individual and creative work. Students can work at their own pace against a criteria set down by the technology process.

We acknowledge and are very grateful to members of the public who donate fabrics and recycling materials used in our department. Mrs M George

Ngahuia Brider-Wiari – Good aggression on court, and once she fine tunes key basketball skills, you will not want to be in her pathway.


